Centennial

ST. JOHNS The Robert G. and June L. Young farm, 5205 N. McNeil Rd., St. Johns, was one of 12 Michigan farms recently certified as centennial farms. The Young farm has been in the same family since Jan. 27, 1847.

A centennial farm is ten or more acres of farm land owned by the same family for at least 100 years. Almost 5,500 Michigan farms have been certified as centennial farms since the program was begun in 1948.

Owners receive centennial certificates from the Bureau of History in the Michigan Department of State, with markers for the farms provided by the Detroit Edison and Consumers Power Company.

Moving

ST. JOHNS The Michigan Department of State has announced that the St. Johns Secretary of State Branch Office, located at 1515 N. US-27, will be closed on Nov. 20. The office will be moved to the Southpoint Mall that day.

Hearing officer for Perry is appointed

Loren Perry, the St. Johns High School counselor accused of sexual misconduct, last week waived a preliminary exam in district court, said Clinton County Prosecutor Jon Newman.

Newman said late last week that Perry was scheduled to be arraigned into circuit court before Judge Timothy Green on Nov. 17.

Meanwhile, the St. Johns Board of Education last week appointed Donald Reisig, a Lansing attorney with experience in tenure cases, to be the hearing officer during a school board hearing into Perry's employment status with the school district.

At the hearing — for which a date has not yet been set — the school board will consider the dismissal of Perry from school district employment.

Reisig's role in the hearing will be comparable to that of a judge in a criminal trial, said board trustee Robert Craig. He compared the role of school district lawyer Keven Harty to that of a prosecutor and the role of the school board to that of a jury.

It will be the school board, not the hearing officer, that determines Perry's employment status.

The tenure hearing is a completely separate process from criminal prosecution of Perry. Only whether Perry can be legally dismissed from his job — not his guilt or innocence of the sexual misconduct accusations that have been brought against him — will be decided by the school board.

Perry was arraigned Oct. 24 in district court on four counts of second degree criminal sexual conduct.

Community Living Center is a home to those living there

On a recent autumn afternoon the grounds of the Clinton County Community Living Center are covered by an orange carpet of leaves. Inside, the walls of the office of Administrator Barbara Craig are painted lavender.

The office contains a gray filing cabinet of the sort that will be found in any government building — but not far away a classical guitar leans against a wall. That sort of gentle contrast is characteristic of the Community Living Center — a place that is at once a home and an institution for the 20 people who live there.

"I like a light and cheerful atmosphere and my staff is trained to provide this," says Craig, whose job it is to supervise the facility, at 3815 County Farm Road.

One of the first things she did when she took the post several years ago, says Craig, was to replace the dreary institutional colors with a decor that was lighter, more cheery and more like a home.

The facility had its start in the 1920s as a poor farm. The people who lived at the farm would probably be called street people today, says Craig. They were people who had nowhere else to turn. Craig says there is a record of a man who, tired of his marriage, brought his wife to the farm and abandoned her.

In those days the farm was managed by a live-in husband and wife team. Although the role of the facility has changed since then — and its name has been changed to reflect the new role — the name County Farm Road is a reminder of what the place once was.

"It was actually a working farm," says Craig. "People worked here and that's how they lived."

In the 1970s, amid a societal trend toward moving the mentally impaired out of institutions and back into their communities, the county poor farm became a place where people who could not live alone could live together. Today many of the residents are mentally handicapped, including some who lived a long part of their lives in institutions.

"At this time our purpose changed and our needs changed," says Craig. "The live-in manager and his wife were not educated and equipped to deal with handicapped people."

Craig, who is educated in social work and psychology, heads a staff of two supervisors, a laundress, a cook, and a maintenance person. Although the building is staffed at all times, none of the staff live in the building.

The residents themselves help with the work. Depending on their abilities, they help with meals, cleaning, laundry and other housekeeping chores.

When a new resident comes to live at the center, says Craig, an assessment of their needs and abilities is conducted and an activities plan is

formulated. Some residents attend the Community Mental Health Day Treatment program in St. Johns, others participate in job training at the Peckham Vocational Industries in Lansing, and others work on completing their high school education.

At the center itself, there is an emphasis on group activities that help residents develop social skills: exercise groups, a pool tournament organized by a resident, classes in arts and crafts, health and grooming and Bible study.

Craig says the programs she develops depend largely on the needs of the population of the center at the time. But one thing, she says, remains constant.

"The biggest challenge, as I see it, is to develop self-respect," she says.

There are really two groups of residents at the Community Living Center, says Craig. One group consists of those who are permanent residents. The other group consists of those who will eventually leave the center and who are working towards independence.

Groups will work together to form sex education plan

Five people from a citizen advisory council will work with the three school board members who are slated to bring a proposed sex education policy back to the full board in January.

School board members Jeanette Adams, James Parr and Robert Craig last month formed a committee to draft the proposed policy. Previously, a citizen advisory council working independently of the school board developed curriculum guidelines for a kindergarten through fifth grade health education curriculum.

The board members said last week they would work with a five-member sub-committee of the citizen advisory council.

The advisory council members are high school counselor Terry Cornwell, school nurse Caroline Moore, parent Jim Butler and high school students Emily Holley and John Kuenzli.

Board member Craig said the

group will attempt to have materials ready for the full board to look at during a board workshop scheduled for Dec. 5 and 6.

"We're going to do a major re-write of that administrative proposal," said Craig, referring to a proposed sex education policy submitted to the board by the school administration last month.

The three board members said when the committee was formed last month that their concern with the proposed policy included concern about sections of the policy dealing with contraception.

Craig said the K-5 health education curriculum guidelines, drafted by the citizen advisory council, were not expected to be significantly changed.

He also said the advisory council plans to survey parents in the school district to gather data about attitudes toward sex education. The survey will initially be directed toward parents of elementary students, Craig said.

M & M first company to build in industrial park

The agreement by M & M Restaurant Supply to open a \$2 million plant in St. Johns that will employ over 60 people is the first major success of a thrust to attract jobs to the county, said the county economic development head last week.

"I particularly happy about it because it gets the St. Johns industrial park off the ground," said Bill Dutton, director of the Clinton Area New Development Organization. "Nothing breeds success like success."

Dutton, asked what sort of wages the company is expected to pay, said,

"I don't have specific numbers but I know they're very competitive."

Jobs generated by construction of the facility will include truck driving, warehousing and office work.

Dutton said the restaurant supply company — which recently became the first company to agree to build a facility in the St. Johns industrial park — was initially prompted to look at the Mid-Michigan Area by the RED Team, a regional economic development organization that includes Clinton County.

M & M later began talks with city officials and subsequently with CANDO, the county-level version of the RED Team. CANDO, headed by Dutton, is in its first year of operation.

"We kind of got in at the end of the process but I think we were instrumental," said Dutton of the agreement by M & M to locate here.

THE CITY OF St. Johns in 1980 bought the land for the industrial park. It is located on N. US-27 near Walker Road, next to the Knights of Columbus Hall.

The City also established the park as an industrial facilities district, making companies that locate there eligible to apply for 12-year, 50-percent property tax abatements.

The Economic Development Corporation, which at one time was used to provide low-interest financing to new industries, is not involved in the M & M agreement, said Dutton. Federal tax reform this year has made EDC-type financing ineffective as an incentive, he said.

Tax reform has in fact caused a great deal of confusion in economic development circles, said Dutton.

"I don't think anyone knows how much we can do right now," he said. "Sure, we can give tax abatements. But how much can we sweeten the pot? That's the question."

In the meantime, Dutton said, Clinton County is forging ahead in its efforts.

"People are starting to get on the bandwagon," he said. "People are realizing you either grow or stagnate. It's inexorable."

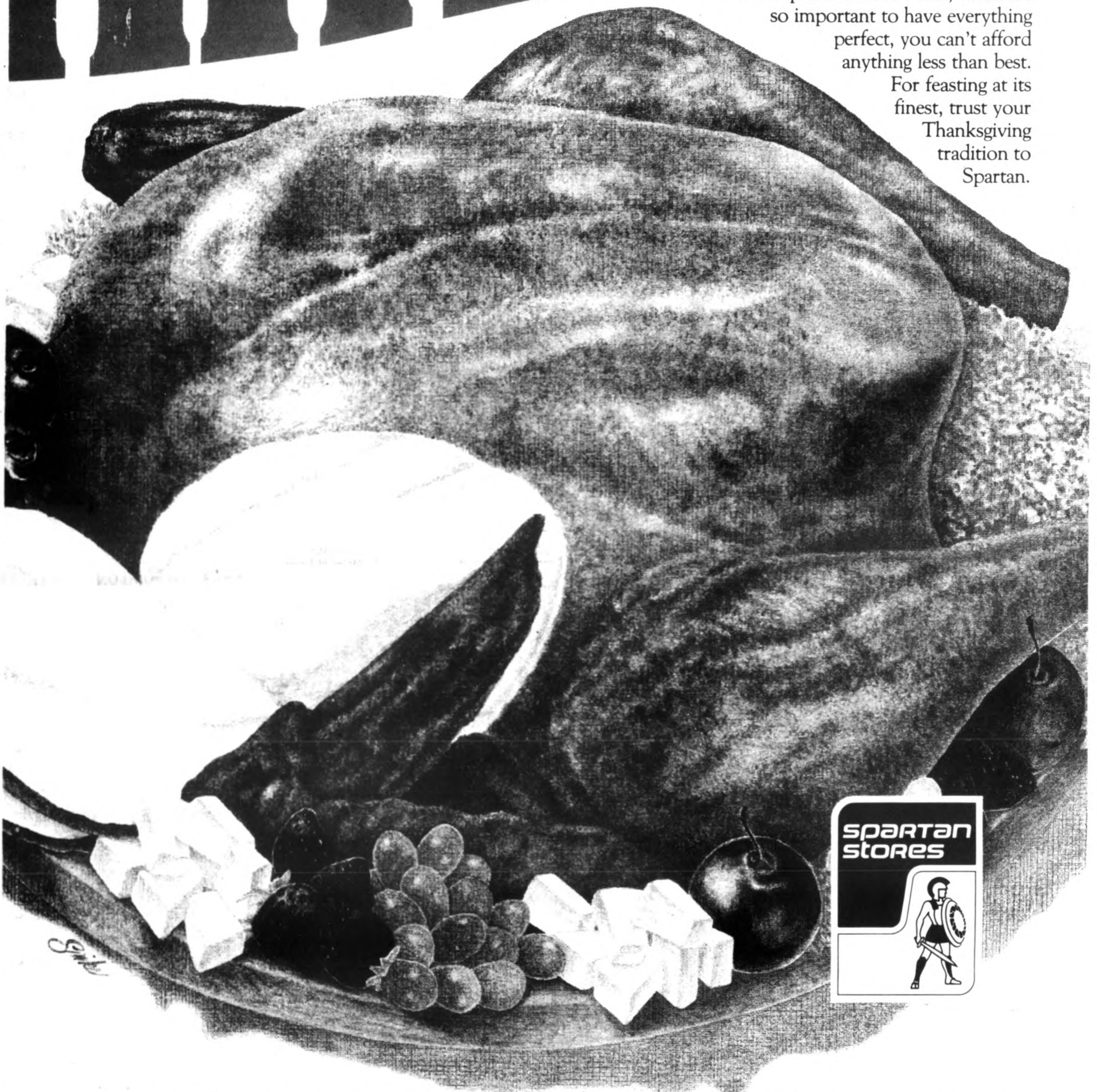

Clinton Memorial and Carson City join to apply for a mobile CT unit

Carson City and Clinton Memorial Hospitals have submitted a Certificate of Need application for participation in a mobile CT scanning service program, according to a joint press release issued last week by hospital presidents Bruce Traverse and Paul McNamara.

The CT scanner combines the principles of x-ray with advances in computer technology, producing a cross-sectional view of the body rather than the flat-body image of an x-ray. The low-level x-ray beams provide an accurate image of the entire body, with organs and tissue "pictured" in precise detail.

CT scanning allows doctors to make an early diagnosis of any number of internal disorders in a relatively short time. It is particularly valuable in emergency situations.

The CT scanner is housed in a van, specifically designed for transporting and delivering the service. It provides all the features of a stationary unit. The unit would be staffed by registered x-ray technologists.

"MOBILE service programs are a cost-effective and convenient way to bring this highly sophisticated service to patients in our rural communities," said the statement. "By

sharing a mobile unit, we will avoid duplication of services, eliminate the expense of high-priced capital investment and pay only when a patient is scanned."

The Certificate of Need application is required by the state. It will be reviewed by the Michigan Department of Public Health to determine the level of need for the proposed CT Scanning Services in Montcalm and Clinton County areas.

If approved, Carson City and Clinton Memorial Hospitals could both begin providing CT scanning services in mid-1987.

Family focus

Preparing venison

Dawn Harris



We are now in the thick of hunting season and soon many of you will find yourself with some venison to prepare. In my column today I have included some tips to follow to prepare and enjoy venison.

Freezing is the easiest way to preserve venison. To prepare venison for freezing, trim away connective tissue and fat, the source of strong "gamey" flavor. Protect the meat by wrapping it in moisture, vapor-resistant packaging materials, such as heavy aluminum foil, laminated freezer paper, thick plastic freezer bags or plastic film. Package in quantities your family will eat in one meal. Label each package with the date and cut of meat.

Freeze quickly at 0 degrees F or below. In a home freezer, freeze no more than two pounds per cubic foot of total storage space at one time. Overloading slows down the rate of freezing, and foods that freeze too slowly may lose quality or spoil. For quickest freezing, place packages against freezing plates or coils and leave a little space between so air can circulate freely.

For best eating quality, use frozen ground venison within two-three months. Frozen venison steaks or roasts should be used within 8-12 months.

When cooking venison, the tenderness of the cut will be your guide for choosing either moist or dry heat. Your venison roasts, steaks and ribs, and ground meat will require a different cooking style to achieve a flavorful, tender product. Today we will concentrate on steaks and ribs.

Steaks and ribs retain more juice if the cuts are thick (1-1 1/4 inches). Tenderness will be the guide for choosing dry or moist heat cookery. Use moist heat for less tender cuts or tenderize in one of these ways: 1. Cut the long muscle fibers by pounding or scoring. 2. Soften the tissue by using acids (lemon juice, tomato juice). 3. Use commercially prepared marinades or tenderizers.

Use dry heat cookery for tenderized or already tender cuts. Cook quickly over high heat.

If you are looking for a good venison steak recipe the following Venison Stroganoff may be just the dish you will want to add to your cookbook this fall.

Venison Stroganoff

- 1/2 cup onion, chopped
- 1/2 cup celery, chopped
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1 1/2 lb. cubed venison
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 2 tbsp. flour
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 tsp. paprika
- 1 lb. fresh or 1-8 oz. can mushrooms (optional)
- 1 can undiluted cream of chicken soup
- 1 cup sour cream
- parsley, chives or dill

Saute onions and celery in melted butter or margarine in a frying pan until soft but not brown. Stir in venison cubes, garlic, flour, salt, pepper, paprika and mushrooms. Saute mixture for five minutes. Add soup. Simmer uncovered for 20 minutes. Thin with water as desired. Cover and simmer about 1 hour. Stir in sour cream and sprinkle with parsley, chives or dill. Heat. Serve on rice, noodles, toast or potatoes. Serves four. Variation: Use ground venison. Simmer only 20 minutes covered before adding sour cream.

Keeping'em

Safe for flight

Submarines, since they were first used in World War I, have become increasingly quieter and more sophisticated — so has the art of searching them out.

A 22-year-old Ovid man is part of the U.S. Navy's effort to search out submarines of potential enemies.

Zeno Budd, the 22 year-old son of Zeno Budd Sr., Ovid, helps the pilots and aircrew of Helicopter Antisubmarine Squadron (HSL) 33 perform the search.

"I take care of helicopter component maintenance records," said Budd, a Navy aviation maintenance administration man. "Each aircraft part has a certain number of hours it can fly. I keep track of those hours and schedule component maintenance when it's required. I also maintain the publications and technical manuals we use to repair the aircraft."

"There are a lot of numbers to keep track of in a job like mine," said Budd. "It isn't hard, but it takes a lot of concentration. I have to know what's going on in maintenance, because just about anything that has to do with the helos comes by me at one time or another."

Based at the North Island Naval Air Station near San Diego, the HSL-33 was established in 1969. It uses a Navy multi-purpose helicopter to assist U.S. ships and submarines in finding and identifying other surface and subsurface contacts.

In addition to their primary mission, the squadron's helicopters are also used to conduct search and rescue operations at sea, naval gunfire spotting and medical evacuation missions.

Budd plays a role in making sure HSL-33's aircraft are safe and ready for flight.

"I'm responsible for the lives of the aircrews and the helos they fly," Budd said. "If I let a component's maintenance go overdue and the helicopter goes down because of that part, it's my fault."

"Staying on top of the aircraft we have and all their parts is a challenge. It's harder at sea because we don't have all the people with us that we have here, so the available crew has to make up the extra work."

A 1982 graduate of Ovid-Elsie High School, Budd joined the Navy in November of that year. After completing boot camp at the Great Lakes Naval Training Center



north of Chicago, he went to the aviation maintenance administration man school.

Movies, books and television have given most people an idea of what life is like on ships and in jet squadrons, but Budd said that working in a helicopter squadron is different.

"Our mission is just as important as a ship or a fighter squadrons, but we're a little more relaxed here," Budd said. "I've flown in jets and helos and been on deployments with both types of squadrons. Helo detachments are smaller, so it's easier to get to know people and become close. I like that."

Dept. of Social Services begins issuing food stamps by computer

Clinton County Dept. of Social Services inaugurated a new, computerized food stamp issuance system on Nov. 3, altering the manner in which more than 900 county households obtain free coupons under the federal food program.

The on-line system can validate eligibility, automatically generate an authorization-to-participate (ATP) card and post each client's transactions at food stamp issuance sites.

The system in the Clinton County Dept. of Social Services Office consists of two transaction terminals and printers linked to the State Dept. of Social Services Central Office Client Information System (CIS) in Lansing. Plastic food stamp participation cards which activate the system were mailed to eligible Clinton County households before Nov. 3. The plastic card, the food stamp identification card and additional identification such as a driver's license will be

required to obtain food coupons under the new system.

The plastic cards resemble credit cards and are embossed with the client's name and case number. Each card contains a magnetic strip readable through the transaction terminal which will transmit information from the magnetic strip to the computer in Lansing.

The Lansing computer will determine from information which it has stored whether to authorize issuance of food stamps to the client whose coded card has passed through the terminal.

On the basis of its stored information, the computer will transmit an appropriate directive to the printer in the food stamp issuance office. If the client is authorized to receive food stamps, the printer then issues an ATP card for the amount of food stamps the client is entitled to receive.

The client then signs the card and exchanges it for

food stamps. The food stamp issuance site cashier will confirm participation on the transaction terminal, and the computer's file will be logged to prevent issuance of food stamps above the amount allotted to the household for that month.

The signed participation cards will be stored for possible retrieval should fraud be suspected.

The plastic food stamp cards are to be retained by clients for on-going use.

Although the new system will be more convenient and accessible for clients, it will restrict issuance of food coupons to the designated recipient or an authorized representative with the system prior to going to an issuance site.

The Clinton County food stamp site is located at 1411 N. US-27.

The food stamp issuance window will be open from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. the 1st through the 15th of each month, and from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. on the 16th through

the 30/31st every business day each month.

Other neighboring coun-

ties that are on-line food stamps are Ingham County, Shiawassee County and

Ionia County. Clinton County households may participate at these is-

suance sites also. Because hours at some sites may vary, food stamp reci-

ipients should check the hours with the site of their choice.

Fowler claims regional football crown 36-0

One game away from the Silverdome. Following their 36-0 thrashing of Whitmore Lake last Saturday, that's where the Fowler football team will be heading if they pick up a semi-final victory this Saturday when they face North Muskegon at Battle Creek Central's Post Field.

That one game looms big on the Eagle horizon however, and nobody on Coach Steve Spicer's team will be thinking about anything except winning this Saturday at 1:30 p.m.

"They (North Muskegon) have been ranked second in the state in Class D all year," Spicer said. "The first time they played a Class D school was in the play-offs — their entire regular season schedule is with Class C and B schools. We know we'll have our hands full."

Just as they had in their Class D pre-regional win over Detroit Servite the previous week, the Eagles totally dominated Whitmore Lake in the big regional victory at Lansing Sexton's Memorial Field. The Fowler players, and their multitude of fans, seemed oblivious of the bone-chilling night air and gusty winds.

Perhaps Spicer and his team remembered back to the regional loss they suffered at the hands of Battle Creek Saint Philip last year on the same field under very similar conditions.

If they had their way, and they certainly did, there was no leaving the field of battle this time without the regional trophy firmly in their grasp.

THE GAME opened with Fowler kicking off and promptly forcing the Trojans to punt on their first possession. One of Whitmore Lake's few breaks of the game came off an intercepted pass on the Eagles' opening series. They would not capitalize on the Fowler miscue however, as the Eagle defense held on a fourth and four situation, giving the ball back to the offense on their own 26-yard line.

Picture-perfect plays and excellent running by quarterback Matt Hufnagel and backs Rex Thelen and Curtis Feldpausch, brought the ball all the way down to the Trojan 10-yard line. A quarter-back keeper saw Hufnagel go straight up the middle into the endzone behind a surging Eagle offensive line to pick up Fowler's first points of the game with just 36 seconds left in the first quarter.

Hufnagel added two more points when he took the ball in on the conversion attempt, giving the Eagles a 8-0 lead.

Fowler got the ball back quickly after the ensuing kick-off when the Trojans coughed up the ball on their first series of plays. Curtis Simmon recovered the fumble on the Whitmore Lake 33-yard line, and the Eagles were off and running again.

Feldpausch and Thelen combined for all the yardage as Fowler drove toward the goal line, and Feldpausch went in for the touchdown from the Trojan 2-yard line with 7:44 left in the half.

An offside call against Whitmore Lake on the two-point conversion attempt, gave Feldpausch an opportunity to pick up 2 more points for Fowler as he burrowed his way into the endzone on the Eagles' second point after try, putting them on top 14-0.

FOWLER HELD the Trojans at bay on their next possession, and, following a long Whitmore Lake punt, began their series of downs from their own 6-yard line. The Eagles picked up one first down before being forced to punt — the only time they would do so during the entire contest.

The Trojans began a drive from the Fowler 35-yard line, and were in position to score when the stalwart Eagle defense forced a fumble which Joe Simon recovered with just 34 seconds left in the half.

The second half was not only an Eagle-controlled game, it was pretty much the "Curtis Feldpausch Show," as the senior back chewed up yards and yards of Trojan turf on his way to scoring two more Fowler touchdowns and another 2-point conversion in the third quarter alone.

Feldpausch's first score of the half came off big-yardage runs when he carried the ball for 50 yards on 9 plays in 3 minutes. The 2-point conversion run put the Eagles ahead by a comfortable 24-0 margin with 6:58 showing on the clock.

Following another Trojan fumble recovery on their ensuing possession, Feldpausch and company marched another 46 yards in 7 plays, which included a big 18-yard run by the senior into the endzone. With 2:18 left in the quarter, and the game pretty much in the bag at 30-0, the Eagles began filtering starters out of the line-up.

The final points of the game came after yet another Trojan fumble when junior Andy Thelen broke tackles on a pretty 20-yard romp in to score, giving Fowler their 36-0 regional win.

FELDPAUSCH WAS the leading ground-gainer for Fowler, totaling 125 yards on the night. Rex Thelen added 43 yards, Hufnagel had 46, and Andy Thelen netted 62 yards toward the Eagles' overall offensive total of 313. Fowler picked up 20 first downs, compared to 4 and 124 yards for Whitmore Lake, and were penalized only 3 times for 20 yards.

The game was not without casualties for Spicer's troop, though. Senior Bruce Feldpausch was shaken up on Fowler's first punt return of the night, while quarterback Hufnagel suffered an ankle injury mid-way through the second period and saw limited action in the second half.

"X-rays showed that Matt has a sprained ankle," Spicer said, "so he'll be taking it easy in practices this week."

As far as the semi-final game with North Muskegon is concerned, the Coach and his staff spent last Saturday scouting at North Muskegon's regional game with Schoolcraft.

"They were behind 7-0 and hung on to win in overtime," Spicer said. "They've got good size and one great back who they play at tailback for one half, and quarter-

back for the other. They run the option when he's at quarterback, and sweeps with him at tailback.

"He's gained 1,700 yards this season and had 22 touchdowns. The key will be to contain him."

Should the Eagles win this Saturday, they would advance to the State Class D Championship on Nov. 29 against the winner of the Crystal Falls/Michigan Lutheran Seminary semi-final. The championship game will be played at the Silverdome in Pontiac.

"It would be nice to play where it's warm," the coach said.

The fans wouldn't complain a bit either, Coach.

40 assists, 2 fumble recoveries, 1 interception, 1 blocked kick, and 1 quarterback sack. The 6'11" 195 lb. senior was named to the MMB First Team and also was one of the keys of the Redwings' offense from his fullback position.

Number 40, Rex Thelen, may be better known for his running ability on the Eagle offense, carrying the ball well and often for Fowler. However, his prowess on defense has given him 87 tackles and three fumble recoveries, and made him Captain of the First Team defense in the CMAC. The 6' 200 lb. senior also sees duty on Eagle kick-offs and as their place kicker.

Wooley, a 5'8" 200 lb. senior, was in on 89 tackles from his inside linebacker position, had five quarterback sacks, and one fumble recovery for the Marauders. He was selected to the Second Team MMB at the end of the 1986 season.

Defensive linemen are a real fun bunch. Like their brothers across the line, they take pride in how much punishment they can dish out in any one game. Some people say they are mean. The fact that in some cases, defensive linemen see double duty as offensive linemen may account for their mean spirit.

The "mean" defensive linemen include: Kurt Simon and Joe Simon from Fowler, Russell Klatt from Ashley, Craig Thelen from Pewamo-Westphalia, and Troy Luznak from Ovid-Elsie. The "Simon duo" from Fowler presents a formidable image to any running back foolish enough to come their way. The seniors stand 6'6" and 6'3" respectively with Kurt bringing down 54 opponents during the course of the year.

Klatt, a junior for the Ashley Bears, was in on 96 tackles throughout 1986 and should make things happen for Ashley next year. Standing 6'2" and weighing 203 lbs., Thelen had 53 solo tackles for the Pirates and was named to the First Team defense in the CMAC. A Second Team MMB choice, Luznak was in on 96 tackles for the Marauders, had 2 quarterback sacks, and intercepted one pass. The senior stands 5'10" and doubles as an offensive guard.

Stan Bauer, averaging 38 yards/punt, is the punter of record from Pewamo-Westphalia. The tight end, also averaged 17.1 yards/reception for the Pirates.

With so many talented athletes on every team, an Honorable Mention listing is a necessity.

Debut of 1986 all-area football team

Picking an All-Area football team is no piece of cake. Not when the "area" involves six schools with teams in Classes A, B, C, and D, all of which field athletes of excellent caliber who do not all compete against one another.

Although nowhere is it written in stone that an area team must be selected, it does seem like the appropriate thing for the local newspaper to do at the conclusion of the football season. (Keeping in mind, of course, that Fowler's football season is far from over as they head into the final rounds of Class D State Championship competition this weekend.)

A poll of all the area coaches produced an assortment of names, statistics, averages, and comments as to whom their choices would be. From that beginning, the following 1986 All-Area Football Team was chosen by the Clinton County News.

First Team Offense

At quarterback, Dave Stump from Pewamo-Westphalia. The 6'1" senior set a new school record for the Pirates in 1986, completing 46 percent of his passes for a total of 1,004 yards and six touchdowns. Stump's arm was instrumental in P-W's mid-to-late season surge, helping the Pirates to victories.

Running back positions are filled by Don Price from Fulton, Curtis Feldpausch from Fowler, and Nell Putnam from Ovid-Elsie.

A senior on the Fulton Pirate team, Prices' statistics made him a prime candidate for either running back or defensive linebacker. As a back, Price was named to the CMAC First Team by virtue of his 948 total yards on 165 carries. That was good for a 5.7 yd/carry average and 74 points on the year. From his linebacker position, he totaled 109 tackles in eight games — a new school record at Fulton.

Feldpausch was another "dual-role" player for the Eagles, playing linebacker on defense as well as carrying the ball for Fowler. Number "35" has racked up 703 yards on 128 carries, scoring 12 touchdowns and four, 2-point conversions for the Eagles. The 5'6", 185 pound senior is a fearless tackler on defense. He also punts for Fowler, but has not seen much action in that role as the Eagles rarely are forced to punt the ball.

A rather bleak season for Ovid-Elsie had Putnam as one bright spot. He gained 706 yards on 166 carries for the Marauders, good for a 4.3 yd/carry average. The 5'8", 165 lb. senior scored 18 points for Ovid-Elsie during the year, and doubled as an outside linebacker on defense.

In the offensive end position, Tom Penix from St. Johns and Todd Koone from Fulton were sure-handed targets for their teams' quarterbacks. Penix picked up 523 yards on 35 pass receptions for the Redwings and scored three touchdowns. The 6'5" junior should see much action for St. Johns again next year.

Koone grabbed 32 passes for 603 yards, good for a 18.8 yd/reception average. The senior Pirate scored six touchdowns and tallied 54 points during 1986.

Offensive linemen have earned a reputation of being mean, tough, individuals who generally enjoy seeing how much havoc they can wreak on the opposing team. They call them "hogs." This year's "hogs" include:

Terry Rossow, St. Johns; Andy Schneider, Pewamo-Westphalia; Matt Kissane, Fulton; and Randy Theis and Joe Plovman from Fowler.

All stand 6'1" with the exception of Fowler's Plovman (6'2") and Theis (5'11"), and range in weight from 180 lb. to 220 lb. Coaches comments included: "Never had a noseguard bother us all year," "good leadership," "top blocker," "extremely competent," and "best offensive lineman."

Rounding out the offensive team is Tom Bates, kicker for the St. Johns Redwings. A senior, Bates was good on 15-19 extra point attempts, and kicked 3-3 field goals for St. Johns.

First Team Defense

The 1986 All-Area defensive backfield is made up of Pat Heckman from Pewamo-Westphalia, Ken Jewison

Fulton

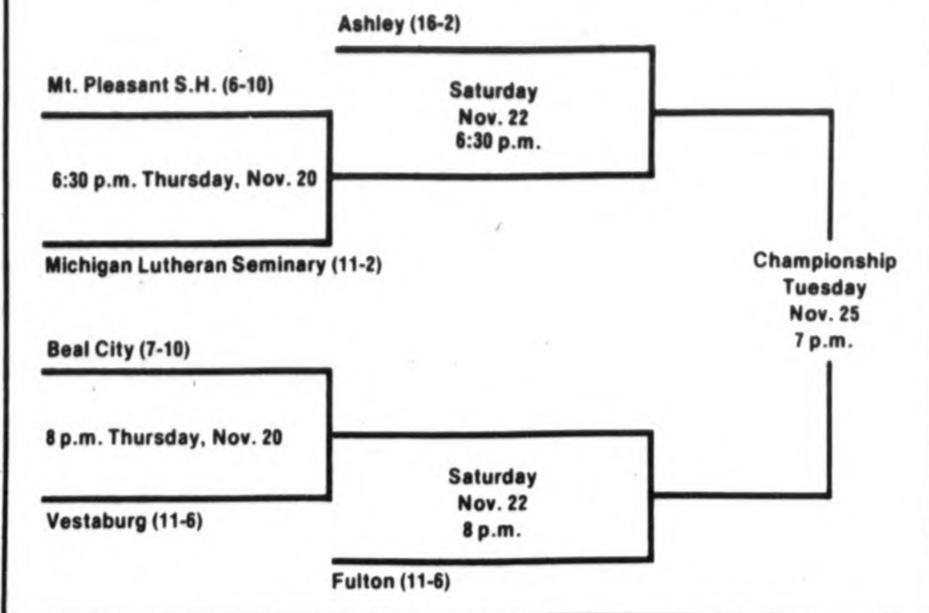

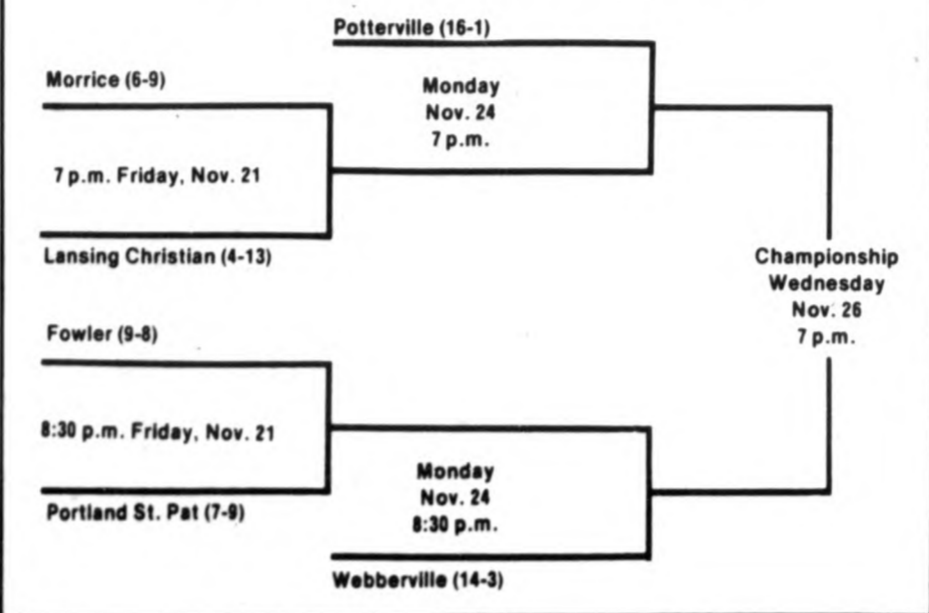
Dee Gardner paced the Pirates with 46 points, Janice Kresge added 12 points, and Lori Helman had 5 points.

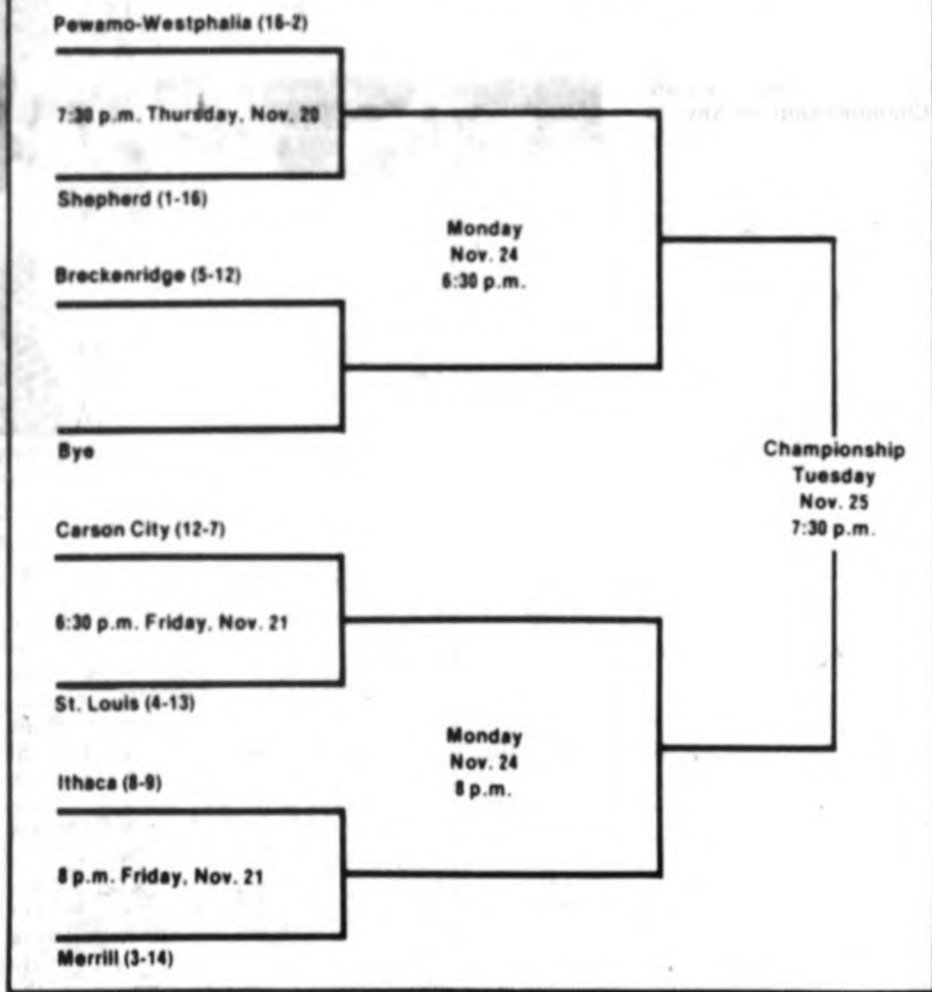

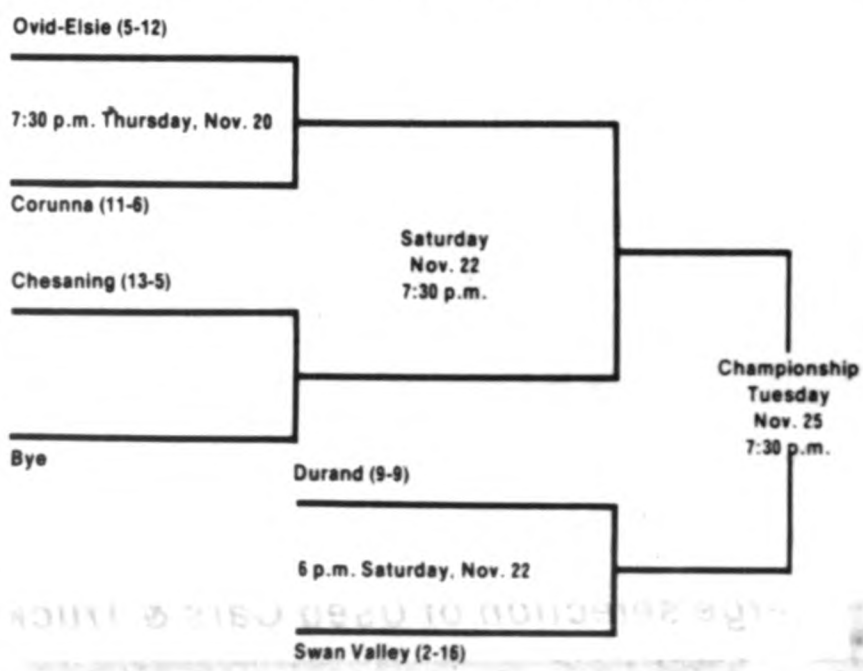

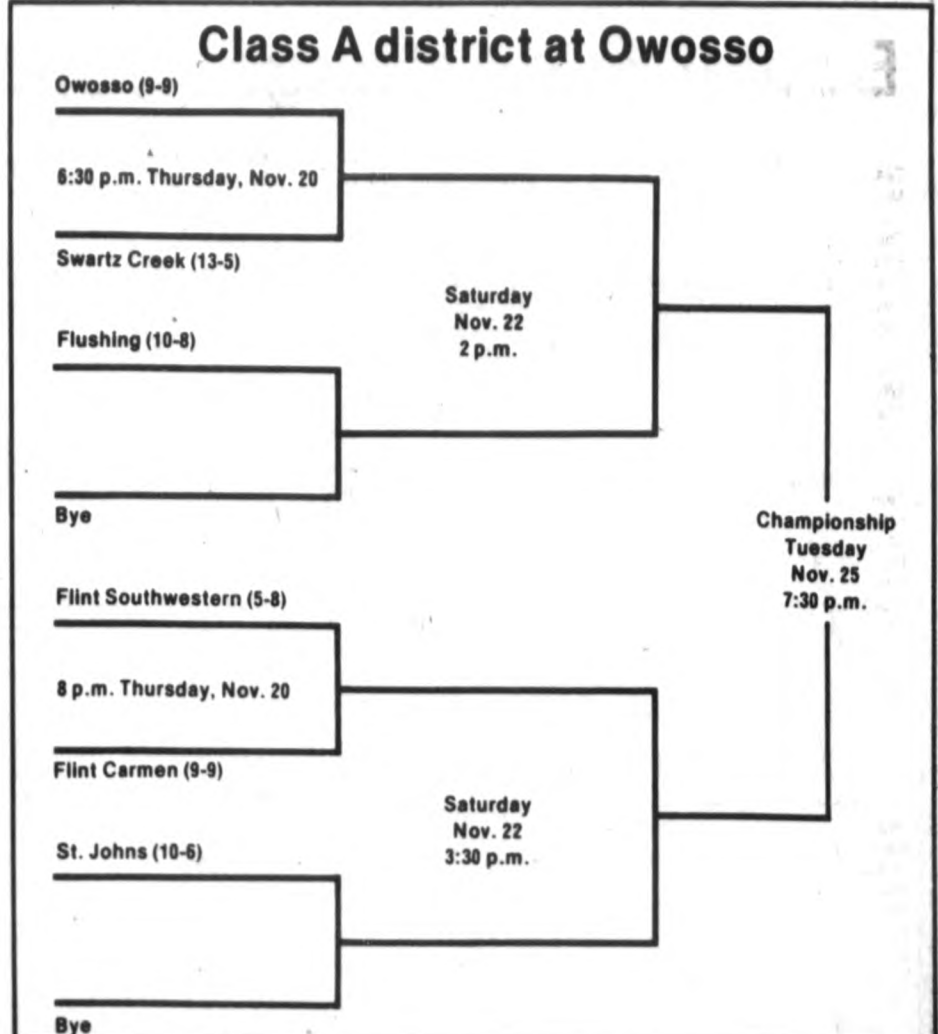

Financial focus Tax reform

Two things to understand about taxes are that you must pay them and you must change with them. Just as working Americans began to appreciate the benefits of the Individual Retirement Account (IRA), Congress changed it. But, while many people believe the benefits of IRAs have been totally eliminated, this is not true.

In the "1986 Money Guide, Your IRA," it was reported that in the five years since Congress has made IRAs available, roughly 40 million Americans have opened the accounts. IRA assets have grown from \$26 billion at the end of 1981 to more than \$170 billion in 1986. It's estimated that about half of all zero coupon bonds are purchased for IRA accounts.

Originally, the IRA provision covered only those persons without the benefit of an employer retirement plan. It was later expanded to include anyone who had earned income, and it even threw in a special provision for a spouse not employed outside the home. So, an income-earning spouse could annually deposit the lesser of total earned income or \$2,000. A non-working spouse could deposit up to \$250 which was then tax-deductible. And, so it was through 1986.

Beginning in 1987, the rules will change again. If neither you nor your spouse is covered by a retirement plan, you can still deposit \$2,000 annually into an IRA or \$2,250 into a spousal IRA, if your spouse doesn't work, and it will still be tax deductible. No change here. However, if either spouse is covered by a qualified retirement plan, the deductible amount of the IRA contribution is limited if adjusted gross income, without regard to the IRA deduction, is between \$40,000 and \$50,000. If it exceeds \$50,000, no deduction is allowed for an IRA contribution.

If you're a single taxpayer, you can benefit from the total IRA deductions if your adjusted gross income is less than \$25,000. If it's more than \$35,000, no deduction is allowed. If it's between \$25,000 and \$35,000, a partial deduction is allowed.

So far we've discussed only deductible IRA contributions — that is, contributions made before taxes are paid thus lowering your tax bill. However, even if you discover you're not eligible for deductible IRA contributions, you can still benefit by either beginning or continuing your IRA plan. There's the same contribution limit, \$2,000 or \$2,250, but now it's non-deductible. However, all interest and earnings are still allowed to accumulate and compound free of current income tax.

So, an IRA still offers attractive benefits even though the annual contribution may not be deductible. In later years, when withdrawals are necessary, you

pay taxes on only the income and gains your deposits have earned. The actual dollar deposits were taxed at the time they were made so, obviously, you owe no taxes on them. By taking advantage of these IRA tax laws, you can build a substantial "nest egg" for retirement.

If you're considering non-deductible IRA contributions, you should discuss this with an investment specialist. There are other alternatives which could benefit you. For example, tax-free municipal bonds, bond trusts or tax-free municipal bond funds not only allow interest and dividends to accumulate tax free, but they also allow them to be withdrawn at any time with no federal taxes or early withdrawal penalties. They have no restrictions as to when, or if, withdrawals can be made. Finally, they're more flexible than IRAs, but at this time there are few investments available that offer a combination of these benefits and good growth potential.

On the other hand, an IRA, even if funded with a non-deductible contribution, offers a variety of investments which can be monitored and changed throughout the years.

New tax legislation has dealt a blow to some people by reducing IRA benefits. It has not, however, eliminated these benefits. The Individual Retirement Account is alive and well.

Roehl lines Tax Talk

Dr. Mike Kelsey, MSU agricultural tax specialist, will speak at Smith Hall on Nov. 20. Kelsey will identify the ways that the new 1986 tax laws will have an impact on farm operators and what they should be doing to gain the maximum benefits and avoid pitfalls.

Kelsey will discuss the new treatment of capital gains property, the use of preproduction expenses of seed and fertilizers, land clearing expenses, income shifting, investment credits, depreciation, expensing, financial leases, debt restructuring, absentee land owners expense and other tax law changes that will affect agricultural operation.

By finding out what the law says now, tax planning can be accomplished that may save tax dollars both in '86 and '87.

Soil test now. The rains may have leaked valuable nutrients from our productive soils. Now more than ever it is necessary for a grower to test these soils to determine what fertilizer, if any, must be added for the 1987 crop.

All soils may have some damage but sandy and organic mucks probably have been hurt the most. A soil test will help a farmer identify the most economical level of fertilization. The soil test for phosphorus will probably have not been affected by the rainfall as it does not move readily.

However, the soil pH may have been affected by the leaking of potassium, magnesium and calcium was "washed out" to lower the pH. Most crops require a pH between 6.5 to 7.0. Alfalfa requires a pH of 6.8 for production.

Lime is added to sweeten the soil, that is to increase the soil pH. It will normally take two to three tons of lime to raise the pH from 5.5 to 6.5. The soil test will show the amount needed according to the cropping program. If over five tons are needed, apply 1/2 before and 1/2 following the fall tillage. Never apply more than six tons per acre of lime in any one year.

Final on hay donations: Just to let you know how it went -

1. 150 railroad cars shipped out of state to southeast with approximately 1,200 bales each.
2. 37 semitrailers took hay to the southeast with approximately 500 bales each.
3. 12 smaller trucks with about 200 bales each.
4. 39 railroad cars were shipped to Michigan's Upper Peninsula.
5. 70 semi-trailers aboard the piggyback rail system were shipped to the Upper Peninsula.

All of the above who donated hay shipments were sent on donated transportation.

Bean growers to nominate

Bean growers of Clinton and other area counties will gather on Nov. 24 to nominate two candidates to serve on the Michigan Bean Commission. The meeting will be held in the choir room at Ithaca High School at 7:30 p.m.

The names of the two nominees selected at the meeting will be submitted

to Gov. Blanchard who will appoint one of the nominees to serve on the commission for a three year term.

In addition to the nominating procedure, there will be a review of commission activities, an update on bean variety trials, and the latest information on bean markets.

Bills would protect farmers

Three bills dealing with grain insurance have been proposed to protect farmers in the event of a failure of a grain dealer, according to a press release by Robert Smith, Michigan Farm Bureau senior legislative counsel.

Proposals call for setting up a state fund of \$3 to \$5 million, funded by a check-off or assessment on each bushel or hundredweight of covered commodities. The Michigan Agricultural Insurance Corporation would be created to administer the fund.

"With such a fund, if a grain dealer goes bankrupt, payments could be made to producers very quickly rather than having to wait out the long and often involved bankruptcy proceedings," Smith said.

Smith said Farm Bureau supports such a fund, provided affected producers have an opportunity to vote in a referendum, much the same way producers now vote on whether to fund research and promotion for various commodities through check-offs.

Prices rebound

The Index of Prices Received by farmers in Michigan for all products as of Oct. 15 was 112 percent of its 1977 base according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Statistics Service. This is a 6 percent rise from September. The October price index was 1 percent above its level a year earlier.

The price index for all crops in Michigan jumped

13 percent from September. Most of that increase was from the doubling of dry bean prices. Unfortunately, there are not that many dry beans to sell.

Potato, hay, and wheat prices also rose while corn and soybean prices dropped. Vegetable prices remained about the same as in September, but fruit prices rose.

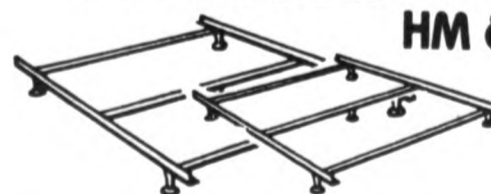

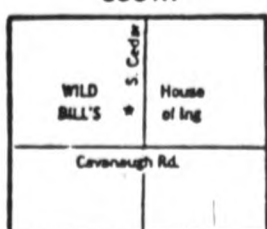

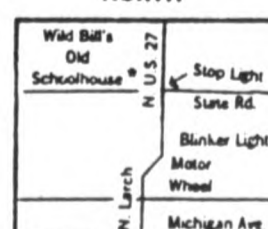

What is a commitment letter worth? Probably not much.

DEAR MR. CAMPBELL: I recently applied to refinance some property I own. This property has both a first and a second mortgage and both loans are conventional. I am in the process of obtaining an FHA loan.

The bank has what it calls a 60-day lock on the interest rate and the points; and of course they have a form they want me to sign which basically states only the time period of 60 days, loan amount, interest rate and the points. I asked at the time of application if I could float with the current rate and was advised no — that the bank had adopted this procedure as it eliminated problems they had encountered when rates fluctuated from the time of application to the time of closing.

I certainly can appreciate their position, too, but when I asked what happens if the approval process should take longer than the 60 days, I was advised that there were no guarantees although the loan officer tried to assure me that it would close in that time. I should point out that, at the moment, the lock-rate is something I can live with, provided it does not go higher and, of course, if the rate should fall, I would like to take advantage of this as well.

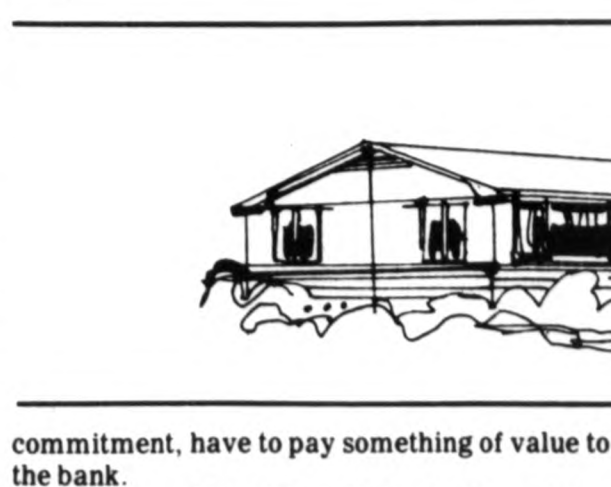
What, specifically, are my rights as to the final settlement on this loan? I have heard that an individual refinancing has six months from appraisal date to close (subject, of course, to approval). If this is true, where do I sit with regards to my 60-day lock (1) if the interest rate should drop and (2) can I transfer my loan approval to another institution? - Mr. S. W. Cheyenne, Wyo.

ANSWER: It's become all the rage with banks and savings and loan associations these days to give out these letters of "commitment" locking in such-and-such an interest rate for X number of days. Just like they used to hand out toasters for opening a new savings account.

Frankly, my friends in the legal business tell me, the toasters were a better bargain.

"Unless it's very, very unusual letter," a real estate lawyer told me, "a full 99 percent of these commitment letters are meaningless."

The catch is in the fact that to be enforceable such a letter has to be a bona fide, legal contract and that you, in order to obtain such a



commitment, have to pay something of value to the bank.

"It can read like it's entirely binding, it can be signed and it can be sent by certified mail — and it still doesn't mean a thing," our lawyer added.

In all fairness to the bank, the letter you've been given is probably an honest expression of the bank's intentions at the time you received it, but if it's typical it's also probably vague, subject to a number of ifs, ands, and buts, and as full of holes as a basketball net. All other things being equal, however, the bank will probably honor it if present economic conditions remain as they are.

I have not heard anything about this business of having six months from the date of appraisal in which to conclude a refinancing. I suspect that whoever told you that meant that the average appraisal is good for six months before a new appraisal is required. No, I would imagine that if interest rates either rise or fall during your 60-day lock-in your commitment letter will turn out to have some nullifying holes in it that will make it about as valuable as a piece of "Occupant" mail. And, if you decide to go to another lender, I'm afraid that your loan approval at the current bank — if you add 50 cents to it — might buy you a good doughnut.

DEAR MR. CAMPBELL: I've read with interest your comments about paying off a mortgage in as few years as possible to save considerable money in interest payments.

Eight years ago we borrowed \$25,000 on a 25-year mortgage at 9 and one-half percent interest. We're now able to pay an additional \$100 a month toward the principal and thus reduce

the number of years of the mortgage with the accelerated payments. Would this be preferable to investing the \$1,200 a year at, say, 11 percent interest, and continue deducting our mortgage interest from our federal income tax? Last year the mortgage interest amounted to \$1,800 and the principal is now \$19,500.

Are lending institutions receptive to accelerated payments? - Mr. G. M. H. Moline, Ill.

ANSWER: You've omitted a few specifics here — exactly when, eight years ago? Exactly what are your monthly payments? And when, exactly did you start, or are planning to start, your acceleration? But, hey! A man can't think of everything.

So, I've made a few projections ("guesses," really) and I am assuming that your monthly payments have been running \$218.43 a month for principal and interest and that you'll begin your \$100-a-month acceleration with your next regular payment. On the basis of your original, 25-year mortgage, you still have almost 13 years to go and still owe him \$14,480 in interest alone. At the end of your 25 years you will have paid him a full \$40,529 in interest — that's over and above the \$25,000 you actually borrowed.

Now, if you started paying an extra \$100 — a total of \$318.43 — a month beginning with your next payment you'll pay the mortgage off in another 7.08 years instead of 13 and you'll virtually cut your interest payments in half. Instead of paying him, at this point, another \$14,480 in interest over the next 13 years you'll pay him instead, just \$7,281 — net, out-of-pocket, savings of \$7,199.

Now, the old argument: Don't pay it off, but put that extra \$100-a-month into some nice yum-

my investment and you'll come out ahead. A few years ago, admittedly, it made a whale of a lot more sense than it does today. At that time you could put it into a money market fund and, sure enough, could earn 13 percent to 15 percent on it. At the same time, unfortunately, mortgage interest rates were comparable or, at best, only a notch lower, but you might have a 1 percent or 1 and one-half percentage point spread.

What's the situation today? Well, for openers, you're going to have a frustrating time finding anything yielding the 11 percent interest that you have in mind — try 7 percent or, at best 8 percent and, even then, with a certain amount of risk involved in them. What would you have if you stick with your present schedule and, instead of accelerating your mortgage, you invest the \$100 a month at 8 percent? Well, it's not too bad — roughly \$27,365. But, of course, \$14,480 of that has gone to your lender in interest and the rest of it is reduced further because it's taxable income.

Taxes generally? Sure, as soon as you start accelerating your mortgage payments your tax deductibility is going to begin shrinking, too. But remember, the new tax code goes into effect next year and Uncle Sam's role as a partner in paying off your mortgage dwindles sharply. If, this year, you are in the 40 percent tax bracket, Uncle Sam is effectively picking up about 40 percent of your mortgage interest payment through its deductibility. Next year, he'll pick 28 percent of it, maximum.

Dollar-wise, you might come out a tad ahead investing that \$100 instead of accelerating your mortgage — maybe.

Are lending institutions receptive to accelerated payoffs? Generally yes. The sooner your lender gets his money back from you, after all, the faster he can put it back to work.
