## Decrease expected in county revenues

The expected shrinkage of several sources of county revenue in coming years prompted the Clinton County Board of Commissioners on Jan. 28 to approve a resolution aimed at keeping better track of where county dollars are spent.

"We're trying to tighten up our budget procedures," said Chairman Roger Overway. "We think we're going to have a tough couple of years, especially if we lose revenue sharing."

Federal revenue sharing, which has already been cut in recent years, and other federal monies, are expected to dwindle as the national government attempts to meet budget deficit reduction targets recently established by Congress.

Additionally, the county is expected to lose funds this year because of an expected 10 to 13 percent drop in farm land assessments. One-third of the county property tax revenue comes from farm land, said Overway.

County Administrator Bill LeFevre said the decrease in farm assessments is expected to occur as the result of both declining farm land values and recent state legislation intended to make assessed values more reflective of the actual value of farm land.

IN THE BUDGET CONTROL resolution, LeFevre is named chief administrative officer for the county and is directed to develop procedures for implementing a set of guidelines also included in the resolution.

The guidelines prohibit the overexpenditure of individual line items — amounts designated in the budget for specific purposes. Previously, commissioners could approve such overexpenditures.

"The difference this will make is that by not allowing them to overs-

pend line items it will force us, myself and the board, to transfer money," said LeFevre.

He said transferring money between line items instead of approving overexpenditures will allow him to keep better track of where the money is spent.

"As we move into tighter and tighter economic times, I need to know how much we're spending on individual lines items," he said.

ALSO UNDER THE new guidelines, departmental budgets will only be increased if the department head demonstrates that an emergency need exists, that the need could not have been foreseen when the original budget allocation was made, that the need is critical to the operation of the department or the provision of a particular service, and that there are no funds within the existing department budget that could be redirected to meet the need.

Department heads are required by the guidelines to report any areas of the budget in which overspending is expected to occur.

Another provision prohibits county employees and officials from spending more than the amount budgeted to them for conference travel. Anything beyond the budgeted amount "will be the responsibility of the individual incurring the expense," according to the guidelines.

"Non-compliance with these budget expenditure guidelines will be dealt with on a case by case basis for 1986," the resolution said. "The county administrator shall investigate the feasibility of implementing system wide expenditure controls if general non-compliance occurs in 1986."

The resolution also said that if a department's budget ends the year in a negative balance without the department head having arranged to bring it into balance, a like dollar amount will be subtracted from the department's budget for the next year.

## Don Sisung is named to Road Commission

Essex Township Trustee Donald Sisung was named Jan. 28 to the Clinton County Road Commission after county commissioners chose him from among at least five candidates for the post.

He replaces Paul Nobis, who resigned effective Jan. 31 after serving for 29 years.

Sisung, a farmer and past president of the Clinton County Farm Bureau, was named to the \$3,300-a-year post after three rounds of voting by county commissioners. He will resign his township post to avoid conflicts of interest between the two jobs.

Other candidates for the post were Donald Witt, Gary Hyde, Robert Eldridge and Larry Nobis, who is the son of the resigning road commissioner.

Eldridge, the only one of the candidates present at the meeting, was also the only one of the five who was nominated by commissioners for the

post. Immediately after the nominations were made he asked why he had not been included.

"You have a relatively inexperienced board here," he said of the Road Commission. "I feel my candidacy should have been given a little more consideration."

Commissioners indicated they had to make a tough choice from among a number of candidates. Commissioner Glen Webster said he felt the Road Commission would benefit from the appointment of a younger man — an explanation that did little to placate Eldridge.

"I resent the implication of age," he said. "I'm not as old as President Reagan."

However, Eldridge said, he will not hold a grudge.

"It's a pleasure to see that many names (of candidates)," said Roger Overway, chairman of the Board of Commissioners.

"We usually have trouble finding enough people to serve."

## County administrator gets new title, a forgotten raise

Clinton County Administrator Bill LeFevre got a new title and a raise last week but the two were not connected.

In addition to his current title, LeFevre was named the county's chief administrative officer, responsible for preparing and presenting proposed budgets to the Board of Commissioners and for other duties relating to the budget.

However, the designation was mostly a formality, as he was already performing those duties, both LeFevre and Chairman Roger Overway report.

The raise from \$28,636 to \$30,500 yearly approved by commissioners last week was to correct an oversight made when the annual budget was

approved for the year.

"We forgot," Overway said. "He didn't say anything and we didn't think of it."

The annual budget included raises of about four percent for other county employees, but as a "contract" employee who is not on a salary schedule LeFevre was not included, said Overway. He said the county administrator's raise is comparable in size to the longevity raises of other county employees.

Overway said even with the raise approved last week LeFevre is paid less than those in comparable positions in neighboring counties. Commissioners will review the county administrator's salary again during the next budget process, he said.

## Planning commission asked for zoning recommendation

St. Johns city commissioners on Jan. 28 asked the city Planning Commission to come up with a recommendation by May 13 regarding future zoning of the downtown business district.

Commissioners asked the Planning Commission to recommend either:  
• a specific plan for rezoning the business district; or  
• that experts be hired to study the area, or  
• that nothing at all be done.

Commissioners also authorized City Administrator Diane Edwards to write a letter to local businessman Al Marah telling him the alleged use of a building he owns on Railroad Street as a carpeting warehouse is in violation of city zoning restrictions.

Marah last October asked that the block containing his Railroad Street property be rezoned from residential to commercial. The rezoning, denied by city commissioners, would have cleared the way for him to operate his retail carpeting business from that location.

AT ABOUT THE same time they denied the rezoning request, city commissioners, concerned about

what one commissioner termed the "haphazard expansion" of the business district, asked the Planning Commission to review the zoning of the downtown area. A public hearing was held in October but little has happened since.

"We haven't been able to come up with anything concrete," Edwards, a member of the Planning Commission, told city commissioners. Edwards said the Planning Commission needed additional information and direction.

She also said that since the denial of his rezoning request Marah has removed a business sign from the Railroad Street property and boarded up some display windows. However, she said, Marah does not want to proceed with the conversion of the property to residential use while the possibility remains open that the property will eventually be rezoned.

City commissioners said a letter to Marah notifying him that he is in violation of zoning restrictions would demonstrate that the city is not "acquiescing" to his use of the building as a warehouse.

In other business at the Jan 28 meeting, commissioners approved a Memorial Day parade sponsored by the American Legion and the

Veterans of Foreign Wars. The parade will be held this year on the traditional date, May 30, rather than on the previous Monday, the legal date of the holiday.

## Local boy dies in apartment fire

An 18-month-old St. Johns boy died Jan. 26 in a fire at the Camelot Apartments, 205 N. Scott Rd. Michael Robert Brooks, the son of Jamie Onstott and Brian Almond Brooks, died in a Sunday morning fire that broke out in the bedroom in which he was sleeping. Police said rescue attempts by the boy's father and three other adults who were in the apartment were thwarted by heat and smoke. Police said the fire was caused by the boy's three-year-old brother, who they said was playing with a

cigarette lighter. St. Johns Fire Chief Clare Maier said the fire was reported at 3:45 a.m. and that firemen were on the scene within about five minutes. The entire bedroom was in flames and by the time they entered the bedroom it was too late to save the boy, he said. The bedroom was gutted by the fire and there was heavy smoke and water damage throughout the apartment, officials said. Adjoining apartments were reported to have suffered minor smoke damage. Funeral services for the boy were held at Schepp

Funeral Home in Carson City.

An apartment at 210 Ross St. in St. Johns suffered extensive damage Jan. 29 when grease left on a stove ignited, said St. Johns Fire Chief Clare Maier. The fire started 11:38 a.m. and was secure at 1:53 a.m., Maier said. The apartment was the home of Gary Hyatt, who rented it from Dave Odell, of Elsie. Maier said two pets, a cat and a bird, perished in the fire. There were no other injuries, he said.

## Group to campaign for highway safety

- In 1984, 344 people were charged with drunk driving in Clinton County.

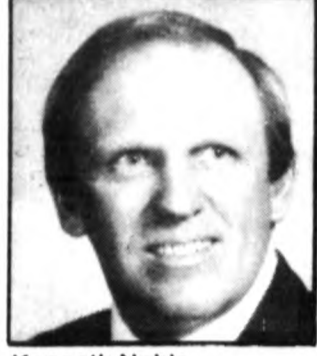

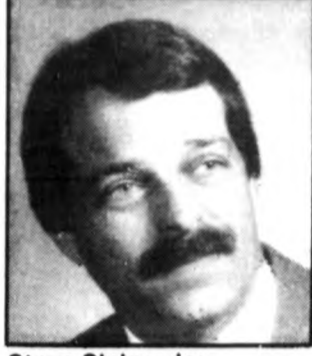

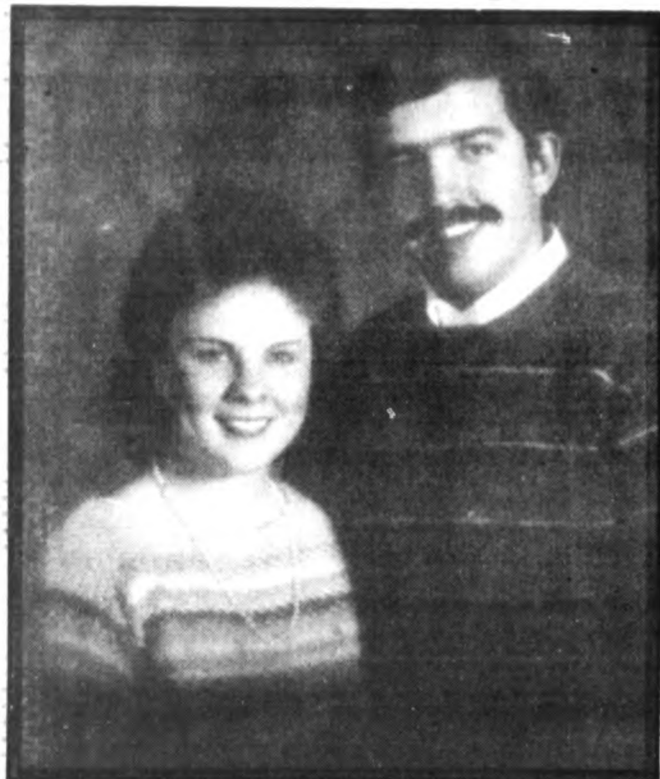

## Family focus

### Dieting with honey

Honey is no better nutritionally than table sugar and it contains more calories, so it's not the answer to the dieter's sweet tooth.

Honey contains more of the sugar compound fructose, which makes it sweeter than table sugar. For this reason, it is sometimes used in dieting because less honey is needed to sweeten food or drinks. However, honey has no other nutritional advantage over table sugar.

Honey is also proportionately higher in calories than table sugar. Honey has 64 calories per tablespoon while table sugar has 46 calories per tablespoon.

Even though the fructose in honey does not require insulin to break down, honey should not be considered a safe sugar for diabetics because the other sugar compounds in honey require insulin. Some of the fructose in honey also will convert in the liver to glucose, a sugar compound that does require insulin.

Honey should likewise not be used in infant formulas or baby foods because of its linkage to scattered cases of botulism poisoning in infants.

Using honey causes baked goods to darken on the inside and at the crust. The texture of the product is usually heavier and more moist. Because of these changes, it is best to use honey-tested recipes.

Substitute honey for other sweeteners in recipes according to the following guidelines: If more than one cup of honey is used in a recipe, add ¼ teaspoon of baking soda for each cup of honey. This is to counteract the acids present in honey.

To substitute honey for sugar in a recipe, use the same amount but decrease the liquid in the recipe by ¼ cup for each cup of honey used. When making plain cake, substitute only ½ to ⅔ of the sugar so that the texture does not change significantly. When making jellies without pectin, replace ½ of the sugar called for with honey.

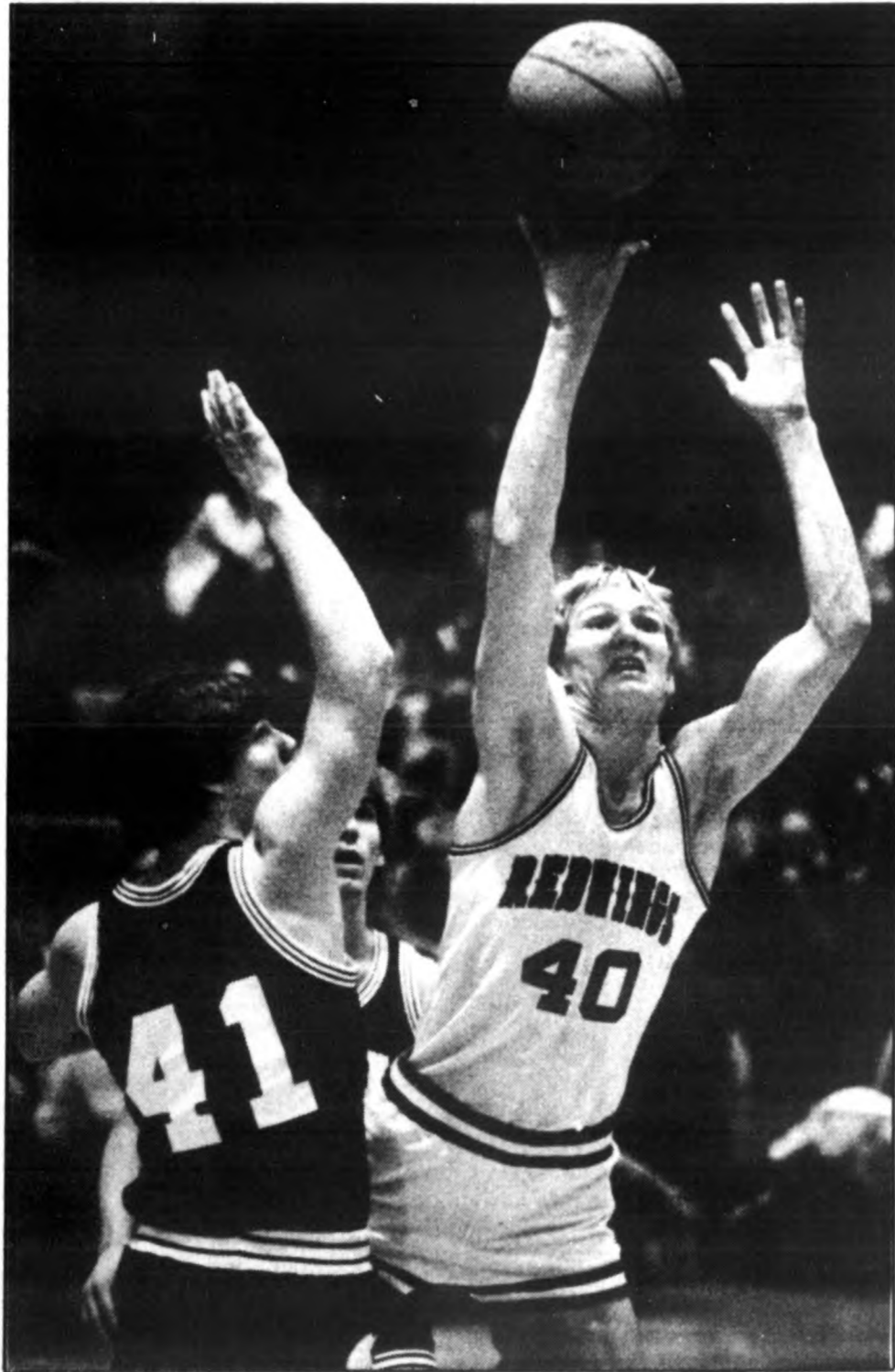

## Junior High cage action abounds in Clinton County

Although not many people are aware of it, basketball at the Junior High level is alive and well in Clinton County. In fact, in terms of attendance, some of these games draw as big a crowd as ballgames played by freshman and junior varsity teams.

Let's do a little scouting of how programs around the county are faring in 1986.

"We have a lot of good kids and are not lacking in enthusiasm," said Bill Brown, Assistant Principal at Rodney B. Wilson Jr. High, "but our lack of size has hurt us this year and for the past several years. We had been used to dominating teams we played against."

**THE EIGHTH GRADE TEAM** at Rodney B. is coached by veteran, Dale Knight, who more or less came "out of retirement" to take the coaching position. He has 20 players out this year, divided into "A" and "B" teams. Their record stands at 2-6.

Roger DePaepe has been coaching the seventh graders for 15 years at Rodney B. They are 500 on the year with four wins and four losses.

"We play against teams that are comparable to us in terms of school size," Brown said. "Our schedule this year included Ionia, Grand Ledge, Alma, Okemos, Mt. Pleasant, and DeWitt. The games we've lost have been close contests."

"It seems that we have not had a height advantage in the past few years — the kids just don't seem to be as tall as they used to," said Brown. "Maybe they're not eating their Wheaties."

**"THESE ARE ALL REALLY** good kids, and enjoyable to work with. We are struggling to win games though," he added. "What we need is to re-establish our feeder program in the elementary grade levels."

"Right now for some of these kids, the first time they have any real basketball experience is when they get into seventh grade," said Brown. "That's just too late to begin training and hope to compete successfully with other schools who have an established elementary program."

St. Johns Varsity coach, Keith Haske, and his coaching staff run a summer program for youth from the St. Johns area. They also operate a Saturday program for elementary and Junior High students during January and February.

The regular season for St. Johns ends on Feb. 6. They will be participating in an annual tournament hosted by Ovid-Elsie Schools beginning on Feb. 13. "We're hoping to do something there," Brown said.

"One thing we do have are some outstanding cheerleaders," Brown remarked. "They are fine young ladies who have won awards this year — they have been a good support group for the teams."

**NEIL HUNGAGLE IS THE MAN** in command of Fowler's junior high program. He is supervisor and Assistant Athletic Director at Most Holy Trinity School. "We've had some good ball games this year," he said.

Twelve eighth graders make up the team coached by Hilery Stump. Their record is impressive at 5-1, with the one loss coming at the hands of DeWitt.

Bill Armbrustmacher is coach for the 22 seventh graders who have four wins and two losses so far. "We don't have an "A" or "B" team," said Hufnagle, "but rotate players so everyone has a chance to play."

While Fowler has no scheduled games for fifth and sixth graders, they do have a six to eight week program in the spring. "Elementary students have an opportuni-

ty to learn basics during the school year also," Hufnagle said. "They know basketball fundamentals by the time they enter seventh grade."

Fowler hosts a year-end tournament which has been ongoing since "at least the early 70's," according to Hufnagle. "Maybe it's even been longer than that — I know I played in it."

The first round of this year's tournament will begin on Feb. 15. Teams from Fulton, Pewamo-Westphalia and Portland St. Patricks will be participating along with Fowler's squad.

**OVID-ELSIE SCHOOLS HAVE** an established Junior High program which involves 27 seventh graders and 24 eighth graders from Ovid and Elsie Junior Highs. Joe Thering, Principal at Elsie Junior High is in charge of the program for both schools.

"The teams from both schools are pretty evenly matched," Thering said. "Ovid beat Elsie by one point in the game where they met for the first time."

Both the seventh and eighth grade teams from Ovid are undefeated with 6-0 records. Gary McCallister is coach of the seventh grade, and Lyle Howard coaches the eighth grade squad.

Elsie seventh graders are coached by Randy Bowles and have a 0-5 record. The eighth graders from Elsie have three wins and two losses so far this season. They are coached by Tom Hughey.

"We run an elementary basketball program for our fourth, fifth and sixth graders where each school practices once a week," Thering said. "They also play games amongst themselves. They know basketball fundamentals when they enter Junior High."

In addition, Bob Foreback, Varsity coach and Athletic Director at O-E High School, has run a Saturday program for youth for many years. "This program also helps the kids learn the basics of basketball," Thering concluded.

**"WE'VE GOT SOME REAL GAMERS** who play hard basketball," Kurt Mable said of Pewamo-Westphalia's Junior High cagers. Mable is Athletic Director at P-W High School and coaches the eighth grade team along with Steve Spitzley.

The seventh grade team at P-W is coached by Larry Thelen and Daric Feldpausch. In all, there are 12 eighth graders and 15 seventh graders involved in the program. Their record stands at 3-1, with their only loss coming at the hands of Fowler.

"We play a regular schedule of games with St. Pats, Fowler, Fulton, DeWitt and Carson City," Mable said. "Our elementary kids come from Pewamo, St. Marys in Westphalia, and Matherton. Both Westphalia and Pewamo have fifth and sixth grade programs so these kids know some basketball fundamentals when they enter Junior High here."

"What's interesting to me is the wide range of ability at this age level," said Mable. "Some kids mature faster than others so you have an array of talent."

Pewamo-Westphalia will be going to the tournament hosted by Fowler and is looking forward to playing in that. "We feel our Junior High program is a great learning experience for the kids. We try to see that everyone has a chance to play," Mable remarked.

## Redwing roundballers falter

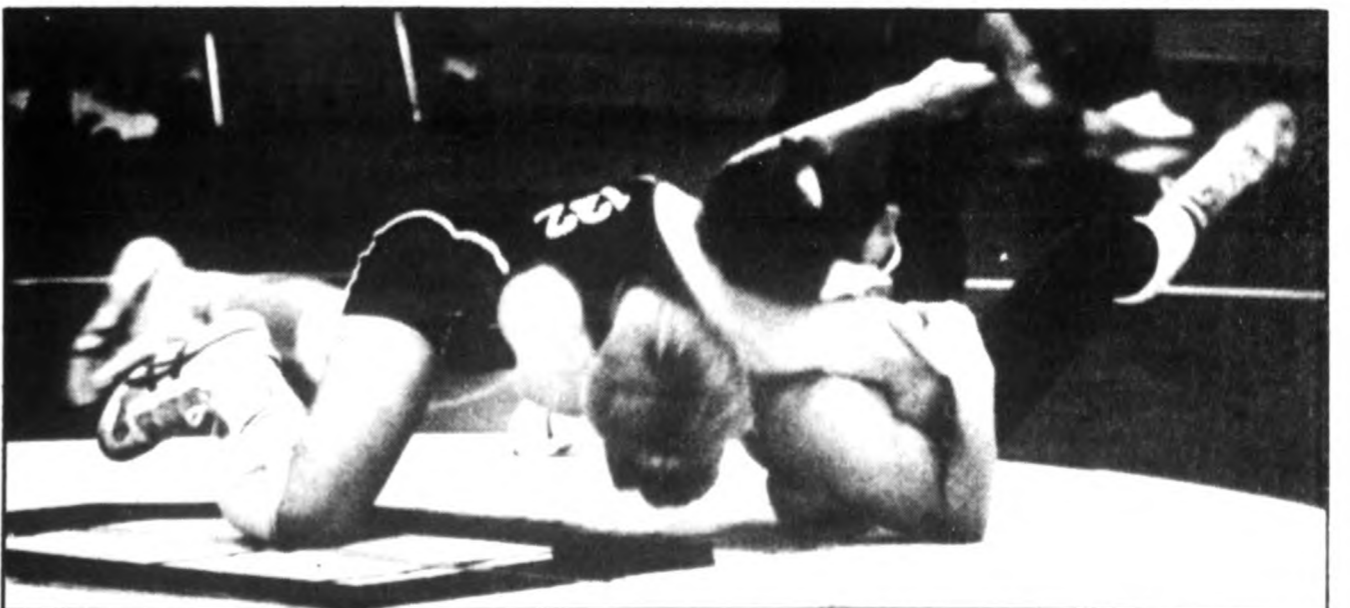
"Things were tight in that game," Smith said, "We made some real quick baskets in succession and managed to put the game away."

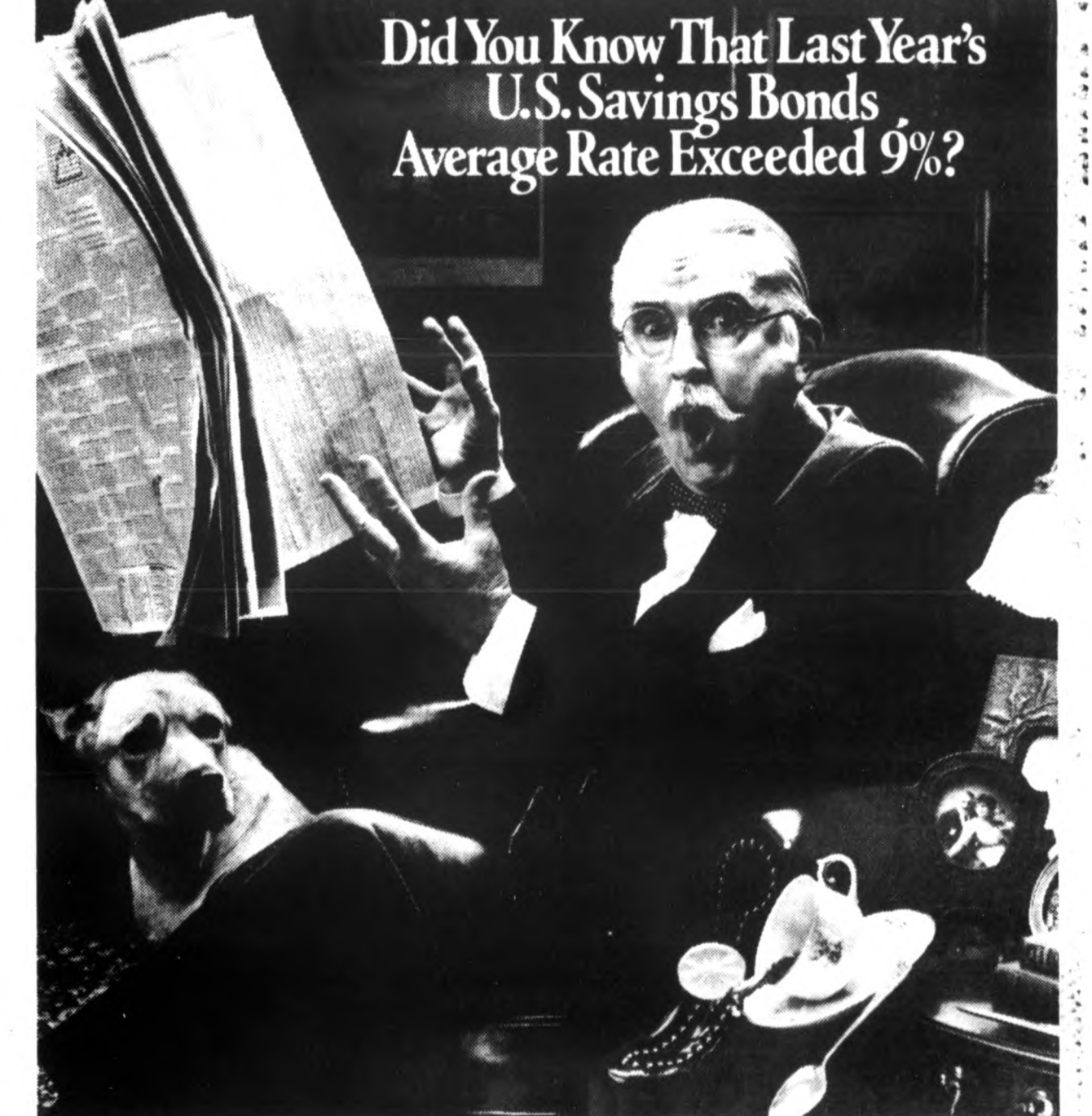
