Beck's 'planned shopping center' approved

The Clinton County Board of Commissioners on Nov. 30 approved a special land use permit that will allow Ben Beck of St. Johns to develop a "planned shopping center"

on the southwest corner of Hyde Road and US-27, south of Beck's Farm Market.

Detailed plans for the shopping center are not yet available.

However, conceptual ideas that have been discussed call for several attached stores or shops, with the possibility of a detached bank, car wash, restaurant, or furniture store.

The subject parcel is presently being used for agricultural purposes and has been for sale for quite some time. Tom Warstler, planner and director of the Department of Plann-

ing and Zoning, claims that the overall site seems suitable for the use proposed.

Beck filed an application for rezoning the 45.7-acre parcel of land through the Department of Planning and Zoning, and the Clinton County Planning Commission held a public hearing on Nov. 12 to verify notification of adjoining property owners and public notices.

PRELIMINARY PLANS call for access drives on both the highway and the local road. There has been speculation as to whether the state highway department will allow a cross-over in this location or whether patrons would need to travel south on US-27 in order to use the access drive on US-27.

Beck has indicated to the Clinton County Planning Commission that the state may not allow the crossover.

Hope Road has recently been resurfaced, but may need to be

widened in order to provide enough width in that section of the roadway to accommodate a left-turn, if deemed necessary by the road commission. According to the CCPC public hearing's report there is not a problem with any other transportation-related concern or with sighting differences.

The BOC permit said the facility is contingent upon compliance with the following regulations:

- Beck shall comply with all applicable federal, state, county, township, or other governmental regulations.

- No construction shall commence prior to the project being approved by the site plan review committee.

- The construction, alteration, or renovation of any building or structure used for or in conjunction with the development of the shopping center shall be subject to the applicable provisions of the state construction code and the Clinton County Zoning Ordinance.

Larry Arnold of Flint has played every dive and gig this side of St. Johns to some of the best rooms in the world.

Now performing at Little Caesar's Pizza of St. Johns throughout the New Year on Friday and Saturday's, the 25 year old is making a musical debut for the local pizzeria.

Arnold believes the entertainment room at Little Caesar's is going to do well irregardless of who the entertainer is. "Hopefully I can be a good launching pad and add to it, instead of away from it."

"I consider myself a musician who plays music, and if it's the right music at the right time it will entertain," says Arnold.

"The most gratification I get out of my job is composing, arranging, and recording something musically awesome which audiences enjoy," Arnold says.

Holiday music fills the air at SJHS

As the holiday season gets into full swing, thoughts of Christmas tend to dominate. The brilliant glimmer of colorful lights, homes festooned with traditional decorations, smells of spices flowing from holiday kitchens - and the heart-warming sounds of holiday music cheer us.

What would it be like to have a holiday season without traditional music?

The music departments of Rodney B. Wilson Junior High and St. Johns High School have been working diligently to continue the tradition of the season with a wealth of fine Christmas music.

THE SCHEDULE OF Christmas concerts begins on Thursday, Dec. 10, at 7:30 p.m. in the RBW auditorium. The eighth grade band,

under the direction of John Speck, and the sixth grade band and chorus, directed by Algie Watkins, will perform a repertoire of seasonal music.

The band will play a number of selections including "Jingo Jango," "Christmas Celebration," "Jingle Bell Rock," and others. The chorus, accompanied by Diantha Witteveen, will sing "Christmas Bells," "Winter Holiday," "Stars That Twinkle and Shine," and other arrangements.

On Sunday, Dec. 13, a family Christmas concert will be presented at Pocius Auditorium in SJHS, beginning at 3 p.m. Performing will be the high school concert choir, directed by Donald Valentine; the symphonic band, under the direction of Gerald Krause; and the symphony orchestra, directed by William Tennant.

A SPECIAL feature of the concert will be guest artist, harpist Sylvia

Norris. An accomplished professional harpist, Norris teaches harp at Interlochen Arts Academy and took part in a past dinner theatre production of "The Fantasticks" at the high school.

Norris will play with the symphony orchestra during their performance of Ralph Vaughn Williams' "Greensleeves," and will perform harp solos of Christmas carols.

A variety of selections appropriate to the holiday season are planned for the concert including "Sleigh Ride," "A Christmas Festival," selections from "The Nutcracker Suite," and a special presentation of "Peter and the Wolf" where children from the audience will be invited on stage for a story reading.

On Tuesday, Dec. 15, the seventh and eighth grade orchestras and chorus will hold their Christmas concert. Included in the seventh

grade chorus performance are "It's a Holiday Time of Year," and "Sing Noel, Sing Noel;" the eighth grade chorus will sing "A Christmas Wish," "Once Upon a Silent Night," and others; the combined orchestras will accompany the audience in the singing of carols, and perform "Christmas Processional," and "Toyland;" and the eighth grade orchestra will conclude the program with "Silent Night."

The groups are directed by Watkins, Tennant, with Witteveen serving as accompanist.

The final concert of the season is planned for Thursday, Dec. 17 at Pocius Auditorium beginning at 7:30 p.m. The cadet and concert bands, SJHS chorus, chamber string orchestra, and the Chorales will be featured. Directors include Valentine, Krause, and Tennant.

All of the concerts are open to the public and free of charge.

Justice seminar planned

The definition of a victim as described in Webster's New World Dictionary is someone or something killed, destroyed, or sacrificed. A victim is one who suffers some loss, especially by being swindled.

"Victims and Witnesses of Crimes," a new criminal justice program and awareness seminar, will be sponsored and presented by the Clinton County Sheriff's Department in conjunction with the Michigan Sheriff's Association and the Criminal Justice Management Institute of SCH.

"We have committed to the citizens of this county to sponsor a comprehensive victim/witness training program for all members of our criminal justice community including all law enforcement agencies, prosecutors and staff, the judiciary, clergy, mental health and crisis center workers, and interested community representatives," says

Sheriff Terry Haneckow.

There are two sessions of the awareness program scheduled on Thursday, Dec. 17, at Smith Hall, located at the fairgrounds at the St. Johns City Park. Session one is from 8 a.m. to noon and the second meeting is from 1 to 5 p.m.

The seminar is a four-hour overview on sensitization training. Participants will explore the experiences of victims and witnesses of crime, learn how to find solutions to the problems of victims, why it is important to work effectively with them, the role of the criminal justice system, the rights of victims, and changes needed in individual and organizational responses to victims.

"Participation is encouraged in this countywide presentation. With your support, we feel confident that the success of this program will improve the way the victims/witnesses of crime are treated in Clinton County," says Haneckow.

There is no charge for either seminar session and the program is certified by the Michigan Law Enforcement Officers Training Council.

Presentation of this program has been made possible through a Michigan Justice Training Commission grant to the Michigan Sheriff's Educational Foundation.

Changes in library plans

The Clinton County Arts Council board of directors and members unanimously decided last week at a special meeting to join with the St. Johns Area-New Library Project Committee, and the Community Resource Volunteer Services to establish a county-wide cultural center.

According to Kaye Pilmore, executive director of CCACG, "the vision is beginning to become a reality."

"About 60 members who were unable to attend the meeting called to seek information or to express their concerns. I feel their opinions were represented fairly," says Pilmore.

"The energy is generated for a cultural center and I hope it spreads

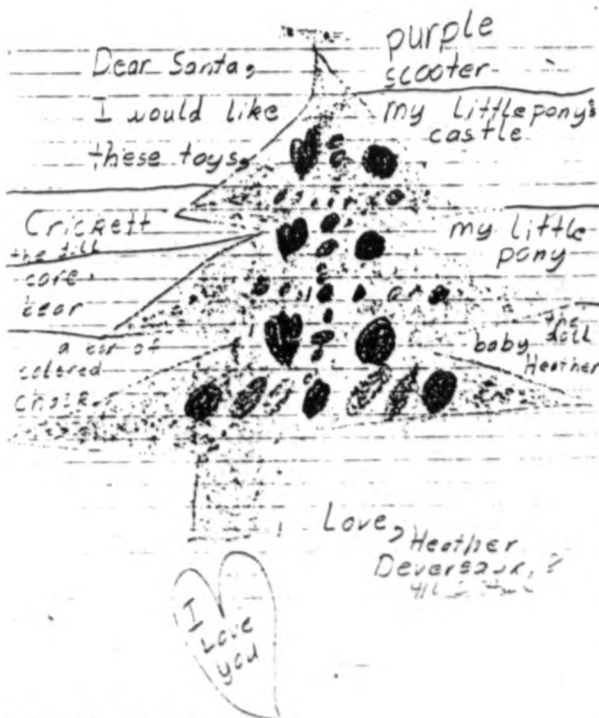

With the use of his guitar synthesizer he is able to play strings, brass, organ, piano, and sound effects which makes jazz, easy listening, and Top 40 music a special sound.
"The material is quality from the standpoint that it's a variety and I found it unobjectionable by most audiences," says Arnold. "I'm not going to please many country audiences or thrash metal ones, so I try to satisfy just about everyone else in between."
"I'm kind of like a one man juke box, only a little different, I'm supposed to add a little personality," claims Arnold.
He has traveled throughout the U.S. and performed with many musicians as a guitarist and arranger for "The Platters," a 50s band, and "The Yellowjackets," a Los Angeles fusion group.
Arnold is a member of the American Federation of Musicians, American String Teachers Association, and National Association of Songwriters.
While performing on the road, Arnold has acquired musical training from the Grove School of Music, Musicians Institute, and Cal State, all of Los Angeles, Michigan State University, and the University of Michigan in Flint.

"I'm a nomad at heart," says Arnold.
"I figure why not work a Friday or Saturday night for means of support when I'm producing a record for someone else or myself." Arnold's current album, "Choice of Fate," due out in Jan. 1988.

Over the garden gate Religious liberty

Christmas is barely two weeks away. Children look to the holidays with great excitement, anticipating goodies and gifts, while their parents are probably counting how many paydays remain.
However, school teachers and public school officials, especially sensitive to their constitutional duties and public opinion, may not approach Christmas as "the season to be jolly."
In recent years there have been some parents who claim that the constitution forbids all government participation and acknowledgement of religious holidays.
In a booklet entitled "Christmas in the Public Schools - Constitutional Ways to Observe Religious Holidays," Jordan Lorence, a civil rights attorney specializing in the areas of the First Amendment and religious liberties, says that unfortunately many school officials assume incorrectly that any acknowledgement in the public schools of Christmas' religious aspects must be wrong.
School officials sometimes delete religious Christmas carols from choir concert programs stripping the repertoire to "Frosty the Snowman" and "Jingle Bells." In extreme cases, the school officials feel forced to rename "Christmas vacation" as "winter vacation."
In one school district in Florida, a teacher forbade a second grade girl from distributing Christmas cards to her classmates because she had placed a sticker of Jesus on the backs of the cards. The cards supposedly violated the constitution.
In that same school district, a teacher had an eighth grade girl tear up a picture of the nativity (Mary, Joseph, Jesus, and the shepherds) that she had made for an art contest. The teacher said the picture violated the separation of church and state, because it was in a public school and had to be destroyed.
Concerned Women for America filed a lawsuit on behalf of the two girls and later won the case with a favorable out-of-court settlement.
Many people swell with outrage at such incidents especially when they know that the constitution does not require censorship of Christmas from the public schools. A federal appeals court ruled in a major decision from Sioux Falls, S.D., that the singing of religious Christmas carols in the public schools does not violate the constitution.
Many other courts have ruled in favor of Christmas celebrations and students' rights to express freely their religious beliefs in the public schools. The U.S. Supreme Court even upheld the constitutionality of a

nativity scene (creche) erected by the city of Pawtucket, R.I., as part of a Christmas holiday display.
Incidentally, the phrase, "separation of church and state" or anything like it appears nowhere in the constitution.

Students benefit from mini grants

A number of Clinton County students are reaping the benefits of two mini grants which were recently received by teachers at Waldron Elementary School in Fowler and St. Johns High School.

Marie Showers, the Chapter 1 instructor at

Waldron, was awarded a \$561 grant for a special reading incentive program, while Randy Rude, a special education teacher at St. Johns High School, earned a \$315 grant for his home maintenance course.

The mini grants were awarded by the State Board of Education to just 199 applicants out of a total

of 2,176 applications received. The grants totaled \$105,000.

Students in grades 1-5 in Showers' Chapter 1 remedial reading program at Waldron will receive three books a month for the next five months — plus take a trip to circus when it comes to Lansing in the spring. The cost of the trip for the 21 students involved in the program, along with a total of 15 books per student, will be paid for out of the mini grant.

"I had used the circus program before with another grant and it worked very well," Showers says. "It is motivational.

The idea of owning their own books, and going to the circus, is an added incentive for the students to want to read more.

"The more students practice reading, the better readers they become."

The mini grant received by Rude for his 13 shop students will be used to purchase needed supplies for the home maintenance program which stresses "basic handyman skills."

"The class is really a springboard for other vocational classes at the high school level," Rude says. "The students learn basic skills which will help them obtain entry level job

positions in the future."

Included in the many projects which Rude's students have built are: paper racks, newspaper stands, bookshelves, picture frames, signs, storage sheds, bulletin boards, toy chests, refinishing desks, and other small jobs.

"We also cover minor plumbing, wiring, welding, lawn mower and machine repair in preparation for higher level vocational classes," Rude says.

The mini grant was used to purchase a variety of new tools for the shop students, such as hammers, tapes, lumber, and other basic supplies.

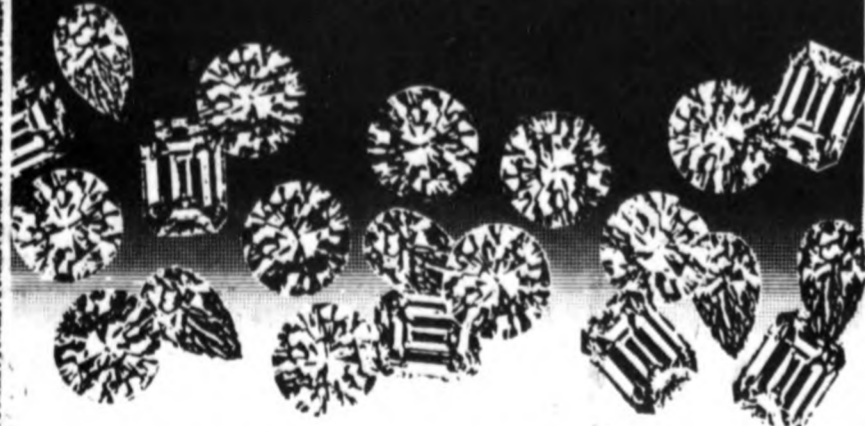

Family focus

Home decorating

Thanksgiving is over and Christmas will be here in just a couple of weeks. Families all over Clinton County are getting into the holiday spirit by decorating their homes. In my column today, I'd like to give a few decorating safety tips to keep your house a safe and beautiful place throughout the holiday season.

When you get out the Christmas lights to decorate the tree this year, take an extra few minutes to check your light strings for deterioration. Those few minutes could mean the difference between a merry Christmas and one spent enumerating fire damaged possessions for the insurance company.

Every year, many homes are damaged or lost due to fires started by poorly maintained or old Christmas light strings. Specifically check:

- The plug. Is the molded plastic insulation cracked or brittle? Are the prongs loose when plugged into a receptacle?
- The wire. Can you see cracking or flaking insulation?
- The light sockets. Are the bulbs loose or is the socket cracked with age?

If any of these conditions are apparent, then it is time for new lights. Be sure any lights you purchase have the Underwriter's Lab label. If you use lights outside, make sure that it states on the tag affixed to the string that the lights are suitable for use outside. Never use light strings on an artificial metal tree; use only floodlights in floor fixtures made for the purpose.

When you put your light strings away for the season, store them on reels or wrapped on wooden frames to avoid the damaging tangles that occur in random storage.

Following these simple rules can help insure that

your house won't become a fire loss statistic this Christmas. Dawn Harris is the home economist for the Clinton County Cooperative Extension Service.

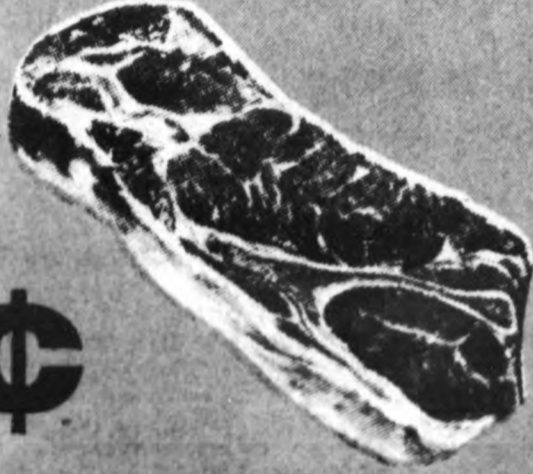

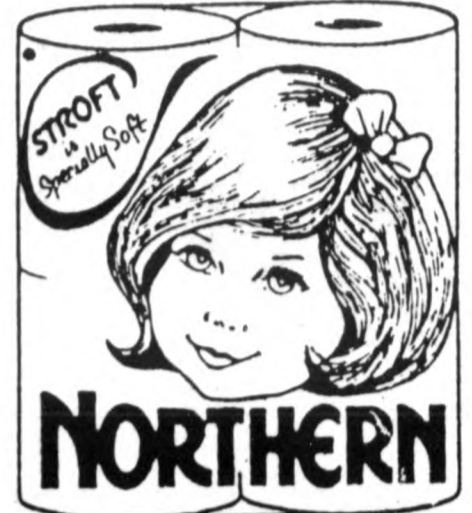

St. Johns area youths learn ice hockey skills in GLAHA

Wayne Gretzky, beware! A group of young hockey players from St. Johns may be shooting for your scoring records someday.

Nine future ice stars, ranging from pre-school age through sophomores in high school, are honing their skates along with hockey skills in a variety of programs sponsored by the Greater Lansing Amateur Hockey Association.

GLAHA-coordinated hockey programs begin with an Atoms class for pre-school children, followed by Mites I and II (ages 6-8), Squirts (ages 9-10), PeeWee (ages 11-12), Bantam (ages 13-14), and Midget (high school students). Skaters enjoy ice time at Munn Arena on the MSU campus, and at the Lansing Ice & Gymnastics Centre. A typical week for beginners includes several hours of practice time along with a weekly game.

"The kids really get a lot of ice time," says parent/coach John Scott. "Leagues begin around the third week in September and run through mid-March, although registrations for new skaters are accepted throughout the season."

THE YOUNGEST members of the St. Johns connection are four-year-old twins Derek and Dirk Croftchik, sons of Larry and Debbie Croftchik. Participants in the Atoms group, the Croftchiks look like miniature ice stars when they're fully outfitted in skates, pads, helmets, gloves, and uniforms.

"We follow the MSU hockey team," Debbie says, "and learned about the GLAHA program. The boys really enjoy themselves on the ice."

"They started out with pillows stuffed into snowsuits, but it wasn't long before they had regular hockey equipment."

Skating in the Mite I class is eight-year-old Ross Johnson, son of Chuck and Carol Johnson. His brother, Aaron — a sophomore at St. Johns High School, has travelled around the state and out-of-state playing competitive hockey.

Members of the Mites II group are David Poff, age eight, and Brian Finos, age seven. David is the son of Doug and Nancy Poff, and Brian is the son of Terri and Lou Finos. Nine-year-old Bobby Scott, son of John and Donna Scott, is coached by father John on a team in the Squirt grouping, while Jim Kotajarvi participates on the Squirt AA travel team. He is the son of Jerry and Mary Lou Kotajarvi.

Rounding out the roster of St. Johns area players is Mark Moore, a freshman at St. Johns High School who is playing in a Detroit league this season.

DESPITE THE many, many hours which the parents must spend in travelling to practices and games, all think it is time well spent.

"We'd like to see more kids from St. Johns get involved in hockey," says Mary Lou Kotajarvi. "It's hard to compete with basketball and football here — we're from Marquette so we're well acquainted with hockey."

Scott, who has coached in the GLAHA program for the past four years, echoes Kotajarvi's estimation about the popularity of playing ice hockey.

"It's not as popular here as it is in some areas, but once kids get involved in it they really have fun with it," he says. "The kids get a chance to play against teams from across the state. We have an excellent exchange program with teams from the Ann Arbor area and from East Kentwood near Grand Rapids."

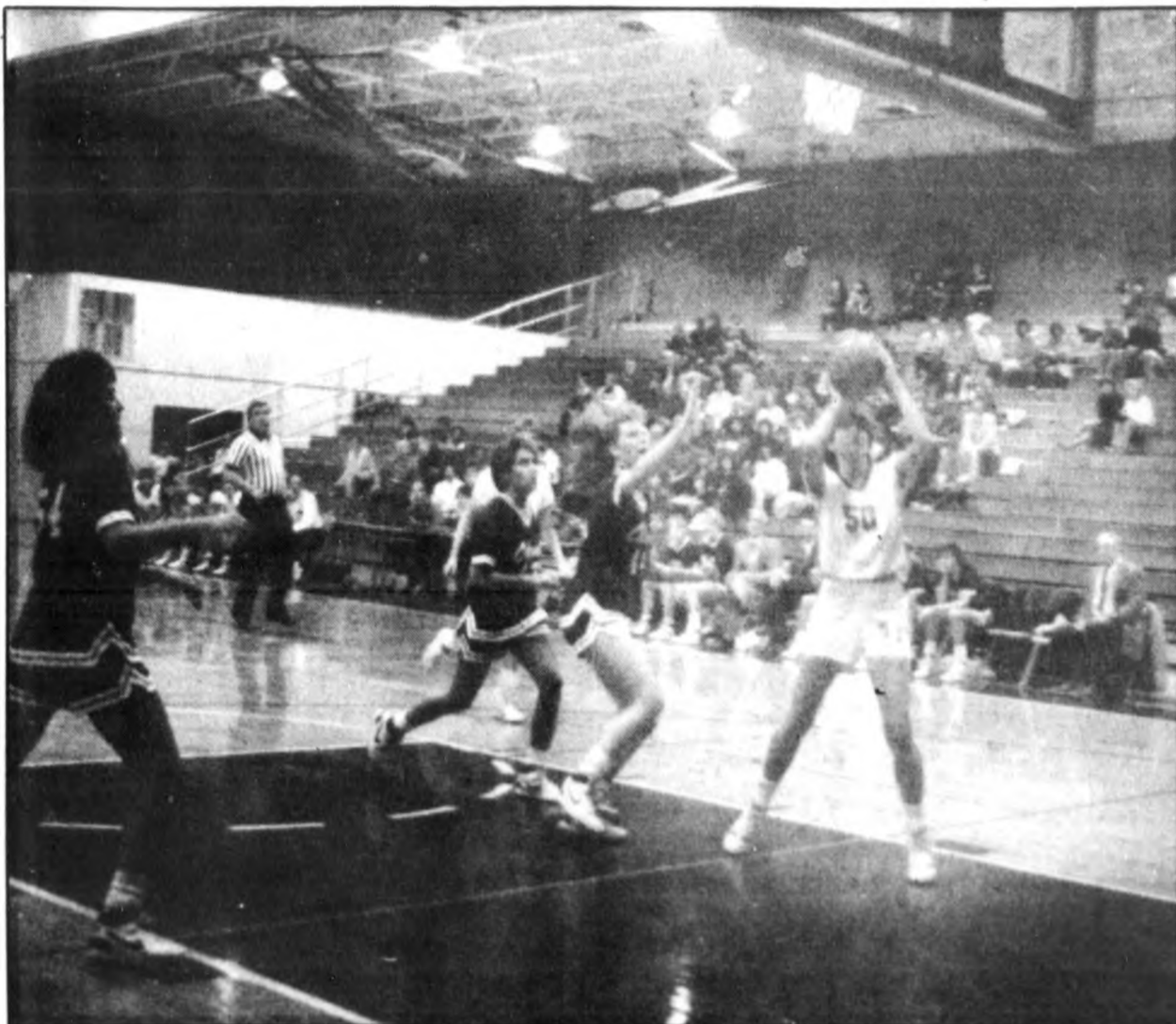
St. Johns is hoping for a better second game when they meet East Lansing tonight (Dec. 8) on their own home court. But, defeating the Trojans won't be easy.

When you're the "King of the Hill" everybody sets their sights on knocking you off the mountain. With an assortment of Central Michigan Athletic titles to their credit — plus 32 Class D district crowns, and numerous times as regional through state final participants — the Fowler basketball team is well acquainted with the pressures that go with being the top dog.

Coach Dennis Smith's 1987-88 Eagle varsity cage team must not only deal with the prospects of being gunned for by CMAC opponents, but also try to live up to the basketball traditions inherited by all Fowler teams.

That tradition was made clear by last year's squad who ended the season with a 24-2 record, was ranked third in the state in Class D, and went all the way to the state quarterfinals before being eliminated by Detroit East Catholic in a close 52-47 ballgame.

BACK FROM that stellar team are seniors Matt Hufnagel, Don Simon, Troy Irrer, and Tony Schafer.

At 6'3", Hufnagel averaged 13.8 points a game last year and 5.5 rebounds. His clutch-shooting pulled the Eagles out of many a tight spot, especially in key conference and play-off contests.

Simon, Irrer, and Schafer all played support roles on the 1986-87 championship team. As the season progressed, they were often called upon by Coach Smith to carry the gauntlet when starters found themselves in foul trouble — or were unable to get things in motion.

A new addition to this year's starting line-up is sophomore Jeff Armbrustmacher. Standing 5'9", he will assume the job of point guard for the Eagles.

"We usually don't dip down into the sophomore class

for varsity players," Coach Smith said, "but we really believe that Jeff is ready to play varsity ball."

Another newcomer to the varsity level who should see plenty of playing time is junior Jim Wohlert. The 6'3" forward will add height and strength to the Eagles' team.

Additional spots on Fowler's roster are filled by Scott Koenigsnecht and Tony Bertram, both 5'11" juniors who were targets for many of Hufnagel's passes during the recently completed football season; juniors Kevin Hafner, Scott Piggott, and Mark Simon, all members of last year's junior varsity team; and 5'8" junior Steve Halfmann, a newcomer to the Fowler cage program.

COACH SMITH, who has amassed a career record of 109-34 entering his eighth season as head coach at Fowler, believes the CMAC will be evenly matched this year in terms of personnel and overall team quality.

"There is more balance at the top than ever before," Smith said. "Pewamo-Westphalia has some very strong ballplayers up from their junior varsity program, and Laingsburg looks as good or better than last year with two sophomores up to the varsity who are exceptional shooters.

"Pottersville, who went to their regional finals last year, has their two 6'5" kids, along with a transfer student from Lansing Everett who was their starting point guard last season. Saranac also should be much improved this year.

"It's impossible to tell who the top team will be."

One thing that can be said with certainty is that Fowler will field a team ready to play in the winning style that Eagle fans have become accustomed to watching on the court.

"We will be very competitive this year," Coach Smith said.

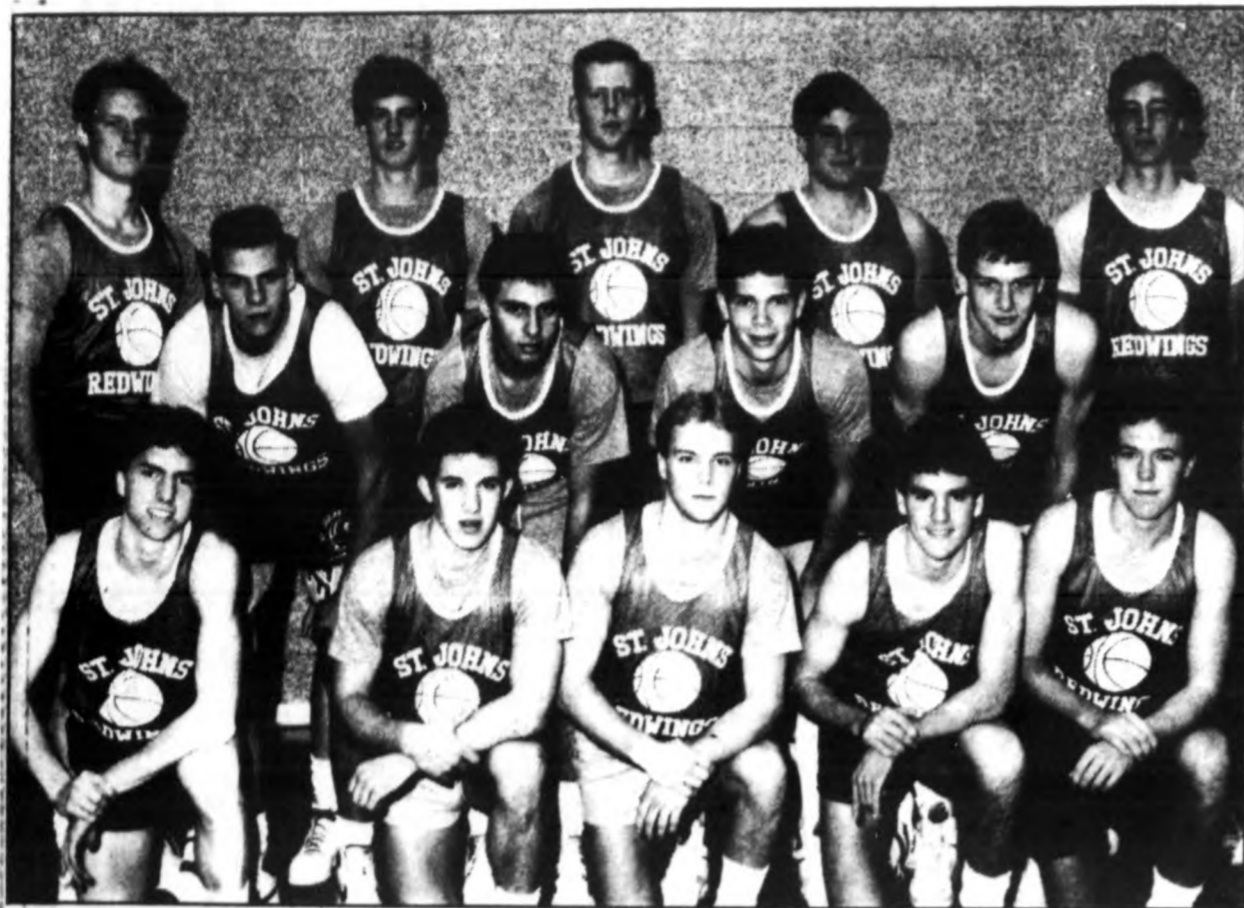

Quality veteran players are back in the Redwing lineup

Talk about a top-notch group of returning high school basketball players — the 1987-88 Redwing varsity team has enough players back from last year's squad to field two teams.

"Our depth is probably our one biggest strength this year," Coach Keith Haske said of his varsity cagers. "We have a lot of kids who can play — and they're all good, strong players."

The fact that 10 players are returning from the team of a year ago — many of whom either started or saw ample playing time — has led many predictors to pick St. Johns as the team to beat in the Mid-Michigan B league this year. Adding to the Redwing optimism is a "changed" head coach who begins his third season at the St. Johns' helm with an upbeat attitude on his teams' chances to do well.

"People say I have changed — I don't know about that," Coach Haske said, "but I guess maybe I have. Last year was a very difficult one for me. This group of kids is so good to work with. We don't have any attitude or discipline problems — it makes it nice to come to practice."

LEADER OF THE PACK for the Redwings is senior center/forward Tom Penix who measures in at 6'6". Along with rebounding and scoring strength, Penix should act as one of the team leaders.

Other big men for St. Johns include seniors Clark VanBuren, a 6'1" forward/center, Scott Aylsworth, 6'4" forward/center, and Jim Martens, 6'2" forward.

All three saw a considerable amount of court time last

"Scott is just tougher than heck on the boards," Haske said. Martens is a real worker — we just hope we can keep him out of foul trouble."

Also back are the starting guards from a year ago, Matt Wilcox and Barry Keil. Both are juniors on the Redwing team this year. The remainder of returning players include Andy Ball, Steve Kudwa, Marty Suidiguest, Jim DeBrabander, and Pete Cocco.

UP FROM last year's junior varsity are Chip Lott, Joe Moore, Paul Hughes, and Mike Lumbert. Because of the large number of players on the Redwing roster, Hughes and Moore have been practicing with the varsity team but will see playing time with the junior varsity cagers.

Believing that his team should be strong enough to finish in the top portion of the MMB, Coach Haske noted that both Ionia and Chesaning also should be good this year.

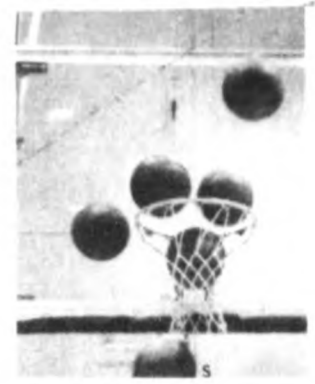
"Ionia should be especially good in the second half of the season when they get their big man back," he said. "Chesaning is going to surprise a lot of people, too."

Ashley looks forward to a brighter season in 1987-88

Coming off a rough season last year (2-8, 2-19), the 1987-88 edition of the Ashley Bears is anticipating an improved win/loss record at the conclusion of this year's agenda. A Class D school in the Mid-State Athletic Conference, the Bears are coached by Gary Schestag — beginning his fourth season as varsity head coach.

"Overall, we feel that we will be improved and more competitive than last year," Coach Schestag said. "These young men are hard workers. If they can be patient and execute, as well as learn how to be aggressive in dictating the action on the court, we should surprise some people."

The Bears return seven letterman from last year, three of whom have starting experience: 5'8" senior point guard, Jim Skaryd; 5'9" senior center-forward, Aaron Burk; and 6'0" senior center-forward, Pat Cordray.

SKARYD IS in his third year on the varsity level, and his second year as a member of the starting unit.

"He is our quarterback on the floor and an aggressive defensive player," the coach said. "He's a good shooter, although sometimes streaky — he will have to take charge for us."

Standing just 5'9", Burk is probably one of the shortest centers in the area. However, according to Coach Schestag, his "jumping ability offsets his size disadvantage."

"He can surprise people when he decides to take control. He will have to concentrate on moving the ball to the inside, rather than trying to go over people."

The tallest player on the Bear team, Cordray is an aggressive player who also needs to discipline himself to drive to the basket, not go over people, his coach said.

Coach Schestag is anticipating sophomore forward Charlie Howes will add strength and fundamental basketball skills to the team this year. Howes moved up to the varsity level as a freshman midway through last year's schedule.

"He made his presence felt on the varsity last year and should be a solid performer for us this season," Schestag said.

THE REMAINDER of the roster is comprised of, "all-around performer," junior Tom Lamey; "aggressive," junior John Hendricks; "quick and good shooting," senior Steve Mills; "all-around," player Randy Ordway; sophomore Brian Gavenda and Jimmy Stehlik; and "newcomer, German exchange student," Christoph Ulleweit.

Strengths listed by Coach Schestag include the experience of seven returning lettermen, quickness, shooting and ball-handling skills, and good jumping ability. The lack of size, coupled with a tendency for inconsistency in execution and aggressiveness, are seen as the Bears' weaknesses by the coach.

Looking around the MSAC, Coach Schestag expects Dansville and Genesee to have the edge, with Webberville as a darkhorse in an overall well-balanced league.

"We feel we can be in the thick of things," he said.

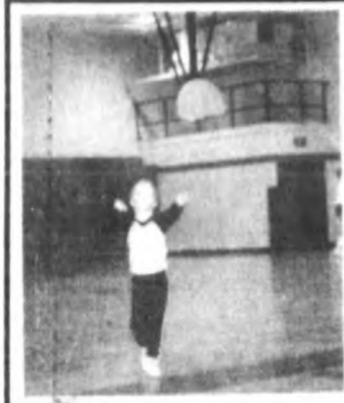

Pewamo-Westphalia fields big, strong team in 1987-88

Opposing teams who have the opportunity to run up against the Pewamo-Westphalia varsity basketball team during the 1987-88 season will undoubtedly find out in a hurry that the Pirates won't allow anyone to push them around.

"They're big. They're strong. And they won't be easily intimidated."

Their roster includes more than a couple members from the 1987 varsity football team, who took — and received — their share of hard knocks.

"We looked a little like the proverbial bull in the china shop," Head Coach Ron Kramer said of his squad's pre-season scrimmage last week. "We're a little rough around the edges."

FIVE LETTERMEN, none of whom saw starting action last year, along with nine juniors who were members of the 19-1 junior varsity squad in 1986-87 make up Coach Kramer's team.

Last year's varsity team posted a 18-6 overall record, picked up a second consecutive Class C district title, and earned the first-ever win in regional competition by a Pirate boys' squad — defeating New Lothrop 54-45 before being eliminated by eventual Class C State Champion Saginaw Nouvel.

Attempting to equal — or exceed — the mark made by

their teammates from a year ago, will be senior lettermen Brian Barker, Dale Jandernoa, Dane Hengesbach, Rich Thelen, and Bill Schafer.

Hengesbach, measuring 6'0", averaged 5 points, 2 steals, and 3 assists a game last year in a reserve role from his guard position. He will be aided offensively by Schafer, 5'11" guard, and Jandernoa, a 6'2" forward. Coach Kramer is counting on Barker and Thelen to serve as "role players, who will supply leadership and defense."

Another "Bill Schafer," will not only add to scorekeeper's confusion, but is expected to be one of the Pirates' main scoring threats. A scoring leader on the junior varsity last season, the junior Schafer stands 6'1" and will play at forward this year.

Along with Schafer, juniors Tim Wieber (6'1" forward/center), Jason Spitzley (6'0" forward), and Tony Schneider (6'3" forward/center) will help provide rebounding strength on both ends of the court for the Pirates.

Coach Kramer likes the quickness and outside shooting skills of junior candidates Tom Thelen (6'1" guard), Mike Spitzley (6'1" guard), and Randy Hayes (5'10" guard). Pirate fans might expect to see a few three-point shots fall from any of the above if the spirit moves them.

Adding to Pewamo-Westphalia's front line attack will be the remaining two junior team members, Dean Harr (6'0" forward), and Tim Hengesbach (6'3" forward).

THE PIRATES have intensified their schedule this season, coupling the expansion of the already tough Central Michigan Athletic Conference with slated Class B opponents Portland, Belding, and Central Montcalm, to form a well-rounded agenda.

"The CMAC shows the greatest balance in probably ten years," Coach Kramer said. "We expect the top teams to include Potterville, Fowler, Laingsburg, and Saranac — as well as ourselves."

"These teams should all have a shot at winning the league title, with Bath, St. Pats, and Fulton acting as dark horses who could have an impact on who finishes on top. The expansion of the league schedule (to include Bath and Saranac) could also leave its mark on some teams."

As always, Coach Kramer sees "keeping players healthy and playing up to their potential," as primary season goals.

"Our success will depend on good senior leadership and intensity, as well as how quickly the juniors mature into varsity level players," the coach said.

New Fulton coach 'hopeful' for a Pirate winning season

Fulton varsity basketball coach Randy Troub, in his first year at the helm of the Pirate team, is hopeful that his cagers will follow the path begun by another "first-year Fulton coach" — football mentor Randy Lark who led the Pirate gridders to one of their best seasons in recent years.

Coach Troub, along with Coach Lark and new Fulton wrestling leader, Coach Randy Meiers, form a trio of new "Randys" who are doing their best to put Fulton athletics on the winning road.

"I am really enjoying my job as coach," Coach Troub said of his tenure thus far. "The team has been working very hard — they're hustlers and very willing to learn."

COMING INTO a program that has seen three head varsity coaches in the same number of years has been one obstacle which the new coach has tried to overcome. Senior Chris Barrus, who suffered from a bad ankle through a portion of last year's schedule, is expected to be at full strength in 1987-88. Other seniors who will help fill the bill for Fulton are Jan Mahler and Rick Wilson, with junior Mike Chick also looking strong, according to the coach.

The team is rounded out by Chris Towslee, Ron Carris, Brian Peck, and Brian Stead.

"We really did better than I expected in our pre-season scrimmage with Merrill last week," Coach Troub said, "especially since they were so much bigger than us. We handled their height quite well and did a good job of boxing people out."

A PRODUCT OF the Fulton school system, Troub was

a member of the Pirate team which won the league title, district, and regional crowns during his final two years of high school. He is familiar with the CMAC and expects Pewamo-Westphalia, Fowler, Potterville and Laingsburg to be among the teams to beat.

Prior to accepting the coaching position at Fulton, Coach Troub taught and coached in Texas. Although he termed the style of basketball played in the Lone Star State as "different from here in Michigan," he attributes much of his success as a Texas coach to the "hard-nosed, pressure defense" he employed there.

"I'd say the best attribute this team has going for them right now is their attitude," he said. "They always hustle and give all I ask from them."

20-year veteran coach will help Marauders cage skills

The 1987-88 season marks an anniversary for the Ovid-Elsie varsity basketball team. For the twentieth year, Coach Robert Foreback will lead the Marauder "blue and gold" cagers into action as varsity head coach.

With 229 wins to his credit as a varsity coach, and a past recipient of "Coach of the Year" honors as voted by the Michigan High School Coaches Association, Foreback will have to draw upon his coaching expertise to help a young O-E team over big hurdles this season.

Hurdle number one will be molding a team that returns just one starter from last season.

"This will be the least experienced team I have had in all my years of coaching," Foreback said.

Other hurdles which the Marauders will be forced to clear according to Coach Foreback are a lack of speed and quickness.

"On the positive side, we will have some good shooters and what should be a strong inside attack," the veteran coach said. "The lack of experience may cause us some problems early in the season, but we should be in pretty good shape by the second half of the year."

Three seniors who are expected to make key contributions include 5-9" guard Lee McCallister, 6'0" forward Shad Morgan, and 5-11" guard Brad Walker.

"McCallister has good offensive skills," Foreback said. "He will have to work on his defensive play, but he should see starting action. Morgan is a hard worker and will probably see playing time because of that fact, and Walker will also be fighting for a starting position. He's a good player, but can be inconsistent at times."

5'10" junior Jason McCreery joins the varsity after serving as the team leader and point guard on the junior varsity team last season.

"He (McCreery) is a solid player in all areas," Foreback said. "We've had some exceptional point

guards at Ovid-Elsie in the past years — he looks to be in the mold of them."

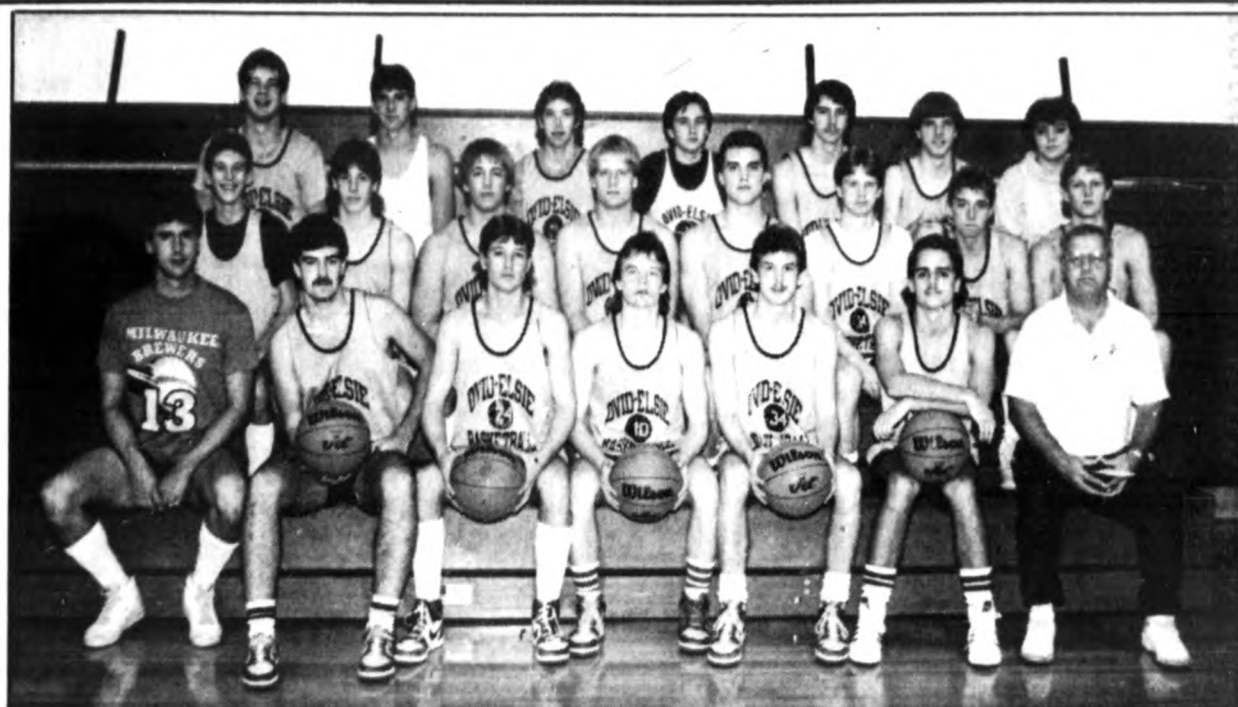
COACH FOREBACK also has high hopes for another varsity newcomer — sophomore James Teelander. Standing 6'5", the young center will be the "big man inside that we haven't had for the last three years," the coach said.

Seeing themselves and Alma as the two inexperienced teams in the Mid-Michigan B League, Coach Foreback expects St. Johns to be the team to beat in the conference this year.

"They are returning eight of their first nine players for a year ago," he said. "Ionia will be good also in the second half of the season when 6'10" Matt Hofcamp is eligible to play again. Both Chesaning and Corunna return veteran teams as well and should be improved from last season."

Agricultural news Welcome!

I would like to take this opportunity to introduce a newcomer to the Michigan State University Animal Science Department. Dr. Michael Allen, a dairy nutritionist, recently joined the faculty with a joint research and extension appointment.

Mike comes to us with a strong dairy nutrition background. He grew up in upstate New York in rural Dutchess County. He obtained his bachelor's degree in agriculture from Cornell University in 1977. An interest in forage utilization and dairy cattle nutrition led him to graduate work at Cornell.

While there, he developed methods to evaluate ration particle size, buffering capacity, and residence

time of feed stuffs in the rumen. Last year he worked as a post-doc. at the U.S. Dairy Forage Research Center in Madison, Wis.

In this position he conducted research to evaluate the effects of fiber, intake, and forage type on the rumen. At MSU, Mike plans to continue efforts in the basic and applied aspects of utilization, storage, and evaluation of forages and forage systems.

The strong background Mike brings with him in forage utilization will be of great benefit as we develop Mike's forage program.

Farm prices increase in November report

The index of prices received by farmers in Michigan for all products as of Nov. 15, was 111 percent of its 1977 base, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Statistics Service.

The price index for all crops in Michigan was 2 percent above the October level. Price increases for corn, soybeans, oats, and potatoes more than offset lower prices for dry beans

and wheat. Fruit prices were up slightly while hay prices were unchanged.

The livestock and livestock product price index for Michigan was down 2 percent from October. A small increase in milk prices failed to offset a large decline in meat animal and egg prices. The livestock price index was down 2 percent from November 1986, while the crop index was unchanged from a year ago.

New plant for Countrymark

The Board of Directors of Countrymark has approved a recommendation from management to build a \$3 million feed manufacturing plant on the company's property located in Lima, Ohio.

The St. Johns branch of Countrymark is located at 408 N. Clinton Ave., with Bill Campbell serving as

director.

Construction on the new Lima plant is expected to begin in the spring of 1988, with completion about a year later. The facility will be capable of manufacturing 80,000 tons of formula livestock and poultry feed annually, and will have room for 100,000 bushels of grain storage.

Roehl lines

1987 crops

When I first came to Clinton County I heard of winter wheat yields up to 150 bushel per acre. That was good wheat. 1987 did not have 100 plus wheat yields, but the yields were still up over averages.

In 1987, farmers talked of soybeans in the high 60s - the state average yield was 35 bushel per acre. This is a record average for Michigan, the previous high being 33 bushels per acre.

Corn yields of 95 bushel per acre were average to slightly below average. This year's yield is estimated to be down 10 bushels per acre from 1986, a reduction of \$18.30 to \$30.30 per acre to the producers.

The dry edible bean yield is placed at 13 hundredweight per acre. Near average, this yield is well above the very poor 8 count per acre of 1986.

Sugarbeets are expected to average 20 ton per acre, while potatoe production is down from previous years.

Note: Recent reports released by the Environmental Protection Agency, in conjunction with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, warn that using unleaded

fuel in regular gasoline engines can cause substantial engine damage.
