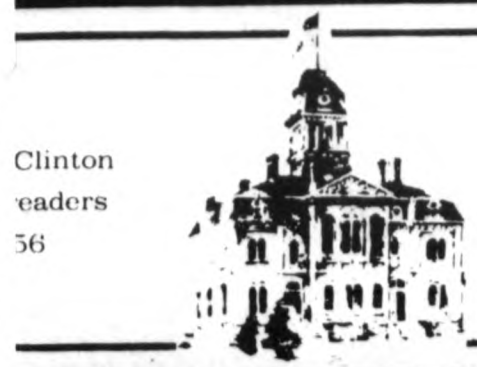

Birth control at issue in education policy

As the St. Johns school district comes closer to a consensus on a sex education policy, the issue of birth control remains divisive, said Board of Education Trustee Robert Craig last week.

"So we're going to have to wrestle with that issue," he said. Craig said he was pleased with a May 4 meeting of about 75 residents and school board members at which a proposed "Human Sexuality Education" policy was presented by a school board subcommittee.

He said the meeting was in sharp contrast to a sex education meeting last fall. The fall meeting was marked by tension and emotion and flawed by uncertainties about how public comment should be obtained on a draft document the public had not had a chance to study.

At the May 4 meeting, Craig spent about 15 minutes giving an overview of the proposed sex education policy developed by himself, board Vice President Jeanette Adams and Trustee James Parr. Participants then broke into small groups to discuss the policy. After about an hour of small group discussion, representatives of each group presented summaries of what had been said.

"Overall there was a lot of support for that policy and that program," said Craig.

He said there were a number of objections from single parents to phrases in the proposed policy such as "broken homes" and "illegitimate children."

"Somehow we're going to have to fine tune that and soften that language," said Craig. "That's one

change I can see."

But consensus has not been reached on the appropriate role of the school district in providing information about birth control, he said. He said he believes participants were close to a 50-50 split on the issue.

The board subcommittee's proposed policy states that chastity is "the most acceptable and the safest means of birth control."

The proposed policy also states:

"Birth control information shall not be taught."

Craig said of the subcommittee, "We don't think you can be hypocritical and say on one hand that chastity is the way to go and on the other we're going to teach you all about birth control."

The other point of view, he said, is that a certain percentage of teenagers are going to be sexually active even if adults disapprove and

that those teenagers need birth control information.

One possibility for compromise, said Craig, would be to keep birth control information out of the curriculum but allow qualified staff to answer questions on an individual basis.

"We feel in that case it's not part of the curriculum," he said. "We're willing to let a qualified person answer a question about a personal

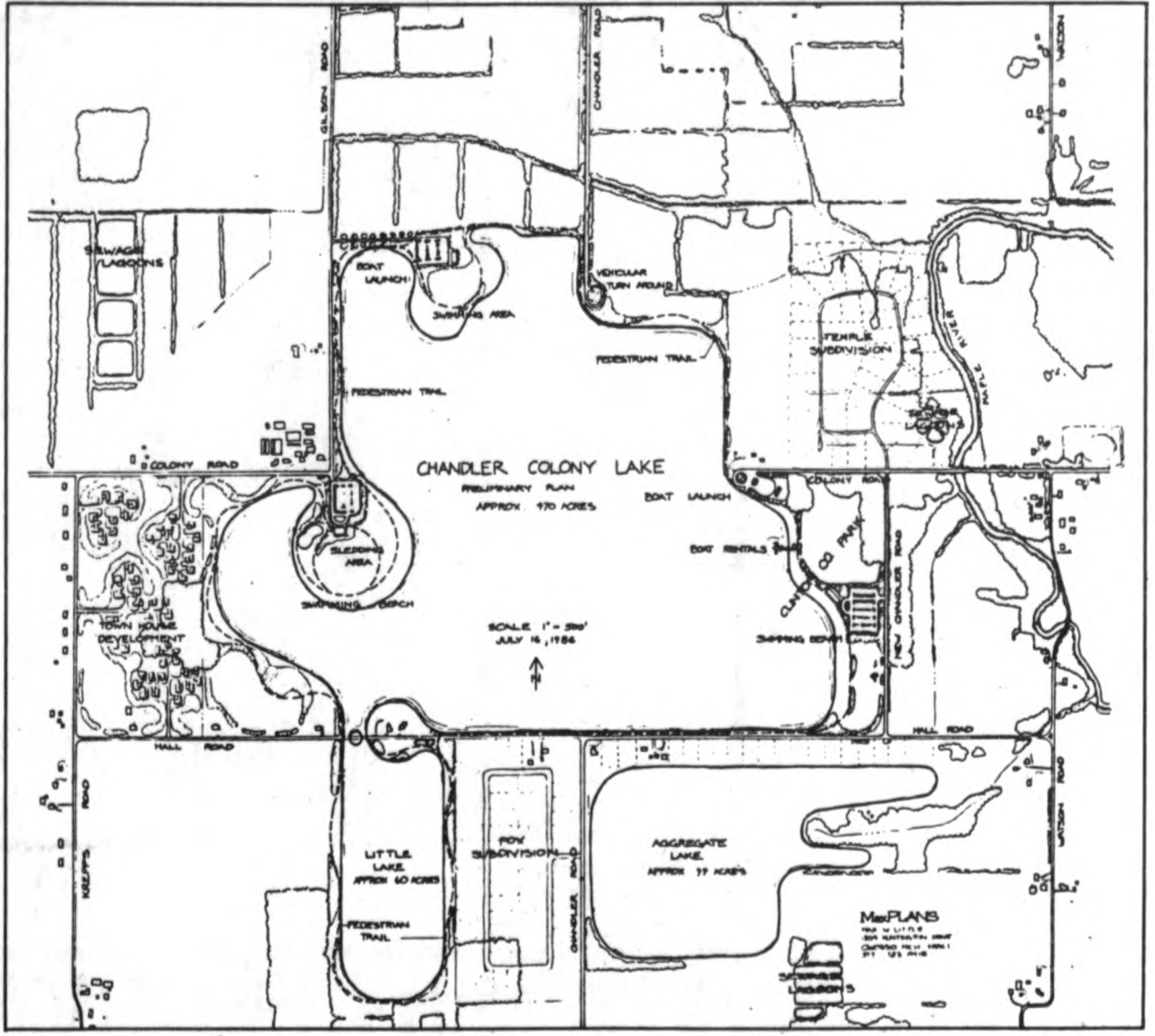
practice and that could include a question about birth control."

Craig said the May 4 meeting also differed from the sex education meeting last fall in that all participants seemed to agree that some sort of sex education program is inevitable.

"The question is not to have a program or not to have a program," said Craig. "The question is what kind of program we're going to have."

Proposal: Change gravel pits into a 470-acre lake

Sometime this summer the Clinton County Planning Commission will begin discussing — and possibly acting upon — a plan to transform an area of gravel pits in northeastern Clinton County into the county's largest lake.

As envisioned by County Planner Thomas Wartsler, the lake would consist of at least 470 acres of pristine blue water for swimming, boating and fishing. There would be a county park on the eastern shore, a pedestrian trail around its edge, and several beaches and boat launching sites.

The center of the lake would be what is now the intersection of Chandler and Colony roads. It is an area of gravel mines; Wartsler proposes an alternative to leaving the mined-out pits empty or simply filling them in to make flat fields. What he wants to do is mine out the roadways that separate the gravel pits — and in so doing create the lake.

The plan has several selling points:

- The county would gain a new recreational lake.

- "In my mind that would be the biggest attraction — a quality recreation area," says Wartsler.

- Wartsler envisions residential development in clusters set back from the lake, rather than extensive

lakefront development. This would prevent widely different property values for lakefront versus non-lakefront property, he says, and would make the lake more accessible to the general public.

- The lake would replace the "attractive nuisance" of unrestored gravel pits. Such pits can be dangerous in that they attract unsupervised youngsters. They can also cause liability problems for the owners.

- Owners of some of the newer mining sites are required by county ordinance of recent years to meet certain requirements for restoring the land after the mining operation is complete. But even in those instances a lake would be vastly preferable, says Bill Dutton, director of the Clinton Area New Development Organization and a supporter of the lake proposal.

- "Restored to what?" he asks. "We already have lots of open fields in the county."

- The lake, says Dutton, would be a vital element in the effort to attract new jobs and tax dollars to the county. Companies scouting for new locations often take into account the "amenities" offered by the areas they scout.

Majority opinion says No to school clinics, drunk drivers

Clinton County residents favor competency tests for graduating high school students and tougher drunk driving penalties but oppose school-based health clinics.

These are among the results of a survey of county residents conducted by state Sen. Fred Dillingham.

Martin Garn, staff assistant to Dillingham, said about 600 people responded to the survey, which was mailed in April to all Clinton County households. He said the responses show that Dillingham's policy goals reflect the opinions of the majority of the residents of the county.

"By and large we are pretty much right in line with the responses we've had," said Garn.

Nearly 85 percent of the respondents said they support com-

petency testing for high school graduates and 83 percent said they want the state to crack down on drunk drivers.

More than 76 percent said they do not believe health clinics belong in public schools. Garn said most of the resistance to health clinics stems from the suspicion that the clinics would be used to distribute contraception and abortion information.

As for other health clinic functions, said Garn, "A lot of these things are nothing that the traditional school nurse couldn't take care of."

Other survey results included:

- More than 63 percent oppose raising Michigan's 15-cent gas tax limit to 21 cents by 1994 to pay for road improvements.
- Some 70 percent oppose allowing

local governments to raise their own fuel taxes to pay for road maintenance.

- Sixty-four percent said they are in favor of drug testing in schools and workplaces.

- Sixty-five percent support the agriculture disaster relief program.

- Fifty-three percent support changing Public Act 116, the farmland preservation act, which offers farmers a tax break in exchange for leaving their land undeveloped for at least 10 years. Some believe the act should be changed to allow for a five year commitment, to lower the amount of income from the land needed to qualify for the program, and to lower the penalty for those who wish to withdraw from the program.

Society makes it tough on single parents

To the Editor:

Once again my 11-year-old son brings home a note from school inviting fathers to join their sons at school. This time it's a father and son sexuality discussion. I vowed that the next time I received a father and son "only" note, I would assert myself as a single parent and cry out, "Discrimination!"

Are they really considering what is best for my son by telling him he does not qualify to be included? Or are they imprisoned in a set of out-dated, unrealistic rules? Single mothers raising sons and single fathers raising daughters are discriminated against in schools, youth programs, and social situations.

Presently the school system is failing to meet the needs of the single parent who is trying to raise a child of the opposite gender. The school system is attempting to bridge the communication gap between parents and their children by hosting father-son, and mother-daughter sexuality discussions. The topic of sexuality for pre-adolescence is an important one, and the school has undertaken the task of teaching sexual feelings and responsibilities to their students.

However, they encourage the child to talk with a friend or teacher rather than the parent of the opposite sex, who should be the first one consulted. Furthermore, the parent at home is usually the one who will be available for the child and will offer moral and ethical support. A child needs to feel he/she can come to a parent, regardless of the gender, not to a person the school feels is an appropriate substitute.

Youth programs, such as scouting and little league baseball, are guilty of discriminating against single-parent children. In scouting, for example, there are many events planned for fathers and cub scouts, mothers and brownie scouts. Why should games and outings be based on gender? Why can't the parent who has the most time and interest participate in scouting activities?

Consequently, these scouting programs inhibit the children who much need the valuable experience scouting can offer. Unfortunately, my son and many others have dropped scouting rather than face the embarrassment and humiliation of being excluded from activities because they lack a father.

IN LITTLE league baseball, girls are no longer prevented from playing on teams and by playing get all the benefits of fun and sportsmanship that the boys do. Their coach, however, has to be a male parent. This is unfeasible for many dads, thus, leaves some children unable to play since they have no coach. It

seems a waste of many interested and capable mothers who would be willing to undertake this responsibility.

In order for my son to play on a little league team this summer, I was required to sign a paper which states, "This must be signed by both parents...if not, state reason below." My marital status has no relationship to my son's ability to play. I feel that this is an invasion of my privacy and should not be required information.

In social situations, children are left out or made to feel uncomfortable when one of the parents is absent. Often they are victims of name-calling and teasing, even today when the incidence of divorce and separation is more common. Many organizations, such as churches and clubs, sponsor father-son or mother-daughter events and activities which, as a result, omits many young people and their parents. Many single parents feel they don't fit in; that their presence is not valid because their sex is different than that of their child. Why not make these events for parent and child where none would be excluded?

Despite the fact that single parenting is on the rise, society refuses to acknowledge that not all children live in a two-parent household. Consequently, the school systems, youth programs and social organizations continue to ostracize single parents who are raising children of the opposite gender. As a result, the parent and child may feel resentful, angry and rejected. There are numerous moms raising sons and dads raising daughters, alone, who need to feel a part of all aspects of life.

As a single mom, with a son, I believe that we are tired of not being respected for the job that we do. It is not easy to be both a father and a mother to a child, particularly when society keeps making the distinction. We don't need sympathy. We need empathy.

News insensitive to women's achievement

To the Editor:

The April 7, 1987, edition of the Clinton County News carried a front page article about St. Johns High School students who were selected to join the National Honor Society because of their achievements in scholarship, character, leadership and service. The names of 35 students achieving this honor were listed. Although 22 of the students named were young women, the photograph accompanying the article pictured only two of the 13 young men named in the article, and none of the 22 young women.

The April 21, 1987, edition of the Clinton County News contained an article (on page 4A) entitled "Statesmen." This article listed the names of St. Johns High School students qualifying for special citizenship programs. Five young men and two young women were named in the article. The photograph accompanying this article again pictured only the young men and neither of the young women who were written about.

Letters

The saying "a picture is worth a thousand words" is especially true in the field of newspaper journalism, where a photograph is often used to highlight or call attention to an article. The failure to include the photographs of any of the young women achieving the honors written about demonstrates an unfortunate insensitivity to giving the young women of this community an equal "pat on the back" for a job well done.

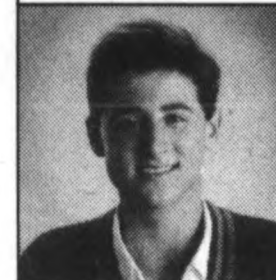

'They foster disrespect for law'

Sheriff supports fuzzbuster ban

Clinton County Sheriff Terry Haneckow last week announced his support of a total ban on radar detection devices, more commonly known as fuzzbusters. He said the failure of the Michigan legislature to make fuzzbusters illegal will continue to impede law enforcement efforts to uphold legal speed limits.

Haneckow said the continued use of fuzzbusters would:

- require more personnel on traffic patrol, diverting crime fighting efforts;
- encourage drivers to ignore laws;
- lead to more severe accidents;
- enable large trucks to travel at a higher rate of speed endangering the lives of the drivers and other motorists;

The sheriff encourages citizens of Clinton County to contact their legislators in Lansing and join with him in support of a ban on fuzzbusters.

Fowler to gain most in school aid if school millage request passes

If all four of the additional mills requested by the Fowler school district on the June 8 ballot are approved by voters the district will collect only about \$8,000 more in local tax dollars. But the district will gain about \$180,000 in additional state aid.

These are the figures supplied by Superintendent Mary Ann Chartrand last week. The sharp reduction in the value of agriculture lands will offset the increased millage for farmers in the school district, she said.

For residential property owners, however, the increase will probably result in a tax bill increase.

The real boon to the school district will come from the state because the state school aid formula increases the amount of aid school districts get

as their millage rates go up. The ballot proposals are as follows:

- Proposition I requests passage of 28.5 mills for one year to be used for school operations. This proposal includes the renewal of the 25.5 mill levy that expired with the 1986 tax year plus a three-mill increase.
- Information supplied by the Fowler school district says the Board of Education is requesting the increase to help offset the projected loss of 13 students and the rising costs for supplies, materials and salaries. Even with the increase, a slight reduction in staff size will be needed, the information says.
- The school district's fund balance will not increase if the millage is

passed. In fact, it will probably decrease to \$65,000, about three percent of the total budget, the school district says.

- Proposition II requests one mill to generate \$43,000 to be used exclusively for the repair and maintenance of school buildings and grounds. A five-year plan shows that nearly \$500,000 in maintenance work will be needed. The one-mill proposed this year will be used for roofing over the kitchen and original shop area of the high school, removing an underground oil tank, replacing a portion of the asphalt, installing extra double doors for energy conservation, carpeting the school library, and replacing high school lockers.

Nothing dampens '87 Mint Festival

"I think the mint crop will come," Joann Martis was saying. "It may not be a bumper crop. But there will be a crop of some sort."

The question had come up during a discussion of the 1987 St. Johns Mint Festival, which this year takes place August 8-9. Mrs. Martis, director of the St. Johns Area Chamber of Commerce, promises that even if the county mint crop — battered by flooding last fall — is weak this year, the mint festival will be stronger than ever.

Riders will be offered a bird's eye view of the festival while contributing to the award-winning nursing home.

- Tours of the John Hicks Mansion. The mansion, built in 1873, has been partially restored to its original condition by the current owners, the Giesecke family. The mansion has mahogany woodwork, marble fireplaces

Family focus

Microwave cooking

As the days get warmer many families look for creative ways to prepare a meal without heating up the kitchen with a hot oven. One excellent way is to use our microwave oven. With a little experimentation you will find that whole meals can be prepared in your microwave.

Probably meats and main dishes will be the biggest challenge for you if you are not used to cooking in your microwave. Meat cookery calls for the most "new thinking" in terms of preparation and handling as compared to other food products.

Listed below are a few pointers that I always present in microwave classes. By keeping these tips in mind you should be able to turn out a tender, attractive main dish every time!

1. Cooking time will depend on the starting temperature of the food. All meats should be completely defrosted for best results.

2. Do not salt meats until after cooking.

3. Small, tender cuts of meat may not have a chance to brown in the microwave. In that case you may try an attractive coating. Such coatings as cheese sauce, french-fried onion rings or cream of vegetable soup work well!

4. Large, less tender cuts of meat will require less powerful cooking temperatures for longer periods of time, then tender cuts. It helps to put these cuts in a cooking bag or cover tightly with some liquid in the bottom of the pan. It may also improve the taste/appearance of the product if you brush the meat lightly with melted butter or a browning sauce.

5. Learn to recognize meat when it's almost done. Remember, microwave-cooked products continue to cook after coming out of the oven. Meat allowed to cook too long will turn tough and dried out upon standing.

The internal temperature of chicken should be 170-175 degrees when done. Standing time will increase the time to 180-185 degrees. A rump roast should be 160-165 degrees for a well-done roast. Pork roasts should be 170-175 and pre-cooked ham should be 120-125 degrees. After standing time, all of these products will be well-done.

In this column I have included a "favorite" recipe from a recent meats class I held in the DeWitt area. This recipe is quick and delicious!

Saucy Cube Steaks

- 4 beef cubed steaks, 5 oz. each
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced onion
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 2 cups sliced fresh mushrooms
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 1 cup milk

Arrange cube steaks in 12x7 dish. Cover with wax paper. Microwave at high four minutes. Turn steaks over. Cover; rotate dish 1/2 turn. Microwave two to three minutes. Meat will still have a slightly pink interior. Remove meat from dish and set aside, covered loosely with foil.

Drain all but two to three tablespoons drippings from dish. Add mushrooms and onion. Cover with wax paper; microwave 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 minutes or until tender. Blend in flour and seasonings. Slowly stir in milk. Microwave four to six minutes or until thickened. Add cheese. Return steaks to dish; spoon sauce over them. Microwave one minute.

Golden Stuffed Onion

- 4 jumbo yellow onions
- 1 cup fresh mushrooms
- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
- 1-1/2 cups white sauce (recipe follows)
- Shredded Cheddar cheese

Peel onions. Cut thin slice off root ends. Slice 1/3 off onion tops (reserve for another use). Hollow onions with spoon or melon baller, leaving shells 3/8-inch thick with bottoms intact. Chop the onion parings and the mushrooms; saute in butter over medium heat 5 minutes. Prepare white sauce; add to onion mushroom mixture. Firmly pack mixture into onion shells. Sprinkle generously with cheese. Place in baking dish, cover and bake in 350°F. oven 30 minutes. Remove cover for last 10 minutes to brown cheese and onions. Makes 4 servings.

White Sauce: In small saucepan, melt 1 tablespoon butter or margarine. Stir in 1 tablespoon flour. Gradually add 1 cup milk, stirring constantly. Add 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1/8 teaspoon pepper. Cook and stir over medium heat until thickened.

Warm Potatoes Lyonnaise

- 4 medium potatoes (about 1-1/3 pounds), sliced 1/4 inch thick
- 1 can (10-3/4 ounces) chicken broth
- 1/3 cup vegetable oil
- 2 tablespoons white wine vinegar
- 2 teaspoons grainy mustard
- Salt and pepper, to taste
- Chopped parsley

In saucepan combine potatoes and broth. Bring to boil; reduce heat and simmer covered, until just tender, about 10 minutes. Remove from heat; drain and reserve broth from potatoes. Combine 1/4 cup of the broth (reserve remaining broth for another use), the oil, vinegar, mustard, salt and pepper. Whisk to blend. Pour over potatoes, tossing gently to coat. Let stand 10 minutes to serve warm, or serve at room temperature. Garnish with parsley. Makes 4 servings.

Balsamic Tomatoes Almandine

- 1/3 cup sliced almonds
- 1/4 cup Balsamic vinegar
- 1/4 cup plus 1-1/2 teaspoons almond oil
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt
- 3 tomatoes, thinly sliced
- 1/2 head butter lettuce, washed and crisped
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1/8 cup chopped green pepper
- 1-1/2 teaspoons capers, optional

Spread almonds in a single layer on cookie sheet. Toast in 300°F. oven, 5 to 8 minutes, until golden brown; cool. Combine vinegar, 1/4 cup oil and garlic salt; pour over tomatoes. Marinate 15 to 20 minutes. Line serving dish with lettuce leaves. Arrange tomato slices over top, reserving marinade. Saute onion and green pepper in remaining 1-1/2 teaspoons almond oil. Nest eggs

Many people believe IRAs lost much of their appeal when the current tax laws went into effect. This is not true. Although IRA contributions did lose their deductibility in some cases, the bottom line is IRAs still do what they originally were intended to do — they help investors establish a "nest egg" for retirement. Best of all, the earnings and interest from these "nest eggs" are still allowed to accumulate and compound tax-free until withdrawal. Once you've decided to open an IRA, determining where to establish this fund is just as crucial.

Most people establish their IRAs with banking institutions or insurance companies. In fact, banks and savings and loans hold half of all IRA money invested today. In the case of banks, these funds are usually invested in CDs. With insurance companies, the funds most often are invested in annuities.

Others prefer to self-direct their IRA investment through brokerage firms. The institution you choose should depend upon your retirement goals; how much risk, if any, you're willing to take with your money; and what kind of results you expect your investment to produce.

One of the primary advantages of investing IRA funds with banks and insurance companies is that you're guaranteed a specific return on your investment. For some people, that's a critical consideration. However, this guaranteed rate of return can work against you because as inflation rises, money loses its buying power. For example, suppose the current inflation rate is six percent. This means prices will double in 12 years. If your money is not earning an interest rate comparable to that six percent rate of inflation, your money is actually losing its buying power.

To avoid this, many people choose to purchase self-

directed IRAs from brokerage firms. This means, with the help of a professional, they distribute their annual \$2,000 contribution among any of the investments the firm offers. The advantage of self-directing your IRA is you participate in the economy and, hopefully, earn a return that outpaces inflation. The disadvantage is that some of these products do not guarantee a specific return, and thus you take the chance that the return on your investment will not equal what you hoped. You could, however, purchase fixed-income investments such as corporate bonds or growth-oriented investments to get the best of both worlds.

Determining where to establish your IRA is as important as making the decision to open an IRA so make sure you do so carefully. The choice you make will have a large impact on where and how you spend your retirement years.

Agricultural news Ventilation

We hear a lot about building ventilation and air quality. We know that in order to get optimum performance out of the livestock housed in these structures we have to provide them with good, fresh air.

My question is, are air quality and ventilation concerns a new problem to the livestock industry? The answer is, no!

The following paragraph is quoted from an article entitled "Why Ventilate Farm Barns and How," by F.E. Fogle. The article appeared in Michigan Quarterly Bulletin, August, 1925:

"Ventilation may be defined as the changing of the air in any room or space. It is a means of supplying fresh air, controlling temperature, controlling humidity, or moisture, and removing foul air and objectionable products which cause odors. Ventilation is necessary for the health and comfort of animals. It will preserve the building and contents from mold and rot, due to excessive moisture, and will aid in the

prevention and control of disease."

In 1987, the concerns are still the same. In the dairy industry, naturally ventilated structures are widely used. To assure maximum performance from these barns the principles of ventilation must be understood.

Wind pressure and the difference between inside and outside temperature moves air through the building. Natural ventilation of gable buildings works best with a continuous ridge opening, large sidewall openings, no ceiling, and small continuous eave openings.

For summer ventilation, large openings (typically 1/2 or more of the sidewalls) are important to good summer ventilation. Sidewall openings and end doors allow a cross flow of air. Locate openings to ensure good airflow through the animal zone (about four inches above floor level).

Ridge openings are also a critical part in the ventilation process. Provide a ridge opening of two inches (measured horizontally) for each 10 feet of building width, e.g. a 14 inch wide opening for a 70 foot wide building. To protect building framing, cover each rafter or truss with a strip of flashing material. Extend the flashing 1/2 inch to one inch on each side of the truss member of rafter.

With a properly sized ridge opening, precipitation entering the building is not a serious problem. Air exiting through the ridge prevents most rain and snow from entering. Raised ridge caps are not recommended because they disturb airflow, can trap snow, are expensive and require maintenance. An upstand can be added to help keep out snow and rain.

Construct continuous eave openings along both sides of the building. Size each opening to have at least 1/2 as much open area as the ridge opening. Eave openings can be provided at the open spaces between trusses or on the underside of the roof overhang. Provide eave baffles so airflow can be reduced, but never completely close them. To reduce drafts, protect eave openings from direct wind gusts with fascia boards and vent doors. Use vent doors only during periods of severe winter weather. If vent doors are used, continual adjustment is needed requiring more labor.

Once the side walls, edge and eave openings have been checked in the facility the next thing to look at is the site selection. Trees, tower silos, grain bins and other structures disturb airflow around adjacent buildings. Locate naturally ventilated buildings on high ground for better wind exposure and at least 50 feet in any direction from other structures and trees. Trees or structures affect both summer and winter ventilation for five to ten times their height downwind. If naturally ventilated buildings are in a building complex, place them on the west or south side of mechanically ventilated buildings and perpendicular to prevailing summer winds.

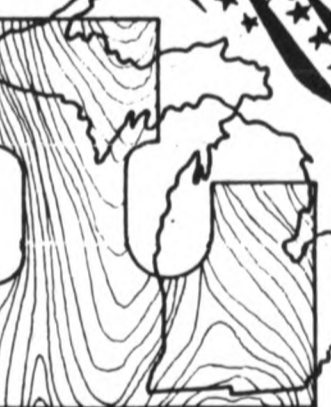

Discussion and Community Dialogue: The Board discussed the need to purchase additional hard disk storage for the computer. A decision will be made at the next regular meeting.

Hosted by Ovid-Elsie High School, the county meet was sponsored by the Clinton County News, Ovid Lions Club and Elsie Lions Club. Teams from St. Johns, Fowler, Fulton, Ovid-Elsie, Bath, DeWitt, and Laingsburg took part in the meet under near-perfect weather conditions.

Following St. Johns' boys 158 points were: Fowler, 111; Ovid-Elsie, 69; Bath, 66; Fulton, 46; DeWitt, 42; and Laingsburg, 34. St. Johns' girls totaled 126 points, followed by: Ovid-Elsie, 105; Bath, 104; Fowler, 78; DeWitt, 66; Fulton, 11; and Laingsburg, 6.

The St. Johns girls' team scored points and placed in 15 of the 16 events, earning first, third and fourth place finishes in the long jump. A high point in the meet for the Redwings was Sandra Terrell's first place finishes in the mile and 2-mile run. The senior set a new meet record in the 2-mile with a time of 11:53.2.

Redwing boys placed in 15 of their 17 events, with first and second place finishes by Zane Ballard and Dale Feldpausch in both the 100 and 220 dashes bringing St. Johns fans to their feet.

Other county teams added some sparkling moments of their own, including:

- The boys mile relay — Matt Hufnagel, running the final leg for Fowler's team, almost brought the Eagle team to a come-from-behind win, but was edged out by Bath.

- Dave Holley and Chad Bush, both from Ovid-Elsie, who swept first and second places in the shot put and discus events.
- Steve Bierstetel, who ran away from the pack in first place finishes in the mile and 2-mile events.
- Fulton's Dee Gardner, earning a first-place finish in the girls' high jump.
- A new meet record in the girls' shot put, 40'1 1/2" set by Sarah Neeley from Bath. She broke her own record of 38'8", set in 1986.
- Ovid-Elsie's second, third, and fourth place sweep of the girls' 110 hurdles.

Redwing softball team upset at Diamond Classic

"It was not a good week for Redwing softball."

So said St. Johns Coach Paul Sternburgh whose girls softball team came just short in their attempt to earn an opening game win at the Lansing Diamond Classic on Saturday, and dropped a league doubleheader to Chesaning earlier last week. They were defeated by Webberville 3-2 in Classic action, and lost to Chesaning by scores of 6-3 and 4-0.

A freak accident caused Coach Sternburgh to miss out on all the action at the Diamond Classic. He was hit by a ball before the game began, breaking his glasses and opening a gash above his eye. He spent game-time at emergency having five stitches sewn in.

"They tell me I missed the best game we had played all year," Sternburgh said. "The team had three double-plays and played excellent defense."

The game was scoreless until the fifth inning when Tonya LaBar singled and stole second, followed by a double off the bat of Gina Schneider. Both runners scored when Angie Pung stroked a double.

The only other runs of the contest came in the bottom of the sixth. Webberville placed runners at second and third with one out; a single scored one run and a follow-up double crossed two runs. St. Johns had the tying run in position in their final at-bat, but could not score.

LaBar pitched the entire seven innings and took the loss, giving up 3 runs on 5 hits, striking out 2 batters and walking none. The Redwings collected a total of 6 hits with Pung going 3-4 with 2 RBIs, and Schneider also netting a double.

"We were disappointed," Sternburgh said, "but the girls really played well and you have to learn to take the losses as well as the wins."

The MMB losses to Chesaning virtually kills any chance for St. Johns to win the league title. They have a record of 4-2 in the conference while Chesaning is undefeated.

"Chesaning played well and we just could not hit the ball when we needed to," Sternburgh said. "We had runners in scoring position, especially in the second game, but couldn't get them home."

Melanie DeWitt went the distance for St. Johns in the first game, giving up 6 runs on 9 hits with 2 strike-outs

and 6 walks. The Redwings scored one run each in the first, second, and seventh innings. Chesaning was ahead 3-2 after four innings and put the game away with 3 runs in the sixth.

The nightcap followed much the same pattern with the Redwings stranding runners on base, including lead-off triples by Karen Simon in the second inning and Schneider in the third. Both players were 2-3 at the plate. LaBar took the loss.

St. Johns did earn a split in a non-league doubleheader with DeWitt during their busy week, dropping the first game 9-6 and winning the nightcap 3-2.

"We literally gave the first game to them in the first inning," Sternburgh said. "We played horrendously in that inning — after that we settled down."

The Redwings committed six errors in the game, with the first five Panther runners scoring.

In the second game, DeWitt picked up the first two runs of the game in the fifth inning. St. Johns answered by crossing 3 runners in the sixth to take the win. Schneider singled, stole second, went to third on a wild pitch, and came home off a sacrifice fly by Jennifer Rositas for one Redwing run. A home run by Missy Vitek gave St. Johns their remaining runs, plating Becky Thelen who had singled.

Besides an MMB game with Corunna tonight (May 12), the Redwings have an important pre-district qualifying game with Okemos tomorrow. They must win in order to advance to a pre-district game with Grand Ledge on May 22.

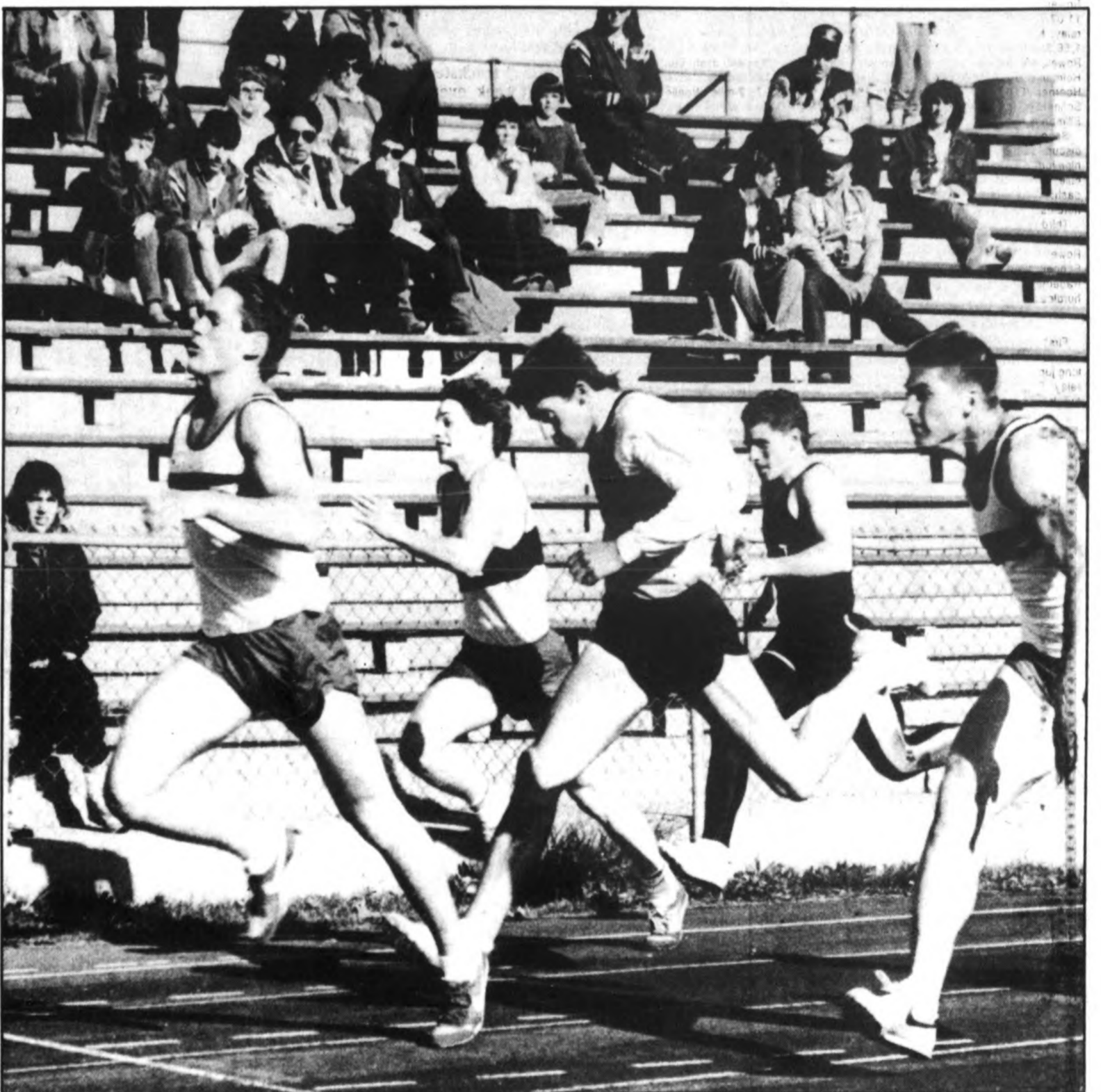

St. Johns baseball team has flawless week

Gusty wind and powerful Redwing bats combined to earn two football-score wins, 14-10 and 17-7, for the St. Johns varsity baseball team in a doubleheader sweep of East Lansing last Saturday.

"The wind was blowing out — and we were really hitting the ball hard," Coach Doug Parker said of his teams' large scores. "There were a lot of runs, a lot of hitting, and a lot of people contributing. We have been hitting the ball very, very well all week."

Saturday's games put a successful cap on a week's worth of games for the Redwing team. They increased their overall record to 18-2 with doubleheader wins over Chesaning, 10-9 and 12-2, and DeWitt, 5-3 and 15-4 in a pair of contests played on St. Johns' home field.

Tim Cleaver carried a lot of clout for the Redwings during their six games, batting a hefty .722 during the time span. He went 13-18 at the plate with 5 doubles, 2 home runs, and 15 RBIs, and increased his overall batting average to .439.

Three pitchers saw duty in each game of the doubleheader with East Lansing. Mark Henning earned the win in the first game, coming in relief of Matt Wilcox who pitched the opening 1 2/3 innings. Henning allowed 3 hits and 2 runs in his 2 1/2 innings of work, while Tom Bates picked up a save finishing the final 3 innings of the game.

Trailing 8-1 going into the bottom of the second inning, the Redwings mounted a rally spread over four innings to take the lead and earn the win. A two-run single by Jerry Duwell in the second inning got the St. Johns drive underway and they picked up one more run in the third inning off a solo home run blast by Tim Cleaver.

The fourth inning proved to be the big one for St. Johns; they plated six runs in the inning. A double by Cleaver scored 3 runs and a single by Barry Kiel sent the tying and go-ahead runs in, giving St. Johns an 11-10 lead.

Andy Ball's RBI single in the sixth inning was icing on the cake.

Cleaver was 2-3 with a double, home run, and 4 RBIs; Kiel had 2 hits with 2 RBIs; and Duwell picked up 3 RBIs on his 2-run single and an infield groundout.

COACH PARKER elected to use three Redwing pitchers in the second game also, with Dwight Pierson, Ball and Wilcox all seeing action. Pierson pitched the

first three innings and picked up the win. Ball pitched 2/3 of an inning, and Wilcox finished the contest and earned a save.

The Redwings opened up a big 14-0 lead, scoring 2 runs in the first inning, and plating 12 runs in the third inning.

"It (the third inning) was a combination of a lot of big hits and walks," Coach Parker said.

Driving in runs in the inning were Cleaver, who hit his second home run of the day to score 2 runs, a 2-run double by Pierson, 2-run single off the bat of Randy Ammons, and RBIs scored by Steve Dunkel. 10 Redwings batters were walked in the inning.

East Lansing tightened things up somewhat in the fourth inning when they scored 7 runs, but St. Johns completed scoring by crossing runners in their half of the fourth and fifth innings.

In St. Johns' other outings last week, Wilcox earned the win in the first game of the Redwings' doubleheader with Chesaning. He came on in relief of Tom Bates who pitched the first 4 1/2 innings.

Getting multiple hits in the contest were Cleaver who went 3-4 with 2 RBIs, and two hits apiece tallied by Bates, Scott Heibeck, Duwell, Ball, Kiel, and Dunkel. St. Johns totaled 16 hits in the game.

Down by one run, 5-4, St. Johns scored five runs in their half of the fifth inning to take a 9-5 lead. An RBI double by Cleaver tied the game, while Ball's RBI single plated the go-ahead runs.

Chesaning tied the game at 9-9 in the sixth inning, but Duwell put the game into the Redwing win column when he doubled in the seventh inning, advanced to third on an error, and crossed home plate on a pass ball.

The nightcap went just 5 innings with Ball throwing all five innings and earning the win. He gave up 5 hits, struck out 5 batters, and walked 3. Once again, Cleaver was the big hitter for the Redwings, going 3-3 with 4 RBIs.

Chesaning took an early 2-0 lead in the top of the first — the only runs they would score in the game. St. Johns answered with 6 runs in their half of the first, 4 runs in the second, and 1 run each in the third and fifth innings.

THE SWEEP keeps St. Johns in a tie for first place in the MMB with Alma and Ovid-Elsie — all at 5-1 in the league.

"We were very happy with the wins," Parker said. "Chesaning is the defending league champion and is ranked in Class B in the state, so it was especially pleas-

ing to win two games from them."

In the non-league doubleheader with DeWitt on Thursday, Duwell pitched all seven innings of the first game and earned the win for St. Johns. The Redwings totaled 12 hits in the game. Cleaver and Bates both going 3-4 and Wilcox netting two singles.

RBI singles by Scott Aylsworth, Henning, and Ball plated St. Johns opening runs in the second inning to give them a 3-0 lead. DeWitt crossed 2 runners in the second inning, and St. Johns plated 2 runs in the third on RBI singles by Wilcox and Cleaver.

The Panthers made things exciting in their last at-bat when they scored 1 run, then loaded the bases with just one out before a Redwing double-play ended the threat.

Doug Heyer was the winning pitcher in the nightcap, going the first four innings, and Henning picked up a save when he finished the contest.

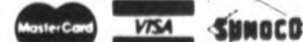

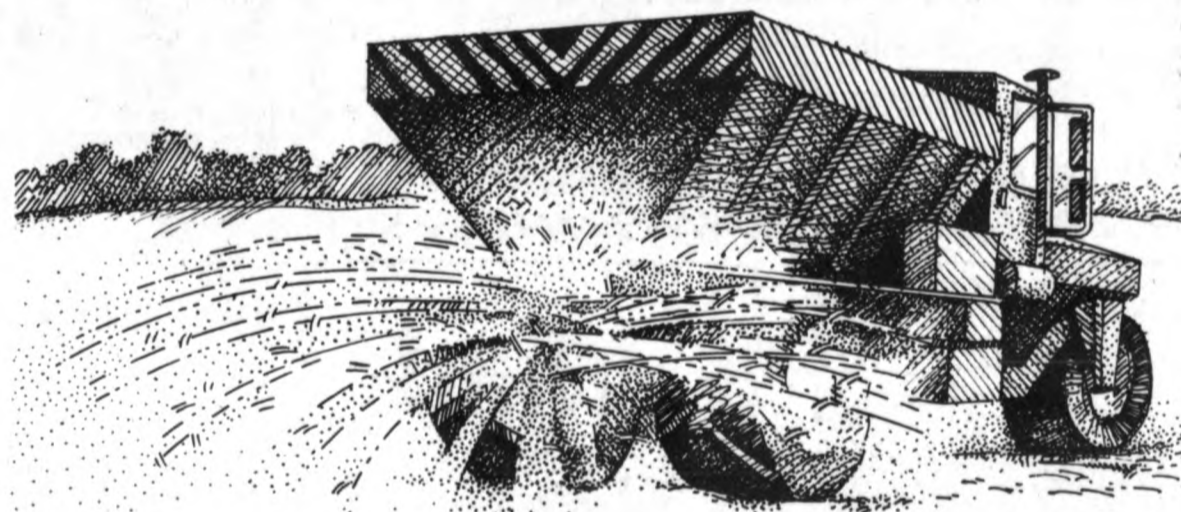

First career portfolio distributed

Employability Development Plans, used by Ovid-Elsie and St. Johns High Schools, allow business and education to work together to increase employability skills for high school students. For the first time this year, seniors were presented with a career portfolio.

The portfolio provides young people with a neat, organized folder to carry their resume, written references, a sample job application, proof of graduation and other information critical to securing a job. The portfolios were provided by Clinton Bank and Trust, Sealed Power Corporation and Federal Mogul Corporation.

"Job applicants would

score 110 percent with me if they applied for a job with the proper information organized in a portfolio such as these are," said Tom Rapson, personnel manager at Clinton Bank. "It should give applicants an edge on securing jobs."

Ovid-Elsie and St. Johns schools started the training process beginning with students at the ninth grade and working with them each year until graduation. Volunteers from the workforce and retired persons who worked with students in the schools through the coordination of the Clinton Work-Education Council were keys to the success of the overall program.

Proposal: Turn gravel pits into large lake

The water in the area is extremely blue and clean.

"That water is something you'd see in Canada," says Wartsler.

He says the water could be kept clean by building sewage lagoons instead of private septic tanks.

The county could use proceeds from the sale of materials mined from county-owned roadways to offset the cost of building new roads. Wartsler estimates the value of the

material at about \$250,000.

NOT EVERYONE is enthusiastic. Last month, when Wartsler met with residents of the area to explain the plan, he met with significant resistance.

"The vast majority of the people who spoke were opposed to it," he says.

Seven homes would have to be moved out of the area in order for the lake to be built. Wartsler envisions moving the homes to the edge of the new lake. But several residents said at

the meeting they do not want to relocate.

Other area residents opposed the plan because they believe the lake would draw recreational vehicles and other traffic to an area they moved into for peace and quiet; because they fear their property taxes would go up as land values in the area of the lake increased; and because they fear the lake would cause transportation problems.

In one instance cited, a farmer would have to go all the way around the lake to

get to a field that is currently only a short distance away.

The lake did have some supporters at the meeting, says Wartsler. He adds he received a number of telephone calls after the meeting from people who said they support the idea of building the lake.

WARTSLER AND Dutton estimate the cost of transforming the area into a lake at \$2.5 million. That would include \$775,000 in roads as well as the cost of relocating homeowners on-

to new sites.

They say the private sector would play a large part in the development of the area.

"Everything but the basic infrastructure would be privately developed," says Dutton.

Wartsler would like to see a task force or committee formed to begin exploring the idea of building the lake. The next step will come in June or July, when the proposal will come before the county planning commission.

BMX racing is back at Jack Pine Lodge

BMX bicycle racing roared back to life last weekend at the Jack Pine Family BMX Racetrack, thanks to a new non-profit organization composed mostly of parents, and a multitude of generous local businesses.

At last weekend's season opening 200 cyclists participated, up significantly from last year's count of 72, according to Jack Pine Family BMX President James Bliss.

"Last summer a number of parents were sitting around the campfire," he says, "and we decided to see if we could get a good program going here again."

Bliss explains that Jack Pine had been a popular motorcycle racecourse as far back as the 1920's, but that the motorcycles had vanished with the increase in residential development in the area.

"Back in 1980," he says, "this was one of the largest BMX courses in the country. It had a national reputation."

For some reason, he says, the course had fallen into a state of decline in the intervening years.

And the Jack Pine Lodge had fared about as well at the bicycle racing.

"When we got here the roof leaked, the bathroom and kitchen was in terrible condition," says Bliss.

"The building was just not operational."

Thanks to the donations of time and materials by RBK Building, Larry Haggard Construction, Kesler Construction, and Ryan Electric, the parents group brought the building back into usable condition, and youth bicycle racing back to Jack Pine.

Bliss says that the track is now as good as any, and getting better, and thanks to Lansing's central location BMX racing will soon be strong in the area.

"The problem with the other operators," says Bliss, "is that they tried to make money at it. You just can't do that. We're totally non-profit."

BMX bicycle racing appeals to all children, from age 4 to age 54. Last weekend one of the competitor's was 45 year old.

Bliss says the track at Jack Pine is safer than street riding, since there won't be any cars to look out for, and the course is monitored by adults at all the corners.

Jack Pine Family BMX is located on US-27, just south of Clark Road in DeWitt. Registration for the races is at 10 a.m. on Sunday. They run three races each day, and sometimes more if necessary. The cost for a day's racing is \$9. There will also be racing on Friday nights, and practices on Wednesday evenings as well.

If additional incentive is needed, other than having a good time, Bliss advises that everyone competing receives a trophy.

"We, as parents, encourage you to try this rewarding family sport," says Bliss.

"It really is fun for the whole family. Good sportsmanship and self-confidence are really just a few of the benefits kids can get out of BMX racing."

Bliss says that people who remember the old Jack Pine Lodge might want to stop by and see what they've done to it. The entire facility has been remodelled, and the new course is, says Bliss, on its way to being one of the best in the world.

"Racers from age 2 to 50 will be out at the track. And for kids under four years, we have Big Wheel racing, too."

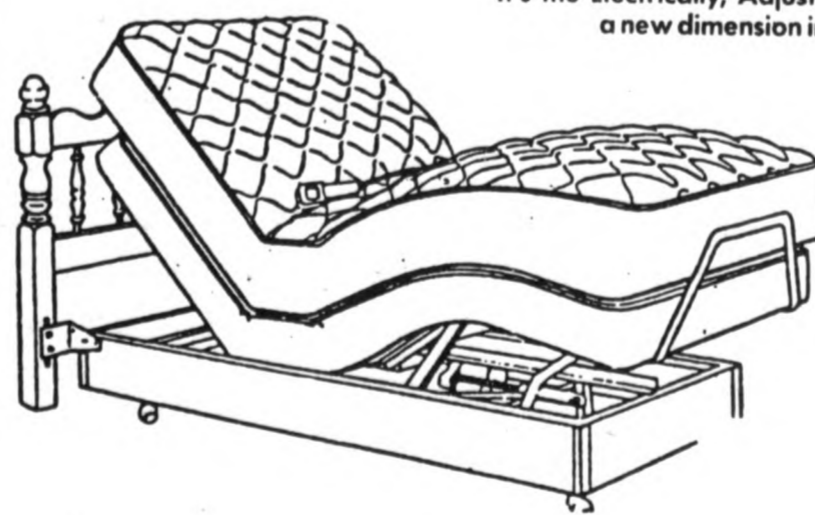

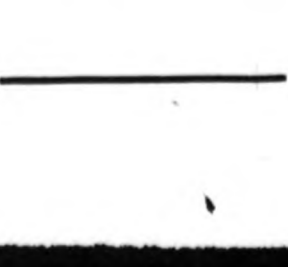
