## She's a queen!

Findlay Country Manor resident Eleanor Hills — who had never before worn a formal gown — was last Saturday crowned queen of the Ms. Capitol Area Nursing Home Pageant in Lansing. "I told you I wouldn't let you girls down," Eleanor told Findlay Manor Activities Director Debbie Whybra.

The pageant was the first of its kind in the state. Sponsored by the Tri-County Association of Activity Directors and hosted by Lansing television personality Howard Lancour, the pageant drew contestants from nursing homes all over Clinton, Eaton and Ingham counties.

Eleanor had earlier in the week been crowned queen of the Findlay Manor Senior Prom. Crowned king was John Barrett.

Findlay Activities Director Whybra reports that John gave Eleanor a congratulatory kiss upon learning she had been crown-

ed queen of the pageant. "Did I dream that king kissed me or did that really happen?" asked Eleanor.

With her crown, Eleanor was presented with a trophy, three dozen roses and a traveling plaque that will be passed on to next year's winner.

Whybra describes Eleanor as an extremely energetic woman who has worked hard all her life and who sometimes worked 21 hour days when involved in chicken farming. She had never before worn a formal gown or make-up, Whyra said.

During the pageant, contestants were asked to name the one person who had most influenced their lives. Eleanor named her daughter, Beverly Hayes.

"I guess it's just a tribute to Eleanor," said Whybra, referring to Eleanor's success at the pageant. "Of course we were tickled."

## Hospital, Findlay meet to talk of compromise

Representatives from Clinton Memorial Hospital and Hazel I. Findlay Country Manor have begun talking together about ways to end the nursing bed deadlock between the two facilities.

Both facilities have asked the state for a limited number of nursing home beds available to Clinton County. The Michigan Department of Public Health decided the beds should go to the nursing home but an appeal by the hospital could delay the installation of the beds by as much as five years.

The next hearing in the appeal process is currently scheduled for 1989.

Charles Coletta, chairman of the hospital's board of trustees, said at the trustees' annual meeting May 14 that a meeting was to be held Monday morning between the two facilities. Besides Coletta, the meeting was to include hospital chief Paul McNamara, Findlay Manor Administrator Mark Stapelman and Harold Benson, chairman of the nursing home's board of directors.

Coletta said later he expected the meeting to be the first step of a process of working toward an agreement.

"It'll take a few meetings to break ground, I'm sure," he said. "As far as I'm concerned we'll keep meeting until we work something out."

Coletta first mentioned the

meeting May 19 while addressing the hospital trustees at the annual meeting of the Health Corporation of Clinton, the parent corporation of the hospital. Moments before, Trustee Marilyn Irrer had made a motion that a committee of trustees join with nursing home board members to work toward a solution to the nursing bed deadlock and other problems. The motion was defeated by a vote of 18 to 15.

Coletta had spoken strongly in opposition to the motion, saying it would be divisive.

"If we start breaking up into committees all we'll have is nitpicking," he said. "I don't want any part of it."

**IN A RELATED** development, hospital financial advisor Steven Sipkovsky said the hospital would save \$75,000 to \$100,000 in indirect costs by installing 24 nursing home beds in what is currently an empty wing of the hospital.

Hospital President McNamara said in March that he had asked the hospital's financial advisors to try to quantify factors he said would improve the hospital's financial picture if the nursing beds are installed but which are not included in the financial profit and loss projections for the nursing beds.

Hospital officials anticipate a \$13,000 profit from the nursing home beds.

## Hospital will be on 'solid ground' by 1988

Clinton Memorial Hospital can expect a positive cash flow by June and will be on solid financial ground by the end of the year, said Steven Sipkovsky, the hospital's financial advisor, at the annual meeting of the hospital corporation on May 14.

However, he said, the hospital lost \$104,000 in the first quarter of the 1987 fiscal year. Hospital President Paul McNamara said the deficit could mean a net loss for the year even if the last three quarters of the year are profitable.

Sipkovsky, a St. Johns accountant, said cost-cutting and revenue-enhancing measures taken by the hospital corporation since January will have a positive "bottom line effect" of \$760,000. The corporation lost \$829,678 in 1986.

Cost-cutting and revenue-increasing measures have included:

• The equivalent of at least 27 full-

time employees have been laid off and vacated positions have been left unfilled

• Effective May 11 all non-union employees took a five percent cut in pay. A proposal for a similar reduction was made to union employees recently.

• Contracts have been made to provide pharmacy contracts to facilities such as the Ovid Convalescent Manor.

Hospital officials say additional savings will be realized by the closing of the DeWitt and Bath Medical centers and a pharmacy in Lansing.

"I think we can conclude the hospital and the total corporation will be back on solid ground by the end of the year," said Sipkovsky.

Hospital officials have said key elements in keeping the hospital financially stable is the recruitment of doctors to join the medical staff.

## Group's survey says many desire change

Over half the respondents to a survey conducted a citizen group want a change in the administration at Clinton Memorial Hospital, according to a written summary of the survey.

Hospital Trustee Barry Dean, at the annual meeting of the Health Corporation of Clinton on May 14, presented the results of a survey conducted by Residents for Clinton Memorial Hospital in which 59 percent of 77 respondents said they want a "change of administration" at the hospital.

The citizen group was formed after Ken Kralik, manager of the St. Johns branch of the Capitol Federal Savings Bank, appealed for community support of the hospital.

Kralik, a volunteer fireman, was injured in the fire that destroyed the Clinton Home Center last winter and was hospitalized at Clinton Memorial for several days.

The group placed a survey in the St. Johns Reminder to research the degree of support for the hospital and "to give us an indication of what the community would feel as adequate changes within the hospital if they didn't presently support our hospital," said a written summary of the survey results.

The summary reported 33.8 percent of 77 respondents said they are not willing to financially support the hospital until a new administrator is hired. Asked what changes are desirable at the hospital, 59 percent of the 77 respondents said they wanted a change of administration.

Trustee Virginia Zeeb said 77 responses was a very small sample

considering the survey was printed in a publication with a circulation of 14,000.

Later in the meeting, Dean, the trustee who reported the survey results, nominated Citizens for Clinton Memorial Hospital spokesman Kralik for hospital trustee. Kralik was subsequently elected.

Asked if the survey his group conducted would influence him as a hospital trustee, Kralik said, "This nomination from the floor was not what I expected...As a trustee I will look into some of these things."

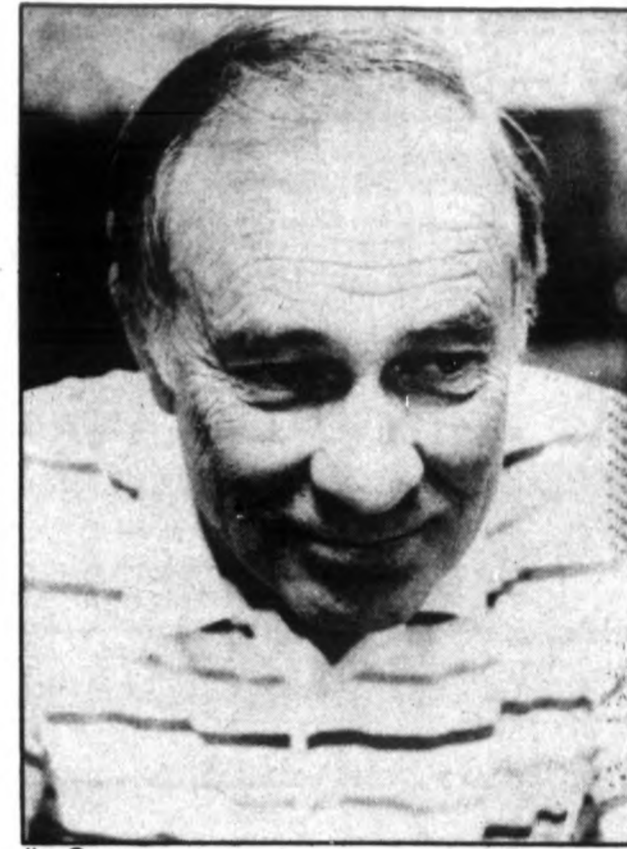

Wanted: Senior Citizens interested in joining with other senior citizens for the purpose of enriching their lives. This can be done through taking advantage of leadership opportunities, social interaction, nutritional luncheons, and educational and recreational programs.

The Clinton County Senior Citizen Drop-in Center offers programs related to the needs of the senior population. In addition to the above, we offer graduate courses in Bingo, cribbage, euchre and pinochle. We also offer movies and sing-alongs with our own famous senior band, which does such a marvelous job. Also, we offer a good number of senior trips, during the course of the year, to various points of interest.

I would like to take this opportunity to emphasize that *this is not a welfare operation*. All of our members contribute by volunteering their time and expertise to the benefits of the center and the community.

The center, located at 315 N. Clinton Ave., St. Johns, is open Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. On Mondays, from 11 a.m. until whenever we're done, we have a luncheon open to the general public at extremely reasonable prices.

ONCE EACH month, on a Friday, we have a steak supper with all the trimmings for just \$3.00 per person.

Those two activities are the main sources of revenue for the Drop-In Center.

We also serve hot, nutritional meals three days each week — Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday — at 12:30 p.m. The donation for each meal is only \$1.25 for senior citizens age 60 and older.

On Thursday we have a pot luck lunch that is very well attended. New friends can be made here in an informal setting.

Every other Wednesday we have a euchre party at 7:30 p.m.

The second Wednesday of each month, we have a nurse at the center from 9:30-11:30 a.m. taking blood

pressure readings for those who wish to avail themselves of this service. There is no charge but a free will donation may be made.

Our governing board is made up of 50 percent seniors and 50 percent business people. We are fortunate to have very capable people from the business sector representing that group. We also are proud of the time and excellent efforts of the seniors who represent us on the board.

Won't you please come and join us? You can make lasting friendships and join in the fun and the fellowship at the center.

Those interested can apply at our beautiful Drop-In Center, which, by the way, we own.

## In the house of representatives Drunk drivers

Legislation designed to help Michigan courts report drunk driving and other traffic offenses to the Michigan Department of State has been introduced in the state house.

The bill, (HB 4547) would bring about the improvements recommended in a report issued by the state task force on reporting traffic-related offenses.

Those changes include:

- Requiring court officials to certify in writing twice each year that they have reported all required convictions for the prior six months;
- Requiring county prosecutors to be responsible for identifying felony traffic cases that are to be reported to the Department of State;
- Amending state law to indicate what cases must be reported to the Department of State.

Last April, a house concurrent resolution was passed requiring the Auditor General to investigate state driving records to determine whether courts were consistently reporting convictions for drunk driving offenses. The auditor general's review found that 88 percent of felony convictions involving a motor vehicle were not reported to the Secretary of State, even though such reporting is required. The 27-member task force was appointed in January following the auditor general's report.

The legislation is designed to better define the responsibility of trial courts and other agencies in reporting offenses. Our ultimate goal is to keep dangerous drivers off the road.

## Anti-abortion bill introduced in Congress

To the Editor:

It has come to my attention that President Reagan has introduced pro-life legislation into Congress through Congressman Henry Hyde. It is disturbing that we find out information on such a historic piece of legislation almost by accident. This is the first time for a president to introduce such pro-life legislation, yet the news media is silent on even presenting the facts. The following is an outline of the provisions of House Bill HR1729 as stated by Carl Anderson, special assistant to the president on the Focus on the Family radio program on May 13:

• Provision 1 is a congressional finding section which states clearly that: 1. abortion takes the life of an unborn child; 2. that the child before birth really is a human being; and 3. that the Supreme Court's decision in Roe vs. Wade was wrong.

• Provision 2 makes the Hyde Amendment restriction on abortion funding (which states you cannot fund abortion unless the life of the mother is in danger), would take this restriction, make it permanent and ap-

ply it across-the-board in government.

• Provision 3 says a private organization is not eligible for Title 10 (Federal Family Planning) monies if that organization provides abortions or refers for abortions, unless the mother's life is in danger.

This last section would cause groups like Planned Parenthood to choose to either quit their abortion advocacy practices or face being ineligible for our tax dollars through Title 10 grants.

This legislation is currently sitting in a house subcommittee. If you support this important pro-life bill, you need to write your congressman and senators. If you do not know who your legislators are, you can check with your local librarian. It's important for each of us to let those who represent us know whether or not we want millions of our tax dollars to keep going to groups who destroy thousands of unborn children every year through abortion.

## Gravel mine approved by planning commission

The Clinton County Planning Commission last Thursday voted 5-3 to recommend approval of a gravel mining operation in Greenbush Township. A group of area residents oppose the operation.

The Clinton County Board of Commissioners will take up the issue at its May 26 meeting. Several meetings have already been held on the is-

suance of a special use permit for the Searles Construction Company that would allow the ravel mining.

About 25 residents of the area appeared at the planning commission meeting to oppose the permit. The group opposes issuance of the permit because of what they say would be a variety of health and safety hazards associated with the operation, in-

cluding dust and noise pollution.

Voting in favor of recommending approval of the permit were Chairman Ernie Sakrasta, Harold Rappuhn, Blaine Lenta, Max Loudbeck and Walt Nobis.

Voting no were Almond Cressman, Dan Garlock and John C. Rademacher.

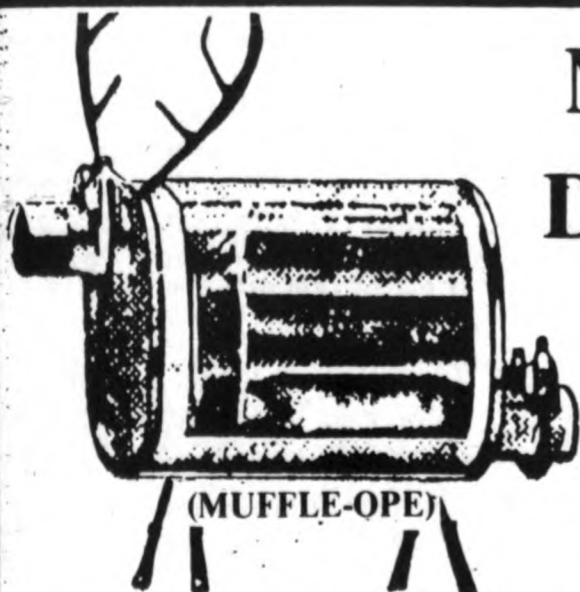

## Family focus

### Pasta dishes

By Dawn Harris



In my column last week I included several tips for successful meat cookery in a microwave oven. This week I would like to feature pasta dishes. A quick casserole, served with a lettuce salad, makes a nice light menu for spring.

Cereals, such as oatmeal, cream of wheat or cornmeal are perfect for microwave ovens because they cook in a shorter time period and require only one utensil, that is easily cleaned after use. Rice and noodles require a little different technique. There is only a little difference in cooking time for preparing rice or noodles in the microwave and on the range top. The difference is that many times you can combine all the ingredients of a rice or noodle casserole into a single dish that is used for cooking and serving.

Listed below are a few tips that I have found helpful in preparing casseroles for the microwave.

1. Allow for a large enough container to prevent boilovers. Usually a 4-quart casserole dish is required.
2. Noodles and rice require rehydration. Always cover the dish tightly with a plastic wrap, leaving a hole for steam to escape.
3. Casseroles with a tomato, broth or soup base are sturdy. You can microwave at full power, stirring occasionally.
4. Casseroles with a cream, sour cream, or cheese base are delicate. Microwave at 50 percent to prevent

curdling.  
5. If hamburger is used, combine with a sturdy sauce to prevent overcooking of meat.

Included below is a delicious casserole that will let you practice all of the steps I mentioned above. I think you will enjoy how simple making a casserole in the microwave can be.

#### Beef Goulash

- 1 lb. lean ground beef
- 1 can (15 oz.) tomato sauce
- 1 cup water
- 3 cups narrow egg noodles, uncooked
- 1 envelope dry onion soup mix

Microwave ground beef in a 2½ quart glass casserole, covered for about five minutes or until cooked. Stir twice to break up the meat. Drain off excess fat. Sprinkle uncooked noodles over meat. Combine water, tomato sauce and soup mix. Pour over noodles. Do not stir. Cover and microwave for 10 minutes. Stir. Microwave five minutes more or until noodles are tender. Optional: Add one small can mushrooms after the initial 10 minutes of cooking. Serves four to six.

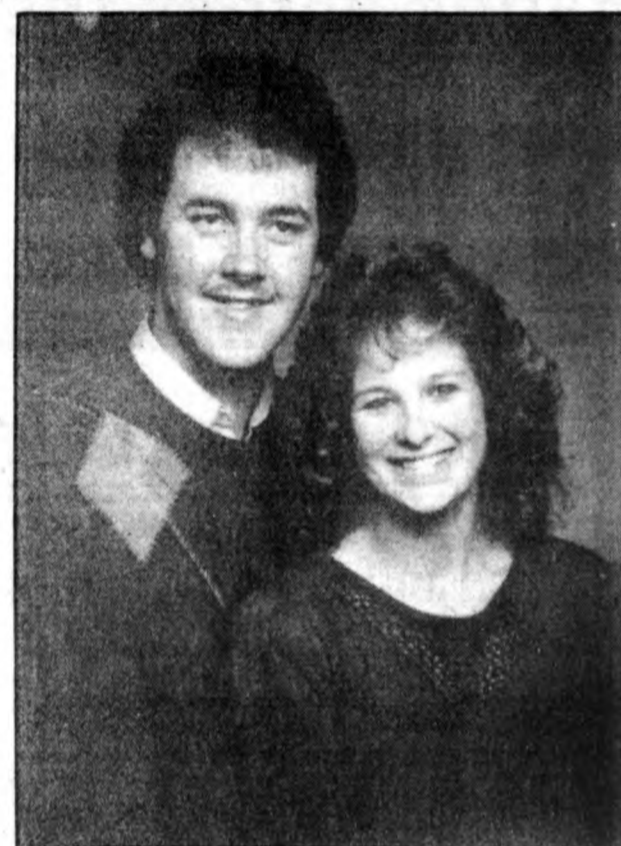
put in the Sunshine book. Also a thank you from the Oberlin family, and an oral thank you from Josie Oberlin.

## CMH gets computer scanner

Clinton Memorial Hospital has received approval from the Michigan Department of Public Health for its certificate of need application to participate in a network of hospitals sharing a mobile CT (computerized tomography) scanner.

"We share the same concerns as other participating hospitals in how we can best offer needed services in a cost efficient manner," Paul McNamara said. "This network arrangement helps eliminate the duplication of services, the costly ambulance transfers of patients to hospitals with scanning services, and the high-priced capital investment involved with such service."

The CT scanner combines the principles of x-ray with the advances of computer technology. Unlike conventional x-rays, a cross-section view

of the body is produced. The low-level x-ray beams provide an accurate image of the entire body, with organ and tissue "pictured" in precise detail. Especially helpful in emergency situations, CT scanning is an efficient, painless way for a physician to make an early diagnosis of any number of internal disorders in a relatively short time.

Clinton Memorial Hospital will share the mobile unit with six other hospitals. The scanner will

be at the St. Johns hospital at least twice a week. Other participating hospitals are Carson City Hospital, Hayes Green Beach Memorial Hospital (Charlotte), Ionia County Memorial Hospital, Kelsey Memorial Hospital (Lakeview), Pennox Memorial Hospital (Hastings), and United Memorial Hospital (Greenville).

## From mail carrier to tennis, Jack Davis does it better

Jack Davis, St. Johns junior varsity tennis coach, went from playing "hit and giggle" tennis to serious tennis back in 1974 — when his youngest daughter's boyfriend beat him badly in front of a number of spectators.

"I came home and swore that I would beat that kid," the 61-year-old Davis said. "I played him about six weeks later and tore him to shreds — the Ancient Mariner struck back!"

Since that time, Coach Davis has spent countless hours on the court, winning several St. Johns City Recreation championships and playing against stiff competition at the Lansing Racquet Club during the winter months. He learned the game by reading every tennis book he could get his hands on, and by spending hours hitting balls against the wall at St. Joseph School.

"The people at the library got to the point where they had books ready for me when I walked in the door," Davis said.

After his retirement from the United States Postal Service last year, St. Johns varsity Coach Al Werbish approached Davis about being his assistant and assuming the junior varsity position.

"I had my doubts about it to begin with," Coach Davis said. "This is the first time I've ever coached anything, but I'm really enjoying it. I have a good bunch of kids — they make it fun."

The 16-member team is unusually large for a junior varsity program, consisting primarily of freshmen with two juniors and a sophomore.

"It's a huge number for a j.v. team," Davis said. "We have many more players than most of the schools we compete against. Quite often my players end up playing against opposing varsity players after they have finished their first match."

**THE YOUNG** Redwing netters have done well for their coach, with just one loss on the season to a highly touted East Lansing squad. In that outing, the number three doubles team of Kent Bartley and Todd Schwartzkopf defeated their Trojan opponents and earned a special "Coaches Award" for their efforts — coupons redeemable at a local hamburger establishment.

"Giving out hamburger coupons for special efforts was really my wife's idea," the coach said. "I found out that some of my players were going out for something to

eat before their matches, and I got upset with them. My wife reminded me of the kind of appetites boys that age have."

Other players who earned coupons were Chad Adams for winning his match against a senior from Everett, Josh Foote for improvement, and Aaron Gaffney and Doug Wadell who beat the number four varsity doubles team and advanced to the number one doubles position on the junior varsity.

"We've played against some very good teams this year," Davis said. "The East Lansing match was especially good, even though we lost. The kids played their best tennis of the year and were complimented by the East Lansing coach."

"We also had a hard-fought scrimmage with Ovid-Elsie that was beneficial for both clubs."

**COACH DAVIS** may be widening his coaching expertise into the Ovid-Elsie area next year to coach the girls' team.

"When I asked the administration here what I should do if some boys showed up, they said, 'Anything you do that helps Ovid-Elsie's program, helps the whole league.' I was really pleased with that attitude."

The tennis coach and his wife moved to St. Johns from Louisville, Kentucky, in 1951 and have lived in town ever since. After a brief stint as a salesperson, Coach Davis spent the next 23 years as a St. Johns city mail-carrier. With basically the same route during all those years, he became a friendly and welcome face to many persons in the South Oakland area.

"I turned down a lot of opportunities to do something besides be a mail-carrier within the postal service throughout the years," Davis said. "I liked the exercise; I liked the people; and I liked talking to the people on my route."

"I could tell some really good stories about things that happened over the years — most of them you couldn't print though."

Coach Davis has nothing but praise for his junior varsity players, who he plays against on a regular basis.

"I give the kids 30 points a game," he said. "So far, Josh (Foote) is the only one to beat me. Aaron (Gaffney) and Jacob (Seavey) both have tied me."

"All the kids on the team are really nice, they try hard and there is a lot of competition and spirit."

"I don't think that I've had that much to do with the team being as good as it is — but, I know if they had done poorly I would get the blame, so I've told the boys that I'm going to take credit for their success."

## Fowler Eagles head for state track meet after regional win

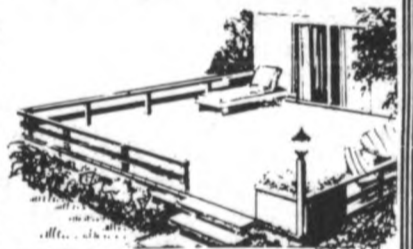

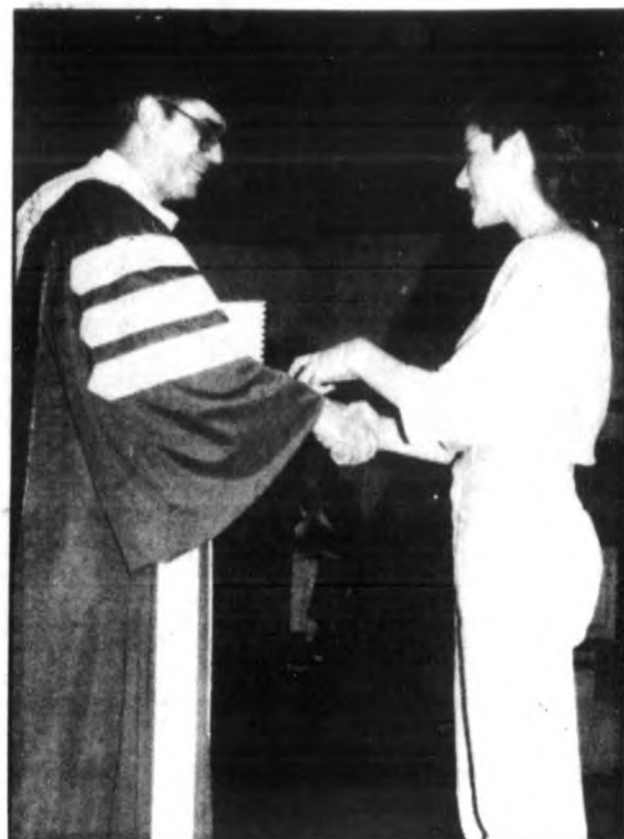

## Roehl lines

### Alfalfa fields

By Giles Roehl



Should alfalfa fields that experienced last fall's flooding be harvested late? Normally, first cutting would be taken at first bloom or June 1, which ever comes first. There is a question whether we should delay first harvest seven to 10 days on injured fields. This may be good advice if significant plant injury occurred over winter since delaying first cutting will enable plants to regrow more quickly after harvest. But, you should be aware of other consequences of delaying the first harvest before you make this decision.

Forage quality decreases with maturity, and delaying first cutting for 10 days could cause a significant drop in nutrient quality. Ten days in early June could be the difference between harvesting at late bud or full bloom. This could cause a loss in both protein and energy content. Studies from Michigan and Wisconsin indicated a decrease in crude protein from 21.0 to 12.9 percent and a decrease in TDN (total digestible nutrients) from 59 to 48 percent when harvest was delayed from late bud to full bloom. In terms of economic value, these decreases represent about a 13 percent reduction. If high quality forage is not re-

quired, then delaying first harvest on previously flooded or injured stands may be a good idea. If forage quality is important, however, consider the sacrifice you will be making if you delay harvesting in June.

In southern Michigan, alfalfa weevil can be a significant pest problem and one of the most economical and environmentally safe methods of control is early cutting. If alfalfa weevils become a problem on an alfalfa stand, delaying harvest means either: 1. losing significant yield and quality to the insect or; 2. depending on chemical control for a longer period and through a dense canopy. If alfalfa harvest is not delayed, you can scout the stubble after harvest and decide on the need for chemical control at that time.

If first harvest is delayed, it is likely that the harvesting schedule over the entire growing season will be delayed. In some cases, this may not present a problem. In other cases, however, this could mean the difference between getting three or four cuttings this year.

### People diets

I am an animal nutritionist and have often thought that we do a better job of balancing the rations of hogs and cattle than we do people. With livestock, we look at the total ration to see if it meets the nutritional requirements of the animal. People, on the other hand, tend to look at one component of their diet, i.e., fiber, fat, cholesterol, etc., and develop their eating habits around that. However, by focusing on only one component we may be shorting our bodies of essential nutrients.

In "Beef," May-1987, issue, an article entitled "Setting the Record Straight on Cholesterol" points out this same concern. In this article, Dr. Roslyn Alfin-Slater, renowned professor of biological chemistry in the University of California at Los Angeles School of Public Health, said, "Data available is not strong enough to recommend that the entire population, including children, go on a low-fat, low-cholesterol diet."

Although scientists have been doing research on the effect of dietary cholesterol on atherosclerosis and heart disease for many years, there is still no consensus in the scientific community as to its effects.

The theory has been that saturated fats and cholesterol lead to high blood cholesterol levels, hardening of the arteries, heart disease and even death. Therefore, the National Institute of Health and the American Heart Association have recommended that all Americans should reduce daily intake of cholesterol to 300 mg per day.

Dr. Alfin-Slater concludes from research, that there is no connection between the amount of cholesterol in the diet and cholesterol in the body. She goes on to say that there are at least 36 different risk factors linked to heart disease. Factors such as age, environment, heredity and smoking play more of an important part in heart disease than diet.

Now, let us take a closer look at the consequences of limiting our dietary intake of cholesterol to 300 mg per day. First of all, dietary cholesterol is only obtained from products of animal origin, therefore, a common recommendation is to reduce the levels of meat, milk products and eggs in your diet. Most of these products that contain cholesterol are also good sources of protein and excellent sources of vitamins and minerals. By limiting your intake, you may have shorted your body of these essential nutrients and by limiting animal products you certainly make it more difficult to provide your body with a balanced diet.

So what is the answer to the human species dietary dilemma? Use good judgement and common sense when planning your diet. Swinging from one extreme to another rarely pays off. Dr. Alfin-Slater's closing comments were: "Man does not live by bread, or meat, or eggs, or fiber, alone! A varied diet eaten in moderation and attention to other facets of your lifestyle are important in maintaining good health and hopefully, long life."

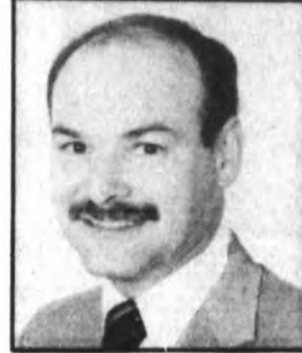
