## Roadsign vandalism on the increase

Vandals, who last year cost Clinton County nearly \$75,000 in roadsign repairs, have stepped up their destructive pace this year.

"It sure has been terrible," says Michael Nobach, superintendent-manager of the Clinton County Road Commission. "It's just like they're picking out a stretch of road and

knocking everything down.

Figures have not been compiled for 1987 but Nobach says Road Commission employees see the problem getting worse.

"It's going to turn into a major disaster," he says. "I see the trend getting worse, not tapering off."

The destruction is not limited to

bending a few speed limit signs or to twisting streetsigns to read incorrectly. Nobach says even heavy duty signs — signs that would require in the order of a four wheel drive vehicle to destroy — have been hit.

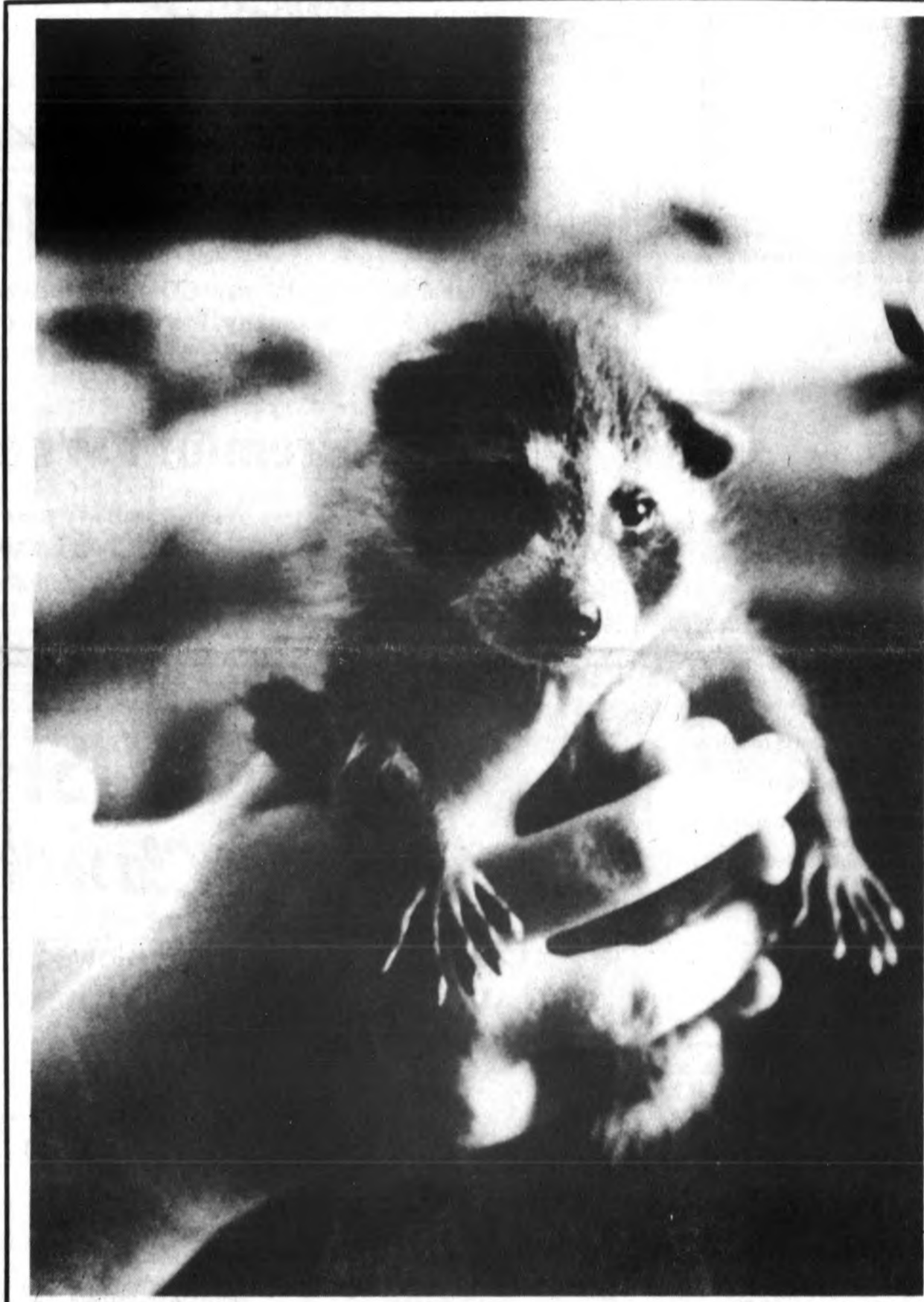
The Road Commission pays particular attention to stopsigns, replacing vandalized signs at night, on

holidays — whenever they are reported missing. Besides the expense of replacing the signs — which includes overtime for the workers who have to do the work — missing stopsigns endanger county motorists, Nobach notes.

The Road Commission prosecutes the culprits when they are caught —

which is not often. In the last year, two vandals have been prosecuted, says Nobach.

Both the convicted vandals were young men in their late teens or early 20s, says Nobach, and neither offered him an explanation for vandalizing the roadsigns.

## Smith pleads guilty to assault without intention of murdering

Sentencing is scheduled for June 8 for a St. Johns man who last week pleaded guilty to an assault charge stemming from a shooting in the Searles Trailer Park in March.

Christopher D. Smith, 23, of 2265 W. Parks Rd., pleaded guilty to assault with intent to do great bodily harm less than murder. An assault with intent to commit murder charge will be dropped under a plea bargained

agreement. Smith pleaded no contest to a charge of possessing a firearm while committing a felony.

The assault charge carries a maximum penalty of 10 years in prison. The firearm charge carries a two-year mandatory prison sentence that may not be served concurrently with any other sentence. The charges stem from an incident

March 29 in which Smith shot Jason Galloway, 15, in the mouth. The youth was hospitalized for several days following the shooting, which cost him several teeth and the loss of some bone.

A second youth, Wilmar Barber II, was wounded in the hand by the same shot.

Smith will be sentenced June 8 by 29th Circuit court Judge Randy Tahvonen.

## Board approves contract with superintendent

The St. Johns Board of Education on May 18 approved a three-year contract for Superintendent Steve Bakita and named Bette Munger the assistant superintendent for instruction.

The board's contract with Bakita, effective July 1, stipulates a \$59,125 annual salary.

Bette Munger, who is currently principal of East Olive and Riley elementary schools, will become the assistant superintendent for instruction effective July 1. It is the position left by Bakita when he took over as

superintendent from the resigning Earl Gabriel.

Bakita said the notice has been posted seeking candidates to replace Munger at the elementary schools. He said it has not yet been determined if the position will be left as it is — one principal responsible for both Riley and East Olive — or if Riley will be assigned a full-time principal and East Olive a different half-time principal.

Applicants within the school district have until to June 2 to apply for the position.

## June board meetings: Sex ed, building plans

Superintendent Steve Bakita said the sparse attendance at the public meeting could indicate a lack of public interest in the proposal. However, he said, it is possible that the plan will perhaps generate more interest when it is refined into a formal proposal to the voters.

Architect Don Lee said at the meeting that the next step, if the school board accepts the plan, will be to develop the design of the new middle school proposed by the plan.

A public hearing on the appropriations budget will be held at the June 22 meeting.

Several important issues will come before the St. Johns Board of Education in June:

• Human sexuality education policy — The board will hold a first reading of a proposed policy on June 8. Copies of the policy will be available to the public.

Final reading and adoption of the policy is expected at the June 22 meeting.

• School Facilities Committee — The committee will present to the board on June 8 its \$11 million plan for school building construction and improvement.

A public meeting held by the committee May 19 to gather public comment on the plan was sparsely attended. About 30 persons attended, about a half of whom were members of the committee.

## Judge warns parents of liability for alcohol

Parents — you are criminally and civilly liable for alcohol served to minors at your home.

That, in a nutshell, is the message Clinton County Probate Judge Marvin Robertson wants to convey during this season of graduation open houses.

The Michigan Supreme Court held in a recent ruling that state laws prohibiting a person from furnishing alcohol to minors apply not only to retailers and bars, but also to social hosts.

Violators, says Robertson, can be charged with a misdemeanor. But the decision also means that social hosts who furnish alcohol to those under 21 years could be found liable for injuries or death associated with the alcohol they served.

The Supreme Court case involved a 19-year-old boy who drank an unspecified amount of alcohol at a wedding reception. In the following early morning hours he was killed in an automobile accident. A law suit was brought against the hosts of the reception and the court decided the hosts could be held liable.

Robertson says what is true for weddings is true for graduation open houses — where alcohol is often served.

"I think we are sitting on a time bomb," he says. "I predict that what we're going to see is some graduates will not be careful. I think they'll have an open bar...."

Robertson fears that young partygoers will go from party to party, having several drinks at each one.

"I think some kids will go party hopping," he says. "I think some kids are going to be injured or killed."

When that occurs, he says, parents

can be held liable even if, as far as they knew, the young person only had one drink at their house.

"If you served alcohol to a minor, there is a presumption a kid getting drunk and getting in an accident is caused by your negligence," he says.

Robertson suggest having a "dry" party. The money saved by not buying alcohol can be given directly to the graduate, he says.

"In addition, we don't want it on our heads, on our conscience, that we were the source of a kid getting intoxicated," he adds.

### Missing children

Legislation designed to help law enforcement officials find missing children has been approved by the Michigan House of Representatives.

The three-bill package (HB 4366-68) is intended to "tag the records" of missing children to help authorities locate them. The records which would be tagged are birth certificates and school records.

I voted in favor of these bills. The package was recommended by the House Republican PROTECT

Task Force which has spent several months closely examining a variety of issues affecting children.

While helping police locate runaways, the legislation would also help catch non-custodial parents who "snatch" a child, flee to another state and try to enroll the children in school in a new state. Eventually, a parent or the child may seek a birth certificate or school records. Under the legislation, that request would alert authorities and provide a vital clue to locating the child.

A similar recordkeeping requirement is part of Illinois' successful and highly regarded I-SEARCH missing children program, which has been credited with enabling authorities to locate a number of missing children within the past year or so.

Following House passage, the bill was sent to the Senate for further consideration. I voted for this legislation and hope we can quickly enact this public safety legislation.

"It's in the Bag"

The earliest records of the use of rhubarb date back to about 2700 B.C. in China or Mongolia, where the root was used for medicinal purposes. It's generally believed that camel caravans crossing the deserts and mountains of the Far East carried what was then a highly prized cargo.

Later, natives along the Volga discovered a plant similar to the China variety, and use of the leaves as a medicine spread throughout Europe. It wasn't until 1778 that rhubarb was recorded as a food plant in England.

According to one researcher, records of rhubarb in America identify an unnamed Maine gardener as apparently having obtained either the seeds or the root stock from Europe between 1790 and 1800.

Moving West, rhubarb cuttings were one of the precious things pioneer women tucked into the old Conestoga wagons for the trip. Nothing of value less than a dollar a pound was supposed to take a space in the wagon. However, rhubarb was so highly regarded, the resourceful women managed to stow away a few roots.

## Perrinton holds Centennial in July

The village of Perrinton will hold a centennial celebration July 16-19.

Many events are planned. One fundraiser project will help build a replica of a bandstand, originally built in 1894 on the main street of the village. Bands played in the upper level of the two-story structure for special events in the village's early years. The bandstand later

deteriorated and was destroyed in the 1920's or 1930's.

The replica, being built by M.E. Schneider Construction of Perrinton, will be 16 feet across and two stories high. The village will use it during the centennial as their information headquarters, and after the centennial, it will be maintained by the village in the park on main

street.

The centennial committee has raised over \$1,000 for the bandstand, leaving \$1,000 needed for the construction. Canisters for donations are located in the village's businesses. A plaque with the names of donors contributing \$10 or more will be made. Residents may contribute in memory of relatives as well as in their own name.

Persons wishing to donate to the bandstand project may mail donations to: Centennial Committee, Box 401, Perrinton, 48871. If a donation of \$10 or more is made, persons are requested to include pro-

per spelling of the name(s) they wish placed on the commemorative plaque. Individuals may also stop in the village office from 1-5 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays or Fridays.

The major fundraiser planned for the bandstand is a steak supper scheduled for June 5 at the Mark Daniels VFW Hall in Perrinton. The dinner runs from 5-8 p.m. with a steak supper for adults priced at \$5.75, or a hamburger dinner for children at \$2.50. The dinner includes meat, tossed salad, baked potatoes or french fries, and beverage. The public is invited.

Funding for the vegetation came from a \$525

Michigan Department of Education mini-grant. Additionally, Pete Motz, owner of Plum Line Landscape and Design of St. Johns, gave the club a substantial discount on the trees and shrubbery.

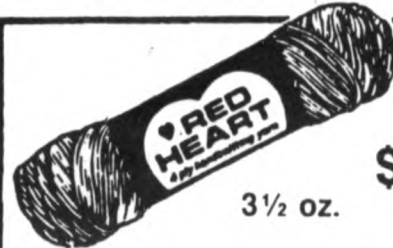

Student volunteers from the high school, along with varsity football Coach Bart Kjolhede and his team members, were very helpful to the Olympians during

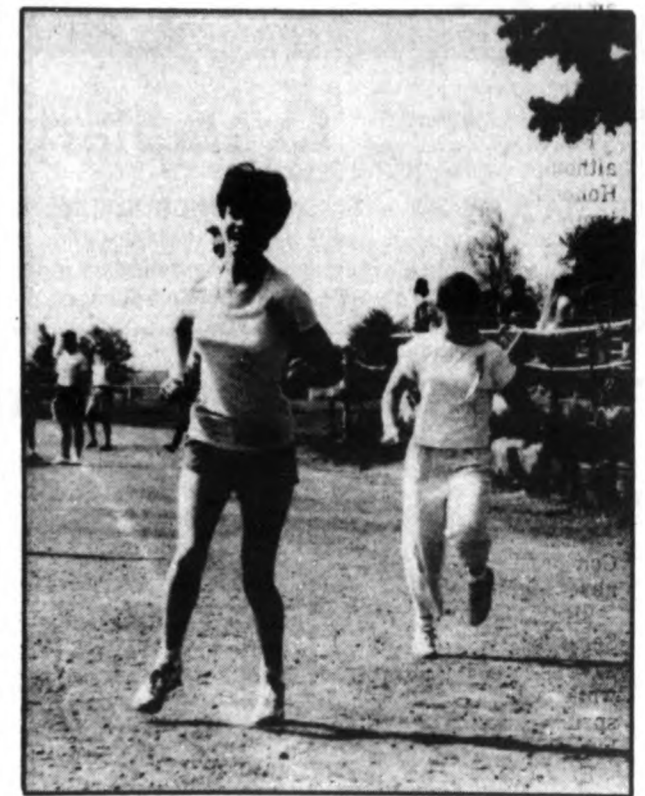
the meet, according to Jekel.

## St. Johns baseball team bags first-ever MMB title

The good news is, for the first time ever, the St. Johns baseball team won a Mid-Michigan B league championship and received their third-ever bid to play at the Lansing Diamond Classic.

The bad news is the Redwings' 16-3 pre-district loss to Jackson on Friday.

Rubbing a little salt in the wound, Jackson scored all 16 runs in one inning — the fourth — when they totaled 15 hits and three home runs.

"They were a good club with excellent pitching," St. Johns Coach Doug Parker said, "but I don't really think they were the best team we've faced this year. They just really hit the ball in that inning — and in the right places."

Four pitchers saw action in the fateful fourth inning — Tom Bates started the game and took the loss, while Dwight Pierson, Jerry Duwell and Mark Henning all pitched in the inning.

Redwing outfielders had a tough time in the odd-shaped field, while Jackson batters used their home field to their own advantage.

"Some of the home runs would have been outs in our park," Parker said. "They (Jackson) did all they could with the available space."

The Redwings scored three runs in the first inning to take an early 3-0 lead, but they were the only hits St.

Johns could garner in the contest. Thirteen Redwing batters went down swinging to the powerful Jackson pitcher.

"We had faced him as a sophomore last year," Parker said. "We knew he was good. Unfortunately, next year he will be back as a senior."

St. Johns' runs in the inning came when Scott Heibeck picked up a walk, Duwell singled, Tim Cleaver singled to score Heibeck, and a triple by Matt Wilcox plated both Duwell and Cleaver.

IN THE MMB showdown with Alma last week for the league title, St. Johns manhandled the Panthers, winning by scores of 10-0 and 7-6.

Bates was the winning pitcher in the first game, going into the Jackson contest with a 7-0 record. Cleaver was 3-3 at the plate with 2 RBIs and Steve Dunkel was 2-3.

The Redwings scored runners in each of the first four innings to win the game going away. Singles by Dunkel, Duwell, Cleaver and a double by Wilcox gave St. Johns three runs in the first inning; Bates and Dunkel singled in the second, Heibeck walked, and Duwell and Cleaver earned RBIs to score three more runs in the second inning; and three more Redwings scored in the third off singles by Pierson, Barry Kiel, and Heibeck.

Cleaver's single in the fourth inning scored the Redwings' tenth run of the game.

Pierson earned the win in the nightcap in a game that saw St. Johns come back from a 4-0 deficit after two Alma at-bats, scoring 5 runs in the bottom of the second

to take a 5-4 lead.

Alma tied the score at 5-5 in the third, but St. Johns picked up one run in the fourth when Dunkel scored off a sacrifice fly by Duwell, and added their final run in the fifth when Wilcox scored off a sacrifice fly by Pierson.

The sweep gives St. Johns sole possession of first place in the MMB with a 9-1 record. Ovid-Elsie finished second at 8-2, and Alma was third with a record of 6-4.

In non-conference action with Mt. Pleasant last Thursday, St. Johns lost the first game 13-6 and tied the nightcap 9-9 when the game was called due to darkness after the sixth inning.

THE OILERS scored eight of their runs in the first inning, and according to Coach Parker, that was pretty much the ballgame. The Redwings could pull no closer than 9-5 in the game.

Duwell was the losing pitcher, while Cleaver was 3-4 at the plate for St. Johns with a double, home run, and 2 RBIs.

Ahead 8-1 after their bat in the fifth inning, the Oilers

allowed seven Redwings runners to score in their half of the inning to tie the game. A single by Wilcox scored 2 runs for St. Johns in the inning to make the score 8-5, and a three-run home run by Dan Dorn tied the game at 8-8.

Both clubs picked up one more run each in the sixth inning before the game was called.

The weeks' worth of action gives St. Johns a record of 22-4-1 going into their opening Diamond Classic game tonight (May 26) versus Dansville. The game begins at 8 p.m. at Municipal Park in Lansing. Should the Redwings win, they would advance to the second round of play, facing DeWitt on June 1.

"As far as I know, this is only the third time a St. Johns baseball team has been invited to play in the Classic," Coach Parker said. "We are really looking forward to it. The organizers of the Classic have invited more area teams this year than in past years — that should make it even more interesting."

The St. Johns girls softball team ended their 1987 season with a doubleheader sweep of Alma in Mid-Michigan B league play, and a non-conference loss to a strong Mt. Pleasant team.

The Redwings' final 6-4 record puts them in third place in the league, with an 18-13 overall record.

"That's not too bad, considering this was a rebuilding year for us," St. Johns Coach Paul Sternburgh said. "We were 13-4 at one point in the season. We played some very good teams during the course of the year — only two clubs we played against had losing records."

St. Johns defeated Alma 4-3 and 13-3 in the league finale played on the Redwing's home diamond last Tuesday. Tanya LaBar picked up the win in the first game, allowing 3 runs on 9 hits, and Melanie DeWitt earned the win in the nightcap which lasted just 5 innings.

The Redwings scored 2 runs in the first inning and added 1 more in the second to jump off to a 3-0 lead. Gina Schneider was safe on an error in the opening inn-

ing, stole second and third, and came home on a fielder's choice by Missy Vitek. She in turn scored when Karen Simon hit a long triple.

Bensinger crossed the Redwings' run in the second inning, and Vitek added St. Johns' final run in the fifth inning when she tagged and came home from second off a long flyball by Simon.

Alma scored 2 runs in the third inning and 1 run in the fourth. The Panthers committed 4 errors.

Karen Simon was the leading Redwing hitter, going 2-2 with a double, triple, and 2 RBIs.

In the nightcap, the Redwings tallied 5 runs in the opening inning and added 2 more in the second to put the Panthers in a big hole. Alma's only runs came in the third inning, while St. Johns added 1 run in the fourth and plated 6 more runs in the fifth to end the game.

Angie Pung blasted a pair of doubles to pick up 3 RBIs, scoring Redwing runners in both the second and fifth innings. Simon added 3 RBIs to her year's totals with singles in the first and fifth innings, and DeWitt helped herself by going 2-4 at the plate and netting 1 RBI.

The Redwings went up against a "hitting team" when they faced the Oilers on Thursday. St. Johns lost the first game 7-1 and dropped the nightcap 10-7.

"They (Mt. Pleasant) were really smacking the ball," Sternburgh said. "They had two triples and four doubles in the first game alone. We had only one error in the game, so it wasn't like we gave anything away."

The game was scoreless going into the third inning when Mt. Pleasant picked up one run, but the Oilers put things away in the fourth when they tallied four more runs.

St. Johns lone run of the game came when Simon singled, advanced to third off a pair of ground balls, and came home on a single by Mindi Martinez.

Ahead by a score of 4-2 after two innings of the second game, the Redwings allowed Mt. Pleasant to score 7 runs in the third inning and could not recoup the loss.

"Overall, the girls played well this season," Sternburgh said. "We'll be looking forward to next year with a little more experience from the younger players on the team."

Student volunteers from the high school, along with varsity football Coach Bart Kjolhede and his team members, were very helpful to the Olympians during

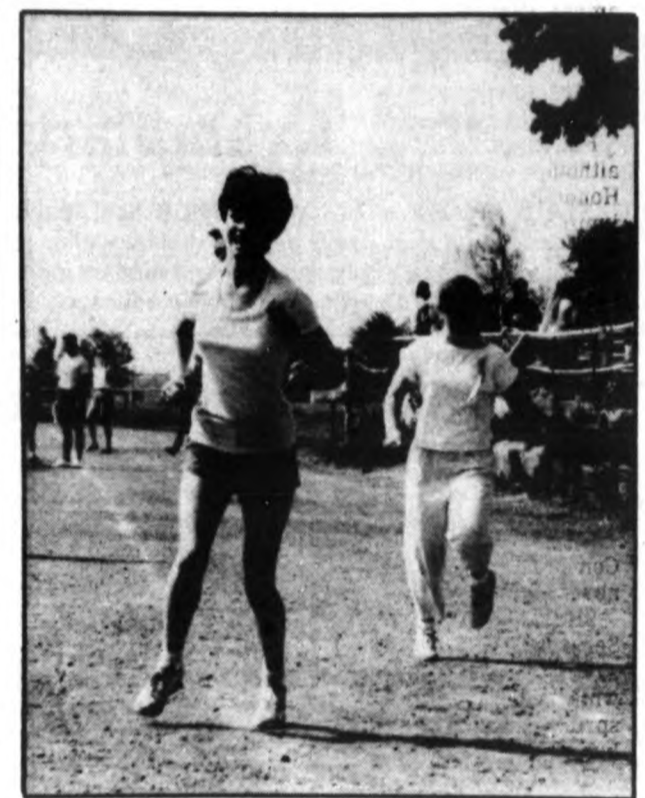
the meet, according to Jekel.

## St. Johns baseball team bags first-ever MMB title

The good news is, for the first time ever, the St. Johns baseball team won a Mid-Michigan B league championship and received their third-ever bid to play at the Lansing Diamond Classic.

The bad news is the Redwings' 16-3 pre-district loss to Jackson on Friday.

Rubbing a little salt in the wound, Jackson scored all 16 runs in one inning — the fourth — when they totaled 15 hits and three home runs.

"They were a good club with excellent pitching," St. Johns Coach Doug Parker said, "but I don't really think they were the best team we've faced this year. They just really hit the ball in that inning — and in the right places."

Four pitchers saw action in the fateful fourth inning — Tom Bates started the game and took the loss, while Dwight Pierson, Jerry Duwell and Mark Henning all pitched in the inning.

Redwing outfielders had a tough time in the odd-shaped field, while Jackson batters used their home field to their own advantage.

"Some of the home runs would have been outs in our park," Parker said. "They (Jackson) did all they could with the available space."

The Redwings scored three runs in the first inning to take an early 3-0 lead, but they were the only hits St.

Johns could garner in the contest. Thirteen Redwing batters went down swinging to the powerful Jackson pitcher.

"We had faced him as a sophomore last year," Parker said. "We knew he was good. Unfortunately, next year he will be back as a senior."

St. Johns' runs in the inning came when Scott Heibeck picked up a walk, Duwell singled, Tim Cleaver singled to score Heibeck, and a triple by Matt Wilcox plated both Duwell and Cleaver.

IN THE MMB showdown with Alma last week for the league title, St. Johns manhandled the Panthers, winning by scores of 10-0 and 7-6.

Bates was the winning pitcher in the first game, going into the Jackson contest with a 7-0 record. Cleaver was 3-3 at the plate with 2 RBIs and Steve Dunkel was 2-3.

The Redwings scored runners in each of the first four innings to win the game going away. Singles by Dunkel, Duwell, Cleaver and a double by Wilcox gave St. Johns three runs in the first inning; Bates and Dunkel singled in the second, Heibeck walked, and Duwell and Cleaver earned RBIs to score three more runs in the second inning; and three more Redwings scored in the third off singles by Pierson, Barry Kiel, and Heibeck.

Cleaver's single in the fourth inning scored the Redwings' tenth run of the game.

Pierson earned the win in the nightcap in a game that saw St. Johns come back from a 4-0 deficit after two Alma at-bats, scoring 5 runs in the bottom of the second

to take a 5-4 lead.

Alma tied the score at 5-5 in the third, but St. Johns picked up one run in the fourth when Dunkel scored off a sacrifice fly by Duwell, and added their final run in the fifth when Wilcox scored off a sacrifice fly by Pierson.

The sweep gives St. Johns sole possession of first place in the MMB with a 9-1 record. Ovid-Elsie finished second at 8-2, and Alma was third with a record of 6-4.

In non-conference action with Mt. Pleasant last Thursday, St. Johns lost the first game 13-6 and tied the nightcap 9-9 when the game was called due to darkness after the sixth inning.

THE OILERS scored eight of their runs in the first inning, and according to Coach Parker, that was pretty much the ballgame. The Redwings could pull no closer than 9-5 in the game.

Duwell was the losing pitcher, while Cleaver was 3-4 at the plate for St. Johns with a double, home run, and 2 RBIs.

Ahead 8-1 after their bat in the fifth inning, the Oilers

allowed seven Redwings runners to score in their half of the inning to tie the game. A single by Wilcox scored 2 runs for St. Johns in the inning to make the score 8-5, and a three-run home run by Dan Dorn tied the game at 8-8.

Both clubs picked up one more run each in the sixth inning before the game was called.

The weeks' worth of action gives St. Johns a record of 22-4-1 going into their opening Diamond Classic game tonight (May 26) versus Dansville. The game begins at 8 p.m. at Municipal Park in Lansing. Should the Redwings win, they would advance to the second round of play, facing DeWitt on June 1.

"As far as I know, this is only the third time a St. Johns baseball team has been invited to play in the Classic," Coach Parker said. "We are really looking forward to it. The organizers of the Classic have invited more area teams this year than in past years — that should make it even more interesting."

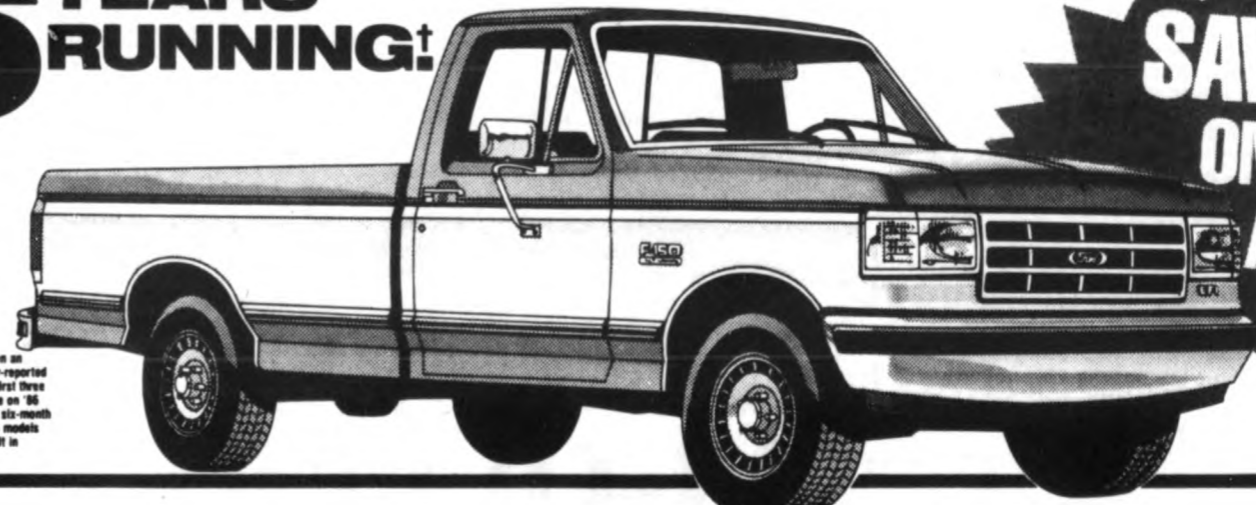

## Standing alfalfa losses eligible for Michigan disaster loans

Farm Credit Services of Mid-Michigan in St. Johns has been given official notice that standing alfalfa losses are eligible for State of Michigan interest free loans.

The amount of the loan will be determined by Farm Credit Services based on field inspection by the Cooperative Extension Service and certification by the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Losses in production or quality were already included in the loan program and will continue to be certified by the ASCS or the Extension Service.

Farmers who believe their alfalfa fields have suffered due to the wet fall of 1986 should contact the Extension Service at 224-5240 to arrange for a field inspection by an alfalfa specialist.

Farmer whose feed amount or quality was adversely affected by the wet fall should also contact the Extension Service for an inspection.

After you have received the information from the Extension Service, you will need ASCS acreage certification. Both the Extension Service and the ASCS forms need to be provided to the lender.

significant. Many of the fields most severely damaged are the young stands that were seeded within the last year. The average cost of seeding an alfalfa stand according to Michigan State University is \$143/acre. Reseeding 8,464.5 acres at \$143/acre results in an additional expense of \$1,210,434.

The actual financial impact on Clinton County farmers will be \$3,018,463, the loss of production for this year plus cost of reseeding damaged fields.

**THE EXTENT** of damage to the area's mint in the fields was also extensive. This office evaluated the condition of 1,967 acres of mint in Clinton County, of this acreage 50.6 percent was lost or 996 acres. If the value of this loss is calculated at the value of the mint stolens (roots used to plant new mint fields) of \$500 pre acre, then the loss to Clinton County growers is about \$498,000.

These losses suffered by Clinton County producers will be felt in the economy of Clinton County over the next couple of years since these losses will effect profits for the next year or two. Money that would have been used to possibly purchase new equipment or other improvements will instead have to be used to recover from the loss.

### Alfalfa damage in Clinton County

Over the past two months a great deal of time has been spent evaluating the condition of the alfalfa stands and mint fields in Clinton County and the extent of the damage done by last fall's rains. In putting together the information that has been gathered it appears that the financial impact of the damage is very significant. The following is some of the data gathered on alfalfa and mint damages.

According to our latest figures from our county ASCS office, Clinton County has 25,650 acres of alfalfa. As of this date, I have evaluated the condition of 2,906.6 acres in the county or about 11.3 percent of the hay fields. Of the fields I have evaluated, losses have ranged from 5 percent up to 100 percent of the stand, with an average overall loss of 42 percent.

The average yield for the county is 3.56 tons per acre. If I use a conservative loss figure of 33 percent, this would be 8,464.5 acres of alfalfa lost in Clinton County. By multiplying this acreage by the average county yield (8,464.5 times 3.56T/acre, equals 30,134 T) there is an estimated loss of \$1,808,040 to the alfalfa producers in Clinton County.

The expense to the farmers to reseed fields will be

## Agricultural news Eye protection

Look around you. Isn't it beautiful! Can you imagine what it would be like not to see, or not to see clearly?

Your eyes are a valuable asset — protect them! When discussing agricultural safety, eye protection often comes up. Safety glasses should be worn when handling farm chemicals and when working with materials that may throw particles and puncture your eyes. Many safety minded people are already following good safety procedures when working with these dangerous chemicals and materials. However, what many people may not realize is that the sun can also be detrimental to your eyesight.

People who spend a lot of time in the sun, and that certainly includes farmers, have a better chance of

developing cataracts. The ultraviolet light from the sun can, over time, cause cataracts. Wearing sunglasses can help protect your eyes from these harmful rays. Lens tint of gray, green or brown do the best job of filtering our ultraviolet light.

Some individuals are more sensitive to the ultraviolet light than others. People who should be the most cautious when working for extended periods of time in the sun are the elderly and those taking tranquilizers or diuretics.

Eyesight is certainly a valuable asset. Take a few precautions now to protect it in the future.

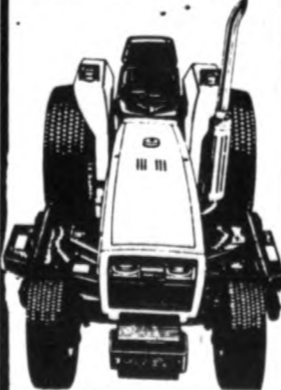

**BINGHAM TOWNSHIP SEWER ORDINANCE**

**April 27, 1987**  
An Ordinance to regulate the use of Public and Private Sewers as drains, the installation and connection of building sewers and the discharge of waters and wastes into public sewer systems in the Township of Bingham, and to provide penalties for the violations thereof, adopted on April 27, 1987.  
THE TOWNSHIP OF BINGHAM ORDAINS:  
ORDINANCE NO. 20

**ARTICLE V USE OF PUBLIC SEWERS**

20.052. Prohibited Uses. Except as hereinafter provided, no person shall discharge any industrial or commercial type wastes into the Township Sewer System which is deleterious to the public health and safety of the people of the Township or the City. Any waste will be considered deleterious that may cause damaging effects as stated under General Conditions and/or does not conform to the limitations stated under Specific Conditions.  
(1) General Conditions:  
(e) Placing of unusual demands on the sewage treatment equipment or process.  
(2) Specific Conditions:  
(c) Must not contain any explosive substance, in the case of gas or vapors, the concentrations shall not exceed twenty (20%) percent of lower explosive limits.  
(z) Shall not contain unusual volume of flow or concentration of wastes constituting "Slugs".  
All the preceding Standards and Regulations are to apply at the point where industrial or commercial type wastes are discharged into a public sewer and all chemical and/or mechanical corrective treatment must be accomplished to practical completion before this point is reached.  
All measurements, test and analyses of the characteristics of waters and wastes to which reference is made in this regulation shall be determined in accordance with the current edition of "Standard Methods for the Examination of Water and Wastewater", published by the American Public Health Association and in accordance with 40 CFR Part 136 entitled "Guidelines Establishing Test Procedures for Analysis of Pollutants."

**ARTICLE VIII THE CLEAN WATER ACT, GENERAL PRETREATMENT REGULATIONS AND POLLUTANTS IN GENERAL**

20.082 Regulations.  
(a) General Discharge Prohibitions  
4) Any wastewater containing toxic pollutants in sufficient quantity, either singly or by interaction with other pollutants, to injure or interfere with any wastewater treatment process, constitute a hazard to humans or animals, create a toxic effect in the receiving waters of the POTW, or to exceed the limitation set forth in a Categorical Pretreatment Standard. A toxic pollutant shall include but not be limited to any pollutant identified pursuant to Section 307(a) of the Act.  
20.084 Administration.  
(b) Wastewater Discharge Permits  
(6) Permit Transfer  
Wastewater Discharge Permits are issued to a specific User for a specific operation. A Wastewater Discharge Permit shall not be assigned or transferred or sold to a new owner, new User, different premises, or a new or changed operation without the approval of the Township and the City. Any succeeding owner or User shall also comply with the terms and conditions of the existing permit.  
(c) Reporting Requirements for Permittee  
(2) Periodic Compliance Reports  
(f) Pretreatment  
Users shall provide necessary wastewater treatment as required to comply with this Ordinance and shall achieve compliance with Federal Categorical Pretreatment Standards within the time limitations as specified by the Federal Pretreatment Regulations. Any facilities required to pretreat wastewater to a level acceptable to the Township and the City shall be provided, operated, and maintained at the User's expense. Detailed plans showing the pretreatment facilities and operating procedures shall be submitted to the Township and the City for review. The Township and the City will review such plans and respond with suggested modifications within thirty (30) days following plan submittal. The review of such plans and operating procedures will in no way relieve the User from the responsibility of modifying the facility as necessary to produce an effluent acceptable to the Township and the City under the provisions of this Ordinance. Any subsequent changes in the pretreatment facilities or method of operation shall be reported to the Township and the City prior to the User's initiation of the changes.  
All records relating to compliance with Pretreatment Standards and Requirements shall be made available to officials of the EPA or MDNR upon request.  
(g) Confidential Information  
Information and data on a User obtained from reports, questionnaires, permit applications, permits and monitoring programs and from inspections shall be available to the public or other governmental agency without restriction unless the User specifically requests and is able to demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Township and the City that the release of such information would divulge information processes or methods of production entitled to protection as trade secrets of the User.  
When requested by the person furnishing a report, the portions of a report which might disclose trade secrets or secret processes shall not be made available for inspection by the public but shall be made available upon written request to governmental agencies for uses related to this ordinance, the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit, State Disposal System permit and/or the Pretreatment Programs; provided, however, that such portions of report shall be available for use by the State or any state agency judicial review or enforcement proceedings involving the person furnishing the report. Wastewater constituents and characteristics will not be recognized as confidential information.
