### City OKs drama signs

**ST. JOHNS** — City commissioners on May 26 approved the placement of signs proclaiming the city the home of the high school theatre state champions. Redwing theatre students have won the state title eight times in the past 17 years. The achievement will be noted on each of the four City of St. Johns signs. The signs were proposed by the St. Johns Area Chamber of Commerce. City commissioners plan to come up with a policy for determining who gets such recognition in the future.

## Tax commmission refuses county's farmland figures

Clinton County officials were unsuccessful in their attempts to convince the State Tax Commission that county agriculture land values have decreased 20 percent, not the 15 percent recognized by state officials.

The State Tax Commission on May 26 adopted a State Equalized Value for Clinton County farmland of \$140.44 million.

County officials say the figure should be the amount assessed locally: \$134.13 million. Although county commissioners in April adopted the higher state figure, they did so only to avoid having a factor imposed by the state. That factor would have increased all county farmland assessments by an equal percentage.

They said at the time that they planned to ask the State Tax Commission to reconsider.

"The values have declined drastically due to economic conditions and were further reduced by the flooding and heavy fall rains," said letter from county commissioners to the State Tax Commission. "Our sales data have demonstrated a 20 percent decline and (were) backed up by further sales into 1987.... There seems to be something drastically wrong with the State's method of determining values."

**THAT PROTEST** was read into the record at a May 11 preliminary hearing of the Tax Commission by county Board of Commissioners Chairman Glenn Webster. At a May 26 meeting the State Tax Commission adopted the \$140.44 million SEV.

Treasury department staff members commented at that time that no further information or requests for meetings had come from

the county after May 11. They also noted that county commissioners had adopted the state figures rather than the local figure.

"This is not to say Clinton County did not adequately protest," said Roland C. Andersen, manager of research and statistics for the treasury department. County officials had met a number of times to present its case for the lower equalization figure.

"Factually it did not convince the staff or the Commission," he said.

### 'That's not to say Clinton County did not adequately protest'

Andersen said state and county equalization figures were based on the same data. He said Clinton County farmland market values are influenced by "competing uses" because of proximity to urban areas but said there is no single reason for the difference in the state and the local equalization figures.

"The reason for the difference is that we simply interpret the facts differently," he said.

"We think we've done the job that should be done," he said. "It's true that reasonable minds can disagree."

## Commissioners okay Greenbush gravel pit

The Clinton County Board of Commissioners on May 26 approved a permit that will allow the Searles Construction Company to conduct a gravel mining operation in Greenbush Township.

The 5-2 vote came after several months of deliberation, during which time the company's application for the permit was shunted back and forth between the Clinton County Planning Commission and the county Board of Commissioners.

A group of residents who live near the site of the proposed mining operation have steadfastly opposed the permit during a series of planning commission and county commission meetings. They say the mining operation between French and Colony roads near DeWitt Road will result in health and safety hazards because of speeding gravel trucks and dust and noise pollution.

They have also questioned the need for the gravel and argued that Searles Constuction owner Leon Searles knew when he bought the property that the previous owner had been denied a special use permit to mine the location.

**ON JANUARY 15** the planning commissioners voted 5-2 to recommend denial of the permit. On Jan. 27, county commissioners returned the application to the planning commissioners for reconsideration.

Last month the planning commission voted to recommend approval of the permit. County commissioners then approved the permit by a 5-2 vote.

Voting in favor of approval were Glenn Webster, Water Nobis, Lois Bracey, Richard Hawks and Roger Overway. Opposed were Earl Lancaster and Robert Vandreisen.

Some residents who opposed the permit portrayed the controversy as one in which "big money" ruled over the rights of the individual. Others, including Commissioner Nobis, said gravel mining is an allowed use in agriculturally zoned areas.

## School boards, millages

# County voters go to the polls June 8

Here's a roundup of the June 8 school board races and millage proposals for the school districts within the circulation area of the Clinton County News.

### ST. JOHNS

DeWitt resident Richard Lehnert, editor of the Michigan Farmer, is running for one of two seats on the Board of Education. Incumbent Jeanette Adams, currently the board vice president, is running for reelection.

In the event of a write-in candidacy, the top two vote-getters will be seated on the board.

There are no other races or ballot issues in St. Johns.

### FWOLER

Incumbent Ruth Feldpausch is running for re-election to a four-year term. Also running for the seat is Jerome L. Thelen.

There are two ballot proposals in Fowler:

**Proposition 1: 28.5 mills for one year** — This proposal includes the renewal of the 25.5-mill levy that expired in 1986 plus a three-mill increase.

School officials say the increase is requested to help offset rising costs and the loss of 13 students. The in-

crease will allow the district to make a "small step" toward reversing the trend of recent years in which the purchase of equipment and books have been postponed.

Even with the extra millage and some projected staff reduction, the district will not be in the best of financial health, officials say.

**Proposition 2 — 1 mill for one year** — These funds would be used exclusively for repair and maintenance of the buildings and grounds.

Because of a decline in land values, passage of both proposals is expected to generate only \$8,000 in additional local tax dollars. However, the district will reap an additional \$180,000 in state aid.

### PEWAMO-WESTPHALIA

Don Campbell is the only candidate seeking one open seat on the school board.

There are two millage proposals:

**Proposition 1: 26.5 mills for two years** — This proposal includes the renewal of 24.5 mills that expired in 1986 plus two additional mills. This levy would be for school operations.

**Proposition 2: One-half mill for two years** — Funds generated by this

levy will be earmarked for the purchase of equipment, including computers, and the repair and maintenance of school buildings.

### FULTON

Incumbents Peggy Torok and Edna Vaughn are unopposed in their reelection bids for four-year terms.

There are no millage proposals.

### OVID-ELSIE

There is a one-mill proposal for two years for school operations.

There are five candidates for two-year terms on the school board. They are incumbent Edward W. Thornton, and Margaret Green,

David Kurka, Robert G. Parker and Thomas Pumford, Jr.

### ASHLEY

The school district is seeking the renewal of 8.5 mills for a period of two years. The renewal levy is for school operations.

Steve Strouse and Sam Sopocy are running for a single three-year term on the school board.

Ronald Burk and Joseph Gavenda, both incumbents, are squaring off for a single one-year term. Burk is finishing a four-year term while Gavenda was appointed to fill a vacancy.

## St. Johns commission adopts 1987-88 budget

St. Johns City commissioners last week adopted a 1987-88 fiscal year budget of \$4,575,306. The budget is 7.5 percent larger than last year.

The total tax levy included in the budget resolution is 14.2237 mills. This includes 9.8337 mills for general operating. The remaining mills will be used for payment on the City's four general obligation bonds.

There was no comment from the public at a public hearing held before the budget was adopted.

In other City Commission business:

• Commissioners voted to recommend to the State of Michigan approval of an entertainment permit for Little Caesars restaurant. The restaurant plans to expand into an adjacent storefront in the Southpoint Mall and will offer family entertain-

ment, said City Clerk Richard Coletta.

• Commissioners heard the first reading of an ordinance to rezone the Central School site from Municipal to Residential-3. St. Johns developer Mark Barber intends to convert the vacant school building into a luxury condominium unit.

Commissioners set a public hearing on an ordinance to rezone property near the Southpoint Mall for 7:45 p.m. on June 22.

• Commissioners approved a payment of \$4,823 to SOS Service Group for sewer inspection work completed through March 27.

## Peace by the year 2000?

Adam Coffman, a 16-year-old St. Johns High School senior, was recently awarded second prize in the United Nations Association national essay contest. He and his sponsoring teacher, Peggy Andretz, will fly to New York on June 6 to attend a United Nations fundraising ball where he will receive his award.

He will receive \$750 in addition to accommodation and travel expenses.

His prize-winning essay was first submitted to the Greater Lansing Chapter of the United Nations Association.

The son of Dale and Patsy Coffman, 206 S. Swegles St., St. Johns, Adam plans to attend the University of Michigan's Honor College next year.

Here is his award-winning essay:

The United Nations: Looking to the Year 2000

By ADAM COFFMAN

The past 42 years have left the United Nations Organization but 13 in which to maintain global peace and security in the 20th Century. Having yet to be completely effective in this respect, the United Nations is nonetheless at least part of the reason for humanity's continued existence in the nuclear age.

Much has been accomplished — the reconstruction of Europe after the war that shocked civilization enough to form the UN, numerous treaties and agreements promoting international cooperation, and the eradication of smallpox, to name a few.

The almost arbitrary deadline of a new millennium, however, does not mean that the work is done. Human population continues to grow exponentially, causing hunger in even the most affluent of societies. The careless, unmanaged use of energy and resources by industry and the individual are eroding the environment that supports all life on earth. Every nation in the world faces annihilation via a second nuclear war — a gruesome scenario made possible by a lack of trust between the superpowers.

To avert self-destruction, the members of the UN seek not only to increase cooperation and understanding between the nations themselves, but between the more than five billion people they represent. To call the UN's assignment to preserve peace a difficult job is an understatement. An entirely new way of thinking is overdue, in which all human beings have the right and the freedom to life, liberty, and security of person as provided for in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

It is the mission and the trust of the United Nations, in the past, present, and future, to create a stable and peaceful world from a planet torn by war, famine, pestilence, and disease, while respecting the rights of sovereign nations. The year 2000 is almost upon us, and the United Nations carries the hope of our survival and that of our posterity into the new century and beyond.

Human population is now skyrocketing past five billion, and the dramatic effects of malnutrition, overcrowding, and hunger exist in greater numbers than ever before, whether the press covers it or not. The major cause is the rapid decline in the death rate of the world's population, a result of the miracles of modern medicine wiping out disease and prolonging life in rich and poor countries alike. The increase in population is due largely, however, to the differences in thought patterns in the developed and developing nations. In the industrialized countries, the low death rate is accompanied by a low birth rate — families are having less children. In the third-world countries, families continue to have several children because that is part of their culture. Many children can be a status symbol, or a means of support on farms, or when the parents can no longer work. The results of more people being born and less dying — a drastic increase in population never before seen in history, leading to starvation and death on a major scale.

To combat hunger, attention must be focused on the less-developed countries and two objectives must be reached: decrease in the total birth rate, and increase in total food production. To accomplish the former, the United Nations should increase its efforts to work with governments to educate the general population on the advantages, both short and long term, of small families. It is up to the governments, with the assistance of the UN, to eliminate the economic, non-cultural factors that lead to overpopulation. Providing support for the elderly could remove one reason why parents produce more children.

To increase food production, the spread of deserts and the erosion of topsoil has to be kept to a minimum, and

new sources of the protein lacking in the diets of the malnourished are necessary. Aqua-culture is one possibility in some areas of the world, duplicating the Southeast Asia technique of growing fish in rice fields, collecting both at harvest time. Another method is the hybridization or genetic engineering of protein-rich grain with high yield and which can be grown by the people in need in their own climate. No such goals involving the large-scale application of science and technology can be effective without a political, economic and social commitment by cooperating nations, and no better mechanism for such international coordination exists than the United Nations.

The recent talks in Reykjavik, Iceland, are indicative of the need and desire of the superpowers to lessen the threat of worldwide destruction, but the differences between the United States and the Soviet Union have yet to be resolved. Their antipathy is not simply a consequence of political and economic disagreements, but is also caused by a lack of mutual trust. Obviously, the two countries must understand each other in order to perform constructively at the arms control table. The talks are now blocked by the research and development of defensive satellites in earth orbit.

The technology which at this time prevents a reduction in the nuclear weapons stockpiles, could if directed to another goal, bring the two nations together. This objective, already promoted by top scientists on both sides, is a manned mission to the planet Mars. Clearly a great benefit not only to the USA and USSR, but to the entire world, the flight is only possible with the kind of cooperative effort needed to solve terrestrial problems.

The United States has the experience of the moon landing and the advanced technology, the Soviet Union has the expertise of having put men in space for the lengthy periods of time necessary for interplanetary travel, and the United Nations could work out the administration involved in such a joint operation. The UN is the ideal vehicle for the international project, in that it has an extensive background in international, technical, administrative and diplomatic coordination.

Travel to the fourth planet and a safe return is both ambitious and expensive, but a small fraction of each country's defense budget is little to ask for the immense return of scientific data and Soviet-American cooperation. Should the United Nations operate the mission to Mars, it would both re-awaken the global public's interest in the UN, but quite possibly improve the United States' involvement in the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization. Once the nations know how to effectively work together in pursuit of a specific and common goal, the prospect of peace on earth is far more likely to be reached.

In the final eighth of the 20th century, the United Nations is still a continuing concern to all the world's nations. The ominous shadows of hunger, overpopulation, environmental decay, and a Third World War loom around all of us on our green planet, and the United Nations is the major vessel for international dialogue and negotiation to solve these and other problems. Its future existence and operation are vital. The role of the UN in global affairs is bound to increase with the increase in the number of countries, world citizens, and nuclear weapons.

The year 2000 holds three possibilities. The first is failure of the United Nations to maintain peace, with nations at war or destroyed in a nuclear holocaust. The second is the lack of progress, with hunger and a fragile balance of nuclear warheads still endangering the world. The third alternative represents a successful United Nations, with all the world's countries and the world's people working together to solve the problems of their time, possibly on two planets.

In a best case scenario, the number of nuclear warheads would be dropping, or even zero; the population would be steady, with food and shelter for all. For the present, though, looking toward the year 2,000, it is the job of the United Nations, its members, and their citizens, to work toward that third possibility — a peaceful world in the 21st century.

## Memorial Day observed on traditional day

Much to the liking of area veterans, Memorial Day was observed in St. Johns on the traditional day — May 30 — this year.

"That's the day," says St. Johns World War II veteran John Caudy. "That's the day all us vets think it should be on."

Local Disabled Americans Veterans Commander George Gavenda echoed that thought.

"That was the day," he said. "And we just want to keep it that way."

"We don't see any reason to change it just so someone can get an extra day off from work," said another St. Johns veteran.

Caudy said the fact that Memorial Day was observed here on May 30 — the traditional date of the holiday before the legislature changed it several years ago to create a three-day weekend — may have contributed to healthy turnout for the observances this year.

The fact that St. Johns was closely touched by the Iraqi attack on the USS Stark may have also contributed. Joseph Watson, the husband of St. Johns High School graduate Kristen Watson, was one of 37 sailors killed in that attack.

Kristen Watson is the daughter of Don and Joan Valentine, of St. Johns. A memorial service for Mr. Watson was held in St. Johns on Thursday.

The new monument installed in Mt. Rest Cemetery and dedicated last Memorial Day to veterans of all wars may have also contributed. Caudy said he had heard several positive comments about the monument.

## County collects twice the average in child support for ADC parents

Clinton County collects nearly twice as much as the state average in child support owed to parents who receive Aid to Dependent Children, said George Eberhard, director of the Clinton County Department of Social Services.

"I personally feel very strongly that child support

is an area that we should make every effort to enforce," Eberhard told Clinton County commissioners while presenting his annual departmental report for 1986.

Clinton County collected an average \$992 per ADC case in 1986 compared to a state average of \$558.43,

the report said.

The DSS, the prosecuting attorney and the friend of the court work together on the collections, the report states.

The report also said:

- The number of people receiving some DSS aid — ADC, general assistance, emergency help or food

- stamps — decreased from an average of 2818 to 2760
- The average number of ADC cases increased from 598 to 605.
- The average number of general assistance cases decreased from 211 to 188.
- 4.9 percent of the county population is receiving some kind of assistance.

## Family focus Storing clothing

Hurray! It's time to pack away your winter clothes and enjoy the warm weather. In your enthusiasm to shed heavy winter garments, don't lose sight of the fact that how you store your cold weather clothes now will determine what shape they will be in next winter.

Even if the garment looks clean, it should still be laundered or dry-cleaned before you put it away. The clothes may be soiled with body oil or unnoticed spills that will cause spotty yellow discolorations if you store the items without cleaning.

Another threat comes from moths, silverfish and crickets. These insects are attracted to clothes that have food, perspiration or other organic matter left on them.

Many people think insects prefer to munch on wool, but soiled synthetics also provide a mealtime haven for these pests.

If possible, press freshly laundered garments before storing them. Wrinkles in permanent press fabrics may become permanent if the crumpled garments are stored for several months.

Don't use starch on clothes destined for storage. Starch is appealing to insects.

When cleaning your garments, be sure to follow the manufacturer's instructions.

Use moth crystals or flakes in the container or closet where clothing will be stored. The vapor must

be fairly concentrated to kill the larvae, so your trunks, chests, boxes and garment bags should be airtight. Clothes can also be stored in mothproof plastic bags obtained from the drycleaner.

No-pest strips are also useful in closed chests or closets. They have a less noticeable odor than crystals or flakes. Use no-pest strips according to label directions for dosage and legal use. Avoid contact with the product's resin. Wash hands thoroughly if you inadvertently touch the resin.

Cedar chests and closets probably offer good protection if they can be tightly closed. Don't depend on a cedar chest or closet to protect clothes longer than one or two years. Only fresh cedar oil will kill insect pest larvae. Bags of cedar chips may release a pleasant fragrance, but they do little to keep insects away from clothes.

Storing clothes in a closet that is opened frequently will provide little protection.

## Financial Focus Insider trading

These days, it seems every time you tune into the news, you hear about "insiders" or "insider trading." To understand insider news, it's important to know exactly what it is and how it may, or may not, affect you.

An "insider" is a person who has access to key information about a company before that information becomes public knowledge. Traditionally, the term "insider" refers to a director, officer or key employee of a company. In recent years, however, the term has been legally extended to include relatives and others who could have access to or who could benefit from non-public news of the company. This non-public news is called "inside information."

For example, the officers of a firm generally know in advance if their company is being taken over or if the earnings of the company will be significantly different from previous reports. In such cases, these "insiders," by using information not yet available to the public, could benefit by either buying or selling their company stock in the open market. For this reason, the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) forbids such trading by an insider and levies severe fines and penalties against anyone who violates these rules. It's for this reason that the purchase or sale of securities by insiders must be reported to the SEC. It then becomes public information and is released in an insider trading report.

Armed with this information, investors often begin to draw conclusions, some of which are incorrect and lead to investment errors. An example of such sketchy information appeared some time ago in an editorial regarding the sale of 2,000 shares of stock by an officer of a major corporation. This was insider trading and was properly reported by the company.

The editorial, however, either stated or implied that company officer was selling in anticipation of a slump in company sales, earning or the like. Using only this information, a shareholder of this company may have been inclined to sell. "After all," he could conclude, "the insiders are selling." But, as Paul Harvey says, now for the rest of the story.

Six months earlier, this officer bought more than twice that number of shares by exercising stock options. Company officers typically sell shares six months after exercising stock options to cover their tax liabilities. In this case, that's exactly what happened. The net effect was that the officer actually increased his holdings by ten percent.

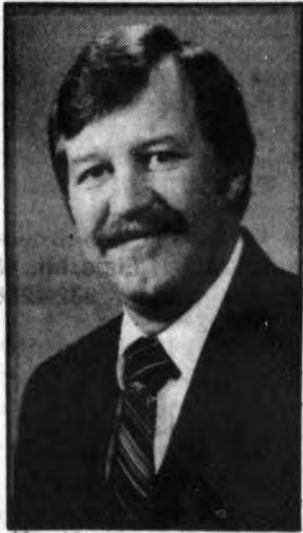
In an official reply, the company further pointed out that for the same period referenced in the article, other officers and directors similarly bought and sold their company stock with an overall net result of 30,000 more shares bought than sold.

Once all the facts were reported, they were almost directly opposite of those which first appeared. As this example clearly shows, major investment decisions made entirely on partial or immediate insider reports can prove hasty and ill-advised.

Teacher Scholarships. The scholarships, awarded to 81 Michigan students this year, is worth \$5,000 per year and is renewable for up to four years.

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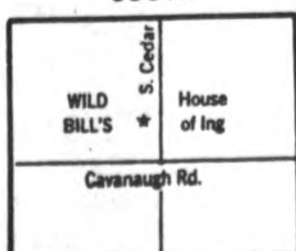

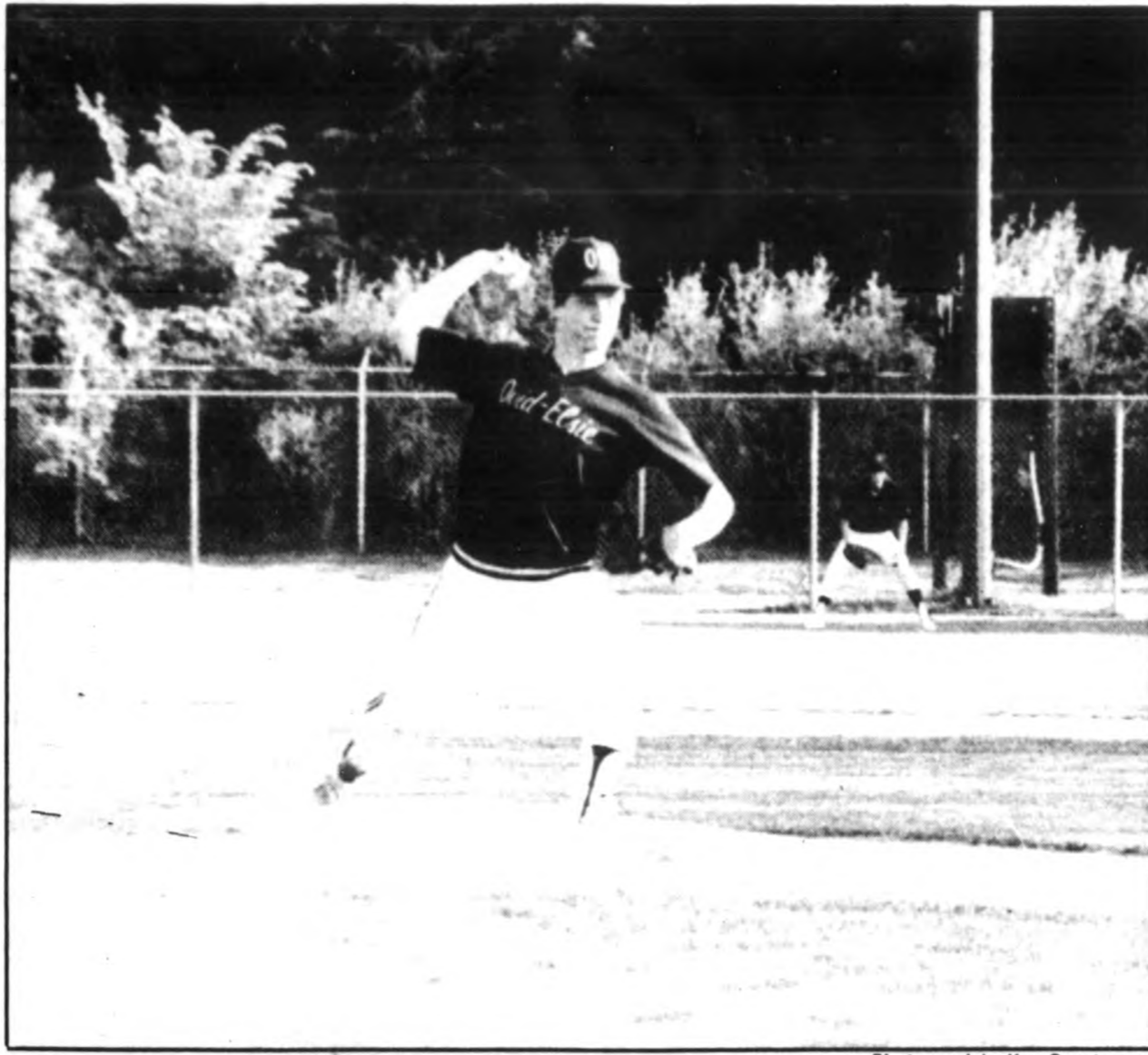
The extra eighth inning saw Vestaburg score the run they needed to get the win.

AN ORDINANCE TO VACATE AN EASEMENT RIGHT-OF-WAY WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS, MICHIGAN.

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




## Feed check scheduled for June 12

The Cooperative Extension Service will hold a nutrition check day on June 12 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Ken and Larry Nobis Farm, located northwest of St. Johns at 5813 W. Walker Road.

According to the Extension Service, alfalfa stands will not be yielding the optimum tonnage this season and hay won't yield the nutrients livestock producers are accustomed to harvesting. Grassier

stands and weevil damage will both cut into the protein content of hay. In order to realize production typically received, forages will need to be tested and rations analyzed. The nutrition check day

will provide an opportunity for livestock producers to have testing done. There is no charge for the program, but reservations for time slots must be made in advance. To reserve a time, call the Extension Service at 224-5240 by June 8.

## Full crop loss compensation OK'd

President Ronald Reagan has signed into law a bill that will allow farmers full compensation for crops lost in droughts and floods last year, announced U.S. Rep. Bill Schuette last week.

An amendment offered by Schuette to the Farm Disaster Act of 1987 would provide farmers with additional compensation for eligible crop losses. The Congress will still have to appropriate funds for the

program. The legislation also establishes a program for wheat farmers who were unable to plant as result of excessive rains. "Last week I had written to Secretary of Agriculture

Richard Lyng and to President Reagan urging the president to sign this bill," said Schuette. "I am extremely pleased that the president has in fact signed the bill, realizing the importance of disaster relief for our farmers."

### Oil leases

Oil and gas leasing activity is on the up-swing in Michigan and recently we have seen a lot of activity in Clinton County. The oil companies' landmen are shrewd business men, putting most landowners at a disadvantage when negotiating terms for sizemographing and/or drawing up a lease for oil or gas pumping rights.

Presently, the companies are doing sizemographing. This process is required to see if there is oil or gas potential on that land. This process can be quite damaging to growing crops and potentially damaging to tile lines. You should not let them do this without paying. People have negotiated up to \$10/rod. Be certain that you indicate where they are and keep away from them.

When drawing up a lease there are seven key thoughts to keep in mind.

1. Read a lease out loud, paragraph by paragraph, with all parties involved present.
2. Don't be in a hurry to sign; don't be pressured into an agreement.
3. Never sign something you don't understand.
4. There is no "standard" lease form; each is an individual contract.
5. All provisions of a lease are negotiable within reason.
6. "Landowners in areas considered 'hot' will have

more negotiating power than landowners in areas with unproven reserves" (1)

7. Take time to talk to neighbors considering, or under, a lease to compare your offer with the terms that they have negotiated.

Gaining as much knowledge as possible on the subject will make you a better negotiator. We have a lot of current information at the Cooperative Extension Office on this topic as well as contacts with key resource people. Some bulletins available at the Cooperative Extension Service are:

### Insect problems

By Giles Roehl



**Seed Corn Maggot** — The seed corn maggot is a special threat to any crops being planted at this time of year, especially to dry beans. The maggot has already had one generation of increase so they are out in numbers to attack the seed in the ground. The maggot cannot be controlled after they enter the seed. Several products applied to the seed together with a fungicide or applied as a seed box treatment will protect the seed from the maggot. The soil insecticides will also control the maggot but may be more expensive than seed treatments.

Slow germination of the seed increases risk of maggot damage, since some low vigor seed will be planted this season. While all bean seed should be treated, growers using questionable seed should definitely treat the seed for maggot control.

**Alfalfa weevil** — If you haven't checked, do so now as the weevil is really working the alfalfa fields, on what alfalfa is left that is.

When weevils are found you have several choices. First, if you intend to cut it within the next week, control may not pay. However, once the alfalfa is cut you need to watch for weevil in the regrowth. If 1/2 or more of the small plants show weevil damage plan a treatment program.

If you cannot cut and the weevils are eating their way through the field, apply a recommended spray in the evening whenever practical. Full coverage is not required, one gallon or ten gallons of spray per acre with ground equipment is sufficient. (Specific chemical names are used for educational purposes only).

**Alfalfa blooms** — You often hear of harvest recommendations for alfalfa being made according to "bloom stages" (e.g. ten percent, 20 percent, 50 percent bloom, etc.). To determine the bloom stage of alfalfa, randomly select 10 stems at several locations in the field. Count the number of stems in 10 which have one or more flowers open. If only one stem out of 10 has one or more flowers open, the crop is at 10 per-

cent bloom; two stems out of 10 is 20 percent bloom; five stems out of 10 is 50 percent bloom; and 10 stems out of 10 is 100 percent or full bloom.

The recommended average stage of harvest for alfalfa is 10 percent bloom stage. If you merely look at an alfalfa field from afar (like through the windshield of a pickup) by the time you have seen any purple color you are past the 10 percent bloom stage. If you want to "catch" the crop at the proper stage for harvest, you must walk fields and follow the procedure described above for determining bloom stages. If you have much alfalfa acreage to harvest, you must start well before the bloom stage so your average stage will be ten percent bloom.
