## Fourth of July events begin today



St. Johns will begin celebrating the Fourth of July today as the Schmidt Amusement Company of Standish opens its carnival in the St. Johns High School Parking lot.

Following the barbeque there will be a fireworks display at the Leonard Elementary School.

## AIDS: Health Department pilots education plan

In early July every home in Clinton County will be mailed a booklet of information about how parents can protect themselves and their children from AIDS.

"We going to have deaths from AIDS," said Joe Latoff, director of the Mid-Michigan District Health Department. "We are trying to minimize those deaths."

The first section of six-page booklet contains information about the three stages of AIDS infection, how it is transmitted, and how infection can be prevented. The second section of the booklet contains a number of tips for educating children about AIDS.

Latoff said the information is all factual. Parents can draw upon the information without compromising their right to teach their children their own value system, he said.

"Each family has its own value system," he said. "They tend not to appreciate some institution coming in with some other value system."

THE BOOKLET, officially called a

"Home Teaching Module," was funded by the Northern Health Foundation, an association of eight health departments in Michigan. The cost of publishing and mailing the booklet to 40,000 homes in Clinton, Montcalm and Gratiot counties will be \$20,000, said Gerald Chafe, president of the Northern Health Foundation.

The AIDS booklet is the first in a series of home teaching modules the health department intends to publish. Included in the booklet is a brief survey asking parents their opinion of the information and for ideas about what topics future modules should address.

Latoff said the idea of publishing the AIDS home teaching module was born last fall when health department staff began talking about AIDS education. Because AIDS infection can be prevented by avoiding certain behaviors, education is the front line of defense against its spread.

After interviewing a number of health professionals and parents from 40 different families, Latoff

said, he became convinced that many parents desire to inform their children about health risks such as AIDS but feel hampered by a lack of facts.

ON JULY 13 the health department will present its home teaching module to the Michigan Association for Local Public Health. That organization is expected to seek legislative support for an \$11 million state-wide AIDS education, testing and counseling program, said Health Officer Kent L. Gray.

Gray said the proposal will ask that the funds go directly to the association instead to the Michigan Department of Public Health. Asked whether that funding scenario might lead to a conflict with the state public health department, Gray said, "That's a definite possibility, but maybe it's time that happened."

He said 22 percent of the state health department's funding is used for administrative overhead compared to eight percent for the local health department association.

## Schools face deficit in 1988-89

St. Johns Public Schools face a \$1 million deficit in two years, school administrators said last week.

"We are going to be in need of millage," said Supt. Steve Bakita. "I don't want to alarm anyone but it is a concern of mine."

Expenditures in the 1987-88 budget adopted June 22 by the Board of Education will require using an estimated \$738,405 of the fund equity, the "savings" of the school district.

That will leave a fund equity of only \$95,658 at the end of the school year.

The fund equity is expected be depleted even further by the cost of borrowing approximately \$3.2 million to cover a cash flow shortage until the tax collection this winter. Although the district borrows almost every year in anticipation of the tax collection, the amount borrowed this year will be greater because the district is using up its fund equity,

said Bakita.

Interest on the loan could use up another \$75,000 of the fund equity, he said.

The school board is expected to approve borrowing the money at its July 6 meeting.

Expenditures are expected to rise about \$750,000 for the 1988-89 budget year but there will be no fund equity available to balance the budget, said Bakita. Even if there is a slight increase in state aid, the district could face a \$1 million deficit, he said.

"I don't know where that money is going to come from," he said.

Unknown factors that could impact on the finances of the school district are student enrollment in coming years, the level of state funding of schools, and the report of a commission in Lansing that is looking for ways to reform school financing. The commission is expected to release its findings late this fall.

AFTER adopting the 1987-88 budget, the board set the tax levy for the year at 35 mills. Asst. Supt. Gordon Vandemark said the 1.75 mills levied for debt service will probably rise to 1.8 or 2 mills next year in response to declining state land values in the school district.

## Sex education policy adopted as proposed

The St. Johns Board of Education, after listening to a last minute plea by residents who want birth control information included in the school curriculum, adopted a sex education policy that prohibits teaching birth control methods other than chastity.

Board member Kevin Kirk spoke in favor of changing the policy to include birth control information in the curriculum and cast the only vote against adoption. Voting to adopt the policy were Neil Barnhart, Jeanette Adams, Gary Whitford, Robert Craig, James Parr and Thomas Irer.

"I feel this is a good policy," said Craig, who served with Adams and Parr on the board committee that presented the final version of the policy to the whole board. "Let's give it a chance to work and evaluate it after a year."

Other board members noted the policy does allow qualified teachers, counselors or school nurses to provide birth control information to students on an individual basis.

AMONG those who argued in favor of revising the policy to include birth control information in the curriculum was former school board member Eugene Livingston. He said: "The truth does not corrupt, only the lack of it...Think what it would be like to have to make a decision with only half the facts available to you. You would not have a lot of credibility in the people presenting the facts."

Joe Latoff, director of the Mid-

Michigan District Health Department, called the sex education policy inadequate and said the majority of parents in the school district support birth control information in the curriculum.

Joyce Caulkins, whom the board had earlier congratulated for having been named St. Johns Teacher of the Year, said most of the students who ask for extra information are already in some kind of trouble. She said discussion at school can act as a spring board for discussion in the home.

"They already know that anyway," she said of birth control. "What they don't know are the consequences."

St. Johns physician Roger Annis said doctors see the medical effects of ignorance. He also said there are 18-year-olds getting married who have not learned birth control and disease prevention.

Several other residents spoke in favor of changing the policy, including Richard Lehnert, who begins a four-year term on the board in July.

One resident, Tom Moldenhauer, of St. Johns, said he supports the policy as written. He said at least half the participants of a recent sex education policy workshop did not want birth control information in the curriculum.

Kevin Kirk, who cast the dissenting vote, said he had been impressed by the amount of parental support for birth control information in the curriculum. He said many parents find it difficult to discuss the topic with their children.

### 'They have sown the wind and they shall reap the whirlwind'

To the Editor:

I would like to respond to the many who believe birth control for our students is an answer to our problems concerning teen pregnancy and AIDS. There are those of us who oppose this stand and I hope to be able to explain some of our views.

We are not blind to the problems associated with teenage or pre-marital sex. There are many who have been there who still do not promote birth control information in the classroom. Some people must think we're super-puritans out of touch with reality and the problems because we've never "been there." But that is not true.

There are those who are concerned about teenage pregnancy and AIDS and less concerned about the self-concept and self-respect kids lack when they engage in sexual relations. Of course, the consequences of pregnancy or disease are a lot more noticeable (and fearful) than someone's self-image. But "down the road" the lack of discipline and respect will take their toll. The whole thing behind pre-marital sex is the attitude of selfishness.

We are headed for a generation of undisciplined kids who have no standards and no concern for right or wrong. We are hastening the process when we start passing out contraceptives to those who are "going to do

it anyway." This poses temptation to those who aren't sure if they "want to do it anyway." Some will reason, "Why try so hard to stay pure if there's a 'safe' way to have sex and release these sexual feelings?" I happen to know peer pressure is real and powerful and it does account as a source for decision making. (This battle alone to put birth control into schools is a result of pressure. "Others are doing it, maybe we should too.")

People are emotionally scarred for life because of promiscuity. They are searching for love and stability and those in authority are giving them "safe sex" as a pat answer. It isn't at all safe emotionally and it isn't 100 percent safe physically. AIDS will flourish because condoms are not fail-safe (besides who can be sure every kid who has one will use it?) This type of thinking is like slapping a band-aid over a cancerous wound. There will still be pregnancy and disease passed around. Not to mention the rise in teen depression and suicides when the instability reaches its peak in many of these young lives.

The sex ed policy the school board has approved does leave room for those who want birth control to be able to get the information they need. It is not taught in the

classroom but is given on a personal basis. Argument against this is that it requires a student to approach a teacher or counselor for help and this may discourage them. Hey, these kids have to be responsible for something and if they are interested enough to play it "safe," they'll be interested enough to get the information they need. For pete's sake, enough of them know how to get their drugs and their booze, they can surely get their condoms!

We don't have to lessen the virtue of chastity in the classroom with "however, if you don't want to — use this." Our highest goal should be to stress how much happier, fulfilling, and carefree life is when we love ourselves and others enough to say, "No, I'd rather not chance the consequences." How much more of a bright future all of us would have as families and as a nation if we lived lives led by discipline, self-control, and high goals. If we stay on the road we are on I fear for my kids and for their kids.

Like Hosea said in the Old Testament: "They have sown the wind and they shall reap the whirlwind."

## Fowler school budget increases six percent

The \$2,015,456 proposed 1987-88 budget for Fowler Public Schools includes a six percent growth in expenditures compared to the previous year.

That does not include \$43,000 earmarked for maintenance and repair of school property. That money was generated by a one mill levy approved by voters last month.

The budget includes one fewer teaching position, said Supt. Mary Ann Chartrand. She said the staff reduction was the result of declining enrollment.

Three new classes will be offered at the high school, she said. They are

Computer II, Basic Home Maintenance, and Speech.

At the end of the fiscal year the district will have an estimated cash fund equity of \$76,000, said Chartrand.

"We've been going into our fund equity for three years now," she said. However, Chartrand said, the district hopes to "maintain where we are because we did have a good millage increase."

The Fowler Board of Education will hold a public hearing on the budget on Monday, July 6. The hearing will be held in Room 102 of the Waldron School.

## DeWitt woman raped; Lansing man arrested

A Lansing man accused of hiding in the house of a rural DeWitt woman and raping her when she returned home is lodged in the Clinton County Jail awaiting preliminary examination.

Martin Gerard Quinn, 30, of 4059 Woodbridge, Lansing, was arraigned Friday before 65th District Court Judge Jeffrey Martlew on a charge of first degree criminal sexual conduct. Martlew set bond at \$1 million.

The offense carries a maximum penalty of life imprisonment.

Clinton County Detective Sgt. Don Kennell said Quinn allegedly broke into the woman's rural DeWitt home. When the woman returned home, Quinn allegedly jumped her, bound and gagged her, and raped her.

Kennell said Quinn's car was parked a quarter of a mile away. When

Quinn returned to his car he found Clinton County Deputy Sheriff John Imeson there. Quinn told the deputy that his car had broken down, said Kennell.

The victim then pulled up in her own car and accused Quinn of assaulting her. The deputy then arrested Quinn.

The woman, in her early 20s, did not know Quinn, said County Prosecuting Attorney Jon Newman.

At his arraignment, Quinn told the court he had been convicted in 1982 of attempted larceny of an automobile. Newman told the court Quinn was diverted 10 years ago under the Holmes Youthful Trainee Act after being accused of assaulting a woman at Michigan State University.

Preliminary examination is set for July 7 at 9 a.m.

## St. Johns OKs rezoning

St. Johns City Commissioners on June 22 approved the rezoning of the Central School property from municipal to high density residential.

The change was necessary for St. Johns developer Mark Barber to move ahead with his plans to convert the old school building into luxury condominiums. He purchased the property from the school district earlier this year.

Commissioners also approved the rezoning of a

section of property at 904 E. Sturgis. Ransom Briggs had requested the rezoning from commercial to high density residential in connection with an apartment building he is building on the property.

### IN OTHER action:

City Commissioners set up a committee to negotiate a new lease with the St. Johns Public Schools for the football and track fields. The property is owned by the City and leased to the school district.

City commissioners approved making two temporary traffic control orders permanent. One order limits parking on East Railroad Street to two hours. The other prohibits truck traffic on Steel Street from the Federal Mogul plant to US-27.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TITLE V, ZONING AND PLANNING, CHAPTER 51, KNOWN AS THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS, TO CHANGE CERTAIN ZONING CLASSIFICATIONS AS SET FORTH HEREIN FROM ITS PRESENT "GC" GENERAL COMMERCIAL TO "R-3", HIGH DENSITY RESIDENTIAL.

THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

That the Zoning Ordinance of the City of St. Johns, and the Zoning Map of the City of St. Johns forming a part thereof, shall be amended in the following respects:

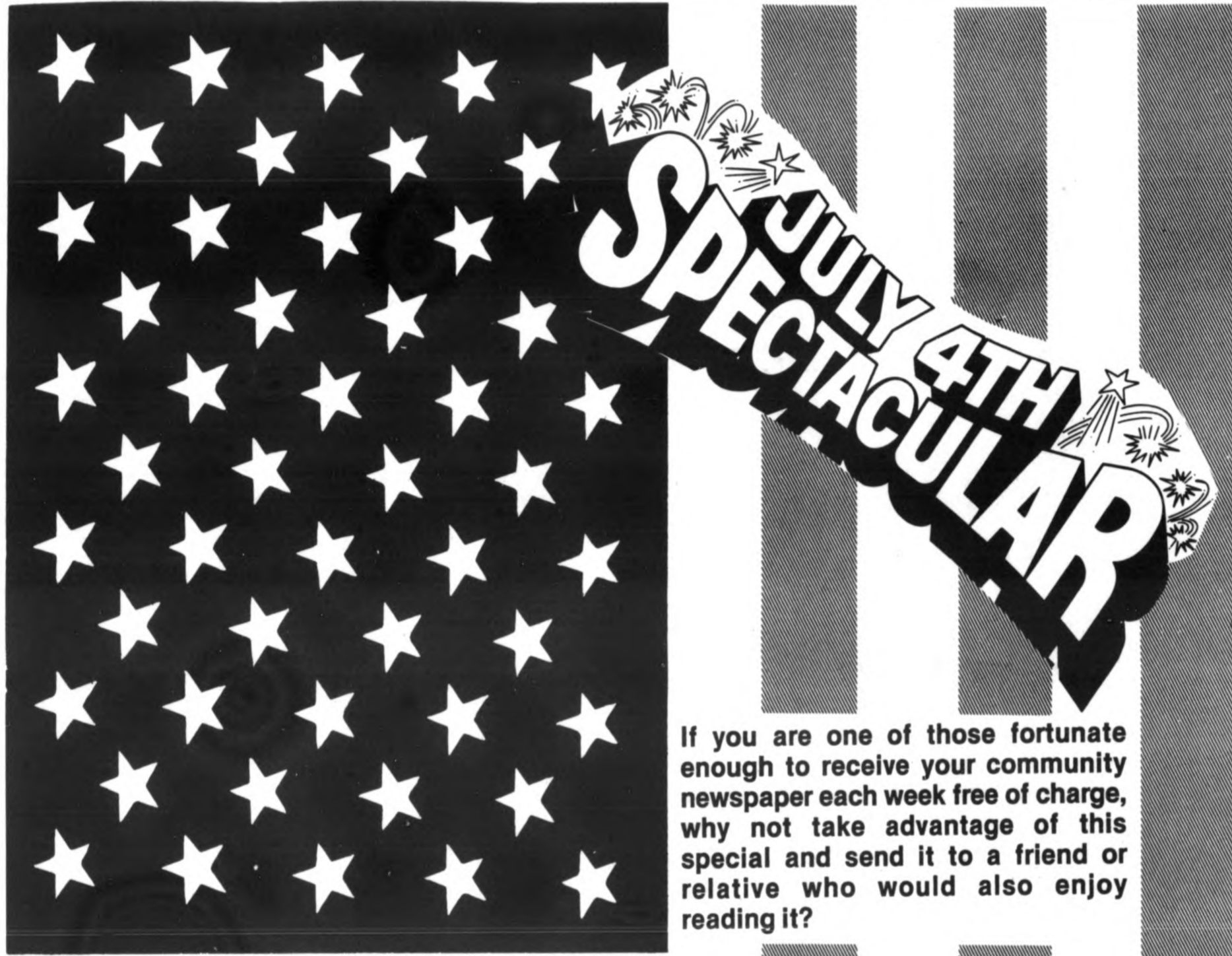

Terrell expects the trip to be fun. The race will take up one day of a several day trip and she plans to get some sightseeing and touring in as well.

"I don't think it's going to be as much pressure for me," she says. "It's just a honor to be able to go. I'm sure I'll be nervous the day of the race."

**WHAT MOTIVATES** a successful long distance runner? What keeps her going when the lungs begin to burn, when the legs become lead weights?

Terrell shrugs. "Competition mostly, I guess," she says.

Give her a close race. Someone on her heels or a few steps in front of her is just the challenge Terrell enjoys.

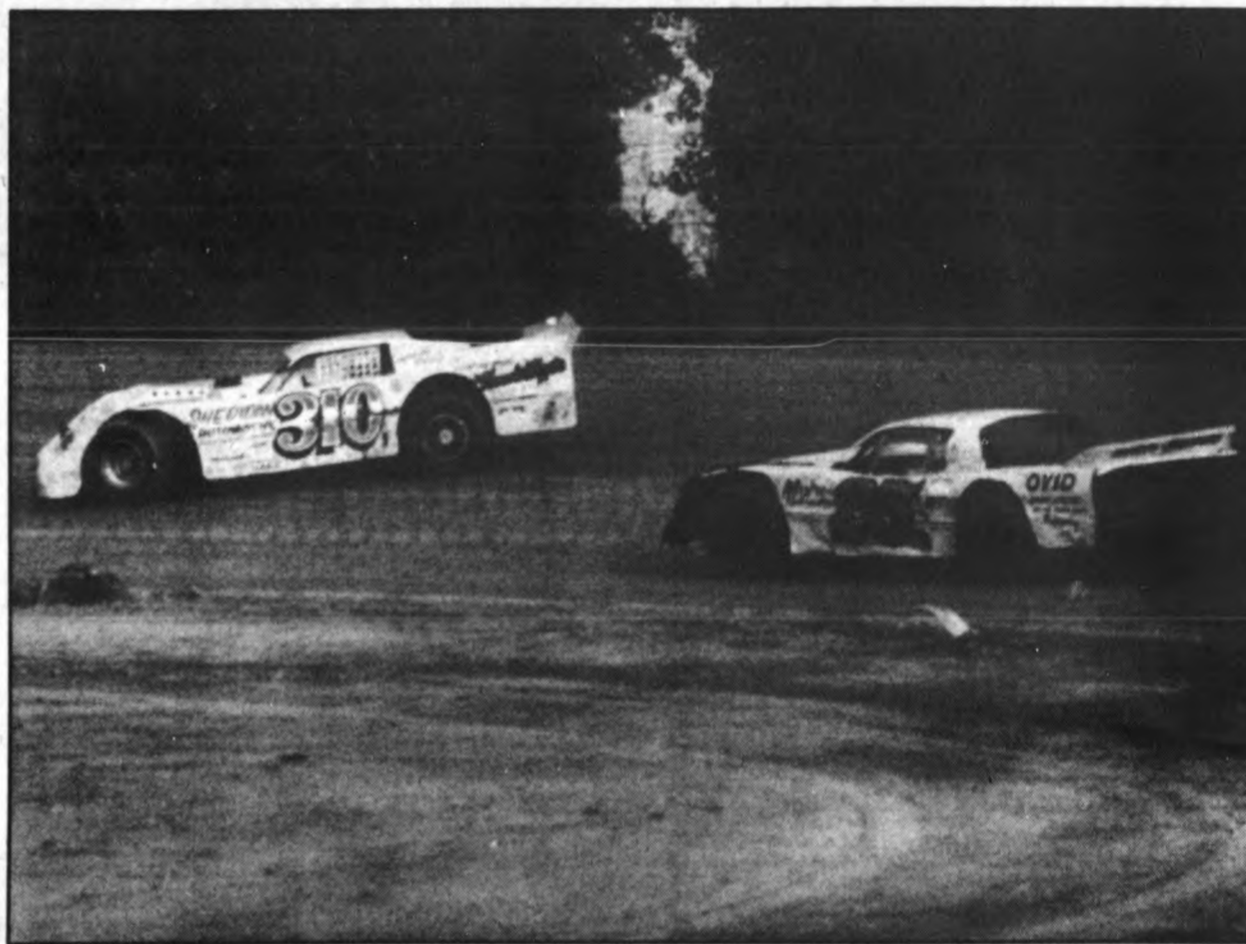
"I just try to run the best I can on that day," she says. "Mostly you'll get your better times when there's someone there with you."

## Off road drivers need special permit

Michigan residents and outstate residents who drive an off-road-vehicle (ORV) over Michigan's 1,600 miles of groomed ORV trails, are required to register and obtain an ORV permit from the state for their vehicle.

An ORV is described as a motor vehicle used in off-road travel and includes such vehicles as four-wheel drive vehicles, three and four-wheel all-terrain-vehicles (ATV), trail motorcycles and amphibious and air-cushioned vehicles.

Michigan residents must register at their local secretary of state office. The resident registration fee is \$9 and is valid for three years.

**Record number of deer taken**

A record 192,000 deer were estimated to have been taken during the 1986 firearm deer season, including a record buck harvest of 147,000, making it the most successful season in the history of Michigan deer hunting.

The preliminary figures were announced by the Dept. of Natural Resources (DNR).

A comparison of 1985 and 1986 firearm deer harvest shows a 12 percent drop in the Upper Peninsula harvest between the two years. Last winter's severity contributed to a loss of nearly 100,000 deer in the U.P., mostly to malnutrition.

A 15 percent increase in deer harvested in the southern Lower Peninsula was due primarily to improved deer habitat, high productivity, and minimal winter losses.

A number of conditions figured in the year's record harvest including: mild temperatures throughout the 15-day season, extending the hunter's time afield; good tracking snow throughout much of northern Michigan; availability of a second firearm deer license; standing corn left unharvested because of excessive rain/snow

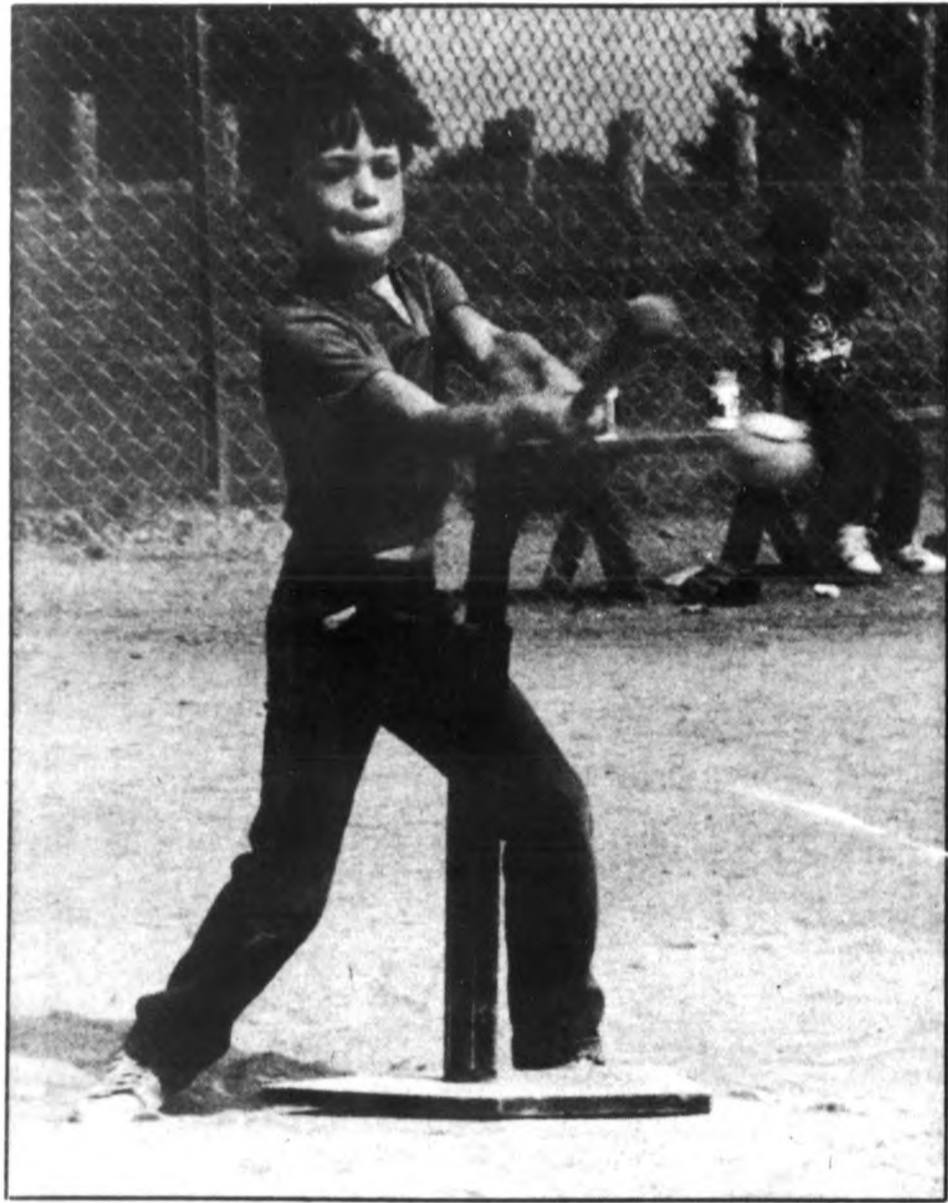

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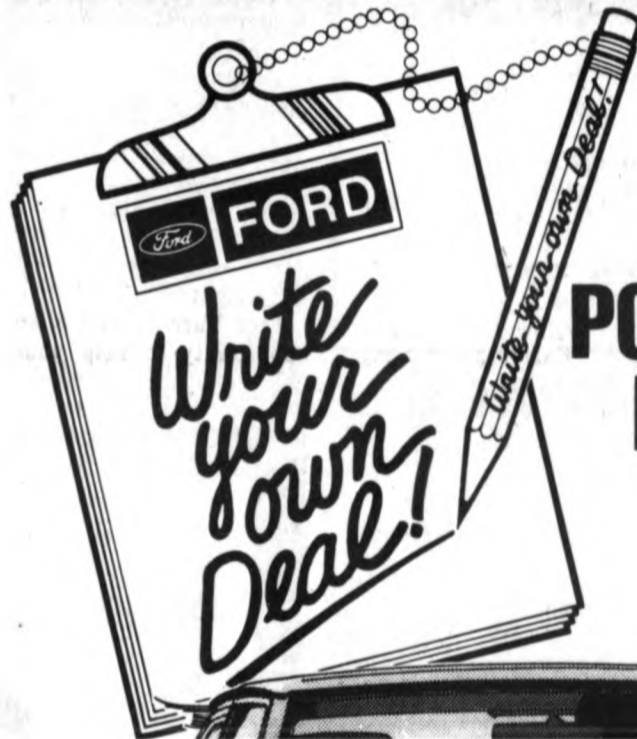
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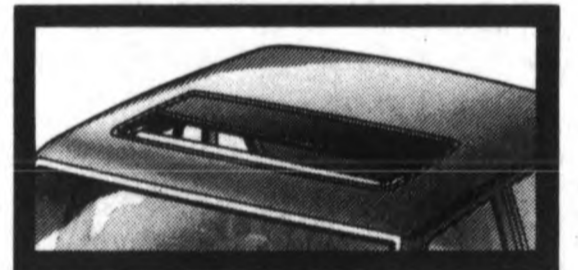

## Farm Credit Services offers money-back land guarantee

Farmers and ranchers buying land from Farm Credit Services in the next 10 weeks will get a money-back guarantee with their purchase under Land Values Guaranteed, a new program announced by the Farm Credit Services of Mid-Michigan June 17. The new program, which features no interest payment until Jan. 1, 1988, will only be available to qualified members of the lending cooperative for the first month. After that, it will be opened up to other farmers and ranchers.

"Nearly 6,000 acres of farm land in the nine-county Mid-Michigan area are available for sale," says Jim Bremer, president of FCS of Mid-Michigan.

The offer is available until July 20 to members who are current in their loan payments. It will then be expanded to other farmers and ranchers through Sept. 7. Information is available at local Farm Credit branch offices on the available acreage, or call the Acquired Property Department in Lansing at 372-5404.

Bremer reports: "This new program is designed to increase interest in buying farm land by removing the risk of further land value decreases, and Farm Credit is guaranteeing buyer satisfaction in the land for sale. At the time of the purchase, buyers will pick a date in the future, three, four, or five years down the road, when they can reconsider their purchase. If they change their minds,

we will rescind the sale and return their downpayments and any principal payments they have made."

The downpayments and principal payments will be placed in a special escrow account until the reconsideration option has passed. This ensures buyers the money will be available if they want to exercise their operation to rescind the purchase agreement.

In addition to the money-back guarantee, the qualified buyer will be offered a land contract with a fixed rate of interest of 9 percent for up to seven years. The contract will be amortized at the top 25 years and require a downpayment as low as 20 percent. As an added incentive, no interest will be charged on the purchase until Jan. 1, 1988.

Land Values Guaranteed is the second major effort by the Seventh District to reduce its inventory of acquired property. An earlier program focused on attractive interest rates and intensive advertising of available land. This program will also focus on rates and the available land but its strongest attraction will lay with the guarantee it offers prospective buyers.

Says Doyle Dingman, acquirp property manager at FCS of Mid-Michigan: "Over 1,300 inquiries were received during the first program. Three thousand acres were sold, with more than 80 percent of those sales to local farmers. This took care of half of our property, but we have received some new property back with or re-

cent loan restructuring blitz. Consequently, we are looking forward to this second program!"

Bremer says: "With Land Values Guaranteed, we are giving our members and other farmers a safety net. And, offering it to members first is our way of saying thanks for staying with us and remaining current on their loans."

Farm Credit Services says its goal is not only to sell land but to stabilize and strengthen the land markets and keep the land moving into the hands of owner-operators who will support the local rural communities. That is why this program is for renters who are ready to buy their own farm or for the established farmer who wants to expand.

The first stop will be Mike Kirnovic's Dairy Farm. The Kirnovic Dairy Farm offers a look at a modern dairy facility typical of many Michigan dairy farms. As we travel to our next stop we will pass the Michigan Milk Plant in Ovid. You will see large silos used for holding milk prior to processing into dry milk and butter.

The next stop is an ultra modern dairy facility — Green Meadow Farms is a family farm with 1,500 milk cows. The high tech facility has the capacity to milk 32 cows at one time. You can observe this process from a deck overlooking the milking parlor.

Traveling back to St. Johns, we will pass the oldest settlement in Clinton County as well as some typical Clinton County cash crops from mint to corn and soybeans. Once back in St. Johns, we will tour the Coun-

tryMark grain elevator, the marketing point for many of the cash crops grown in the county.

Back on the buses for the final leg of the tour, you will return to the city park and be dropped off at the County Youth Fair. As you walk through the fairgrounds to return to your car, you can help yourself to a glass of cold milk and a sandwich, compliments of the Clinton County Dairy Tour Planning Committee, Clinton County Young Farmers and many area businesses. Enjoy your meals as you walk through the many livestock exhibits and commercial displays at the County Fair.

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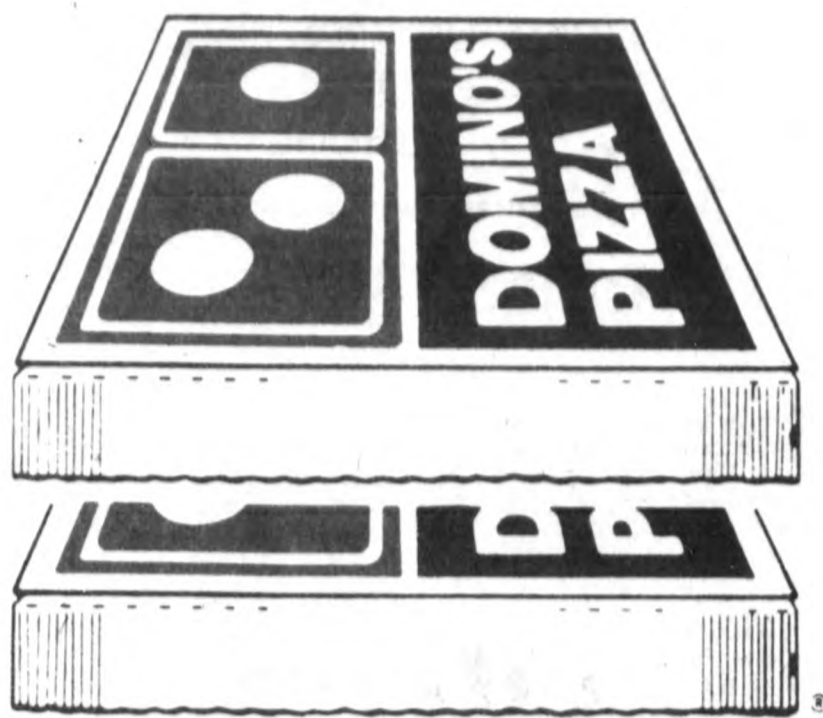
