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50th Birthday

4-H Youth Fair begins

Once again, as they have for the past 50 years, 4-H members from all over the county will gather next week for the Clinton County 4-H Youth Fair.

In honor of the fair's 50th birthday, there will be an opening night birthday party at 8 p.m. on the fair stage at the fairgrounds. The fairgrounds are located next to the St. Johns City Park.

At the party, former 4-H directors, leaders, members and exhibitors will be recognized, the River City Boys will perform and numerous displays of early fair exhibits will be viewed.

Another special event included in this year's fair is the Sesquicentennial Farm Tour on Wednesday, Aug. 5. Tour buses will leave the parking lot at the St. Johns High School every half hour from 2 p.m. until 6:30 p.m.

The tour will include the Kirnovic Dairy Farm and Green Meadow Farms, a modern dairy operation with 1,500 milk cows. Heading back to St. Johns, the tour will pass through Clinton County's oldest settlement and past typical cashcrop farms.

And the winner is...Denise Egres! Twelve candidates for the title of 1987 St. Johns Mint Queen performed Saturday in the St. Johns High School auditorium before an audience that continually fanned themselves with programs in an attempt to keep cool.

The candidates' high energy jazz dance routine, choreographed by Melanie Humphrey of Melanie's Dance-X-Ercise in St. Johns, was followed some 20 minutes later by an "After Five" presentation featuring formal gowns.

Masters of Ceremonies Brandon and Annette White remarked on the difficulties inherent in having 12 young women change from dance costume to formal wear in a short period of time with only one available bathroom.

WHEN IT was all over the four judges — Robert Hoover, general manager of Coldwell-Banker-Simon Real Estate; Steve Corlett, of WLNZ

Radio Station; Marilee Powell, a jazzercise instructor from DeWitt; and Elouise Harris, the 1936 St. Johns Mint Queen — had chosen 17-year-old Denise Egres to represent St. Johns as the 1987 Mint Queen.

First farm in county honored for 150 years

The Victor J. Clark farm at 10785 Clark Road, Eagle, has been in the Clark family a long time — 152 years, to be exact — which gives it the distinction of being the oldest single family farm in Clinton County.

Jonas Clark obtained the 80-acre parcel as a land grant from the U.S. government in 1834, during the presidency of Andrew Jackson. The neat farmhouse, much remodeled and modernized over the years, was built in 1848.

The farm was officially proclaimed a Sesquicentennial Farm on July 20. For the ceremony, Victor Clark was

joined by his brothers Stanley and Leon and sister-in-law Genevieve Spitzley Clark, along with a number of their children, grandchildren, relatives and friends.

Ev Beemer, Consumers Power Company district manager, presented the family a Sesquicentennial Farm plaque to be displayed along with the Centennial Farm sign already standing in the yard. Consumers Power was also represented by community services personnel W. A. Bassette and Roxane Peskey.

Needed: Adults who want to finish high school

This is the first in a three-part series on adult education programs in St. Johns.

There are at least 3,500 people over 25 years old in the St. Johns school district who do not have high school diplomas, according to data compiled by John Furry, director of community education for the district.

The same data indicates there are 1,400 such people in St. Johns alone. Furry is determined to attract some of those people to educational programs offered by the Community Education Department. He is determined for two reasons: adult education is good for the student and good for the district.

"As an educator I am frustrated at the the number of people out there without a high school education who could be availing themselves of a program," he says.

Someone who does not have a diploma is in bad shape in today's job market, the educator says.

"When personnel directors are throwing away 60,000 applications each year in an effort to weed out, they're not going to get to first base," he says.

Community Education offers two programs especially useful to those attempting to improve their chances of obtaining a living wage. Firstly, there is the adult high school completion program. It is a com-

pletely free opportunity for adults over 18 to finish high school.

Secondly, Community Education offers a training program designed to teach skills needed for entry level jobs in the marketplace. Training is available in such skills as word processing, data entry, computer operations, accounting, clerical work, small engine repair, welding and auto mechanics.

FURRY stresses the benefits to the adult of returning to school. But he wants it known also that every adult who returns to school is, in a sense, contributing to the school district.

School board commended for sex ed policy

To the Editor:
I would like to commend the St. Johns School Board for coming up with a balanced policy, an excellent compromise between the citizens of the community that wanted more birth control information in the classroom curriculum and other citizens that wanted no sex education policy or birth control information available to the students.

There are different ways to communicate information to young people and the classroom is not the only way to inform. Allowing birth control information to be given by a qualified instructor, counselor or school nurse upon request of a student can have many advantages over the classroom method, if properly done. In a classroom setting, negative peer pressures prevail, inadequate time for dealing with individual questions is the norm and more chances for misunderstandings can occur than in a private session. Private sessions allow the professional to tailor the information and relate it to the young person's actual situation.

A well-organized program, with caring staff can overcome a student's initial embarrassment at requesting birth control information and can provide much more accurate and personal information that will eliminate most misunderstanding about a very complex area that always involves more than one person and very private matters.

Even though teenage pregnancies are indeed a tragedy, many other problems of sexual abuse are just as serious. According to "Crime in the U.S.," actual reported forcible rape cases in 1986 was approximately 240 per day, 10 per hour or one rape every six minutes, with a three percent increase over 1985, but a 55 percent increase over 1976, with the greatest percentage increase occurring in rural and suburban

areas between 1985 and 1986. Date rape is a growing problem among teenagers.

In recommending chastity, this policy wisely avoids even implicitly encouraging male irresponsibility and rape by giving boys the perception that rape is socially acceptable, as long as they don't get the girl pregnant. The growing prevalence of rape is the major reason why no child in the school district should have to wait alone at an isolated bus stop.

The policy wisely allows for the teaching of "prevention of sexually transmitted diseases". This allows the teaching about condoms in their role as reducing the risk of AIDS.

Any curriculum needs to emphasize personal responsibility and accountability for each young person's behavior. Young people need to be taught interpersonal skills. They need to be taught what their emotional and psychological needs are and how best to meet them, without destroying their own life or stealing the virginity from another person. A far greater need than birth control information is learning how to communicate with the opposite sex, for misunderstandings and break-downs in communication are usually at the root of problem relationships and destroyed lives.

Overall, this policy needs a chance to be tried and to be debugged. However, the implementation of this policy by a compassionate and caring staff is needed to make it work. Anyway, why should parents be upset over some elements of this policy, when this policy was only made necessary by the failure of parents to teach their children about human sexuality?

I will also have this and other literature available at the Rural Outreach Services booth at the Clinton County 4-H Fair. Come check with me there.

FOR THOSE who are still facing some disruption or more stress now than before the flood, please talk with our feelings, etc., with someone you trust to talk with openly. If you do not have such people available, or feel the need for additional information on helping your family or others through difficult times, call me at 224-7546 for information or a confidential discussion on your situation. We can think and talk about some of the alternatives or options you may wish to consider. I care!

You may also wish to consider coming to a Caring Farmers Fun Night or one of the three discussion groups operating in the county.

Fun nights meet at Pilgrim United Methodist Church, 2965 W. Park Road about every two weeks. Call 224-7546 or 224-2225 for day and time. Dates are also listed in the Extension Agri-business Newsletter. Fun nights are a social time only, a time to play volleyball, board games, etc., and eat finger foods with your friends/neighbors. Put the dates on your calendar and come join us.

Farm financial information received the highest number of requests. The best source for this service (and it's free in most cases, except for a small printing charge for some booklets) is the Cooperative Extension Service (CES), 306 Elm St., St. Johns. Call 224-6240. Their new computer program, PinPack, provides an in-depth analysis of your present financial situation. The program also allows for change possibilities — adding hogs, giving back some land bought at a high price and interest rate, etc. — with an evaluation of how making that change would affect your cash flow picture. Either director Giles Roehl or Marilyn Loudenslager, agriculture agent, can run the

program with you.

DAWN HARRIS, home economist at CES, has some excellent material on managing/budgeting home finances. She will also work with you individually on your financial situation, if you wish.

Job Club/JPTA is also under CES's umbrella of services, with Marilyn Loudenslager in charge. Call her at CES for information/job openings, etc. Employers often let CES know of their openings. Marilyn also has a list of several other local agencies who assist people in finding jobs.

Requests for utility payment program information was also popular. Consumers Power has several programs to help farm and other families with their utility bills, weatherization or insulation, etc. Call Elaine Wetland, consumer affairs, at (517) 799-7110 for information specific to your situation. I also hope to have this information by Fair time — check with me at the booth there.

Emergency utility payment assistance in some situations may be available through Dept. of Social Services, 1411 N. US-27, phone 224-6751. Betty Silm can help you evaluate your situation to see if you qualify.

Food pantries or places for help getting emergency food are through Clinton County Community Services, 224-6702, 911 E. State St., St. Johns. The main food bank is located there with corresponding food banks in Bath (15510 Webster Rd., phone 641-4180 for Margret Williams); in Laingsburg at 9227 Highland View, phone 651-6816 for Carol Winebarger; in Maple Rapids at the Congregational Christian Church, 410 S. Maple St., phone 682-4165 for Jim Longhurst; and in Elsie the UMYF Community Pantry is at the Elsie Methodist Church, 106 W. Main, phone 862-5239.

Please note that these food banks are for emergency use only, and do have a limit of one use per 30 days with a total of five uses per year.

There are a number of good youth groups operating in Clinton County. For 4-H groups in your area or area of interest, call Theresa Silm at 224-5240. FFA/FHA chapters at local schools, as well as youth groups in most of the county's over 80 churches may fill a need in your young person's life.

AFTERWARD, in the best rural tradition, the family served lunch to its guests, accompanied by lots of reminiscing and catching up on the latest news.

Geneva Kebler Wiskemann, Clinton County Historical Committee chairperson, loaned a sesquicentennial banner and a 26-star flag for the occasion. The 26-star flag, which was the official flag of the United States from 1837 until 1845, is one of 300 donated by Michigan Bell for use in sesquicentennial observances. Mrs. Wiskemann later presented the flag to the Clinton County Board of Commissioners for permanent custody.

This was not the first time the Clark farm's history has been celebrated. In 1985, its actual 150th year, a huge party was held with over 200

guests in attendance.

"WE'RE VERY proud to have had the first sesquicentennial farm celebration here in Clinton County," Mrs. Wiskemann says.

"We also want to express our appreciation to the utility companies, who have played such a big part in our sesquicentennial events. Consumers Power provides all the signs for these farms in our area and they don't get enough recognition for their service," she says.

At 80, Vic Clark still does much of his own work, says nephew Peter Clark, son of Leon and Fran Matthews Clark and one of the younger generation carrying on the family farming tradition. "Of course we help out," says Peter, who farms over 2,500 acres. "But he's in pretty good shape, and we expect him to keep on a long time."

aid funds on a per-student basis. An adult enrolled full time (three classes, usually) in a Community Education program is worth as much to the district as a student in elementary or regular high school.

But the adult education

program does not cost nearly as much to run as regular school programs. Hence, the adult education student contributes to the district while gaining an education.

"It's in the Bag"
by Bob Beck



If you're an average American homemaker, here's how you treat spices in your cooking. You use more kinds of spices more frequently today than you did five years ago. You've tried 20 different spices and you have 17 different kinds on hand.

If dill isn't one of the 17, you don't know what you're missing. In the United States dill pickles rank high as the best friend a sandwich ever had. Dill seed is not only good for pickles but also pickled beets, salads, sauerkraut, green beans, steaks, fish, chicken, breads, eggs and of course, cucumbers.

Botanically, dill is known as Anethum graveolens, (which is easy enough for me to say, with a book in front of me). Though it was first discovered in England in the 16th century, it is not used in that country's food today as much as it is elsewhere.

Both dill seed and weed, which are the dill leaves, are almost always sold dried in the whole form. An annual plant of the parsley family, dill is native to Europe and Asia and has been used for centuries.

This week stock-up on spices from Beck's, where you'll find our variety, including dill, is the "spice of life."

Festival is set for Bannister

A Czechoslovak Harvest Festival will be held on Aug. 2 at the ZCJB Hall in Bannister. The annual event, sponsored by Bannister, Flint, and Owosso ZCJB Lodges, is a celebration brought from Czechoslovakia.

In that country, there are two harvest celebrations. Posvici is a religious ceremony, while Obzinky is secular in nature. Program chairman Tom Bradley explains that when the harvest is over the laborers make a wreath of wheat or rye and field flowers and then accompanied by music and song, present the wreath to the landowner. After the ceremony there is feasting and dancing.

The Michigan ZCJB Lodges have tried to keep many of these traditions alive during the festival.

A dinner consisting of fried chicken, ham, dressing, dumplings, sauerkraut, kolche and all the trimmings will be served from 11:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. Adult dinners are \$4, children under 12 are \$2, and pre-schoolers are free.

The program begins at 2:30 p.m. with lodge members dressed in colorful ethnic costumes (kroj) carrying rakes and scythes decorated with wheat and flowers. More than 50 dancers ranging in age from two to 77 will perform Czechoslovakian folk dances. The young dancers

Remembering 50 years of the 4-H Youth Fair

By HELEN MURTON

*"I pledge my head to clearer thinking;
My heart to greater loyalty;
My hands to wider service;
And my health to better living
For my club, my community, my country, and my world."*

There was no organized 4-H in the county until 1920 when Howard Kittle became Agricultural Agent here, but records show there were local clubs led by interested neighborhood adults. By 1928, there were clubs enrolled in dairy, handicrafts and clothing in rural neighborhoods.

While the Board of Supervisors had begun financial support by providing part of the agent's salary, office expense and travel, only a small part of his time could be spent on the clubs. With interest growing in clubs for boys and girls, a financial drive was conducted to raise funds for a full-time 4-H agent.

Roscoe Smith was hired as this agent and began work in the spring of 1929. Although his staff consisted of only himself, his secretary, Mrs. Laura Sonier (his secretary for 15 years), and many local volunteer club leaders, it was through his tireless and continuous efforts that 4-H mushroomed in the county — even though he was expected to supervise all other government agricultural areas in the county at the same time.

Fourteen clubs were officially organized that first summer. The clubs and their leaders were:

- Victor — Canning — Mr. Elza Exelby

- Essex — Poultry — Florence Stewart
- Duplain — Canning — Lucille Levett

- Duplain — Dairy — Walter Bolander
- Essex — Dairy — Flobd Anderson

- Bengal — Dairy — Frank Pope
- Victor — Dairy — Elza Exelby
- Bengal — Woodwork — Fred Knight

The first County Wide Achievement Day (forerunner of the present 4-H Fair) was held in 1929 at the old County Fairgrounds. By 1930 there were 39 4-H clubs. In that

year, 112 head of dairy animals were shown and every foot of space was filled in the two building areas with 4-H projects from woodworking, flowers, dairy, canning, and sewing.

Awarded that year a trip to the Canadian National were Paul Bullard of Olive, Loree Findlay of Essex, Nettie Stockweather of Watertown, and Arlene Jones of Bingham Township.

Awarded a trip to the State 4-H Fair was Robert Murton of Bengal for woodworking. Team members of the dairy judging at the National Show at St. Louis, Mo., were Dale Anderson, Wilson Kirk, Lowell Spike and Earl Hass of Essex.

During the years since, the fine work of many young 4-H'ers has won honors and trips. The persons mentioned here were among the pioneers.

In 1934 the first 4-H County Camp was held. Leaders who organized this were Mrs. Viola Exelby, Raymond Murton, and Mr. and Mrs. Roscoe Smith.

In 1944 Einer Oldstrom became a full-time club agent and under his leadership trip awards were expanded and the Yankee Springs trip and the Traverse City Snow Trip were initiated.

In September of 1951, Donald Walker became club agent and during his time the Youth Talent Show, the Clinton County Softball League, the Coldwater Lake Trip, the 4-H Leaders Council, Recreation School, Judging School and Officers Training School were added to the program.

In 1937, a building was erected on the land to be known as the Clinton County 4-H Fairgrounds. For the previous two years the fair had been held in tents. This first building was sponsored by Schuyler Marshall, publisher of the Clinton County Republican News; the St. Johns Chamber of Commerce; the St. Johns Rotary Club; and the County Board of Supervisors.

This fair is different — it has no midway or concessions except the foodstands run by the 4-H leaders and home demonstration ladies. Only the 4-H club members are exhibitors.

These then were the beginnings of the Clinton County 4-H Youth Fair. In the years following clubs and memberships have increased, kinds of projects have been added to encompass many other interests, urban youth have joined and every summer hundreds come to the fair to see what goals, efforts, cooperation, and willingness to work and learn can achieve.

And, many thanks should be given to the many local leaders who gave their time, talents, and patience to the youth they worked with in their 4-H clubs.

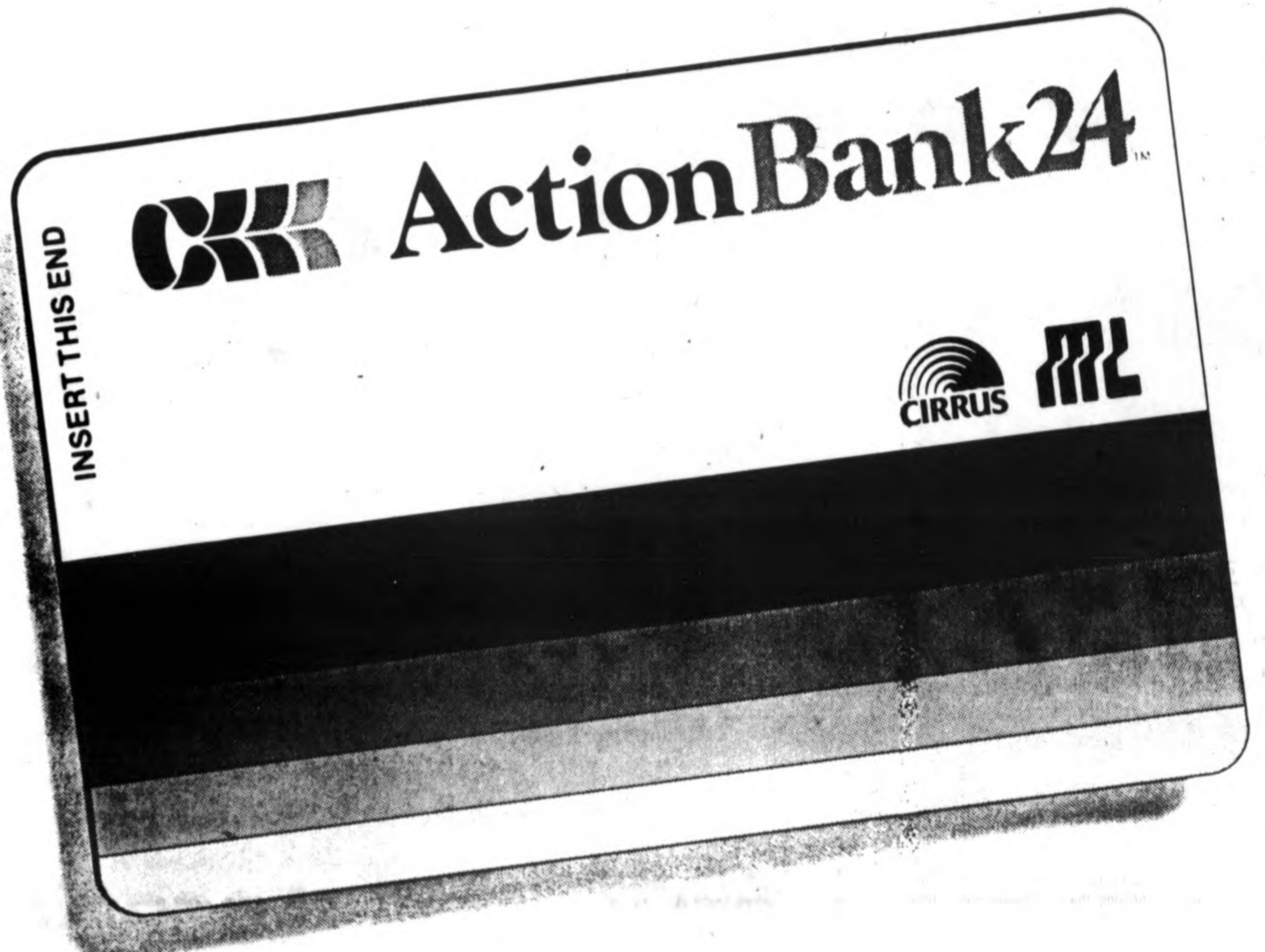

S.T.A.R.S. Crystal Raceway host for weekend racing extravaganza

The S.T.A.R.S. were shining brightly at Crystal Raceway this past weekend — both stars above the race track and the Short Track Auto Racing Stars on the dirt oval.

An assortment of top-ranked late model drivers from around the country and many fine local drivers competed for over \$30,000 in prize money as part of Crystal's first ever Great Lakes North-South Shootout which was run July 25-26.

STARS driver Willie Craft from Minnesota was the big winner of the weekend, taking first in the feature on Sunday night for \$5,000 and earning second place in Saturday night's feature race. Another STARS driver, Larry Moore, also made the trip worthwhile for himself by taking the checkered flag in the feature on Saturday, good for \$3,000, and placing second on Sunday night.

Saturday night winners included fast time qualifier Frank Seder with a time of 15.96. Moore won the dash, while heat winners were Crystal regular Denny Anderson, and STARS drivers John Mason, Donny Moran and Don Gross.

Kris Patterson of St. Johns won Saturday's semi-feature.

Moore posted the fast qualifying time on Sunday at 15.49, and Craft won the dash. Heat winners were Seder and Mason with Seder winning the North-South Shootout. Crystal Raceway driver Roger Wing of Middleton won the consie.

On hand for the STARS weekend of racing were local drivers Butch and Gary Fedewa. Butch came "out of retirement" to race in the late model class for the first time in five years. He and brother Gary along with their sons also drove in a special father-son event held at Spartan Speedway on July 24 in memory of their father.

Gary is a familiar Crystal driver when the SOD sprints run at the racetrack. Racing in three to four sprint events each week, Fedewa and his car have been in their share of scrapes but his lucky dollar bill is still intact on the dashboard.

"It's kind of a good luck thing I guess," he said. "It's all I had left after we built the car."

Engine problems forced Gary to view racing action from the pits over the weekend. Butch raced well in his return to the track, making Sunday night's feature race.

STARS President Rick Gross and Executive Director Doc Lehman were impressed with the condition of the track at Crystal and happy to have some of the southern drivers race at the dirt track as part of their sanctioned events.

"The track looks real nice," Lehman said. "The Fricke's (Crystal owners Ray and Pat Fricke) have made a lot of improvements. This is the first time in four or five years that the STARS have run in Michigan. The southern drivers don't get up this way too often."

Gross said the purse of \$30,000 was a big drawing point for the STARS northern trip, as well as giving the southern drivers a chance to compete on a different track.

"This being a STARS sanctioned race, the drivers want to compete for the points also," he said. "The average car running here costs \$35,000 and the top point getter at the end of the STARS season could earn as much as \$25,000."

Many of the southern drivers will take part in the 7th Annual Dirt Track World Championship on Oct. 17-18 at Pennsboro Speedway. The winner there will take home \$60,000 with a total purse of \$120,000 the largest ever in dirt track history.

Racing action continues at Crystal this weekend with a double dose of late model racing plus regular pro stocks and IMCA modifieds.

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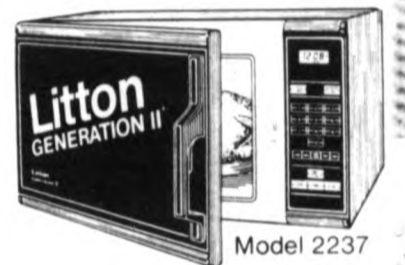

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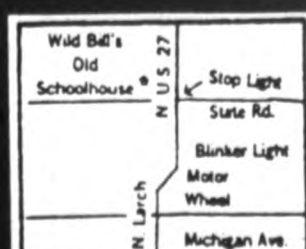

Roehl lines

No rainfall

Some of the county is experiencing a severe shortage of rainfall this growing season. Inadequate moisture during any period of growth can result in reduced grain yield. Nutrient availability, uptake, and transport are impaired without sufficient water. Plants weakened by stress are also more susceptible to disease and insects. Severe moisture stress is indicated by leaf wilting that is alleviated only when the plants receive additional water. The period during which drought will most severely affect yield is silking and pollination. Plants under severe moisture stress during silking can lose more than 10 percent of their potential yield per day. Moisture stress during this period can result in a lack of synchronization between pollen shed and silking at pollination because pollen grains may not remain viable and silking may be delayed according to Orin Hesterman, MSU crops specialist.

To determine whether corn plants have been pollinated and fertilized, look for small white blisters on the ear seven to 10 days after pollen shed. To identify the blisters, take ears from several areas in the field and break them in half. Using a knife, dig out several kernels on each ear. If you find blisters on the ears, you can assume that your corn plants were pollinated and kernel fertilization occurred. If you observe the kernels after pollen shed and are unsure whether pollination has occurred, observe the kernels again in five to seven days. If the kernels were pollinated and fertilized, the blisters will rapidly increase in size. If pollination and kernel fertilization did not occur, the kernels will not increase in size. It is also possible to tell if pollination and fertilization occurred by slicing the kernels longitudinally through the embryo side and looking for the young embryo. Only fertilized kernels will produce embryos. Kernels that have been fertilized and pollinated will continue to develop to maturity if the plants get water.

If a plant tasseled and shed pollen but no blisters appeared, it will be barren. A common result of moderate moisture stress during pollination is the production of ears with barren tips. This occurs because the silks attached to the tip kernels were not

pollinated or were aborted after pollination. Drought stress prior to tassel and silk appearance may result in small ear size. From the 12-leaf to the 17-leaf stage (V12 to V17) moisture stress may reduce both the ear length and the number of potential kernels on each ear. If ear size is reduced during this period, it cannot be corrected by relieving the moisture stress later in the season.

Drought stress after pollination and fertilization will result in poor kernel fill, causing low test weight and reduced yield. It may also increase stalk root problems.

Forage

Having a current feed test on your forage and using these values to update your rations is a good management practice any year. However, this year it is even more critical to have regular feed tests run on your forages. The thinned alfalfa stands due to last fall's floods encouraged grass and weeds to infiltrate the alfalfa fields. The drought further stunted the crop. In addition to this, a great deal of alternative forage has been planted in the county. As we harvest and begin to feed these forage crops we need to get them tested. These are not typical crops and they will not have typical feeding values.

A Forage Analysis Day will be held Aug. 3, at the Clinton County 4-H Youth Fair in St. Johns. We will begin testing samples at 9 a.m. and continue to test through 4 p.m. The NIR (Near Infrared) testing equipment will be set up in the Commercial Exhibit tent.
