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Festival: Cool rain, big crowd

Rain dampened the air but not the spirit of the 1987 St. Johns Mint Festival.

Record crowds along the route of the festival parade on Saturday morning brought out umbrellas but stayed in place as a light rain cooled streets that a few days earlier baked in a 90-degree heat wave. One woman used her umbrella to cover her dog, who lay contentedly awaiting the parade.

Festival vendors protected their wares with plastic and continued to strike bargains with the festival-goers who came to downtown St. Johns in greater numbers than ever before.

"They weren't going to let a little rain dampen it," said Joann Martis, director of the St. Johns Area Chamber of Commerce.

Martis said "expanded cooperation" had helped make the 1987 festival bigger than the last two festivals. For example, she said, the half-hour newscast from the courthouse lawn on Friday by WILX-Channel 10 News had helped attract larger numbers of people to the festival.

ON SUNDAY afternoon, there was plenty of sunshine for one of the festival's most unusual events: the Peppermint Patty Plop. Although a cow was the center of attention for

the event, the crowd itself tended more toward the sheepish.

"I'm sure not going to tell anybody at work what I did today," said one woman.

The Peppermint Patty Plop was a special kind of raffle, sponsored by the St. Johns Kiwanis Club 707, in which the high school football field was divided into 242 squares. The cow, provided by the Valleyside Dairy Farm of St. Johns, was to choose the winning square in a way only a cow can do.

The cow's named was really Marjean. Marjean was led onto the field and released.

"Let's get her accustomed to all that greenery and all think positive thoughts," said announcer Rod Fuller.

The stiff-legged cow regarded the audience with a benign indifference suggesting a spirit of uncooperation.

"Moo," said one of the humans in the audience.

"Moooo-ooo!" cried the cow, and dashed for the far end of the field.

Kiwanis Club members were kept busy for the next few minutes trying to keep Marjean on the football field and dragging her back when she succeeded in escaping. The cow showed a definite preference for the northern end of the field.

"She keeps seeing a shiny object on that end of the field," announced Fuller. "Tom (Wiseman), put a hat on."

Finally, Marjean seemed to become resigned to the idea of staying on the field. That was as far as she seemed willing to cooperate, however. Soon it was the people who were restless.

"I tell you, I was at the Ionia Free Fair last week and there were so many cows plopping I thought it was orchestrated," said Fuller.

"Ah, she's a poney plopper," said one man. "That's a plopperless cow."

"Well, you can lead a cow to grass,

but you can't make her... Well, maybe you can, I don't know," announced Fuller.

A bucket of water was given to Marjean. She drank deeply and within minutes obliged the wildly applauding audience.

Doug Wier of St. Johns won the \$300 grand prize. Paul McNamara, Dean Mazzolini, Laura Washburn and Katherin Ackles each won \$25 in random drawings. Proceeds from the event will be used by the Kiwanis to benefit the aged, handicapped or underprivileged.

"I didn't know water had that effect on cows," someone said.

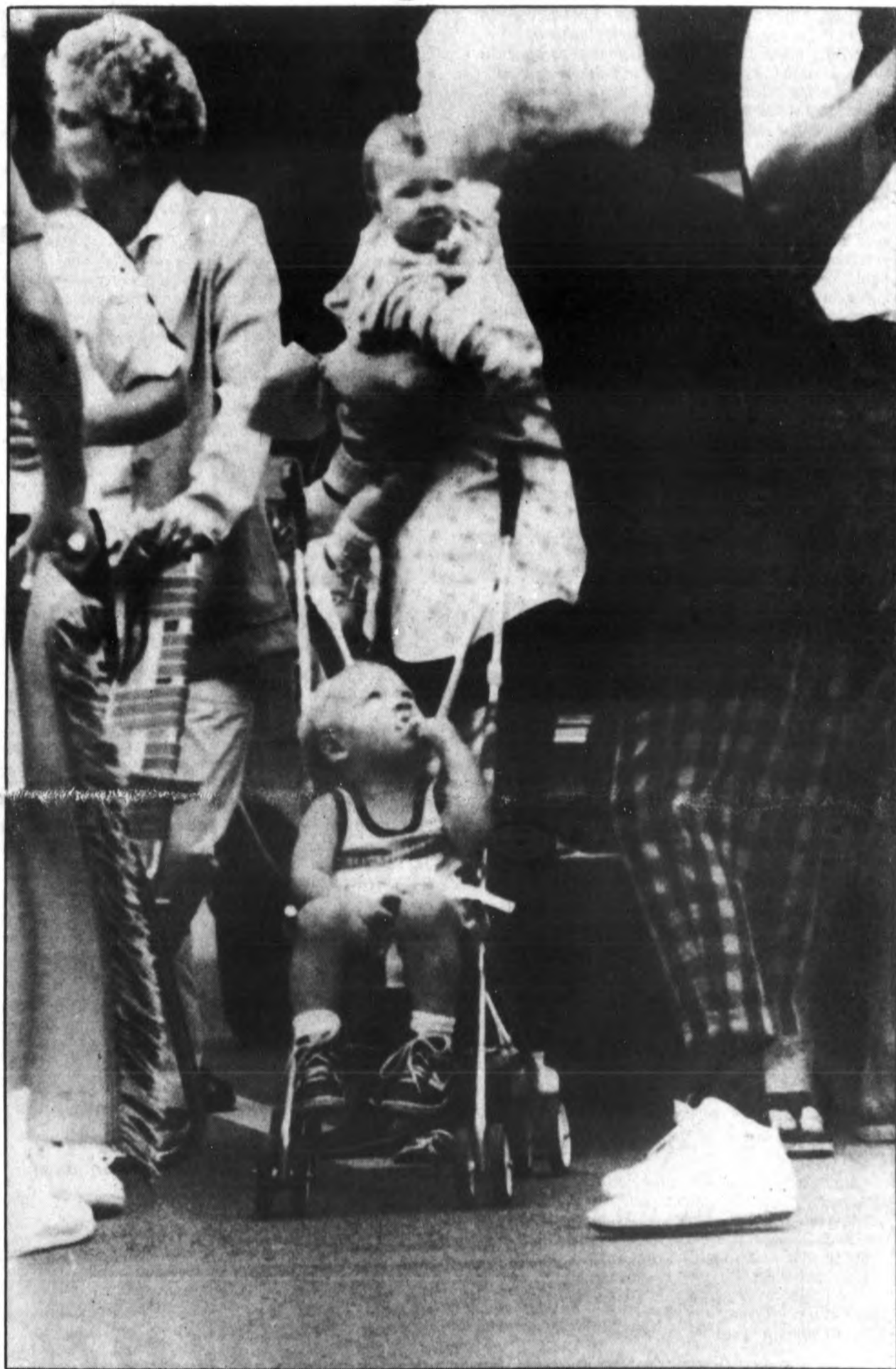
MEANWHILE back at the courthouse, it was time for the raffle drawings that traditionally wrap up the festival. The lucky winners are as follows:

Clark Farm sesqui plaque stolen

The Victor J. Clark farm in Eagle has been there for 152 years. A plaque proclaiming it a Sesquicentennial Farm didn't last two weeks.

The plaque was stolen during the night of August 2 — only 13 days after it had been placed at the farm.

Clinton County Sheriff's Deputy Mark Finnilla said the theft occurred

sometime between 9 p.m. on August 2 and 9 a.m. on Aug. 3.

The plaque was placed on the farm July 20 during a ceremony attended by the Clark family, the Clinton County Historical Commission and the Consumers Power Company. Consumers Power donated the plaque.

The Clark farm is the oldest farm in Clinton County and the first to be proclaimed a Sesquicentennial Farm.

Finnilla asked anyone with information about the missing plaque to call the Clinton County Sheriff's Department at 224-5200.

Ithaca to rebuild

ITHACA — Standing before the remains of a building burned during a devastating fire earlier this year, U.S. Rep. Bill Schuette announced the City of Ithaca will receive a grant of \$250,000 to help rebuild the downtown area.

The grant has been provided by the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The grant provides funds to be used for material, construction and supplies for the effort to rebuild the downtown area destroyed by fire.

Congressman Schuette praised Ithaca Mayor Ron Gruesbeck, State Representative Gary Randall, State Senator John Engler, and Greater Ithaca Development Executive Director Don Schurr for their assistance in helping him secure the grant.

You're closer than you may think and you're never too old

This is the last in a series of three articles about adult education programs in St. Johns. This week St. Johns Community Education Director John Furry answers some frequently asked questions about adult education.

Q. How long will it take me to complete my requirements for a high school diploma?

A. You are closer than you may think to meeting the requirements. Credit is granted for all previous high school credits. Additionally to this, credits are granted for military service, GED testing, life and work experience, special training for jobs, and college courses. With all the available sources of credit permissible, the average length of time is one full academic year or three terms.

Q. Why should I resume my education?

A. The answers to this question can be as varied as the number of people asking the question. Your reason could be self-satisfaction or that now you have the time you didn't have before. A better job, more earning power, a chance at some additional technical training, or a desire to go

on to college are some other very good reasons. One thing is certain: The world of work becomes more complex every day and the opportunities for more job security, more pay and a chance at a promotion generally start with a high school diploma.

Q. Am I too old?

A. Almost without exception, every adult education graduating class includes a grandmother or grandfather from 50 to 75 years of age. The same class may also include an 18 year-old who is now combining a job with his or her schooling. In short, age has nothing to do with the desire to learn and to live a richer, fuller life.

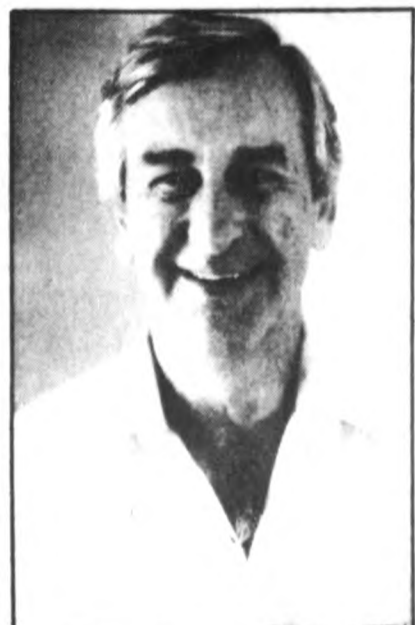
Q. What other programs are available for the adult student?

A. Classes are designed with adults' experiences, interests, and time availability in mind. In addition to

the basic high school completion courses, there are classes in employability skills, typing, welding, report writing, drafting, business skills, computers, art and more. Whatever your interest, chances are that you will find a course to meet your personal needs and desires. In addition to the job related classes offered in the Skills Training Program, we also have available the Adult Basic Education (ABE) Program to assist those adults who have very limited reading and math abilities.

Q. How do I get more information about Adult Education?

A. Call or visit the Community Education office. The director or counselor will evaluate your particular case and help you prepare a program to meet your specific needs. Our office is located at the Theresa Merrill School, N. Traver St., St. Johns. Call us at 224-9341, ext. 159.

Questions posed about plans to build jail

To the Editor:

Open letter to County Commissioners:
The issue of building a new County Jail has been presented to the public and as a citizen I do not wish to debate whether we need a new jail or not; I will leave that decision to the professionals to present their case. But what I question at this point are some of the contemplated actions and decisions by the county commissioners and their jail committee.

1. If the present jail complex is on less than one acre of land why have the commissioners recommended the option to purchase 60 acres of land located east of US-27 on Townsend Road? An increase of 6,000 per cent in size is really hard to comprehend.
2. The jail committee and commissioners have stated there are a number of potential sites for the new jail. What are these sites?
3. Why have the commissioners decided to move the new jail out of the City of St. Johns? There is substantial vacant land within the city limits. What is the justification for moving out of the city?
4. If the decision to move the jail complex out of St. Johns is valid, why not build the new jail complex on land that the county presently owns? The county-owned, 160-plus acres on US-27, 1 1/2 miles south of St. Johns, is immediately available and the new sewer system being installed is almost one-third of the way there. Why spend a minimum of \$90,000 of taxpayers' money for new land when we (the county) presently have 160 acres free and clear? Also, the 60 acres on East Townsend Road that the county has taken an option on is not zoned for a jail or municipal use. The land is zoned residential and agricultural. Can we expect that the people having homes in the immediate area will not want the jail complex as a new neighbor? Will there be rezoning problems? A court fight? The 60 acres the county proposes to buy is paying taxes and providing income for the county. If the county buys this 60 acres of land, the county will lose the income and request an increase in our taxes to pay for the new land.
5. The commissioners had advised us the proposed jail complex will cost the taxpayers an estimated \$6,000,000 for a 100-cell facility. I do not profess to be an expert on jail construction costs, but \$60,000 per cell seems to be high for just a plain jail cell. I realize this cell cost includes all support services, but it still seems high.
6. The county commission tells us of a jail problem and the solution of building a new jail and yet in reading the minutes of the County Jail Committee I find the following:

Letter

*"The committee raised the question of adding a court complex to the proposed county jail for public convenience."
"The committee met with District Court Judge Jeffrey Martlew and Probate Court Judge Marvin Robertson to discuss the concept of a court building being built along with the proposed jail facility. The law states that the juvenile offender must be out of vision and hearing of adult offenders. There would be some restrictions to having a combined facility, but very workable solutions."
"The ideal would be to have all courts and support staff, along with the prosecutor, located near the proposed jail facility. The architect suggested a tunnel arrangement for the transport from jail to the court systems."
"Judge Robertson introduced Mr. Bill Nelson from the State Court Administrators Office. Mr. Nelson stated that his office would be willing to return technical assistance to the courts during planning of the structure."*

As I read the above it would appear that the plans for a new jail have been changed drastically and now the county commissioners have expanded the original request of a new jail to a new complete facility complex consisting of all courts and support staff, prosecutor's office, sheriff's office, and finally a new jail. These new issues to the best of my knowledge have not been publicly discussed and it raises the question are voters being asked to approve a new 100-cell jail for an estimated six million dollars, or are the voters really approving a whole new complex of courts, sheriff's office, etc., with an estimated unknown cost at the present time.

The voters will and should make the final decision on Nov. 3, 1987, but all I am hoping for is that the voter is given all of the necessary information to make the best and right decision. I feel strongly that an informed citizen will evaluate all of the issues to make the right decision, but I also feel strongly that we the voters have not been completely apprised of the total plans.

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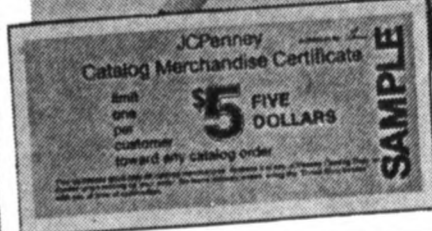

Today, I'm going to tell you a little bit about one vegetable that didn't come into existence until the Middle Ages! It seems like most of the plants or vegetables that we eat go back as far as the beginning of time. 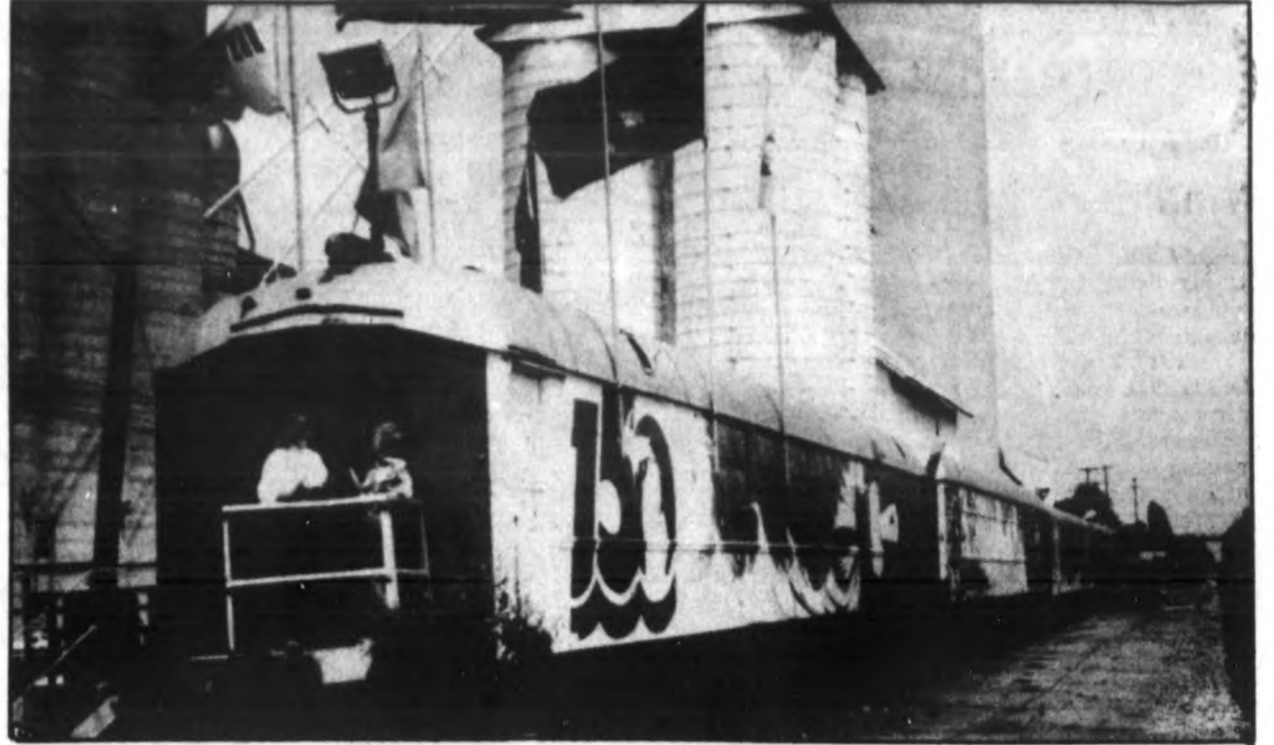

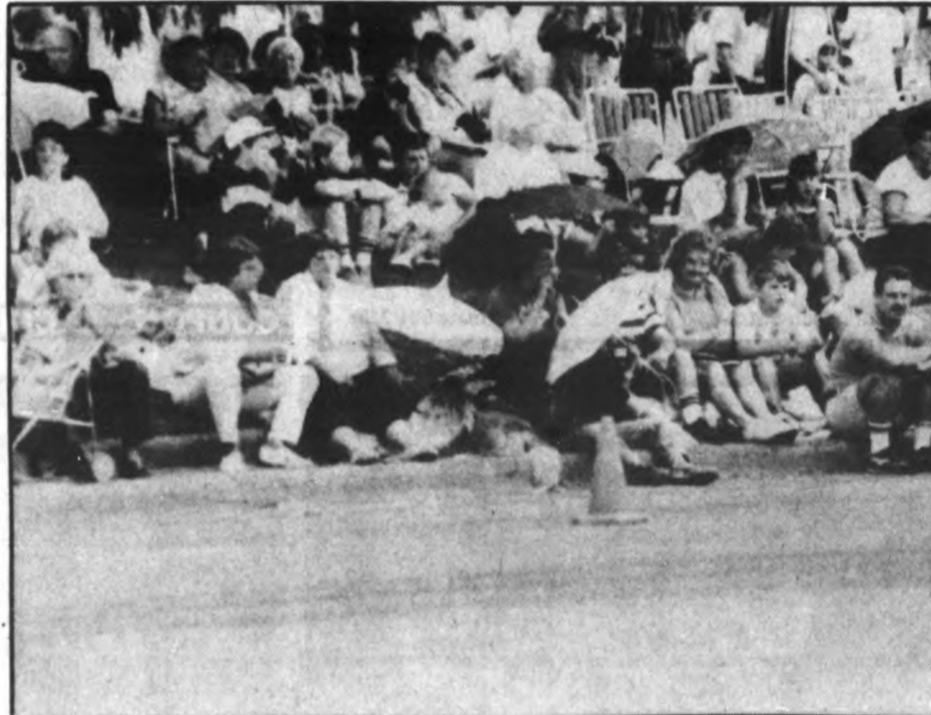

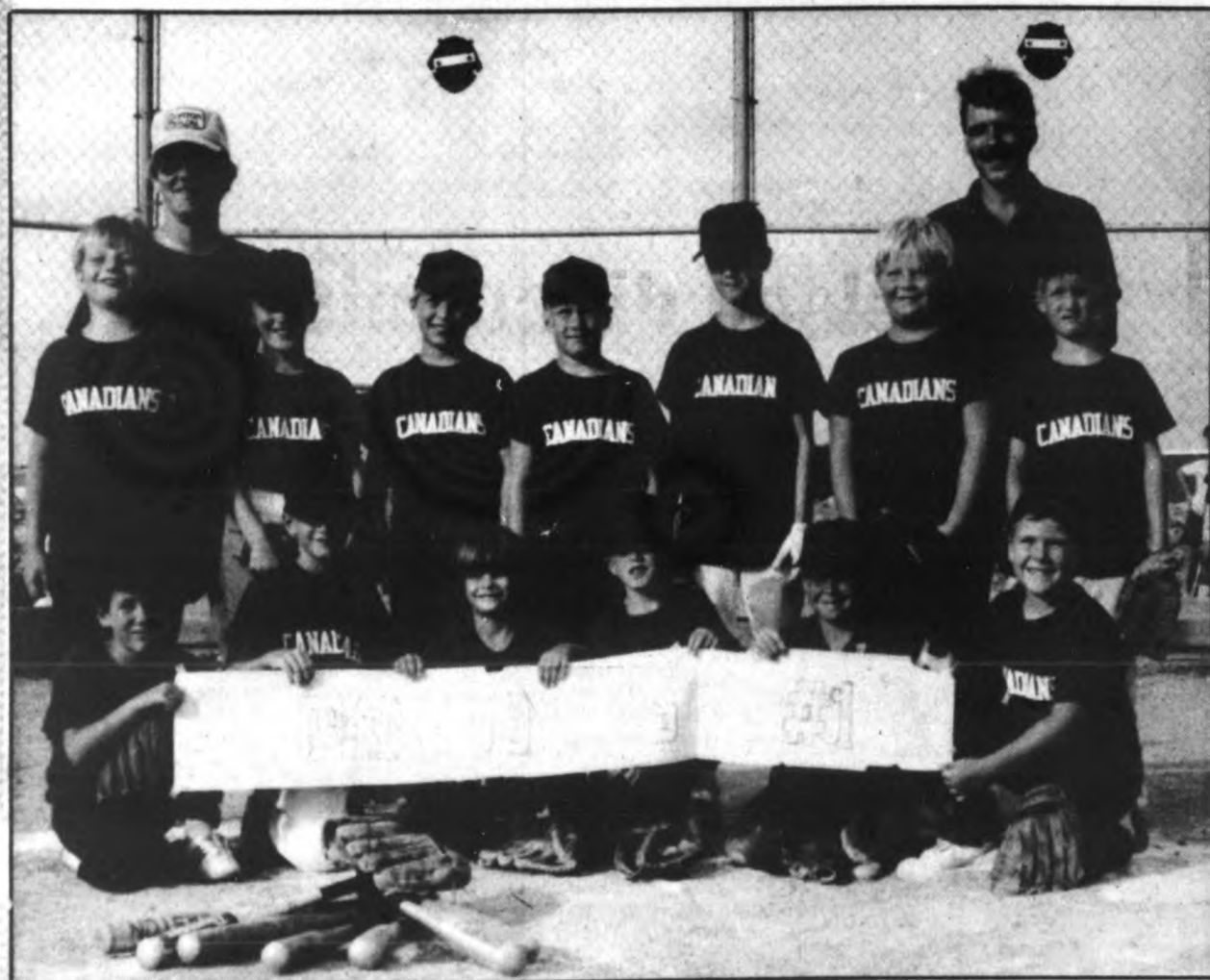

Conservation corner Canada trip

The Clinton Soil Conservation District has arranged with the Ministry of Agriculture in Ontario, Canada, to visit a farming area near Clinton, Ontario, on August 20 and 21.

A group of farmers from there have been to Michigan several times in the past few years, most recently meeting on March 18 in Lapeer. Now we will travel to their farms to see first-hand how they practice conservation methods and have an exchange of ideas. As the weather and soils are very similar to the ones in Clinton County, we may find some very useful suggestions.

We plan to leave from the Clinton S.C.D. office at 8 a.m. on Aug. 20. We will be traveling by car-pool, so if you can drive be sure to let us know. We have a very limited number of reservations made at a motel in Godrich, so if you would like to go along, please let us know as soon as possible.

On Thursday afternoon we plan to visit the Don Lobb farm and look at eight years of conservation tillage comparison plots, windbreaks, and test plots. Then on to the Jack McGregor farm. He has flat, very heavy soils; so heavy that tile drainage cannot be us-

ed. He uses a great deal of ridge-tilling. In the evening we will attend a theatre play "Girls in the Gang," about women's views of local bank robberies. (Cost \$9 each in Canadian money).

On Friday we will visit the Centralia Agricultural College for Edible Bean Research where John Herd will speak. Then on to the Doug Glenn farm for more conservation methods.

The ladies will have their own program and visit points of interest and go shopping. At noon on Friday the local Soil Conservation District will provide a barbecue for all of us. After the lunch we will start back and should arrive in St. Johns about 6 p.m.

Bill Schuette reports FCS trouble

It is no secret that the Farm Credit System (FCS) is in serious financial trouble. The system has lost over \$4.6 billion in the last two years alone and is expected to lose an additional \$1.4 billion this year.

The House Agriculture Committee last week began to develop new farm credit policy.

Currently, there are 12 district banks which make up the FCS, the majority of which are in poor financial condition. Michigan is included in the Minnesota-St. Paul District. As the primary financier of Michigan's agriculture, it holds over 23,000 loans totaling more than \$1.2 billion.

Just under 1,000 of these loans are not accruing any payments, meaning the district bank must use its capital to cover the payments to service these bad debts.

THE AGRICULTURE Credit Act of 1987 concentrates on the restructuring of loans held by the FCS. Under the bill, a Temporary Assistance Corporation will be initiated to replace the Capital Corporation. The TAC will direct the ailing district banks by managing the capital Congress will like provide. It will also oversee the restructuring of delinquent loans.

The legislation will also improve the farmers' position by providing protection against unfair lender conduct, such as accelerating loan payments or requiring excessive collateral. In addition, establishment of a secondary market has been considered for agricultural loans, promoting greater competition in agriculture lending and lower interest rates.

IN MY OPINION, there

are four goals which must be addressed in the development of new Farm Credit policy. First, local control must be maintained in order to assure continued sensitivity to the needs of our farmers.

A second goal must be to provide protection for borrowers. During early consideration of new FCS legislation, I introduced an amendment, which was accepted without objection, to require FCS lending institutions to give farmers at least 75 days notice to allow them to complete the restructuring of their debts to avoid foreclosure. The original bill only allowed for 45 days prior notification.

Third, some injection of capital into the Farm Credit System is necessary to avoid the

bankruptcy of the system. Figures under discussion in the committee range between \$4 and \$6 billion.

Finally, given that injection of capital is necessary, the implementation of reform measures for the FCS should also be adopted. Simply throwing money at the farm credit problem is obviously not the answer.

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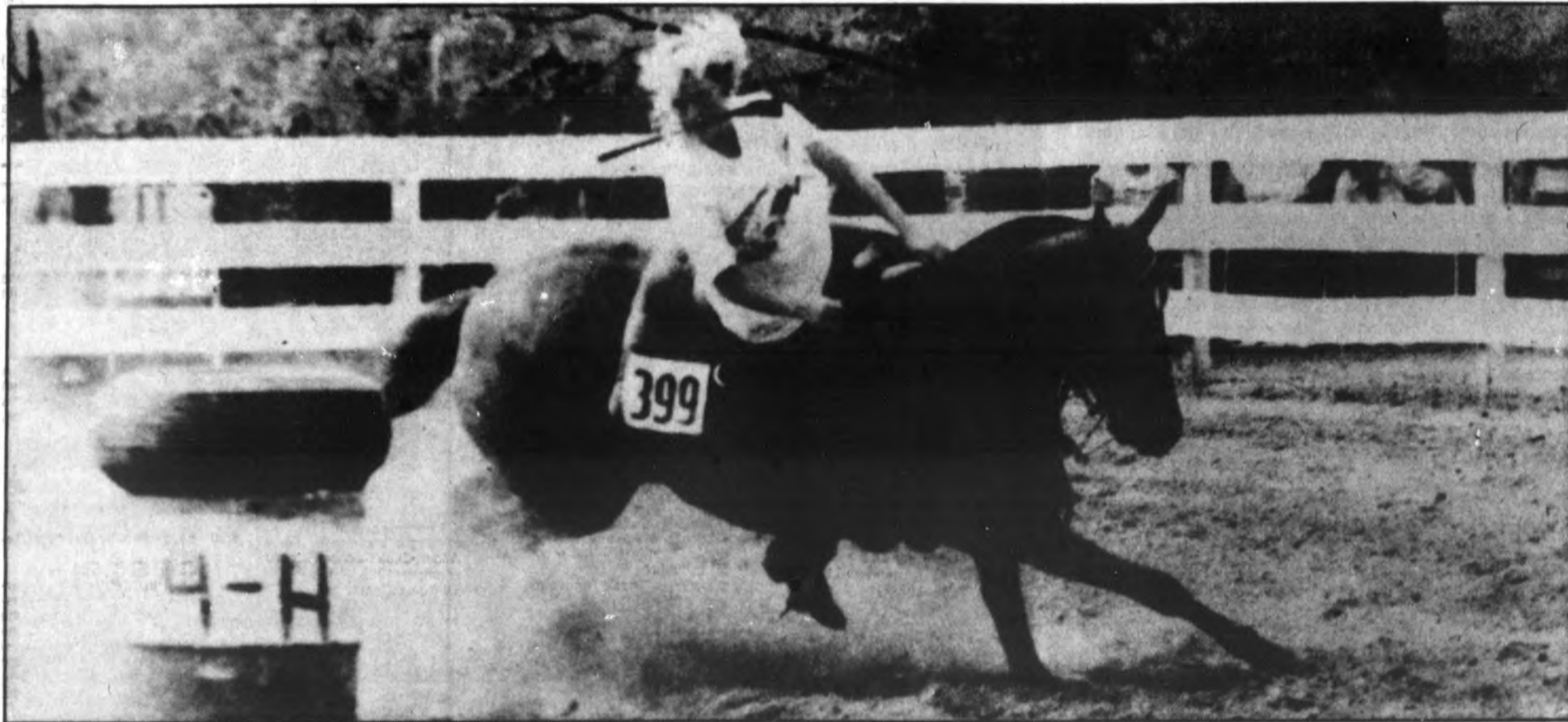

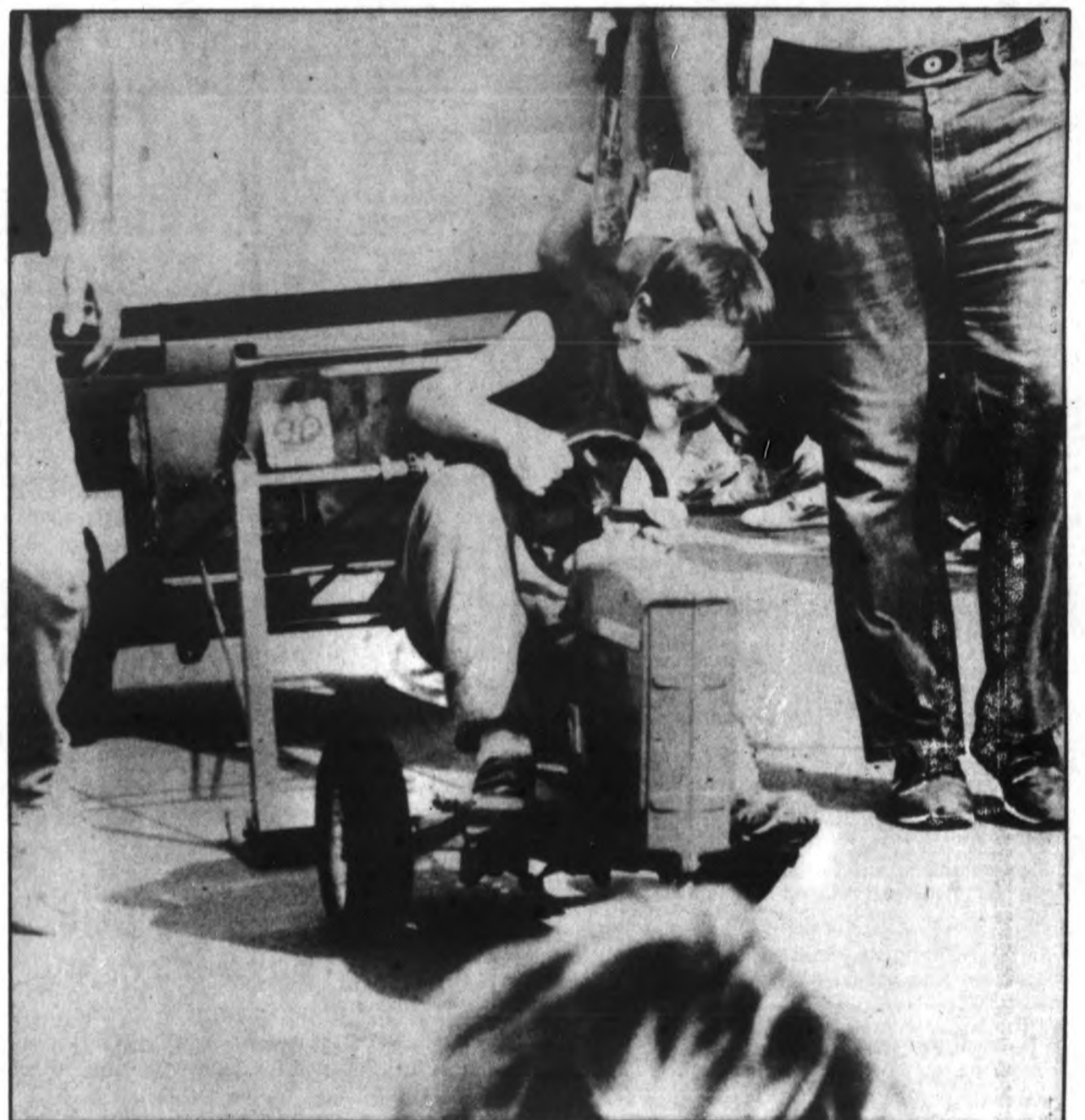

On home mortgages

Program offers lower rates

A new program can lower the mortgage interest cost to home buyers by as much as 2.5 percentage points.

New purchase price limits for homes financed in the Michigan Mortgage credit certificate program were announced last week by the federal government. The new limits take effect for mortgage loan commitments issued after Aug. 9, 1987.

In Maple Rapids, Lebanon Township, and Ovid Township, the maximum sales price for a new home will be \$71,060. For existing homes the sales price limit will be \$54,890.

The remainder of Clinton County will have a maximum sales price of \$58,140 for new homes and \$44,910 for existing homes.

Income limits are unchanged at \$30,000 for buyers of new houses and \$28,000 for buyers of existing homes.

The program provides homebuyers with a federal income tax credit that gives them more money to qualify for a mortgage loan and to make monthly house payments. The amount of the credit is based on 20 percent of the annual interest paid on the loan.

Participating lenders set

their own interest rates, loan terms and down payment requirements. The cash flow from the program has the effect of reducing the homebuyers' interest rate by up to 2.5 percent.
