County holds jail meeting Thursday

The Clinton County Board of Commissioners has scheduled a public meeting to provide information and answer questions about the proposal for a new county jail on the county ballot Nov. 3.

The public meeting will be held at 7 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 27, at Smith Hall. Smith Hall is on the county fairgrounds, across Sickles Street

from the St. Johns High School. Commissioners earlier this year decided to ask voters to approve funds for a new jail after a similar proposal was defeated by only about 80 votes.

The exact wording of the proposal had not been decided upon by late last week. However, the wording was expected to ask voters to approve a bond issue that would be financed by a debt levy of not more than one mill for 20 years.

County Administrator Bill LeFevere said preliminary recom-

mendations from architects and consultants hired by the county call for an 80-cell jail.

LeFevere also said county officials have not made a final decision as to the location of the proposed jail. Although the county paid \$3,000 for an option to buy a 60-acre site on Townsend Road, the possibility of building the jail somewhere else has not been excluded, he said.

County officials and police officers have for several years called for the construction of a new jail, citing cramped conditions and over-

crowding at the present jail. In 1986, the county paid \$97,508 to house inmates in other counties because there was no room in the jail here.

The present jail, built in 1949, contains 42 cells. In 1979, after the Michigan Department of Corrections cited a number of deficiencies in the jail, voters turned down a new jail proposal by a vote of 9469-7033.

In 1982, voters again turned down a new jail proposal. Last November, in a narrow 80-vote decision, voters again turned down a new jail proposal.

Plea date set for Ovid man

Arraignment has been set for Sept. 8 for an Ovid man accused of offering to pay for a murder.

Allen Dickenson, 37, of 3837 N. Hollister Rd., Ovid, has been lodged in the Clinton County Jail since June 12. He was arrested on that date and accused of offering to pay an unidentified Lansing man to murder a male friend of Dickenson's estranged wife. He is charged with solicitation of murder.

District Court Judge Jeffery Martlew set arraignment for 9 a.m. Sept. 8 after Dickenson waived preliminary examination on Aug. 11.

Martlew also reduced Dickenson's \$100,000 cash bond to \$10,000 personal recognizance bond. Dickenson posted bond and was released Aug. 11.

Plea date set for Gonzales

A Dewitt man arrested last month on drug charges faces arraignment next week.

Roman Gonzales Jr., 42, of 10739 Bond Rd., DeWitt, will be arraigned Aug. 31 on one charge of delivering and manufacturing marijuana and one charge of possession of cocaine. District Court Judge Jeffery Martlew set the date at a preliminary examination last week.

Police arrested Gonzales June 2 after allegedly observing him place 40 pounds of marijuana in his car. Police say they were acting on a tip and had placed Gonzales under surveillance.

Police also confiscated a large sum of cash and a half-ounce of suspected cocaine from Gonzales' home.

Gonzales is free on \$10,000 bond.

City vehicles to have Eyes & Ears

City of St. Johns vehicles will soon bear the Eyes & Ears logo.

Radio-equipped vehicles from the department of public works, the water department and the waste water treatment plant will begin participating in the child safety/crime prevention pro-

gram, city officials announced last week.

The Eyes & Ears logo alerts the public, especially children, that the driver of the vehicle is trained to request emergency assistance for anyone in trouble.

"Eyes & Ears focuses special attention on reporting suspicious persons and situations that appear to be related to assaults, abductions and rapes," says Bill Bassett, community services director for Consumers Power Company, which helps to coor-

dinate the program.

The City of St. Johns is the second local agency to begin participation in the program recently. The Clinton County Road Commission began several months ago.

Spotlight on transportation

School bus staff readies the "Big Yellows"

In just one more week students across the St. Johns school district will be lined up at their school bus stops ready to board those "Big Yellows."

Busing Supervisor Duane Davis lists some of the things the bus garage staff has done over the summer to prepare the buses for the school year:

- They checked and repaired all brakes, seats, steering mechanisms, tire and electrical systems in each bus and school vehicle.
- They tuned all gasoline engines.
- They changed air breathers and oil and fuel filters.
- They repaired the bodies of all school vehicles.
- They spot painted school vehicles.
- They inspected and completed any necessary incidental maintenance.
- They cleaned and washed each bus, inside and out.

In addition to the regular summer work, the bus garage staff took on some building and bus maintenance tasks not part of the usual summer responsibilities. Gus Lange, Chuck Hazel and Bob Roberts used chemical strippers to completely

clean the bus garage floor. They also repainted the bus garage area and the bus garage sign.

They also spruced up the buses by painting all bus wheels, hubs and bumpers. This should make the St. Johns fleet sparkle as the buses hit the road Sept. 1.

Here are some statistics regarding the operation of the St. Johns fleet, provided by Duane Smith, of the state Department of Education transportation department:

- Twenty regular and eight substitute drivers will be used for the 1987-88 school year.
- Those drivers will drive approximately 2,400 miles each day with 20 buses and six back-up buses.
- The St. Johns system operated during the 1986-87 school at an average cost of \$191.30 per students. That is also the state average.

THE BIGGEST headache in running the fleet, says Davis, is weather, especially fog and ice.

Davis, a 20-year veteran of the district's transportation department, said the nicest thing about running the department is the people involved.

"The teachers are real easy to get along with," he says. "We have a good bunch of loyal drivers as well. I can't remember when we've had a

driver late to work." Davis said the department is looking forward to a good year and reminded students to follow the rules so they will be safely and comfortably transported to and from school.

Tax amnesty

More than 74,000 persons have repaid about \$110 million in unpaid taxes during Michigan's six-week tax amnesty program in May and June of last year.

Michigan's tax amnesty program allowed people who owed back taxes to repay the state plus interest, but without penalty or prosecution. Tax outlaws must now face their punishment without amnesty. The \$110 million raised was about \$7 million more than state tax officials previously estimated. After paying \$2 million in administrative costs, our amnesty program brought Michigan \$55 for every \$1 that was spent. But the program also gave state officials a clearer picture of the types of people who cheat on taxes.

ACCORDING to the final report on the state's tax amnesty program, 128,000 tax cases were resolved for individuals and businesses. The size of the amnesty payments ranged from more than \$6 million from one company to one penny from an individual tax payer. The largest payment from an individual was more than \$2.5 million. The money collected from the program breaks down to \$11.46 for each state resident. That ranks Michigan fourth among the nation's 25 states that run amnesty programs. Nearly 1,200 taxpayers used VISA or MasterCard charge accounts to pay more than \$700,000 in back taxes.

Much of the amnesty came from taxpayers who didn't pay their intangibles, use and single business taxes. The intangibles tax generated only about one percent of state taxes, but made up 13 percent of amnesty revenues. The use tax represents 4.1 percent of state collections but nearly 19 percent of amnesty payouts. These findings indicate we should direct more administration and enforcement efforts to these areas. The study also showed a large portion of the tax cheats were self-employed, including professionals.

Division in the Treasury Dept., and increased the number of tax auditors to help ferret out scofflaws. And the state penalties for fraud were increased when we originally approved the tax amnesty program. Ten percent of the records involving amnesty cases were saved to create a profile of a tax cheat, which will help our efforts to prevent future tax fraud. Overall, our efforts resulted in the arrest of nearly 40 people who were charged with cheating on their taxes. Of those, 17 have been convicted.

The tax amnesty programs is just one part of a multi-faceted state campaign to crack down on tax cheats. Along those lines, we created a new Discovery

This may be the first and last state tax amnesty program that Michigan will offer because we don't want to encourage people to cheat on their taxes. But at least the program was successful in squaring overdue tax accounts, and gives us more direction in catching future tax cheats.

The editor looked at the screen of his computer. He looked at his fingers.

"Type," he said.

But his fingers would not type.

Outside, the sun was shining on Clinton County fields. A fox sat in a cornfield looking at his reflection in a pool of water that had drowned more than one bushel of corn. At the corner gas station in Fowler, someone was pumping gas into a station wagon. Traffic raged in frantic clumps up and down US-27.

It was a normal summer Sunday afternoon.

On many such Sunday afternoons the editor had gone about his business of writing headlines, writing photo captions, and writing columns. But this Sunday was to be his last one. He had taken a new job in a new town. He had to write a good-bye column. He was not good at writing good-bye columns.

"Type," he told his fingers.

But his fingers would not type.

THE TRICKY thing, he thought, is to be humorous without sounding glib. Perhaps it would be useful to begin with a variation of this line from John Irving's *The World According to Garp*: "Saddle up like: 'Saddle up the toboggans, boys, we're going to Cheboygan.'"

The other tricky thing, he thought, is to be sincere without stooping to sentimentality. Perhaps it would be useful to mention *communality*. That was something

he had not believed in two years ago. It was a word that had had no meaning. A town was a town. A county was a county. But what was a community? He had not known and he had been, in truth, a skeptic.

Now he was not so skeptical. There had been no revelation, but his skepticism had been steadily worn away. It had been worn away in the observation of the extra efforts put forth on behalf of the town and county by those who did not stand to gain personally.

The volunteer.

The unpaid officeholder.

The quietly competent public official.

The minority opinion holder who stands up to be counted.

The families that line main street for parades and festivals.

And, most of all, all those who are so eager to support a community newspaper.

The editor found, because of these people, his understanding of the meaning of the word *community* had become enriched. For that, he was grateful.

THE EDITOR read over what he had written. He shrugged. It wasn't quite on the mark, but it would have to do. He turned off his computer.

A moment later he turned it back on. He still had headlines to write.

"It's in the Bag"

We learned first that wheat and barley, which grew wild, could be eaten raw; then we learned to cook or bake them. Today, thankfully, we are familiar with many other grains now under cultivation.

Dewitt Township officers ousted

All four members of the Dewitt Township Board who were on the recall ballot were ousted from office at Tuesday's special election.

Results of the recall election became official Wednesday when the canvassing board met and sent the recalled members letters of notification, according to Clinton County Clerk Jane Swanhara.

Board members recalled are township supervisor Frank Mann, township clerk Gregory Whitlock, township treasurer Catherine Reed, and township trustee Michael Verlinde.

Before the totals of the election results were in and it was apparent that the recall of all four members would be the vote Reed cleaned out her office and stated

she would not be back.

"I feel sorry for the people and the township," she says. "It's sad to let 1,500 people decide the path that the township will take."

Attempts to contact the other three members recalled proved fruitless.

The Dewitt Township Recall Committee, which led the special election, was organized in a response to many complaints of township residents and listed a number of reasons for the recall election, according to Pat Relyea, co-chair of the committee.

The reasons included failures to answer residents questions at board meetings, inaccurate board minutes, and violating the Open Meetings Act.

"We just proved that we're not going to sit by and see this kind of thing happen," Relyea says. "I'm glad it's over and I didn't like do-

ing it, but I would do it again if the board ever got this bad."

Relyea's hope is that the people of Dewitt Township will set both long- and short-term goals and work to accomplish them. "The township needs a vision and I hope a lot of people come out and show what they want from and for their township and we can build from there," she adds.

Now that the a majority of the board members have been recalled the governor has the option of temporarily filling one or all vacancies until a Nov. 3 election.

Formal notification of the results must reach the governor before he acts, according to attorney Harriet Harris.

Gregg Morris of the governor's office says that the governor has never taken that action and was not sure if it would be taken or not this time.

Watertown Twp. to develop survey

The Watertown Charter Township Planning Commission is developing a community survey to determine the direction future development will take. Trustee Pam Porterfield says they are undecided as yet, what form the survey will take, but it could be done through the Township newsletter.

"We want people to know we're in the process of doing this," says Porterfield, "and we would like as much input from as many people as possible."

The survey will be based upon the concerns expressed by 21 residents at a long range planning workshop held in April. Township residents expressed a need to look at the zoning policy and protection, urban sprawl, farmland protection, economic development, protecting ground water, controlling development along Grand River, traffic, and landfill size and duration.

Results from the survey will be used to assess, re-evaluate, and change the 1982 comprehensive development plan to better meet the self-determined needs of the community.

PORTERFIELD SAYS the concerns center around the problem of urban sprawl coming closer to the township and how to deal with it.

Because of the close proximity of major freeways, the airport, and railroads, the township is a prime candidate for industrial development. Some 900 plus acres were rezoned industrial just last year in the Grand River corridor.

"But, there are 3,500 resident we want to take into consideration," she says. "We realize we are in one of

the logical growth areas, but we want to bring it about in such a manner that the community won't suffer."

The idea is to plan ahead and, hopefully, not make the same mistakes made by other townships who have been victims of citizen unrest because of too much, too quick, development.



Recyclers get \$24,857 waste grant

Clean Michigan Fund grants totaling nearly \$6 million were awarded 84 applicants recently by the Natural Resources Commission (NRC), bringing the total number of awards to 86. The Recyclers of Ingham, Eaton, and Clinton Counties received \$24,857.

landfills by promoting resource recovery technologies.

It attracted 269 applicants during a limited grant application period last spring. The funding requested in these applicants totaled over \$44 million.

Clean Michigan Fund grants are awarded to local governments, private entities, and non-profit organizations interested in implementing or expanding programs for recycling, composting, and waste-to-energy incineration.

In addition, unlicensed or at-capacity landfills and dumps will be closed, transfer stations constructed, and household hazardous waste collection programs funded to help remove toxic materials from the waste stream.

The Recyclers received a Resource Recovery Education Grant to develop public information, education, and publicity materials to inform residents of the availability of resource recovery options in their communities.

The Clean Michigan Fund was created in response to the state's growing solid waste disposal dilemma. The program is aimed at reducing statewide dependence on

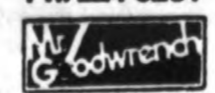

Clover clippings School clothes

Shopping for back-to-school clothes is an annual ritual that can be expensive and frustrating, but with some simple planning, young people can learn the importance of money management and wardrobe planning while they're preparing for a new school year.

4-H clothing specialist Joanne Schultink says back-to-school shopping needs to begin at home.

Before you head for the stores, young people should go through their closets and make lists of the items they have from last year that still fit. Parents can help them decide what items will best compliment the clothes they already have and save time and money in the store.

Schultink suggests planning a wardrobe around two or three colors that can be mixed and matched. Allowing children to browse through catalogs before taking them shopping gives them ideas about the styles and colors that are most popular and will be the easiest to find.

Children develop fashion likes and dislikes at a very young age and should be included in making purchase decisions even at five and six years old. With younger children, such as my kindergartener, parents can choose two or three garments off the rack and let the child make the final selection after trying each one on.

"It's important that children try on any garment before purchases are made," Schultink says, "because sometimes young children aren't comfortable wearing a turtleneck sweater or fabrics like corduroy, but they aren't able to express their feelings to their parents until they wear the garment."

Schultink also advises that older children and teens try on outfits because sizes can vary with style and manufacturer.

Teens are more interested in how a garment looks than anything else, so parents need to read labels for fabric content and washability. Clothes that are 100 percent cotton tend to shrink easily, and garments that require dry cleaning can be costly to maintain.

"Even though a teenager chooses an item that may seem less attractive to his/her parents, such as brightly colored shoes or accessories, don't immediately discount it," Schultink says. "If an item is not very ex-

pensive and is appropriate for school wear, consider allowing your children to purchase it if it will help them feel like they will fit in with their peers."

Children may not realize that clothing is expensive. Parents can help them understand by sitting down with them after a day of shopping to add up the total costs of all purchases and discuss the possibility of wearing some hand-me-downs and shopping at garage sales rather than buying many new garments.

Schultink also warns parents not to buy too many new clothes for their children at one time. If a child experiences a growth spurt, you will be left with a closet full of new clothes that are too small.

By teaching their children how to shop for back-to-school clothes, parents can help them learn valuable lessons before the school bell rings.

Family focus Canning tomatoes

It definitely is canning season in Clinton County. Everyday I receive several questions on how to preserve different vegetables. Many of the questions can be answered by a canning book such as those published by the Ball or Kerr Company. When it comes to canning tomatoes however, I go to a different source.

The USDA recently published updated recommendations for canning tomatoes. Since the guidelines have not been updated since 1940, there were considerable changes.

Listed below are the new canning guidelines for tomatoes that are canned whole or halved. These directions require that the product be packed in water. If you choose to can your tomatoes in tomato juice or without any added liquid, the canning time increases significantly. This is because the product is much thicker without the water and it takes longer for heat to penetrate through to the center.

If you have further questions about how to can your tomatoes, please don't hesitate to call the Cooperative Extension Service at 224-5240.

1. Wash tomatoes, remove skins, core and trim off any discolored portions.

2. Leave whole or halved.

3. For raw pack — put tomatoes in jars. Add boiling water to cover, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. For hot pack — place tomatoes in saucepan; add enough water to cover; boil gently for five minutes. Put tomatoes in jars; add enough of the hot cooking liquid to cover, leaving 1/2 inch headspace.

4. Add bottled lemon juice or citric acid: 2 T bottled lemon juice or 1/2 t. citric acid per quart of tomatoes. For pints, use 1 T. bottled lemon juice or 1/4 t. citric acid.

5. Adjust lids and process.

Process time — Tomatoes — Whole or halved (packed in water)

Boiling water canner — hot and raw packed: Pints, 40 minutes; quarts, 45 minutes.

Pressure canner — hot and raw packed: Pints and quarts, five pounds-15 minutes; 10 pounds-10 minutes; 15 pounds-one minute.

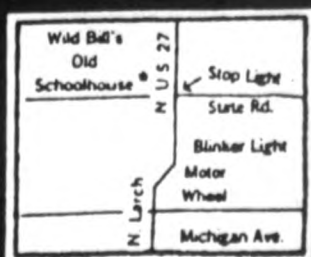

Of gardening and nursing

The gardener requires special knowledge — about plants and their diseases, about soil conditions and light, about moisture, insecticides and fertilizers.

Gardening is hard, physical work which is often repetitive and sometimes grubby — using special tools, digging, planting, watering, spraying, fertilizing, and weeding.

The gardener spends much time watching the plants grow, waiting for the first buds, dreaming about the potential beauty. Because so much time is spent in the garden, the gardener knows each plant and knows what each one needs to thrive.

When a plant is not thriving, the gardener may need to seek help from a friend, from the library, or from a horticultural expert.

Finally, after much hard work and attention, there is a garden — a "fertile spot" that brings delight to all. Pride abounds as the gardener sits in it, admires it, tells others about it, and invites them to enjoy it as well.

Most people see little comparison between gardening and nursing in extended care, but the nurse in extended care is cultivating people, helping them grow and bloom.

Caring for the aged and disabled means helping them grow in maintaining health, productivity, in relationships, in self-esteem, and in ability to enjoy life. Recognizing and preventing loneliness, uselessness, withdrawal, and senility requires time. The nurse must know each patient, must be with, listen to, and understand what the patient is feeling and must share.

The nurse requires special knowledge and must know when and how to use special tools — reality orientation, remotivation therapies, and behavior modifications.

Nursing is hard, physical work, which is often repetitive and sometimes grubby — bathing, dressing, lifting, exercising, feeding and toileting.

Caring for the aged and disabled means learning and using the patients' past to make their lives good now. The nurse must work as part of a team, seeking and encouraging help and advice from other team members — knowledge, skills, hard work, cooperation, and a belief that it is all worthwhile.

These are the things that foster growth. They are also the things that can make an extended care facility a "fertile spot" all can be proud of, a place where the aged and disabled are valued, where they feel good about themselves, and where they are busy enjoying life.

HIFCM is a place that celebrates life — past, present and future.

That's exciting.
That's something to tell others about.
That's something to be proud of.

Consumers offers storm tips

Thunderstorms are a major threat in Michigan, generating lightning and hail as well as interrupting power to homes and businesses. Losing electricity can be frustrating and annoying; until your electricity is restored, Consumers Power offers these tips to help you weather the storm — safely and conveniently:

- Keep an alternative light source available, such as battery-operated flashlight or candles.
- Keep a list of emergency phone numbers near your phone. Consumers Power's customer service number is listed on your bill or in the white pages of your local telephone directory under Consumers Power.
- When you call Consumers Power to report a problem, the more facts you provide, the better. What time did you lose power? Are your neighbors' lights off also? Are trees or wires down in your yard or street? Customer phone calls are the primary way Consumers Power knows which customers have lost their electric service.
- Treat downed wires as if they are charged with electricity. Don't touch them. Also, beware of branches that may be entangled with a downed wire; don't touch them either.
- If you know a storm is coming, consider filling your bathtub and several drinking containers with water in case your electric pump loses power. That way, you'll have water for drinking, flushing the toilet, and cooking.
- Open your refrigerator and freezer as infrequently as possible. Food will usually stay frozen in a fully loaded freezer between 36 and 48 hours if you keep the door closed. In a half-full freezer, food can stay frozen

- around 24 hours.
- Cooking during the outage can be done on a camping stove, your fireplace, or by using sterno fuel placed in its holder on a flameproof surface. Use caution and be sure to provide enough ventilation. Camp stoves and charcoal grills should be used outside only.
- If you use a standby electric generator, be sure that a transfer switch is installed in your fuse box. This will prevent power from your generator from feeding into Consumers Power lines, which could endanger line workers.
- Never operate a generator indoors. Exhaust fumes can cause carbon monoxide poisoning.
- During prolonged outages of three days or longer, transfer the food in your freezer and refrigerator to the home of a friend who has electricity.

Customers requiring continuous operation of monitoring or life-sustaining equipment should call Consumers Power's customer service department and report their medical situation.

The company will give priority to these accounts; however, speedy restoration is not always possible. These customers should have a backup source of emergency power available.

If the phones are busy, these customers should contact their local fire or police department for assistance.

Finally, use common sense where lightning is involved in a storm. If you are caught outside, seek shelter in a large building or an automobile. Don't be a lightning rod by standing under a tree or sitting in an open boat or field.

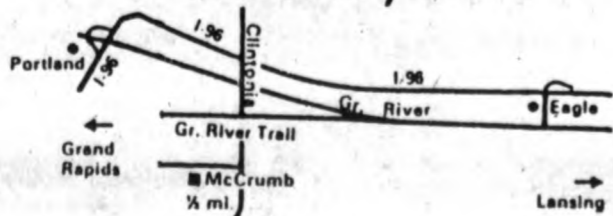

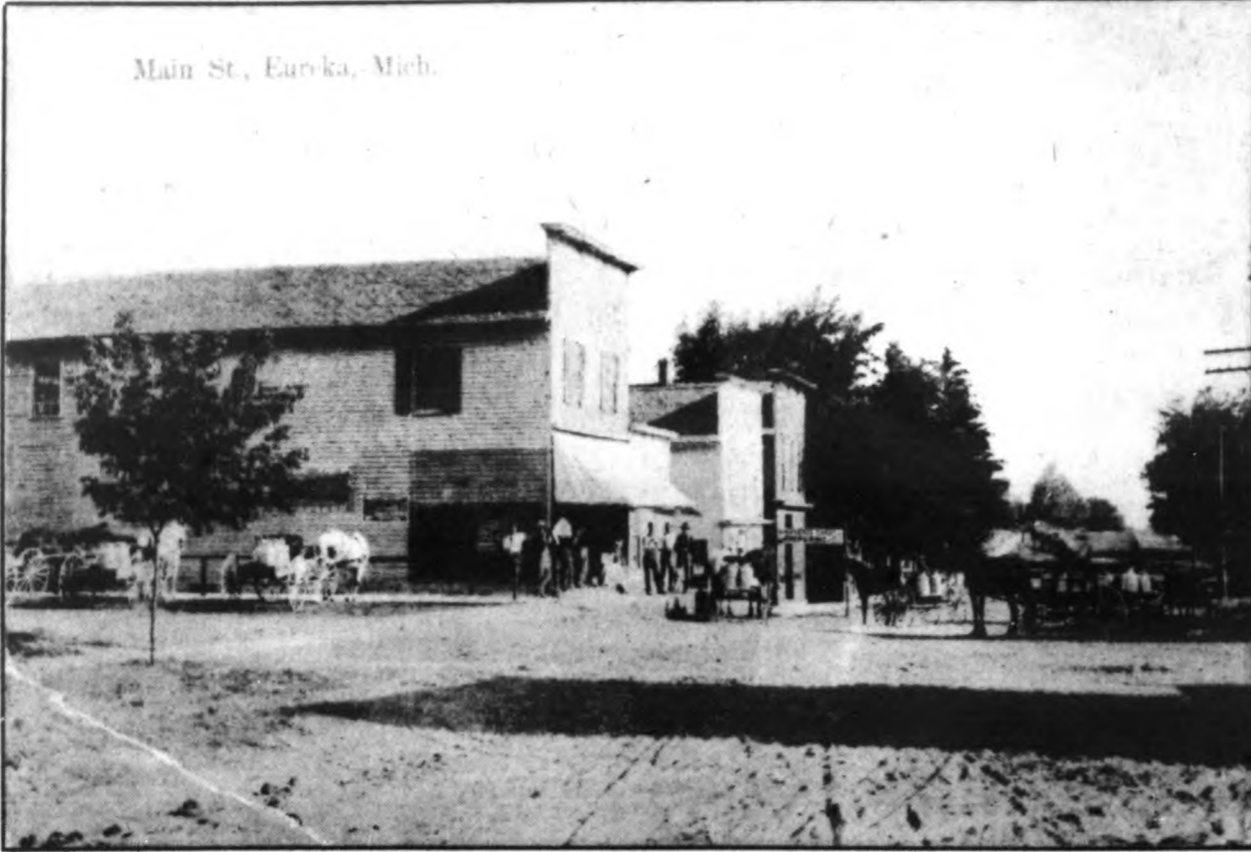

SOUTHERN CLINTON COUNTY

MUNICIPAL UTILITIES AUTHORITY

Code of Regulations

The following rules and regulations are adopted and promulgated by the Southern Clinton County Municipal Utilities Authority pursuant to the rulemaking powers granted to the Authority by Section 4 of Act 233 of the Public Acts of 1955, as amended by Act 178, of the Public Acts of 1985.

Section 1.01. Title. These rules and regulations shall be known and may be cited as "the Southern Clinton County Municipal Utilities Authority Code of Regulations."

Section 1.02. Definitions. For the purposes of administering and enforcing these regulations, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings ascribed to them as follows:

A. The "Authority" means the Southern Clinton County Municipal Utilities Authority, SCCMUA, a Michigan public body corporate organized and existing under the provisions of Act 233 of the Public Acts of 1955, with the principal office located at 3671 Heribson Road, DeWitt Township, Clinton County, Michigan.

B. The "Commission" means the governing body of the Authority which is composed of a Board of members appointed by the constituent municipalities of the Authority.

C. "Constituent Municipalities" mean all of the municipalities which have signed the third amended Articles of Incorporation of the Authority being the Township of DeWitt, the Charter Township of Bath, the City of DeWitt, and the Charter Township of Watertown, and such other municipalities as may become constituents by signing the amended Articles of Incorporation.

D. "POTW" means the Publicly Owned Treatment Works being the sewage treatment plant constructed, owned and operated by this Authority and all facilities for collecting, transporting, pumping, treating, and disposing of sewage whether owned or operated by the Authority or county constituent municipalities.

E. "Significant Industrial User" means any industrial user of the POTW which (i) has a discharge flow of 24,000 gallons or more per average work day, or (ii) has a flow greater than 5% of the combined flow of the collection system of the constituent municipality to which it is connected, or (iii) has or is likely to have in its wastes toxic pollutants as defined by state or federal rules, or (iv) is found by the Authority or the U.S.E.P.A. to have (a) a significant impact singly or in combination with the contributors on the wastewater treatment system, (b) cause in whole or in part the Authority's failure to comply with the effluent limitations of its NPDES Permit, (c) restrict in whole or in part the Authority's approved Program for Effective Residuals Management (PERM), (d) cause in whole or in part operational problems at the treatment facility or the collection system, (e) exceed local limits established in accordance with the approved pretreatment program, or (f) exceed federal pretreatment standards as identified at 40 CFR 403 and in regulations issued pursuant to Section 307(b) and (c) of the Clean Water Act.

Section 2.01. Permit Required. No significant user shall connect or contribute to the POTW without first having obtained a Wastewater Discharge Permit from the Authority. A Wastewater Discharge Permit shall not be reassigned or transferred or sold to a new owner, new user, different premises or a new or changed operation without the approval of the Authority.

Section 3.01. Permit Compliance. All significant users, their agents, and employees, shall comply with all the terms, conditions, and limitations of the permit, the ordinance and all pretreatment requirements necessary to achieve compliance with federal categorical pretreatment standards.

Section 4.01. Inspection, testing, and monitoring requirements. Persons or occupants of premises where wastewater is created or discharged shall allow the Authority, its agent, or representative ready access at all reasonable times to all parts of the premises for the purpose of inspection, sampling, records examination and copying, or the performance of any of their other duties.

Section 4.02. Same. Monitoring and Sampling Devices. All users of the system shall set up and maintain or allow to be set up, on the users premises such devices as are necessary to conduct sampling, inspection, compliance monitoring, and/or metering operations.

Section 5.01. Prohibited Discharges. No user shall contribute, directly or indirectly any wastewater which will interfere with the operation or performance of the POTW or cause the Authority to fail to comply with its effluent limitations, or restrict the Authority's approved program for effective residuals management. These prohibitions shall include among others, those specific prohibited substances as described at Section 7B & D of the Wastewater Collection and Treatment Ordinance of each constituent municipality. These prohibitions shall apply to all users whether or not the user is a significant user or subject to pretreatment standards or requirements.

Section 6.01. Enforcement, Discontinuance of Service.
(1) In addition to any other legal remedy available to the Authority or the constituent municipality, the Authority may authorize the discontinuance of service to a user who violates a rule or regulation adopted herein if the Authority determines that discontinuance of service to that user is necessary to protect the integrity of the affected system.
(2) The Authority shall authorize restoration of service to that user when the Authority determines that the threat to the affected system no longer exists and that the cause of or events resulting in the violation will not recur.

Section 6.02. Same; Misdemeanor Violations.
A. A person who knowingly submits or prepares for submission to the Authority a false statement, representation, or certification is guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by imprisonment for not more than 90 days, or a fine of not more than \$500.00, or both. Each violation constitutes a separate and distinct offense.
B. A person who knowingly tampers with or alters a monitoring device or process, causing inaccurate readings or results, is guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by imprisonment for not more than 90 days, or a fine of not more than \$500.00, or both. Each violation constitutes a separate and distinct offense.

Section 6.03. Same; Civil Infractions.
Any person who violates any provisions of this Code of Regulation which is not designated a misdemeanor shall be responsible for a civil fine to be assessed by the Clinton County District Court in an amount not to exceed \$500.00 plus costs. A fine assessed under this Section shall be distributed pursuant to Section 8379 of the Revised Judicature Act, being MCL 600 8379.

Section 6.04. Same; Citations.
The Superintendent, or in his or her absence, the Assistant Superintendent is charged with the enforcement of this Code of Regulation and may issue a citation or an appearance ticket to any person who is reasonably believed to have violated a rule or regulations of this Code.

7.01. Schedule of Fees and Charges.

In order to ensure that the entire cost of implementing and enforcing the Industrial Pretreatment Program be born by non-domestic users as required by Federal Regulations the following fees and charges shall be paid by the user to the Authority to defray the cost of the Program.

When additional parameters are required on samples collected and processed by the Authority but analyzed by a contract laboratory, the Authority shall pay the contract laboratory and pass on this direct cost to the user together with the appropriate sampling fee.

When it is necessary for the Authority to utilize the services of legal, engineering, architectural, or other professional consultants to assist in reviewing applications and/or devising permit conditions, requirements or limitations, reasonable and customary fees actually paid by the Authority shall be charged to the Permittee in addition to all other charges required.

Section 8.01. Amendments.
The provisions of this Code of Regulations may be amended, deleted, or added to by Resolution of the Commission duly adopted at a properly convened public meeting, and concurred in by Resolution of the governing body of each constituent municipality. Except that amendments to the schedule of fees and charges contained at Section 7.01 of this Code may be adopted by Resolution of the Commission which shall be filed with the duly appointed clerk of each constituent municipality, and concurrence in the case of amendments to Section 7.01 shall thereafter be inclusively deemed to have been granted unless any one or more constituent governing body adopts a resolution of nonconcurrence within 45 days after filing of the Commission's Resolution.

Section 8.02. Effective Date.
These rules and regulations shall become effective 30 days after the date of publication of the notice of resolution adopting these rules and the rules and regulations in a newspaper of general circulation within the territory of each of the constituent municipalities.

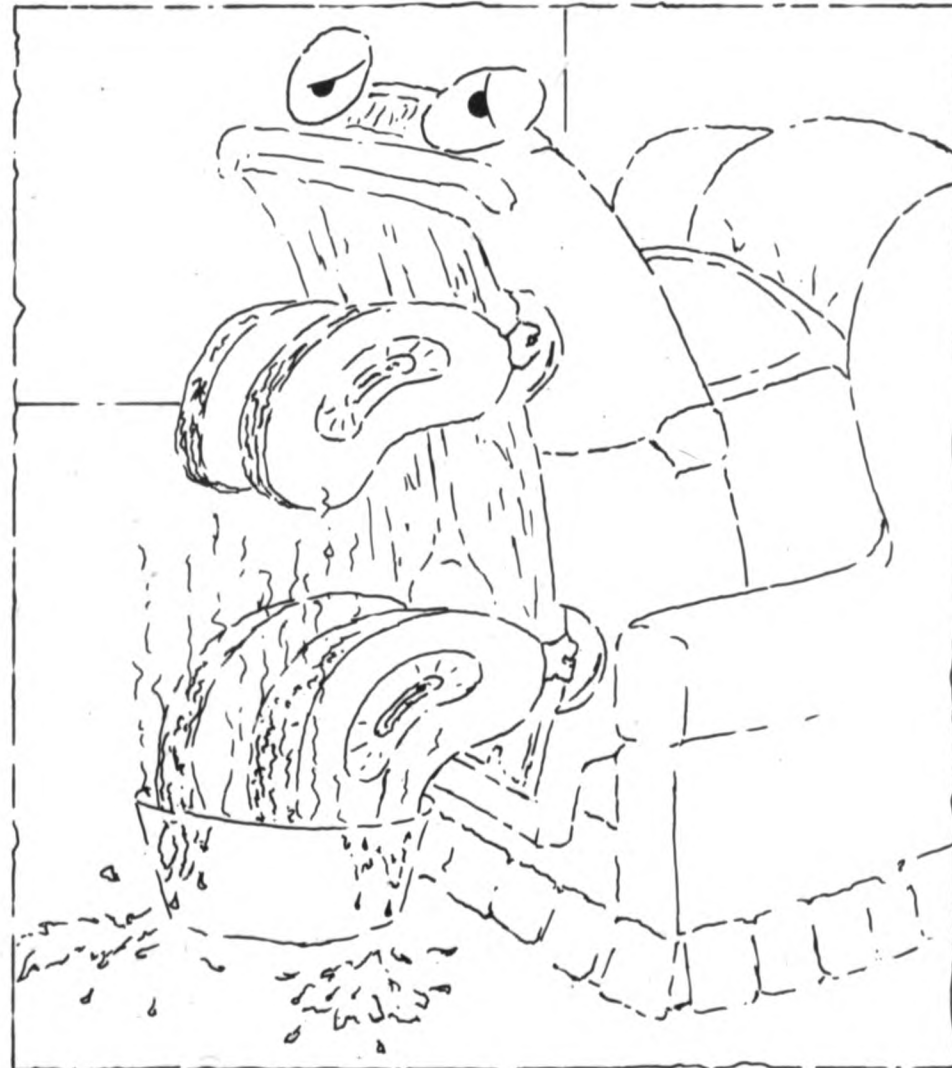

Roehl lines Insect update

By Giles Roehl



Insects are still around and damaging the crops. Scouting is absolutely necessary, check for:

Mexican bean beetle — The newly emerged adults do a lot of feeding as they build up overwintering reserves. Hence, if there is more than one adult per plant and pods have not filled, treatment should be considered to prevent severe defoliation.

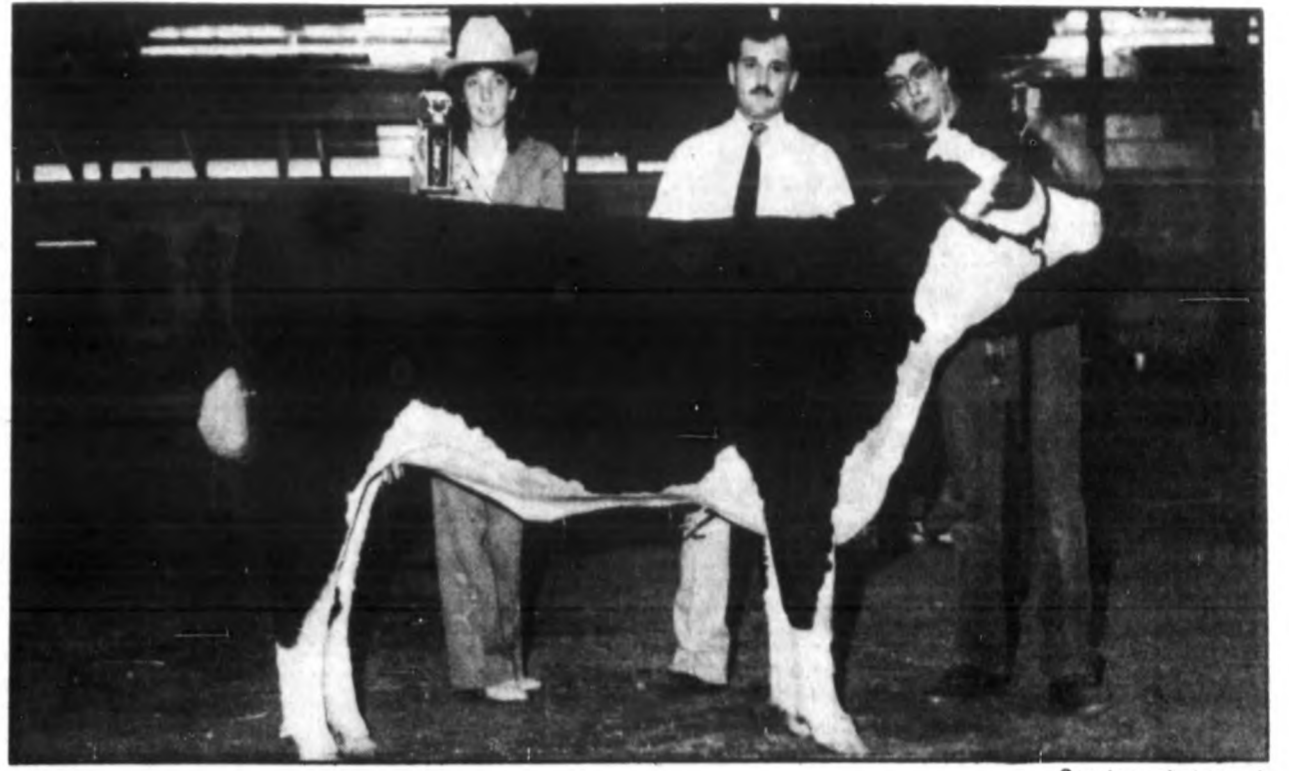
Mites — Mites are sometimes a problem, especially under dry conditions. If yellowing is found along margins or in limited areas of fields, mites are usually the problem. Localized treatment with a material such as Cygon is effective, but recheck the areas 5-7 days later for additional buildup. Mites can build up very rapidly; if treatment is deemed necessary, don't delay.

Potato leafhoppers — They continue to be abundant in alfalfa and some bean fields. In alfalfa, follow the

threshold guidelines of one quart or more per tip or 20 or more per sweeps. If the alfalfa is large enough to cut and the infestation is heavy, cut immediately and check the regrowth. In bean crops, treatment should be considered if pods are not filled and thresholds are exceeded, since flowers and young pods are particularly vulnerable to leafhoppers.

Indian meal moth (in stored products) — The key to all insect problems in stored products is sanitation — start out with clean, insect-free facilities, and keep them that way. The key for the homeowner or a store with a problem is similar — eliminate the source (old bird food, nuts, dried fruit, dog food, rabbit pellets, flour, cereals, etc.) keep the area clean, and try to have relatively rapid turnover of these products.
