Citizens debate merit of proposed jail site

The "preferred site" for the proposed Clinton County Jail drew considerable debate from the more than 125 persons attending an informational meeting on the county project last week.

Clinton County Commissioners named a 60-acre parcel of land located on Townsend Road just east of Scott Road as their number one choice for the location of new jail. The jail would be built on the middle section of the site with room for ex-

pansion to the north, and area to the south suitable for construction of a future court complex.

The preliminary cost of the project is estimated at \$5,040,000 according to Gus Harrison, Inc., and Landmark Design, jail consultant and architect of the complex. A countywide bond issue would finance the project with a levy of not more than 1 mill spread over a period of 20 years.

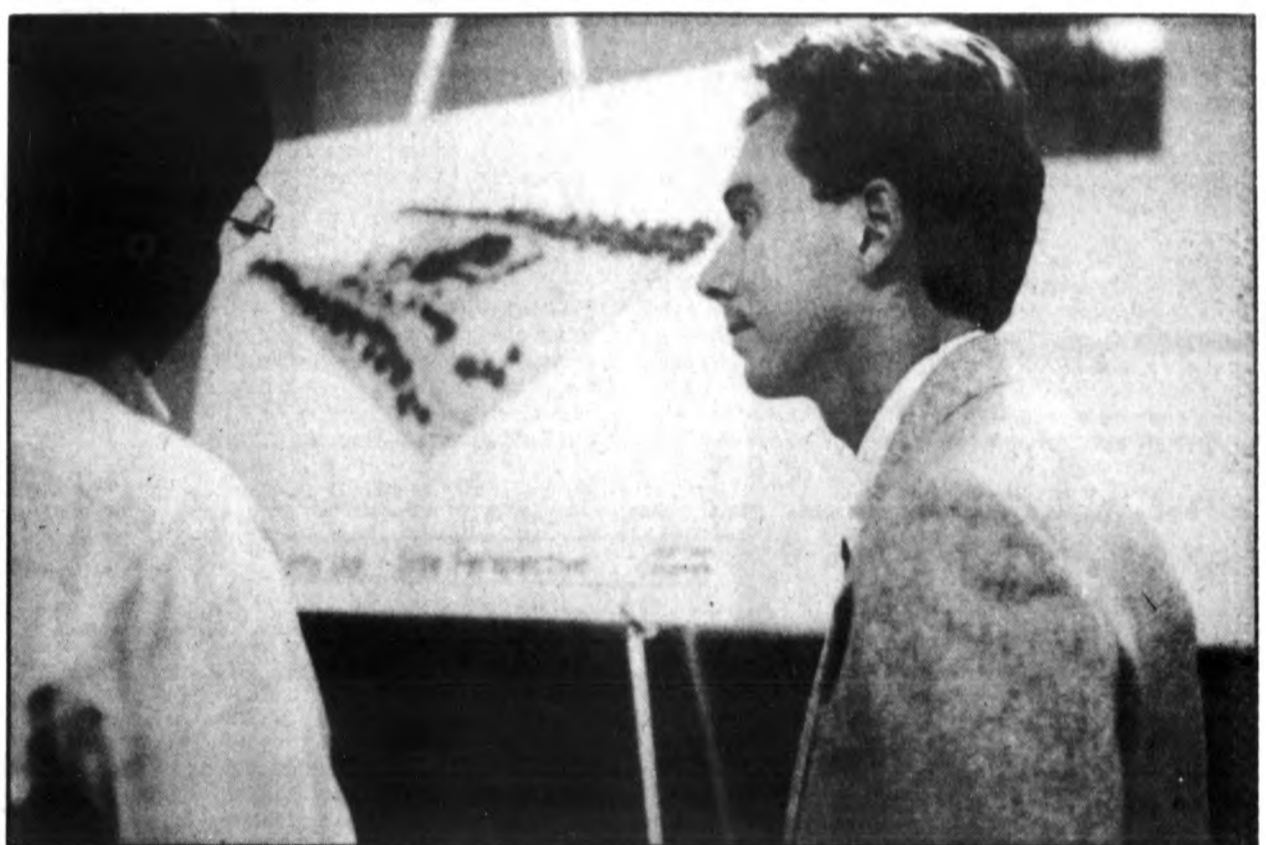
THE \$5 MILLION price tag includes an estimated \$4.2 million for building costs, fixed and detention/security equipment, \$600,000 for site work and utilities, and \$240,000

recommended an allowance for construction contingencies.

In an overview of the project, Harrison noted a number of inadequacies in the current jail.

"Your current jail is not secure...the food service area is very bad...there is no infirmary...cells are undersized by modern standards..." Harrison said. "Today, everybody likes to sue. Your medical and food conditions make the county ripe for lawsuits."

THE MAIN FOCUS during the question and answer session that followed was not directed at the need for a new jail, but rather on the 60-

sewage system under construction on the south side of St. Johns should handle increased sewage.

"You (the commissioners) will shut down the expansion of St. Johns to the south and east," said one person in attendance.

Commissioner Dick Hawks stated that in checking with the city engineer on sewage problems, he was told there would be no problem in the system handling additional waste from the jail.

The commissioners said they had looked into purchasing other parcels within the St. Johns city limits, but felt land costs were too high. They indicated that alternate sites were being explored.

"THE COUNTY FARM is probably our second choice site," Hawks said.

A lagoon sewage system would probably be used if that site was selected, and that would present a variety of problems, Hawks said. According to Department of Natural Resource authorities prior to the in-

stallation of a lagoon, the county would have to check for groundwater contamination and get discharge permits. Those procedures could take up to six months to complete.

"Then, you still have to have a well to provide water," Hawks said. "Those are just some of the problems of building out there."

The proposed jail would have a 130-bed capacity with housing for prisoners located on the perimeters of the planned three-wing structure. There is room for the addition of future wings. Also included in the preliminary design are work-release areas, an intake area, and food area in the center of the complex with the left end of the building designed for public visitation use.

Using the single-story design, jail operations could be done without adding more jail staff, Harrison said. Operational costs for maintenance in the building could not be made with the preliminary design, he said.

OTHER QUESTIONS raised by

persons in attendance included what the commissioners planned to do if the bond issue passed and bids for construction of the complex were over the estimated \$5 million total, and a purported move of current court buildings onto the 60-acre site.

"People in this county are not stupid," a person in the audience said. "We want to be told the truth — not half-truths."

Commissioners stated that they planned to schedule additional information meetings in the future.

"What we would like to see is about 14 people volunteer to head a committee to look into some of these problems and get answers," Commissioner Glenn Webster said.

Voters will go to the polls on Nov. 3 to determine the fate of the proposed jail. Voters rejected a bond proposal for a new jail by a vote of 9,469 to 7,033 in 1979 and again in 1982.

Last November, a jail proposal was rejected by a close 80-vote margin.

Schools won't open teen health clinic

The St. Johns Board of Education adopted the "Michigan Model" at its meeting last week, with the stipulation that the Michigan Health Department be made aware that the school district is not interested in establishing teen health clinics.

Board member Jim Parr cast the lone dissenting vote on adoption of the model, stating his opposition to the establishment of teen health clinics and wording used in the presentation of the program.

"As I see it, the implementation plan assumes that schools will establish teen health clinics," Parr said. "Until that is taken out, I can't support the program. Most of it (the Michigan Model) is fine...but I'm not prepared to support it."

The board approved the program following general discussion which favored drafting a letter of clarification to the Michigan Department of Health stating that the school district had no intention of establishing a teen health clinic.

IMPLEMENTATION OF the kindergarten through sixth grade health curriculum will cover a two-year span where one-half of K-6 teachers will receive in-service training this fall and the remainder in the 1988-89 school year.

The Michigan Model consists of approximately 40 lessons at each grade level K-6. Ten topic areas of health are covered, including disease prevention and control, personal health practices, nutrition, growth and development, family health, substance abuse, consumer health, safety and first-aid, community health, and emotional and mental health.

State appropriations provide the major source of funding for the program. The school district has budgeted \$4,100 for the program with most of that amount going toward payment of substitute teacher salaries while staff teachers receive

in-service training.

"\$4,100 is a real bargain," Board President Jeanette Adams said. "If we were going to try to buy \$12 textbooks for all K-6 grade classrooms we wouldn't get very far."

Board members stated that the health books currently in use in K-6 classrooms are 20 years old.

ALSO AT THE Aug. 24 meeting, Stuart Fitzpatrick, Grand Knight of the Knights of Columbus St. Johns Council, presented checks to several

organizations from monies raised during the K of C annual Tootsie Roll Drive.

Checks in the amount of \$550 were presented to St. Johns Public Schools, Clinton County Special Olympics, and Clinton County Intermediate School District. Clinton County 4-H received a check for \$435, and checks for \$200 and \$600 were mailed to the Boy Scouts of America and the St. Louis Center.

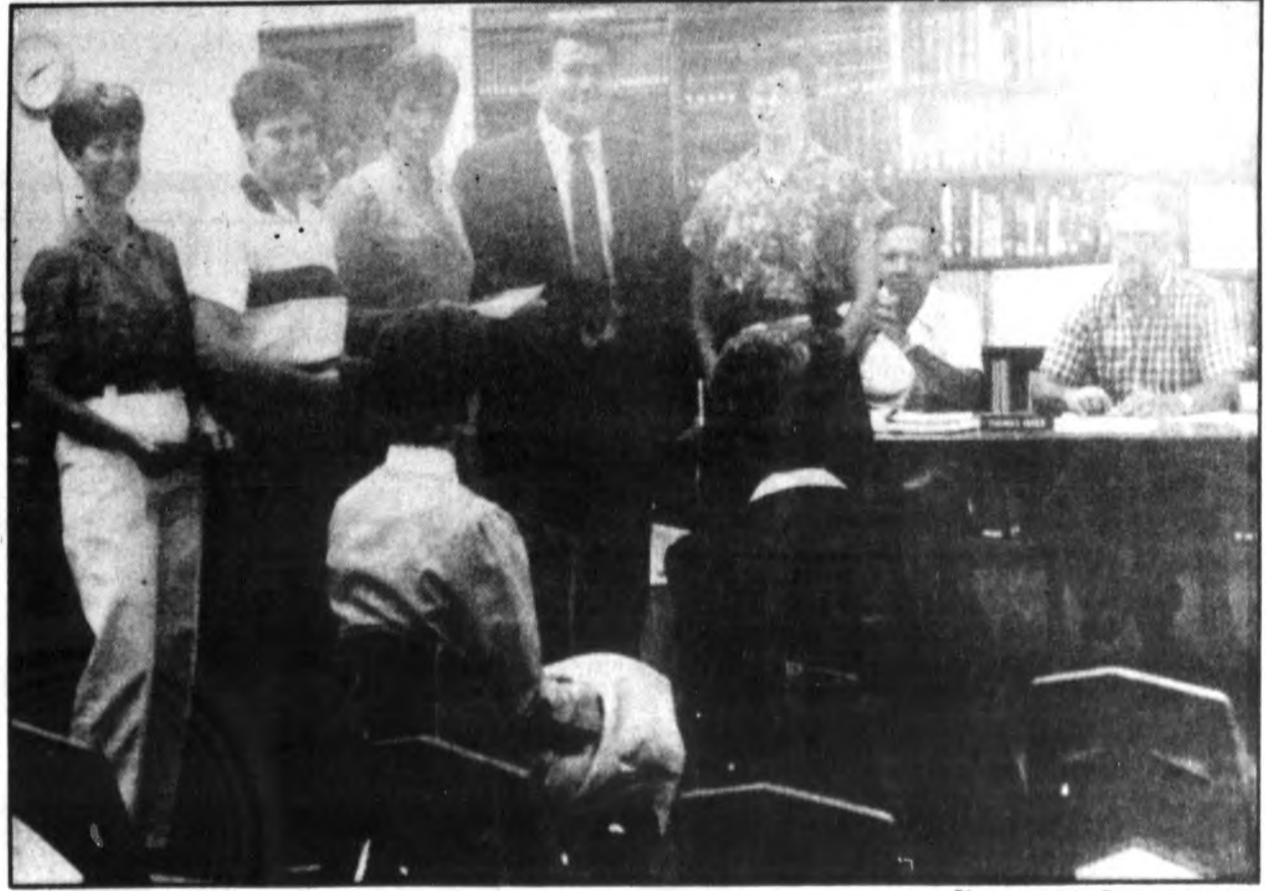

'Why I went to Wurtsmith'

To the Editor:

Why I went to Wurtsmith — I, and other Christians who are interested in non-violence, went there to:

• **Remember.** It was the 42nd anniversary of the bombing of Hiroshima — the day the U.S. intentionally dropped an atomic bomb on a civilian population. We filed past the pictures painted by survivors and remembered the terror, the blood, the "black rain," the bodies clogging the rivers, the 300,000 degree fire and the evaporation of persons into shadows. We remembered that each of the 300,000 killed had a family and friends.

• **To remember the past** is to commit oneself to the future. To remember Hiroshima is to abhor nuclear war. To remember Hiroshima is to commit oneself to peace." Pope John Paul II.

• **Repent.** We admit that today we, the U.S., have the stockpile equal to more than 615,385 Hiroshimas — enough to kill every person on earth 12 times. Michigan, alone, ranks sixth in the number of weapons that are deployed or stored. The bombers at Wurtsmith have a total of 150 nuclear bombs, 60 SRAM missiles, and 200 nuclear air-launched cruise missiles. Each cruise missile carries an explosive force 15 times more powerful than the bomb dropped on Hiroshima. We repent for

our four sins: 1) thinking of it; 2) building it; 3) being willing to use it; 4) being willing to use it first.

Because we are citizens of the U.S. and taxpayers, we have a part in this and live with it. We repent our involvement in it.

• **Resist.** Christianity is not a spectator sport. We are called to imitate the life of Jesus who resisted and rejected evil on every occasion. Jesus freed us to do what is right regardless of the consequences. We don't decide to resist; we are called by the life of Jesus to change the condition of our world today. It even states in the Nuremberg principles (a secular document) that if you see your government doing evil you are called to resist evil. Resistance is: a gift of truth; to grab a life-line in a tank full of sharks; to make new possibilities alive; to raise questions.

Jesus taught us how to die, not how to kill. If we intend to live and love like Jesus, there's a good chance we'll get "nailed." Discipleship will cost us, but it gives us the opportunity to invite others to look at the world with us. It brings the confrontation which begins dialogue. I could not do otherwise.

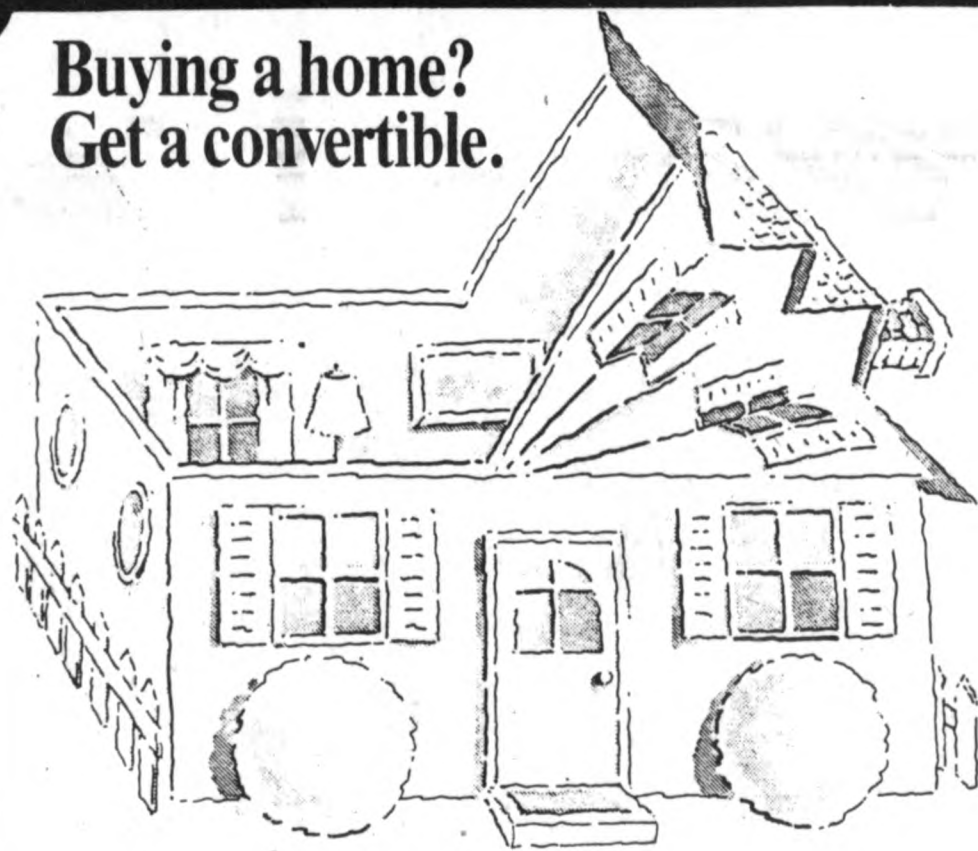

Family focus Freezing vegetables

Late summer offers a plentiful supply of fresh vegetables ready for freezing. Sweet corn, green beans, broccoli, and cauliflower are among those Michigan vegetables ready to be frozen to contribute to more nutritious and enjoyable winter meals.

When selecting vegetables for freezing, keep in mind that young, tender vegetables are the most desirable. The best time for freezing is immediately after picking because the quality of the food begins to deteriorate as soon as the vegetables are harvested. The fresher the vegetables when frozen, the more satisfactory the final product.

Prepare vegetables for freezing much the same way you would for cooking. Wash them under cool running water, so garden dirt doesn't resettle on the food. While washing, remove bruised or spoiled portions.

With the exception of green peppers and onions, vegetables maintain better quality during freezing storage if they are heated before freezing. Heating is an important step in the preparation of vegetables for freezing because it stops the action of enzymes that can cause loss of flavor, color, and texture. Heating also softens the vegetables and makes them easier to pack.

The most common method of heating is blanching. Most vegetables are blanched in boiling water. For

one pound of vegetables (approximately four cups), use one gallon of boiling water. Put the vegetables in a blancher, wire basket, colander, or other suitable holder and lower into actively boiling water. Put the lid on the blancher and immediately start counting the blanching time. Do not wait for the water to return to a boil. Consult a reliable freezing book for proper blanching times. Keep heat on high for the entire blanching time.

As soon as blanching is complete, cool the vegetables immediately in ice water or cold running water to stop the cooking process. Cooling the vegetables should take about the same amount of time as blanching. When vegetables are cool, remove them from the water and drain thoroughly. Don't let vegetables stand in water longer than necessary because loss of flavor and nutrients can occur.

After the vegetables have been blanched, cooled, and drained, pack them in meal-size, airtight, moisture vapor-proof containers leaving a 1/2-inch headspace. After packaging, remove as much air as possible from the container, seal, label, and freeze.

Frozen vegetables should be eaten within one year of freezing to assure optimal nutritional content. Dawn Harris is the home economist for the Clinton County Cooperative Extension Service.

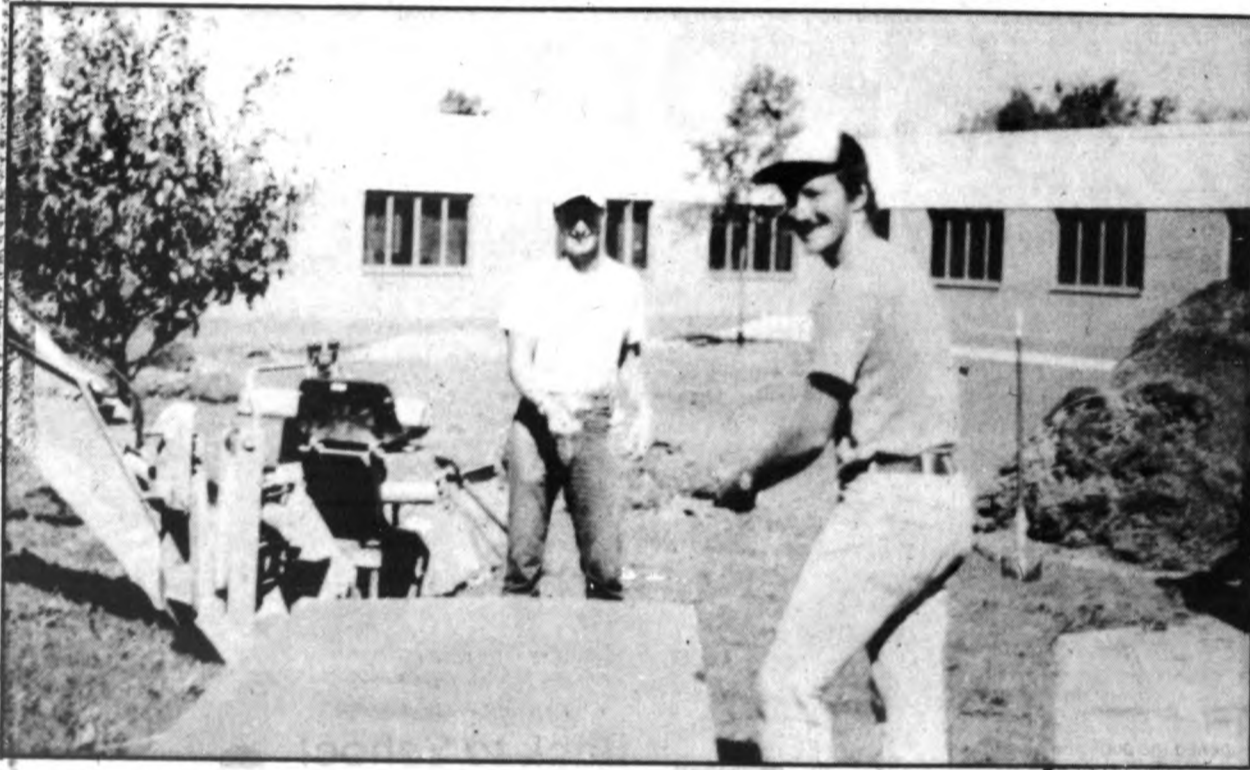

"We were able to exceed all of the goals that we had set for the summer," says Jim Davis, coordinator of job training programs for the district. "We placed over 200 youth in our subsidized jobs program and 380 in our Hire-a-Youth program."

The Hire-a-Youth program had the highest number of placements in the tri-county area for the third consecutive year.

Davis lists a number of benefits received by participants in the summer jobs program such as work experience, an opportunity to build a positive employment record, and regular paychecks. He says the local economy also benefits from the program by receiving approximately \$200,000 in wages paid out to the participants and staff from the federal and state funded programs.

The majority of participants worked at one worksite during the summer learning job skills in office work, custodial services, teacher's aide, painting, or food service. Worksites included Bath Community Schools, Bath Township, DeWitt Public Schools, DeWitt Community Education, city of DeWitt, DeWitt Township, Fowler Public Schools, Fowler Conservation Club, village of Fowler, Ovid-Elsie Area Schools, village of Ovid, village of Elsie, Pewamo-Westphalia Community Schools, St. Johns Public Schools, St. Johns Community Education, CCISD, Region VI Migrant Program, Sleepy Hollow State Park, Rose Lake, 4-H Fairgrounds, Clinton Memorial Hospital, 65th District Court, Drain Commission, RAVE, Prosecuting Attorney's Office, Register of Deeds, Soil Conservation, Watertown Township, and Hazel I. Findlay Country Manor.

Specific summer projects included the building of a 50'x60' bus garage for Bath Community Schools, installing a new roof on the Doctor's Office Annex of the Paine-Gillam-Scott Museum in St. Johns, and installing new windows and wiring and reconstructing the press box at Pewamo-Westphalia High School.

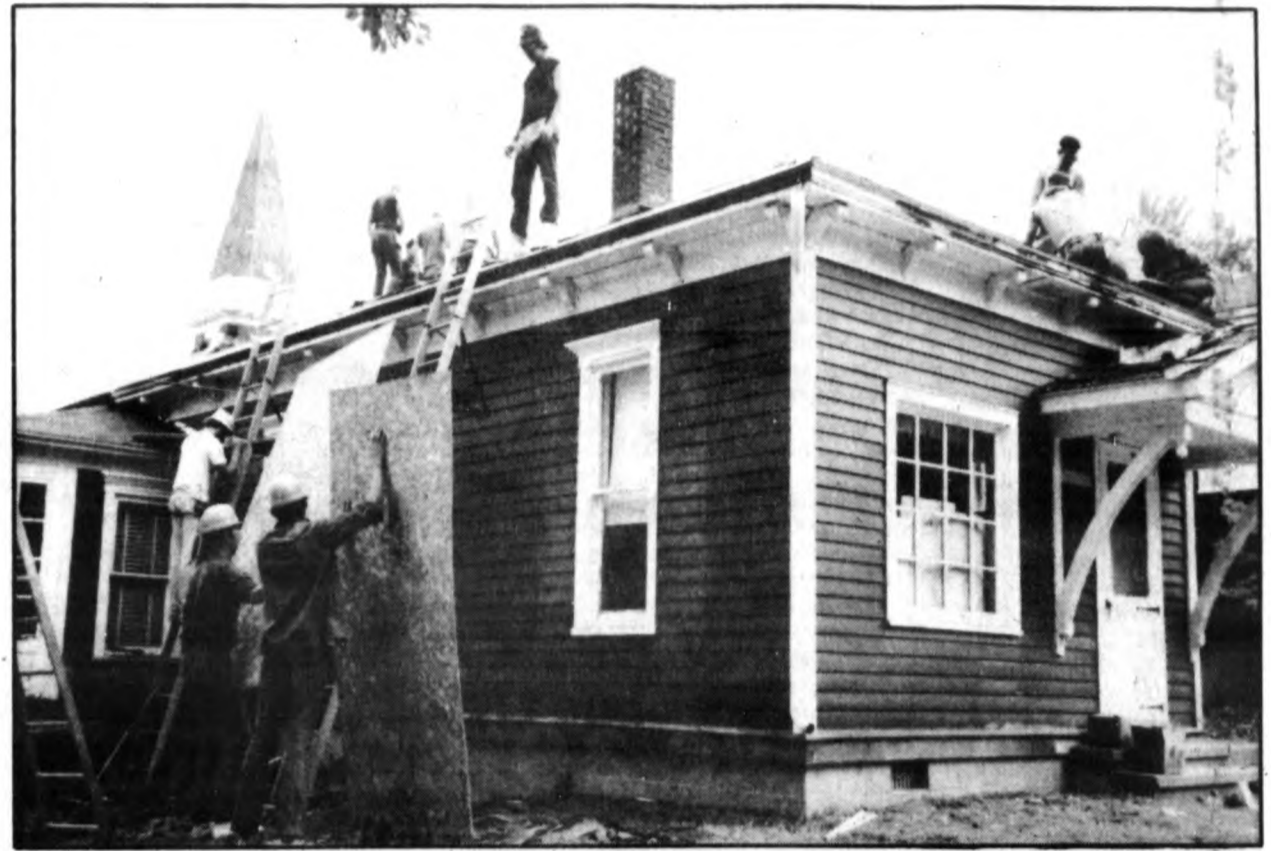
The building trades crew worked under the instruction of Marvin Johnson and Kurt Mabie, the food service

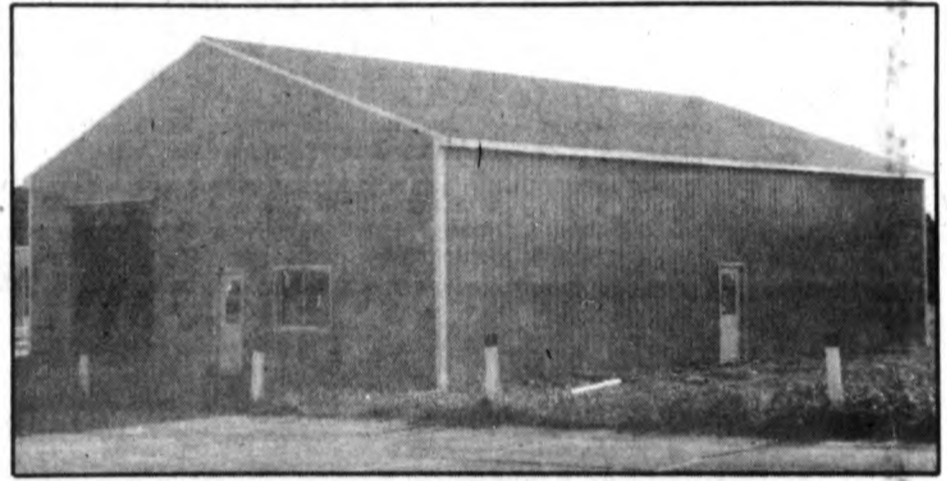
"We are proud of our accomplishments this summer," Davis says, "and look forward to continuing to have a positive impact on the employment and training needs of Clinton County in the future."

Packing lunches

Packing lunch is part of the morning routine for many parents of school-age children. 4-H food and nutrition specialist Pat Hammerschmidt says lunch is an important meal that deserves more thought than a quick decision between bologna and peanut butter sandwiches.

Safety is a major consideration when packing or storing lunches. Hammerschmidt advises against reusing paper sacks because any food spilled in them can result in bacterial growth and she suggests washing lunchboxes thoroughly after each use.

Safe food storage measures include keeping hot foods hot and cold foods cool until they are ready to be eaten.

Foods can be kept cool in a variety of ways. Sandwiches that are frozen and packed in lunches before school will thaw out by lunchtime and save kitchen time in the morning as well.

Hammerschmidt says most sandwich foods freeze well except those containing eggs, jelly, tomatoes, or lettuce. For these foods, she suggests buying an insulated lunch coolant such as blue ice, which can be frozen and placed with the sandwich to keep it cool, or making a coolant by freezing water in a margarine tub with a tight-fitting lid. If you choose the later option, caution your child to dump the leftover ice and water out after lunch before putting the container back in his/her desk or locker. This may save unfortunate spills in the afternoon.

Hot foods such as soup or chili can add variety to cold lunches. They can be stored safely in any thermos container after it has been filled with very hot tap water for a few minutes. Public school lunch programs are also excellent sources of hot, well-balanced meals at reasonable prices.

Nutritionally-balanced cold lunches can be assembled using numerous food combinations.

Milk is very important for young growing bones. It can be packed in a thermos or purchased at most schools. If a child prefers fruit juices on some occasions, cheese cubes make good milk substitutes.

Protein is usually present in the form of sandwich filling or hot thermos food. Beans and nuts can also be added to provide extra protein.

Sandwich bread is a good source of grain. White breads are usually enriched with vitamins and minerals, but Hammerschmidt suggests parents encourage their children to try whole-grain or wheat breads which add fiber and variety.

Fruit is always a good accompaniment, and grapes, berries, and raisins are especially fun to eat.

"It is a great idea to let older children pack their own lunches," Hammerschmidt says. "They not only learn responsibility, but with some nutritional guidelines, they also tend to pack what they enjoy eating. It is also a good way for them to learn about the importance of good nutrition."

The lunch box or bag can also serve as a message center. Busy parents can remind a child about a dentist appointment or Little League practice after school by placing a note between the sandwich and apple. A little note saying, "I love you, see you after school," might brighten a day, too.

Young brown bag carriers often enjoy the opportunity to decorate their sacks with their own designs.

With some thought and imagination on the part of parents and young people, packing lunches to take to school can be a safe, educational, nutritious, and fun activity.

One day at a time

Stress management

Q. I hear you talking about stress management and coping skills, but I don't understand. What are they really?

A. There are basically eight ways people deal with situations in their lives that are hard for them to handle. These eight ways are called coping styles or stress management styles. They are as follows:

1. **Getting information.** Sometimes getting more information before deciding which way to handle a situation is the only logical way to approach it. But if you go to extremes, gathering more and more information while stalling for time, this approach becomes detrimental.

2. **Doing the opposite of what you feel.** If you feel "down" and slow, sometimes the best thing you can do is go find a worthwhile project to work on. Or help a neighbor or friend, a church or community group. Used negatively would be to put on a mask of happiness or "all is fine" when there are situations you should be handling.

3. **Minimizing the importance of the stressor.** This is also called denial, a negative approach usually, and only succeeds in putting off the inevitable facing of that situation. However, if the situation is overwhelming, minimizing it to a proportion you are more comfortable handling may be a positive step, if you then go ahead and face it. Unfortunately, too many people think if they minimize the problem, it will go away by itself.

4. **Avoiding the stressor.** Again this is usually a negative method, especially if coupled with denial. Sometimes called repression or withdrawal, this method only gives the problem more time to grow out of proportion. However, if you have tried all other ap-

proaches and have no cooperation from others involved, breaking with the stressor may be a viable alternative to consider, if you are also ready to accept and deal with the consequences of this decision.

5. **Seeking help.** This is possibly the most positive method available to most people. Finding people who care, who understand your situation, can be very helpful.

6. **Overcoming shortcomings.** Know your limitations and areas of lesser expertise. If it is also an area you must work, take a course or consult an expert. Most Cooperative Extension Service personnel can put you in touch with Michigan State University staff members who specialize in your "short suit," and it is free.

7. **Blaming others** — Too often we tend to project the blame for some situation to someone else when it is too painful to accept the responsibility for at least a part of that situation ourselves. Doing so temporarily is understandable, but to do so continually stunts our emotional growth and maturity and may cost us friends we need.

8. **Doing unrelated pleasurable activities.** This does not include getting away for a few days when we are in a chronic or long-term stressful situation. Using this approach to catch our breath or rethink our perspective so that we can attack the problem again can be very positive. It is when we leave with no intention of returning to handle the situation, that it becomes negative.

Be aware of what coping style you usually use. But also realize there are alternative styles to use and be ready to use them if the situation warrants it.

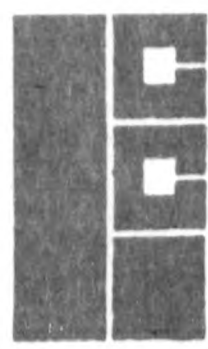

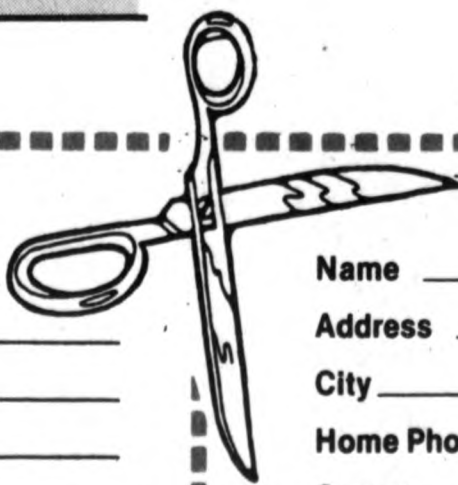

Manure analysis**

A nutrient analysis of manure applied to fields will help farmers save on fertilizer bills by enabling them to reduce the amount of fertilizer nutrients applied by the amount of manure nutrients added.

"The actual nutrient value of manure will vary from farm to farm, depending on the kind of feed rations used and the type of manure handling system," says Lee Jacobs, Michigan State University Extension soil specialist.

Analysis results from nutrient tests of eight beef lot solid manures with bedding, taken from Sanilac and Huron county farms, show the actual amounts of nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium were less than "average values" estimated by the Midwest Plan Service publication "Livestock Waste Facilities Handbook." Tests of manures collected from four dairy operations with liquid pit manure systems also show phosphorus and potassium levels for these manures were below table values, although the nitrogen content was slightly higher.

Farmers who use the estimated table value for their manure and those who make no allowance for manure nutrients will not be applying the correct amounts of fertilizer nutrients to achieve optimum crop production. Often farmers apply the same amount of fertilizer whether they applied manure or not. Using soil fertility tests and correct fertilizer recommendations for the crops grown, along with credit for manure nutrients, can reduce the cost of producing crops.

Researchers point out that farmers can quickly recover the cost of the manure analysis in reduced fertilizer bills and more efficient crop production.

Farmers can send manure samples to:
• A&L Great Lakes Agricultural Laboratories, Inc., 5011 Decatur Road, Fort Wayne, Ind. 46806-3085. For \$29 the lab will determine the amount of nitrogen (N), ammonium sulfamate-nitrogen (NH₄-N), phosphorus (P), and potassium (K).

• Research-Extension Analytical Laboratory, Hayden Hall, Gerlaugh Drive, OARDC, Wooster, Ohio 44691. For \$25 the lab will determine the amount of N, NH₄-N, P, K, calcium (Ca), and magnesium (Mg).

• Soil and Plant Analysis Laboratory, University of Wisconsin-Ext., 5711 Mineral Point Road, Madison, Wis. 53705. For \$18 the lab will determine the amount of N, NH₄-N, P, K, and sulfur (S). For \$27 the lab will also include an analysis of Ca, Mg, sodium (Na), copper (Cu), iron (Fe), aluminum (Al), zinc (Zn), manganese (Mn), and boron (B).

Nutrient values from these three labs will normally be reported in pounds of nutrients per 1,000 gallons of liquid manure or in pounds of nutrients per wet ton of solid manure.

It is important farmers submit a sample that represents the entire manure pit or pile. For liquid manures, agitate or mix the manure in the storage facility before taking a sample. If this is not possible, combine samples from 10 locations in the pit, mix, and fill a one-pint plastic bottle about three-fourths full. Squeeze the bottle to remove some of the air before sealing. This allows space for the gas to expand.

With solid manures, select about 10 samples from different locations in the pile, mix thoroughly, and place about one pound in a clean, heavy-duty plastic

bag and seal.

Samples should be refrigerated overnight and sent by UPS to the laboratory. Ship the sample early in the week so the package will arrive before the weekend and so avoid delays. Each of the three labs will provide sample bottles and an information sheet to help with processing the samples through the analysis.

Windbreaks**

It may seem strange to consider high energy costs for winter at this time of year, but with the advent of cooler days it may be to your advantage to think about what you can do to protect your home from the cold winds.

With energy costs sky-rocketing more and more people are looking for ways to conserve energy and are finding that windbreaks are an answer. According to the United States Department of Agriculture, home heating needs can be reduced by as much as 30 percent with windbreaks.

Dense or multi-row windbreaks on the windward side of a house can shade the home in the summer and reduce winds for energy saving in the winter. Windbreaks also reduce noise, serve as barriers, control snow drifting, and provide food and cover for wildlife.

Although a newly planted windbreak will need several years to mature, this small investment will add value to your property. Windbreaks are well worth the effort of planting and everyone should consider taking advantage of a windbreak's energy sav-

Black nightshade**

We have had our problems with Jimsonweed. Now here is some relatively good news on another weed we are all familiar with.

Black nightshade is poisonous. But how much black nightshade can be consumed by livestock before toxic problems occur? Is this amount different for hay, hayslage, and corn silage?

Both the berries and the foliage of black nightshade are toxic to humans and livestock (including

ruminants). Unlike some toxins, the environment of the rumen will not deactivate the alkaloid toxin in black nightshade. This toxin, more concentrated in the berries than the foliage, creates breathing problems for animals by restricting the flow of oxygen. It can also function as a nerve poison, preventing the diaphragm from getting air. Early symptoms of poisoning are animals' inability to breathe easily.

Black nightshade must be consumed in fairly large quantities before toxicity problems occur.

Corn silage: Although the ensiling process will not deactivate the toxin, there is probably no situation in which black nightshade infestation would be high enough to cause toxicity problems for animals being fed infested corn silage. Estimates are that over one-third of harvested forage would need to be black nightshade before any problem would occur.

Hay: No matter what the level of infestation, animals will likely select against black nightshade when eating hay. So as long as animals have enough other forage to consume, there should be no concern about harvesting alfalfa contaminated with black nightshade.

Hayslage: The greatest potential for toxicity from black nightshade is when feeding infested alfalfa as hayslage. Again, one-third or more of the harvested forage would need to be black nightshade before any toxicity would be expected. If levels of black nightshade are below one-third of forage, there is no need to be concerned about black nightshade in forage fields.

As with any questionable feed, if you have black nightshade mixed in with forage, introduce animals to the feed gradually and look for any adverse reaction. Also, if possible, mix uninfested feed with the infested feed to dilute the toxin.

Corner garden: The rains came, the lawn became a lush green, a deep dark green, except for a few areas where the grass is coarse and not the same green color. The name of the different grass is crabgrass.

At this time of year, crabgrass is a difficult grass to control. Crabgrass is an annual; it grows, seeds, and dies within one year. Controlling crabgrass is best and easiest if done in the spring between April 15 and May 15. Use any of the good commercial products available; they will kill the crabgrass as the seed germinates.

Enjoy the lush green, even with the crabgrass, it is much better than the brown of the hot dry summer. Giles Roehl is the director of the Clinton County Cooperative Extension Service.

Four returning starters from last year's St. Johns girls basketball team spell RELIEF for Redwing Coach Beth Swears.

Varsity starters back from Swears' Class A District Champion and regional finalist 1986-87 team are seniors Gina Schneider, Kerry Porter, and Kristin Kloeckner, and junior Anne Brocker. Also back from last year's 14-8 team are Mindy Martinez and Monica Vasquez.

"As a team, one goal is to win the league championship," Swears said. "If the team continues to work as

hard as they have in the pre-season throughout the year we could be one of the teams to watch in the second season."

The Redwings begin their 1987 campaign next Tuesday (Sept. 8) with a non-conference game at Lansing Eastern. They open their MMB season on Sept. 15 when they face Ovid-Elsie on their home court.

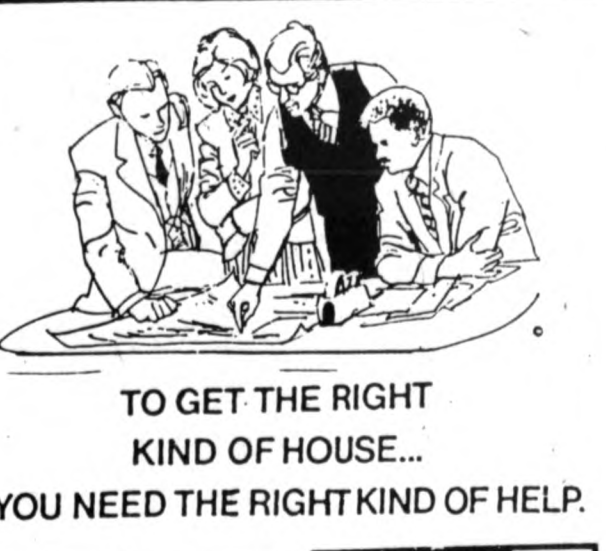

State Laws Pertaining To Stopping For School Bus

FLASHING RED LIGHTS ON EITHER END OF STOPPED SCHOOL BUS

A school bus transporting pupils outside of incorporated cities or villages and inside of incorporated cities or villages where stopping of school buses is controlled by local ordinance, in addition to any other equipment and distinctive marking required by law, shall be equipped with signal lamps mounted as high and widely spaced laterally as practicable which shall be capable of displaying to the front 2 alternately flashing red lights located at the same level and to the rear 2 alternately flashing red lights located at the same level. The lights shall have sufficient intensity to be visible from a distance of not less than 500 feet in normal sunlight and shall be actuated by the driver of the school bus when, but only when, the vehicle is stopped and for a distance of at least 200 feet in advance of a stop for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children. The lights shall not be actuated inside of incorporated cities or villages unless stopping of school buses is controlled by local ordinance.

DIVIDED HIGHWAY, VEHICLE ON OPPOSITE SECTION FROM SCHOOL BUS

The driver of a vehicle upon a highway which has been divided into 2 roadways by leaving an intervening space, or by a physical barrier, or clearly indicated dividing sections so constructed as to impede vehicular traffic, need not stop upon meeting a school bus which has stopped across the dividing space, barrier, or section.

OWNER OF VEHICLE PASSING STOPPED BUS PRESUMED DRIVER

In a proceeding for a violation of subsection, proof that the particular vehicle described in the citation, complaint, or warrant was in violation of subsection, together with proof that the defendant named in the citation, complaint, or warrant was, at the time of the violation, the registered owner of the vehicle, shall constitute in evidence a presumption that the registered owner of the vehicle was the driver of the vehicle at the time of the violation.

PENALTY FOR VIOLATION

Except as otherwise provided in subsection, a person who violates this section is responsible for a civil infraction.
