A parent or guardian must accompany all scouts. Girls should bring a pen and \$4 registration fee.

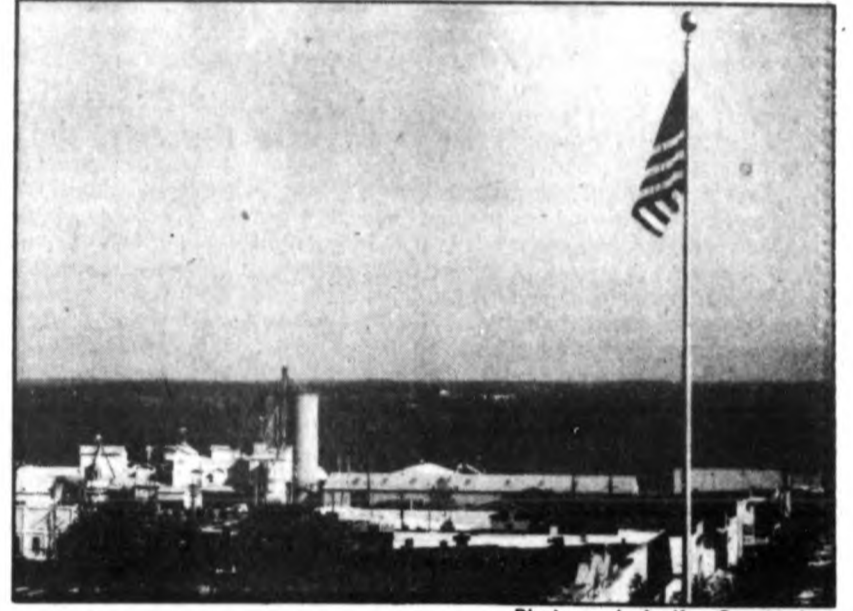
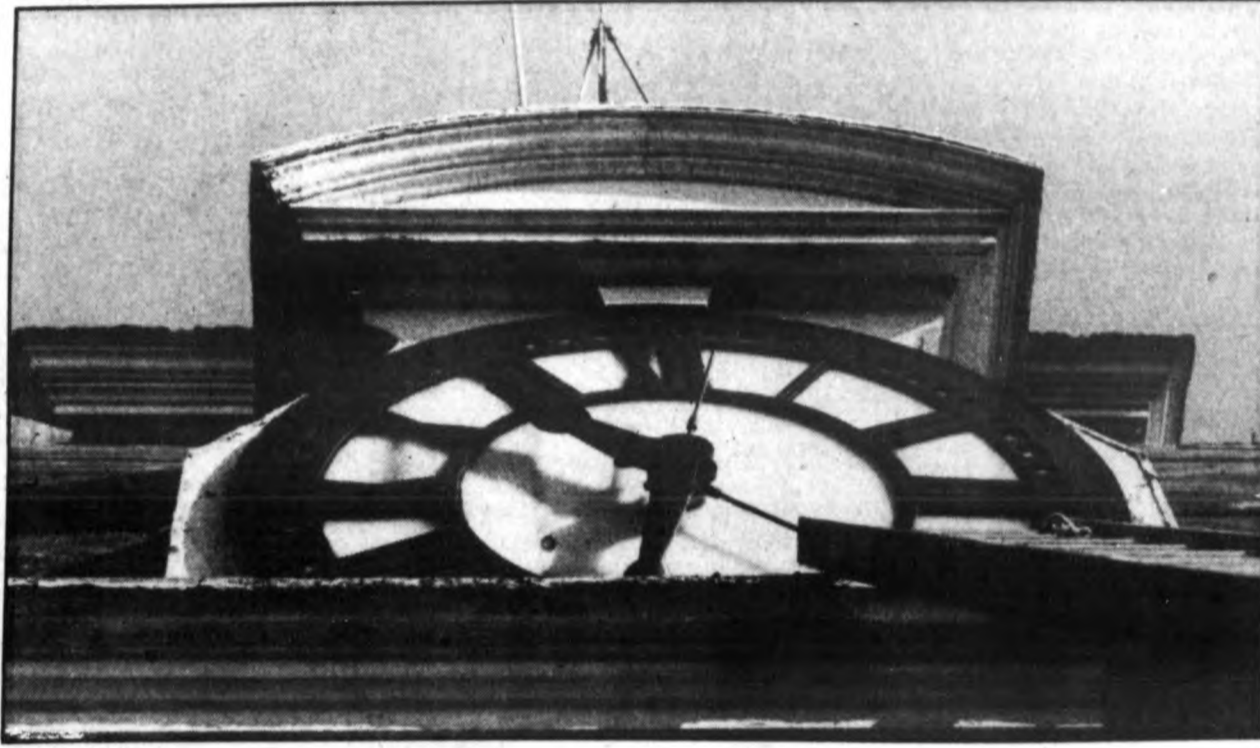

Their job is at the top of the county

To rephrase an old show tune, "On a clear day you can see — Fowler, towers in Lansing, and far to the north of St. Johns."

Providing, of course, that you're standing on the top floor of the Clinton County Courthouse clock tower.

The vista is limitless, and the view of Clinton Avenue stretching north most impressive.

What prompts one to climb 90-plus feet above the ground?

For St. Johns residents Mark Barber and Dan Zuker the climb up has been the only way to get to work. The pair were contracted by Clinton County commissioners to make major repairs to the clock tower and the mansard which surrounds the courthouse.

Work was begun Aug. 24 with the initial phase of the project involving tearing off the old wood around the four clock faces on the tower. Right from the start, Barber and Zuker ran into problems they had not expected to encounter.

"THE LAST TIME construction work was done on the tower, nothing was refashed," Barber says. "It appears that slate was put on right overtop of the old flashing. I think that was back in the 1930s."

"When we began removing the rotted wood, the clock face itself almost fell out."

The new flashing is already in place on the west side of the tower, with cedar shakes placed overtop. The same procedure is being used to redo the remaining three sides of the tower. When the tower is completed, work will begin on the mansard where cedar shakes will again provide the finishing touch.

"We are really taking precautions to make sure all the water stays out," Barber says. "So much water has come through in past years. We're hoping to eliminate that problem."

Barber feels the county commissioners want the job to be done right and notes that County Administrator Bill LeFevre and assistant Jennie Smith both have been helpful in coordinating the project.

"They (LeFevre and Smith) have been extremely cooperative," he says.

IN ALL, 40 squares of cedar will be used with each square measuring 100 square feet. The total bid on the project was \$33,800.

Barber had hoped to have the project completed by the end of October, but that date may have to be revised due to the large amount of rotted wood that had to be replaced and weather conditions.

"So much depends on the weather," Zuker says. "If it gets windy, you just can't work up there. The ladder shakes underneath you."

Construction work 90 feet above ground also presents another problem according to Barber.

"One thing that's tough is when you're lacking a piece of equipment

and have to go down 90 feet to get it — that takes some time."

There are a few compensations for the degree of job difficulty, however. Along with the outstanding view, there is the feeling of being surrounded by past history. From the old bell which has rung out the hour for so many years, to the original

clockwork still in place, to the multitude of dates and names carved in the wood inside the tower, an aura of timelessness prevails.

Signatures with dates as far back as 1895 testify to the longevity of the structure.

"If you're up here, you just have to carve your name," Barber says.

Second folk art fest highlights cultures

Traditionally, folk art has not been widely received as it should be, according to Kaye Pilmore, executive director of Clinton County Arts Council Gallery.

"Although folk art has achieved some recognition, two of the many objectives of the CCAC gallery's second annual Folk Arts Festival, Traditions II, is to renew our modern ties with old generations," she says, "and to share the experience with the people who preserve the culture of

spinning and weaving, basket making, wood carving, American Indian art and quilting, among others."

The folk art festival will be held Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 19 and 20, from 1 to 5 p.m. at the CCAC Gallery located on US-27 and N. Clinton Avenue in St. Johns. Some of Michigan's outstanding folk artists will demonstrate their crafts in a variety of folk art areas.

PILMORE BELIEVES folk art forms continue to create new art forms or works for exhibits and demonstrations designed to be innovative, and to create a traditional

sense of excitement for onlookers and prospective buyers.

Through demonstrations and presentations, the two-day festival features such artists as Roth Brooks of Carson City and Kitty Wiles of Sumner, corn husk crafts; Adaline Dersham of St. Johns, metal tole painting on saw blades; Carolyn Fizzell of Laingsburg and Kathryn Strpko of Ashley, loom weaving; Steena Gaut of DeWitt, wood tole country painting; Jeanne Houston of St. Johns, Australian locker hooking; Dee Morriss of St. Johns, bobbin lace; Judy McEnaney of DeWitt and Linda Hill of Owosso, paper making; Jim Horn of Elsie, fish lure fly tying; Chuck Ruble of DeWitt, wood carving; and Diana Sewell of Perrinton, basket making and hand carved accessories by her husband.

Entertainment included in the outdoor/indoor festival will feature folk and country music, along with instrumental solos.

The folk art exhibit is open throughout September featuring primitives by folk artist Elizabeth Roberts of DeWitt whose work is reminiscent of Grandma Moses. Paintings of area historic buildings, many now destroyed, by David Kemler of Stanton will also be on exhibit. Kemler has taught art at Kendall School of Design in Grand Rapids and Montcalm Community College.

Remodeled school greets new pupils

School bells signalled the first day of the 1987-88 school year for most students in Clinton County last Tuesday, marking the resumption of learning and all the related activities that school normally brings.

But for one small school located in Riley Township, this first day in 1987 was especially meaningful.

For the 46th year, St. Peter Lutheran School welcomed students back to a year of instruction — this year in a newly remodeled school building. Major renovations both to the interior and exterior of the two-room structure were completed just prior to the beginning of classes last week.

New energy-efficient windows replace old wooden ones, new carpeting and paint in both classrooms add to the cheery atmosphere, and exterior landscaping puts the finishing touch on the whole project.

THE MAJORITY OF work was done by volunteers from St. Peter congregation under the supervision of the St. Peter Board of Christian Education, chaired by Dennis Kennedy, and St. Peter Principal Allen Geil.

"The monetary support from members of the congregation and the many, many hours of time spent by volunteer workers really made the renovations possible," Geil says. "In a small school such as ours, people have to be able to work well together and be willing to help each other for a project like this to be successful."

"There's also more satisfaction in the end-result of a project like this if you've had direct hands-on involvement in it."

St. Peter Lutheran School is one of the older private schools still holding regular classes in Clinton County. Classes were begun at St. Peter in September, 1941, with the present school building erected the following year. Since that time, additions to the building and multiple improvements have been made.

THE SITE OF the school includes a large playground, softball diamonds, basketball court, and soccer field — all of which give students plenty of room for recess activities and for learning experiences outside classroom walls.

"We like to think in terms of teaching the whole child — body, mind, and soul," Geil says.

Presently, students are enrolled in kindergarten through eighth grades with Geil serving as principal and teacher of grades 3-8, and Karen Doederlein beginning her sixth year as teacher in the K-2 grade room.

Students at St. Peter enjoy basic elementary and junior high curriculum, including computer skills, and receive daily religious instruction. Except for education fees which cover books and supplies, and a cleaning fee for janitorial duties, all costs of the school are funded by St. Peter congregation. A tuition fee is assessed for persons who are not members of the congregation.

St. Peter Lutheran Church is a member of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. The Rev. Jeffrey Heismoth serves as pastor of the congregation.

911 Day

Getting fast and efficient help in an emergency situation can be the difference between life and death. In recognition of that fact, Friday, Sept. 11, has been designated as 911 Day in Michigan to help generate public support for implementing emergency telephone service in our communities.

By observing Sept. 11 as 911 Day, more people will recognize the importance of this emergency telephone service, and will be encouraged to consider the advantages of a statewide 911 emergency telephone system. Because of geographic boundaries outlined by telephone companies don't always agree with municipal boundaries, some emergency telephone systems result in confusion, inefficiency, and burden local emergency services called to respond outside their jurisdiction.

But Republican-sponsored legislation, now law, improves the organization and funding of 911 emergency telephone systems among many communities at low cost and high effectiveness. Public Act 32 of 1986, helps local units of government establish universal emergency telephone districts that allow people to obtain emergency help by dialing 911.

Specifically, any county that desires to organize its cities and townships into one emergency telephone district must pass a resolution supporting the idea. Any local unit of government may remove itself from the program within 45 days of being notified of plans to form a countywide 911 district.

The act outlines methods to defray the costs of implementing and operating the emergency telephone system. Responsibility for buying the central equipment would rest with the local unit of government, but the service itself would be funded through a charge on local phone users, limited to no more than 2 percent of the current highest rate of monthly service. For residents of large metropolitan areas the average monthly cost ranges from 8 to 22 cents per home.

911 has been used for many years in large cities with great success. It has proven its value as a life saver, and sophisticated advances in equipment can allow dispatchers to plot a caller's location by computer, even if the caller can't talk. 911 is also a number easily remembered by adults and children alike, especially during the stress of an emergency.

Progress toward creating 911 emergency telephone systems in our counties has progressed well since PA 32 was enacted. And I hope all areas of the state will eventually implement 911 emergency systems. PA 32 is an example of state government at its best — providing guidance and opening opportunities for local communities, but not trying to do the job for them. I urge community officials and law enforcement agencies to declare their own 911 Day on Sept. 11. That will help increase public attention and support for this important service.

AIDS task force

Compassion for victims and concern for the public's health are the main goals being emphasized by a newly-formed House Republican Task Force on AIDS.

House Republicans don't pretend to have easy answers. AIDS is the most serious public health problem in decades and state government has a role to play. The task force will examine what can be done to protect the uninfected and how to care for those who have already contracted the disease.

The members are taking a deliberate and sensible approach to this sensitive issue. They will review numerous public health policy statements that have been issued nationwide in the last 12 months, including reports from the American Medical Association and the Center for Disease Control.

The group hopes to answer questions in eight major categories including the scope of the disease, protection against discrimination, the issue of confidentiality, the capacity of the state's medical care system to deal with the disease and the projected cost, the possible intervention techniques, the duty to warn, the role, if any, of the criminal justice system, and how to curb the spread of the disease among intravenous drug users.

These are the broad questions we already anticipate. I am sure many other questions will emerge during the public hearings throughout the fall. A task force report could come in early 1988. The House Republican Policy Committee has already released task force reports on crime reduction and welfare.

The response has been encouraging. House Republicans are presenting sensible approaches to difficult problems and people are taking notice. Even

Blanchard administration officials have called our proposals "innovative and intriguing." In the months ahead, we will continue to make our voices heard on key issues.

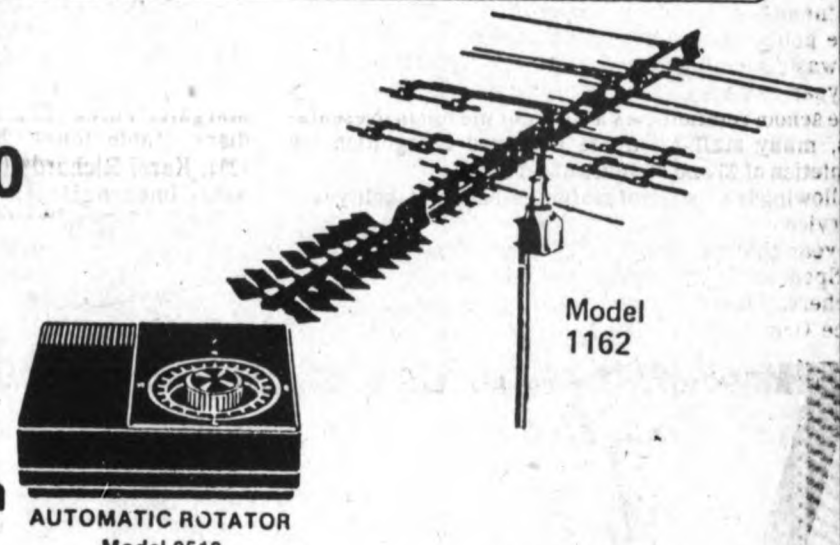

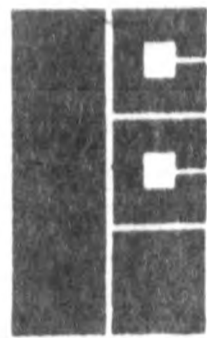

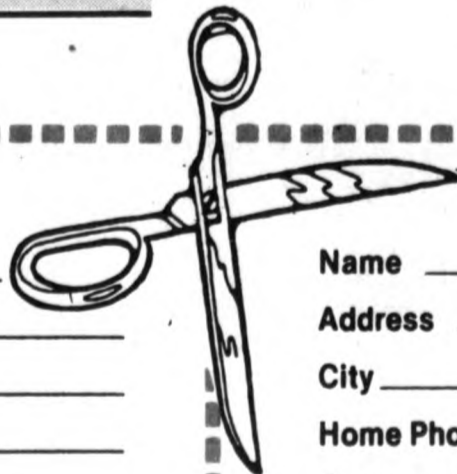

It is not easy for any of us to say "no," often we don't say it because we are afraid of hurting others' feelings. Sometimes, however, a firm clear "no" is needed to get your point across. It will also help if you can look the other person directly in the eye and speak in a convincing tone of voice. That way the other person is sure you have made up your mind.

If saying "no" doesn't work, then your child must try something else. Instead of letting them making excuses for their opinions, why not teach your children to turn the pressure around. The child might say something like, "your pressuring is making me feel like you don't respect me." This way the other person realizes how uncomfortable he/she is making your child feel.

It would help your child to act out a few scenes that he/she might face this coming school year. Remember, a little preventive medicine often replaces a lot of future trouble.

As caregivers of patients diagnosed as senile dementia of the Alzheimer's type, we may feel our actions are of no consequence with these patients. However, I have found that if we maintain close and continuous contact with these patients some disabilities can be prevented and/or temporarily reversed.

Sometimes patients with memory decline due to the disease process, may also exhibit problems with the performance of ADL (Activities of Daily Living), such as the inability to feed himself. However, these skills many times can be reactivated. Assisting the patient to initiate the act of feeding himself, and continuous insistence that he do so, may be enough to reverse the incapability.

Excess disability can also be attributed to many other factors at times. Physical discomfort caused by constipation may cause increased restlessness or agitation and may be interpreted as part of the Alzheimer's syndrome. But when constipation is recognized and alleviated, the excessive behaviors stop. Sometimes shouting, pacing, and restlessness

Alzheimer's workshop planned

A free workshop designed to help persons with a family member who is confused or seriously forgetful is planned for Thursday, Sept. 17, at Clinton Memorial Hospital. The workshop will be held from 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Direct care staff who are working with people with Alzheimer's disease or other dementing illnesses in nursing homes, senior centers, home health care agencies, community mental health centers, hospitals, and adult foster care homes are also invited to attend.

Speakers will discuss what Alzheimer's disease is and how to communicate

with persons who are confused or suffering from memory loss. The afternoon session will focus on legal and financial issues which families face and ways to improve the quality of life for persons with Alzheimer's disease. Suggestions will also be given for managing difficult behaviors such as wandering, incontinence, and difficulties with eating, sleeping, and aggressive behavior.

Some assistance will be available for families who need help in caring for their relative while they attend the workshop.

The workshop is funded by a grant from the Department of Mental

may be behaviors associated with Alzheimer's when, in fact, they may be caused by lack of social or sensory stimulation. Adequate and appropriate stimulation provided by our activity department at HIFCM can sometimes prevent and reverse such behaviors. Disuse also contributes to excess disability. The old saying "You don't use it, you will lose it," is true. These patients will quickly lose the ability to walk if they remain immobilized. Because increasing muscular rigidity is one of the characteristics of this disease process, we must encourage and maintain mobility.

Our goals of nursing care are to prevent or reverse excess disability, help the resident to maintain skills they have, and sometimes to teach ways to perform skills of ADL.

Our purpose of promoting self care of ADL is directed toward preventing and sometimes reversing excess disabilities through reinforcing the familiar and enhancing a sense of competency.

The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, the County of Clinton may use the Block Grant funds, and the State of Michigan will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. The State of Michigan will accept an objection to its approval of the release of funds and acceptance of the certification only if it is on one of the following bases: (a) That the certification was not in fact executed by the chief executive officer or other officer of applicant approved by the State of Michigan, or (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision, finding, or step applicable to project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 98), and may be addressed to the State of Michigan, Department of Commerce, Office of Federal Grant Management, P.O. Box 30225, Lansing, Michigan 48909.

Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by the State of Michigan. No objection received after October 1, 1987 will be considered by the State of Michigan.

Minutes of a Special Meeting of the City Commission of the City of St. Johns, County of Clinton, State of Michigan (the "City") held on the 1st day of September, 1987, at 7:30 o'clock a.m., Eastern Daylight time.

PRESENT: Member Arehart, Wiseman, Parr
ABSENT: Members Starck, Munger

The following preamble and resolution were offered by Member Wiseman and supported by Member Parr:

WHEREAS, this City Commission does hereby determine that it is necessary to acquire and construct major street improvements (the "Improvements") in the City described in Exhibit A, attached hereto and made a part hereof; and

WHEREAS, to finance the cost of the Improvements, the City Commission deems it necessary to borrow the sum of Two Hundred Sixty thousand Dollars (\$260,000) and issue bonds therefor as authorized by the provisions of Act 175, Public Acts of Michigan, 1952, as amended ("Act 175"); and

WHEREAS, the Improvements are in accordance with the purposes enumerated in Act 51, Public Acts of Michigan, 1951 ("Act 51"); and

WHEREAS, the revenues received by the City from the Michigan Transportation Fund pursuant to Act 51 in the year preceding this contemplated borrowing are more than sufficient to comply with all the requirements specified in Section 4 of Act 175;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- The plans and estimates of cost of the Improvements are hereby approved and adopted.
- The period of usefulness of the Improvements is estimated to be not less than twenty (20) years.
- The City Commission hereby determines to borrow the sum of Two Hundred Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$260,000) and issue bonds of the city therefor pursuant to the provisions of Act 175 (the "Bonds"), for the purpose of providing funds to pay part of the cost of the Improvements.
- The Bonds shall be designated 1987 MICHIGAN TRANSPORTATION FUND BONDS and shall consist of bonds registered as to principal and interest of the denominations of any multiple of \$5,000 not exceeding for each maturity the maximum principal amount of the Bonds of that maturity and numbered consecutively in order of registration of transfer. The Bonds will be dated as of September 1, 1987 and be payable on August 1st of each year as follows:
\$10,000 1988 and 1989;
\$15,000 1990 to 1993, inclusive;
\$20,000 1994 to 1997, inclusive;
\$25,000 1998 to 2001, inclusive;

The Bonds shall bear interest to be determined at public sale but not to exceed ten percent (10%) per annum, payable on February 1, 1988 and semi-annually thereafter. The Bonds shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity as provided in Section 9 hereof.

5. The Bonds shall be executed in the name of the City with the facsimile signatures of the Mayor and the City Clerk and shall bear the actual or a facsimile of the City seal. No Bond of this series shall be valid until authenticated by an authorized signature of the transfer agent designated the notice of sale of the Bonds. The Bonds shall be delivered to the transfer agent for authentication and be delivered by the transfer agent to the purchaser in accordance with instructions from the Treasurer of the City upon payment of the purchase price for the Bonds in accordance with the bid therefore when accepted. Executed blank bonds for registration and issuance to transferees shall simultaneously, and from time to time thereafter as necessary, be delivered to the transfer agent for safekeeping.

6. Any Bond may be transferred upon the books required to be kept pursuant to this section by the person in whose name it is registered, in person or by the registered owner's duly authorized attorney, upon surrender of the Bond for cancellation, accompanied by delivery of a duly executed written instrument of transfer in a form approved by the transfer agent shall authenticate and deliver a new Bond or Bonds, in like aggregate principal amount. The transfer agent shall require the payment by the bondholder requesting the transfer of any tax or other governmental charge required to be paid with respect to the transfer. The date of determination of the registered owner for purposes of payment of interest as provided in this resolution may be changed by the City to conform to market practice in the future. The principal of the Bonds shall be payable at the office of the transfer agent designated by the transfer agent. The City Manager shall select a bank or trust company qualified under the state law to act as transfer agent for the Bonds.

7. To provide moneys to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds and in accordance with the provisions of Act 175, there is hereby made an irrevocable appropriation of the amount necessary to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds from the moneys to be derived from State-collected taxes returned to the City for highway purposes, pursuant to law. The Treasurer of the City is directed, each year that any of the principal of and interest on the Bonds remains unpaid, to set aside in a separate depository account, to be designated 1987 MICHIGAN TRANSPORTATION FUND BONDS DEBT RETIREMENT FUND, sufficient moneys from revenues received during such year from the Michigan Transportation Fund pursuant to law to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds next maturing. The Treasurer is further directed to open a separate depository account, to be designated 1987 MICHIGAN TRANSPORTATION FUND BONDS CONSTRUCTION FUND into which the proceeds of the Bonds, less accrued interest and premium, if any, shall be deposited, which account shall be used to pay the City's share of the cost of constructing the Improvements.

8. Pursuant to Act 175, and as additional security for the prompt payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds, there is hereby irrevocably pledged the limited tax full faith and credit of the City, and in the event of insufficiency of funds primarily pledged to the payment thereof, the City covenants and agrees to provide for such insufficiency from such resources as are lawfully available to it.

9. The Bonds shall be in substantially the following form subject to such changes as to ministerial form as may be reasonably requested by the transfer agent:

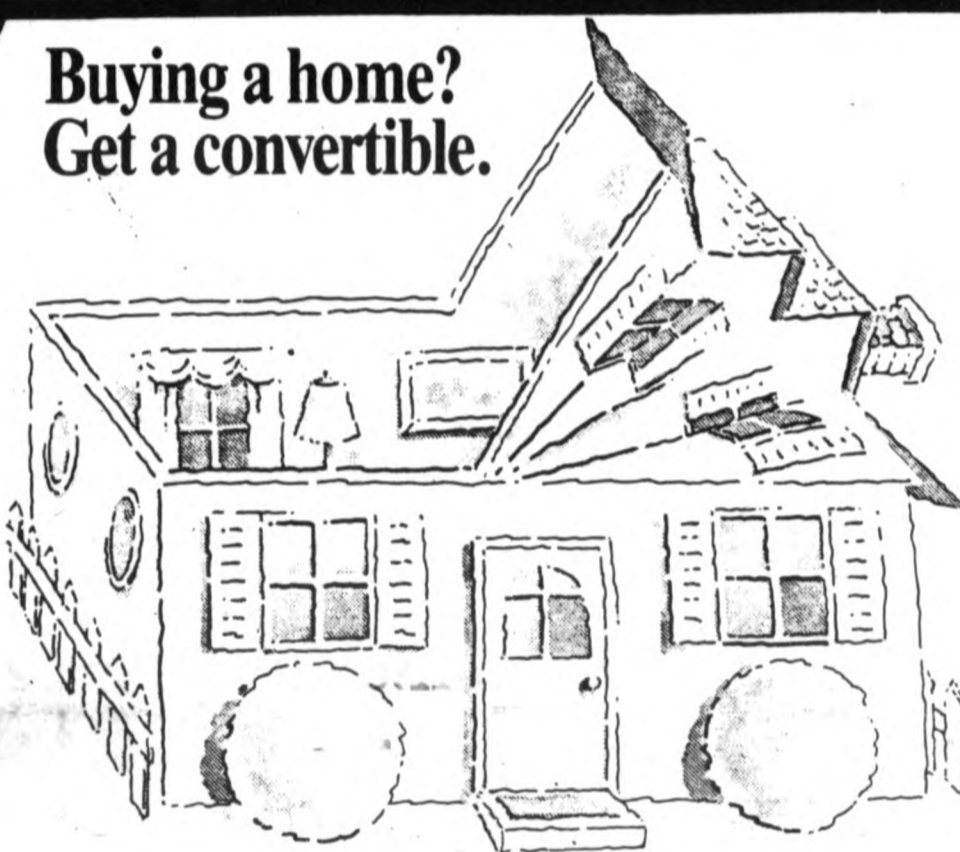

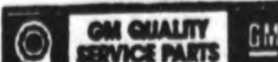

"After investigating the matter, we felt that he had no involvement in planting the marijuana," the deputy says. "More than likely

it self-seeded. It's quite typical of what happens - we can't find the real owners."

There are no suspects in the case which is under investigation by the sheriff's department.

Forage harvestors

By Giles Roehl

Routine maintenance of forage harvesting equipment will cut horsepower requirements and reduce handling and storage problems.

When the knives are dull, if the shear bar is worn, or if there is too much clearance between the knife and the shear bar, the crop will be torn or ripped apart in the forage harvester. It will require more horsepower to operate the harvester if the silage is torn instead of cut cleanly.

You can reduce horsepower requirements and the risk of spoilage by sharpening the knives once a day and resetting the shear bar after each sharpening. Proper maintenance will result in a more uniform cut, making handling easier and reducing the risk of storage losses. Particles that are torn do not pack well as finely cut particles. Longer particles also tend to plug blowers and unloaders, especially when they are handling low moisture legume silages, which tend to be somewhat gummy.

Forages chopped at 65 percent moisture content will store well in a bunker silo. For feeding, 20 to 25 percent of the pieces should be longer than 1 inch.

Farmers need to reduce the length of cut or decide to add a recutter screen for a more uniform cut, they can expect horsepower requirements to increase. Reducing the nominal length of cut by half will require 25 percent more horsepower for the same amount of forage harvested. A recutter screen requires about the same increase in horsepower.

Use milk line to plan corn silage harvest. — The milk line in the kernel can be used to determine when to harvest silage. As corn matures, the milk line in the endosperm moves inward toward the cob. When the milky endosperm disappears (becomes solid yellow), the kernel is fully mature, and it has achieved its final dry weight.

The general relationship between the milk line and fodder moisture, as determined by Minnesota researchers, is given in the table. The optimum range in fodder moisture for best silage is 61 to 68 percent, with 65 percent being ideal. Thus, the single best silage harvest stage is when kernels are at the one-fourth milk stage. The optimum range is from one-half to no milk.

For planning your harvest, it is useful to know not only when the desired fodder moisture content is reached, but how much time you will have before

harvest. Once kernels are fully dented, fodder will reach 64 percent moisture in about 17 days. And once the one-half milk stage is reached, the ideal plant moisture will occur in about a week. Overall, the ideal 61 to 68 percent fodder moisture range will last for about 13 days.

Redwings romp in grid opener, 26-0

If the remaining games on St. Johns' varsity football schedule produce the same end result as the Redwings' season opening 26-0 shut-out over Owosso, it will be a fun season indeed for St. Johns' players, coaches and fans.

The Redwings quite literally romped over the host Trojans last Friday night with St. Johns junior back Bob Paksi eating up yards of Owosso turf.

Standing just 5'5" and weighing in at 145 pounds, Paksi rushed for 179 yards in 18 carries and scored 2 Redwing touchdowns.

"He (Paksi) has a lot of natural ability," St. Johns Coach Bart Kjolhede said, "but we'd also like to think that some of the yards he gained are a product of two years in the weight room. He has tremendous leg strength and can run a 4.8 forty."

"Overall, we were pleasantly surprised with play in the game."

St. Johns' initial points of the contest came with 54 seconds left in the first period when Dwight Pierson took the ball in from 2 yards out. The TD was the product of the Redwings' first of four sustained drives of the evening, covering 63 yards in 13 plays. The PAT was no good making the score 6-0.

BOTH SQUADS were forced to punt on ensuing downs, and Owosso claimed the ball on their own 46-yard line. Pass completions brought the Trojans into Redwing territory, putting them at the Redwing 1-yard line with a first and goal situation. On the next play from scrimmage, senior Mark Locher forced an Owosso fumble which was recovered by St. Johns transfer student Shawn Fike.

"That was a big play in the game," Kjolhede. "We denied them the opportunity to score and then got the ball back downfield."

Runs by Paksi and Pierson carried the Redwings out of danger and a big punt by Zane Ballard sent Owosso well back into their own territory. St. Johns' defense came alive during Owosso's possession with safety Scott Aylsworth batting down a pass on the Redwings' 18-yard line and senior Dan Hartsuff collecting a quarterback sack giving St. Johns the ball back with just 34 seconds left in the half.

Third quarter action saw the Redwings mount another long drive, 72 yards in 11 plays, that ended in Paksi taking the ball around the right end for a 5-yard score at the 5:52 mark. A quarterback keep PAT was no good, putting St. Johns ahead 12-0.

JUNIOR TACKLE Chip Lott threw the Owosso quarterback for a loss on the ensuing series of downs, forcing the Trojans to punt.

St. Johns wasted no time in getting on the board again with Paksi fielding the punt and returning it to the Redwing 40, and Pierson advancing the ball down to the Owosso 45-yard line. Off an option from quarterback

Matt Wilcox, Paksi scampered 50 yards on the next play from scrimmage for another Redwing TD. The extra-point kick by Ballard was good to give St. Johns a 19-0 lead.

The Redwing defense was relentless in the final stanza. Senior defensive end Jim Martens earned a quarterback sack, and junior Randy Trayer picked off a Trojan pass. St. Johns final score of the night came off a 1-yard, quarterback sneak by Aylsworth.

Individually besides Paksi, Pierson carried the ball 12 times for 83 yards and 1 touchdown and Dale Feldpausch picked up 31 yards on 6 carries. Wilcox was 1-5 passing with Hartsuff getting the 11-yard pass reception.

St. Johns was credited with 305 rushing yards on 47 carries and 316 in total yardage. The Redwings held Owosso to 76 yards on the ground and 93 aerial yards, completing 8-13 passes.

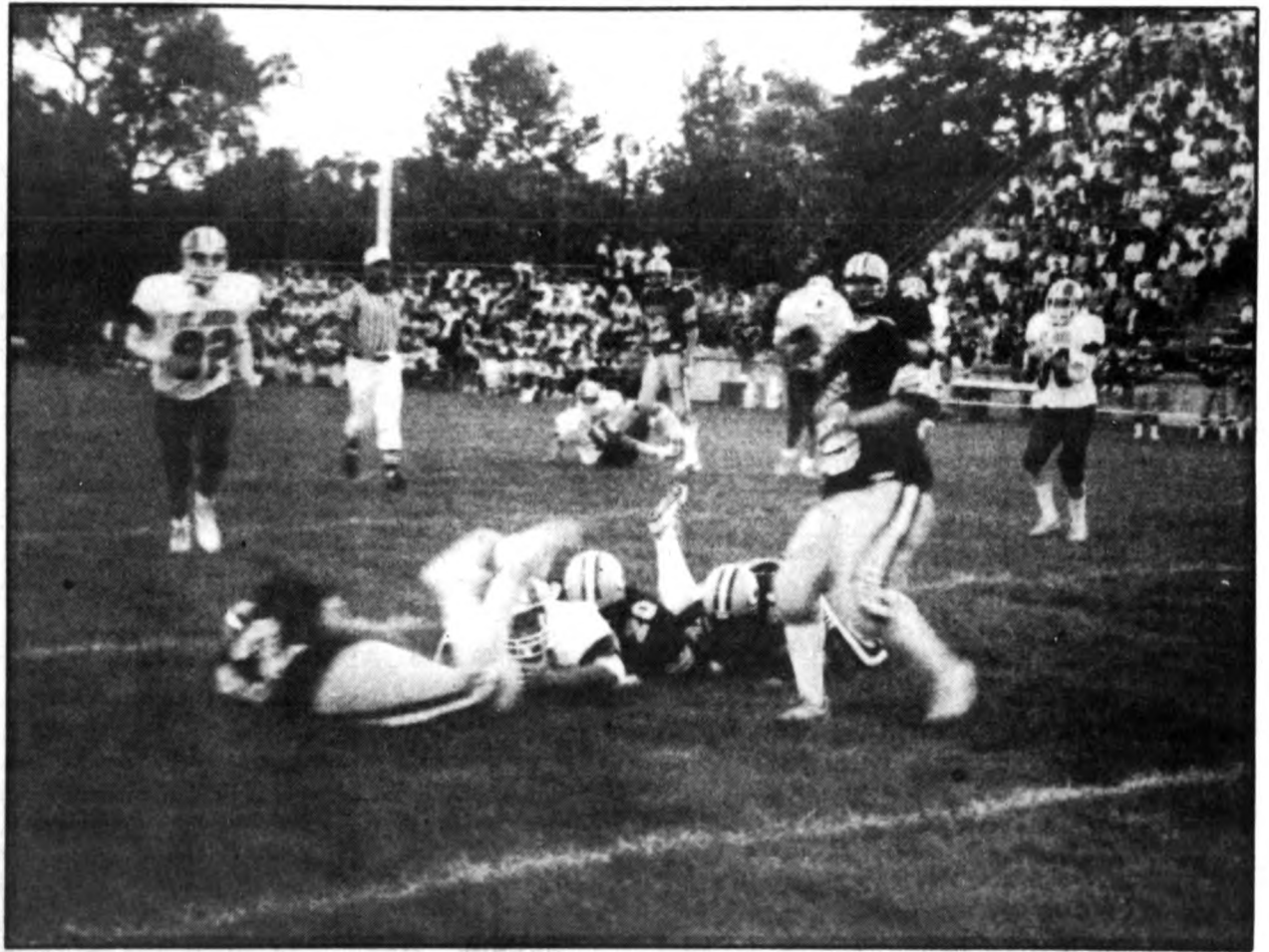

"We got a great performance out of a sophomore," he said in reference to McCreery's game stats. The sophomore was 8-10 passing for 117 yards. He completed 2 touchdown passes and ran another one in.

PORTLAND GOT on the board first, scoring with 5:13 remaining in the first quarter. The 8-yard TD pass followed an 84-yard drive by the Red Raiders that took 18 plays.

The Marauders evened the score at 7-7 early in the second period when McCreery took the ball in on a 1-yard quarterback sneak. The touchdown capped a 40-yard drive by O-E which was set up when Brett Miller recovered a Portland fumble. Eric Gilpin's PAT was good.

Forced to punt on the ensuing series of downs, the Raiders got the ball back quickly when a O-E pass was deflected and picked off by a Portland lineman, Steve Rice, who ran the ball in for the score. The half closed with Portland on top 14-7.

The third period saw Chad Crippen take the ball in from 4 yards out, cutting Portland's lead down to 14-13 at the 6:54 mark of the quarter. A highlight of the 75-yard drive that ended in the TD was a 25-yard pass reception by Chad Hitchen.

In the decisive final stanza, Portland upped the ante on a 5-yard run by Pat Gradi to make the score 20-13. The Marauders wasted no time in putting points on the board when a 22-yard pass reception by Paul Bremer capped an O-E 55-yard, 5-play drive. The 2-point conversion by Wayne Kennedy gave the Marauders the lead, 21-20.

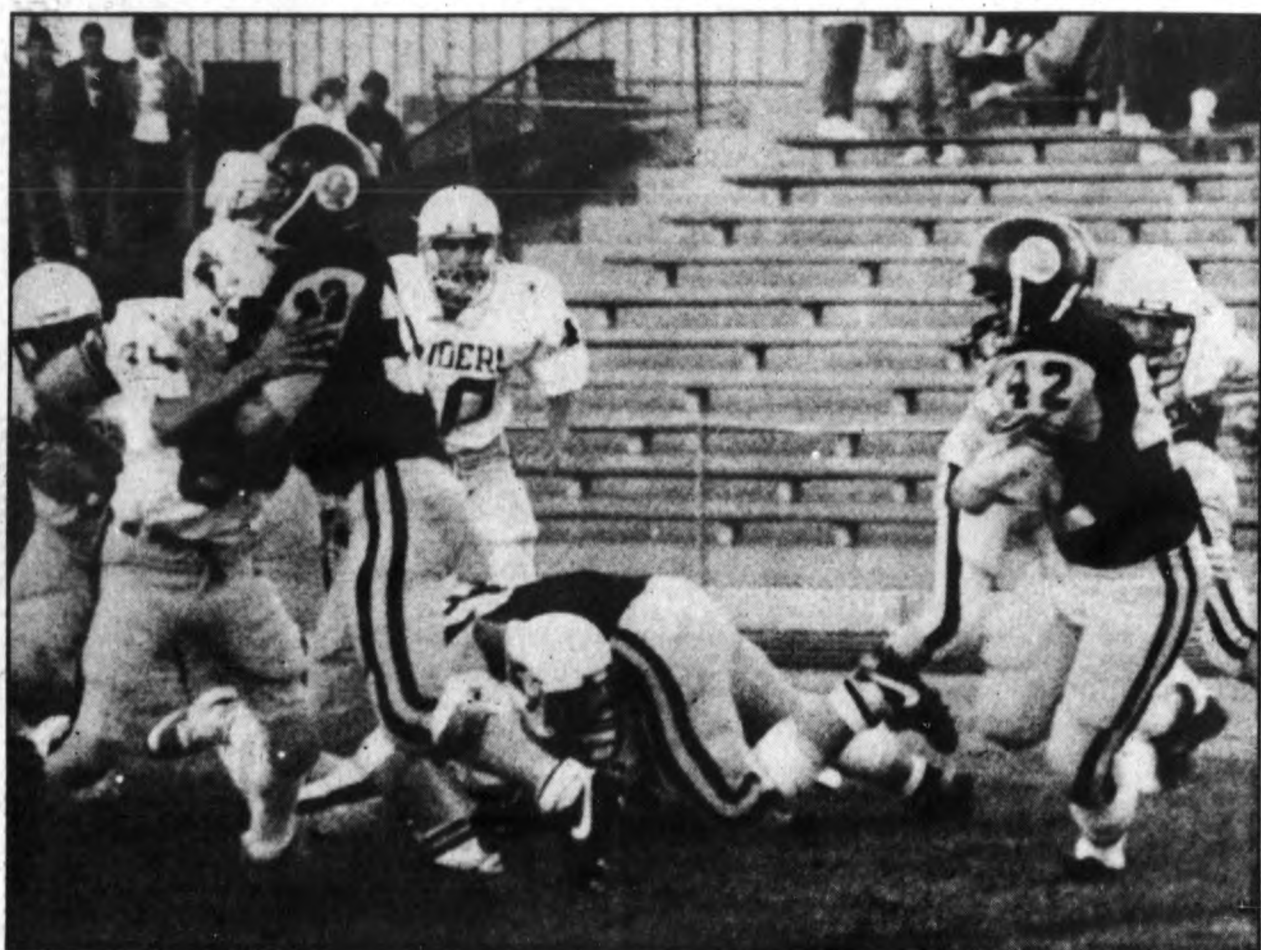
"It was not a very productive evening," Coach Spicer said.

Bear, Pirate cagers meet

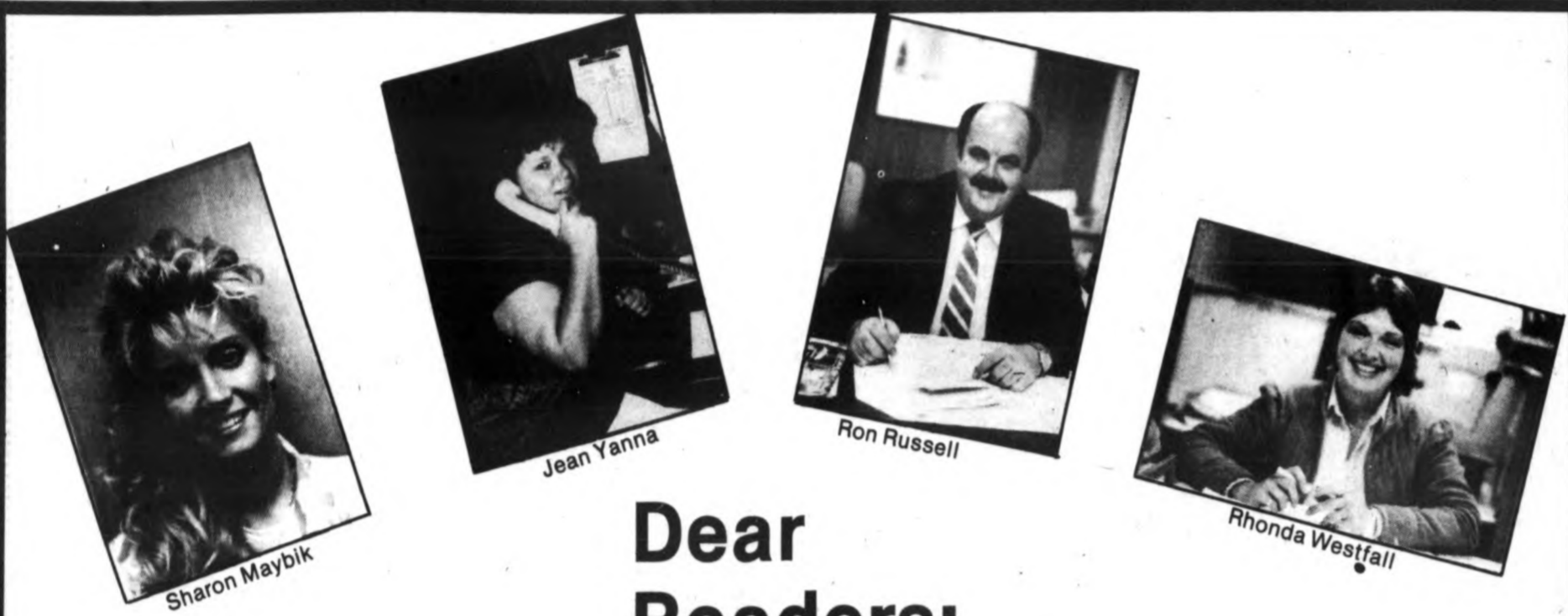
