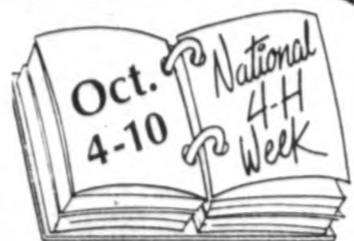

Railroad gets new owner

Depot gets new life

There's new life in the old railroad depot in St. Johns. Central Michigan Railway recently

purchased the property in St. Johns as part of its acquisition of the Grand Trunk Western Railway line extending from Midland through Bay City to Saginaw, and Durand through St. Johns to Grand Rapids and Muskegon. The total purchase encompasses over 185 miles of main track.

The new railway, owned by a Tawas City-based firm, is headed by C.A. "Cap" Pinkerton. Central Michigan Railway and the Detroit and Mackinac Railway are both part of Pinkerton's DM Central Transportation Company, which is headquartered in Tawas City.

Local operations of the railway will be handled by Supervisor Barry Watts who will be based in the St. Johns depot. New to the St. Johns area, Watts plans to move his family into the community in the near future.

"Everyone whom I've talked to about the new railway has been really enthusiastic," Watts says. "I'm from a small town myself and so feel very comfortable in this area."

WATTS SAYS plans for the depot include repainting of the exterior and clean-up of the grounds surrounding the building. The interior of the building will also be painted and cleaned, with limited remodeling also in the works.

"We plan on employing local contractors to do the work," Watts says. "Structurally, the depot is in very good shape. We have no intention of destroying any portion of it. Basically we're talking about general painting and cleaning."

Besides changes in the use of the depot, the new railway has added a track inspector and two signal maintainers to the local operation. According to Watts, the railway's overall plans include working with local road commissions to improve

rail crossings along the line and in general keeping things in good working order.

"We want to be able to work with local people in whatever area comes up," Watts says.

At the present time, two trains run daily from Durand to Grand Rapids, meeting trains from Muskegon with a round trip taking about 12 hours. Watts says the volume of traffic is already up from when Grand Trunk owned the lines, with plans to improve services and move more traffic in progress.

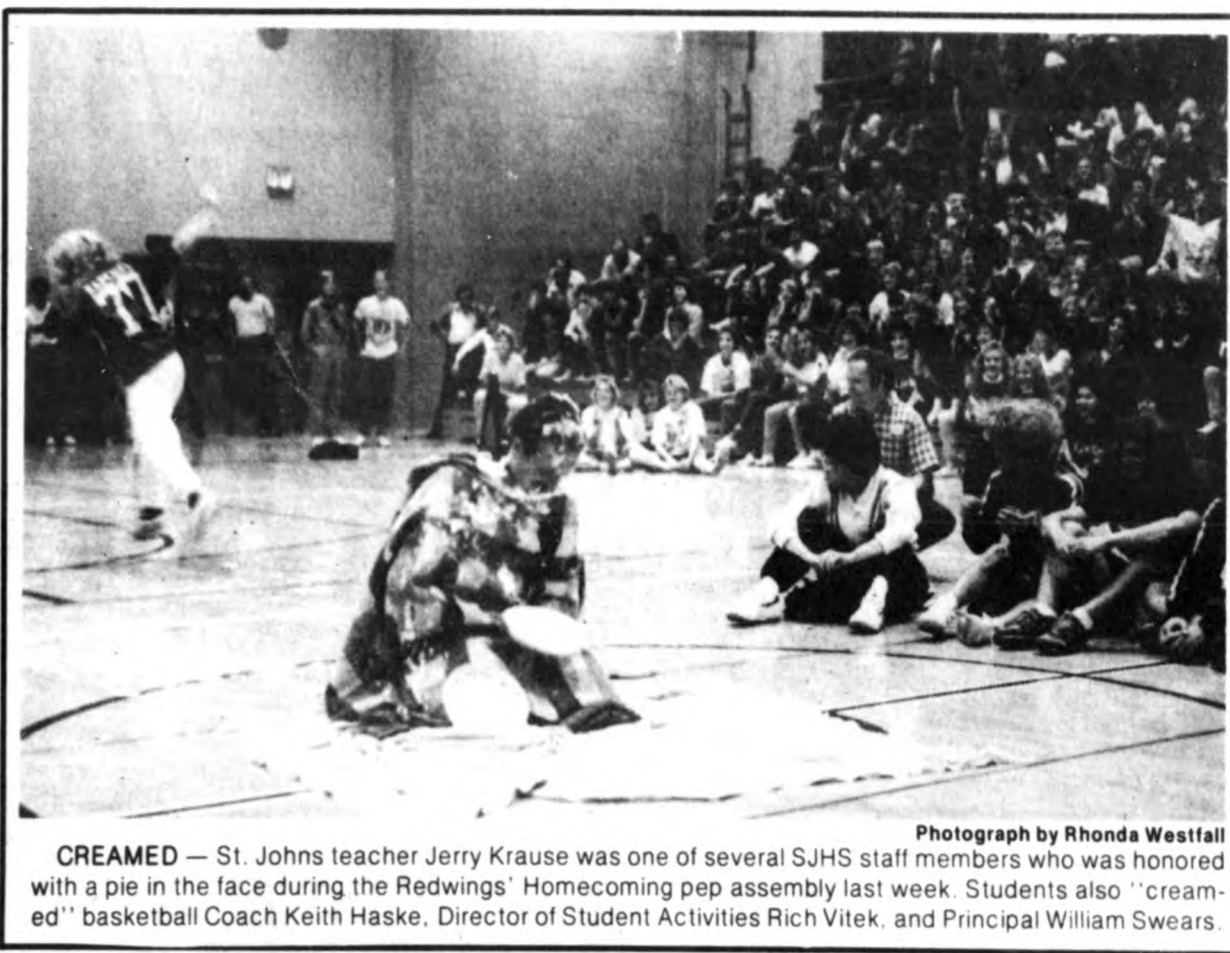
THE RAILWAY generates over 20,000 carloads annually through such major industrial shippers as the Saginaw Motor Division of General Motors, Dow Chemical in Midland, and the Amway Corporation in Ada, as well as many local companies. The company hopes to market its services to small shippers along the old Grand Trunk route.

Freight carried on the railway is varied, Watts says, with nugget sand from Muskegon used as foundry sand and grain from local elevators among the most-travelled commodities. Central Michigan Lumber Company in St. Johns is a big railway user, as are General Tire and Wright Lumber in Ionia.

According to Watts, the sale of the railway was one of the largest of any railway in the state. It required the transfer of property in 10 counties of the state with the purchase approved earlier this summer by the Interstate Commerce Commission, the federal regulatory agency which oversees railroad transactions.

The official change of ownership was effective on Sept. 4.

Pinkerton is the third generation of the Michigan railway family whose ownership of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway extends back to 1893.

Traditionally, the handicapper has been viewed as one who is unable to succeed in life, or as lacking something essential.

How does a family cope with the daily stresses and challenges of rearing a child with a chronic illness or handicapping condition?

Most families need special help in coping with their difficulties.

Such assistance is available in St. Johns through Parents of Children with Special Needs, a support group designed to aid the acceptance of the handicapped in communities.

Not an attempt at remediation, the purpose of the group is to teach parents how to become more knowledgeable so they become more confident, effective parents.

"We are also a spiritual group because new hope and optimism is provided; not found in too many professional groups," explains Yvonne DaPaape.

DaPaape, coordinator of the St. Johns group and a parent of a handicapped son, David, has benefited from her most difficult, yet most rewarding experience in that she has been taught values, and has received love from her son.

SHE WAITS TO see what the future holds because professionals at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, informed her that David would live to be only 2. Now he is 20.

"We are a specific program designed to capitalize on strengths and weaknesses," explains DaPaape, "it's frustrating for parents who are socially withdrawn because they have a hard time to adjust and triumph over their complex circumstances."

The group gives encouragement and support to each other, to share valuable knowledge - enabling parents to learn from each other from the good and bad experiences.

Susan Bettys of Ovid, mother of a son who was born severely handicapped, Albert, 20, has a positive outlook on life.

"God never gives you more than you can bear, and He gave us these children to rear," says Bettys.

BETTYS IS AN active member of

the executive committee for the group, and feels that parents who struggle with the same issues are better able to identify a mixture of emotions including sadness, anger, and empathy.

She has learned through time to conquer her inner desire to become content with her involvement in making decisions which affect her child's future.

"It's important to never feel confined, and to have some other type of outlet," says Bettys.

According to Bettys, some of the steps which are needed to be more

At St. Johns High School

Drain system updated

Low bids from Jerry Henning and Burnham Farm Tiling were accepted by the St. Johns school board at its meeting last week for the installation of a new drainage system at the high school. Money for the project will come from a ½-mill fund of \$29,260 which has been set aside for maintenance.

Henning's portion of the project

calls for plastic piping with catch basins to be set in the low section of the high school parking lot. The pipe will continue south to the Townsend Road ditch to drain rain runoff. His bid of \$14,797 also covers the installation of four two-foot catch basins in the parking lot.

In the second phase of the project, Burnham will set plastic pipe from the delivery ramp catch basin to an existing catch basin on the northeast corner of the high school.

From that point, a connecting catch basin and pipe will drain rain runoff into the parking lot.

Burnham's bid came in at \$4,241.78.

Neither bid includes sidewalk repair or asphalt replacement. The estimated cost of repairing sidewalks and patching asphalt is \$5,600, according to Asst. Supt. Gordon Vandemark. That work will be done

Group aids families of disabled kids

new to Virginia Caesar of St. Johns.

Caesar has three children. Her daughter, Rachel, 6, was born with cerebral palsy, and later developed a chronic lung disease. Eric, 15, is classified as educably mentally retarded (mildly retarded); his social development skills are low. And, Jessica, 11, is an able-bodied child.

"The need of a support group in the community is invaluable, and Parents of Children with Special Needs is a perceptive group," says Caesar.

Caesar says there are good and bad days. She has been counseled for stress, and continues to face the daily realities of circumstances which cannot be changed. But her love and determination improves her children's conditions and provides her family with hope for the future.

"WE HAVE BEEN told by professionals that Rachel doesn't have potential," says Caesar, "we wanted to know if she'd be able to walk - not be the President of the United States."

"Parents are the experts with their children; they know their abilities better than professionals do because we live with them daily," says Caesar.

"At times, you're confronted with the cruelties of the world, and you can't do too much but comfort your child," explains Caesar. "Eric used to receive obscene phone calls, other children would tease him or knock him down because he's different."

Caesar contends that the world is not geared for handicappers. "I teach my children that they have to work harder to make their niche in life; you can feel sorry for yourself and let life hold you down - only if you let it," asserts Caesar.

"IT'S IMPORTANT to take one day at a time, even though it's scary to deal with the fears of what might and could happen," explains Caesar.

According to Caesar, parents of handicapped children go through a grieving process, and finally acceptance takes its course; after the parents have recognized the children for who they are.

This process is similar to those who experience the loss of a loved one. "My children deserve to be in the

world, too," claims Caesar. "They have feelings of a normal child, and they bring my family a lot of joy. There are too many children in the world today who are neglected, and don't receive love the way my children do," says Caesar.

Handicappers are representative of one of the largest statistical minorities in this country, according to the Michigan Department of State Health. They represent about 25 percent of the population.

DePaape, Bettys, and Caesar all agree the first move needed to be recognized as a true minority, is to acknowledge the handicapped person as an unique individual.

As social stigmas and views change about handicappers, and people learn to appreciate their commonality, that change must first be reflected in the behavior and language of others.

Such a change would encourage self-awareness for the handicapped minority.

Budget time

The Legislature convened for the fall session last week, and is already at work on one of the most important problems on the agenda — trying to finalize a realistic budget for the 1987-88 fiscal year.

If it seems to you it is a little late to be working on a budget that starts Oct. 1, you are right. The real reason we are dealing with it now is that both the Senate and the House made a mistake during the budget process last spring: we took the Governor's word on state revenues instead of listening to our own better judgment.

When the Senate recessed for the summer, nearly all the budget work had been completed. Members of both chambers, working with the Governor, had worked out compromises on spending levels. The Senate had serious doubts about the Governor's rosy projections on economic growth and income, because of shortfalls projected by the Senate Fiscal Agency. But we finally agreed to accept the figures of the state treasurer and the state budget director. In a spirit of cooperation, we brought the budget as close as possible to the Governor's requests.

To quote the Governor himself, the process had been "as smooth as glass." Unfortunately, it turned out to be just as fragile, too. It was shattered a few weeks later, when the administration turned around and vetoed huge portions, saying the state simply didn't have and wouldn't have the money to meet the spending levels passed. Municipal governments, state agencies, and school systems across Michigan were suddenly scrambling to finish their budgets, without any idea of what to expect from the state.

Those vetoes also strained the fabric that binds the Legislature and the executive office together in the work of state government. The Senate has never questioned the need to cut spending sharply.

We have been saying that for a long time, and our view was supported by the SFA's analysis of funding

for this year's spending and the next. The SFA's version has been backed up by nearly every other economist studying Michigan's future. We made the mistake of agreeing with the Governor that the state treasurer and the budget director ought to know best what is really in the state coffers.

The Senate has sometimes been accused of naysaying, and of giving the Governor a hard time on important issues. Obviously, we did our best to work with the administration in good faith on the original budget package, only to find ourselves picking up the pieces. We don't believe the problems can be solved with optimistic rhetoric or creative financing. The real answer lies in facing up to spending cuts and working honestly with each other to achieve them.

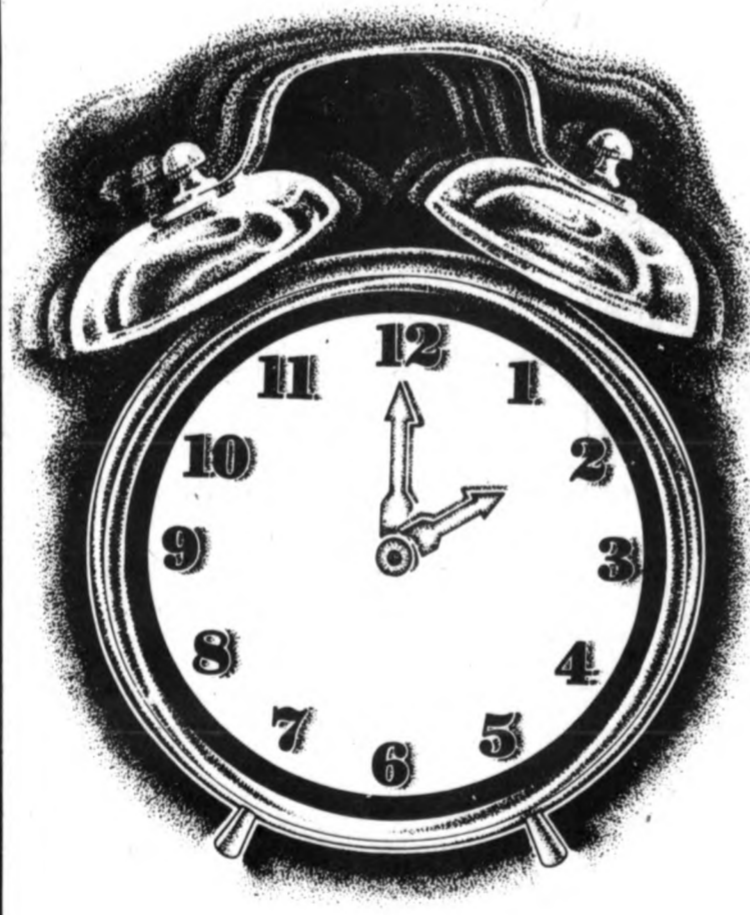
Did you know that an Ostrich Egg measures as much as 7" in length and 6" in diameter and requires about 40 minutes to boil. And, probably serves ten.

The Clinton County Sheriff's Department and the St. Johns City Police Department will provide escort and support for these officers as they run through Clinton County on Oct. 8 at 10:20 p.m.

This fund-raising campaign is sponsored in Michigan by Little Caesar's Pizza.

All three runs culminate at the General Motors Tech Center in Warren on Oct. 9 as runners carry the torch to light the flame for the opening ceremonies of the Michigan Special Olympics Soccer Tournament held at the Tech Center.

Founded in 1968 by Eunice Kennedy Shiver, Special Olympics offers year-round training and competition in 22 official sports to any individual with mental retardation, ages 8 and up.

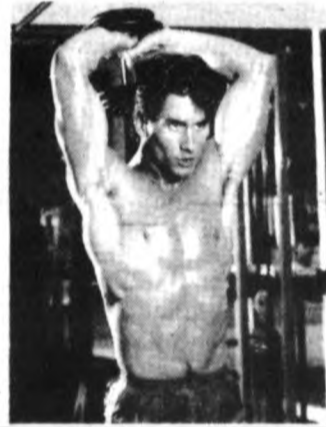

by school district maintenance personnel.

Total cost of both phases is estimated at \$25,634.78.

In addition, the board will accept bids for tiling an area west of the parking lot which would connect with the line in phase A. The cost of the entire project could not exceed the 1/2-mill fund.

THE BOARD ALSO agreed to increase the pay rate for substitute teachers up to \$47.50 per day for the 1987-88 school year and set a rate of \$62.50 per day for teachers substituting in the same classroom beginning with the 11th consecutive day. Substitutes will be paid \$2.50 more per day in both the 1988-89 and 1989-90 school years.

A two-year teacher aide contract giving aides a 40-cent per hour increase the first year and 42-cent increase the second year was ratified by the board. The contract had previously been accepted by teacher aides.

Other action items approved by the board included:

- Resignation of Joe Sternburgh as Community Education Coordinator,

and appointments of Betty Grzesiak as a high school special ed teacher and Myrna Wieber as Community Education secretary.

- Adoption of the human sexuality curriculum for grades four and five.
- Adoption of a revised teacher evaluation form.
- Establishment of a special reserve fund for \$48,500 generated by the sale of the Central School property.
- Passage of a resolution required for additional state aid in the form of incentive grants.

Supt. Steve Bakita reported to the board that total school district enrollment was expected to be greater than the projected 3,383 students.

"Right now it looks like we may be slightly over 3,400 on the Fourth Friday count," Bakita said. "Adult ed could come in as high as 125 — things look better than we thought they would."

Adult education had been estimated at 105 students. Bakita said final enrollment figures probably would not be available for several weeks.

BAKITA ALSO stated that

members of the school facility committee will be asked to attend the Oct. 12 committee-of-the-whole meeting in order for school board members to ask questions about the committee's recommendations.

Earlier in the meeting, board members moved to accept the concept of the committee's report which calls for the following: conversion of Rodney B. Wilson into an elementary school, Swegles into an adult ed facility, and Perrin-Palmer into a double-elementary building; construction of a new junior high school at the high school site; and addition of one wing at the high school.

"We need to have it clear in our minds how the facility committee came to their decisions and be able to directly ask them basic questions about the project," Board President Jeanette Adams said.

Ron Erickson of Michigan School Investments will also be at the Oct. 12 meeting to provide the board with new information on investments and bond issues which would relate to the committee's report.

"We will keep discussion at the meeting to school facility areas only," Bakita said.

Redwings romp in 28-6 homecoming victory

Neither rain, nor snow, nor questionable calls could deter the St. Johns football team from their goal of giving the capacity Homecoming crowd a Redwing victory last Friday night. Despite a second quarter rainstorm that looked rather white at times, Coach Bart Kjolhede's forces mounted an impressive attack and

earned a decisive 28-6 Homecoming win over Corunna's Cavaliers. The win gives the Redwings an MMB record of 3-1, 4-1 overall.

"This was a 'hump' game for us," Coach Kjolhede said. "We had to get over the hump of not having defeated any teams this year that we hadn't already beaten last season. It was an important win to us."

"Defensively, we played very aggressively — that was nice to see. Jim Martens and Jose Riojas really

stuffed the lead blockers, allowing Zane Ballard and Scott Heibeck to make key tackles."

The Redwings stopped the Cavaliers on the first series of downs, getting the football in good position on Corunna's 42 yard line. Runs by Dwight Pierson and a long 16-yard gainer by Bob Paksi quickly put the Redwings near the goal line.

Pierson finally put the ball across on a third and goal situation after it appeared that Dale Feldpausch had nosed the ball over on second down. The extra point kick by Olliver Kessler put the Redwings on top 7-0 with 5:15 left in the first quarter.

A BOOMING KICK by Kessler put Corunna deep in their own territory. The Cavaliers were forced to punt, but got the ball back when St. Johns was called for clipping on the punt. On the third play from scrimmage, Martens recovered a Corunna fumble on the Cavalier 27-yard line, giving St. Johns excellent field position once again.

On the ensuing play, Matt Wilcox connected on a 27-yard bootleg pass to end Tom Penix for St. Johns' second touchdown. The PAT by Kessler split the uprights to give the Redwings a 14-0 lead with 2:03 left in the quarter.

The Redwings struck once more early in the second period when Riojas recovered another Corunna fumble and Paksi scampered into the endzone on a 25-yard run. With rain and snow beginning to fall, Kessler's kick put St. Johns on top 21-0 with 10:39 left in the half.

Action for the remainder of the soggy period was limited to a lackluster Corunna scoring threat which was thwarted by a Martens' fumble recovery on the St. Johns 20-yard line. The Redwings took the ball down to the Corunna 18-yard line, before attempting a field goal with time running out. The kick was no good, St. Johns downed the ball on the Cavalier's 1-yard line and the half expired with St. Johns ahead 21-0.

HALFTIME festivities included the crowning of the 1987 Homecoming King and Queen — Zane Ballard and Jennifer Olmstead.

Second half scoring saw Penix snag a 24-yard pass thrown by Scott Aylsworth in the third period and Corunna get on the board to conclude the contest.

St. Johns rushed 41 times for 185 yards, completed 5-7 passes for 96 aerial yards and a total of 279 offensive yards. Corunna was held to 134 total offensive yards.

Paksi picked up 123 yards on 12 carries. Pierson gained 43 yards on 14 carries, and Penix caught 4 passes for 2 TDs.

"The hogs did a good job on the line of scrimmage," Kjolhede said, "and our offense blocked aggressively downfield. We want to give special credit to John Archambault, a new member of our coaching staff who is working with the defensive ends. He's done a good job with them."

St. Johns travels to Alma for a big MMB contest this Friday, Oct. 9. The Panthers and Redwings sport identical 3-1, 4-1 records.

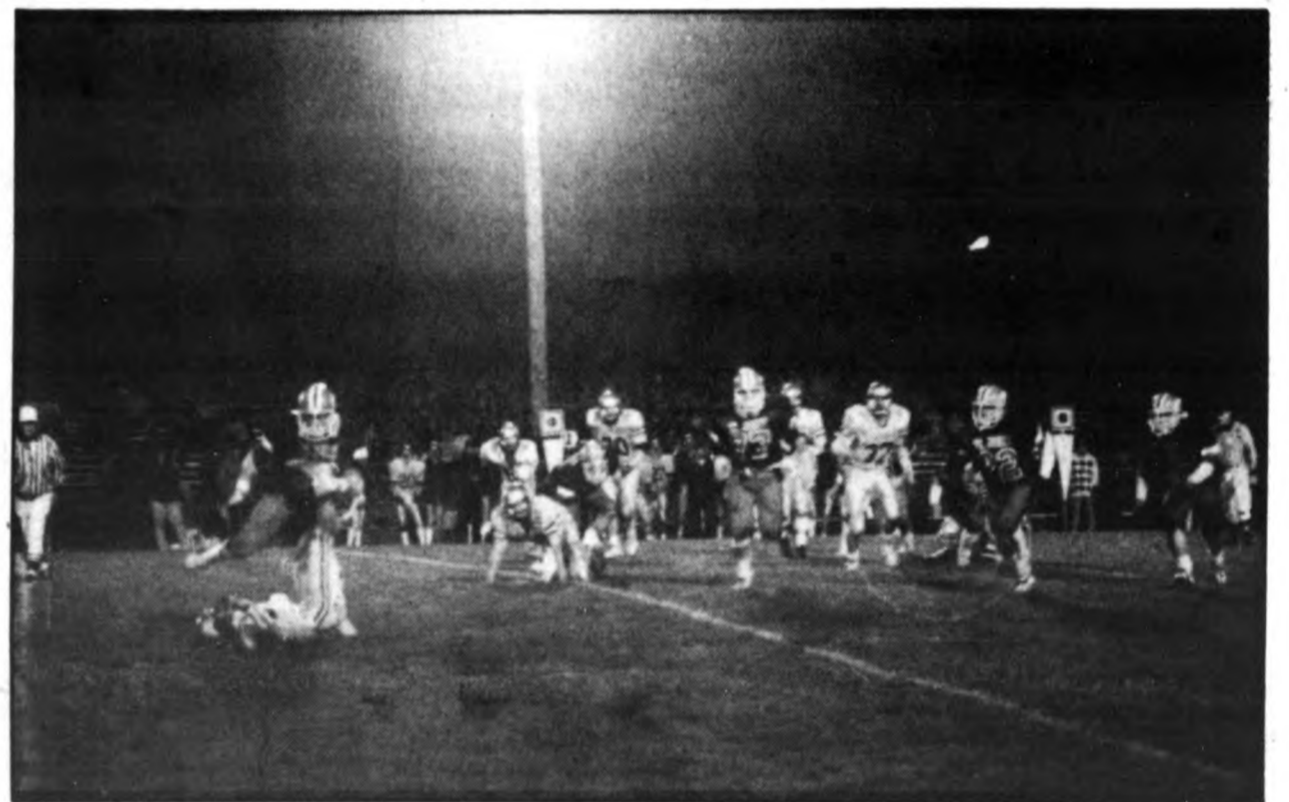
Fowler's girls were led by Lynette Feldpausch who placed fourth overall with a time of 22:37. Other Eagle

Fowler claims 8-0 CMAC grid victory over Fulton

In a hard-fought Central Michigan Athletic Conference gridiron contest last week, Fowler outlasted Fulton to earn a 16-0 victory.

The win puts the Eagles in sole possession of first place in the league at 4-0, and gives Fulton a share of second place with Pewamo-Westphalia at 3-1, setting the stage for the annual P-W/Fowler rivalry this Fri., Oct. 9.

"It was a tough game and a good one," Fulton Coach Randy Lark said. "We had a couple of costly turnovers, but overall the kids fought really hard."

"Fowler is a good team. We were really impressed with their quarterback (Matt) Hufnagel."

Eagle Coach Steve Spicer echoed Lark's opinion of the game, crediting Fulton with tough play and his own defensive unit for special mention in earning the win.

"Our kids played very good defense against Fulton," Spicer said. "Both clubs played well, we thought. It was probably our best game of the season so far."

Fowler capitalized on a Fulton punt, blocked by Tony Schafer, to get on the scoreboard in the first period. Hufnagel's 15-yard pass was completed to Tom Wirth in the endzone, giving the Eagles their first TD and Hufnagel ran the two-point conversion in to put Fowler on top 8-0.

SECOND PERIOD action saw Fulton within striking distance on Fowler's 15-yard line again, only to lose the

ball on a fumble which was recovered by Jim Wohlfert. The half closed with the Eagles ahead by the same 8-0 score.

Near the end of the third period, Wirth went to the air to snag a 38-yard Hufnagel pass, putting the Eagles on Fulton's 3-yard line. Jeff Miller took the ball in for the touchdown and the 2-point pass from Hufnagel to Tony Bertram gave the Eagles all the points they would need for the win.

Individually for Fowler, Miller rushed for 102 yards

on 24 carries, and Hufnagel completed 3-7 passes for 73 yards. Neil Koenigsnecht had 13 tackles to lead the defensive unit.

Fulton's Tom Cecchini carried the ball 20 times for 89 yards.

"He (Cecchini) is a hard runner," Coach Spicer said. Defensively for the Pirates, John Gallagher had 11 tackles and Ben Burk ended the night with 10 tackles.

Coach Rademacher's cage machine rolled merrily along last week, posting an impressive 61-55 win over defending CMAC champ Pottersville and routing hapless DeWitt 69-36.

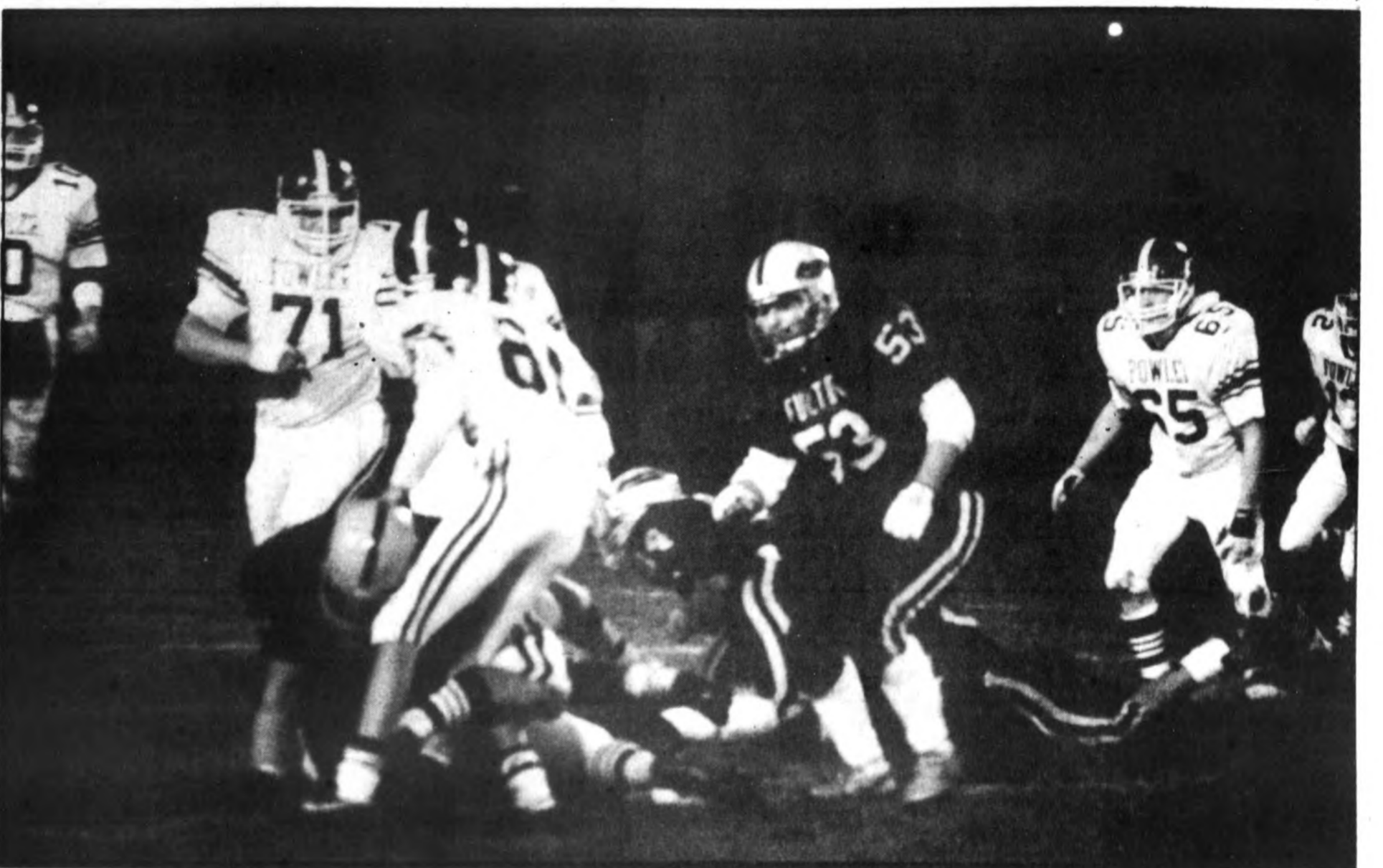
The Pirates came from behind two times in their game with Pottersville, trailing 14-12 at the end of the first quarter to tie the game at 28-28 by halftime, then falling behind by as much as 6 points early in the third stanza before pulling away for the victory.

Amy Hengesbach led the Pirates with 16 points and 11 rebounds. Sandy Martin had 13 points and 5 rebounds, Shirley Thelen had 11 points, 8 steals, and 3 assists, Kerry Nurenberg had 9 points, 6 steals, and 4 assists, Sandy Simon had 8 points and 9 rebounds, and Jamie Bierstetel scored 4 points off the bench.

More balanced scoring was the rule in the Pirates game at DeWitt. Pewamo-Westphalia was in control from beginning to end of the contest.

Simon paced the Pirates with 16 points, 10 rebounds, 3 steals, and 3 assists. Thelen put up the first good 3-point basket of the season for P-W, ending with 15 total points, 3 steals and 4 assists. Hengesbach had 12 points and 14 rebounds, Nurenberg had 9 points, 4 rebounds and 3 steals, and Martin had 8 points and 7 rebounds.

The Pirates are tied for the CMAC lead with Portland St. Patrick, both clubs having perfect 4-0 records in the league.

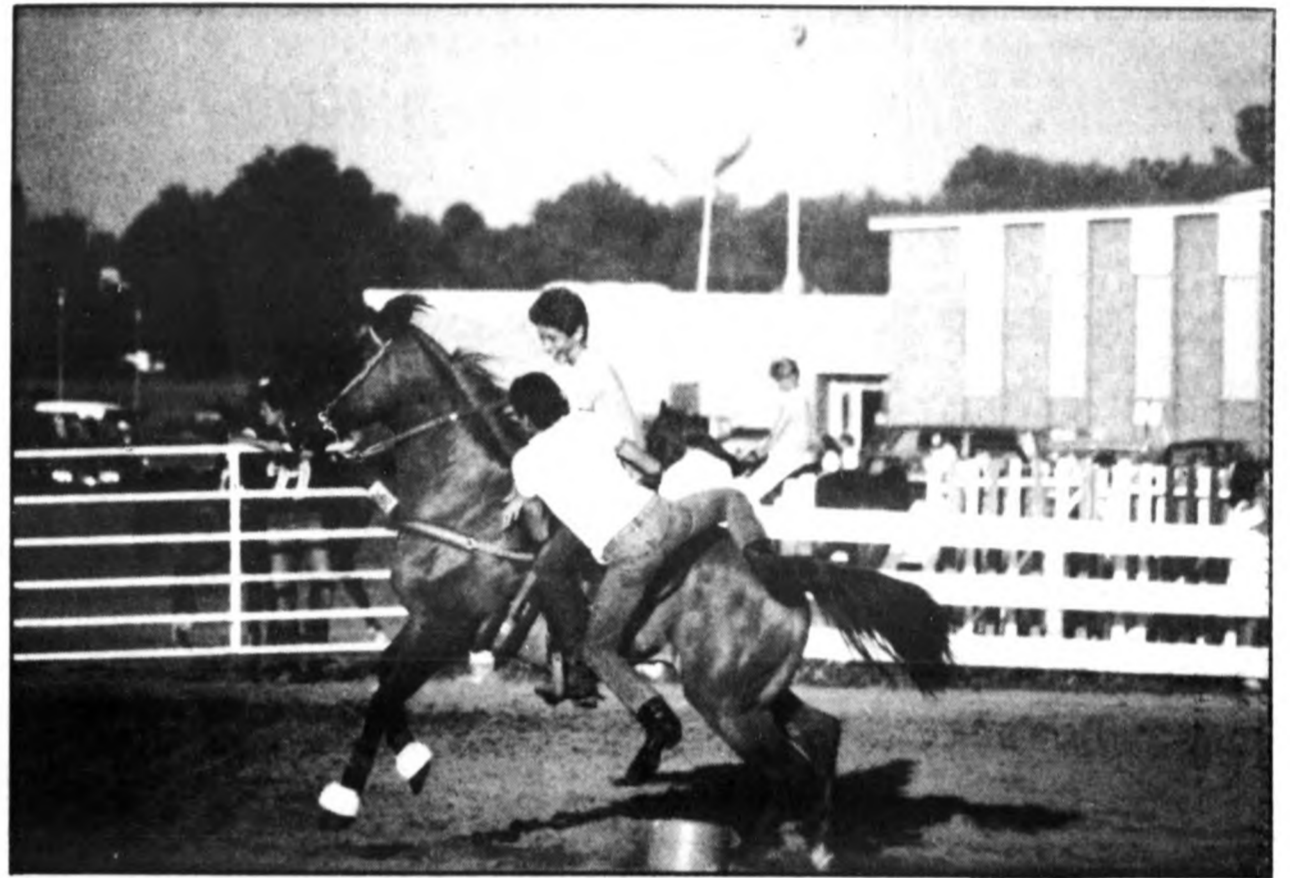

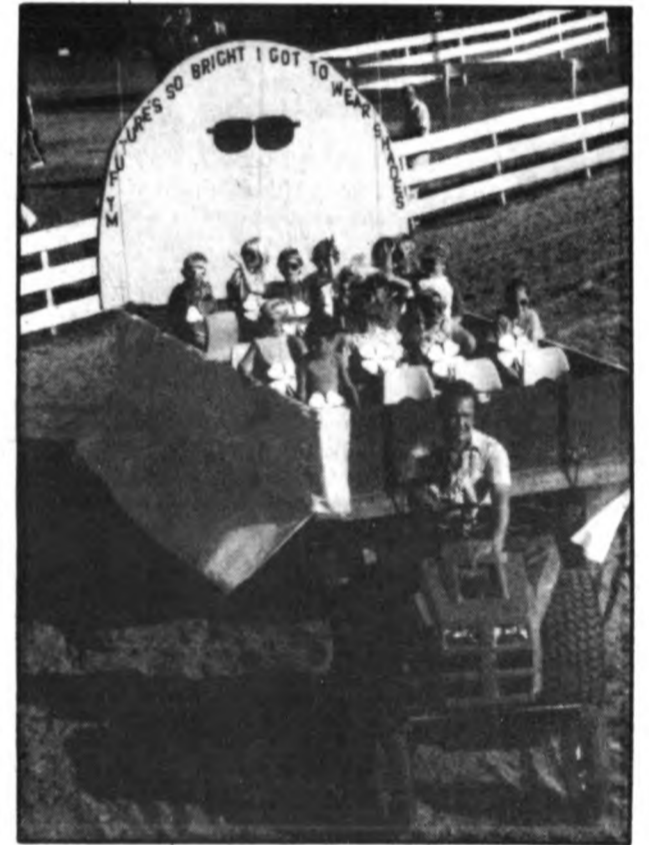

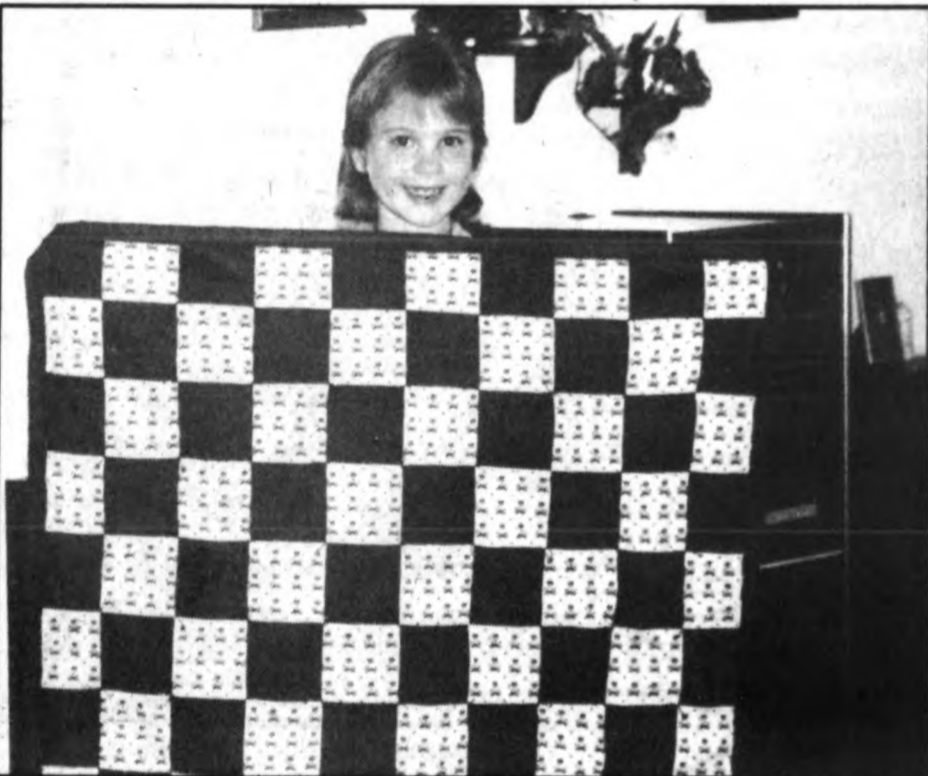

Clinton County Joins National 4-H Week Celebration

In Clinton County 4-H members and leaders are planning special activities and events in observance of National 4-H Week, October 4-10, according to Theresa Silm, Extension 4-H Youth Agent. Some of those activities include the Annual 4-H Recognition Banquet and the Horseback Riding For Handicappers Graduation. Clinton County 4-H'ers are among nearly 4.5 million young people across the country who will participate in the week-long celebration using the theme "4-H For Youth, For America".

"What we do for our youth today, we do for America tomorrow," said Silm in explaining the theme. "Through 4-H, young people can acquire knowledge and develop life skills that enable them to become self-directing, productive and contributing members of our community." They learn good health habits, develop respect for themselves and others, explore career and leisure time opportunities, share responsibility for preserving the environment, learn how to use technology, and develop leadership and citizenship skills through participation in 4-H Clubs.

"But 4-H is not only for youth," Silm adds. "It's for adults, who as volunteer leaders can share their skills and expertise with young people. It's for families, who can participate in the fun and learning together. It's for the community, which benefits from the community service projects youth do. And, as our theme says, it's for America, which benefits as a new cadre of leaders takes its place in our society."

It is through this network of volunteer leaders, state land-grant universities, state and local governments and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, that 4-H has been able to stimulate youth to develop life skills. In Clinton County alone some 391 volunteer leaders work with 1685 youth, both boys and girls, between the ages of 5-19 in 55 4-H Clubs. The 4-H Youth Program is the youth phase of the Cooperative Extension Service of Michigan State University.

With Futures So Bright

For the first time in Clinton County, boys and girls between the ages of 5 and 8 were able to officially join 4-H Clubs in 1987. These 4-H members joined clubs called "Cloverbud Clubs" and explored a variety of different 4-H projects and activities.

Seventy-five members joined the seven newly formed clubs in the first year. Club members were involved in a variety of activities including field trips, picnic, service projects, the Fair and even parades.

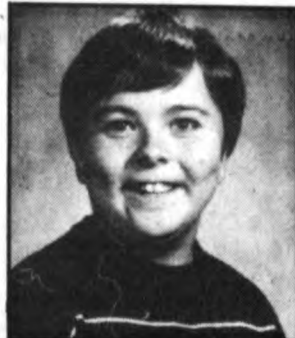
4-H Camp Fun
