## Yields better than expected

# County farmers reap harvest bounty

Last week's picture-perfect Indian Summer weather saw many Clinton County farmers in their fields day and night, busy with the 1987 harvest of soybeans, dry beans and corn. Weather conditions in the last several weeks stand in sharp contrast to the wet weather and flooding experienced last year.

"It's heartening to know farmers can get out in their fields — especially after last year," says Bill Campbell of Countrymark in St. Johns. "If the good weather continues, most crops should be under cover in another week."

Countrymark, along with several other county elevators, will continue to operate around the clock to accommodate farmers in getting their crops into storage.

Campbell says soybean yields so

far are running between 42-45 bushels per acre, and even higher in some areas. That's about 10-12 bushels per acre higher than the normal county average yield.

"Yield wise, soys are the best we've seen here at the elevator in a number of years," Campbell says. "Part of the reason is that rains later in the season came in time for the soys to fill to the top."

**THE RAINS** that helped soybean plants come a little late to do much good for the county's corn crop, however. County-wide, corn yields are below average with the exception of isolated areas in the southern part of the county.

"We have some top notch yields, especially in the southwestern sector of the county," Extension Director Giles Roehl says, "but overall yields are not as good as they would have been with some early-season rain."

As of last week, both Roehl and

Campbell noted that the bulk of navy and dry bean harvest was not underway.

"The jury is still out on dry bean harvest," Campbell says. "There are still lots of fields to be harvested. We're expecting that navies will come in at about 1,200 pounds per acre."

"With the rains that came in August, many plants took on a second growth. That delayed harvesting, but should help yields."

At Countrymark last week, soybean prices were ranging from \$4.85 to \$4.95 per bushel, with corn prices in the \$1.50 per bushel range. According to Campbell, much of the corn coming out of county fields is on the dry side, cutting down on farmers' drying costs.

Reports from the Michigan Agricultural Statistics Service set anticipated corn production in the state at 185 million bushels — a 28

percent decrease from 1986. Statewide yield forecast for soybeans is estimated at 33.8 million bushels, up from 28.8 million bushels in 1986, while dry edible bean production on 460,000 acres is estimated at 5.1 million bags. That would be an 86 percent leap from the poor 1986 crop.

**ALONG WITH** corn and bean harvest, county farmers have been busy in the past few weeks sowing winter wheat and taking a final cutting of alfalfa.

"Much of the county's winter wheat has been sown and fields that are already up look very good," Roehl says. "Normally, farmers would not take a final cutting of hay at this time of year, although theoretically there is nothing wrong with doing so."

"Farmers are cutting late this year because they didn't cut in September — and because there is a shortage of hay caused by the loss of

alfalfa fields in last year's flood and the dry summer this year."

Over 50 percent of the county's alfalfa crop was reseeded this year as a result of 1986 flooding. According to Roehl, the majority of reseeded fields are in good shape this fall with the August rains providing much-needed moisture.

Roehl issued a warning to area farmers harvesting sorghum and sudan grasses for livestock feed. The Extension Director says that livestock poisoning because of prussic acids found in the grasses can present a potential hazard.

"If these grasses are cut before they are 20-inches tall and after a frost, you have a poison," Roehl says. "Farmers need to let the grass lay for a week before feeding it to livestock."

"I've already gotten a call from one farmer who lost two head of cattle because of prussic acid poisoning."

## Addresses chamber

### Randall visits St. Johns

Rep. Gary Randall was the featured speaker at the St. Johns Chamber of Commerce business luncheon Oct. 15.

Randall offered a legislative update on pending issues which he shared with local business persons:

- The speed limit bill — proposal to have placed a \$5 surcharge on all traffic tickets to raise \$5 million to hire more state and local police officers if the legislature and governor act in an affirmative way to allow a 65 mph speed limit on the rural interstates and highways.

- Teacher certification bill — Senate Bill 116 was introduced by Senator Cropsey. This bill would allow private schools the option of testing their pupils, as opposed to having a certified teacher, and would make the determination as to whether the teacher was doing a good or bad job on the basis of how the students perform on tests.

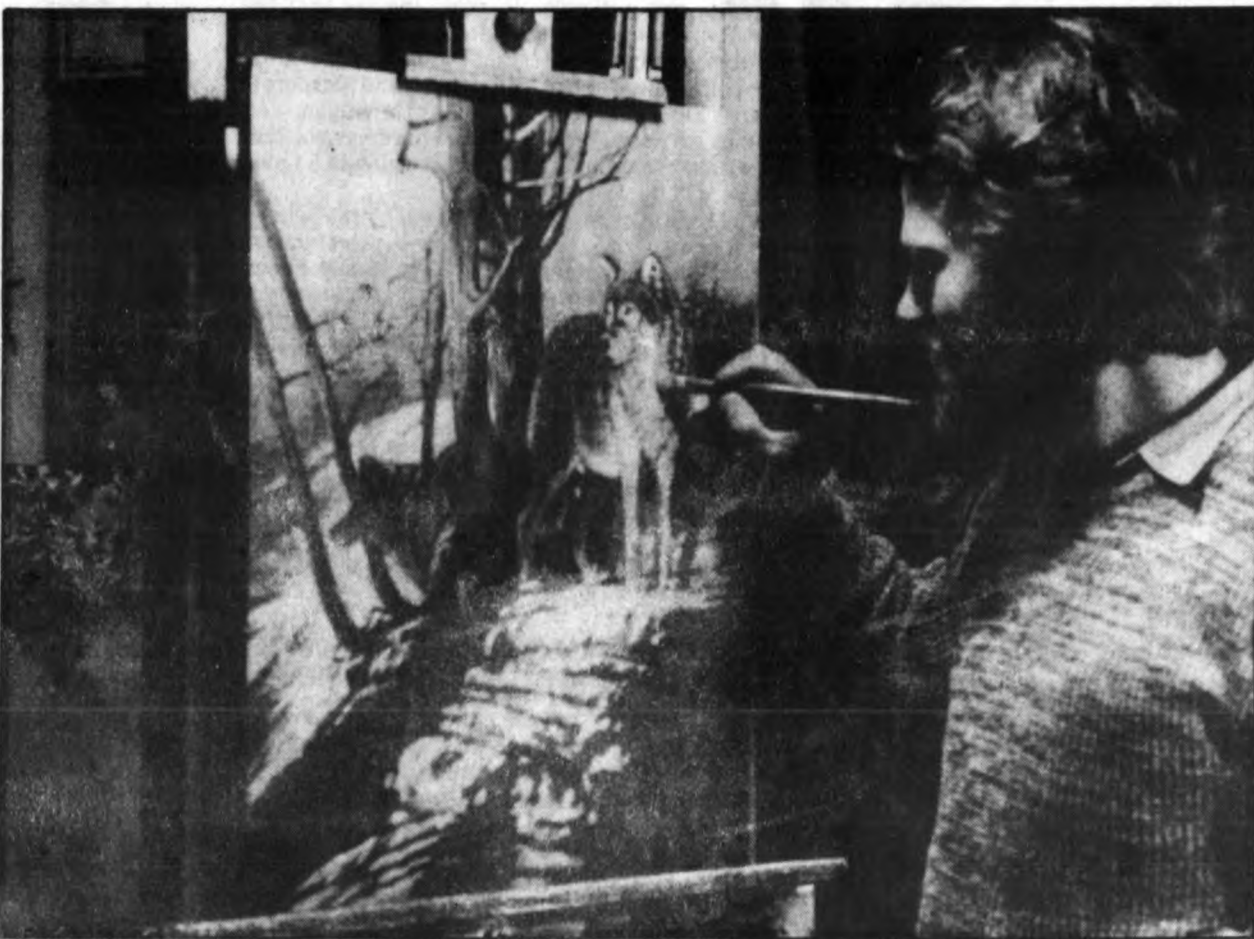
Randall stated that this issue is a dramatic debate because it has to be decided what the state's role should be with regard to education as provided in the constitution.

Randall said that a change in the

present law would allow greater latitude for private schools, however, every child in Michigan has an opportunity to realize his/her fullest potential by having a good and adequate education.

In regard to the elements in 116, he stated that he would like to do what is right for the students, respect the rights of parents to have an influential role in determining the education of their children, and preserve the integrity that should be there for the teaching profession.

## Local artist depicts wildlife

Besides their fame, what did Rien Poortvliet, dutch illustrator, and Gijsbert (Nick) van Frankenhuyzen, dutch artist, have in common?

Both of their reputations are built on painting wildlife art.

van Frankenhuyzen was influenced early on by Poortvliet's impressionistic wildlife style, who first began his career as a commercial artist.

van Frankenhuyzen was born in 1951 in Goes, the Netherlands, while as a youngster he admired and observed the natural beauty of wildlife.

Because of Gijsbert's fascination with wildlife, his father presented a drawing book to him in which he encouraged his son to sketch animals in their surroundings. Gijsbert would draw so quickly that he would receive a book time and time again.

After his five year formal education in graphic design at the Royal Academy of Arts in Arnhem, the Netherlands, he acquired skills such as photography, lay-out, painting, and fine art. He, too, began his career as a commercial artist and photographer in the Netherlands.

**HIS EDUCATION** and expertise qualified him for the position of art director of Michigan Natural Resources Magazine.

Although it took the commercial artist from the Netherlands a year to find his niche and be able to emigrate to the U.S., his trip to Michigan at the invitation of a friend was worth his while.

He stayed for two weeks at the

home of a Department of Natural Resources biologist who restored the health of owls, deer, and hawks. Gijsbert sketched what he saw and the results greatly affected the DNR friend who aroused his interest in the MNRM. Since 1977 each issue includes his paintings, photographs, and article illustrations.

The MNRM has also produced wildlife calendars since 1980 in which van Frankenhuyzen's collection of wildlife portraits can be found.

van Frankenhuyzen explains that visual print is important to capture the reader's interest. This is why he continues to visit zoos and his country home setting to observe and research how animals live and survive the four seasons for future illustrations, to collect data for his variety of personal sketch books on drawing animals, and for his wildlife files.

"**TOO MANY ARTISTS** paint animals out of season and their surroundings," says Gijsbert, "That's why I find it important to study animals in their habitat."

van Frankenhuyzen first treated Michigan to a new way of looking at wildlife when he was recognized as the Michigan Wildlife Artist of the Year in 1980 for his Red Fox and Blue Jay painting which portrayed the animal with its prey in its mouth.

van Frankenhuyzen contends that in Europe it is common to paint animals with their prey, but America's conception is the opposite.

"If it's not feather for feather in the U.S. then your painting is not considered to be good," says Gijsbert. "I try to create natural artwork which is responsive to an animal's environ-

ment," says Gijsbert.

In 1982 he proved he could paint detail for detail, when he won the Michigan Duck Stamp Contest with his pair of "Redheads." However, Gijsbert explains that it is too much like a color photograph — "it's not how I view nature's creatures, and it's too 'cutey'."

**GIJSBERT'S WORK** has been highlighted at many invitational art exhibits, such as the Great Lakes Art Festival in Milwaukee, the National Art Exhibition of Alaska Wildlife in Anchorage, where his "Gray Wolves" won the award of merit from bird specialist Roger Tory Peterson, and the Leigh Yawkey Woodson Birds in Art Exhibit in Wausau, Wis.

In 1984 van Frankenhuyzen executed a number of commissions to complete 10 paintings for the Hall of Christian Pioneers at the First Presbyterian Church of Lansing, depicting the influence of Christian pioneers on Michigan.

The Michigan Sesquicentennial Commission also had him design and paint the official mascot, the black bear, for Michigan's 150th celebration of statehood.

Although he has achieved much, Gijsbert continues to study art as a member of a New York international study group, the Society of Animal Artists, and has also received an Award of Excellence from the Communication Arts Magazine for his reputable work on the MNRM.

Gijsbert does not mind being recognized as a wildlife artist, yet he doesn't want to be confined to his title. With the security of his magazine

## Findlay courtyard project to benefit from Vegas Night

A combined raffle and Vegas Night, sponsored by more than 30 Clinton County service groups, will help raise approximately \$25,000 needed to complete the courtyard project currently under construction at Hazel I. Findlay Country Manor.

Volunteers from a number of organizations will sell 50-50 raffle tickets in the coming weeks. The Vegas Night and bingo party is planned for Saturday, Dec. 5 at the St. Johns-VFW Post on US-27. Bingo will be played between 1 and 4:30 p.m., with other popular Vegas style games planned until midnight.

Courtyard project chairperson Kurt Becker expects that the raffle and Vegas Day will generate the balance of funds needed to complete the courtyard, and is grateful for the support shown by the service groups.

"The concern displayed by each member of the various organizations reflects the pride and commitment that we here in Clinton County have for our senior citizens," Becker says. "The courtyard will not only be a testimony to that, but also to the high level of care and compassion exhibited on a daily basis by the staff of the Manor."

The courtyard will include a 30-foot gazebo-style shelter, improved landscaping with flower beds, shrubbery and foot-lighting along pathways, and a small water fountain in the northeast corner of the area.

Donated by a volunteer group of local contractors, the cement work connecting the gazebo, water fountain, and entrances to the courtyard was completed in September. Construction of the gazebo, also by

## Do commissioners really listen to requests from electorate?

To the Editor:

We elect commissioners to represent us and to do what is best for the majority of the people, but somewhere along the way, these commissioners decide that they alone know what is really best for us and they ignore what the people really want.

They say they will listen to our requests and then in their wisdom, they proceed to do what they originally decided to do. It is fortunate that on this issue of building a new county jail complex, costing the taxpayer \$12 million over the next 20 years, that we have a chance to vote on the added millage. We have the opportunity to say no to more and higher taxes.

Speaking only for myself, I have not been convinced that we need a new jail complex on 60 acres of land. There are many questions that have not been answered.

1. What is the cost of expanding the present jail to increase the capacity? Why scrap the existing 42-cell facility and build a new \$6 million jail just to gain approximately 20 to 30 cells?
2. Have the county commissioners investigated other

means of handling young prisoners other than putting them in jail?

3. What are the county commissioner's priorities on spending and increasing the taxes for all of us? Is building a new jail complex the most important need that the county commissioners feel we need at the present time?

4. What are Clinton County's needs in the next five years? Have these long-range plans been presented so that the voters can make decisions on how best our tax dollars should be spent?

5. Clinton County owns 160 acres of land south of St. Johns; what are the future plans for this land? Is that why they are proposing to buy another 60 acres east of St. Johns?

These are some of my questions that I feel have not been answered, and I am sure that each of you have many more questions.

I can only speak for myself, but at this time, I have no choice but to vote no on increasing the millage and raising our taxes. If it was my \$12 million I was spending in my business, I would certainly have a lot more options to evaluate than have been presented to the taxpayers.

Maybe we sometimes forget that it really is our \$12 million that is being spent, and we should be concerned about making sure that building a new jail complex is the one most important need of our county and as such can be justified by increasing our present high taxes higher.

How I feel on this issue is important only to myself, but the real challenge is that everyone get out and vote their convictions on Nov. 3.

This election is one of the few chances that the taxpayer has the right to tell their commissioners if they want their taxes raised.

## Spotlight on SJHS Student Council President Kuenzli

A friendly smile, a sincere interest in people, a willingness to give of himself — and a genuine love of St. Johns High School and the students who walk its halls. These are all traits of senior John Kuenzli, president of the SJHS Student Council.

"I feel that the role of the Student Council President is twofold: to represent and work for the students, and to act as a bridge between the students and the administration," Kuenzli says. "I have an interest in working to represent people's interests. I like the feeling of helping others."

Kuenzli served as class president during both his freshman and sophomore years. He was an active member of the Student Council during that time, and so was aware of students' goals, problems and concerns when he became president of the council.

He has attended several leadership forums, was a member of the Farm Bureau Leadership Forum in 1986, and serves as a student representative on the Board of Education's Human Sexuality Committee.

KUENZLI SAYS that his job as president is frustrating at times, and lists the following areas which cause him the greatest concern: not enough time to fulfill ideas presented to the council by individuals; inability to convince administration and teachers to adopt changes suggested by the council; and student apathy in regard to the importance and activities of the council.

Despite the various problems which Kuenzli and the council face, he is committed to working toward a number of goals which the council has set for this year. These include:

- The attainment of more student privileges from the school administration, such as students being per-

mitted to wear shorts during warmer weather.

- Improve communications both to and from the student body.
- Assignment of a regular student representative to attend all school board meetings.
- Implementation of a cooperative effort to have a dance with other high schools in the area.

Kuenzli, in his second term as council president, feels that the council has had several successes during his tenure.

"We were able to place a pop machine in the school cafeteria, implemented the school "Hats and Scarf" campaign and the "MORP" dance, helped with the Red Cross blood drive, eliminated the school magazine sale, and organized the Valentine Day carnival sale and Homecoming festivities," he says.

Kuenzli plans to attend MSU in the fall of 1988 where he will study for a career in business. In addition to his leadership activities on the council, he is a member of the band, swim team, Lions All-State Band, and works part time at Rehmanns Clothing in St. Johns.

He is the son of Dale and Pat Kuenzli of W. Parks Road.

• Insurance Tax — One of the ways to address the shortfall of monies which is in the neighborhood of \$160 to 170 million is to address the Michigan insurance tax. The board of appeals recently ruled the tax that the House of Representatives had in place, stating that it did not provide equal protection for non-domestic insurance companies, those companies and corporate headquarters located outside the state of Michigan.

According to Randall, Gov. Blanchard insists that they go with a premiums tax, which is going to be paid by taxpayers, if they go in that direction.

Randall tends to accept the bill passed by the Senate, which is a neutral one. It doesn't look at premiums as being a way of getting new money, but simply allows them to continue with the budget.

Randall stated that this bill is going to be a knock-down-drag-out fight, but that it needs to be resolved before they can move on with the budget.

Randall said that the governor has stated that he has to look at the revenue side of the budget before he will begin to entertain any bills which deal with the expenditure side.

• Transportation fund — The fund expired in 1986 and the extension expires at the end of October; it is a multi-bill package which would call for a \$90 million increase for additional monies in current fees. For example, when a driver's license needs to be renewed, the driver will pay more money for it.

Randall stated that a large amount of money is needed to upkeep the maintenance of roads, in order to improve as a tourist state.

He stated that this is an on-going debate.

Randall was first elected to the House of Representatives in 1978, and is now serving his fifth term in that office. He is assistant Republican leader for the 1987-88 term, representing the 89th District, which consists of Clinton County and a portion of Gratiot County.

Prior to his election, Randall was involved in television production and direction at Central Michigan University's station. He also received a 1987 Distinguished Alumni Award from CMU for his outstanding personal achievements and dedicated public service to CMU and the state of Michigan.

Randall currently holds seats on several committees.

position, he continues to enjoy his job, while he strives to complete a series of African wildlife after traveling to Kenya in 1984 and 1986.

"IT'S FUN TO paint people and animals, because they are similar in that their created naturally; I don't wish to paint anything man-made or commercial," says Gijbsert.

van Frankenhuyzen hopes to continue teaching art classes in the future. For three years he instructed classes in the Kellogg Bird Sanctuary of Augusta, Mich. where he taught 51 pupils art techniques.

His ambition is to bring together a community art group in the Bath or St. Johns area. "I learn just as much as the participants do," says van Frankenhuyzen.

His enjoyment of teaching relates to the one-to-one relationship with a student. "Artists are innovators, and it's an important dual role because as a teacher I deal with a student's talent," explains van Frankenhuyzen. "I see myself as providing a foundation for art students to form their own ideas and develop their own creativity."

"I feel that doing my work is only half of the project, says van Frankenhuyzen. "Having people share and respond to the work is the other half."

Things calmed down considerably after a hectic first quarter on Fowler's football field last Friday.

In fact, if his daughter Tricia had not been a candidate for Homecoming Queen, Coach Steve Spicer might have liked to called the game good after Scott Koenigsknecht gave the Eagles a 19-12 lead on a pass interception in the second period.

The 19-12 score held throughout the second half, assuring Coach Spicer's 6-0 Eagles of at least a tie for first in the Central Michigan Athletic Conference.

"Nothing much happened in the second half," Spicer said. "We were happy to get the win."

Maybe it was just as well that the pace slowed down after halftime — considering that the Bees took an early 6-0 lead off a 60-yard touchdown pass to open the game.

Junior Jeff Miller tied the game on the Eagles' following possession, taking the ball in from 9-yards out to score one of his two TDs of the night. The point after kick by Tony Schafer put Fowler ahead 7-6.

That score stood for less than a minute of playing time.

"We shouldn't have kicked off, I guess," Spicer said of the Eagles' ensuing kickoff.

The Bees took the kickoff and returned it 90 yards for another touchdown to reclaim the lead, 12-7. Things continued to go contrary to Coach Spicer's game plan when the Eagles fumbled on Bath's kickoff and lost the football.

"I'm not sure exactly what the problem was," Spicer said of his teams' unusual three fumble losses on the night. "Maybe it was the excitement of Homecoming week, or the fact that we were coming off two big wins in past weeks."

Bath drove down to Fowler's 13-yard line before, the Eagles defense held and the Bees lost the ball on downs.

From then on, things smoothed out. Miller put Fowler ahead once again with a 7-yard touchdown run, and the

interception by Koenigsknecht gave the Eagles all the breathing room they needed.

Halftime Homecoming activities saw Tricia Spicer crowned Queen — a happening that made father Steve "very proud" — and Tony Schafer was chosen Homecoming King.

Miller was the leading ground-gainer, rushing for 194 yards on 30 carries. The Eagles totaled 261 total yards, compared to 209 yards for Bath.

The Eagles play host to Pottsville in their CMAC season finale this Friday, Oct. 23. A victory would give Fowler undisputed first place in the league — a loss coupled with a win by Fulton would put the two clubs in a tie for first place.

"We'd like to be in first place by ourselves," Spicer said, "but Pottsville is a ball club that always seems to give us fits."

"We were happy with the way the kids handled themselves in the game with Bath — they showed a lot of character and held together."

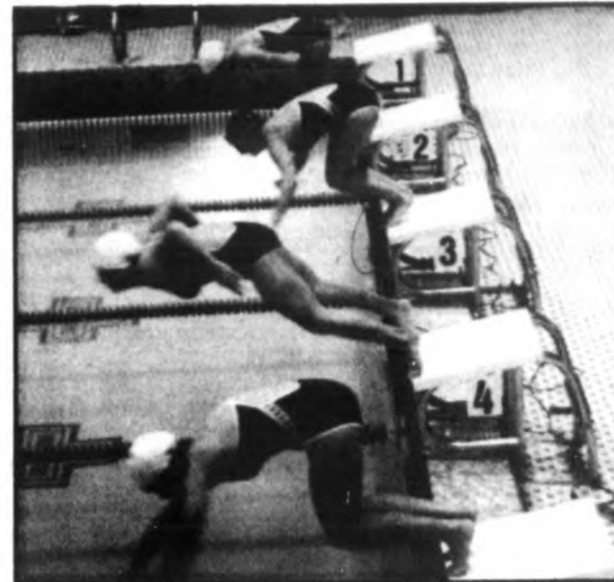

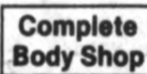

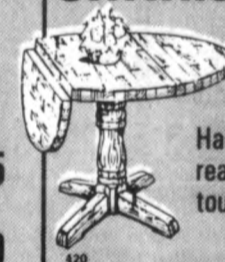

## Roehl lines Harvest chores

By Giles Roehl

Harvest is finally well underway. For many of us that means we have grain in the bins. Everything is done. Not quite. A whole year's work can still be lost to molds and/or insects unless care is taken to handle stored grain effectively.

The first step is to remove weeds and piles of stored grain around the storage bins. These can serve as breeding areas and food sources for both insects and diseases.

The second step, if you haven't already filled the bin, is to thoroughly clean the interior as much as possible. Following the cleaning, spray the inside of the bin with Malathion, a sanitizing spray that kills insects. Allow the chemical to drip through the grates into the aeration area.

The person doing the spraying should wear a chemical cartridge respirator which provides full face protection, a disposable tyvek suit, rubber gloves, boots, and a hard hat that can be washed.

The third step is to take as many fines as possible from grain as it goes into the storage unit. Fines cause the grain to develop air tracts through the grain resulting in "hot spots."

Step five is to avoid moisture condensation in the

bin by following recommended aeration patterns. This involves bringing the crop stored down in steps to 30 to 35 F for fall/winter storage; grain for spring/summer storage that will not be marketed prior to June 1988 should be held at temperatures below 50 degrees F.

Step six involves checking the grain storage structure on a regular basis. Don't put it in now and not look until February. It may be too late; the crop could be destroyed.

Step seven is to warm the grain up to 50 degrees F once again in steps for the spring, and provide air to the storage only when needed.

Remember, moisture content after drying will not have a significant impact on grain storage if once in storage, grain temperatures are not properly managed. If corn has been infected with mold prior to harvest, drying below 14 percent will not stop mold growth unless grain temperature is held below 50 degrees F.

## Agricultural news Pigs and people

In the majority of cases, pigs and people have a good relationship. They live side by side with little if any inconvenience to one another.

In fact, in Clifford Pope's essay, "On the Natural Superiority of Pigs," we see that "man's association with the pig goes back tens of thousands of years and has been an intimate one since domestication took place in Europe and Asia some 7,000 years ago."

Pope suggests that, "if the domestic pig had its way, it would replace the dog as man's best friend, instead of his best source of protein."

Recently the news has been filled with stories about the nuisance factor hogs and other livestock enterprises subject upon society. In fact, a year ago a committee of agency specialists, government officials, and citizens formed to modify the legislation in Michigan

to protect pigs from people and/or people from pigs.

As the legislation is developed, I encourage all livestock producers to follow it and analyze the impacts they will have on your farm. Throughout the winter there will be meetings held and publications written to inform you of the changes and how you can have a voice in the development of this legislation.

The first meeting will be held Dec. 10 in St. Johns. This meeting is sponsored by the MDA and will tell you what changes are proposed now and what consequences they may have for you. Watch for details and plan to attend.

A second meeting is planned for Jan. 20 at Smith Hall. This meeting is sponsored by the Cooperative Extension Service and will look at waste management practices, as well as advise you how to be heard at a public hearing. As a livestock producer, you can't afford to let this issue slip by.

Pork production is a highly sophisticated business that should continue to function, along with the rest of society, without either causing an inconvenience or hardship to the other.

## Dry bean crop looks good

The Michigan Bean Commission says that the change in the Michigan navy bean crop in the last 30 days has been for the positive.

According to state reporting services, the 1987 crop is 15 percent binned, with

yields better than expected. The commission says that 15-20 percent of fields still need additional time for maturity, with a hard frost hurting some of those beans. However, 60-70 percent of fields would be helped by a touch of frost.

# Schuette supports HR 3030

Congressman Bill Schuette last week announced his support for the passage of HR 3030, the Agriculture Credit Act of 1987, which is a compromise financial bailout package of the Farm Credit System.

"My first reaction is that the House has reacted swiftly and responsibly to save the Farm Credit System from bankruptcy," Schuette says. "But my caution is that despite the positive steps which this bill does take in the areas of borrowers' rights and liquidity of the system, it does not go the necessary and final step of streamlining and reorganizing the

FCS and providing local control." The legislation authorizes \$2.5 billion in needed cash for the FCS. The FCS holds nearly one-third of the national farm debt.

HR 3030 also creates a secondary market for the agricultural loans, "Farmer-Mac," which allows banks to purchase loans from the portfolio of the FCS, which in turn provides increased liquidity (cash) to the FCS.

The restructuring of the FCS itself was the most hotly debated aspect of the bill. Portions of the restructuring program included collapsing the

system from the current 12 banks to 6 regional banking centers to eliminate excessive costs and make the system more reliable. Schuette disagrees with the debtor/creditor relationship between the regional banks and local associations which was included in HR 3030.

"I would have preferred to see the local banks have greater autonomy in decision-making from the regional banks," he says. "This would have given farmers the true local control which I believe is imperative for an effective and efficient farm credit system."

## PIK and roll options

Congressman Bill Schuette reports that the IRS has reversed its earlier ruling of unfairly taxing Michigan farmers who exercise their option to "PIK and roll." Schuette says the IRS reversed its decision after re-examining the intent of the government agriculture program.

"What the IRS did was attempt to tax farmers for the crops they harvested before they sold their crop on the market," Schuette says. "The whole purpose of the PIK and roll program is to provide farmers with a better market en-

vironment to sell their crops rather than force them to sell at depressed prices and risk even greater losses."

Schuette adds, "The PIK and roll program provides greater market stability for agricultural products which in turn creates a consistent supply of food at lower food prices for consumers."

Schuette, along with other members from agricultural districts, sent letters to Secretary Lyng and Treasury Secretary Baker urging administrative action to reverse this action.
