County voters decide fate of jail today

Clinton County residents go to the polls today, Tuesday, Nov. 3, to decide whether or not to adopt an up to one-mill property tax increase to fund the construction of a new county jail.

The special election, authorized by the Clinton County Board of Commissioners, will levy a tax not to exceed 1 mill (one dollar per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation of property) for 20 years, beginning Dec. 1, 1988, to provide funds for the acquisition, construction and equipping of the jail.

Residents of St. Johns will also vote for two out of three city commis-

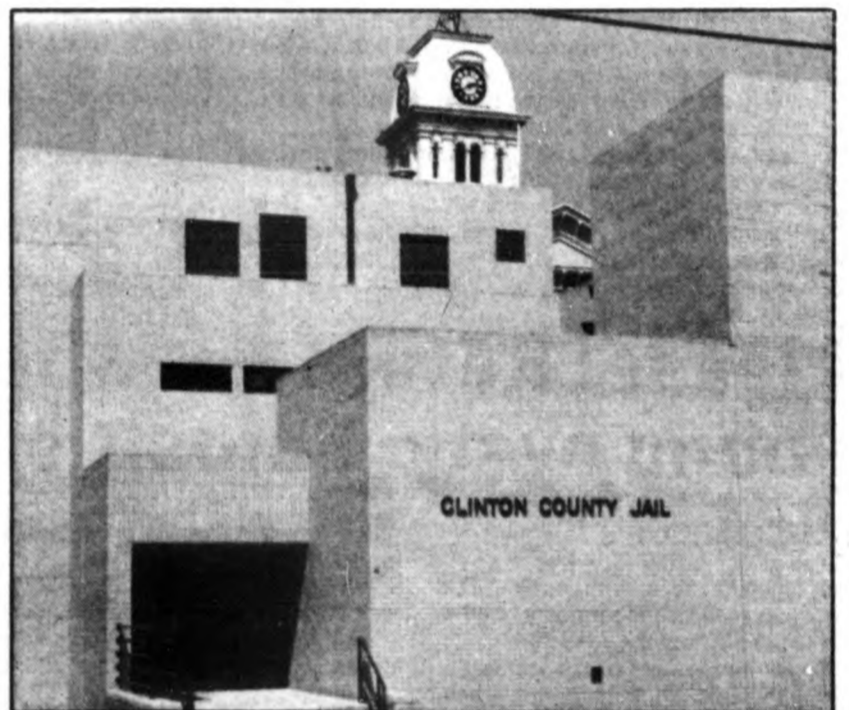

Operational millage forecast for next spring in St. Johns

A light agenda at the St. Johns Board of Education meeting on Oct. 26 presented board members several major discussion areas. The main topic was the amendment of the 1987-88 budgets in which the board was forced to use \$872,130 of cash fund equity monies in order to balance the budget.

That will leave a projected cash fund equity of \$42,520 in June, 1988, and ensures a millage vote next spring.

"Using the cash fund is not good for the following year," Supt. Steve Bakita says. "Because of that, we're definitely looking at a spring operational millage vote."

With an operational millage in mind, along with the prospect of a school bond vote for a possible new junior high building, the board established two subcommittees.

Board secretary Kevin Kirk will chair one committee with Dick Lehnert and Jim Parr as members, to work on the format for an operational millage. The group will meet with administrators to work out the details for a spring millage vote.

The second subcommittee, chaired by Tom Irrer with Bob Craig and Neil Barnhart serving as members, will investigate and explore the findings of the school facilities committee, and work on a future bond proposal. At their September meeting, board members endorsed the concept of the facilities committee which had made various recommendations for upgrading and constructing school buildings.

AT A MEETING on Oct. 12, board members took part in a "sharing session" with members of the facility committee and Don Lee, Tomblinson, Harburn Associates, the architectural firm which assisted the

committee in their study. Also present at that meeting was Ron Erickson of the Michigan School Investment Assoc., providing input on bond issues.

A date for the spring vote will be established in the near future, according to Bakita.

Other action taken by the board at the Oct. 26 meeting included:

• Adoption of a new automotive text for high school classes which replaces the 1965 textbook currently in use. The board authorized the pur-

chase of 70 new books at a total cost of \$31,313.

• Adoption of the board agenda policy amendment which provides for public communication on any matter to be given near the beginning of board meetings instead of at the end.

• Received a progress report on the current drainage project at the high school which includes pipe and catch basins in the parking lot, from the delivery ramp to the northeast corner of the building, and the area west of the parking lot.

St. Johns only district with enrollment gains

With the exception of St. Johns Public Schools, school districts in the coverage area of the Clinton County News experienced declines in total school enrollment for the 1987-88 school year.

Total enrollment for the St. Johns district as tallied on Oct. 2 — the "fourth Friday count" — stood at 3,394 which includes 3,269 students enrolled in developmental kindergarten through twelfth grade and 125 students enrolled in adult education programs. There are 1,125 students enrolled at the high school level, keeping St. Johns in Class A athletic status.

Fowler Public Schools' Oct. 2 count showed a total enrollment of 586 students — down six students from 1986-87 and resulting in a loss of approximately \$20,000 in state aid funds.

Supt. Mary Ann Chartrand says that the Fowler district anticipated the loss and had planned their budget accordingly.

"It (the enrollment decline) won't have an impact on anything this year," she says, "but it could

impact us in the future if it continues."

Supt. David Porrell of Ovid-Elsie Area Schools reported the biggest decline in the county — a loss of 69 students. A total of 1,889 students were enrolled in Ovid-Elsie Schools as of Oct. 2, costing the district \$118,000 in state aid.

"We had anticipated a decline," Porrell says, "and were able to balance the budget with our fund equity. We will have to take a hard look at next year."

Despite the enrollment loss, Ovid-Elsie will remain a Class B school for athletic events — high school enrollment being nine students over the Class C cutoff.

Pewamo-Westphalia Schools had "less of a loss than we anticipated," according to Supt. Roy Thelen. Total school enrollment on Oct. 2 stood at 673, down eight students from 1986-87. The enrollment decline means a loss of about \$24,000 in state aid for the district, which Thelen says had been projected in the boards' budget.

Changes in prearranged funerals

The concept of making funeral arrangements in advance, commonly called prearrangement, is nothing new. What is new about prearrangement is a bill recently passed by the Michigan House of Representatives — House Bill 4588, the "prepaid funeral contract funding act."

Basically what the new law does is provides a greater degree of protection for consumers by mandating that all monies given to a seller of funeral goods or services be placed in escrow until the funeral occurs. It also allows the consumer the right to cancel the agreement and be guaranteed at least a 90 percent refund of their original payment and any accrued interest.

According to Bob Sirrine, owner of Osgood Funeral Homes, there is a growing interest in prearrangement which stems in part from longer life spans and a need to get one's "house" in order.

"Studies show that people are living longer and that children aren't as likely to live close by as was the case in past years," he says. "As a result, most people consider making their

own funeral plans known rather than leaving the responsibility to their families."

ST. JOHNS' businessman John Sirrine says that the growth of prearranged funerals brought on the need for state legislation of the industry.

"As in every profession, you're going to end up with some people who are going to cheat someone," Sirrine says. "The legislation is designed to put credibility into record keeping systems by requiring funeral directors and sellers of funeral services to be audited every three years."

"It also brings all persons selling funeral services under the same guidelines."

Sirrine says the number of persons opting to arrange their own funerals in advance varies widely from one area to another.

"Education plays a big part in prearrangement, as does availability of nursing care facilities," he says.

State of Michigan regulations encourage prearrangement plans prior to receiving Medicaid payments for nursing home care. Generally speaking, it is to an individual's benefit to have monies in escrow for funeral arrangements where it is not considered as an asset. The law permits

Medicaid applicants to set aside up to \$2,000 for funeral arrangements without having it count as an asset in

Former St. Johns resident urges concern for substance abuse

To the Editor:

Until 1972 I lived and raised my family in St. Johns. I am a registered nurse and have a B.S. and M.S. in health education.

For 15 years I taught a very comprehensive required health course at the ninth grade level in Holt (just south of Lansing). Holt's parents were involved and supportive of the drug education and sex education units of this course. Perhaps because of our nearness to Lansing, our parents were more aware than many parents of the possibilities and dangers of adolescent drug experimentation and use.

Over the past year or two, I have heard numerous reports that St. Johns is experiencing much drug activity among its young people and that the parents, school officials, police, and churches have not taken effective steps to deal with the problem.

Any parent whose child has been in treatment for drug use can tell you that denying the problem only increases it. But, denial is a major key to promoting any addiction - whether it's alcohol, pot, cocaine, or others.

Friends in St. Johns tell me David Toma is scheduled to be speaking to your students on Nov. 3 and 4. When Mr. Toma speaks to young people, he gets through to many of them and they begin to search, almost frantically, for someone to help them.

Do you have any organized group of understanding and knowledgeable people prepared to talk to and help direct these youngsters to responsible agencies? How about a hot line that would accept anonymous calls? Might I suggest possible helpful contacts for your information?

Garners award Cornwell is top counselor

Terry Cornwell, elementary counselor for St. Johns Public Schools, was recognized last week at the Mid-Michigan Counselor of the Year. The announcement of Cornwell's selection was made during the state convention of the Michigan Association of Counseling and Development held in Grand Rapids.

"I feel that you need to be positive with kids and parents," Cornwell says of his counseling philosophy. "You must help them understand that there are many ways in which they can grow and develop."

"Most people want to solve their problems and are willing to work at it - but they need someone to show them how. I've never seen a parent who was intentionally trying to create problems or get in the way of their child's development."

A 1965 graduate of St. Johns High School, Cornwell has long been proud of his "home town." After receiving a degree in elementary education from Michigan State University, he taught sixth grade at St. Joseph Catholic School in St. Johns for one year before assuming a position as fourth and fifth grade teacher at Central Elementary School in St. Johns.

While teaching at Central for seven years, Cornwell attended Central Michigan University where he completed studies toward a masters degree in counseling. He has served as elementary counselor for the past 10 years.

CORNWELL BELIEVES that counseling students at the elementary level could have a substantial impact on problems which might be encountered in later school years.

"I really believe that if we can get to kids and parents before they have habitual problems, we can save a lot of bitterness and hurt in later years," he says. "Ideally, here in St. Johns schools, we could use four elementary

counselors for our six schools. The school needs to enter into a partnership with parents in educating and rearing children - a lot of emphasis needs to be with parents."

Looking back on his years spent in student counseling, Cornwell sees himself as having ability to "align himself with the child."

"It's like saying, 'I think I know what you're feeling,'" he says, "and then help the child find his own solutions. His (the child's) feelings are legitimate, but the behavior he chooses based on those feelings is what is important."

"Children must learn that all control comes from inside themselves and they have to control their own behavior - and they must accept the consequences of that behavior. They also must realize that there are positive consequences for changes in behavior - that's what I help them with."

Cornwell and his wife, Dorothy, have four daughters ranging in age from 24 to 15 years old. They are members of St. Joseph Catholic Church and are active in a variety of community activities.

1911 auto trip an adventure

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following St. Johns to Lansing route was included in the Clinton County Historical Society's November newsletter.

Taking a Trip in 1911

In 1911, the Scarborough Company issued a travel book of how to get from here to there throughout Michigan. This contained detailed descriptions of all trips by the number of miles to be traveled.

Trip 156 is listed from St. Johns to Lansing - 21.1 miles.

0.0 - Leave Courthouse, corner of Maple and State, going west on State Street, "Indpt Telephone."

0.2 - Turn left. 1.0 - Paralleling trolley, trolley line on left. 1.2 - Straight ahead, very sandy roads. 2.2 - Turn right. 2.6 - School on left. 3.2 - Turn left, good clay roads. 3.6 - Bridge. 4.2 - Straight ahead. 4.8 - Bridge and school on left.

5.2 - Turn right. 5.5 - Turn left, sandy roads. 6.2 - Bridge. 6.4 - Straight ahead. 7.3 - School on left. 7.6 - Bridge, turn right, very sandy roads. 8.6 - Straight ahead. 9.3 - Cemetery on left.

10.6 - Straight ahead, sandy roads. 11.7 - Turn right. 11.9 - Turn left. 12.0 - Paralleling trolley line, trolley on left.

12.8 - DEWITT, straight ahead. 13.2 - Bridge, straight ahead. 13.3 - Turn right, good clay roads.

15.0 - Straight ahead. 15.9 - School on right, cemetery, very sandy roads. 16.0 - Turn left. 16.2 - Turn right. 17.6 - Straight ahead. 18.7 - Railroad crossing, very sandy roads. 18.9 - Turn left, railroad crossing, good gravel roads. 19.4 - Railroad crossing. 19.7 - Turn right. 19.9 - Bridge.

20.0 - Turn left. 20.2 - Turn right, trolley crossing going south on Capitol Street.

21.1 - LANSING. State House, corner of Michigan and Capitol Streets, going south on Capitol St., good gravel roads. "Indpt Telephone."

Dillingham Comments Handicapped

While handicapper business owners face problems similar to all small businesses, they also have unique problems - such as not being taken seriously by lending institutions, government support programs, and procurement offices.

However, Michigan would be more responsive to the needs of the handicapper-owned and operated businesses under legislation before the Senate.

Senate Bill 414, ready for Senate passage, would create the Handicapper Business Opportunity Act. The bill sets a goal for state departments to award handicapper-owned businesses at least 3 percent of total yearly expenditures for construction, goods, and services.

Last year, the state's purchasing orders totaled more than \$205 million, but only \$25,000 went to handicapper-owned and operated businesses. This bill would promote competitive opportunities for these businesses by taking handicapper business people seriously. SB 414 would also help handicappers become more self-sufficient and less dependent on

public assistance.

To determine how Michigan handicappers in business were faring, the state Departments of Commerce, Labor, and Education coordinated the nation's first Handicapper Entrepreneur Conference last year. As an outgrowth of that conference, the Handicapper Small Business Association was formed with the goal of creating more procurement opportunities for handicapper-owned businesses. SB 414 is the result of their efforts and was developed with the support of the Department of Civil Rights, Commerce, Education, Management and Budget, and the Governor's office.

SB 414 is designed to improve the climate for handicapper business owners and promote handicapper business starts and expansion in this state. To accomplish that goal, the legislature should quickly approve the bill and send it to the governor to become law.

In the house of representatives Insurance debt

Our state's unemployment insurance system could be facing a \$16 million debt by 1989, and unless legislative action is taken soon, I predict the fund will be in a crisis for the second time in a decade.

Recently-revised Michigan Employment Security Commission assumptions indicate that instead of an expected Trust Fund balance of \$657 million by the end of 1989, there will be at least a \$16 million debt.

Quite simply, Michigan is not prepared for the next downturn. I thought we learned our lesson during the recession of the early 1980s, but history will repeat itself unless Governor Blanchard puts unemployment insurance reform on his agenda.

The MESC projection is based on the assumption

that there will be a total unemployment rate in Michigan of 9 percent in 1988 and 9.4 percent in 1989. The University of Michigan economists are forecasting an unemployment rate of 9.9 percent in 1988 and 10 percent in 1989.

The legislature should be examining this bill and other proposals. To do nothing new only assures a far more painful package of unemployment benefit cuts and employer tax increases during the next crisis. Ultimately, the failure to look ahead will make it even harder for Michigan to compete for jobs.

determining eligibility. THERE ARE two types of preneed contracts, Sirrine says, guaranteed price and non-guaranteed price.

In a guaranteed price agreement, the buyer purchases goods and services at current prices with the funeral director agreeing to deliver the goods and services at no additional cost to family members regardless of when the death occurs or of inflation costs.

A non-guaranteed contract says that the money in escrow will be applied toward the cost of the funeral, but if it is not enough to cover expenses at the time of death, the family must make up the difference. The family is also entitled to receive any surplus left in the account.

Sirrine hopes a new promotional program which Osgoods currently is using will help make people aware that they do have many options available to them regarding funeral arrangements.

"Prearrangement doesn't necessarily mean just 'pre-funding,'" he says. "Prearrangement can cover anything from knowledge and understanding about cremation to simply choosing one's own service style."

"People still have a tendency to be uncomfortable when they deal with funeral directors - it's just not like calling up the phone company and ordering a new phone," he says.

"We're hoping to make people more comfortable with their decisions concerning funeral arrangements."

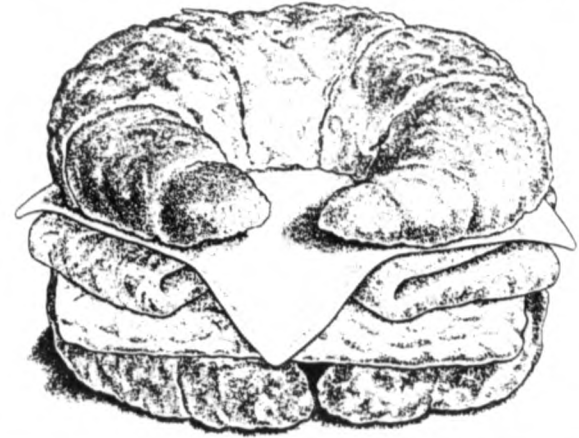

Family focus

Fat substitute

Everyone seems to be much more health conscious these days. All the classes that I have offered this year on cooking for a healthier diet have filled right up! Well, for all of you who are still looking for ideas on how to have a healthier diet, I have something new to tell you. There may be a new calorie-free fat substitute on the market.

The first fat substitute may be available within the next few years. Procter and Gamble is seeking permission to sell "Olestra," the commercial name for their indigestible, fatlike substance. Development of the product has taken nearly 20 years.

Olestra, a sucrose polyester, is a calorie-free, man-made substance formed by linking sugar and fatty acids. It is claimed that the bonds that are formed in the processing of Olestra are so tight that digestive enzymes cannot break them down. If that is true, the substance could pass through the body without being absorbed. If it's not absorbed, it would not provide any calories.

According to studies, SPE could offer an added advantage: reducing blood cholesterol levels by up to 20

percent in some individuals. It appears that SPE displaces some of the saturated fats normally consumed in the diet and inhibits the absorption of dietary cholesterol.

Several safety questions need to be answered before Olestra will be approved for use as a food product. SPE may remove from the body some fat soluble vitamins, namely A and E, along with cholesterol. Procter and Gamble intends to add vitamin E to the formulation of Olestra.

Other researchers say that some individuals may experience a laxative effect if they consume SPE in large quantities. Because fatty acids are needed to maintain the body, serious consideration must be given to the impact of substituting indigestible fat for fats that provide those fatty acids.

If Olestra is approved as a food product, expect to find it in home cooking oil, replacing up to 35 percent of the fats, and in commercial oil and snack foods, replacing up to 75 percent of the fats.

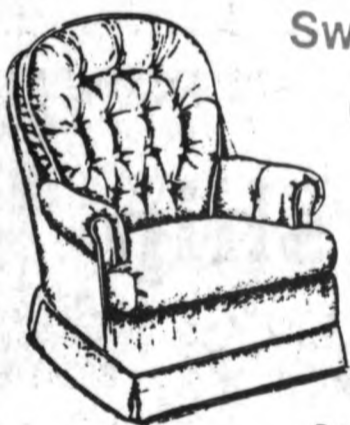

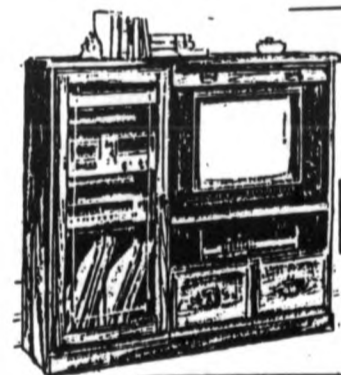
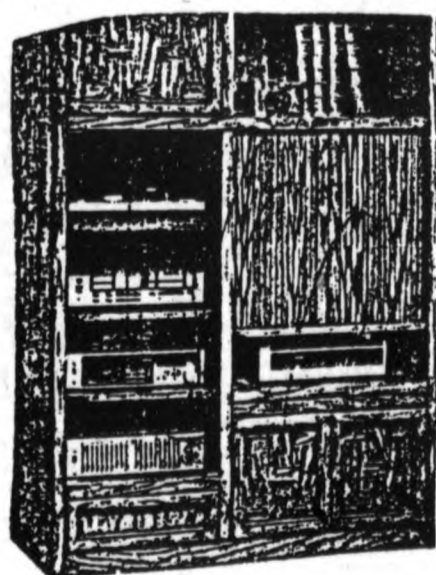

St. Johns' group promotes excellence in education via 'Foundation for Excellence'

What is St. Johns Schools "Foundation for Excellence?" A non-profit organization which is a special feature adding to the quality of education for all students within the school district.

Founded in the fall of 1985, the foundation is a broad-based community organization dedicated to the development, funding and promotion of positive programs which will create a climate of 'excellence' for students, faculty and staff of St. Johns Public Schools. Its purpose is not to replace the basic funding of education which is provided by local taxes, but rather to enhance that education by assisting in the regular functions of the district and in areas of critical need.

BECAUSE OF the finance problems and budget cuts experienced by the school district in the past several years, the foundation has helped to sponsor a variety of projects which could not have been funded by regular school financing. Included among the projects which the foundation helped to fund last year are:

- T-shirts, displaying a special 'foundation' logo indicating excellence, were presented to students achieving high academic standards.

- A grant was given to elementary music instructor Joe Badarko to create a series of video-tapes for kindergarten teachers which will be used in presentation of a music curriculum for their classes.

- A grant was given to high school special education teacher Randy Rude which financed building of a storage shed, constructed by his students. Money raised from the sale of the shed will be used to buy more materials for construction of another shed — making the project self-perpetuating.

THE FOUNDATION is financially dependent on donated cash, securities, personal and real property, with all donations tax-deductible. Donations may be made in several ways:

- General gifts — Contributions in this category are accepted by the foundation for use in a variety of areas including administrative purposes, current grants, endowment grants, or other funding approved by the board of directors.

- Bequests — Consideration by persons for bequests under will or trust are encouraged by the foundation. Donors should discuss their intentions for specific bequests with board members to ensure compliance with their wishes.

- Grants — Along with applying for grants from other

foundations and businesses, the board of directors is always appreciative of the many memorial gifts given to the foundation which are made in memory of deceased individuals or in cases of celebration of special events.

Donations to the foundation may be made as an outright gift, by monthly or annual pledges or approved payroll deductions, designated gifts made in memorial, or gifts of securities, personal or real property. In all cases, donations are tax-exempt and should be made to "St. Johns Schools Foundation for Excellence." All donations will be accepted and acknowledged. Donations may be mailed to:

Seniors enjoy Gail Foerch's music at local center

Gail Foerch, 75, of Fowler, has been involved in his own entertainment history since an early age.

As a youngster, Foerch was musically inclined and influenced by his father who played the harmonica, and his two brothers, Berl who played the violin and Hazel the piano.

The early home-spun music referred to as bluegrass, gave Foerch the momentum to carry on a rich family tradition. Since he did not have an instrument to call his own, at age 13 he invented one out of a wooden cigar box.

"But it didn't play very well because the box's sound couldn't compare to the real instruments; I just wanted to play with the big boys," said Foerch.

When he was 15-years old, Foerch had saved enough allowance to buy a five string banjo. He began to practice daily. Because of his diligence and talent which he demonstrated throughout his childhood he was referred to as 'the musical plow boy.'

Foerch continued to carry on his musical heritage

while he was a first class electrician's mate in the navy. He played the banjo with "The Minute Men" aboard the U.S.S. Lexington, one of the first three aircraft carriers.

"The Minute Men consisted of a 10 member band; we were an orchestration," said Foerch, "from 1931 to 1934 we performed together — the improvisation was incredible."

IN 1934 'The Minute Men' entertained an audience of thousands for the New Year in Longbeach, Calif. at Longbeach Municipal Auditorium.

"Long Beach's auditorium is bigger than the Lansing Civic Center and at that time we played in a bandshell because there wasn't any modern equipment such as microphones," said Foerch.

Now, Foerch's banjo is 60 years old and he no longer plays it because of arthritis in his fingers which limit him to pluck away at the strings.

However, Foerch has not given up his right to entertain himself or others. "I learned of a short-cut to play-

ing the piano, because I couldn't break the chords of a piano, and I found it easier to perform on the organ," claims Foerch.

Foerch started out on a Hammond chord organ in 1949. He is known for the way he swings the keys of an organ, and the musical sounds which he produces.

In 1981 he performed at the R.E. Olds Museum, Lansing, for their 84th birthday. "It was a formal dedication to commemorate the Olds Motor Vehicle, and I was happy to have shared my talents and time," said Foerch.

For 10 years Foerch has also performed at the St. Johns Senior Citizen Center. "I received a silver plaque in appreciation for all of the fine musical entertainment I have given them," said Foerch.

Over the years, Foerch has collected four Hammond organs, with which he continues to perform at house parties and other functions to share his musical aspirations and to teach people about electric organs.

Enjoy USA trip

Fulton Schools host teachers

The only disappointment Nubuo Kitagawa and Masanobu Ohashi have had so far during their visit to Michigan is that the Detroit Tigers didn't make it as far as baseball's World Series.

"The Detroit Tigers are very much liked in Japan," Ohashi says. "We were hoping to see them win the World Series."

Kitagawa and Ohashi, Japanese teachers involved in a Japanese/American exchange teacher program, were teaching classes at Fulton's high school and middle school last week before heading for Marquette — their next stop on the 10-month trip.

The 1987-88 Michigan-Shiga Exchange Teacher Program was organized through Lansing Community College, with Charles Bettisin from LCC making arrangements with Fulton Principal Chuck Mongall for the teachers to visit the school. The Shiga prefecture in Japan is a "sister state" of Michigan, located at about the same latitude as Michigan.

DURING THEIR four-day visit, Ohashi and Kitagawa addressed students and presented slides on various Japanese customs and traditions. They spoke on topics including art, songs, history, culture, family life, and life in Japanese schools.

"The presentations were excellent opportunities for our students to hear and learn about a culture different than our own and to become more aware of Japanese life," Mongall says.

Kitagawa is an English teacher at Hachman High School in Ohmihachman City, Japan. Because he normally instructs high school age students, the experience of talking to classes of elementary and junior high students was a new one for him.

"Talking with kindergarten and elementary students was unusual," he says, "but very enjoyable. They had many, many questions."

Kitagawa says one main difference he had noted so far in teaching American students was their inquisitive nature and willingness to express opinions.

"United States students seem to have an opinion about many things," he says, "and talk much more about how they feel about different things than students in Japan do. I think that is good."

Ohashi, also an English teacher at Kagamioka Junior High in Shiga, Japan, agreed with his co-worker's estimation of American students.

"Students here have a greater ability to express themselves — Japanese students are too shy to ask questions," he says. "In Japan, we may have a bit too

many regulations placed on our students. Japanese are more group-orientated."

THE FORMER high school baseball coach also concurs with Kitagawa in saying that they had received a warm reception at all the schools which they visited so far on their trip. Before arriving at Fulton, the two teachers instructed classes in Williamston and Southfield.

"It has been a most enjoyable trip so far," Ohashi says. "We have much that we have learned from the American teaching system — and perhaps we will leave behind some Japanese ideas which will be useful here in the United States as well."

"The idea of the exchange program is to learn about different education methods and to help one another."

PAL awarded dollars in battle with Granger

The folks at the Peoples Action League, better known as PAL, were jumping up and down last weekend as they absorbed some good news.

In what may be a landmark decision in Michigan, an Ingham County circuit judge has ordered Granger Landfill to repay half of PAL's legal fees in its five-year battle against the Watertown Township landfill.

Judge Carolyn Stell said in her decision Oct. 19 that the "courts review of this litigation convinces her that PAL has, in significant measure, implemented the goal of the Michigan Environmental Protection Agency of protecting Michigan's natural resources."

Therefore, the interests of justice require that PAL be assisted with its attorney fees. The court exercises her discretion and allocates one-half of PAL's costs, including attorney fees, to be paid by Granger.

PAL member Nancy Coleman says she was told that PAL may very well be the only "dump fighters" in Michigan to have been awarded money in its efforts.

PAL President Jan Look says she was actually surprised about the ruling. "We didn't really think she would do this," says Look. Whenever PAL left the courtroom the feeling was "we weren't really there yet — she was real sticky and hard to get a handle on."

Jerry Granger of Granger Landfill was also somewhat taken aback. Although he hadn't really had a chance to see the court order, he says he was "certainly" surprised at it and "I bet they (PAL) were too."

At this point he has no plans for further action, other than to review the options open to them.

The court order is the culmination of a hard battle stemming from the attempt of Granger Landfill to open

a hazardous waste facility in the early 1980s. Residents found that Granger was already dumping hazardous waste on the site, apparently before permits were issued.

PAL was formed by concerned residents to stop Granger and in 1986 of last year, a formal affidavit was signed. Granger would no longer be seeking permission 'o open a hazardous waste site.

Jan Look says the group ultimately got everything it wanted and kept Granger from grandfathering in more acreage for a hazardous waste site. Then they went for money.

PAL won't be spending the money prematurely. There is the chance that Granger will appeal the decision. In addition, the judge was not satisfied with attorney Pete Stetee's reckoning of fees due him.

The court order says the "attorneys fees are not sufficiently detailed to ascertain how much time was spent on this case, as opposed to various other actions." PAL was ordered to confer with Granger on the approximately \$55,000 billings.

Look says the decision boils down to one thing for them, "we knew we were right and to have it verified really makes a difference — more than the money! We poured out blood and tears over this and it was paid for with more than just cash."

The township community and PAL members persevered to the end. Through everything from bake sales, to residents who just came up and gave PAL donations, the group has paid many of its legal bills.

Look says PAL would like to have a community open house somehow to thank people for all their support. She says there were plenty of people who "would bring in a check and never ask us where we were — they just supported us. They're just as much the 'stars' as anyone else."

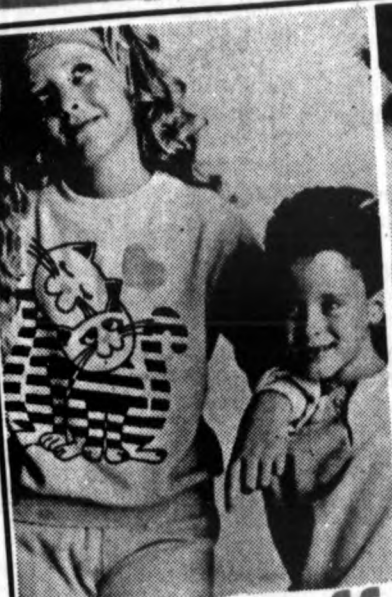

Roehl lines Tax planning

Now is the time to plan for your 1987 income taxes, not after Jan. 1, 1988, when it's too late. To help you know what to look for we have arranged to have Dr. Mike Kelsey, a Michigan State University income tax and farm management specialist, explain the new tax laws Wednesday, Nov. 11, at 7:30 p.m. at Smith Hall.

Major changes have been made in the federal income tax laws. Some of these changes are already in effect, others will be phased in over a period of time.

Some changes will affect everyone — items such as standard deduction increased, less tax brackets, increased personal exemption, and loss of dividend exclusions. Other changes affect special groups: spouse two earner income deduction, income averaging, and long form deduction.

Then there are the changes that may or may not affect you, depending on many different circumstances. These are the ones I've requested Dr. Kelsey to relate to and explain. These may include sale of a long term asset (i.e. a home, handling the dairy herd buyout dollars, mortgage interest, interest on an automobile, how to handle your IRAs, soil and water conservation expenses, and a host of other concerns).

Dr. Kelsey is recognized as an outstanding authority on income tax management, especially in the farm tax area. He helps write the books!

Put this time and place on your calendar now — Nov. 11, 7:30 p.m., at Smith Hall.

Agricultural news Forage quality

What do you know about the forages you are feeding? Well, several Clinton County farmers have a much better idea of the quality of the feeds they put up this year and how to feed them after attending the Forage Analysis Workshop last week.

Thirty-one feed samples were analyzed using the NIR forage analysis equipment. These values were later used to balance for lactating cows, dry cows, and heifers.

Why do we analyze forages? Well, let me give you an example. Out of 14 samples of hay or haylage, the crude protein ranged from 7.8 percent to 22.2 percent and the Relative Feed Value ranged from a low of 88.01 to a high of 147.8.

What all this means is there is a great deal of variability in forage quality and as this quality changes, the way you feed the forage and who you feed it to must also change.

Earlier I referred to the relative feeding value of the forage. The RFV is an index used to rank forages based on fiber and protein content, estimated intake potential, and milk producing ability. It is an attempt to measure the overall nutritive quality of a forage using a single number.

In the 14 hay and/or haylage samples, the haylage testing highest in protein (22.2 percent) did not have the highest RFV (138.1). The highest RFV was 147.8 and the crude protein on that sample was 20.9 percent.

The difference was in the fiber level. The higher CP sample also had a higher fiber level, thus limiting the cows intake and her milk producing ability.

Now, one should not get the impression that the 22.2 CP haylage is bad; the truth is that both are very good forages. The RFV 147.8 is a Prime and the RFV 138.1 is a number one quality forage; both very good forages for high producing cows.

As I analyzed the results of all the hay and haylages sampled, I found that 50 percent of this was of high enough quality to recommend feeding it to high producing cows. The other 50 percent would work much better if fed to the low group: dry cows or heifers.

Forage quality is a very important issue when feeding your cows. If cows are not producing, you may want to look at the forage quality and then see if your ration is balanced.

Schuette writes to Lyng

Congressman Bill Schuette recently sent a letter to Secretary Richard Lyng from the Michigan Congressional Delegation requesting that he invoke his discretionary power and waive the federal crop insurance requirement, allowing Michigan farmers to be eligible for disaster assistance for this summer's drought.

Schuette, the author of the letter, explained that due to the 1985 Farm Bill, farmers are required to purchase federal crop insurance for their crops in order to be eligible for government assistance in a disaster situation. The current participation rate for Michigan farmers in the Federal Crop Insurance program is less than 4 percent.

Schuette says, "the 4 percent participation rate of Michigan farmers in the program implies that farmers do not believe that the federal government is the good hands people."

This summer's drought affected over 45 Michigan

members who participated in these contests.

Chapter Farmer initiation was held in October. There were five members from the Ovid-Elsie chapter to receive this degree.

Conservation corner Soil survey

By Eileen Gillespie

Soil scientists made a survey to learn what kinds of soils are in Clinton County, where they are located, and how they can be used. The scientists observed the steepness, length, and shape of slopes, the size and nature of streams, the kinds of native plants or crops, the kinds of rock, and the different types of soils.

They dug many holes to expose the natural layers of a soil, then studies these layers of soil and compared them with surrounding counties and with soils from more distant areas. From this they classified and named the soils according to nationwide procedures.

After a guide for classifying and naming the soils had been worked out, they drew boundaries of each soil on aerial photographs. These photographs show

woodlands, buildings, field borders, trees, and other details that help in drawing soil boundaries accurately.

The maps show the different soil types and these types are described so as to be useful to those who want to have a general idea of the soils in a particular area, or who want to locate areas suitable for a certain kind of land use. Such a map is a useful guide for broad planning for a watershed, tree planting, recreation facilities, community development, etc.

The soil survey book contains the names and descriptions of the many different soils and various tables explaining the uses of the soil types.

The Clinton Soil Conservation District has a supply of these surveys of the county and if you would like to have one for your own use, stop in the district office at 306 Elm St., St. Johns and get your copy.

Fowler travels football playoff road again

Don't pack away those football blankets and tailgate supplies just yet.

The "second season" begins this weekend. Michigan High School football playoffs, that is.

For the third consecutive year, Fowler football fans in particular — and area followers in general — will have the opportunity to sample playoff excitement when Coach Steve Spicer's Eagles face Ottawa Lake-Whiteford in their opening Class D contest on Saturday, Nov. 7.

As host team, Fowler elected to use facilities at St. Johns High School, with kickoff time slated for 1:30 p.m.

The Eagles finished in second place in their Class D region, under the point system established by the Michigan High School Athletic Association for post season play. Ottawa Lake-Whiteford was third, while first place Sand Creek will play against fourth place Genesee in the other first round game this weekend.

"We had scouts out last Friday night looking at all the teams who we might have met in our first game," Spicer said in a Sunday evening telephone conversation. "but we haven't really had a chance to go over those as yet."

"We do know that Ottawa Lake has an identical record to ours — 8-1 — and that they played well against Morénci, a Class C school ranked second in the state, in their game prior to this past weekend."

Spicer's squad secured their second-place berth with a devastating 62-0 thrashing of Capac in their regular season finale last Friday night. The Eagles were definitely flying high in their last home appearance of the 1987 season.

Jeff Miller scored Fowler's first touchdown of the game — one of three TDs which the Eagles tallied in the first quarter alone. Miller's 3-yard run was followed by a completed 2-point conversion pass from quarterback Matt Hufnagel to Ron Schafer. Hufnagel rambled 25 yards for Fowler's second TD, and Miller completed first period scoring with a 15-yard run and following 2-point conversion run.

Second quarter action saw the Eagles score two runs via the air when Hufnagel completed a 60-yard pass

play and 25-yard aerial trick to Scott Koenigsnecht. The senior quarterback sandwiched a 2-point conversion pass to Tony Bertram between the TDs. Fowler's final score of the half came on a 3-yard run by Andy Thelen.

Thelen put 6 more points on the board when he went 55 yards on the Eagles' first play of the second half, and Scott Koenigsnecht took over quarterbacking duties to connect with Bertram on the 2-point conversion.

Ron Schafer capped off Fowler's totals with an 8-yard run in the third period and a 4-yard run in the fourth stanza.

Individually, Miller gained 104 yards on 8 carries. Thelen rushed for 88 yards on 6 carries, and Hufnagel completed 2-2 passes for 85 yards. The Eagles totaled 334 offensive yards, compared to 130 yards for Capac.

Redwings win exciting 14-7 grid finale at Grand Ledge

The final seconds of this year's annual St. Johns/Grand Ledge football clash brought fans on both sides of the field to their feet, with the final 14-7 score in the Redwings' favor coming after passes into the endzone by Grand Ledge quarterback Steve Kingsley were batted down.

St. Johns' players Scott Heibeck and Barry Kiel thwarted the Comets' plan to tie the contest in the closing 11 seconds by denying Grand Ledge receivers the ball.

The non-league victory was a fitting conclusion to a fine 8-1 season for Coach Bart Kjolhede's team.

"It was exciting — right down to the end," Coach Kjolhede said. "We turned them back — it was a good test of character."

Redwing quarterback Matt Wilcox put the initial points of the game on the scoreboard in the second quarter, following a back-and-forth first period that saw neither team score. Oliver Kessler split the uprights with his extra point kick to give St. Johns a 7-0 lead.

That advantage was extremely short-lived, however, as the Comets returned the ensuing kickoff all the way for a touchdown. The PAT knotted the score at 7-7.

St. Johns mounted a drive late in the period, taking the ball down to the Comet 2-yard line with 16-yard and 23-yard pass receptions by senior Tom Penix paving the way. Time, and the Comet defensive line, conspired to keep the Redwings from scoring as the halftime gun sounded.

WITH THE Grand Ledge first half kickoff return TD still fresh in their minds, the Redwings elected to attempt an onside kick to begin the second half. The Comets got the ball in good field position on the St. Johns' 44-yard line, but failed to make the first down.

Following an exchange of possessions, the Redwings got the ball on their own 15-yard line and began the long march downfield. Runs by sophomore back Ray Schneider, and a screen pass play from Wilcox to

Schneider that covered 54-yards, carried St. Johns down to the Comet 6-yard line where Dale Feldpausch took the ball in for the score on two running plays.

Another PAT by Kessler gave St. Johns the lead, 14-7 with :50 left in the third quarter.

The Redwings held the Comets on the next series of downs, then brought the ball into Grand Ledge territory with Wilcox hitting senior Jim Martens for plays that went 35 and 12 yards. With a first and goal situation and 2:34 left in the game, the Comets came up with an interception to stall St. Johns' drive.

Grand Ledge moved the ball downfield on pass completions by Kingsley, when senior Scott Aylsworth intercepted the ball in the endzone to give St. Johns possession with just 1:00 left in the game.

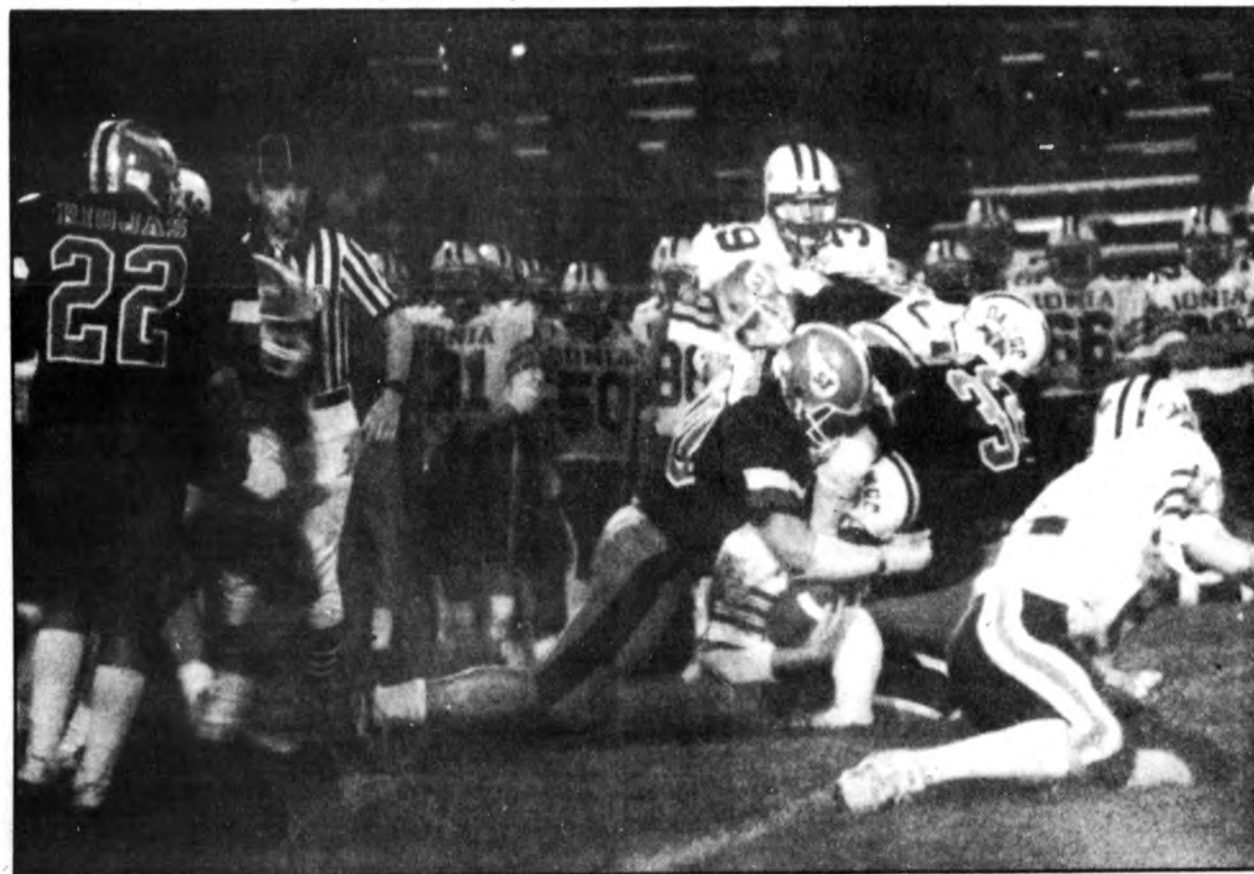
AFTER BEING forced to punt, the Redwings put Grand Ledge in the catbird seat when a pair of 15-yard penalties gave the Comets the football on the Redwing 12-yard line. The Redwing defense held firm in the closing :11 seconds with Mike Fleishman forcing Kingsley out of bounds for a loss, followed by the plays by Heibeck and Kiel.

Offensively, St. Johns rushed for 220 yards and tallied 192 yards in the air for a total of 412 yards. The Comets had 60 yards on the ground and 79 aerial yards for 139 total yards.

Feldpausch gained 53 yards on 17 carries, Dwight Pierson had 61 yards on 15 carries, Schneider had 52 yards on 12 carries and one pass reception for 54 yards, Wilcox gained 37 yards on 11 carries and completed 9-14 passes. Penix caught 6 passes for 104 yards, and Martens had 2 pass receptions for 33 yards.

Defensively, Randy Trayer had 7 tackles and 2 assists, Fleishman had 3 tackles and 1 sack, Martens had 4 tackles and 3 assists, Jose Riojas had 3 tackles, 2 assists and 1 sack, Heibeck had 3 tackles and 2 assists, and Aylsworth had the pass interception.

"It was nice to win one of these (games with Grand Ledge)," Coach Kjolhede said. "We have some things that we know we can work on next year — we know we can be better — but this group of seniors ended their season knowing they had done a good job."

Eagle lady harriers were led by sophomore Lynette Feldpausch who placed seventh overall at 22:10, while Lisa Rademacher was close behind in eighth place at 22:17. Other point earners were Kristin Hoerner, 11th at 22:42; Rebecca Feldpausch, 24th at 23:56; and Kelly Nobis, 27th at 24:07.

The time posted by Nobis was especially noteworthy as it included time lost while she reclaimed her shoe from a mudhole.

"She came back to finish well for us," Spalsbury said.

The coach knows both teams must post good race times to be in contention for top spots at the state finals this weekend. "I give the Coaches Award based on the girl's tennis ability, her compatibility with other team members, and her helpfulness and willingness to work with others," Davis said.

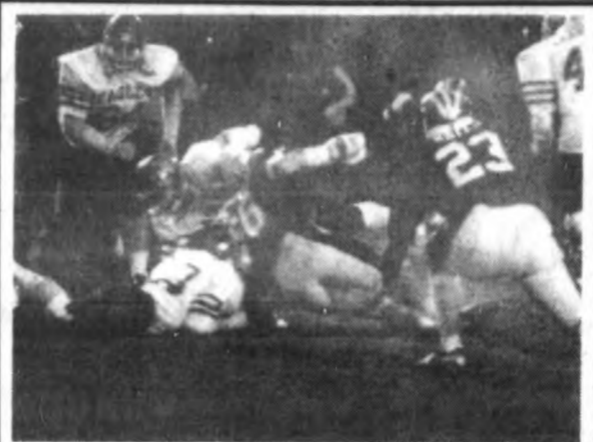
Royston also was named "Biggest Food Moocher" by her teammates, while Julie Frye received the "Tiger of the Court" award.

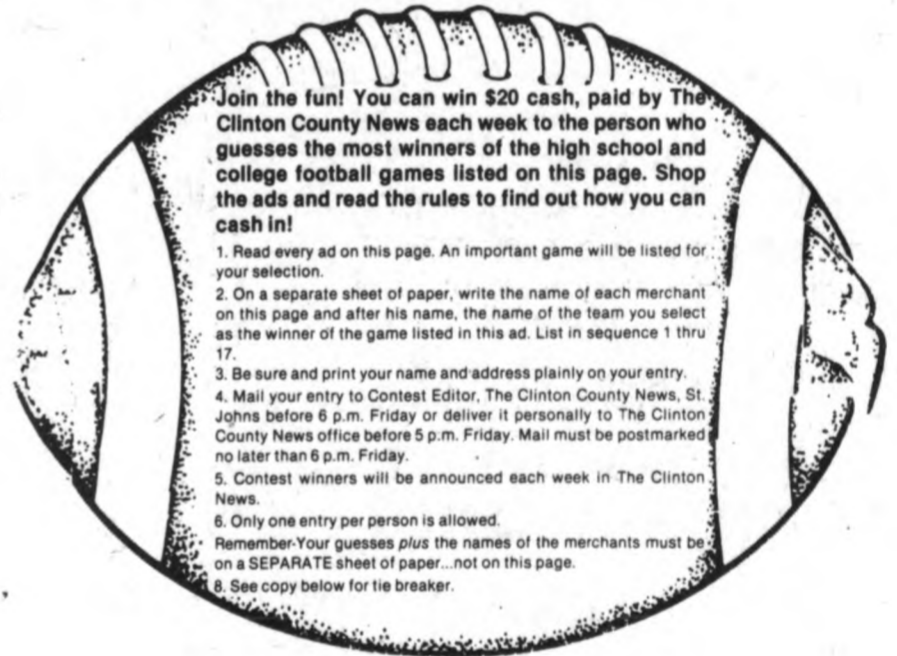

Outdoors Harvest gifts

With November comes a sense of urgency. It's time to gather the last of what needs to be gathered, to bring in or repair the last of what needs to be brought in or repaired. Shorter days and colder nights make all of this abundantly clear.

Outside my window, the last of the leaves are clinging to their limbs, protesting against the wind that would send them winging to a crushed and shriveled fate. But the wind will have its way and the ground below will take them in as nourishment for the lawn, or garden, or for whatever other purpose the end of their flight makes them suitable. Such is the way of all harvesting, really.

We bought fifty pounds of birdseed at Woldumar, and with a kindly farmer's permission, gathered half a bushel of hickory nuts and some walnuts besides. The birds and squirrels of our shared neighborhoods will be helped by these harvest crops. And so will we, when some of the nuts are added to our holiday fudge and cakes.

Jack-o-lanterns have already been cut for pies and wild grapes gathered from almost forgotten places. Jelly of an unmatched flavor will result from those grapes, snatched from the probing fingers of a ruining frost. Harvest, preparation, enjoyment, and using what has been provided by both planned and natural ingredients are the things. Our forefathers understood these things much better than we do.

A LITTLE CLOSER to home there are windows to wash and calking to push in around some of them. And the woodpile needs to be replenished some. Down the street, a neighbor lost an oak to wind this fall. I get half of it for sawing up the tree. Just another kind of harvest.

But the kind I like the best is the harvest in the woods. While seeking out the latest movements of whitetail deer it is a pleasure to find that my sightings often flush a ruffed grouse or startle a rabbit. These creatures offer delectable taste treats to the hunter and his family.

In the area where I frequently hunt deer there are not only abundant numbers of grouse, but both cottontails and snowshoe hares. The former birds are like the little "individual serving" cornish game hens that you buy at the meat market, only smaller. Because grouse fly, their meat is mostly dark however. The rabbits and hares are again like the rabbits found in the meat market, although they are a little less meaty. All of these are rewards for the persistent who brings in the harvest of the woods.

AND IT IS important to note here that just like a farmer harvests his fields, the sportsman needs to harvest the outdoors to avoid waste. Existing conditions in the woods today are the result of management programs that leave a "crop" of grouse, rabbits, deer, nuts, berries and a number of other things in need of being harvested to avoid their waste. It really is a beautiful system because in addition to the tangible benefits are the accompanying advantages of fresh air, exercise and the peace of one's surroundings.

So, now the woods and meadows, like the fields, begin their rest. Next year, with the nourishment of the rains and the fallen leaves and the energy from the warming sun, they will again burst forth with their crops of life.

It is no accident that this is the month of Thanksgiving.

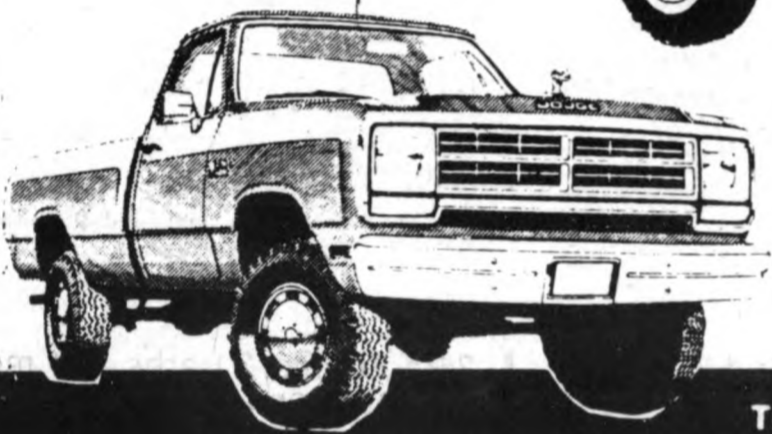

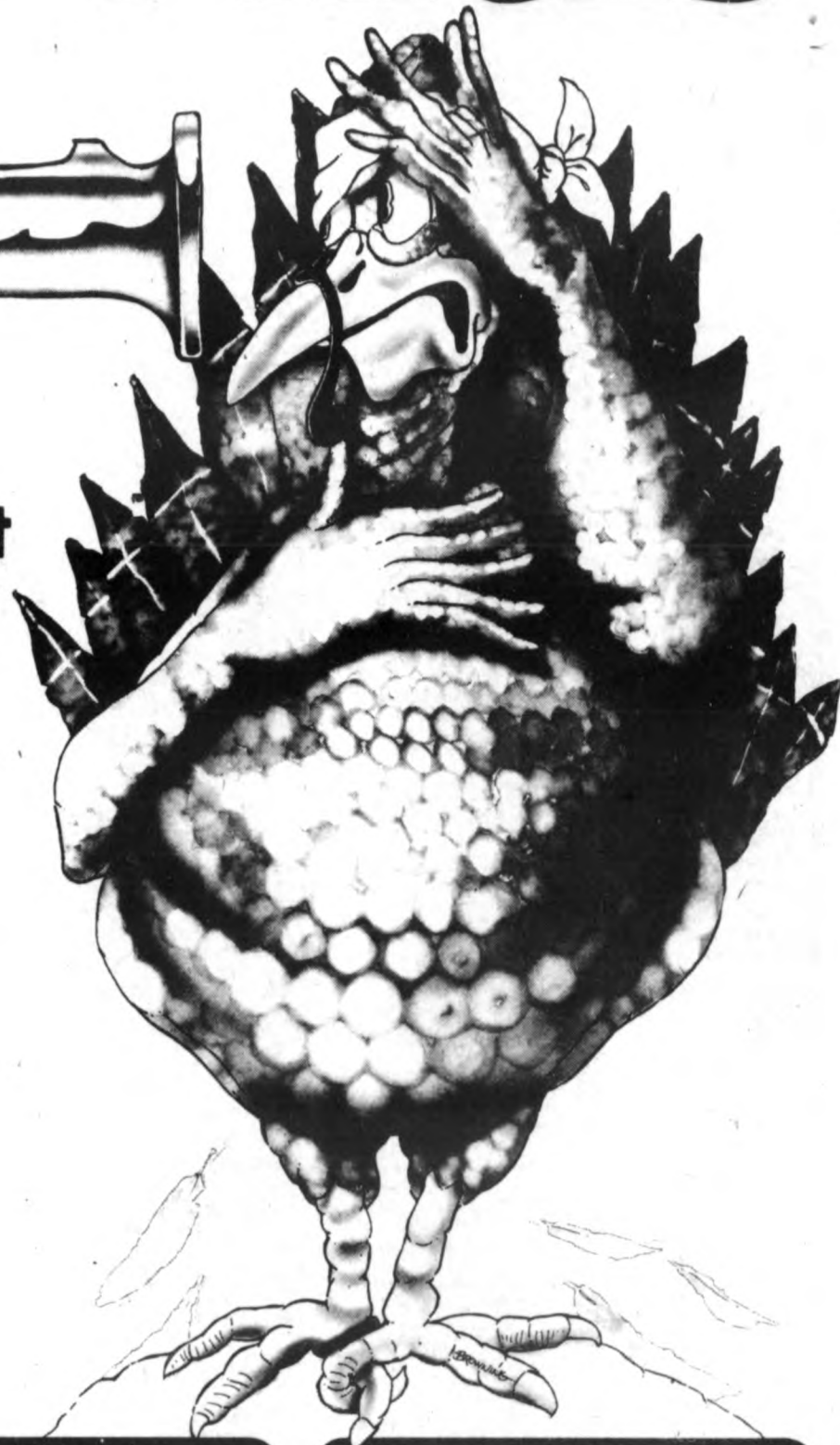
