Lawsuit is dropped from Credit Union

One present and four former employees of the St. Johns Federal Credit Union have reached an out of court settlement with the Credit Union on their lawsuit charging sexual harassment.

Edith Harsh, attorney for the five local women, said a tentative settlement was reached about a month ago, but was not finalized until last Friday.

Harsh would not reveal the amount of the settlement, abiding with one of the terms of the agreement. She said her clients feel "very positive and very happy with the settlement." In June, when the lawsuit was filed in Clinton County Circuit Court, the women were seeking at least \$40,000.

Harsh said the five women, LuAnn Feldpausch, Tammie Witt, Yvonne Makara, Christina Brawner, and Sherri Jopke, are still continuing their lawsuit, however, against former manager of the Credit Union, Roy Ebert, the alleged offender in the sexual harassment suit.

In the original suit, filed June 8, the women accused Ebert of verbal and

physical sexual harassment, including "repeated sexual demands, unconsented touching, and propositions to engage in sex."

The complaint said Ebert created an "intimidating, hostile and offensive employee environment," and subjected the women to "ridicule, public humiliation and embarrassment before co-workers."

Before the out of court settlement, the Credit Union was named in the suit alleging negligence, saying the Board of Directors was notified of the problem but failed to warn or replace Ebert.

Harsh expects to have a pre-trial hearing in circuit court in the Ebert lawsuit either this week or next.

Her original motion to change venue was denied by the court, but may still be possible if an objective jury cannot be found here.

Harsh wants a change of venue because she believes her clients will not be able to receive a fair trial in Clinton County. She cited the fact that Ebert is a former mayor of St. Johns, and that most of the 7,000 members of the Credit Union live in Clinton County.

Increases sap schools' fund balance

The St. Johns Board of Education saw its fund equity balance drop some \$361,694 last week with a number of budget amendments.

Due mainly to increases in salaries to school staff members, the fund equity dropped from \$543,434 to \$181,740.

"That's quite a drop in fund equity," Board member Thomas Irrer exasperated.

But it was nothing the district didn't expect, according to district controller Rick Terres. "We had an idea where we stood. There are a lot of districts around groping for money now," he told the board.

"We have no reason to push the panic button right now," Terres said. "The national average for district spending is \$13.95 per student. St. Johns is spending around \$13.05 per student. St. Johns is doing pretty well."

Those budget amendments may have had a more drastic effect on the fund equity had the district not received nearly \$141,000 in unanticipated revenues.

The district received an additional \$111,330 worth of state aid it had not anticipated, from a partial reimbursement from a previous Executive Order by Governor Blanchard. The district also

saw an increase of \$12,990 in unexpected revenues from the Community Education Program.

Yet some board members were still concerned, like Leonard Puetz, that the district has expenses over income of nearly a half million dollars this year.

That concern seemed to take a back seat to the on-going issue of door-to-door busing, however, that was brought back up to the board's attention later in the meeting.

After a lengthy discussion session between the board and members of the audience on an eight-point program of school transportation rules formulated by a special administrative committee, it was decided that the new system would only confuse the program more by opening up more avenues of interpretation.

That new eight-point system would cost the district some \$20,000 whereas a total door-to-door busing program would carry a price tag near \$30,000.

United Way efforts push funds over top

On Friday, Nov. 11, the Capital Area United Way held a Campaign Achievement Breakfast at the Kellogg Center on the campus of Michigan State University. The goal for the entire Capital Area was \$4,415,945 and the total reported at the meeting was \$4,522,527 — 102.4 per cent.

Douglas Tracy, General Campaign Chairperson reported this to be the first time since 1977 that the United Way drive has met and gone over the goal.

Jim Robinson, Chairperson for the Clinton County United Way, was very pleased to report to the assembled group that the generous people of Clinton County also met their goal of \$50,000, and then went over the top.

To date, \$51,908 has been collected, and there are some pledges still to be turned in. That's 103.8 per cent!

A great many local people gave unselfishly of their time to make this campaign a successful one, according to Robinson, and said thanks to all of those people who contributed to this worthy cause, 49 Capital Area United Way agencies will be receiving the help they so desperately need.

According to Robinson, many individual accounts reported increases over last year. The notable ones were: J.C. Penney's, a 64 per cent increase; St. Johns Schools, 34 per cent; Sealed Power Corp, 28 per cent; Central National Bank, 28 per cent; I.T.T. Hancock, 17 per cent; Federal Mogul, 12 per cent; and Clinton Bank, 6.3 per cent.

The Clinton County Campaign Cabinet consisted of Brandon White, Paul McNamara, Sandra Bisson, Dan Redman, Dale Abraham, Tom Rapson, and Mick Boog.

Arehart is Mayor

John Arehart was appointed Mayor of St. Johns for the seventh consecutive year Tuesday night during an organizational meeting of the City Commission.

Commissioner Richard Starck was appointed to serve as Vice Mayor. Ben Munger and Ray Parr were sworn in as newly elected City Commissioners.

In addition, several citizens were re-appointed to various city bodies: James McKenzie, a three-year term on the Board of Review; Don Britten and Lucille Boak, a three-year term on the Board of Appeals; William Morriss and Thomas Coleman, three-year terms on the Planning Commission along with Bob Barber, a two-year term, who was appointed to fill the seat vacated by Gayle Desprez who resigned; Romaine Berkousen, Terry Cornwell and Kurt Becker, two-year terms on the Parks and Recreation Board; Maurice Witteveen, Dale Aurant, and Barry Dean, two-year terms on the Parking Lot Committee; and Mrs. Sheryll Plowman was appointed to the five-year term on the Library Board.

In other action, the City Commission approved the request by the Chamber of Commerce to move the date of the annual Santa Claus Parade from Nov. 25 to Dec. 2. The one week delay was requested because of scheduling difficulties.

The commission also attained the services of Wonsey's Tree Service for the city's tree removal, trimming and stump removal. The city budgeted \$4,000 for this service. Five hundred dollars will be sav-

ed of this amount for emergencies while the rest will be used to remove approximately 18 trees and stumps and to trim at least 103 more.

And for the first time, the city will allow private property owners in the city to take advantage of the low bid cost of the service for their own trees and stumps.

People wishing to have trees or stumps removed by the service can call the city offices, which will then relay their name to Wonsey's Tree Service. Wonsey's will come to the property and give a quote to the owner for the job.

DeWitt Township Police and the Michigan State Police Fire Marshall are investigating a fire at the

residence of Gary Higbie, at 3485 E. Clark Rd. Monday evening. Arson is suspected in the blaze which caused some \$15,000 in damages.

Township police have a suspect in custody but are withholding information pending the issuance of warrants.

The Clinton County Sheriff's Department handled four personal injury accidents over the past week, 23 property damage accidents and 20 car-deer accidents.

Fowler fans seemed to take the defeat in stride.

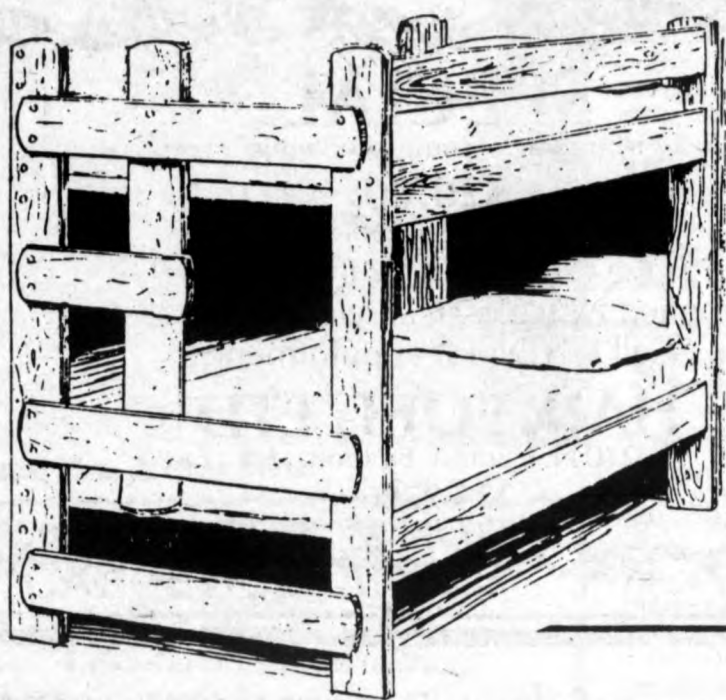

Foiled! Passer shines, but Fowler falters in playoff

When Fowler's running game produced little, Fowler's littlest player had to produce.

Steve Goerge did, but his efforts weren't enough to prevent a 14-13 loss last Saturday to Waterford Our Lady of the Lakes in a Class D state playoff game at Corunna.

Goerge, Fowler's 130-pound quarterback, had spent much of the season handing off to Tom Simon, Dan Simon and Giles Feldpausch. In fact, he had attempted only 35 passes.

But when Waterford's quick defenders sealed off the Eagles running game, Fowler coach Steve Spicer had to resort to something seldom seen in Fowler — the forward pass. Goerge, a former second-stringer on the Fowler junior varsity, responded with the game of his career, completing 11 of 25 passes for 165 yards.

Spicer was concerned that fans would think about the five interceptions thrown by the senior quarterback. Four came in the final seven minutes, when Fowler was desperately trying to move into field goal range.

"He kept us in the football game," said Spicer, mindful of how bad the loss could have been had Goerge not responded. "All the people actually see is the last three or four interceptions."

Spicer wasn't even sure Goerge could play because he had suffered torn ankle ligaments in Fowler's last

regular-season game against Portland. The injury limited his practice time before the Lakes game to two days.

Waterford's secret to victory could be found on defense. The Lakers held Fowler rushers to 72 yards. Tom Simon carried 19 times for 47 yards — his lowest total all season. His previous low was 64 against Portland St. Patrick.

"No one's taken the run away from us like that," Spicer said. "They were just too quick."

"We have a swarming type of defense," said Lakes coach Mike Boyd. "We're like little bees. We're small, but we go after the ball."

Waterford's defense was at its best in the fourth quarter, when the Lakers were clinging to their one-point lead.

On the last play of the third quarter, Fowler moved down to the Waterford 43 when Bob Simon pitched to Tom Simon on a fake punt. The drive ended on the Waterford 29, though, when Buddy Mehl broke up Goerge's fourth-down pass to Dan Hufnagel.

Fowler got the ball back on Waterford's 45, but Giles Feldpausch slipped while running an out pattern and Mehl made an interception.

On Fowler's next possession, after the Eagles defense held the Lakers on downs, Hufnagel caught a pass which Feldpausch deflected to move the ball to the Lakes 41. But Waterford's Chris Johnson intercepted a screen pass intended for Hufnagel on the 39.

The Lakers gave Fowler another chance when they botched a handoff and watched Joe Bertram recover the fumble on the 32. But Mehl intercepted on the 13 with three minutes remaining.

Fowler got one more chance after a Lakers punt, taking over on the Waterford 43 with 1:25 left. A pass to Tom Simon moved the ball to the 35, but Johnson intercepted a fourth-down pass to end the threat.

Another key to Waterford's victory was the punishing running of its fullback, Bob Schuster. He rambled for 130 yards in 33 carries and scored one touchdown on an eight-yard run.

"He's a very good back," Spicer said. "He's got

strong legs. He's very definitely an all-state back."

Waterford's Mehl was also effective on crossing patterns. A 30-yard catch and run in the third quarter set up quarterback Mike Goga's one-yard sneak for a touchdown. Mehl then kicked the decisive extra point.

Fowler scored 28 seconds before halftime on Goerge's 13-yard swing pass to Tom Simon. The senior tailback also scored Fowler's second touchdown, following right tackle Bill Kohagen on a four-yard run in the third quarter. Bob Simon kicked the first extra point but saw his third-quarter attempt blocked.

Tom Simon finished with 1,361 yards in 265 carries for 21 rushing touchdowns this season — school records in each category. Averaging 5.1 yards a carry, he also scored a school-record 138 points.

Giles Feldpausch, Fowler football: Giles, a senior halfback, had a good day running pass patterns last Saturday in a 14-13 Class D football playoff loss to Waterford Our Lady of the Lakes. He caught four passes for 68 yards.

Dan Hufnagel, Fowler football: Dan, a senior end, contributed big plays both ways in the Class D playoff game. As a defensive tackle, he made some big plays to stop Waterford's rushing attack. On offense, he hauled in three passes for 70 yards.

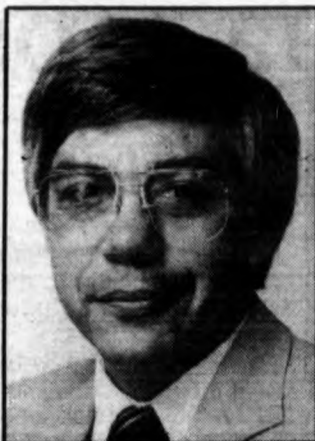

Lakewood joins Circuit

As the saga of conference expansion continues, Capital Circuit league officials seem to have gotten a jump on the Mid-Michigan 'B' Conference.

On Monday, Nov. 7, the Capital Circuit Board of Control voted to take Lakewood into the league for the 1984-1985 season.

That left Mid-Michigan 'B' officials hanging, since they had been hoping to admit Lakewood in a 12-team concept.

The six-school MMB had gotten inquiries from Lansing Waverly, Portland, Durand, Greenville and Lakewood regarding the expansion. The conference had hoped to vote on it on Wednesday, Nov. 9, at a meeting in St. Johns, but those plans were thwarted when Lakewood pulled out.

Instead, the Mid-Michigan 'B' Conference will consider adding two schools at its next meeting Dec. 14. Interested schools will have to apply in writing by Dec. 7.

"We're really right back to square zero — what we were looking at with Lakewood and Greenville," said St. Johns athletic director Steve Bakita, referring to applications for entry made by those schools in August.

Five of the six Capital Circuit schools voted to admit Lakewood. DeWitt abstained, because athletic director

Ron Mead needed DeWitt Board of Education approval before casting his vote. But Mead said he would have voted no.

"I would have asked them (DeWitt board members) to oppose it, because I don't favor a seven-team league," Mead said.

Mead said Circuit officials acted quickly because they were afraid Lakewood would join the Mid-Michigan 'B'. "The league felt we'd better get them before the 'B' did," Mead said.

Lakewood, presently a member of the disbanding Tri-River League, will compete for league championships in seven boys sports and six girls sports next season. The Vikings have boys basketball, golf, cross country, wrestling, track, baseball and tennis teams. In girls sports, Lakewood has basketball, tennis, cross country, volleyball, softball and track.

Lakewood also has football, but the Vikings won't be able to compete in the Capital Circuit until 1985.

Mead said he opposes a seven-team league because it causes scheduling problems. For example, teams in a seven-team league will have to scramble to find a non-league opponent to plug a scheduling hole in the middle of the season.

For DeWitt, playing Lakewood as a league opponent will mean dropping either Pewamo-Westphalia or Ovid-Elsie from its football schedule, Mead said.

"I think it might be good for the rest of the league, but I don't think for us it's very good," Mead said. "I already told them (other Circuit athletic directors) we ought to recruit a school, but they didn't seem very interested."

Besides DeWitt and Lakewood, the Capital Circuit includes Okemos, Mason, Charlotte, Eaton Rapids and Lansing Catholic Central.

DeWitt's girls hope to erase the memory of a 0-9 dual-meet season tonight and tomorrow in the Tri-League Swimming and Diving Invitational at DeWitt.

The Panthers will welcome swim teams from Alma, Corunna, St. Johns, Okemos, Haslett and Mason for the meet, which starts at 7 p.m. tonight with diving.

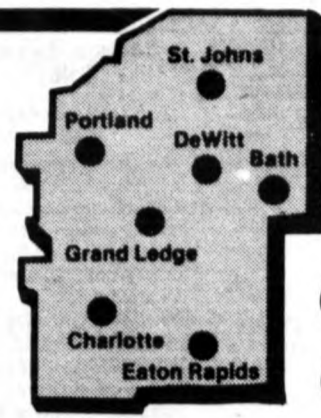

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 26 OF THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF BATH ENTITLED: "AN ORDINANCE TO LICENSE, REGULATE, AND CONTROL OUTDOOR ASSEMBLIES AND GATHERINGS OF LARGE NUMBERS OF PEOPLE IN EXCESS OF THOSE NORMALLY DRAWING UPON THE HEALTH, SANITATION, FIRE, POLICE, TRANSPORTATION, UTILITY, AND OTHER PUBLIC SERVICES REGULARLY PROVIDED IN THIS TOWNSHIP."

BATH CHARTER TOWNSHIP ORDAINS:
 SECTION 1. Section 1a of Ordinance entitled "Definitions" is hereby amended to read as follows:

a) **Outdoor Assembly**, hereinafter referred to as assembly means any event to be attended or attended by more than 500 persons all or any part of which includes theatrical exhibition, public show, display, entertainment, amusement, or other exhibition, including but not limited to musical festivals, concerts, art exhibitions, or similar gatherings, but does not mean: (1) an event which is conducted or sponsored by a governmental unit or agency on publicly owned land or property; or (2) an event held entirely within the confines of a permanently enclosed and covered structure.

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to the laws of the State of Michigan.

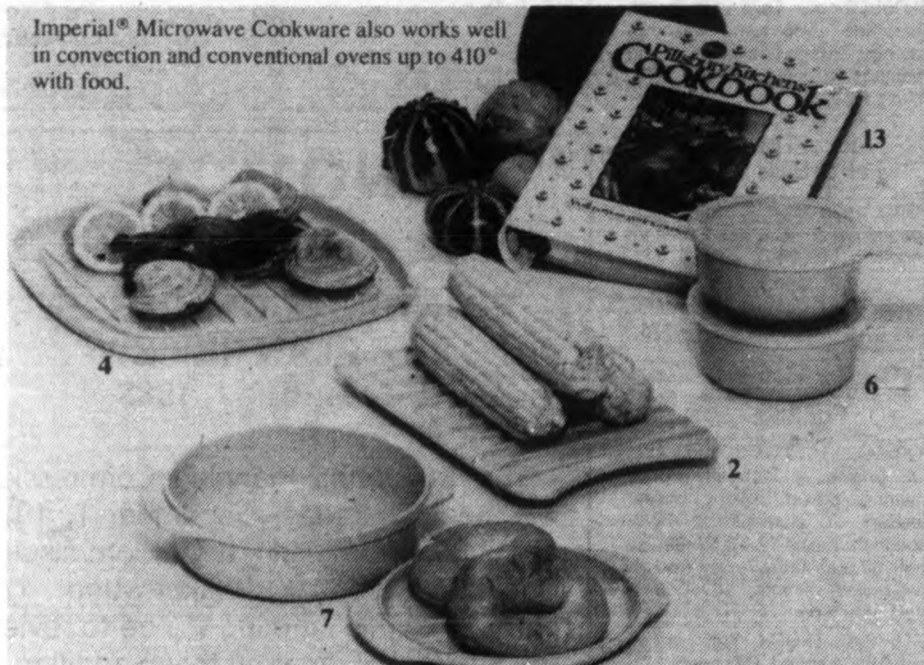
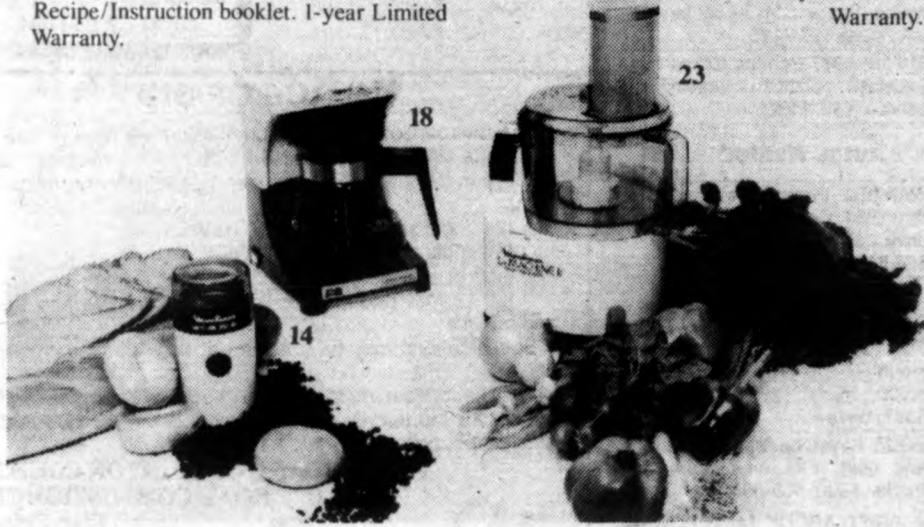
