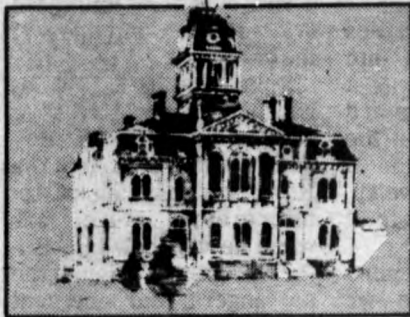

Union is checked into Manor firing

Union officials will be in St. Johns for another week, investigating the termination of an employee at the Hazel I. Findlay Country Manor. Their investigation will precede their filing of unfair labor practices charges against the nursing home to the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB).

The investigation stems from the firing of LPN Joni Hafner on Nov. 3. She claims she was fired because of her participation in the forming of a union at Findlay. The nursing home is saying she was dismissed for unsatisfactory performance of her job.

The union movement had started prior to Hafner's dismissal and had gained momentum a week before her termination when union authorization cards were handed out to the employees.

Hafner was one of many key organizers at the nursing home, and says she does not know why she was singled out.

She was more than surprised when she was told to report directly to the office after punching in that Thursday morning. She was handed an evaluation by the director of nursing with unsatisfactory marks and was told because of these, she was being fired.

Hafner believes the unsatisfactory charges were trumped up and that the real reason she was being fired was for her part in the union organizing.

"I wasn't expecting a pat on the back," she commented on the reaction for her

union activities, "but I wasn't expecting to get terminated either."

"I feel the interest in the union has increased recently," she said, "not just because of my termination, but because they (co-workers) see the need and the reality of a union."

Dick Knapp, regional union organizer for the United Food and Commercial Workers Union, Local 951 feels they have the information necessary to file charges right now, but further investigation needs to be done to substantiate those charges.

Both Knapp and Dave Day, an international representative for the union, are interviewing the employees of the nursing home. Day says it will probably be the end of next week when the investigation will conclude, they then will advise Hafner whether it's feasible to file the charges.

If the charges are filed, they will be looking to reinstate Hafner at the facility and reimburse her for all lost wages and benefits as well as having a cease and desist order placed on the home from interfering with the employee's rights to organize.

"There is a definite need for unions in health care," Day said. "Their wages are generally lower than other industries, it would give them a voice in patient care, allow for continuing education for the nurses, build loyalty through a good wage and benefit program, and improve the overall working conditions."

The UFCW 951 currently has 70,000 members that are in the health care field.

Hafner says she feels a union is necessary at the Country Manor, "so we could have a voice in our own workforce, our wages, hours, and working conditions. But our primary concern is to have input in the running and decision making process at the home."

According to Day, this is not just an internal nursing home problem either.

"A lot depends on community support as well," he said. "The home is supposed to be operated as a publicly-funded home, but they're not willing to give labor a say."

"This is a community home. This is a community problem. And their knowledge of this situation would be good."

Most viewers devastated by showing of 'The Day After'

The day after "The Day After," hundreds of people in Clinton County were striking up conversations.

The ABC-TV movie about the catastrophic effects of nuclear war was a frequent topic of discussion on Monday following its showing on Sunday night.

Many people surveyed by Clinton County News-DeWitt/Bath Review staff said they did not watch the entire movie because they felt it would be too depressing. Those who watched it offered comments on how world leaders need to address the problem.

Almost everyone showed some surprise at the devastation depicted. Land was laid waste and sizzling bodies were shown as a result of the nuclear bomb-hitting Kansas City.

"It was real scary," said Ann Marie Bebow of St. Johns. "Everything just kind of went poof, and it was gone. I was just watching it, seeing what was going on. I thought it was just going to be like another war movie."

"I think the general public as a whole should get together and stress more nuclear disarmament," said Maridell Nelson, a waitress at the Colonial Restaurant in St. Johns. "It gave me the shivers. Detroit's not that far away and we would certainly feel the aftershock

and the fallout."

Some people said they wouldn't care about living if they knew that the missiles were coming.

"I didn't watch all of it," said Kathy McQueen, Bath Township clerk. "I only watched an hour and a half. I got too depressed. All I know is that if it happens I'm running toward the nearest bomb. I'm a chicken."

Here is what other people were saying about the movie:

Betty Peck, customer at the Colonial: "I didn't think it was as bad as they said it would be. I'm glad they showed it. It made you think."

Eunice Tiedt, customer at the Colonial: "Some fool someday will probably do it sometime. It makes you think. It could happen. All it takes is some idiot to push the button."

Larry McDiarmid, customer at the Colonial: "I think it was a necessary movie. I found it to be a little disturbing, but... I really don't feel there will be that many people alive after it hits. They showed a lot more people alive than I thought there would be. If I go by the Bible, I really am not that worried about it because I'm a Christian. I'm going up."

Wayne Searles of St. Johns: "I saw parts of it. It shows what atomic war can

do. I didn't like to watch it too much. I was sitting there watching it with a couple of people I know and then I went out for a walk."

Lori Ballantine of NuVision Optical, St. Johns: "I didn't watch it. I didn't want to get depressed. I didn't feel like I could handle it like I wanted to handle it."

Linda Ritter of NuVision Optical, St. Johns: "I guess that's the way I feel about it, too. We just bought a rabbit and it just died, so I guess we couldn't handle two disasters at once."

Frank Deak, counselor at DeWitt High School: "I don't think it was as scary as people are making it out to be. There's so much violence on television that it kind of blended in: The only thing is, I'm not sure we would survive. The film left the impression that some people could survive."

Liz Schaibly, secretary at Bath High School: "I wasn't as astounded as normal because we've seen a lot of movies that are shocking. It makes you a little more conscious of the nuclear situation. It made you stop and think about doing something about the nuclear warheads. Another thing that frightens you is that these are just people, like you and I, that make the decision."

DeWitt shooting may be accidental

A DeWitt man was shot early Monday morning just down the road from his residence in an apparent hunting incident, but authorities suspect no foul play.

Carl Steffen, 50, of 3113 W. Clark Rd. was shot in the left chest and arm from a blast from a 12-gauge shotgun with buckshot. It occurred between 6 and 6:30 in the morning near 3130 W. Clark Rd.

Steffen is listed in serious condition at Lansing's Sparrow Hospital.

The DeWitt Township Police Department is still attempting to locate the suspect who fled the scene of the shooting. Even though the suspect ran away, officials say it appears to have been an accidental shooting. It remains under investigation.

• Four people were injured in a three-car pile-up Sunday afternoon on U.S. 27 in St. Johns.

St. Johns Police say a car driven by Gregory Argersinger, 16, of 107 N. Ottawa, St. Johns was attempting to turn onto U.S. 27 from Walker Street through a backup of traffic from the intersection at U.S. 27 and 21.

In doing so, he was broadsided by a car driven by Phillip Potter, 61, of Onaway. A car following Potter, driven by Kenneth Steggall, 41, of Shepherd, tried to avoid the accident but was struck by Potter's spinning vehicle.

Injured were Argersinger; his passenger, Matthew Baker, 15, of 206 N. Prospect, St. Johns; Potter and his wife, Doris, 58.

Badge Beat

Steggall and two passengers in his car were not injured.

Argersinger was ticketed for failure to yield the right of way.

• The Michigan State Police Fire Marshall and two private insurance companies are investigating a Friday night fire which destroyed a storage building and its contents at the Assad Co. on the corner of M-21 and DeWitt Road.

The contents, some 500

bales of hay, were owned by local dairy farmer Bob Graham. It is the third fire since June which involved property owned by Graham.

The first fire, back in June, was at one of Graham's barns, the second was at his workshop over month ago. St. Johns Fire Chief Clare Maier has heard the total of all three fires could reach \$400,000 in damages.

• The Clinton County

Sheriff's Department is investigating the larceny of the home of Virgil Adams of DeWitt last week.

Adams told authorities someone had broken into his home while he was a work. Entry was gained through a side door of the residence. Stolen was a stereo system, jewelry, and \$400 in cash. The total losses were \$3,279.

• The sheriff's department is investigating two other break-ins last week. Donald Hyler of St. Johns and his wife had been hunting at Sleepy Hollow State Park last Wednesday and while they were away from their vehicle, it was broken

into and a 20-gauge shotgun was stolen. The value of the gun was \$160. There was an estimated \$75 worth of damages to the van.

Donald Malkin of Laingsburg reported a similar crime the day before. While parked in the Royal Scott parking lot, someone broke into his car while he was bowling. Entry was gained through the passenger's rear side vent window. Stolen was a 16-gauge Remington shotgun valued at \$150.

• The sheriff's department also handled two personal injury accidents and 15 car-deer accidents.

County swimmers splash in DeWitt



St. Johns swim coach Jim Makarauskas didn't expect to catch Okemos in the Tri-League Swimming and Diving Championships last Friday at DeWitt.

But he thought his Redwings might have been able to creep closer to Okemos. The Chieftains wound up winning by 92 points.

"It was not a great meet for us," Makarauskas said. "But it was a great season."

The brightest spot for St. Johns was diving. Chris Warren won the event and Shawn Keisel finished second. Beth Coger was fourth, just four points behind an Okemos diver.

All three Redwings qualified for the Class A regional diving meet next Tuesday at Grand Rapids East Kentwood. Placing in the top 12 there would qualify a diver for the state meet.

Kris Rapelje and Diane Stratton led the Redwings at DeWitt by placing in three events apiece.

Rapelje finished third in the 100-yard breaststroke and fourth in the 200 individual medley. She also swam a leg on the freestyle relay team which finished second.

Chris Rapelje of St. Johns bobbed to a fourth-place finish in the 200-yard individual medley.

Stratton was also on the freestyle relay team and finished second in the 100 freestyle and fourth in the 50 freestyle.

St. Johns finished its dual-meet season at 6-3.

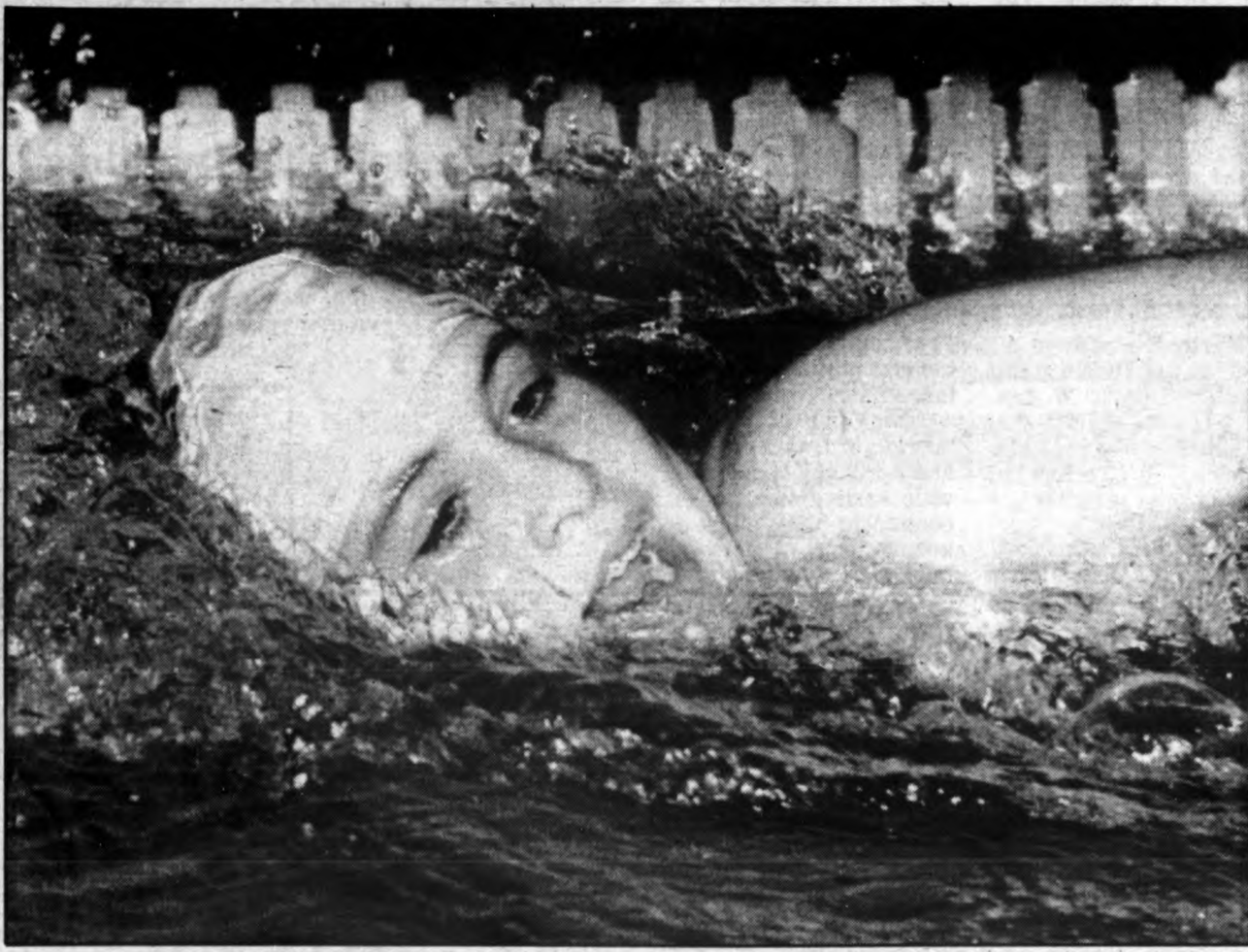
DeWitt: The Panthers finished sixth in the seven-team meet with 100.5 points. However, a disqualification in the medley relay cost the team a second-place finish, which would have moved DeWitt up to fourth in the team standings.

Ten out of 20 DeWitt performances were personal bests. "We swam well, but we were just inexperienced," said coach Mike Keevan.


Kelly Smith won the 100 freestyle in 59.8 and finished third in the 50 freestyle in a personal-best 27.21. She also had a personal-best time on her butterfly leg of the medley relay.

The youthful Panthers find themselves in an unusual position this season. This is the first time in eight seasons that DeWitt has not qualified anyone for the state Class B meet.

"The times have gotten so much faster in Class B," Keevan said. "For us to make it in, we'd have to be fast. Our league is down — as slow as it's been in the last three years. I think we're still a couple of years away from going to the state meet and being a factor again."

Bridesmaids were Shelly Zimmer, Violet Youness and Karolyn Uribe. Petal throwers were Erica Haas and Amanda Badgett.

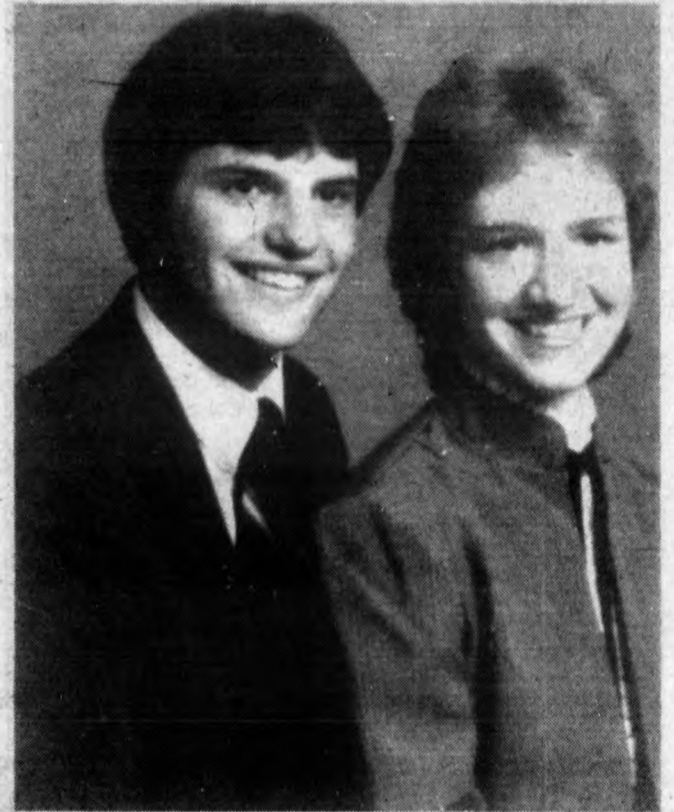

The 1983 All-County offensive team

Statistics don't always tell the story about exceptional athletes. Performance in practice and a hard-working attitude is often what makes them stand out.

Look at the example of St. Johns junior quarterback Brian Bates. He completed 31 of 72 passes for 442 yards and five touchdowns. He ran for 176 yards and one touchdown.

But the thing that impressed coach Joe Gonzales was his hard-working attitude. Based on skills and experience, Bates started off as the No. 2 quarterback. He stepped in for the first game when the starter suffered an injury.

"He's one of the most conscientious off-season people I've ever had," Gonzales said. "He's been working since January."

St. Johns running back Chad Munger joins Bates in the all-county backfield. Operating as either a fullback or tailback, Munger rambled for 637 yards and eight touchdowns. A team captain, he was also voted team Most Valuable Player.

"He's probably the best power back I've had," Gonzales said. "When he was

really running well, people didn't want to tackle him."

Fowler tailback Tom Simon had the most spectacular statistics of any Clinton County player this season. He racked up 1,361 yards and 21 touchdowns rushing. Voted Fowler's Most Valuable Player, he scored a school-record 138 points.

"He's a very good cutback runner," said Fowler coach Steve Spicer. "It's almost as if he feels the man."

Bath's Rick Ramsayer gained over 600 yards despite facing defenses who keyed on him every week.

"He was our mainstay," said Bath coach Bob Popp. "He's almost a straight A student — very intelligent and polite — and he has that mean streak of trying to run over people. The kid's as strong as a bull — he should be an all-state wrestler. He's like a (John) Riggins-type of runner."

When DeWitt needed a big play, wide receiver Joe Wheeldon usually provided it. He caught 10 passes for 270 yards and scored seven touchdowns. He was also DeWitt's leading tackler, a standout on special teams and the team Most

Valuable Player.

"He's one of the quickest kids in the league," said DeWitt coach Gail Thornton. "He likes to play the game. We had him on everything."

The other all-county receiver, Marty Martens of St. Johns, impressed observers with his downfield blocking. The 6-foot-4 junior also caught 11 passes for 146 yards.

"He'll be one of the best ends we've had here if he continues to improve the way he has," Gonzales said. "He's college potential with his size and ability. Our goal is to have him 6-4 and 205 pounds for next year."

On the line, tackle Bill Kohagen was a major reason why Fowler won all nine of its regular-season games. Simon ran for several of his touchdowns through Kohagen's right tackle area.

"He was our most consistent blocker all season," Spicer said. "He's quick and he's strong. He seemed to read the defense well."

St. Johns tackle Pat Schneider teamed with Martens clear the way for the Redwing running backs this season. His best

blocking, according to Gonzales, was done straight ahead.

"He'd get out on you quick and stay on you and drive, drive, drive," Gonzales said.

Pewamo-Westphalia guard Jim Pohl earned an honor seldom given to linemen when teammates voted him co-Most Valuable Player with running back Tom Schafer. Coach Mike Folk credited Pohl for his leadership.

"He's probably our best blocker, technique wise," Folk said. "He was a two-way player and was an excellent defensive end for us, too."

Kevin Aylsworth of St. Johns, a 3.9 student, mans the other guard spot. His quick blocks helped spark St. Johns' power rushing attack.

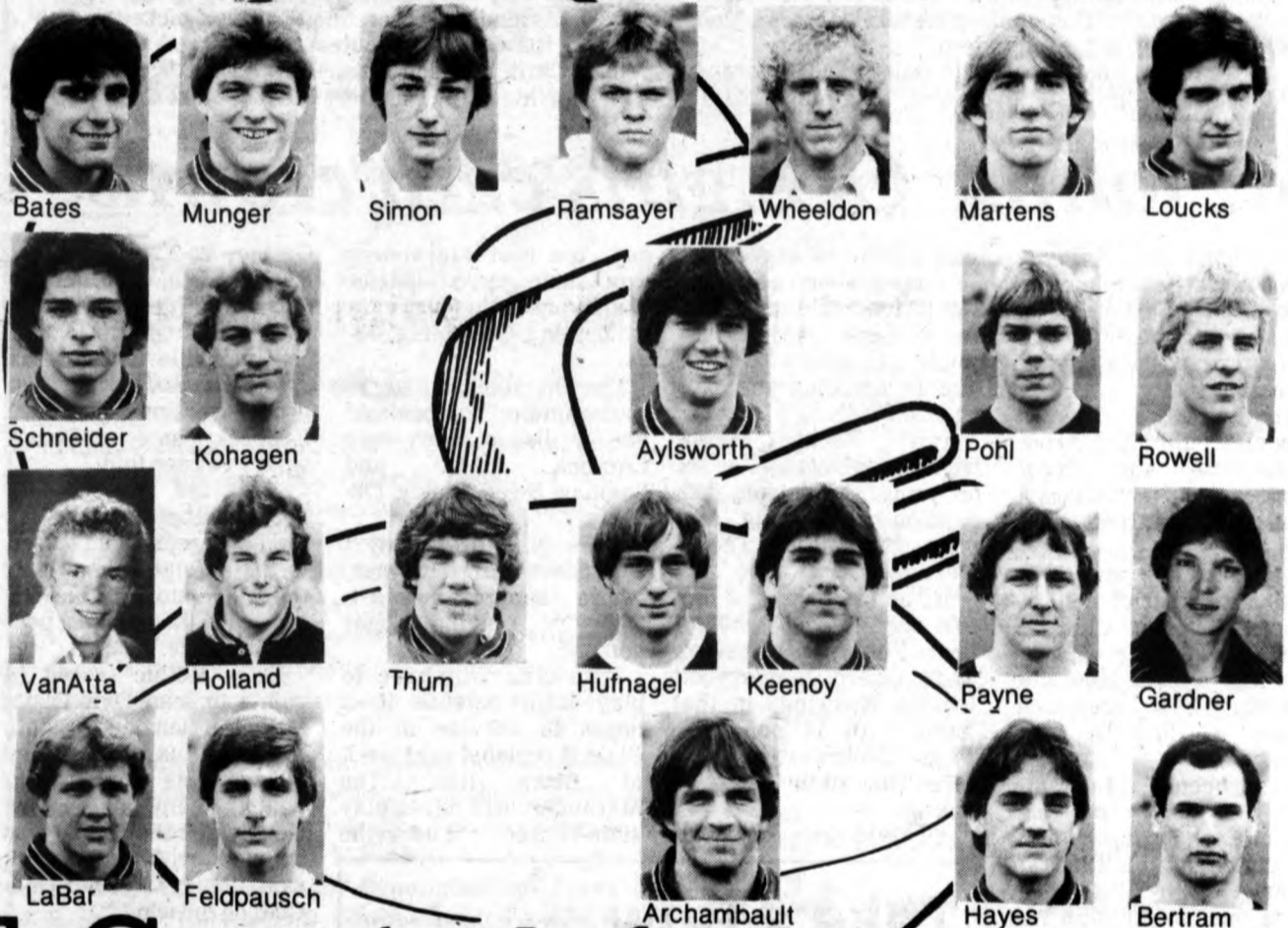
"He's a tremendous trap blocker," Gonzales said. "Also, he can get out and get a linebacker."

Center Scott Rowell of Fowler was a two-year starter for the Eagles.

"He works awful hard at center," Spicer said. "He comes off the ball real quick and he's able to get the nose man."

Coach of the Year

Our selection for Clinton County Coach of the Year should come as no surprise.

Steve Spicer, coach of the perennially successful Fowler Eagles, earned the award for guiding his team into the Class D state playoffs.

The 1983 All-County defensive team

Any solid defense begins with the nose guard, and Ovid-Elsie's Kevin VanAtta was one of the best. He was second on his team with 81 tackles and tied for team leadership in sacks with 13.

"He was our captain," said O-E coach Russ Pope. "He played the whole season — I don't think he got out more than 10 plays. When we needed a loss on third and short, he went after it. He didn't sit back and let them take it to him."

A pair of 235-pounders anchor the defensive tackle spots. DeWitt's Steve Holland was the second leading tackler on his team with 69 and was voted Most Valuable Lineman for the Panthers.

"Teams got so they were running away from him a lot the second half of the season," said DeWitt coach Gail Thornton. "He's a very smart kid. You tell him what his responsibility is and he does it the first time you tell him."

Thum, a three-year starter for St. Johns, was in on 63 tackles for the Redwings. He was noted for his quickness.

"On the snap of the ball, he was consistently the first one off," said St. Johns coach Joe Gonzales.

Fowler's Dan Hufnagel, who made 65 tackles, was the main force in the Eagle defensive line. His presence at 6-1, 195 pounds was a major reason why teams could score an average of only 5.3 points against the Eagles.

"Danny's not a holler-type of guy," said Fowler coach Steve Spicer. "He's a leader by example. He makes the big play every once in awhile."

John Keenoy, at 6-5, 220 pounds, has attracted attention from college scouts though he is only a junior. At defensive end, he made 67 tackles and had three sacks.

"Depending on what he does between now and the next football season, he has definite unlimited college potential," Gonzales said. "He's very athletic for his size. He's able to take people straight on and they don't move him."

Inside linebacker Bill Payne was a pain to enemy ballcarriers all season. The junior led Fowler in tackles with 81.

"He reacts awful quick," Spicer said. "He seems to have a natural read."

Scott Gardner provided the same consistency for Ovid-Elsie, leading the Marauders with 110 tackles. He also broke through for six sacks.

"He was like a fireball," Pope said. "He'd go hellbent to get the ballcarrier."

In the secondary, cornerback Rick LaBar of St. Johns was one of those guys that often goes unnoticed. He intercepted only three passes, knocked down two and caused two fumbles. But his 55 total tackles show that he knew how to play the run.

"He will come up and hit," Gonzales said.

Fowler cornerback Giles Feldpausch was one of his team's most versatile backs. He finished with three interceptions.

"He's as tough as any 150-pound kid I know," Spicer said. "He takes on the run real well. He simply tackles low. And he plays the run and the pass. He gets himself back and is able to read the people coming across the

field."

St. Johns monsterback John Archambault battled knee, shoulder and hand injuries all season. But he still finished with 52 tackles.

"He was a Brian Bates type," said Gonzales, referring to St. Johns' hard-working quarterback. "He never missed weight lifting, never missed a film session. When he was healthy, no one can hit like 'chambo.'"

St. Johns free safety Jeff Hayes had a season all defensive backs dream about. He finished with a school-record 10 interceptions. He also set school marks for knocked down passes (13) and touchdown-saving tackles (9).

"He's one of the top three safeties we've had, if not the best, and we've had a lot of all-league safeties here," Gonzales said. "He had good balance and an excellent nose for the ball."

St. Johns also had the all-county kicker in Chris Loucks. On 22 kickoffs when he was kicking deep, Loucks averaged 54.2 yards. He boomed eight kicks into the end zone and three out of the end zone.

"He worked at it every day in practice," Gonzales said. "HE wanted to be a kicker."

Fowler's Joe Bertram averaged 38.6 yards per punt during the regular season. More importantly, he came up with two big punts in crucial situations — a 66-yarder against Portland St. Patrick and a 61-yarder against Pewamo-Westphalia.

"When things were tough, he boomed 'em out of there," Spicer said.

P-W girls pulverize Bath district foes

Crash, boom, bang. Those are the sounds of three girls basketball teams getting flattened by Pewamo-Westphalia in Class C district tournament action at Bath. These are the numbers — 63-19, 70-41 and 70-38. Goodbye, Bath. Goodbye, Williamston. Goodbye Lansing Catholic Central. Say hello to Pewamo-Westphalia's third straight district championship. DeWitt had been looking to challenge the Pirates in the district final, but coach Frank Deak almost sounded content after his team's 53-50 loss to Lansing Catholic Central. "In many ways, we probably lucked out," Deak said. "I think they (the Pirates) would have blown us out. They're state-championship material. They have a better team than I had when we went to the state semifinals." Folks around P-W are starting to talk about a state championship for their girls, who are now 22-1. Next in

line is a regional tournament at Fulton, where the Pirates will meet either Fulton or Carson City-Crystal next Thursday. If the Pirates get past that game, Sanford-Meridian is a likely opponent in the regional final. Sanford-Meridian entered district play at Farwell last week ranked No. 10 in the state with an 18-1 record and was slated to play Shepherd on Tuesday for the district title. P-W coach Carol Bogard, whose team is ranked No. 6, was talking about everything but a state championship after the rout of Lansing Catholic Central on Monday. "Some people are talking state championship," she said. "That's the last thing on our minds. Every game is going to be tougher." P-W dominated district foes with a deadly halfcourt trap defense. With three players each standing 5-foot-10 strung out near the front of a 1-3-1 alignment, the Pirates were able to force numerous turnovers. The trap worked to near perfection against Williamston, which entered district play with a 13-6

record. The smaller Hornets could not get past midcourt to set up their offense and found themselves trailing, 26-3, after one quarter. "We've seen them play three times but we had no idea they were as quick as they were for their size," said coach Keith Eldred. "Their press was devastating." Guard Jackie Bauer continued her hot hand in the late season as she led the Pirates in scoring throughout the district. The 5-10 senior scored 20 points against Bath, 17 against Williamston and 20 against Lansing Catholic Central. In P-W's last seven games, Bauer has been the team's leading scorer or tied for the scoring lead. Michelle Wieber contributed 18 points and Patty Theis had 15 against Lansing Catholic Central. Wieber also grabbed 12 rebounds and Theis had eight rebounds, six assists and four steals. Lynda Rademacher, who frequently led the team in scoring early in the season, had 14 points against Bath and 13 against Williamston.

Panthers, Bees bow out quickly

Neither Bath nor DeWitt could win a game in the Class C girls basketball district at Bath last week. Bath was routed by eventual district champion Pewamo-Westphalia last Thursday, 63-19, and DeWitt fell unexpectedly to Lansing Catholic Central, 53-50, last Saturday. Bath grabbed a 2-0 lead against P-W when Kristina Pentilla sank a field goal. But the Pirates scored 17 of the next 19 points to smother the Bees. Bath scored only seven points in the second half, sinking two of 24 shots from the field against the towering Pirates. "We've got to get over intimidation," said coach Tom Campbell, whose team finished 5-15 this season. "When somebody starts putting a little pressure on us, we kind of fold. That's our biggest problem." Guard Wendy Foote scored 10 points and recorded eight steals. "She just never quit," Campbell said.

"She's such a competitor." DeWitt's loss came as a bit of a surprise, since the Panthers had posted one- and 14-point victories over Lansing Catholic Central earlier this season. DeWitt got into foul trouble early and could never recover. "We've had better jobs," said coach Frank Deak, referring to the officiating. "A lot of phantom calls. We had a lot of over-the-back fouls that weren't over the back. I looked at the film and it was just ridiculous. "Our top three scorers spent a great deal of time on the bench. That made quite a difference. They called a game that was extremely close that hadn't been called all year. My girls were looking around and saying, 'Where do they call fouls like that?'" DeWitt's leading scorer, Sheila Milner, picked up four fouls in the first 10 minutes and finished with eight points. Chris Pearson finished as DeWitt's top scorer with 12 points as the Panthers ended their season at 11-8.

Fowler fouls curb bid to upset No. 4 Ashley

Fowler finished its girls basketball season on Monday by losing for the third time to undefeated and No. 4-ranked Ashley in a Class D district game. Similar to the teams' second meeting (a 50-44 Ashley win), Ashley had to battle for a 47-38 victory on Monday. Fowler trailed by only four points with 1:30 left, but hope was lost when scoring leader Peg Thelen fouled out with 20 points and nine rebounds. "It was real possible to knock them off," said Fowler coach Denny Smith, whose team finished at 11-10 as Ashley moved to 22-0. "The coach knew it. He figured it would be the toughest game until they got to the quarterfinals."

St. Johns, O-E girls earn crowns

St. Johns won its first Class A district championship in girls basketball on Tuesday night with a 46-29 win over Flushing at Owosso. The Redwings, 17-3, will now play either Ann Arbor Huron or Ann Arbor Pioneer in a 6 p.m. Class A regional opener next Tuesday at Howell. St. Johns had won three previous district championships as a Class B school. But since winning the last one in 1979, the Redwings have taken their lumps in Class A tournaments. "It's been a total team thing on the floor," said Coach Beth Swears, joyfully clutching the Class A district trophy. "It hasn't been one player who has dominated this year." Indeed, though center Brenda Eiseler led St. Johns in scoring with 16 points, forward Pam Sehlike may have been the

team's steadiest player. Sehlike grabbed a season-high 17 rebounds, had three assists and scored 10 points. She also was effective in handling the ball against Flushing's press. Amy Hartsuff contributed eight points — six on jump shots from her position on the wing. And point guard Lisa Thelen had five assists. St. Johns passed a big test on Saturday when it beat Flint Southwestern, 53-47. Guard Janine Scott led the Redwings in that game with 14 points as Flint Southwestern suffered its sixth loss this season. At Ovid-Elsie on Tues-

day, the host Marauders won their third district championship in four years by beating Chesaning, 58-33. The championship-game rout came on the heels of earlier district wins over Corunna (52-35) and Saginaw Swan Valley (78-36). "The girls are ready," said coach Mary Hudecek, whose team is now 1-4. "They're playing super defense." Ovid-Elsie will have to play solid defense if it hopes to survive in the Class B regional next week at Birch Run. The Marauders will either play state-ranked Essexville

Garber, 20-2, or Saginaw Buena Vista, 16-6, in an opener on Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. "Essexville Garber has a 6-foot-4 center and two good shooting guards," Hudecek said. "That's what I've been told. "We are always up against people a lot taller than we are, so we're used to that. Height alone isn't the whole story in basketball, even though most people think it is." Kelly McCue scored 18 points to lead Ovid-Elsie. Mary Perrien had 10 points and nine assists. "Mary always gets double-team against them, and it was Kelly's girl that Mary was doubled with," Hudecek said. "Mary finds her (McCue) on the wing." Paula Coleman contributed 12 points and 11 rebounds.

St. Johns High School Opened 25 Years Ago

This was the headline dated Jan. 5, 1950.

Twenty-five years ago, Jan. 19, 1925, the new Rodney B. Wilson High School in St. Johns was occupied for the first time. Classes began on that date, at the start of the second semester, though the building was not formally accepted at that time.

A formal dedication of the new high school building was held on Friday, April 17, 1925.

Mrs. Cerelda Hicks, secretary to the superintendent, is the only individual connected with the high school today that was also on the staff at that time.

The students moved into the new building from what is now Central Elementary School. There were 316 students in the four high school grades 25 years ago compared with 511 today.

Twenty-five years ago, Superintendent Frank Buck and Principal H.D. Corbus headed a staff of 14 high school instructors. There are now 27 teachers at St. Johns High School in addition to Superintendent J. Ivan Niergarth and Principal Bennie Pocus.

Portiuncula In The Pines

In the valley of Mount Subasio near Assisi, Italy, there stands a small chapel, known as St. Mary of

the Angels. It was built in the 12th Century on a little portion of ground without trees, called the Portiuncula, and was the favorite chapel of St. Francis of Assisi, founder of the Franciscan Order.

On 45 rolling, beautiful wooded acres just east of DeWitt, the sons of St. Francis have built a retreat house, called Portiuncula in the Pines. It was built in 1955 with the hope that in the words of St. Francis, "Here whoever prays will obtain what he asks; his heart will be inflamed by the fire of divine love, his soul enlightened by the light of heavenly wisdom."

Governed by the Lansing Diocese, the retreat is staffed by four priests and four friars, Father Julian Fuzer is the superior and retreat director, and Father Maximus Mandi is retreat master.

There are facilities for 41 retreatants. About 1,500 Catholic men and women attend the retreats each year.

The retreat house consists of the Chapel of Our Lady Queen of the Angels, sleeping rooms, dining room, kitchen, and recreation room. It is built of brick, modern, plain and functional. The rooms are furnished simply but comfortably.

The kitchen, presided over by Dr. Benignus Balogh, contains the latest stainless steel equipment, and can testify to the excellence of the food which comes from it.

The chapel is beautifully appointed in a modernistic motif, and impresses one with a feeling of reverence.

The friary, in which the staff is housed, is separate from the retreat house but similar in architecture. It was dedicated only last September.

The weekend retreats begin on Friday afternoon and are dismissed on Sunday afternoon. During that time, the emphasis is on prayer and meditation, and conversation is kept to the absolute minimum.

There is no fixed charge for the retreat. A donation of \$15, which will cover all expenses, is suggested. But anyone wishing to make a retreat is welcome to do so, no matter what offering can be made.

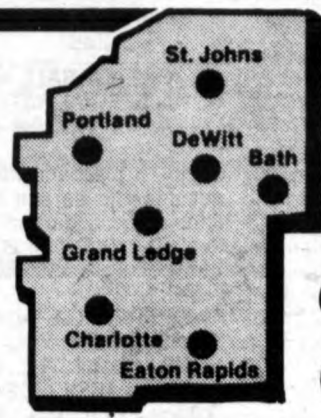
