Council approves an access channel

The city of St. Johns will have a local access channel on its local cable television service soon. The city council approved at Tuesday night's meeting the purchase of the necessary equipment, a video cassette player and recorder and a television monitor, to facilitate the service which will provide locally originated television programming.

The total cost of both pieces of equipment is \$1,550 that will come from set franchise fees from the cable service. Clinton Memorial Hospital is currently proceeding with plans to serve as an access point for interested parties in broadcasting taped programs on public access Channel 2.

The St. Johns Public Schools will be contacted to see if they are interested and recognize a need to have an origination point at the high school. City Manager Randy Humphrey said, if it does, Cable Vision's offer to extend the wire to the school will cost \$2,832 with payments being deducted from future franchise fees.

Clinton Memorial Hospital secured three bids for the purchase of the equipment, the low bidder being Cruse Communications Company of East Lansing. The equipment carries a 90-day parts and labor warranty. The hospital will assume the responsibilities or repair and maintenance.

The city council also approved a site plan proposed by the Sealed Power Corporation Tuesday night. The plan calls for a 66-by-80-foot addition to the rear of the existing plant for basic warehousing purposes.

In other action, the city council advised the city attorney to pursue legal action against Mrs. Geraldine Costanzo for continued violation of the city's zoning ordinances.

Over the past several years, the city has had an ongoing battle with Mrs. Costanzo concerning the use of her property at 604 Lambert Dr. as a multi-

family dwelling.

City Assessor Diane Edwards reported that Mrs. Costanzo will correct the problem for a few months, but then turns around and rent the rooms out again, starting the complaints from neighbors and the notification process from her office again.

Edwards said just recently, the city has been notified that the house has been being used as a boarding-type house for a various number of people in violation with that area's zoning ordinances.

The city also moved to establish an interest bearing checking account on the recommendation of the city's auditors. This type of an account will pick up additional interest on collected funds in the clearing account before the accounts payable checks are returned back through the account. The local checks clear in one to two days, while the outside checks clear on the average of three to five days.

The city will set up a City Super Now Account with Clinton Bank and Trust and Central National Bank on a yearly rotating basis. It will replace the current accounts the city carries with the two banks, which are not interest bearing.

The council approved the action unanimously with Councilman Raymond Parr abstaining due to his affiliation on the board of directors of one of the banks involved.

The council also approved the sale by the Old Newsboys with their tongue-in-cheek newspaper in the St. Johns area this year.

The sale of the paper will raise money to purchase shoes, boots and socks for needy children in the St. Johns area. The charity has been a tradition in the Lansing area for 60 years.

The Old Newsboys will hit the streets of St. Johns Friday, Dec. 16. They hope to raise \$60,000 in the Lansing area this year. The paper sells for whatever money people can spare.

Fulton teachers may get a breakthrough

After working near one-half year of the new school year without a contract, Fulton teachers say they are looking forward to the first potential breakthrough in the present impasse situation.

Kathy Parker, president of the Fulton Education Association, said that the district's financial report, which is one of the keys to an agreement, has finally been received. This material had been expected earlier but was delayed when Superintendent Ned Curtis requested an extension. "In addition," Parker added, "potential fact finders have been proposed to hear the arguments from both sides."

"Despite everything that has been reported to date, the financial situation is not the only problem barring a settlement," Parker said. "It's unfortunate that Mr. Curtis has put the roadblock of a threatened financial freeze across the path, thus preventing a contract settlement."

"We have not reached an agreement on anything because Mr. Curtis has insisted we must accept a freeze before we can even discuss any other item in our contract," Parker commented. "Consequently, such things as class size, layoff and recall procedures, and working conditions have never been discussed, and all of them must be resolved if we are to reach an equitable agreement."

Parker added that a contributing factor in delaying the contract settlement was that only 14 hours of negotiations were held last summer before the board declared an impasse.

Parker said she was hopeful that the fact-finder would be able to point out an area for settlement. But she said teachers would continue their present actions, such as refusing to participate in non-contractual activities.

"After all," she said. "Mr. Curtis and the board of education should realize that Fulton teachers normally work under the terms of a negotiated contract. At present they are working without a contract which we suggest is not a normal situation."

Brown running for sheriff

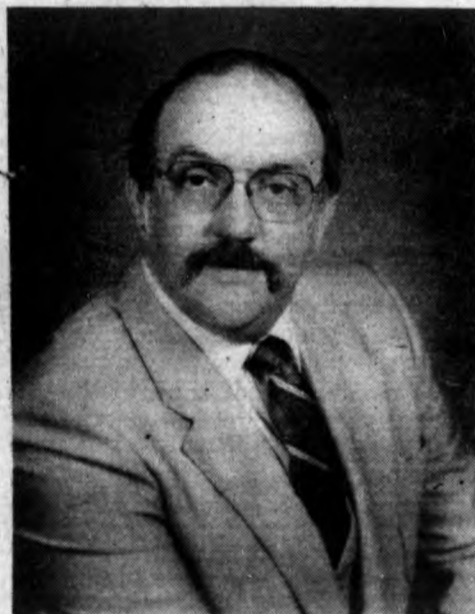
Erbas Royce Brown, 43, a life-long resident of Clinton County, is announcing his candidacy for the office of Clinton County Sheriff. Brown and his wife, Joyce, reside in DeWitt with their two children, Whitney, 15, and Aaron, 13.

State Police in 1982. He and his family are members of the Pilgrim United Methodist Church in St. Johns, where he has been very active working with the youth in Caravan and served as president of the Methodist Mens' Group. He traveled to Haiti on a work mission rebuilding a

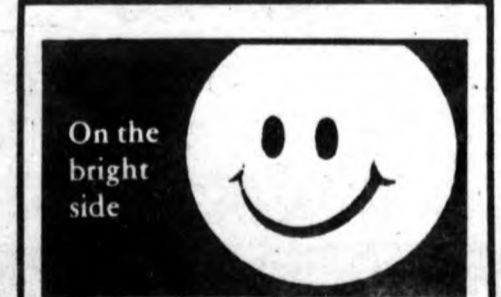
church and minister's home. He enjoys working with people and helping wherever he is needed. Brown believes he is very civic minded and prides himself in taking part in activities within the community.

Brown says he realizes the sheriff's race was close in 1980 and with the tremendous support the public is giving him, there is a definite need for a change in the office of Clinton County Sheriff. Township looks into armed robbery

The DeWitt Township Police Department is investigating the armed robbery of a pizza delivery car last weekend.

Authorities say a lone black man jumped into a Domino's Pizza delivery car in Lansing Friday night around 6 p.m. and ordered the driver to take

him to DeWitt Township.

The suspect, wearing bright red pants, a green army coat and a dark ski mask produced a knife while making his demands. He obtained a small amount of money from the driver and fled on foot.

The driver was slightly

injured when he was struck on the forehead by unknown means. He was treated and released from a local hospital. The suspect remains at large and the incident is still under investigation.

The City of DeWitt handled six traffic accidents over the past week, one of them involving a personal injury.

Paul Alan Hunnicutt, 17, of 12220 Wood Rd., DeWitt struck a utility pole last Wednesday afternoon as he rounded a curve on East Main Street in DeWitt. He told authorities he hit a patch of ice and slid into the pole head-on. He received cuts and bruises and was treated at the Police Department.

They also had one drunk

driving arrest; two larcenies of Christmas tree lights; two malicious destruction of property involving mailboxes; and four snowmobile complaints. The department handled a total of 34 complaints.

The Clinton County Sheriff's Department were busy with several incidents of malicious destruction of property.

Mailboxes were the targets of vandals last Sunday on East Townsend Road in Bingham Township. A suspected vehicle was seen in the area, but no suspects have been contacted. A total damage estimate to those mailboxes and several others has been set at \$50.

U.S. 27 reported damage to a wooden fence done by a vehicle around 6:30 p.m. last Tuesday. Estimated damage to the fence was over \$500. Authorities say the vehicle involved should have a lot of damage to the right side of it.

On Sunday, Pewamo-Westphalia High School was vandalized as a car drove through the school yard and several beer bottles were thrown through four windows measuring 3 by 4 feet.

The Westphalia Hardware Store reported the theft of 17 Christmas trees during the same weekend. No suspects or value has been listed for the trees.

reported that someone had stolen a half face cord of wood from outside his storage area. Officials have no suspects in that case.

And Donald Niswonger of DeWitt reported several items were stolen from a house under construction. All the items missing were construction materials and no value has been listed. Niswonger was insured for the property stolen.

Sheriff's deputies handled 13 property damage accidents and three personal injury accidents where the injured sought their own treatment. Twelve people were booked into the county jail on drunk driving charges.

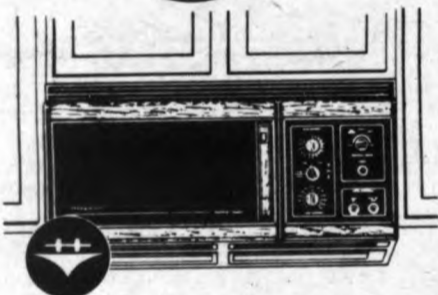

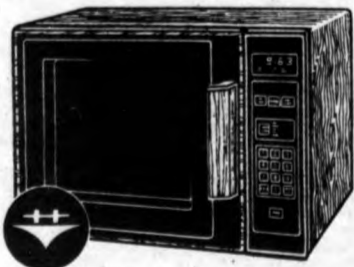

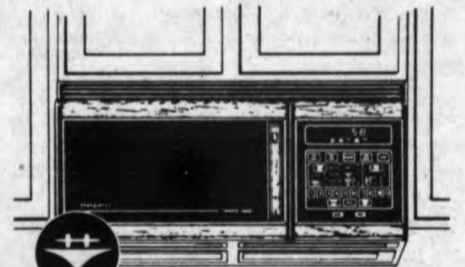

Farm leader gives it to auto industry

The president of the state's largest farm organization delivered a verbal slap to the auto industry and auto unions, accusing them of looking for government protection rather than competing for consumers.

In his annual address at the Michigan Farm Bureau's 64th annual meeting, President Elton R. Smith identified the domestic contents bill, which would require that 90 per cent of the parts in American cars be made in the U.S., as one of the agriculture's greatest threats.

"I wish that members of Congress and leaders in the auto industry and unions would realize what they are doing to this nation as they push for the domestic contents bill," Smith told the hundreds of farmers gathered at the Grand Center in Grand Rapids.

"One Congressman suggested this bill be renamed the 'UAW Wage Differential Protection and Anti-Consumer Act.' One economic association states that the average price of both domestic and foreign cars have been boosted by \$1,000 due to 'voluntary' restraints already agreed to by Japan. The domestic contents bill will raise prices by another \$1,000. Govern-

ment interferes and consumers suffer," he said.

"Even worse is the fact that figures released by the bipartisan Congressional budget office show that this legislation will increase employment in the auto industry by 38,000 — but about 140,000 jobs in the export industries will be lost. In my book, that's dumb mathematics.

"Farmers will be the big losers if this legislation goes through, for we will lose our share in the world market. Other countries, especially Japan, will continue to buy food, but those purchases will be made in countries that buy their products. The best help agriculture in Canada, South America, Argentina, and Africa can secure would be passage of the domestic content bill by the U.S. Congress," Smith said.

"The auto industry and auto unions seem to be afraid of the market system. They are looking to protection rather than competing for consumers. That is an unwise act and borders on immorality," the farm leader charged.

"We must recognize what the auto industry is doing to itself and apply that to agriculture as a new farm program is developed. We are tied to the export market for our

income. Support prices must reflect world prices or we will again have government in the storage business, due to loss of markets, and we must recognize that taxpayers will not tolerate federal expenditures for storing surplus commodities.

"As farmers, we will find it difficult to talk of the need to curtail government spending and at the same time be participating in programs which are dependent on government to be our market," he said.

The farm leader said on-

ly two actions exist to reduce the huge federal deficit which is hurting all businesses — increase taxes or reduce spending. "Reduction in spending is the logical answer, but does not seem to be the political answer," he said.

"The philosophy that government spending primes the economic pump seems to prevail in Washington. Those of us who have ever primed a water pump know that you can only get water when the well-point is clean and is in a supply of water. A well-point in a dry well doesn't produce anything regardless of how much it is primed. The economic well is very similar. Government spending requires heavier taxation, which dries up the incentive to invest, to create

jobs. It destroys the profit motive," he said.

"We hear members of Congress talking about needed tax increases including a freeze on federal estate tax credits for which Farm Bureau worked so hard. They talk about increasing taxes on fringe benefits and other areas. This is a pure and simple tactic to drain money from citizens and place it in the hands of government spenders.

"Americans everywhere should stand up and shout, 'No, members of Congress, you can't do this to us!' You must be part of that voice telling congress to cut spending and stop increasing taxes. If you don't then you will not have fulfilled your responsibilities," he challenged the farmers.

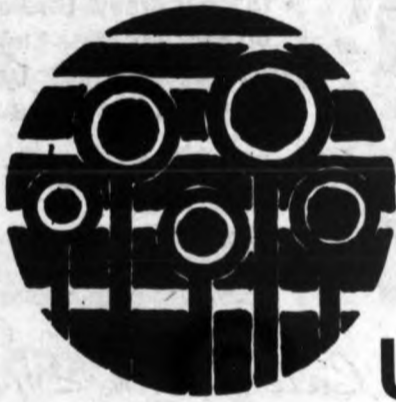

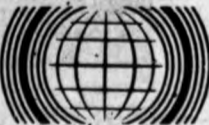

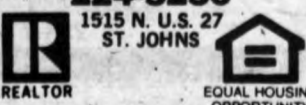

In order to be named AQHA Champion, a horse must win a total of 35 or more points in competition at official shows, contests or races recognized by the AQHA. A minimum of 15 points must be earned in both halter and performance classes, with points being won at five or more different shows under five or more different judges.

Lucinda Socks is also State Champion of Michigan for 1983 in the Senior Hunter Under Saddle category and also Reserve State Champion in the Working Hunter category, and Reserve

Champion for High Point All-Around Horse of Michigan.

Another of the Millers' horses, Hesa Dandy Doty, was also a champion. The two-year-old Palomino Gelding was Reserve World Champion for 1983 and won, along with the Millers' son Bobby won 10 AQHA Youth Championships in 1983.

AQHA is the world's largest and fastest growing equine registry, claiming more than 142,000

members. State and local associations are spread throughout all 50 states, and recognized foreign associations are present in 10 foreign countries.

More than 6,700 approved shows were conducted during 1982, attracting 720,812 entries (an increase of 20,755 over 1981 statistics). Less than 5,000 of AQHA's more than two million registered horses have earned this status. The award program was initiated in 1952.

...that I was able to miss the Perry Como Christmas Special again this year.

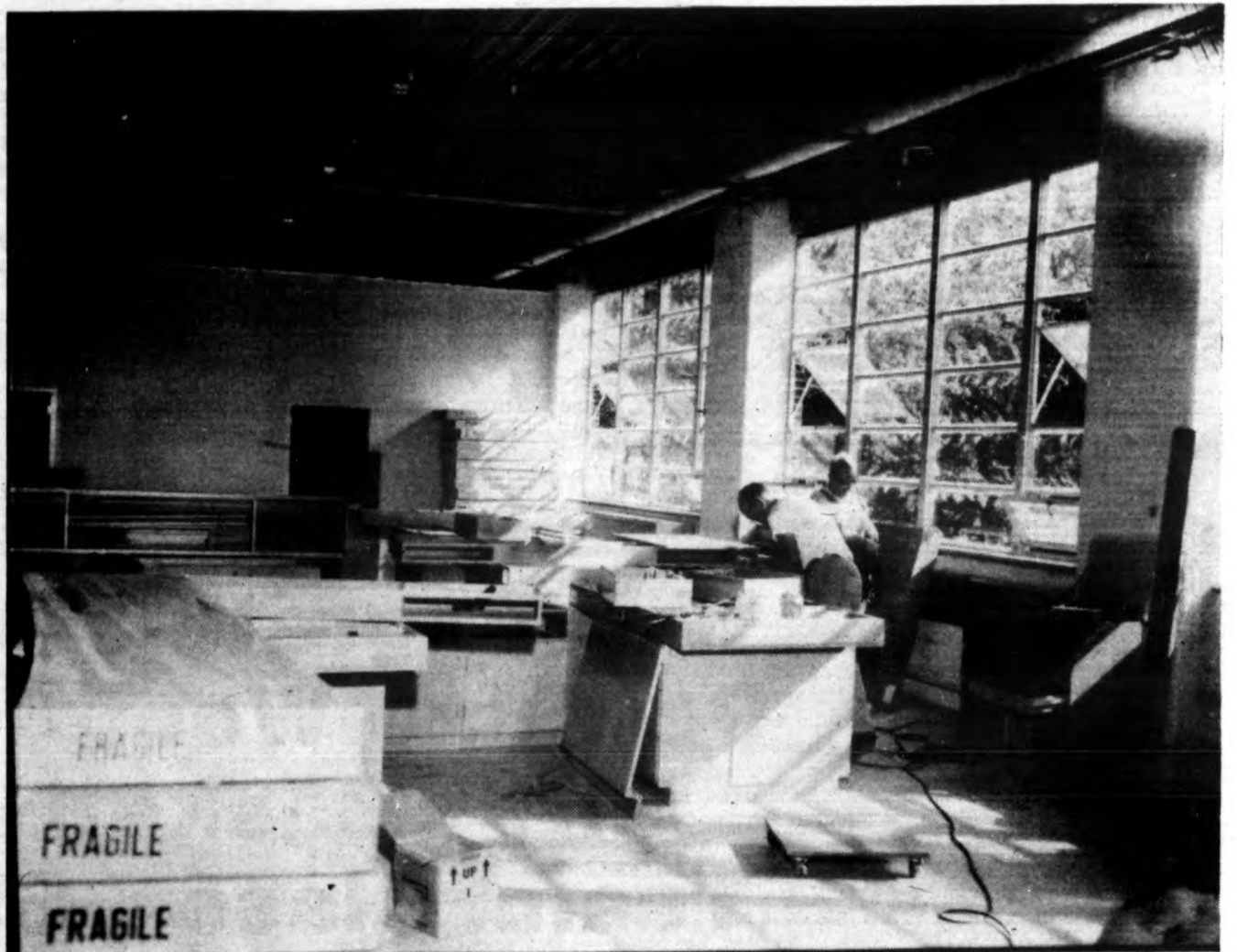
...that the M-21 resurfacing through St. Johns was completed in time for the holiday shopping rush downtown.

One Thousand Taxes In A Quart of Milk

There has been a lot of discussion on the farmer and his products. In the Republican News dated April 13, 1950, it does go a little further to explain the cost of milk and dairy products.

Today's price of milk is approximately one-third taxes. An estimated 1,000 taxes, direct and indirect, are part of the price of milk, says Bruce Clotheir, president of the American Dairy Association of Michigan.

"Take the matter of transportation alone," he continues. "Automobile manufacturers estimate there are 206 separate tax transactions from raw materials to finished product. Until the milk is delivered to your door, the farmer has a truck and tractor involved, the milk hauler has a truck, and the deliveryman has a truck. That's 824 taxes alone. The tax list includes federal, and state and local.

Even the air in the tires on each of these vehicles, he observed, has at least four distinct taxes placed on it: (1) the power to run the motor; (2) the oil for the compressor; (3) the gas station attendant; and (4) hidden taxes in the manufacturer and the sale of the motor and hose.

Here's a partial list for the farmer's property taxes on land for the buildings and to grow the crops and pasture; taxes that go into material and labor for barn, milk house and buildings such as silo and machinery sheds; taxes that are added to the cost of planting and harvesting machinery; taxes on trucks and tractors included in the price

he paid for them, to say nothing of taxes on operation such as gas and oil and license fees. In barn equipment such as: Manufacture of stanchions, hay loaders, milking machines, litter carriers, pitch forks, shovels, feed carts. There's even a 20 per cent tax on light bulbs to light the barn.

In every step from the cow to the consumer there is labor involved. Labor means withholding taxes, social security taxes to the federal government and very likely income taxes to the state and unemployment compensation.

The article goes on to tell about so many hidden taxes in every step of the way from the cow to us. There is not room in this article to list everything that relates to taxes. After reading this you may not be critical of the farmer who starts this round of taxes. It doesn't seem to be a get-rich job.

Food prices always makes me interested. You who know me will know the reason why!!! You will notice that most of the cost of food even years ago, are generally lower, but some of the specials we now have are quite close to the price years ago.

Pirates place second in Class C

Quick Lady Hawks swipe the state title

At the end of the regular season, when everyone was wondering how far Pewamo-Westphalia's girls basketball team would go, Fowler coach Denny Smith offered this observation.

"It's going to take an awfully quick team to beat them," Smith said.

Smith's words proved prophetic after Flint Hamady toppled the taller Pirates, 60-48, in the state Class C championship game last Saturday at Western Michigan University's Read Field House.

Utilizing a full-court press, the quicker Lady Hawks overcame a 12-point deficit to snatch away the state title.

"Their quickness hurt us more than anything," said P-W coach Carol Bogard, whose team finished 26-2.

"They were quick," said forward Patty Theis. "Twenty-five was unreal."

No. 25, sophomore Lisa Horne, was a main reason why Flint Hamady forced 19 Pirate turnovers in the second half. Horne, who sometimes pulled away from the Pirates while dribbling, sank her last 10 shots and finished with 30 points.

Though Flint Hamady entered the final game with an unimpressive 20-6 record, the Lady Hawks had gained confidence throughout the state tournament. In their regional opener, they upset the team co-ranked No. 1 in the state, Harbor Beach, by rallying from an 11-point deficit.

"Again, it was a result of our pressure," said coach Peter Stempky. "Our pressure defense forced the action, they turned the ball over and we converted a lot of turnovers into easy buckets."

P-W's power in the final game came mainly from center Lynda Rademacher. The 6-0 junior poured in 20 points, grabbed 12 rebounds, had four blocked shots and three steals.

Though a teary-eyed Bogard was disappointed with the outcome, she took comfort in the fact that hers is the first P-W team to ever make it to the finals of a state tournament.

"The initial loss hurts, but tomorrow, or in two or three weeks, you look back and finishing second in the state in Class C is nothing to be ashamed of," Bogard said.

"But you don't get here very often. You want to win the big one."

Overshadowed by the championship game were two outstanding performances which carried P-W into "The Big One." Pulsating victories over Ida and Benzonia Benzie Central were keyed by the guts and glue of P-W's Maize and Blue — Theis and guard Jackie Bauer.

Without the efforts of those two seniors in the quarterfinals and semifinals, P-W would never have had the opportunity to play for the championship.

Class C quarterfinal: P-W 46, Ida 44

The Pirates seemed nervous during this game, played before 1,400 fans last Wednesday at DeWitt.

As it turned out, they would sink only four of 15 free throws.

With 5:39 left in the third quarter, Theis picked up her fourth foul. P-W proceeded to lose a four-point lead and fall behind by as many as four points.

Bogard took a chance by reinserting Theis to start the fourth quarter.

"She said, 'Just watch it,'" Theis said. "We need you the whole time."

"I bet I told her 20 times, 'Patty, use your head out there,'" Bogard said. "Don't even think about blocking a shot."

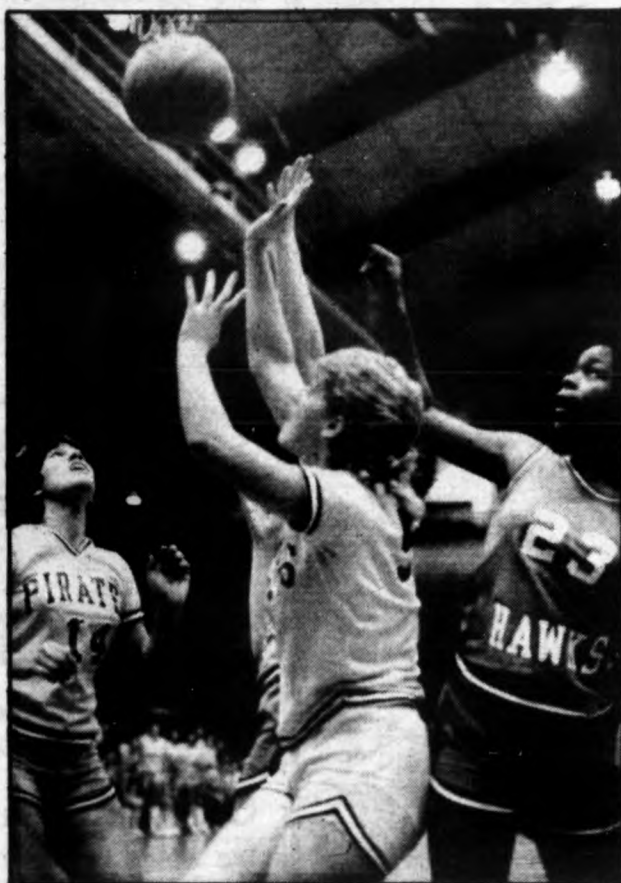
Thus instructed, Theis saved the game by scoring 10 of P-W's 14 points, including the final eight.

Later, Bogard would agree with those who felt P-W would not have won if Theis had fouled out.

"I realized just how valuable she was," the coach said. "Things were not running smoothly out there."

Solid rebounding was the trademark of Pewamo-Westphalia's girls basketball team this year.

Only once in 28 games were the Pirates outrebounded. That was when St. Johns grabbed 32 to P-W's 31.

Pounding the boards most efficiently throughout the state tournament was Michelle Wieber, a 5-foot-11 junior who gobbled up most of P-W's offensive rebounds.

"Her rebounding is something else," said coach Carol Bogard, describing Wieber's 18-point, 15-rebound effort against Benzie Central. "She gets all her points on garbage shots. She scrapes up the garbage from the boards."

In only her second year of organized basketball, Wieber improved so much this season that Bogard took her off the bench after the first couple of games. From that point on, she never left the starting lineup.

During the tournament, her timely offensive rebounds were a major reason why P-W was able to beat Ida and Benzie Central. In the final game against Flint Hamady, she grabbed 15 of the team's 49 rebounds and scored three baskets on offensive rebounds before fouling out.

"She has a lot of natural athletic ability," the coach

said. "She's just improved so much and become a much smarter player."

Bogard is hoping that Wieber can team with classmate Lynda Rademacher to give the Pirates a potent inside scoring combination next year.

P-W loyalists leave lasting impression

First to disappear were 750 tickets for the state quarterfinal game on Wednesday. The 600 available for Friday's semifinal game went just as quickly.

Pewamo-Westphalia sports fans have a reputation for being devout, but never had the school gotten so excited about one of its teams. The Pirate girls basketball team was marching through the state Class C tournament in quest of the school's first state championship.

They even decided to close school last Friday for the afternoon, so fans and players could prepare for a weekend in Kalamazoo.

"If we had 1,000 tickets here now for each of the two games," said principal Harry Peacock on Friday, "we could sell them all."

As it turned out, the team finished second behind a quick and determined Flint Hamady squad. But the P-W fans were second to none.

The fans' biggest moment came in the semifinals, as P-W rallied from eight points down to beat Benzonia-Benzie Central, 53-51, at Comstock High School.

They succeeded in outcheering a very vocal Benzie Central crowd during the game. But they saved the best for last.

"What I really enjoyed was watching the gym floor disappear," said Bonnie Somero, P-W athletic director.

After Benzie Central failed in a last-second attempt to tie the game, the P-W fans swarmed the court and started hugging the players.

They hugged and hugged and danced and pranced and hugged and stayed on the floor until Comstock officials could stand it no longer. At least four times, they pleaded over the public address system in an attempt to clear the floor for the other semifinal game.

The P-W flock, estimated at about 1,000, was back in full force for the championship game on Saturday at Western Michigan University. P-W had the largest group from any of the eight finalist schools.

Players and coaches couldn't say enough about the support.

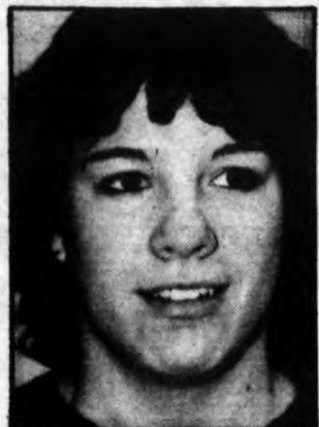
"Best in the state," said senior forward Patty Theis, referring to the fans.

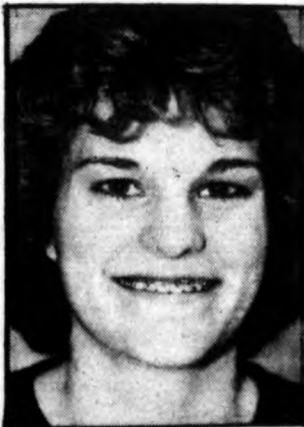

ORDINANCE NO. 92

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 92 WHICH IS "AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE ACQUISITION OF A SANITARY SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM BY THE CITY OF DEWITT, CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN, TO PROVIDE FOR THE OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF THE CITY OF DEWITT WASTEWATER COLLECTION SYSTEM; TO PROVIDE FOR THE OWNERSHIP, OPERATION OF, AND MANDATORY CONNECTION TO, SAID SYSTEM; TO REGULATE THE DISCHARGE OF WATER AND WASTE INTO SAID SYSTEM; TO PROHIBIT PRIVATE SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEMS AND EXCEPTIONS THERETO; TO PROVIDE RATES AND CHARGES TO BE LEVIED UPON USERS OF THE SYSTEM AND FOR CONNECTION THERETO; FOR CAPACITY UTILIZATION, INSPECTION AND FOR INDUSTRIAL COST RECOVERY, TO ESTABLISH ADMINISTRATIVE AND FINANCIAL PROCEDURES FOR THE OPERATION OF THE SYSTEM AND THE DISCHARGE OF OBLIGATIONS INCURRED IN CONNECTION THEREWITH; TO DEFINE TERMS, ESTABLISH FUNDS, AND PROVIDE REMEDIES AND PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE; AND TO REPEAL IN THEIR ENTIRETY ORDINANCES NO. 38 AND NO. 78, BEING THE SEWER USE ORDINANCES HERETOFORE ADOPTED BY THE CITY OF DEWITT; BY AMENDING SECTION 6 TO PROVIDE FOR AND REGULATE THE ABANDONMENT OF PUBLIC SEWER AND DISCONNECTION OF BUILDING SEWER FROM THE PUBLIC SYSTEM, TO PROVIDE FOR CONSTRUCTION REQUIREMENTS AND STANDARDS, INSPECTION, PERMITS AND FEES FOR SAME AND TO PROVIDE AN EFFECTIVE DATE HEREOF."

THE CITY OF DEWITT, CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN, ORDANS:

Sec. 6. BUILDING SEWERS AND CONNECTIONS; IS HEREBY AMENDED IN ITS ENTIRETY:

A. BUILDING SEWER REGULATIONS AND PERMIT REQUIREMENTS.

1. SEPARATE SEWER FOR EVERY BUILDING. A separate and independent building sewer (lead) shall be provided for every building in which sanitary sewage originates.

2. REQUIREMENTS TO BE MET. As to sewage to be transmitted and treated by the system, all building sewers shall meet or exceed all requirements of this ordinance.

3. PERMIT; REQUIRED. No unauthorized person shall uncover, make any connections with or opening into, alter or disturb any public sewer or appurtenance thereof without first obtaining a written permit from the Authority Agent.

4. PERMIT; FORMS; FEES; CONDITIONS; EXPIRATION; RENEWAL. The permit for a building sewer connection shall be on such forms and on payment of such fees and in accordance with such conditions as shall be established from time to time by the City. Said permits shall be dated and shall expire thirty (30) days from the date of issuance but may be renewable at the discretion of the Authority or the Authority Agent.

5. PERMIT; NECESSARY INFORMATION. Said permits shall show the location of the work, the extent of the work, information regarding the contract with the owner, and any pertinent information as shall be deemed necessary.

6. RESPONSIBILITIES OF OWNER. All costs and expenses incident to the installation and connection of the building sewer to the public sewer shall be the responsibility of the owner. The repair, replacement and maintenance of the building sewer, including the portion on the street right-of-way, shall be the responsibility of the owner. The owner or the persons installing the building sewer for said owner shall indemnify the Authority, Authority Agent, or local unit of government from any and all losses or damage that may be directly occasioned by the installation of the sanitary sewer or building sewer.

7. PAYMENT OF DIRECT OR INDIRECT CONNECTION CHARGE. The foregoing notwithstanding, no such permit shall issue for connection to the system unless and until the applicant demonstrates a receipt from the local unit of government for the payment in full of the direct or indirect connection charge required herein.

B. CONSTRUCTION REQUIREMENTS.

1. BUILDING LEADS; SPECIFICATIONS. Building leads hereinafter installed shall consist of pipes and fittings of the following types and sizes:

a. Size of Sewer. That portion of the building sewer lying in the area of a public street, alley or right-of-way, shall not be less than 6" I.D. That part of the building sewer between the public right-of-way boundary and the building shall be not less than 4" I.D. Building sewers serving other than single family dwellings,

including multiple dwellings, commercial and industrial users, shall be of adequate size for the expected wastewater flow.

b. Approved Construction Materials. Building sewer must be constructed of one of the following materials and cannot be mixed in the connection lines to include the fittings:

(1) Extra strength vitrified clay pipe with ASTM 425 joints;

(2) Cast iron soil pipe with "no-hub" type joints;

(3) Polyvinyl chloride (PVC) pipe Type 1, Schedule 40 ASTM D 1785 with solvent weld joints;

c. Prohibited Fittings. No tees, double-tees or crosses or double hub type shall be permitted; and

d. Changes in Grade. All changes in grade shall be made with appropriate 1/8 bends;

e. Air or Water Pressure. The building sewers shall be low air or water pressure tested from within five (5) feet of the building to the point of connection to the sanitary sewer system, said pressure shall be 3.5 pounds per square inch and held for five (5) minutes.

f. Slope. The minimum slope of a 6" I.D. line shall be 1/8 inch per foot, and for a 4" I.D. line said minimum shall be 1/4 inch per foot.

g. Laying Sewers. Building sewers shall be laid at a uniform grade and in a straight alignment insofar as possible. Changes in direction shall be made only with properly curved pipe and fittings with cleanouts located a maximum of 90 feet of straight run and at each 90° direction change (two 45° connections), and all cleanouts shall be plugged.

h. Separate Sewer for Every Building; Exception. A separate and independent building sewer shall be provided for every building, except where one building stands at the rear of a lot on an interior lot and no private sewer is available or can be constructed to the rear through an adjoining alley, street, court yard, or driveway. Building sewer from the front building may be extended to the rear building and the whole considered as one building sewer. Provided, however, that all such building sewer shall, prior to construction, be approved by the Authority or the Authority Agent.

i. Old Building Sewers. Old building sewers or portions thereof may be used in connection with new buildings only when said sewers are tested by the owner and found by the Authority Agent to meet all requirements of these regulations.

j. Depth. Whenever possible the building sewer shall be brought to the building at an elevation below the basement floor. No building sewer shall be closer than three (3) feet parallel to any bearing wall which might thereby be weakened. The depth shall be sufficient to afford protection from frost.

k. Plumbing Code Rules. The method to be used in excavating, placing of pipe, jointing, testing and backfilling the trench shall conform to the requirements of the Plumbing Code Rules (Part 7) issued by the Michigan Department of Labor, Construction Code Commission, which rules are incorporated herein by reference.

l. Lifting Sewage By Artificial Means. In all buildings in which any building drain is too low to permit gravity flow to the public sewer, waste water carried by such drains shall be lifted by approved artificial means and discharged to the building sewer.

m. Excavations; Regulations. All excavations for building sewer installation and connection shall be pursuant to appropriate permits and shall be adequately guarded by barricades and lighting so as to protect the public from hazard. The streets, sidewalks, alleys, parkways and other public property disturbed in the course of the installation and connection work shall be restored in a manner satisfactory to the city.

n. Connection to Public Sewer. The connection of the building sewer to the public sewer shall be made at the wye branch or manhole designed for that property if such outlet is available at a suitable location. Any connection not made at the designated outlet in the main sewer shall be done in accordance with the Sewer Construction Regulations.

o. Inspection and Connection. The applicant for the building sewer shall notify the Authority Agent when said building sewer is ready for inspection and connection to the public sewer. No part of the building sewer shall be covered prior to testing and approval of all materials and workmanship by the Authority Agent. The connection shall be made under the observation of the Authority Agent. A minimum of 24-hours advance notice shall be required for inspection.

p. Sufficiency of Sewer Capacity. No connection to the system will be permitted unless there is capacity available at all downstream sewers, lift stations, force mains, and the sewage treatment plant, including capacity for treatment of B.O.D. and suspended solids.

q. Who May Make Connections. All connections to the said system will be made by a licensed contractor or plumber registered with the city. Provided, however, that a property owner may make his own installation and connection so long as he has secured a connection permit.

2. PLUMBERS & CONTRACTORS; LICENSE; BOND; INSURANCE; REVOCATION OF LICENSE. All licensed contractors and plumbers making connections to the system shall file a license and/or permit bond with the city in the amount of \$10,000.00 and in addition shall provide the city with a copy of their plumbers' or contractors' license from the State of Michigan and a copy of their liability insurance policy (providing a minimum of 100/300 thousand dollars personal liability protection and \$500,000 property damage protection) prior to performing any connections to the system. Said bond shall indemnify the city and the Authority against all losses or damages caused by the city or Authority by reason of the contractor's or plumber's breach of this ordinance or any rule or regulation relating thereto. The City of DeWitt Mayor may, upon notice of a violation by a licensee, revoke said license. Said revocation shall become final unless the license revocation is reversed by the Sanitary Sewer Board of Appeals. All such appeals shall be filed within ten (10) days of license revocation.

3. SURFACE OR GROUND WATER. No person shall connect roof downspouts, foundation drains, area-way drains, swimming pool drains, or any sources of surface or ground water to a building sewer which in turn is connected to the system.

4. SEWER CONSTRUCTION AFTER COMPLETION OF SYSTEM; CHARGES AND PAYMENT. Any construction of sanitary sewer within the public right-of-way which is required after completion and acceptance of the public system described herein shall be charged to the property owner requesting connection. Said charge shall be the actual cost of such construction plus ten (10%) percent thereof for administrative expense. Payment shall be made as follows:

(a) Not less than fifty (50%) percent of the estimated cost shall be deposited with the City prior to commencement of construction; and

(b) The balance, if any, of said costs and administrative fee shall be paid upon completion of construction.

C. PUBLIC SANITARY SEWER DISCONNECTION AND ABANDONMENT.

1. ABANDONMENT OF PUBLIC SEWER. In the event a public sanitary sewer must be abandoned, for example due to condemnation, catastrophe, or otherwise permitted by law, the owner of the premises previously served thereby shall cause the construction of a four (4) foot inside diameter manhole at a location to be selected by the engineers selected by the Authority. The construction specifications relating to said manhole shall be equal to those required of such structures on the existing system and shall be inspected and approved by said engineers. All costs of said construction shall be borne by the owner of the premises previously served by said sewer.

2. ABANDONMENT OF BUILDING SEWER. In the event abandonment of a building sewer is permitted by law, and in the event the owner of premises previously connected to the public sanitary sewer shall abandon said building sewer, said owner shall, at owner's expense, cause said building sewer to be excavated at the property line (i.e., at the public sewer or road right-of-way line) and plugged with a permanent air-tight stopper or plugging device which shall be suitably secured and braced. Approval of all such plugging devices shall be obtained in advance of installation.

3. ABANDONMENT AND DISCONNECTION PERMIT FEES. Permits for abandonment of public sanitary sewer shall be obtained not less than two (2) weeks before commencement of manhole construction and permits for disconnection of building sewers shall be obtained at least twelve (12) hours before excavation. No excavation or construction required herein shall be filled or covered unless and until satisfactory inspection thereof by the municipality or Authority personnel. All work shall be done by contractors qualified under the terms of this Ordinance and a permit fee of twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars shall be due and payable at the time said permit is obtained.

This amendment to Ordinance No. 92 is hereby adopted at a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of DeWitt held on this 5th day of December, 1983 and shall become effective upon publication.



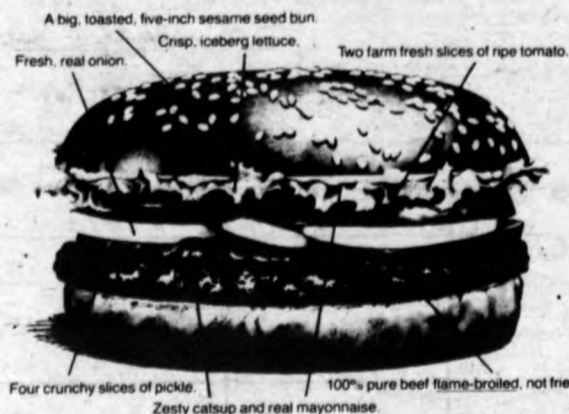
