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## School closings is top story for 1983

The year 1983 is coming to a close and with it a recapping of the year's top stories in the St. Johns and Clinton County area.

One of the most heated issues in St. Johns this past year has been the decision to close two elementary schools in the St. Johns School District.

In April, a group of school administrators recommended to the Board of Education that two rural schools, East Olive and East Essex Elementaries, be closed and sixth graders would attend the middle school.

Dozens of parents protested that recommendation, which the administration said would save the district money and allow more efficient use of the system's staff.

The protests sparked such a controversy that a citizens committee was set up to take a look at the problem and come up with a solution of its own by December.

At that time, the committee recommended the closing of two city elementaries, Central and Perrin-Palmer, and build a new elementary school at the site of the high school.

Some of the other top stories over the past year include:

- The Watertown Township supervisor, clerk, and two trustees were recalled for approving the dumping and storing of hazardous wastes at the Granger Landfill.

The Watertown Citizens Recall Committee said the four "broke faith" with the citizens of Watertown Township and that the "Board acted for Granger's benefit, and not the benefit of the community."

All four were ousted by a three to two margin on Jan. 18.

Then on April 22, a settlement was reached in the "wee hours of the night" by Ingham County Circuit Court Judge Carolyn Stell ordering the stoppage of dumping of hazardous waste disposal at Granger Landfill as of May 2.

- In March, St. Johns Police Chief Lyle French reported to the city council a 7.4 per cent drop in serious crime during 1982. There were no murders, suicides, fatal accidents, arsons, or concealed weapons charges during that year.

In a report to the Clinton County Board of Commissioners, it showed that marriage was up in the county, divorce down, and alcohol was the most abused drug. From 1981, there was an increase of 100 marriage licenses and a drop by 20, in divorces.

- Then on May 1, a 16-year-old St. Johns girl was abducted and raped from a city street by a man in a dark car.

The girl was abducted while she was walking on Wight Street near McConnell Street. After the assault, the victim was returned to the same location and dropped off.

Police Chief French said, "I can't remember ever having something like

this happen." He said it was the worst he has seen in his 27 years of St. Johns police work and urged children to be extremely aware and cautious.

- In February, the St. Johns High School drama production of "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown" took first place among schools from throughout Michigan in the High School Drama Contest. The 13 schools competed in the two-day competition at the University of Michigan.

In addition to the first place award, the cast, production, and musical combo members received the highest individual awards of "superior".

- St. Johns High School senior Nancy Thelen was awarded one of only two special scholarships granted by the University of Michigan, the first annual Arvin M. and Arvella D. Bently Scholarship, which covers tuition, fees, room, board and books for four years.

- On a sadder note, a two-car collision in Dallas Township in June injured five area young people and killed a popular, star athlete from Fowler, Jim Farley.

Farley was a four-sport athlete at Fowler High School and was a member of the National Honor Society. He had just graduated from high school where he had received all-conference honors in football, basketball and baseball as well as academic Top 10 honors.

- In June, the manager of the St. Johns Federal Credit Union was charged with sexual harassment by five local women employees.

In November a settlement was reached with the Credit Union, but charges are still pending against the manager.

- In August, Clinton County Circuit Court Judge Timothy Green raised the annual salary for Friend of the Court Mrs. Colleen Steinman to \$30,000, ignoring a compromise with the Clinton County

Board of Commissioners in May which granted her a token raise to \$24,667.

Commissioners felt \$30,000 was too much money for that position. Judge Green said she was entitled to that salary because of her law degree and the added duties she was given.

- Also in August, the Clinton County Child Safety Committee set a goal of \$100,000 so every child in the county could be fitted for free child restraint car seats.

- Other top stories receiving headlines in Clinton County in 1983 were: DeWitt's Sesquicentennial Celebration marking its 150th Anniversary; the Tri-County Nar-

otics Unit cracks down on the sale of drugs and alcohol at the "Nights" at the Northside Drive-In.

Munger and Ray Parr were elected to the St. Johns Board of Education; several members of the St. Johns Marching Band were members of the All-State Band which toured Hawaii; a DeWitt youth died from Reye's Syndrome; and the Clinton County News, DeWitt/Bath Review and their three sister newspapers were sold to Clinton Beckwith, an Eaton Rapids publisher, in November.

## Tussles continue between Judge and Commissioners

In the continuing skirmish between Clinton County Circuit Court Judge Timothy Green and the Clinton County Board of Commissioners, some of Green's court employees may not be getting the vacations they thought they were.

County Register of Deeds Bonnie Wickerham, County Clerk Jane Swanchara, and County Equalization Director Leon Thelen all met with the Finance and Personnel Committee on Dec. 23 to request that employees in their departments get the afternoons of Dec. 23 and 30 off as holidays. They stated that the primary reason for requesting these days off as holidays was that Circuit Court employees had been granted this time off.

Back in 1981, the county adopted the identical holiday schedule for governmental units, as one set by the State Supreme Court. That schedule would not apply to those two days in question, according to County Administrator Bill LeFevre, but local courts could modify that holiday schedule if an administrative order was sent to a State Court Administrator prior to that action.

LeFevre says Judge Green overlooked that procedure and sent no such order, therefore the county would not recognize those days as holidays. "In fact," LeFevre said, "on Dec. 23, Judge Tahvonen himself worked." Judge Randy Tahvonen is the other County Circuit Court Judge.

The Finance and Personnel Committee therefore told the three department heads that the county had adopted a specific holiday schedule and would not deviate from it and instructed LeFevre to write a letter to all department heads to the effect that any time cards turned in with either Dec. 23 or Dec. 30 shown as holidays were to be charged against their vacation time.

During the County Commissioners meeting on Tuesday, Commission Chairman Roger Overway voiced his concern with several line item changes in the Friend of the Court's budget, as authorized by Judge Green.

The items included \$1,400 from the Contingency Fund to the Friend of the Court to cover postage and travel line items, and \$1,081 from the Circuit Court Family Counseling Fund to the Friend of the Court general fund budget.

Overway, mentioning a previous confrontation with Judge Green over the county's setting of the Friend of the Court's budget at the 1982 levels, said, "Both Mrs. (Colleen) Steinman (Friend of the Court) and the judge feel the 1982 levels are not a permanent thing. They feel if there is a point of inflation, the county should cover it. But since it's such a small item, it wouldn't be worth going to court over."

However Commissioner Richard Hawks commented that the county shouldn't make that big a deal out of it because many of the things the Friend of

the Court do, brings money into the county's General Fund.

Judge Green again came under scrutiny with the Board of Commissioners regarding a letter from Green concerning the salaries for the Assignment Clerk and Judicial Secretary for 1984. The judge wants 25 per cent increases for these employees, according to the Finance and Personnel Committee, while most other county employees were getting an average increase of only 12 per cent.

The committee requested LeFevre to write a letter to Judge Green asking him to utilize the established process for reviewing salaries, asking Green if he would like to request a reclassification for those two positions.

In other action by the County Board of Commissioners, a 1984 borrowing resolution on 1983 delinquent taxes was approved so the county may pay the various local units of government their allotted amounts; approved to continue the Prosecutor's Cooperative Reimbursement Program; and set the effective date for raising the co-pay prescription drug program to March from February due to the company issuing new cards of their own on March 1, LeFevre felt it would be too confusing to have employees use three cards in the span of 30 days. It was also moved to have the co-pay for prescription drugs usage be raised from \$2 to \$3 effective March 1.

# Clinton Memorial conducts Health, Fitness, CPR class

Clinton Memorial Hospital will be sponsoring two health maintenance classes this winter.

A two-credit course called "Health Maintenance and Physical Fitness" will be offered through Lansing Community College. The course will be held in the hospital conference room from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. on Wednesdays, Jan. 11 through March 21.

Instructor Sylvia Hirschegger, R.N., will help individuals develop the skills needed to establish, monitor and evaluate aerobic exercise activities. Risk factors of heart disease will be introduced, with consideration given to individual lifestyles and stressors.

Other topics included in the course are: effects of exercise and warning signs; weight control and general nutrition; stress and relaxation techniques; work of the heart and lungs; changing lifestyle;

dealing with the doctor; self-help records; Type A personality; and CPR and the family.

Participants are encouraged to enroll in the Healthstyle Risk Assessment program offered by the Mid-Michigan District Health Department prior to or during this course.

Anyone interested in taking the course or wanting more information should call the Clinton Memorial Hospital Education Department, 224-6881, Ext. 283. Pre-registration is required.

Clinton Memorial Hospital and the American Heart Association will offer a CPR Instructor Course on Friday, Jan. 20 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the hospital conference room. The class will certify instructors to teach Basic Cardiac Life Support classes according to the standards of the American Heart Association and will be taught by Ricki Burk.

R.N., Instructor-Trainer. Pre-requisites include current certification in Basic Life Support through the American Red Cross or the American Heart Association, a score of 85 per cent on a written test, and satisfactory CPR techniques as

demonstrated on a Recording Resusci-Annie. Participants must be 18 years of age.

## Team cherishes title

Below-zero temperatures have done nothing to freeze interest in baseball at DeWitt.

Pounding horsehide in December and January is indeed popular at the southern Clinton County school.

Some of the 28 varsity and junior varsity athletes who have been working out specifically for baseball were distressed when coach Frank Deak wouldn't open the batting cage before Christmas break.

The mention of enthusiasm put a grin on Deak's face as he talked from his Lake Geneva home.

"Dave Mollitor (a varsity player) came up to me on the last day of classes and said, 'Now you're going to let me know if you'll be opening that cage up before Christmas, won't you?'" the coach said.

Winning district championships under Deak has helped spark an exciting feeling for DeWitt baseball in recent years.

Winning the state Class C championship in 1983 did nothing to curb that excitement.

"I think it gives the kids an overall positive attitude," said Liz Deak, the coach's wife. "These kids were ready to play baseball when they were in football."

DeWitt was able to win the state title with the solid pitching of Steve Sontich and Steve Holland, timely hitting

and near-perfect defense. In seven state tournament games, the Panthers made only four errors in games where errors could have been damaging.

Pivotal defensive plays came to mind when Deak analyzed the state title.

"I always start with luck," he said with a chuckle. "I'm sure everything went our way that we needed to go our way. But we didn't make mistakes."

One crucial defensive play came in the district semifinal game against Lansing Catholic Central.

Down 4-2 in the final inning, the Cougars made a bid to tie the game by placing runners on second and third with two outs. But DeWitt second baseman Sam Dalman dived behind second base, snagged the hard-hit bouncer and threw the batter out to preserve the win.

Rightfielder Ken Rajala came up with the second key play when DeWitt cut down undefeated Montague in the regional semifinal. DeWitt was clinging to a 2-1 lead when Montague placed runners on first and second with one out in the sixth.

The Montague batter stroked a single to Rajala which appeared to score the tying run. But the Panther outfielder charged the ball and fired a perfect throw to catcher Tom Deak, who blocked the plate, caught the ball and tagged out the runner.

DeWitt went on to score twice more and knock off the state's No. 1 ranked team, 4-1.

"That was a turning point," Deak said. "At the time, we didn't know it was, but it was."

DeWitt went on to win its final three games with relative ease, outscoring opponents 28-13. Though those games had tense moments, Deak said he was more concerned about how the team won its first game. In that one, DeWitt had to rally from a 5-2 deficit in the sixth inning to pull out an 8-5 win over Olivet.

"It wasn't that we were playing poorly," he recalled. "It was that everything we did played into their hands. At the time, I wasn't as nervous as I was when I looked back. We could have lost it all right there."

One tangible benefit of the state championship has been increased exposure for DeWitt players.

To illustrate this, Deak talked about his sons, Tim and Tom. Tim, an all-state shortstop at DeWitt, received about 25 inquiries from colleges interested in offering him a baseball scholarship. He settled on Eastern Michigan University.

Tom, an all-state catcher, has already received 40 letters from colleges all over the country, including Texas, Alabama and Michigan — the top three finishers in last year's NCAA tournament.

Coach Deak expects a similar response for the services of Steve Holland, a left-handed pitcher. Scouts from the Los Angeles Dodgers, Kansas City Royals, Milwaukee Brewers and Cincinnati Reds have already contacted Holland and catcher Deak and invited them to tryout camps.

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# Title was incredible

Ask Fowler girls track coach Kim Spalsbury about winning the 1983 state championship and he will invariably tell you how lucky his team was.

Spalsbury is the first to admit that Fowler needed a string of incredible events to capture that state Class D crown. But, in retrospect, he doesn't want that to detract from the team's skill.

"A lot of people I know say, 'You sure were lucky, weren't you?'" said Spalsbury, relaxing in his Grand Ledge home the day after Christmas. "A lot of that came because when I talked to reporters, I emphasized the luck."

"But it was a result of our talent that put us in a position to win it. Talent gets you there, and then you get the breaks."

But as Spalsbury analyzed the 58½-58 victory over Ann Arbor Greenhills in the meet at Traverse City, he smiled at his team's amazing good fortune.

"Very seldom do you get so many breaks in a single meet," he said.

The first break came in the 400-meter dash. Fowler sophomore Kelly Hafner had qualified for the event, but it had not been recorded for state meet officials. After Spalsbury scrambled to get her in the race, Hafner responded with a career-best time to finish seventh and score two points for the team.

When another coach scratched a runner from the 400 meters, Spalsbury was able to run Jan Schmidt in the fast heat of the event. Pushed by the faster competition, Schmidt was able to finish in sixth place.

Another break occurred in the 800-meter run. Freshman Cindy Schneider had been pacing herself off of senior Lana Hafner all season, but Schneider was slated for a slower heat and Hafner was set for the fast heat. A late scratch put Schneider into the fast heat.

With about 220 yards left, Schneider passed her teammate for the first time all season. Thus inspired in the final 180 yards, Hafner spurred from 11th place to finish in fourth. Schneider finished ninth and did not score any team points, but Spalsbury wondered whether Hafner would have finished higher than sixth if the freshman had not passed her.

But even with all of those fortunate in-

cidents, Fowler seemed to be in a hopeless situation. Emily Feldpausch placed seventh in the 3,200-meter run, but a Greenhills runner had finished fifth, giving the Ann Arbor school a 9½-point lead with one event to go.

As it stood, Greenhills would only have had to place among the top eight in the 1,600-meter relay to wrap up the title. Greenhills would be able to run carefully and simply hold on to the baton, since it had the second-fastest seed time in the event.

"That was a frantic time," Spalsbury said. "The whole team knew at that point that we were in trouble. Emily knew that every place she got for us counted for us as far as finishing first or second in the state meet. I ran down to tell her that she ran a good race."

But Spalsbury retained a sliver of hope when he learned that the Greenhills runner and the No. 6 finisher, a girl from Colon, both had been disqualified. That meant Fowler would win the state title if it won the 1,600-meter relay and Greenhills placed fourth.

Even that seemed like a remote possibility to Spalsbury. He told his four relay members not to worry about Greenhills. Like the captain of a sinking ship, Spalsbury wanted to lose the battle with dignity.

"Let's go out in style," he told the relay members. "Let's break our state record. Let's get as close to 4:00 as possible."

The team of Becky Klein, the Hafners and Schmidt followed instructions perfectly by running a 4:02.1, breaking the record of 4:05.8 set by the Eagles in 1981.

That set the stage for the final incredible event. Both Grass Lake and Covert dropped their relay times by at least five seconds and bumped Greenhills down to fourth place.

Fowler, the 1982 state champion, had won its second crown by the narrowest of margins.

"That was probably one of the most special moments I've had in coaching," said Spalsbury. "Going down to greet the mile relay, there were a lot of tears, a lot of embraces."

The pulsating victory also spurred on the Fowler fans to a higher level of support. For the first time in Fowler track

history, the fans participated with the team in a victory lap.

"That's the kind of spirit they had," Spalsbury said. "They got caught up in the moment of it. We did not go to an invitational or big meet when we didn't have the most fans. Even though we didn't have a home track, we always had a home-field advantage."

The championship served as a "going-away" present for the team's senior leaders — Klein, Lana Hafner and Feldpausch. Presently, Klein and Hafner are at Central Michigan University while Feldpausch is at Lansing Community College.

Fowler will honor its 1982 and 1983 state champion girls track teams before the Fowler-Laingsburg basketball game on Friday, Jan. 6.

Lonnie Lowery, assistant director of the Michigan High School Athletic Association, will be present to officially honor the teams. Coach Kim Spalsbury said all members of both teams will be present for the ceremony, which will take place between 7:30 p.m. and 8 p.m.



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## MICHIGAN'S ECONOMIC FUTURE: IN NEED OF ENERGY

Dennis Ellis is concerned about the future of Michigan. It is not so much the next two or three years that he worries about, but it's the next 10-20 years that he sees as crucial.

"We've got to stop looking at only the short term," he explains emphatically. "Michigan has a very good future, but we've got to plan for the long term. Short term benefits aren't really benefits if they create bigger problems in the long term."

A professor of business economics in the school of management at the University of Michigan-Flint, Dr. Ellis wants to see Michigan prosper. He's sure Michigan can experience good, solid growth in the economy, and, most importantly, in jobs.

But, says Ellis, "If Michigan is to have any economic growth, if we are to attract industries and jobs, then we need the long term energy supply necessary to serve those industries. Electricity is often the only energy source for industries like computers, electric control systems, and communications. Those are the industries of the future. Having a good supply of electric energy is of utmost importance in bringing business and jobs here, and this is where Michigan can stand out in the long run."

Dr. Ellis applauds Michigan utilities for having the foresight to build additional electric capacity. "There is a need for new generating plants for several reasons," he explains. "Old, uneconomical plants will have to be retired, oil is too unreliable to use as a source of vital energy, and the Fuel Use Act prohibits the use of natural gas as a boiler fuel after 1990. Finally, our economy is already showing signs of growth, and in many industries, the demand for electricity has always grown faster than the economy. So we need new nuclear and coal-fired plants."

The father of four points out that this is where Michigan really has an advantage. The Sunbelt states have 75 percent of their electricity generated by natural gas and oil. Those plants will either have to be converted, or new ones built, Dr. Ellis notes, meaning higher energy costs. He says the United States Department of Energy has predicted that the future cost of energy in the Southwest and the West will rise greatly compared to the Midwest.

"That's critical to Michigan in terms of economic development and jobs, and that's where the bottom line is. That's why the Midland Nuclear Plant is so important. We've got to send a signal to business that adequate energy at reasonable costs will be available here. As the price of energy in the Sunbelt goes up, Michigan will become more and more attractive."

**DNR specialist has tips for fishermen**

Ice fishing — one of Michigan's most popular winter sports — can provide hours of pleasure for the cautious and prudent outdoorsman.

For others, it can lead to disaster. More than a dozen Michiganians died in ice fishing accidents last year, according to Eric Olsen, marine, law enforcement and education specialist for the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Many, if not all, could have been prevented had the fishermen used a little caution, he said.

Olsen, who has "learned about ice safety the hard way," offers these safety tips:

**WHAT TO WEAR:**

Loose, warm clothing is preferable. "Don't put on so many clothes that you sweat," Olsen advises. A smart fisherman will dress in layers so he can adjust to the changing weather conditions.

Comfortable boots and gloves are also essential. Gloves should be worn at all times; you'll need them if you fall through the ice.

**WHEN IS THE ICE SAFE?**

As a general rule, three to five inches of ice should be enough to support one person safely. But, Olsen warns, looks can be deceiving.

"Make sure you test the ice first," Olsen said. "Ice is not always what it appears to be from up above."

Olsen suggests using an ice stud to determine the ice's safety. They can be purchased at most sporting goods or department stores, or can be made by welding a chisel to the end of a piece of

pipe. If the stud penetrates the ice, stay away.

**HOW TO SURVIVE A DISASTER:**

A gruesome statistic to consider: "Once you fall through the ice," Olsen said, "you have a 50 percent chance of survival."

If the unthinkable happens, try to stay calm and get out of the water as quickly as possible. Olsen suggests two ways to get out: one, get low in the water and spring out using your hands; and two, float on your back and try to squirm your way back onto the solid ice.

A useful tip: When you pull yourself out, immediately reach into your pocket and retrieve your car keys. In less than two minutes, your pants will be frozen solid.

**USEFUL EQUIPMENT:**

A broom or a broom handle can come in handy if you fall through the ice and if there is someone there to fish you out. If you're fishing alone, you might want to consider wearing a thin, warm life vest that will keep you afloat. Also, experienced fishermen carry a few nails in their pockets for extra traction in the event of a disaster.

**OTHER SAFETY TIPS:**

Keep all vehicles off the ice. Three or four people died last year when their snowmobile or car went through the ice.

Bring a buddy if the ice can support the weight of two or more people. There's safety in numbers.

Above all, use good judgment. Don't gamble in this sport, the consequences can be fatal.

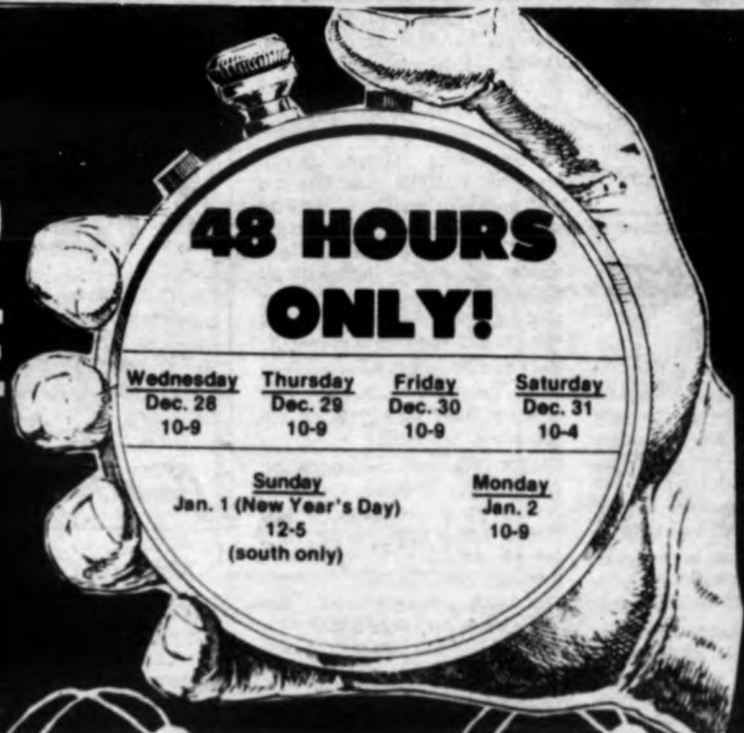
