'Yes' votes win election

Four members of the Watertown Township Board are out of a job, following a recall election held Tuesday.

Voters in the township ousted Supervisor Vaughn Montgomery, Clerk Mildred McDonough and trustees John Fox and Forest Shipman by about a 3-2 yes-no margin. Montgomery received the most yes votes, 673, to 463 no votes. Mrs. McDonough was voted down by a 665-463 margin. Fox was ousted by a 652-472 margin, while Shipman lost a 654-469 vote.

According to Clinton County Clerk Jane Swachara, "By about 7 p.m., 55 percent of the eligible voters had voted, so the total was probably a little higher than that."

The recall movement was brought about by a board vote on Sept. 23 to settle a long dispute with landfill developer Jerry Granger.

The board members who voted for the settlement it was the best they could have hoped for, since a pending state law would have soon taken all authority out of their hands. Members of the Watertown Citizens Recall Committee, however, said that the settlement was premature and gave the green light to the Zoning Board of Appeals to grant Granger a Special Use Permit for the dumping of hazardous waste.

The recall election followed an often-bitter battle between the Recall Committee and members of Citizens Opposed to the Recall Effort, the group set up to fight the recall.

The next step is for each political party to nominate candidates to fill the vacant spots. An election to fill the vacancies will be held within 60 days of certification of the election.

Bath couple dies as result of crash

An accident which claimed the lives of a Bath couple, Russell and Marjorie Orr of 6243 Cutler Road, is still under investigation, according to DeWitt Township Police.

A spokesman for the department said Michigan State Police accident investigation experts will be looking into possible equipment failure on a cement block delivery truck which struck the Orr auto at the intersection of Clark and US-27 near 11:40 a.m. Monday, Jan. 10. No citation has been issued, and police said there is as yet no indication the brakes on the truck failed, as rumored. The truck, a modified flatbed, was empty at the time of the collision, police said.

The Orrs, both 41, died last weekend — Russell Orr died at Sparrow Hospital Friday, Jan. 14, and Mrs. Orr died at St. Lawrence Hospital the following day. Surviving are four children, William, 19, of Lansing, and Milissa, 16, Robert, 15, and Darla Jo, 13, all at home.

Neighbors have begun collecting donations from Bath residents in an effort to aid the Orr's children. Contributions so far have been "really good," Elaine Hansen said. More than \$200 was collected between Friday and Monday at seven canisters displayed at local businesses, Mrs. Hansen said.

Along with Wanda Wilson and Sandy and Greg Ide, Mrs. Hansen has been raising money to assist the Orr children, and people in the Bath community have stepped forward to help, she said. "They want to do as much as they can," she said.

"Two other neighbors and I have a meal list so we're getting at least one balanced meal a day into the kids," she said.

The Orrs were active followers of school sports and activities, and regularly attended games in which their children took part, Mrs. Hansen said.

"They always were active with the kids in sports. They were very, very nice people. You couldn't have asked for a nicer couple, and I think that's the opinion of everyone," Mrs. Hansen said.

Donations have also been received from Russell Orr's co-workers at Fisher Body, she said, and more local contributions are expected.

Bridge safety being studied

Some Clinton County bridges are falling down.

One bridge, over the Looking Glass River on Babcock Road, collapsed Jan. 6, when it was struck by a pickup truck. But the 81-year-old span was not the oldest in the county, nor was it the shakiest, according to Clinton County Road Commission Superintendent-manager Robert Ancel.

"There are some older than that," Ancel said. "Some were built in the late 1800s."

Three bridges had already been closed when the collapse occurred, he said. The closings were ordered after a regular survey of county bridges indicated they were unsafe, he said.

Closed are: A bridge over Stoney Creek on Tallman, south of Parks Road, southwest of Fowler; another over the Maple River, west of Maple Rapids on Maple Rapids Road; and one at

the intersection of Lowell and Kinley roads, northwest of St. Johns.

Ancel says more bridges could be closed soon, and others either have or will have their weight limits reduced.

The bridge closings have prompted few complaints, Ancel said. Prior to its collapse, the Babcock Road bridge had been reduced to a two-ton limit, Ancel said. "No school buses could go over it. About all that could is an auto or an empty pickup truck."

A decision on replacement was expected at the road commission's Thursday, Jan. 20 meeting, he said. "It's a low-traveled road, and I'm sure it's inconvenient for some people, but only a few."

Replacement of the structure would cost about \$200,000, Ancel said. Reports on other bridges will be released soon, possibly forcing more weight limit reductions and closings, he said.

No summer taxes for St. Johns

Despite the fact that summer tax collection would save the St. Johns schools an estimated \$60,000 a year, the school board decided at its meeting last Wednesday to take a wait-and-see approach for this year.

School district Controller Rick Terres told the board, "This would be a good economic move for the school system. Collecting taxes in the summer would give us a lot more money up front, so we'd have to borrow a lot less. And it costs a chunk of change to borrow that much money."

"If we had summer tax collection last year, it would have saved us about \$60,000."

Nevertheless, board members agreed to wait before adopting a summer tax collection in the city, which is allowable under a new state law enacted Dec. 16. Public Act 333 allows Michigan school districts to levy their millage in two equal assessments, on July 1 and Dec. 1, or in one full collection on either date.

Board members and administrators indicated a desire to observe how the law works in other districts before adopting it for St. Johns. DeWitt and Bath are the two county school districts currently pursuing the new law, with public hearings scheduled for Jan. 24.

On a positive note, board members heard a report from maintenance director Bob Keisel which said the

school system saved \$8,000 last year because of energy conservation measures which were instituted.

The board also received letters from the Fowler and Fulton districts, inquiring about the possibility of sharing some programs. "They're encouraging the concept of sharing some high-technology programs, such as computer programming, which they don't have," Terres explained.

The board instructed administrators to keep an open line of communication regarding the shared-program project.

In other business, board members:

- Presented six employees with Certificates of Appreciation and a 25-year school pin for their 25 years of more of service to the schools. Honored were elementary principals Beverly Baker and Dale Knight, high school assistant principal Bob Spencer, community education director John Furry and teachers Bob Labrie and Marlene Hopko.

- Heard a report that the February state-aid payment of \$330,000 was being delayed. The delayed payments will cost the district \$2,500 a month.

- Scheduled a special board meeting for Jan. 20 at 8 p.m. to discuss negotiations with the St. Johns Education Association.

- Agreed to hire Hufnagel Construction of St. Johns to do work on the ceiling at Rodney B. Wilson Junior High.

Squires, and the election will be conducted by the nominating committee, consisting of Chairman Dean Ormsby, Dwight Nash, Jim Voisinet and Al Anderson. Anderson's and Gerald Becker's terms have expired, and both have chosen not to run for reelection.

They will be replaced by two of the following can-

didates: Francis Feldpausch of Dallas Township, Greg Huhn of Westphalia Township; Dan Keiten of Westphalia Township; Larry Nobis of Bengal Township, Ronald Phinney of Olive Township, Don Stump of Dallas Township, and Douglas Witt of Riley Township.

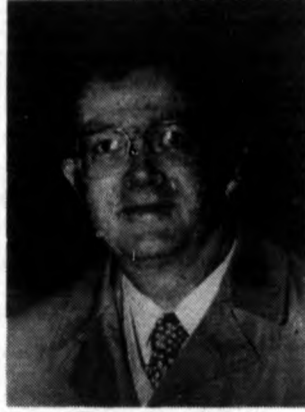
How they voted – and why

Tuna is not the answer

To the editor:

It would be nice to think that "tuna casserole" would be an adequate cure for Watertown Township's ailments. But I doubt it. If it were, I'm sure Mother Earth would have concocted the right brew years ago. Maybe you should find a good recipe for chicken soup, or maybe crow pie? However, neither your nor my taste buds have any real connection with what needs to be changed. How about if we stick to the facts?

Statements made by Watertown Township officials that they never endorsed the dumping or co-mingling of hazardous wastes are simply FALSE. If anyone doubts that fact, all that one needs to do is go to the township offices and inspect the settlement document. Be sure to look for the words "Type I," "co-mingling" and "Act 64" in the special use permit. It is believed by many that a model trust fund, administered in part by (landfill owner Jerry) Granger himself, to monitor the landfill or pay for sewer lines to the dump, would be a good trade-off for the community. Mr. Montgomery and other trustees thought they were acting with their eyes wide open. But obviously, many of the constituents — over 640 — strongly disagree.

It is said that one can choose to be either part of the solution or part of the problem. And in spite of the attempts made by myself and other members of People's Action League (PAL), including one of our attorneys, the Watertown Township officials accomplished little to solve the problems, by settling their lawsuit out of court. The settlement could have proven to be an exemplary enforcement tool, by preventing the further co-mingling of wastes in the 90-acre expansion, and by providing a framework for changing the landfill into a safer recycling operation.

Threats of cuts cause worry

The check is not in the mail for local schools next month, and Governor James Blanchard's first major decision in office has some local superintendents worried.

Blanchard announced he would defer about \$500 million in payments to colleges and schools in February, and has threatened the "hold" on payments could become permanent.

"I understand the deferrals I have ordered may cause severe problems and I regret that," Blanchard said. "Nevertheless, I am absolutely convinced these steps are necessary."

If the state aid payments become permanent reductions, the budget ax will cut deeper in some Clinton County Districts than in others, forcing cuts in programs and staff levels this year in some districts and next year in others.

Blanchard's effort to get the state budget back in the black will cost Clinton County's school districts more than one million dollars, but most local superintendents contacted last week say they hope the deferred payments will not become permanent cuts.

"There's no doubt it would result in serious impact on our programs," Bath Superintendent Ken Dyer said. "Chinese BOOKKEEPING" by the state could put jobs and programs in jeopardy, he said, echoing the sentiments of other county school officials. "We're in trouble. Bad trouble."

A district-by-district analysis of the impact of such cuts follows:

• **St. Johns** — "We don't have enough cash to cover the cut," said Rick Terres, St. Johns controller. But St. Johns could weather the reduction better than others, and would probably not have to reduce staff or programs, he said. Most of the \$330,000 February payment could be cushioned by the district's \$260,000 fund equity balance, leaving a shortfall of about \$70,000, Terres said. "I think we can get \$70,000 out of our budget without affecting people or programs."

Blanchard's deferral delays four percent of the district's roughly \$7.9 million in revenues, he said. But also lost is about \$2,500 per month returns on investment of the cash, Terres said.

The district's 159 teachers and 3,724 students will not feel the cut as much as those in other districts, he said, but further reductions would be serious. "We can absorb another blow or two from the state, but beyond that, it's going to hurt us," Terres said.

• **Bath** — "There's no question it would mean cuts," Dyer said. Maybe not this year, but next year for sure. It would put us in a deficit situation."

Bath's February payment of about \$200,000 would have represented eight percent of the district's total revenues of about \$2.5 million, Dyer said. The district's staff of 53 teachers could be cut, and 1,112 students would feel the pinch if programs are eliminated, he said. But Dyer said would expect no cuts until the next school year.

• **DeWitt** — "There would be significant impact," Superintendent Steven Garrett said. "When you cut that kind of money, you can't continue to operate without some cuts somewhere."

DeWitt's February payment would have been \$250,798, Garrett said, which is seven percent of the district's \$3.7 million budget. Jobs for DeWitt's 77 teachers, and programs for 1,736 students will suffer in the 1983-84 school year if at least some of the payment is not made, he said.

• **Ovid-Elsie** — "If this were to end up as a cut, it would really affect our total budget," Superintendent Dave Porrell said. "We'd have to make some cuts, but by the time we heard about it it would probably be too late to do anything this year."

The payment due is \$210,000, about five percent of the district's roughly \$4.3 million budget; affected by the deferral are 2,000 students and 96 teachers.

• **Fowler** — "We cannot take that at all," Superintendent Jim Andros said of the possible reduction. "That cannot be covered. It would put us \$74,000 in the hole."

Fowler's February payment of \$77,000 adds up to about five and a half percent of the district's \$1.4 million budget, and is 17 percent of the total state aid received by Fowler, Andros said. The cut would wipe out the \$3,000 balance budgeted in reserve at the end of the school year, and leave the district with \$74,000 to make up in cuts or with additional millage, he explained.

"We're in a position with zero fund balance, and we depend on every single dollar that's coming in," Andros said. If the deferral became permanent, he said, mid-year cuts in programs might be made yet this school year.

• **Pewamo-Westphalia** — "We'd either have to increase our millage or make some cuts," Superintendent Roy Thelen said. "There's no way we can make that kind of cut in mid year."

Thelen said the February payment to finance salaries for the district's 40 teachers and programs for 832 students amounted to \$60,000 — about 3.5 percent of the district's roughly \$1.7 million budget.

New program will analyze county's health

You're a working-age resident of Clinton County and you're not sure what kind of health risks you may be running. Is your diet increasing your chance of getting heart disease? Are you getting enough exercise? How does your health compare with the rest of the population?

Well, thanks to a new program offered by the Mid-Michigan District Health Department, there is now somewhere to turn for the answers. After seven years of trying, the Health Department has finally secured funds for a program known as the Health Education Risk Reduction (HERR) Project.

"There are about 100 premature deaths in Clinton County every year," said Dr. Bill Thar, Medical Director of the Health Department. "The major cause of death in these cases is chronic disease — heart disease, stroke, cancer — and in most cases, these are preventable diseases.

"This program is designed to let us look at each individual person and give a personalized analysis designed to help each person identify the risks in their environment and in their heredity, so they can take preventive measures."

The new program, which should begin in mid-spring, will be operated by a nurse educator and clerk-typist. When a person comes in to be analyzed, he or she will fill out a health history form. Following that, the nurse

educator will conduct a number of tests on the person to determine potential health risks.

These tests include a test for body fat to determine best body weight, a diet evaluation, hearing and vision screening, tests for several types of cancer and a check on serum cholesterol in the body. All of the information will then be fed into a computer, which will provide a personal printout for each client.

"The best thing about this is, the system will be quantified," said Joseph Latoff of the Health Department. "This means that a numerical value will be applied to each aspect of the person's fitness. This will allow the person to check himself against others in the population, and it will also let him see a numerical change when he comes back for another visit."

Meaning, if a person has a high number on his cholesterol check the first time and then changes his diet, he can see if the number is lower the next time he is checked.

Once a person is examined and health risks are located, the nurse educator will then refer the person to an existing community organization designed to deal with that problem, or develop a personalized program for the individual.

"For example, if a person needs to cut down on smoking, we can direct him to a program in the community which helps people stop smoking," Latoff said. "This project is going to take input and support from many groups in the community."

Thar said the program is unique — one of only a few in the country. "There is a similar program in Marquette County," he said, "and also in Minneapolis, Pennsylvania and at Stanford University in California."

The group of people targeted by the project are those in the 18-60 age range. "We have other programs designed for children and senior citizens," Thar said. "Actually, this is the age group we've missed in the past."

Funding for HERR will be coming from two grants, although the Health Department hopes it will become self-sufficient in the near future. The Center for Disease Control in Atlanta gave \$50,000 to fund the nurse educator, while the State Health Department granted \$12,500 for the clerk-typist. Latoff is currently conducting interviews to fill the two positions.

Persons interested in the HERR project should send a postcard to the Health Department at 306 Elm St. in St. Johns. Once the program starts, there will be a minor \$10-20 charge to cover the cost of tests, Thar said.

"We're very excited about this," Latoff said. "It's something we've been working on for seven years now."

The win was especially important for Smith's team, due to the fact that LCC has been the only team this year to beat P-W.

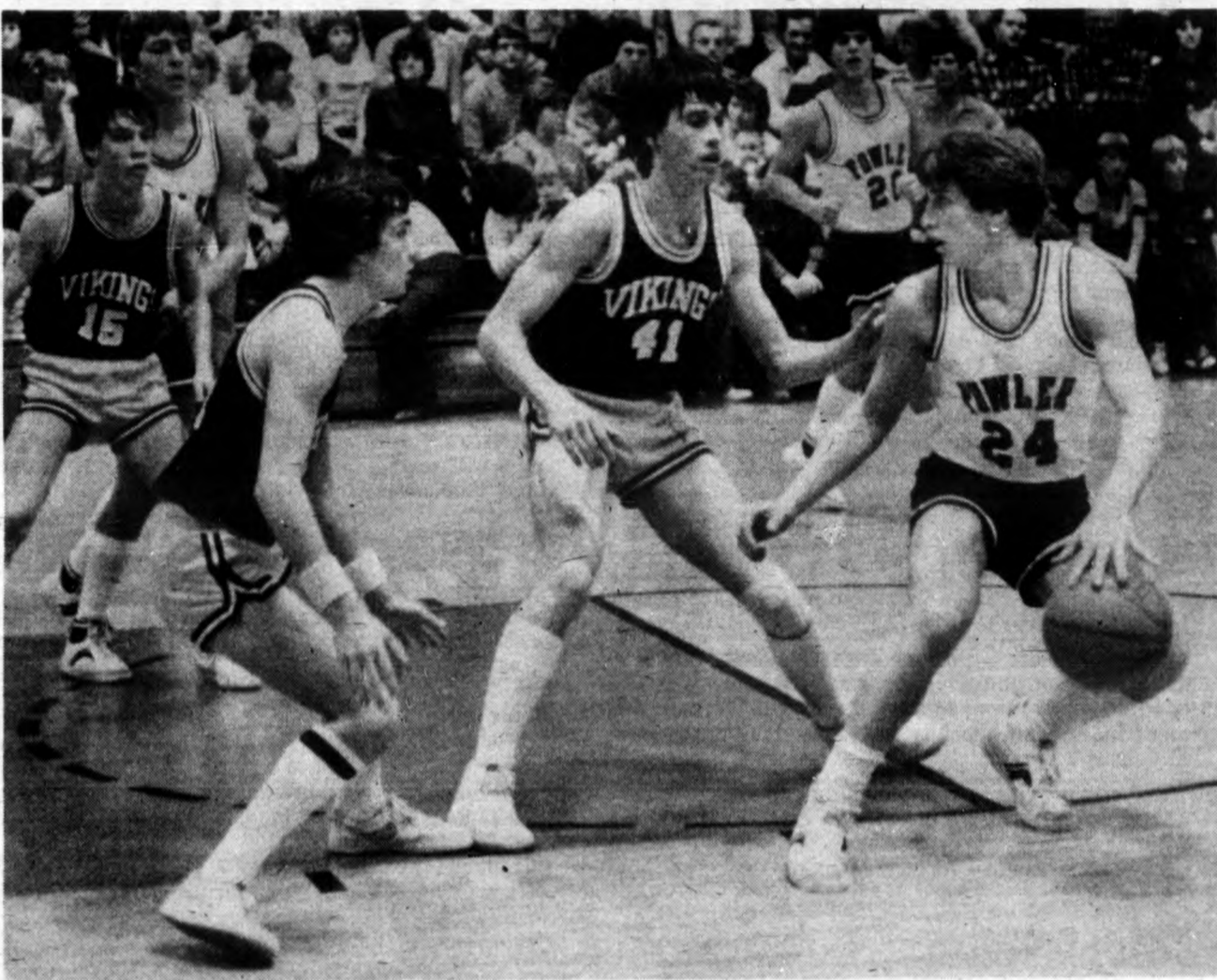
Jan. 14 — Fowler 66, Potterville 48: For a time last Friday night, it was hard to tell which team was big, bad Fowler and which was little old Potterville.

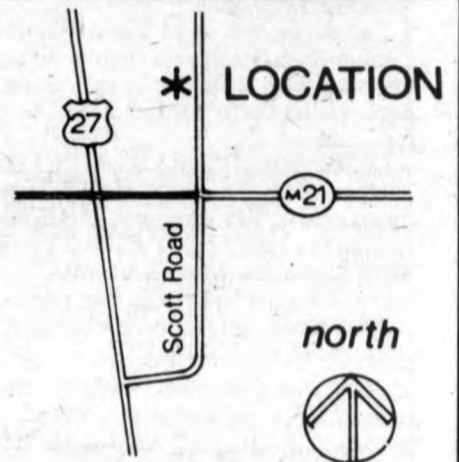

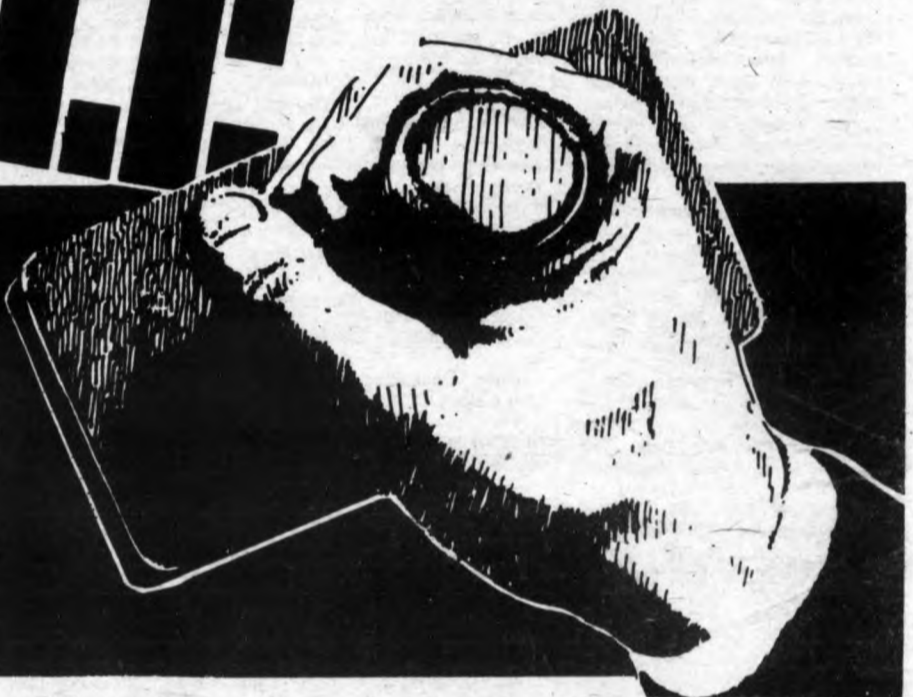

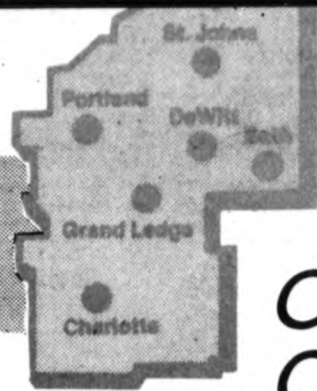
