Congleton: 'I've had it'

"Disappointed, disillusioned, frustrated, angry — you can use any of those adjectives."

That's how Gerry Congleton feels about the St. Johns Board of Education and administration, and that's why he's resigning as president of the St. Johns Education Association (SJEA) at the end of January.

"As far as working with the board and their committees, I've had it," Congleton said Monday. "As far as I'm concerned, I'm up against a brick wall."

The problem, he said, is the board's attitude toward teachers. "Their attitude has caused irreparable damage," the nine-year St. Johns social studies teacher said. "All their pins and longevity awards are a farce when they say teachers are not worth a raise."

Congleton said the failure of teachers and the board to work out a new contract after several months of bargaining played a big part in his decision to resign. "Teacher morale is at an all time low," he said.

Board President Robert Craig and outgoing Superintendent Don Burns both refused to comment on Congleton's statements until they receive his promised letter of resignation and explanation. But one administration official suggested "off the record" that Congleton's move could be a negotiations ploy to make the school board look bad.

Negotiations are expected to resume Feb. 10, at the end of a 90-day cooling-off period agreed to by both sides last November, just prior to an SJEA strike deadline.

Congleton said his departure Jan. 31 would not disrupt negotiations, since SJEA member Mike Gehoski has been chief negotiator.

And, Congleton said, there's more to his decision than failure to get teachers a new contract. "The main reason," he said, "is that I went into this to do something with the district in the area of better public relations. But this board and this administration has made that impossible."

"We have gotten no positive feedback. The education association is here to help the kids and the teachers and the district, but the board has kept us from doing that."

Board members view the SJEA as an adversary and turn a deaf ear to SJEA proposals, Congleton said.

"The biggest area is in community relations. Teachers have an enormous amount to offer, but that board does not want teachers to be looked at in a positive way."

Congleton said all board members were to blame, and expects no help from new Superintendent Earl Gabriel, who replaces Burns Feb. 1. Asked if Gabriel would make a change, Congleton replied: "Not in my conversations with him. That would be political suicide for him to do so."

Refusing to comment on Congleton's remarks, Craig cited a "media freeze" imposed on both sides during the cooling-off period by state mediator Ed Connors.

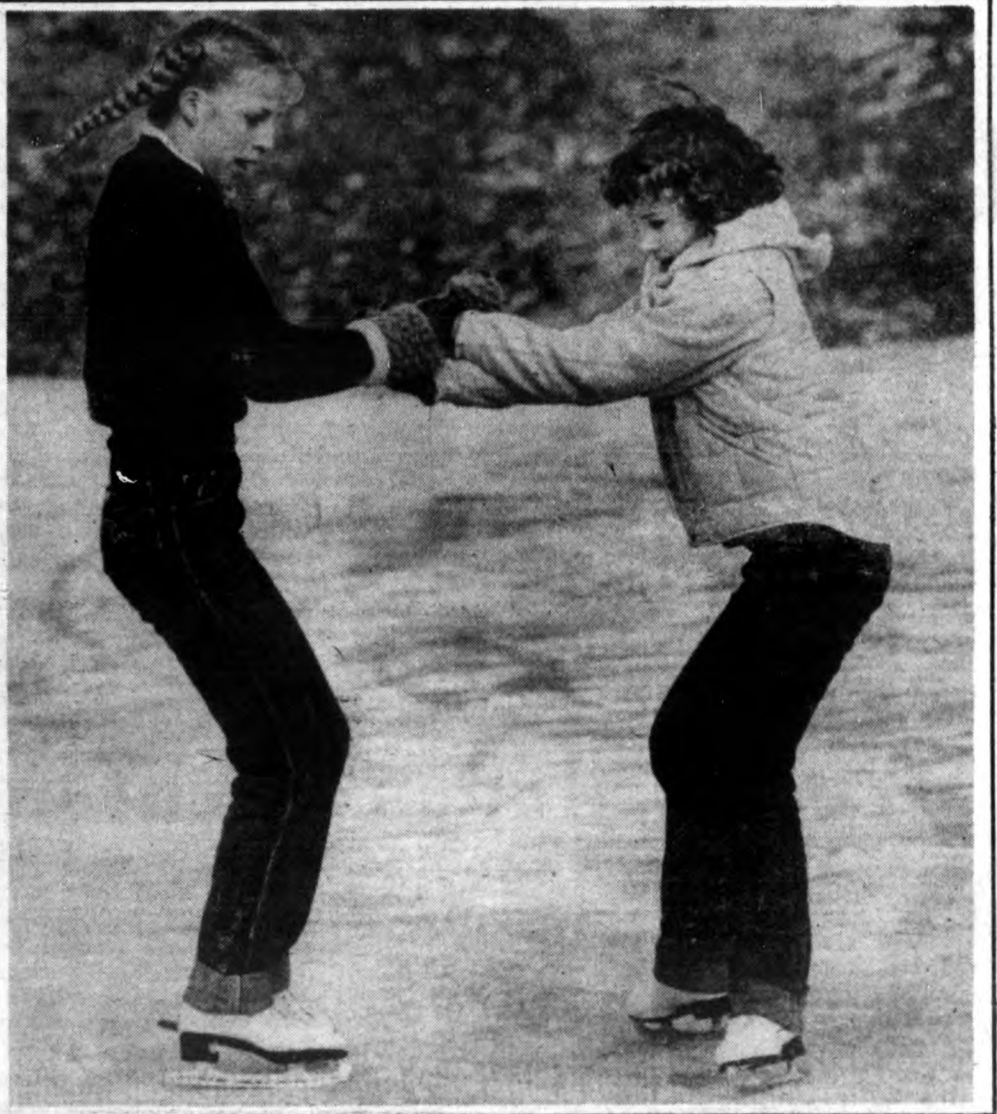
Board members, Gabriel and administrator Gordon Vandemark met with Connors Friday, Jan. 21, Craig said, and Connors was expected to meet with teacher representatives this week to see if either side had shifted positions.

But Congleton said no movement had been made, and teachers are no closer to having a contract now than when negotiations began last summer.

DeWitt teachers and Bath teachers, both members of the Ingham County Education Association along with St. Johns, have settled their contracts, and Congleton said SJEA members hope the settlements will help break the local deadlock.

He blamed part of the delay on lack of public support for St. Johns teachers, which he blames on the board's attitude. Public backing for teachers was instrumental in settlement of DeWitt teachers' strike recently, he said.

Recall didn't leave quorum

When four members of the Watertown Township Board were recalled last week, it created a unique problem. Because so many board members were ousted, it failed to leave a quorum on the board.

"If they only recalled three members, that would have left a quorum," explained Clinton County Clerk Jane Swanchara. "Normally, the remaining board members would appoint people to fill in on an interim basis. But since there isn't a quorum left, this is a unique situation. They can't appoint interim replacements."

To help fill the vacancies until an election can be held, Mrs. Swanchara sent a letter to Gov. James Blanchard asking him to appoint people to fill the spots.

"The governor has the prerogative to make temporary replacements," Mrs. Swanchara said. "We should know soon what he will choose to do. I just hope that at least a clerk will be appointed soon. They'll need a clerk to run the next election, because I can only do recall elections there."

In any event, an election should be held in late March, 60 days after the election results are certified, to fill the vacancies. The four members who were recalled are Supervisor Vaughn Montgomery, Clerk Mildred

McDonough and trustees John Fox and Forest Shipman. "The board of canvassers certified the election and I sent notices to the four board members," Mrs. Swanchara said. "Technically, they are out of office when they receive those notices."

According to Barbara Boughton, a member of the Watertown Citizens Recall Committee, the committee has not started looking for board replacements yet.

"We haven't had a meeting on that yet," Mrs. Boughton said. "Our main goal was just to get the four board members recalled. We just felt we deserved a little time off after the election."

The process of filling the seats permanently is to have each political party nominate a candidate for each vacancy. "I sent letters to each of the party headquarters," Mrs. Swanchara said. "I assume they'll have the precinct delegates from Watertown pick the candidates."

Last week's election was also a landmark of sorts, because it's the first successful recall Mrs. Swanchara can remember in Clinton County. "I've been working here for 15 years, and they've never had a successful recall," she said. "Or at least there has never been one in which so many people were removed at one time. That's the unique thing about it."

Penny saved is penny forgotten

Believe it or not, some people have money collecting dust in local banks and don't even know it.

Most of the money, more than \$10,000, is left over from abandoned bank accounts, according to Clinton County Public Administrator Harold Reed.

"People close out bank accounts and forget about them, or withdraw the money and the bank adds interest in later," Reed said. "The amounts range from two cents to just over a thousand dollars."

Reed's office and the county's Probate Court office have been flooded with calls since a list of abandoned account holders was published in last week's Clinton County News.

"We've gotten dozens of calls," Reed said.

"We've had many, many calls," agreed Sheila Brock, register of the probate court.

They said the average account ranges from just

\$3 to \$4, but many who call are interested in tracking down their lost cash. "Under abandoned property laws, money which has lain in bank accounts for over seven years reverts to the state," Ms. Brock explained. "The state must notify the people, and they have a chance to claim it first."

Such lists should be published annually, Reed said, but the latest is the first in four years, and the backlog has made the list longer than usual — several hundred names, in fact.

The same list was posted on a bulletin board at the county courthouse six months ago, but there were few takers, Reed said. "We got just one call," he said.

"I guess that proves a lot more people read your paper than visit the courthouse."

Those whose names appeared on the list can contact Reed's office, 224-7484, for details on how to claim their forgotten cash.

Election date set; soup kitchen offered

Renewal of one mill for police and fire protection will be put to DeWitt Township voters April 26, it was announced Monday night at a meeting of the township board.

A two-year, one-mill proposal was defeated 992-542 at last summer's Aug. 8 primary election.

Also during the meeting, Clinton County Board Chairman Roger Overway was present and told trustees an effort is underway to organize relief for hungry unemployed families and senior citizens in the county.

"There's getting to be more and more of a problem of

people without food," Overway said, reporting on a recent meeting of the county's Human Services Committee. "Many who have had cottages and snowmobiles in the past are now unemployed, and when their unemployment benefits run out they are ineligible for DSS (Department of Social Services) relief because they have too many assets.

"But on the other hand, they can't sell any of those assets because of the state of the economy. No one wants to buy them."

Overway said reports by DSS Director George Eberhard indicate at least one family a day is facing such problems while seeking hunger relief from his department. Plans are afoot to form food banks in

DeWitt and Elsie, he said, and a meeting will be held to consider regional efforts on Feb. 5. "We'd like to find out if we're eligible for some of the aid from GM (General Motors employees) and other agencies," Overway said.

One trustee asked if soup kitchens are needed, and board member Frank Mann responded with an unequivocal "yes."

"We've got a kitchen here at the township hall, a big room and plenty of chairs and tables. I'd like to see us get on the bandwagon some way," he said.

"I'd rather see us take our gym out here and set it up as a (soup) kitchen and forget our basketball and volleyball for awhile."

Overway said he would report back to the board on his progress, and said he'd keep in mind their offers to help.

Trustees also appointed five new members of their new Sewer Board of Appeals. Appointed to three-year terms were Wayne Miller, Sarah Gower and Dean Crane. Mann and Bernie Miller were appointed to two-year terms.

In other business:

- Mann reported on a joint meeting between parks committees in DeWitt, DeWitt Township and Bath Township. Discussed were sports lessons and leagues, nutrition programs for senior citizens, bike paths spanning the units, river cleaning and use of the Looking Glass River.

- Approved the first reading of a zoning change for R. Reese Sr., 15269 Wood Rd., allowing residential development of a 233' parcel.

- Approved a lot split for Cecil McKay of 15553 North East St.

- Set computer rental rates at \$60 per hour.

Cable coming to Ovid-Elsie area

If all goes as planned, residents of Ovid and Elsie can expect to be hooked into cable television within a couple months.

Cable lines have already been strung in the two villages and construction is underway on a receiving tower behind Ovid-Elsie High School, after the Clinton County Board of Commissioners approved a Special Use Permit at their Dec. 28 meeting for the construction of the tower.

"They're testing the cable lines in the city right now," said Ovid Village Treasurer Marie Scott. "The cable company has rented the Consumers Power poles for the lines, and they said they hope to be done testing by the end of January. At that time, they'll do a house-to-house survey to see who wants cable."

The company servicing the Ovid-Elsie is J. Dorn Com-

munications of Ann Arbor. According to Ms. Scott, the company has given no indication as to how much the cable service will cost.

"We've gotten a lot of calls about it," Ms. Scott said. "As soon as they saw the people putting the lines up, our phones started ringing. There is definitely quite a bit of interest in this."

The tower is being built behind the bus garage at the high school. "They've started building it already," said a school spokesperson. "So far, they've got the base built. They told us it would be finished in two-to-four weeks, and that they could start hooking people up by then."

St. Johns, which started getting cable two years ago, and DeWitt, which was hooked up last summer, are the only two communities in the county currently receiving cable. Bath Township is expected to be hooked up within six months.

Man killed in accident in Bath

An East Lansing man killed in a traffic accident in Bath Township was among the incidents reported by Clinton County law enforcement agencies during the past week.

- While he was walking on the east side of Center Road in Bath Township Jan. 23, Carl Frederick Otto, 63, of 16441 Center Rd., East Lansing, was struck by a car driven by Robert Bouck, 36, Lansing, Bath Township Police said, fatally injuring Otto. Police said Bouck lost control of his auto. He was held before being released Jan. 24 on his personal recognizance, police said. An investigation is pending.

Board regroup, hears of plans for needy

Meeting for the first time since losing four members to a new redistricting plan, the Clinton County Board of Commissioners Tuesday morning confronted a growing problem: hunger.

Presenting his report on a recent meeting of the county's Human Services Committee, Harold Martin told the six remaining commissioners efforts are underway to provide food to a growing number of unemployed and disadvantaged county residents.

"The major problem areas appear to be in the area of heating and electrical bills, and in particular with people that may not qualify for services from DSS (the Department of Social Services)," Martin's report said.

Board Chairman Roger Overway, also a Human Services Committee member, presented the same grim facts at a meeting of the DeWitt Township Board the previous evening. Although Clinton is luckier than many neighboring counties, the number of families facing severe economic crisis is growing, Overway said. (See story at left)

Circled more closely together to fill gaps left by departure of four commissioners — Robert Steinman and John McNalley, who resigned, and Walter Nobis and Robert Wood, defeated in an Aug. 8 primary — commissioners also were given a chance to approve a controversial agreement between the Watertown Township Board and Granger Land Development Co.

The agreement, which sparked recall of four Watertown board members last month, drew no comments and only one question from commissioner Richard DePond.

DePond asked how money set aside in a trust fund under the agreement would be disposed of if not used. "It would be split fifty-fifty between the township and a charity, the Granger Foundation," Watertown attorney Steve Schultz replied.

Board members voted unanimously to approve the agreement, clearing the way for expansion of the Granger Landfill in Watertown Township. The agreement was cited as a major reason for approval of a special use permit for Granger by the Zoning Board of Appeals. The permit okay resolved a year-long battle between Granger and the People's Action League (PAL) over Granger's proposal to double the size of the landfill.

Granger's proposal to open a hazardous waste disposal area is still tied up in Ingham County courts in another legal battle between PAL and landfill owner Jerry Granger.

Schultz said Granger has already begun collecting a surcharge to be placed in the Watertown trust fund, which is to be used for improvements at the site or cleanups if the local environment is contaminated.

In a narrow 4-3 decision, commissioners denied a change in the county's zoning code which would have allowed rural residential homeowners to place unattached structures in front of their homes.

Overway and Richard Hawks opposed the measure, which was recommended by the planning commission. "I don't think as a government we should encourage people to build in rural areas. Because of the cost of

roads and services, it just causes problems for government," Hawks said.

Overway agreed, and said such structure would not be permitted in subdivisions because they would be eyesores.

And Harold Martin pointed out the regulation could be used to justify building a pole barn bigger than a home

on a small parcel.

But DePond disagreed. He argued rejection of the measure would enforce subdivision rules on residents who do not want them. "Through actions like this we discourage subdivision development because we give over protection to the resident who develops a one-acre lot on a rural road," he said.

Collapsed span will stay closed

Babcock Road Bridge will remain closed indefinitely and another half-dozen county bridges could be closed to traffic soon, Clinton County Road Commission Manager/Superintendent Robert Ancel says.

County road commissioners decided not to replace the collapsed bridge during a meeting Jan. 20, Ancel said. "It was basically due to cost," he said, pointing out replacement of the 81-year-old span is estimated at more than \$200,000.

The bridge, which spans the Looking Glass River on Babcock Road just north of Ballantine Road in Victor Township, fell down after being struck by a pickup truck Jan. 6.

Another six or seven bridges in the county will also be closed if commissioners approve recommendations by an engineering report soon to be released, Ancel said.

Bridges in dangerously poor condition were identified in a regular safety check conducted by road commission engineers, he said, but will not be named until the road commission and local officials are given a chance to study the report.

Phone bill hiked

Phone bills will increase for General Telephone customers in Clinton County, thanks to a rate increase okayed by the state's Public Service Commission (PSC).

Reports said the increase was not as much as requested. General Telephone (GTE) was disappointed to receive only 27 percent of the increase asked for, a company official said.

The rate hike, which went into effect Jan. 12, is the fourth general increase in 20 years.

Rates will climb from 66 cents to 99 cents per month for GTE customers, reports said.

They'll always remember . . .

The Big Snow of '67

A real snow job hit us in '67

Currently in the midst of one of the mildest winters in recent history, it might be hard to remember what a really bad winter is like. To help, just set your memory dial for 1967.

It was 16 years ago yesterday, Jan. 26, 1967, when it started. At 9:30 a.m. that Thursday morning, the white stuff started to fall. Twenty-eight hours and 24 inches later, the Big Snow of '67 was over. But the digging out was just beginning.

The worst storm that anyone could remember had literally closed Clinton County. Impassable roads had shut the doors of all the schools in the county, as well as most of the businesses. According to the Feb. 2, 1967 edition of the Clinton County News, among the only stores in St. Johns which opened their doors were the A&P downtown, the Steel Hotel Coffee Shop and Walker's Cafe.

By Saturday, US-27 was the only road in mid-Michigan which was open from one end of a county to the other. The unplowed roads also produced a disaster, as a home under construction on Ann Drive south of Bath burned down. Because of road conditions, the Bath Township Fire Department trucks got stuck twice on the way to the fire. When they arrived an hour after the fire started, the house had been destroyed.

The blizzard also provided the scene for some heroics. Dan Beck and Mike Zigler of St. Johns traveled 20 miles through the snow

It started about 9:30 a.m. last Thursday with a few flakes. But it didn't take more than an hour before Clinton area folks began to doubt the weather forecast of "up to four inches of snow" that day.

With a light but steady northeasterly wind whipping it, the snow continued to fall, swirling first over bare pavements and finally turning them white.

The snow fell heavily all that day, and a foot or more had accumulated by the evening. Homeowners shoveled paths and driveways, getting themselves and their cars under shelter. They went to bed that night confident that the worst was over — it had to be over.

Only it wasn't.

DRIVEWAYS AND FOOT PATHS were gone Friday morning. Snow was still coming down as thick and as fast as it did Thursday. It hadn't abated all night. The wind swirled it away from the north sides of buildings and piled it up tight against the south and west sides. Six-foot drifts were not uncommon, even in St. Johns.

Only a handful of St. Johns merchants — you could almost count them on one hand — braved the storm and optimistically opened their doors for business Friday morning. A common sight was people walking home with sacks of groceries, and the A & P downtown experienced a big run on their stocks.

The Steel Hotel Coffee Shop and Walker's Cafe were reportedly the only restaurants open in downtown St. Johns Friday. And they did a surprisingly brisk business all day. People who did come down to open their stores or to do odds and ends work around the place had to eat, and not many walked back home for lunch.

AT 1 P.M. THE SKY brightened, and about 20 minutes later there was a definite slackening in the rate of snowfall — the first change of pace in 28 hours.

The storm was over! The result was 24 or more inches of snow on the level and six feet and more in drifted areas.

The world was white, and it was a mess. Stalled and stuck cars littered the streets and roads, both parallel and crossways to the lines of traffic.

Schools closed

SCHOOLS THROUGHOUT THE county were closed Friday, Monday and Tuesday. County roads were plugged tightly, making it impossible for school buses to get around.

In St. Johns, Tuesday was the seventh day this year that school had been cancelled because of snow. That won't hamper anything as far as state aid is concerned, Supt. Earl Lancaster said, because the storm "is considered an act of God."

But the St. Johns school official is concerned about the effect on the school's North Central accreditation. North Central rules say a school must be in session 175 days during the year, and after Monday St. Johns will fall short of that number by the end of the school year.

"ALL WE CAN DO IS ask North Central to forgive us," Lancaster said. St. Johns is presently the only school in the county which is North Central accredited.

There are no plans yet to extend the school year. St. Johns stayed in session all day Thursday during the first six hours of the storm. All buses left at the normal time, and all but one of the 22 vehicles completed their runs. The one that did get stuck was snowed in on Bond Road in southeastern Olive Township until Monday. Only five children were yet on the bus, and they had to walk home.

There were no reports of damage to any of the school buildings as of Monday. Maintenance men were walking in to them, however, to check on conditions.

Damage at F-M

FEDERAL MOGUL CORP. IN St. Johns had some anxious moments Friday afternoon. About noon employees noticed some distortion in the old steel trusses in the oldest section of the plants as snow on the flat roof began to build up. Heavy wooden posts were obtained quickly from a lumber yard, and with help from their men, others from St. Johns Co-Op and F-M production crews, the roof was shored up.

The temporary repairs have allowed Federal Mogul to resume production, and the extent of the damage isn't known yet, according to Plant Manager Ed Izkowski. It will be much less than had the roof caved in on equipment and parts in process.

"We had people here who really worked hard to pre-

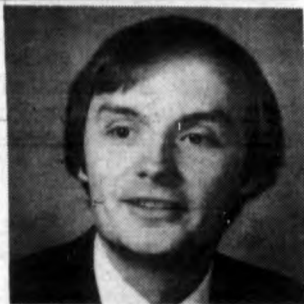

Green Thumb was begun back in 1965 during President Lyndon Johnson's administration as part of his beautification program. Funded by the Labor Department and sponsored by the Farmers' Union, Green Thumb has been in operation for 10 years in Michigan, and employs 700 workers.

Green Thumb positions pay minimum wage, and 21

hours a week is normal for Green Thumb employees.

Hearing delayed in Husted case

The preliminary hearing date for David Lee Husted, a St. Johns taxicab owner charged with three counts of rape, has been set for April 7 at 11 a.m., according to Clinton County Prosecutor Jon Newman.

The preliminary date was pushed back after Husted's attorneys filed an appeal, Newman said. "The appeal was denied — meaning we won — but it still moved back the date of the preliminary," Newman said.

Husted, who operates the county's only cab service, was arrested by St. Johns Police on Sept. 3 of last year

and charged with one count of first-degree criminal sexual conduct (CSC), one count of third degree CSC and one count of gross indecency between males. The charges allege that Husted had illicit relationships with a brother and sister who were juveniles at the time.

If convicted, the first-degree CSC charge could mean life imprisonment for Husted.

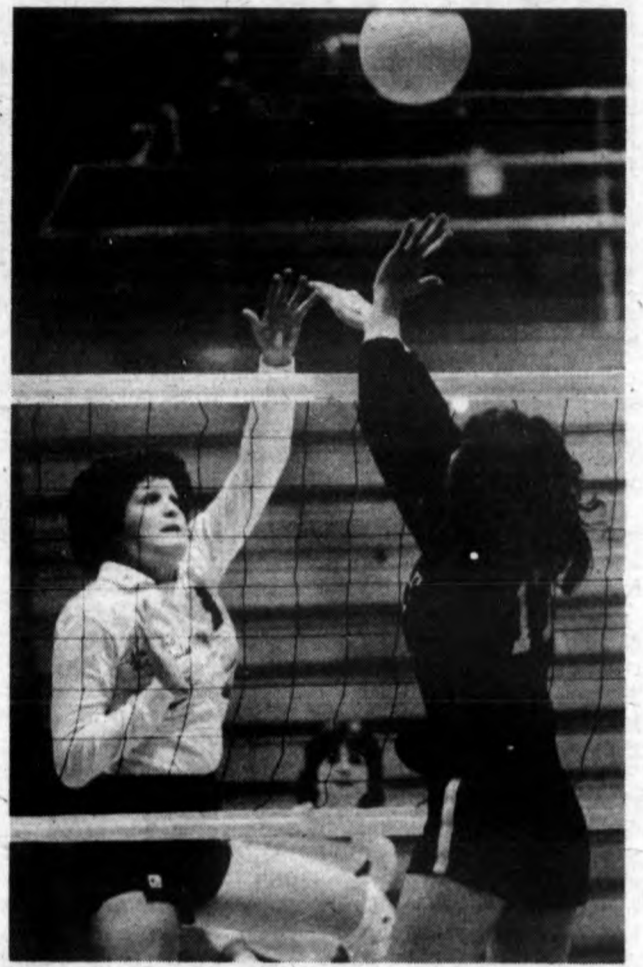

MSU-bound Moore turns green

When little Timmy Moore was growing up, he was probably the biggest University of Michigan fan in all of St. Johns. Maize-and-blue shirts, hats, posters, rugs and walls — he had it all.

So when little Timmy Moore grew up to be big Tim Moore, 6-3 and 210 pounds big, and became a football star, the Wolverines wanted him to play football for them. A dream come true for a life-long Michigan fan, right?

Not exactly. On Tuesday of last week, Moore folded up the U-M rug which sat on the floor of his room and threw it in the closet. He then went out and told his parents he had decided to become a Spartan. A visit to Michigan State the weekend before had convinced Moore to accept a full-ride athletic scholarship to MSU.

"I was really leaning towards Michigan the whole time," Moore said, "until I met coach Perles (MSU head coach George Perles). I really liked him. He seems like he knows what he's talking about."

So on Feb. 9, the first date football recruits can sign letters of intent, Moore will commit himself to MSU, making him the first St. Johns football player to get a scholarship to a Big Ten school since Dale Knight in the early 50's. Knight, who is now an elementary school principal in St. Johns, played on MSU's national champ and Rose Bowl team of that era.

"Tim is definitely the best prospect we've had since I've been here," St. Johns coach Joe Gonzales said. "We've had lot of good small guys, but he's the best, quickest big man we've had."

Moore, who played linebacker and defensive end for the Redwings, broke a lot of hearts when he committed to MSU. Michigan, Eastern Michigan, Central Michigan and a host of other schools all wanted Big Tim.

"When I called and told the Michigan coaches about it, they were very disappointed," Gonzales said. "They were all gentlemen about it, of course, but they were sorry to lose him without him taking a visit there."

The Redwing standout was scheduled to take a trip to Ann Arbor next week, but after he saw what MSU had to offer, his mind was made up.

"They really stress the academics at Michigan State," Moore said. "I like that. I also liked the weight program they have set up there. They told me I could get up to 230 or 235 pounds by lifting weights."

"I just want to get a little playing time in. I don't know if I can start there next year, but I'd like to work into a starting job in a couple years. Next year, I just want to get in some playing time and play on some special teams."

The decision to don the green and white pleased his parents, Bud and Pat Moore, very much. "They're both Michigan State fans," Moore said.

Through it all, though, Moore said all of the recruiters were fair and honest. "I didn't get a car or anything," he said with a laugh.

Against Okemos last Tuesday it almost worked. St. Johns fell behind by 16 points before losing in double overtime.

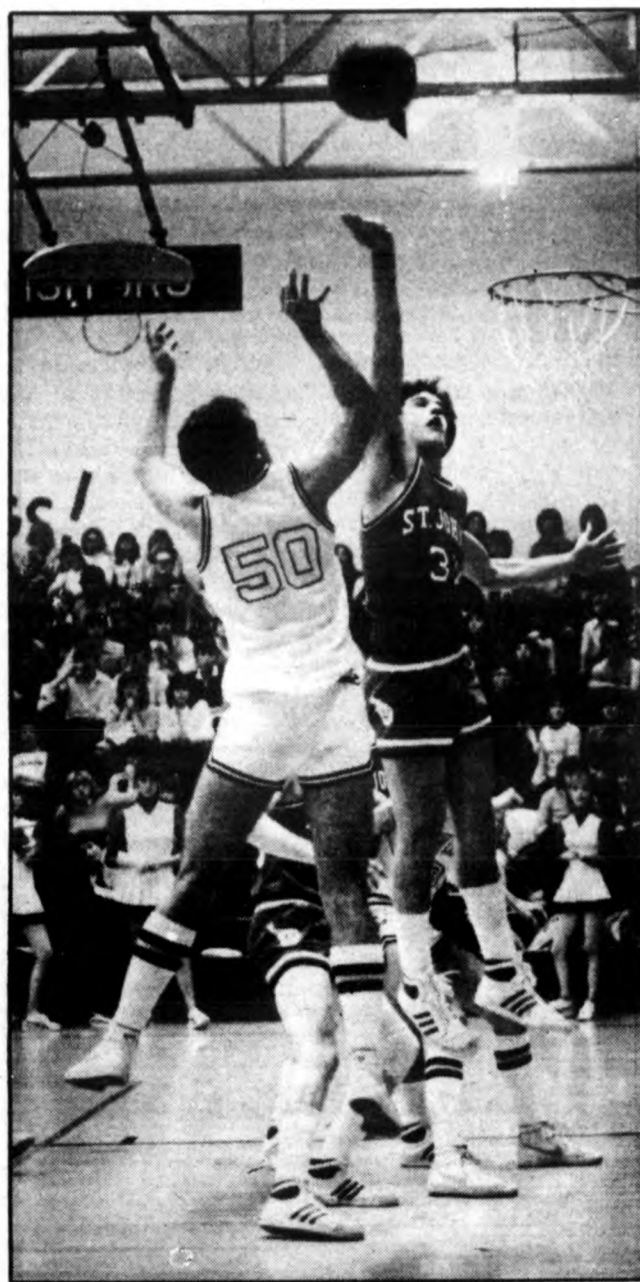

Following a decade of outstanding wrestling at DeWitt, during which several state champions arose from the ranks of Panthers, coach Randy Smith compiled an All-Decade team from the 1973-83 era. The team includes several wrestlers still on the team. A quick look at the 15 members of the All-Decade wrestling squad:

BILL DRURY: The best big man DeWitt has ever had, Drury won the Most Improved Wrestler award three times before he graduated in 1982. He is currently an assistant coach at DeWitt.

MARK KEENER: A state-qualifier at 119 pounds in his senior year (1979), Keener had a career record of 45-12 before moving on to wrestle at Olivet College. He is now an assistant at DeWitt.

JEFF GARLOCK: Currently a senior at DeWitt, Garlock's career record to date is 53-29. As a junior last year, he was a district champ and regional qualifier at 167 pounds. So far this year, at 185 pounds, he has won two tournament championships.

MARK SCHAAR: Before graduating in 1976, Schaar had a 58-41 career record at DeWitt. He holds the state record for Career Dual Escapes and also holds two team records. He was a three-time state qualifier and a four-year letterwinner at Adrian College. He is presently going to medical school at Michigan State University.

JIM SINADINOS: The youngest member of the All-Decade team, Sinadinos is currently a junior at DeWitt. With a career record of 65-11 to date, he was a state qualifier his freshman year and placed second in the state last year at 112 pounds.

TIM ELKINS: With a career record of 68-15 before he graduated in 1976, Elkins was a three-time All-Stater and a state champ at 112 pounds his senior year.

PAUL DESMITH: With a record of 79-39-1, DeSmith, who graduated in 1979, was a two-time state qualifier.

JOHN HUMMEL: With a career record of 79-64, Hum-

mel earned the state championship in his senior year (1980) at 185 pounds in what is considered one of the most exciting contests in the last decade of DeWitt wrestling.

TOM HENNING: Henning is currently a senior at DeWitt, holding a career record of 80-35. He is a two-time state qualifier.

CRAIG HUMMEL: Another wrestler who is presently a senior, Hummel is a two-time all-stater who won the title at 155 pounds last year. He holds the school record for fastest pin and has won the Pinner Award the last two years.

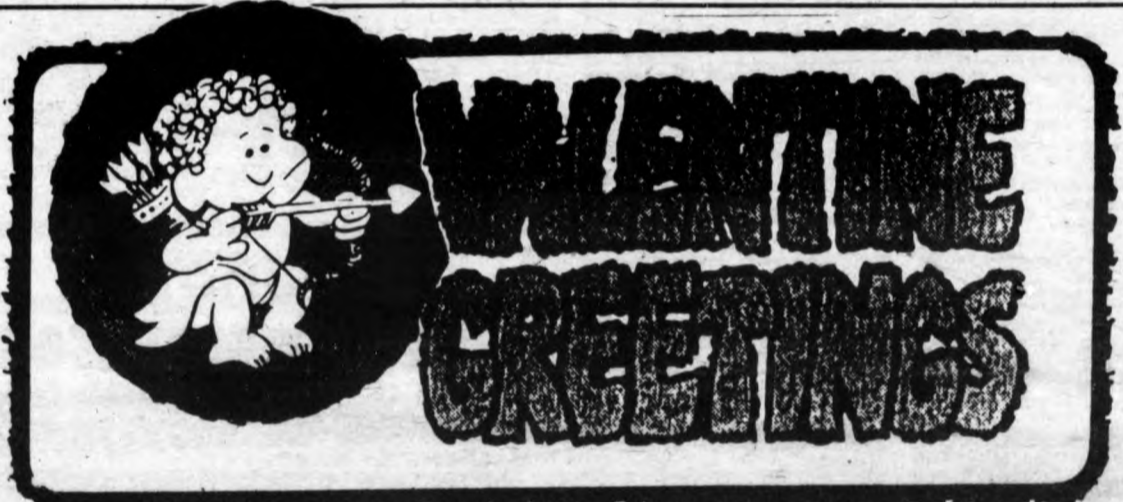
LARRY BATES: One of only three wrestlers at DeWitt to have an undefeated season, Bates went 31-0 in his senior year, 1976. With a career record of 114-12, Bates was a three-time all-stater, a two-time state champ and a High School All-American in 1976.

STU LEWIS: A 1980 graduate, Lewis posted a 117-29 career record, including a second-place finish in the state at 138 pounds his senior year. He is currently an assistant coach at DeWitt.

DOUG PEIFFER: Currently a freshman wrestler at Saginaw Valley State College, the 1982 grad won the state title at 126 pounds last year. Peiffer was a three-time all-stater who had a 122-33-1 career record.

DWAYNE SMITH: A graduate in 1978, Smith had an amazing career mark of 137-14, including a 44-0 season. He was a three-time all-stater, a state champ at 119 pounds and a High School All-American in 1978. In 1980, he was awarded Collegiate All-America honors. He has been an assistant coach at DeWitt for two years.

HUGH BATES: The holder of 10 school records, including most wins, the 1978 grad had a career mark of 140-11-2. He was undefeated in his junior year at 38-0. He was a four-year state qualifier, a two-time state champ and a High School All-American in 1978.
