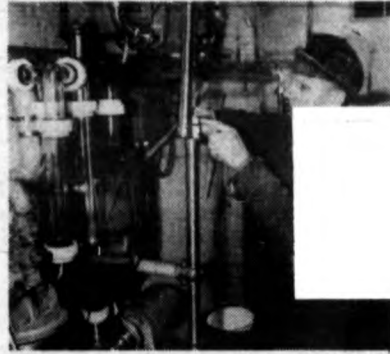


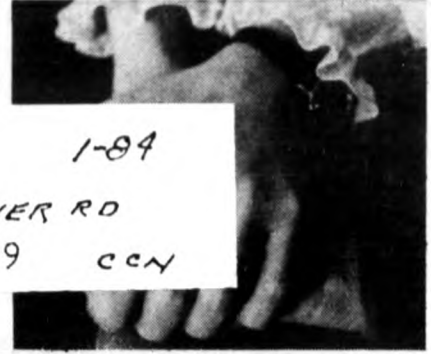

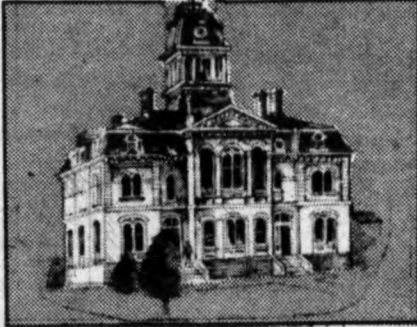

## Most districts to sit out summer tax

Bath became the first county school district to approve summer tax collection last week, and it looks like DeWitt won't be far behind. But the county's other four districts are taking a "wait and see" approach.

Officials at St. Johns, Ovid-Elsie, Fowler and Pewamo-Westphalia school districts say they'll wait until next year to take advantage of Public Act 333, if they decide to use it at all.

The law allows schools to split their tax collection into two assessments, on July 1 and Dec. 1, or to make one full collection on either date. Passed by state lawmakers at the urging of school boards, the summer tax collection could eliminate the need for districts to borrow money in the fall, saving districts thousands of dollars in interest rates. To collect taxes next July, school boards were required to make a decision by Feb. 1.

Bath board members approved the plan at a public hearing Jan. 24, and Superintendent Ken Dyer says it could save his district from \$11,000 to \$25,000, depending on how high interest rates are and how much local townships charge to collect summer school taxes.

"There were about ten people at the hearing, and after listening to our presentation some said maybe we

should go for all of (the tax) in the summer," Dyer said.

Some state districts have had to back down in the face of public protest over the summer tax, however, and misconceptions about the law have been cited by many school officials as reasons for waiting until next year.

"Many people thought this would be an increase in taxes, not just a split," Fowler Superintendent Jim Andros said. "With the timing of the millage election in June, it could hurt us."

Ovid-Elsie Superintendent Dave Porrell agreed. "We're not as informed as we'd like to be about this, and I don't think the public is either," he said. "We might win the battle to levy summer taxes and lose our millage in the process."

DeWitt board members also approved the plan Jan. 24, but they have reserved final approval until their next board meeting Feb. 14.

A light turnout of just five people at DeWitt's public hearing was "mainly opposed" to summer tax collection, a school spokesperson said. Board members unanimously approved the measure, however, citing a possible savings of over \$25,000 in interest payments.

Bath and DeWitt both have relatively low concentrations of farmers in their districts, compared with other county districts, one superintendent pointed out. And with an exclusion in the law for those who make more than half of their income from farming, that makes the summer tax collection less attractive to mainly agricultural school districts.

(Farmers were excluded because, like schools, they also have cash flow problems which could be aggravated by a summer tax bill.)

St. Johns board members voted not to try a summer tax levy, although Controller Rick Terres reported the district could save as much as \$60,000. Their reason, like Porrell's, was lack of information and a large number of farmers on the tax rolls.

"It would be much more practical in an urban area," Porrell said. "We need more time to see how other school districts do."

Public relations played a big part in the Pewamo-Westphalia board's decision to sit out the 1983 summer tax collection. "We just didn't feel we had enough time to inform the public properly," Superintendent Roy Thelen said.

The main item districts will be waiting to see about is the price for tax collection negotiated between townships and school districts. Porrell estimated the cost to schools could range between \$4,000 to \$6,000 per township. For a large district like Ovid-Elsie, that means a reduction in savings from \$80,000 to \$20,000, he said.

But Dyer, for one, feels any savings is worth the effort. "We really feel it's a waste of the taxpayers' money paying interest if we don't have to," he said. "When we have to pay interest, it's not going to kids or to programs. It's just wasted money."

# Expert offers guide through IRS jungle

"If your cup runneth over, have no fear — IRS will be there with a sponge."

Okay. You've got the W-2s, you've cleared a spot at the kitchen table, sharpened extra pencils, and you're ready to render unto Caesar what is Caesar's.

But wait. Before you descend into the Internal Revenue Service's latest labyrinth of regulations and tax schedules, take along a few tax preparation tips from St. Johns Certified Public Accountant Dale Abraham.

Keeping abreast of tax law changes can be time consuming, but small changes can make a big difference to taxpayers, Abraham says. He attends tax seminars each year in Detroit, subscribes to two weekly reports on tax laws, and also receives three or four monthly publications dealing with IRS rules and regulations.

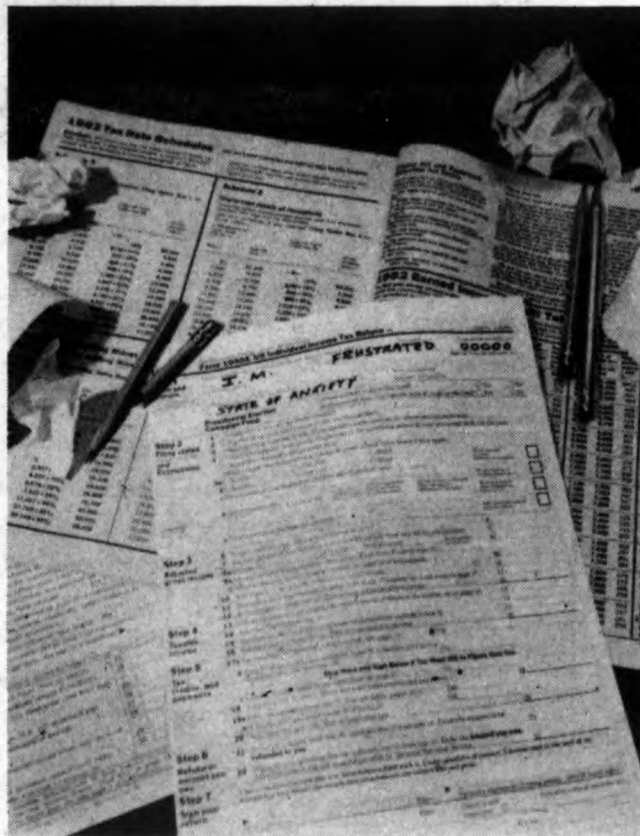
"There are several changes people should be aware of that could make a difference to 'John Doe Taxpayer' this year," he says.

First the good news.

"The biggest thing that's happened for this tax year is that people who are covered by pension and/or profit sharing plans at work can now also take out an IRA (Investment Retirement Account)," he said. "Up until April 15, 1983, they can still invest in an IRA, and it will still count as a 1982 deduction." The investment limit is \$2,000, which can make a significant deduction on tax returns, he said.

"The other really big thing that happened this year is that they're trying to be fairer to working married couples. This year, married couples can deduct five percent of the lower income of the pair." Abraham said a special "Schedule W" is required for the deduction.

The third major change concerns a new short-short form, he said. "For mom and dad who normally fill out tax forms for their kids, there's a new Form 1040 EZ. It's for single people only, for wages salaries and tips, whose interest income is no more than \$400.

"Say you have a son or daughter who works at Big Boy or McDonalds. They may have had taxes withheld, but don't owe any taxes. For their refund, this is a very simple, one page return."

Abraham also pointed out that President Reagan's 10 percent tax cut is already figured into federal tax schedules, so no extra work is required. Also, for the first time this year, those who do not itemize their deductions can deduct \$25 for charitable contributions.

"One other thing, which is the result of a trend which is more prevalent in our society, husbands and wives both working. The amount of credit for child care has been increased in some cases. The 20 percent deduction has been increased to between 20 and 30 percent, depending on how much you make.

"And in the area of business taxes, which could be important to many farmers in the area, the first \$5,000 of equipment purchases can now be entered as expenses. Before, it was required to be depreciated."

Now for the bad news.

"First, married couples were allowed to reduce their interest income by \$400 last year. This year, there is no interest exclusion and all interest income is taxable.

"One other thing. Last year, single people could earn \$20,000, and marrieds could earn \$25,000 without paying any taxes on their unemployment benefits. This year, the limit is \$12,000 for singles and \$18,000 for marrieds. If you exceed these limits, you will pay tax on some of the benefits, maybe all of them."

On the state level, Michigan residents will pay about 11 percent more on their income tax this year, Abraham said. "The rate was increased from 4.6 percent to 5.1 percent; which adds up to a 10.8 percent increase in our rate."

Another new state item is a voluntary \$2 contribution for a child abuse victim relief fund, he said. "This item does increase the amount you pay or will decrease your refund by \$2."

Confused? Just wait until next year, Abraham said, when truly "major" changes in the tax laws take effect.

# Woman killed; bar robbed

A Lansing woman killed in a car-pedestrian accident and an armed robbery were among the incidents reported by Clinton County law enforcement agencies during the past week.

• As she was walking on US-27 north of Jason Road in Olive Township Jan. 30, Robin Elizabeth Vogel, 29, Lansing, was struck and

killed by a car driven by Michael Gregory Long, 19, Parma, Clinton County Sheriff's Deputies said. Long was not injured in the accident, deputies said. The incident is currently under investigation, deputies said.

• A man described as tall and thin and wearing a dark jacket and tan ski

mask used a large-bore revolver to hold up Stage Coach Stop, Round Lake Road, Victor Township, on Jan. 29, Clinton County Sheriff's Deputies said. The suspect got away with a ring, a watch and \$240 in cash, deputies said. He was last seen heading west on Round Lake Road toward US-27 in a white vehicle, deputies said.

• Three people were taken to the hospital following a two-car accident in Bath Township Jan. 28. As he was northbound on Chandler Road near State, Wayne Maurice Thompson, 40, 8052 Chandler Rd., St. Johns, lost control and swerved into the southbound lane, Bath Township Police said. Thompson's car then struck a vehicle driven by Charles Maniaci, 22, East Lansing, injuring Maniaci and his wife, Renee, 21, a

passenger in the car, police said. Another passenger in the car, the Maniaci's three-year-old daughter, Christine, was unharmed, but Mr. and Mrs. Maniaci were taken to Sparrow Hospital, as was Thompson, police said. Police also said Thompson will be cited for drunk driving and having an expired license. Mr. Maniaci was discharged Jan. 30 from Sparrow. Mrs. Thompson is listed in serious condition, while Thompson is listed in fair condition, police said.

• As he was driving north on Webster Road in Bath Township Jan. 29, James William Stiles, 7151 Howe Rd., Bath, lost control of his car on the ice, rolling over in a ditch and striking a tree, Bath Township Police said. Stiles was taken to Sparrow Hospital, where he is listed in fair condition, police said. He

will be cited for driving too fast for conditions, no insurance and expired registration, police said.

• St. Johns City Police are looking for two suspects involved in a theft of fake jewelry from Trudeau's Jewelry in Southpoint Mall. Police said a man and woman entered Trudeau's Jan. 26 while the clerks were in the back of the store. The clerks said they'd be right out, and when they arrived, the two had fled with a display of fake jewelry worth about \$100, police said. Because the jewelry looked authentic, police suspect the two might have thought they were stealing expensive jewelry. The suspects are described as a white male, six-foot, medium-long untrimmed dark hair with a beard and moustache and a short, heavyset white female with red hair, police said.

## Man arrested in St. Johns coupon scam

It's hard to redeem a coupon that doesn't exist, several St. Johns businesses have discovered.

For his alleged involvement in a coupon-bookscam, Dennis Lynn Grace, 39, of Lansing was arrested by St. Johns City Police Jan. 27, and charged with three counts of larceny. Police said Grace reportedly went to 11 businesses in St. Johns last fall, telling them he was putting out a coupon book. Several of the businesses bought the idea, police said, giving Grace cash,

checks or merchandise in return for a coupon in the book, which was to be mailed to local residents.

One problem — the coupon books never materialized. So police went to Grace's home in Lansing and arrested him, charging him with one count of larceny under false pretenses, one count of larceny by conversion and one count of larceny over \$100. Grace was arraigned Jan. 28 and posted bond of \$9,000, police said. A preliminary hearing date will be set soon, police said.

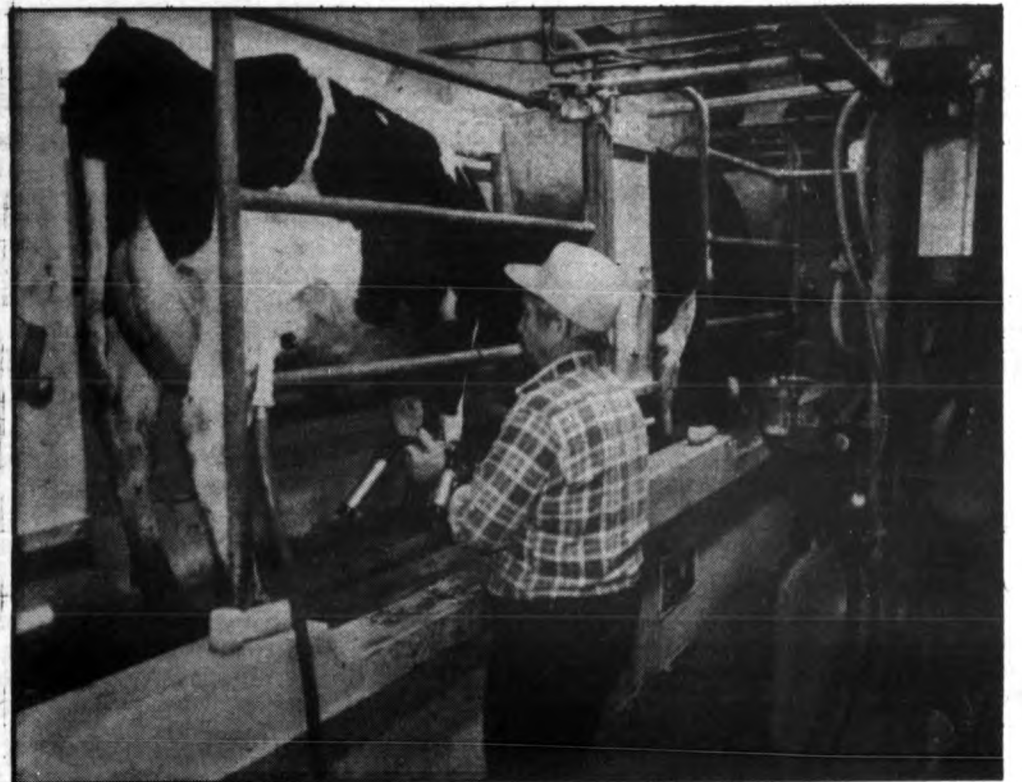

## The old milkin' parlor just ain't what it used to be

"I couldn't milk a cow by hand if I had to," joked DeWitt-area farmer David Conklin. With all the wonders of modern dairy farming to help him, Conklin's 120 dairy cows each produce 55 pounds of milk per day. In top photo, Conklin distributes feed to the calves in these hutches, designed to keep them warm. Above, cows wear a transponder around their necks, designed to tell how much feed they've eaten outside of the parlor. At right, Orvest Davis helps hook up a cow to the milking machine, quite a throwback to the days of buckets and milking stools. At bottom right, Conklin works on the plate cooler, which lowers the milk from 101 degrees (the temperature it is in the cow) to 75 degrees. A cooling tank then lowers it to 32-33 degrees. Conklin ships 6,200 pounds of milk every two days, at \$13.30-13.40 per hundred pounds, to a company in Detroit.

## Fowler women participate in march

# Abortion draws protestors

"I, myself, believe that abortion is a horrible crime and should be abolished," said Susie Thelen of Fowler.

Mrs. Thelen and another Fowler woman, Judy Simon, carried that sentiment to Washington, D.C. two weeks ago when they joined in a protest of the U.S. Supreme Court decision allowing abortion. Approximately 26,000 protestors from all over the country joined in the demonstration on the 10th anniversary of the landmark decision, Jan. 22.

The two Fowlerites went with a group from Grand Rapids, which filled three buses.

"The first thing we did was meet with some legislators' aides, since the legislators were out of session," Mrs. Thelen said. "We asked them to co-sponsor some pro-life legislation. There will be two right-to-life measures introduced when the 98th Congress convenes, and we asked for support on those."

On Friday night, there was a rally which drew a large group. "There were several speakers at the rally, and it was all very interesting," Ms. Simon said. "What amazed me is that there were so many people from different states there. I was really impressed to see so many people there."

Then on Saturday, about 2,000 of the protestors participated in a 15-block march down the Mall to the Capitol Building.

"There was a very good cross-section of people there," Mrs. Thelen said. "People of all ages and from all walks of life. There were even people in wheelchairs there. It was all very good to see."

For Mrs. Thelen, it was the second march she had participated in. "A group of about 45 people from Fowler, Pewamo and Westphalia all went together two years ago," she said. "I'm hoping that the next time there is a protest, we can get another local group together. It really is a sacrifice, though."

It was Ms. Simon's first time as a protest participant. "I went because I really believed in the cause," she said, "and also to see the city. I'd never been to Washington before. I had a very good time."

Did the protest have any effect? "It can't really be measured," Mrs. Thelen said. "There were a lot of media people there, though, so that helped. I think we got the message across that there are still a lot of people in the country who aren't accepting it (the Supreme Court decision.)"

# Red-hot Pirates sizzle Eagles

Jan. 28 — Pewamo-Westphalia 64, Fowler 38: Among the many signs which graced P-W's gym last Friday night was one which said "You've Got Another Thing Coming, Eagles."

Another thing? You mean there's more? It's doubtful anything more could have happened to Fowler's Eagles against P-W. The juiced-up Pirates laid it on thick right from the start, cruising to the easy win to keep them undefeated in the Central Michigan Athletic Conference.

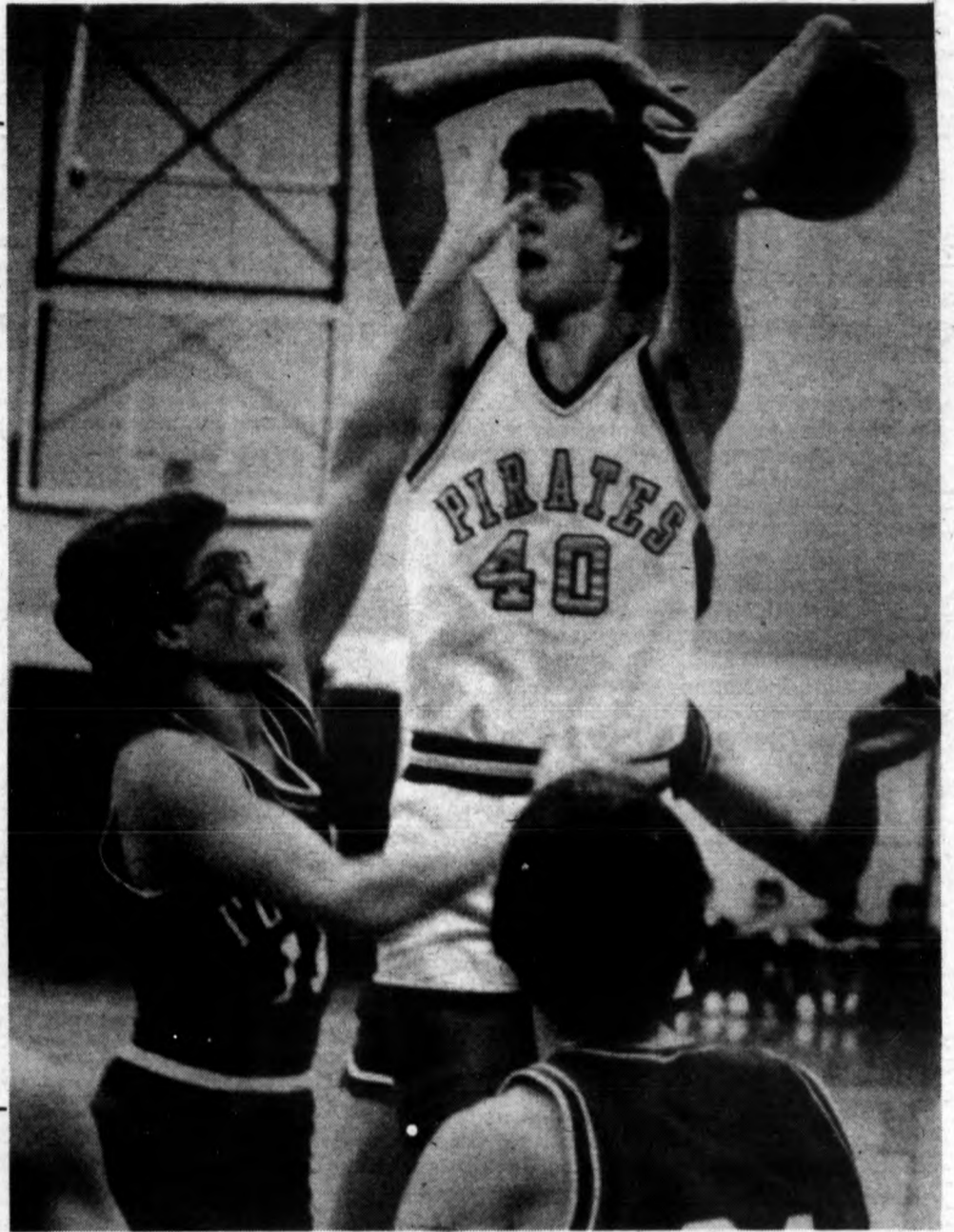

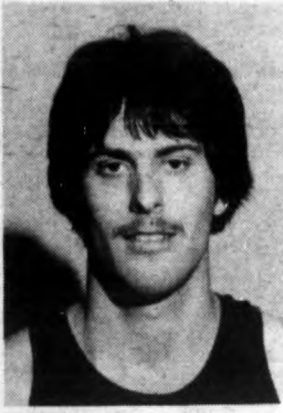

## 'They're super,' Mrs. Bates says

There are Afghans on the back of her sofa and pictures of grandchildren crowd knickknacks off the tables in her living room. But Emma Bates' home is "empty now," she says.

Well, maybe not all that empty. "I still feel his presence around me, and I always will. Maybe that sounds crazy, but it's true."

Emma's husband, Gail, died Nov. 22. The Elsie couple had been married 48 years when he was stricken with terminal throat cancer. "It is sad," she says. "We were looking forward to our 50th anniversary so."

Suddenly single at 72, Mrs. Bates talks candidly and calmly about facing the most difficult moment of a lifetime: the death of a loved one. "At first it was hard, and I still have my bad days. But I couldn't have made it without help."

"It helps to talk about it. Just knowing I can call someone and get some help if I need it... They've helped me in every way, with moral support, someone to lean on."

"They" are Jan Gramlich and Michelle Wiseman, members of Clinton County's new hospice team. Both Home Health Care Services nurses, they enlisted Gail and Emma Bates as the first participants in the new program last November, when Gail was in Clinton Memorial Hospital, shortly after being told of his condition.

"They were a big help to Gail too," Mrs. Bates says. "Between us, we got him to talk about it. He never would talk about it before."

"But he told us one day he was going to die. He wanted to spend his last time at home. That was his wish, and I made a promise to him that as long as I could take care of him, I would."

With the help of Hospice Director Mrs. Gramlich, Mrs. Wiseman, Gail's doctor, John MacDonald, and members of the hospice team Dolores Harold and Josephine Smith, arrangements were made for home care. Gail moved back into his own home three weeks before he died.

"I never could have done it without them. But we got his medications down really good to where we could control the pain, and he knew us right up to the last minute. I was really glad he was here. The grandkids and the boys could come and talk to him."

Emma says her two sons and their children will always treasure the time spent with their father and grandfather during his last days; a time of relaxed and loving talks, words of advice and, once, a walk in the garden.

Professional advice and care, counseling and help with housekeeping provided by the hospice team made it possible, she says.

"When Gail died, I think some of them (hospice team members) felt almost as bad as we did."

In the two months since her husband died, hospice care has continued to provide support and counseling. Emma still gets a visit from Mrs. Gramlich about once a week. "I've got to have someone to unload my thoughts to," she says. "I just pour 'em out. When she leaves, I have a good feeling."

"I think it's taken a little of the burden off of the boys, too, knowing I have someone else to talk to."

"We've been through a lot together," she said of the hospice team. "One afternoon, when I read the eulogy one of our grandchildren wrote for Gail, it was Janet who was crying and I was comforting her. That's how close we've become."

"I couldn't have done it without them."

**How did a hospice program get started in Clinton County?**

"Being a home-care nurse, when you're leaving the home of someone who is dying, you know you've only touched a fragment of their needs," said Michelle Wiseman, nursing coordinator of Clinton Memorial's Home Health Care Services.

"A bunch of the nurses got together and started talking about how we could do more. We looked at the hospice program in Lansing and decided that was the answer."

**Who can take advantage of the hospice program?**

"It is available at request to any person who is a resident of Clinton County with a prognosis of six months or less to live," says Hospice Director Jan Gramlich.

**What is the cost?**

"Nobody will be turned away because of finances," Mrs. Gramlich says. "If a third party insurer like Blue Cross is available, they will pay for part of the professional care. But there are other programs, like Medicare and Medicaid, and we're looking into grants. Cost should not be a factor to consider."

**How do doctors feel about sending terminally ill patients home?**

"We have had excellent response from the physicians we have worked with so far," Mrs. Gramlich says. "They have bent over backward to help us out."

## Quality of life is hospice goal

A concept of care for terminally ill patients which has long been used in Europe has found a home in Clinton County, thanks to Clinton Memorial Hospital's Home Health Care Service.

Several patients have already taken advantage of the new Hospice program in Clinton County, according to Hospice Director Jan Gramlich, R.N. (See related story)

Hospice services first became available in Lansing about a year ago, and the program is still in its formative stages locally, Mrs. Gramlich said. The hospice approach to care for the dying is home-oriented; whenever possible, patients are treated in familiar surroundings, close to their families.

The service can be provided at hospitals, however, and a special hospice unit can be set aside in the hospital if needed, Mrs. Gramlich says.

Though not yet approved, she hopes the service can soon be made available in nursing homes, also.

The hardest part of getting a hospice program off the ground is finding enough volunteers, the St. Johns and DeWitt nurse said. Hospices rely heavily on local help to provide the type of constant care needed, based on medical needs, not on ability to pay.

A drive is underway to find volunteers, and if enough are found, training could begin as soon as March, when volunteers will learn listening and empathy techniques. If all goes as planned, the program will be in full swing by June or July.

Along with volunteer trainees, the hospice team will include specially trained physicians, nurses and clergy. All hospice health care is provided by a qualified physician, Mrs. Gramlich pointed out, including prescriptions of medication and other decisions. But the main burden, as in many areas of health care, falls on the nursing staff.

Quality hospice nursing means being on call 24-hours a day, seven days a week, she said. Nurses must learn to feed patients and perform other tasks with patience. They must learn the patient's mode of communication, and must use unhurried, imaginative care with great attention to detail.

Members of the clergy, who are already qualified in most cases, help the hospice team by providing spiritual guidance to patients.

Families of the dying also need help, and the hospice team can help them cope with grief during the death of a loved one. Another hospice service, Bereavement Follow-up, provides counseling and aid to family members for as long as a year following the death of a hospice patient.

One of the biggest hurdles a hospice program must clear is public misunderstanding, Mrs. Gramlich said. Many, she says, mistakenly think hospices are only available for cancer victims, or are special places where people go to die.

"The primary function of the hospice program is to maintain the quality of life for any person who is terminally ill," she said.
