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Legal web is 'Catch 22'

Hazardous wastes are being dumped in the oldest, least secure Granger landfill in Clinton County because lawsuits have put the company in a "Catch 22" dilemma, a Granger official says.

Clinton County Circuit Judge Randy Tahvonen is expected to rule on one lawsuit soon, but his decision will likely be appealed; another suit in Ingham County is still pending.

Meanwhile, hazardous wastes will continue to be "comingled" — dumped with other wastes — in Granger's original 80-acre Watertown Township landfill, while a new, more leak-resistant landfill next door is used for less dangerous refuse.

Granger is permitted by the state to dispose of hazardous wastes in the old landfill under a "grandfather clause" type agreement which allows specific amounts of industrial sludges and heavy metals which had been dumped at the landfill prior to passage of more stringent guidelines.

In order to obtain permits to more than double the size of the landfill onto an adjacent 90 acres, Granger promised not to dump hazardous wastes in the expansion area, although it features more secure clay liners and drainage collection systems. Granger would prefer to build a separate hazardous waste landfill with even more layers of clay and leachate collection systems.

But Granger opponents, led by the People's Action League (PAL), have blocked construction of the hazardous waste area with an Ingham County Circuit Court injunction. PAL would eventually like to stop disposal of hazardous wastes at all Granger landfills, but present efforts are aimed at closing the expansion area and preventing construction of a new hazardous waste landfill.

"The judge (Tahvonen) asked us how long we would continue to dump at the existing (old) site," Granger executive Kurt Guter said, recalling a recent hearing. "We said we will stop dumping at the existing site within one construction season after we settle the Ingham County suit."

"We believe we're in a Catch 22. PAL says stop comingling, and we say we'd like to stop comingling and put in a hazardous waste landfill. But we can't because of the Ingham County injunction."

PAL President Jan Look had little sympathy for Granger's situation. She hopes Tahvonen will overrule or modify Granger's Special Use Permit which allowed expansion of the landfill. The permit was granted by the county's Zoning Board of Appeals following a lengthy, emotional battle, during which board members refused to consider hazardous waste disposal since Granger promised no hazardous waste would be put in the new landfill.

But under the company's permit, hazardous wastes could be put in the new landfill, Mrs. Look insists. And she says it's only a matter of time before the old landfill gets full, and dangerous wastes are dumped in the new one, too.

"They want everyone to feel sorry for them, but they brought this on themselves," she said. Mrs. Look said PAL will continue to appeal decisions in favor of Granger, and will also continue with the Ingham County case, which has been delayed by a change of judges — Circuit Judge Ray Hotchkiss, who lost his bid for reelection, will be replaced by Carolyn Stell.

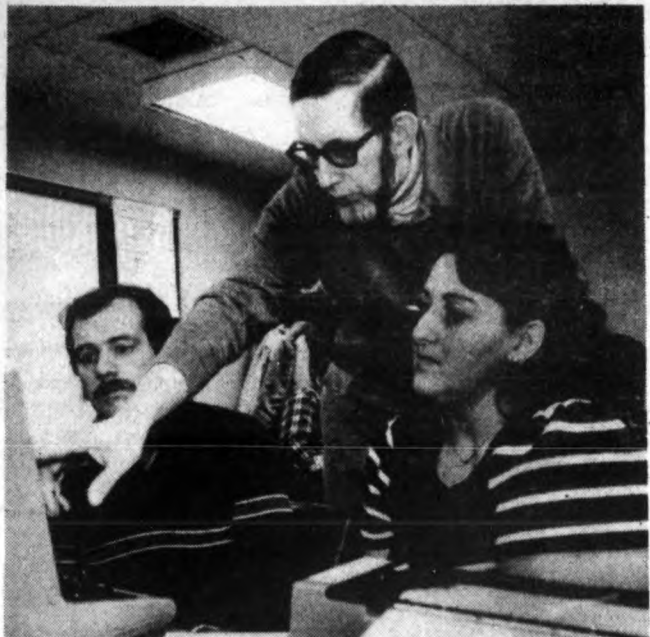
"PAL wouldn't have tied them up in circuit court to begin with if they'd followed the (state) law and submitted (plans) to a site review process," she said. Without a site review, PAL had no option but litigation to protect homes and the environment from Granger, she explained.

One lawsuit by Watertown Township was settled out of court — a settlement which resulted in recall of four township board members. Two suits remain, and could drag on indefinitely. "We just want to get these lawsuits behind us so we can handle waste more securely," Guter said.

But that's not likely, Mrs. Look said. "The only thing that could stop (litigation) is if Granger cries 'uncle' and says 'let's talk.' We'll be glad to."

Sales on hold

Clinton County will be turning out fewer carpenters and electricians and more computer experts next year.

The Clinton Intermediate School District's (CISD) vocational training program is preparing to scrap its building trades courses next year in favor of a new data processing course.

"We've put the building trades program on hold until the economy picks up," said Jay Johnson, coordinator of the Shared Time vocational program. "We'll offer a data processing program as soon as we can get final state approval from the state board of education, probably in March."

The reason for the switch is high interest rates, which have made sale of homes built by shared time students all but impossible. One such home, located on Taft Road in St. Johns, was finally sold in January, a year and a half after it went on the market in June, 1981.

The selling price of \$63,500 is also less than Johnson hoped for, he said. The CISD will make about \$2,000 on the home, which was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Paul Klein through Briggs Realty, he said. However, Johnson was comforted by the fact that Mrs. Klein is a former CISD cosmetology student.

Another house, built in DeWitt and priced at \$74,000, has not been sold, Johnson said. Sale of homes became so difficult, it was decided to build this year's home under contract, he said. Being constructed in Pewamo for Mr. and Mrs. Neil Hoffman at a cost of \$50,000, the most recent home may be the last built by shared time students for awhile, Johnson said.

"Up until this year, we were building two homes a year. Then one of our instructors, Dick Vitek, resigned," Johnson said.

Vitek was not replaced and the remaining instructor,

Ben Weiber, who retires this year, will not be replaced either, Johnson said.

Though jobs in home building trades are scarce, thanks to few new home starts, interest in the program has not flagged, Johnson said. "We haven't had any problem filling the trades program. In fact we had to add a new section last year. There are still a lot of students interested."

Johnson pointed out St. Johns has offered its own building trades program and may continue to do so. St. Johns may not be interested in participating in the data processing program, either, he said.

But for students in the five other county districts, the 38 trades slots will be replaced by 44 data processing slots, Johnson said. Students may be able to enroll for the data processing program as soon as March, he said, for classes next fall. "We expect a lot of interest there too."

DeWitt woman killed by auto

A DeWitt woman killed in a car-pedestrian accident was among the incidents reported by Clinton County law enforcement agencies during the past week.

Emergency device a lifesaver, inventor says

A device which could save lives was introduced in St. Johns recently, and is available throughout Clinton County.

Called the "Cry for Help" light, it's part of a program invented and introduced by Ingham County Sheriff's deputy and paramedic Trenton Taylor.

Taylor and his brother, Terry, were in St. Johns recently to explain the light and its possible emergency benefits for senior citizens, handicapped persons and others. The Cry for Help device is high-intensity strobe light, which is placed in a visible window where neighbors or emergency rescue teams can easily spot it. Activated by remote control, the light alerts police, neighbors or paramedics that help is needed.

"When someone's life is in danger, four minutes can make a lot of difference," Terry Taylor says. "The hospitals and paramedics are ready 24 hours a day, but the people in need of help are not."

Confused and panicked by an emergency, callers often forget to give paramedics or firemen their address, he explained. "This takes the guesswork out," he said of the light, which, like strobe lights atop the Lansing Board of Water and Light smokestacks, can be seen for miles.

Also, elderly or handicapped persons can be incapacitated by a fall or

sudden illness; unable to reach a phone, victims of such emergencies could die before help arrives. With the Cry for Help device, the flashing light could be activated by remote control, alerting neighbors to summon aid, he said.

Bath and DeWitt townships' volunteer fire departments are participating in the program, Taylor said, earning a portion of the profits from sales of the devices. Attempts to obtain cooperation in St. Johns are afoot, and anyone interested in obtaining a device can contact local fire department or police officials for more information, Taylor said.

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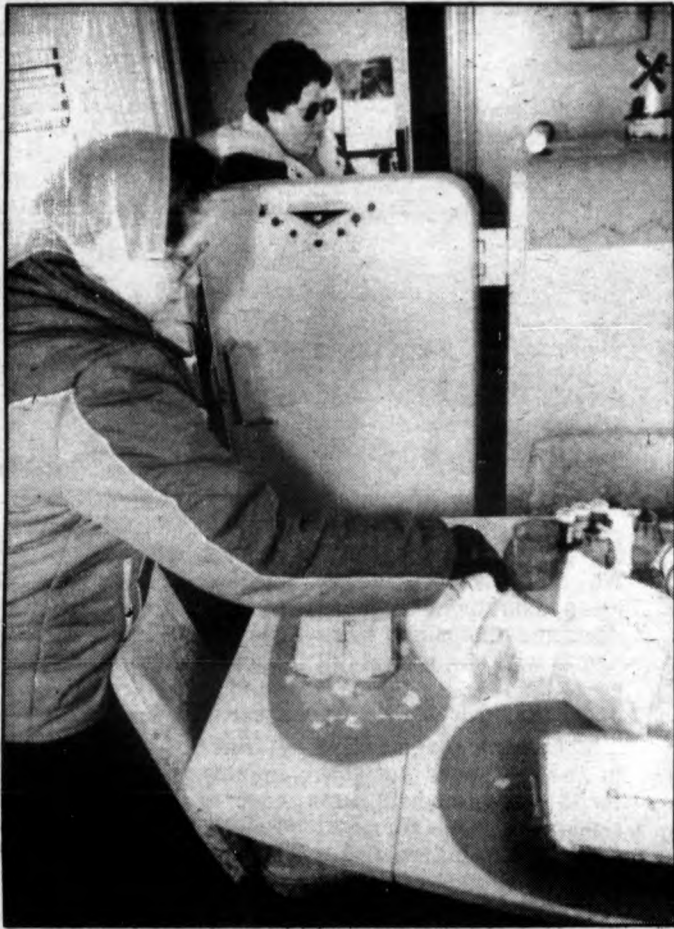
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Meals on wheels

New financing helps

The old '73 Vega just ate another seven quarts of oil this week. The windshield wipers only work on sunny days. The cigarette lighter hasn't worked since '74. Even a new paint job couldn't hide all the rust.

OK, so maybe it's time to get a new car. According to Clinton County automobile dealers, the time was never better. New 11.9 percent finance rates — down from last year's 16.5 percent — have created a renewed interest among new-car buyers, dealers say.

"Traffic is up considerably," said Ralph Dara, new car sales manager at Bee's Chevy-Olds in St. Johns. "I'd say we've sold about 40-to-50 percent more cars than last year at this time. And we're selling a lot more family cars. Not as many people are looking at the compacts. I think that the new interest rates, as well

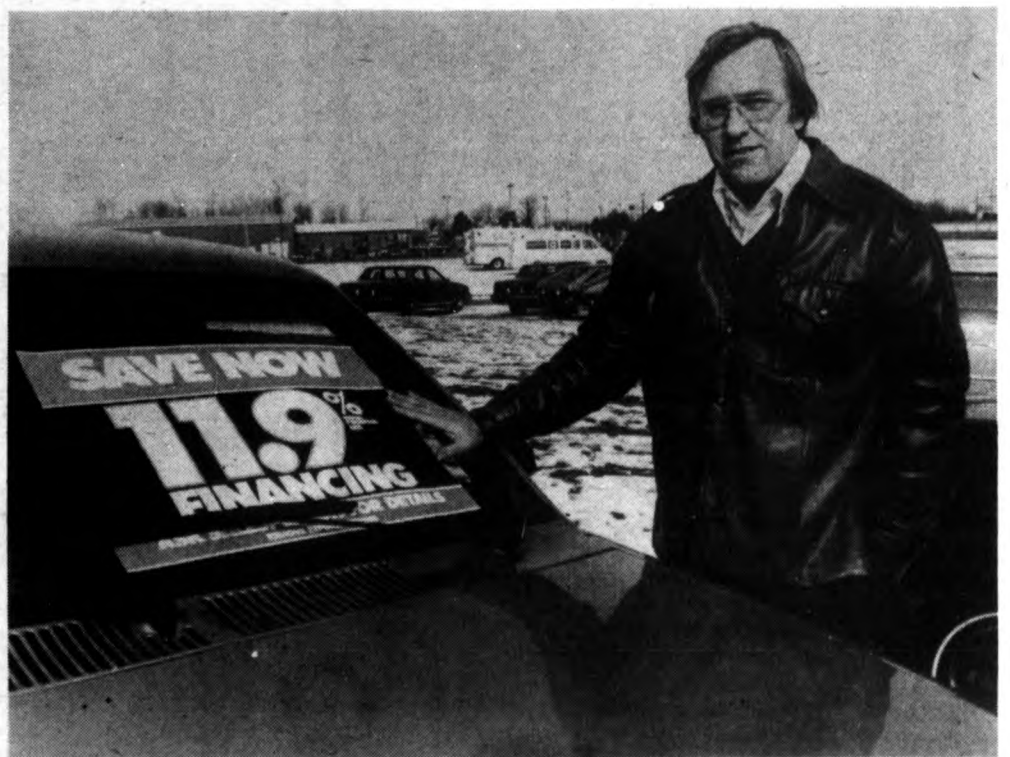
as dramatic improvement in gas mileage, are the main reasons for the sales."

The dealers certainly agree — the lower interest rate is the main reason behind the sales increase. "I don't think there's any question that it's helped," said Jim White, new car sales manager at O'Shaughnessy Chevrolet in DeWitt. "The new interest-rate makes quite a bit of difference in that monthly payment. People are also looking at a different kind of car now. We've had a lot of interest in converted vans, for instance."

Area dealers expect sales to improve even more in the spring, when the new line of '83 models arrive. "We're pretty optimistic about this spring," said Ray Courtier, new car sales manager at St. Johns Ford-Mercury. "We've had a lot of people come in who are interested in buying a car, and quite a few of them are waiting until the

spring." Expected to be among the hottest of the new models is the '83 Corvette. For the first time in almost 15 years, the 'Vette will be sporting an entirely new design and a top end of 140 miles per hour. Downsized, but faster, the Corvette will carry a price tag of \$25,000. Still, industry analysts say it should be a hot seller.

"We've had a few people asking about it," said Dara. "It's a limited market, of course, but among the cars in that market, it's an excellent car. I think a lot of people will buy it."

Other department managers are Pete Cantine, production; Robert Howell, circulation; Eleanor Smith, business; and Berta Stellwagen, classified advertising.

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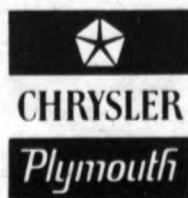


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Watertown election date set

The recall stemmed from a settlement the board reached with landfill developer Jerry Granger about his landfill in the township. The People's Action League (PAL), which has been fighting Granger in court, is supporting Davis and Clark, according to PAL President Jan Look.

"PAL is a non-partisan organization," Ms. Look said. "Pete Clark is a member of the PAL Board of Directors and Jim Davis' wife is also a member of the board. PAL will support these two candidates."



Craig draws Barnhart attack

St. Johns School Board Vice-president Neil Barnhart took over for President Robert Craig at last Wednesday's board meeting — and then criticized him.

Barnhart was upset at Craig for approving two mileage requests without bringing it before the board first. The payments Barnhart was upset about were one for \$37 to Jerry J. Herman and one for \$71 to Earl Gabriel, St. Johns' new superintendent. The mileage was accrued when Herman and Gabriel were candidates for the superintendent job.

"I just don't think Bob had the right to approve those without bringing them before the board first," Barnhart said. "We never said we would pay the superintendent candidates for the mileage they got coming up here. I don't know if we should do anything about it, but I just wanted to go on record as saying I disagree with what Bob did."

Craig was out of the country last week and did not attend the meeting.

The meeting was the first in St. Johns for Gabriel. In his first superintendent's report, he said his first week in town was spent getting to know everyone.

"I've now had a chance to meet the staff in all the schools," he said, "and I've also met with all the service

groups in town. This past week has been very exciting. I've been pleased with all the attention and consideration everyone has given to myself and my wife. I'd like to express our appreciation to the community and the board."

St. Johns football coach Joe Gonzales was also a topic at the meeting, as two letters of commendation were read to the board. One was from Bud and Pat Moore, the parents of St. Johns' highly recruited football player, Tim Moore. The letter thanked Gonzales for his help in the recruitment of Tim, who accepted a scholarship to Michigan State University.

The other letter was from Plas Presnell, an assistant football coach at Central Michigan University. That letter commended Gonzales and his staff for all their help while CMU was recruiting Moore.

In other business, board members:

- Authorized an energy audit for the high school at a cost not to exceed \$1,900. The audit will be conducted by Bauer and Associates.

- Heard a report from Controller Rick Terres that there is 51 percent of the budget remaining. "That's the same as last year at this time," he said, "so you can take that for what it's worth."

- Approved the first reading of a new non-discrimination policy for all board functions.

Clinton County boy scouts got a chance to learn about various aspects of government during "Boy Scouts in Government Day" two weeks ago. Mike Sample of Troop 573 in Eureka gets a first-hand look at a voting booth here. In all, eight scout representatives from throughout the county visited the city offices, police and fire offices, county courthouse and county jail in St. Johns.

Exercise course planned for city

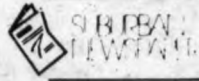

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Pearsall takes her jump shot to Michigan State

Sure, Ohio State had its good points. Best team in the Big Ten. Nice court which would make her feel right at home (it's called St. John Arena.)

And sure, Illinois also had a lot to offer. Beautiful arena in Assembly Hall. Good program. Good coaching staff.

But when St. Johns' Sue Pearsall sat down and tried to decide where to play her college basketball, Michigan State just had too many plusses. So on April 13, the first possible signing date, Pearsall will accept a full-ride athletic scholarship to MSU.

"I really liked Ohio State and Illinois (the other two schools which she had narrowed her choice down to)," Pearsall said, "but it just seemed like Michigan State would be the best for me. I like it because it's close to home, and because I know everyone there — the players and the coaches. Last summer, Sue Tucker (Michigan's Miss Basketball from Okemos) and I worked at the camp there, so I got to know everyone really well.

"And I know that I can get along with

everyone on the team. If I had gone somewhere else, I wouldn't have known if I could get along with everyone, but at Michigan State, I'm sure. And I also felt I would be able to play more than I would have at Ohio State, for instance."

Pearsall's decision to wear the green and white makes it a clean sweep of St. Johns' top athletes for MSU. Football All-Stater Tim Moore accepted a scholarship to State last month.

"I've always been a Michigan State fan. I never liked Michigan — except in football," Pearsall said, adding very quickly, "but not anymore. I'm going to have to root for State now, because they've got Timmy."

The coaches at MSU, who are not allowed to comment on recruits until after the signing date, would only say that Pearsall is the first high school senior to verbally commit to attend the East Lansing campus. Tucker, among others, are also high on MSU's list.

"I haven't really talked to her (Tucker) about where she's going to school," Pearsall said. "I hope we get her, though."

At St. Johns, Pearsall racked up every honor imaginable, including two years on

the first-team All-State squad. The most prolific scorer in the school's history, the 5-10 guard scored over 1,100 points in her four-year career. As a senior, she averaged 21.3 points and eight rebounds a contest, with a game-high of 44 points.

At State, she'll be put in as a guard or forward. "I'd much rather play on a wing (guard)," Pearsall said. "I like to be taller than my opponent. To be honest, I think I'm too small to play forward."

Wherever she plays, chances are good the versatile Pearsall will make an immediate impact at MSU. The Spartans are currently 6-12 overall, 2-7 and tied for seventh in the Big Ten.

"They're graduating three starters this year," she said. "I don't know if I can start right away, but I'd just like to get in some playing time and look good when I'm out there."

On the academic side, Pearsall is looking to criminal justice as a possible major. "It just sounds like fun to me," she said. "I can see myself doing something like that. I'm not totally sure, though. I'm just going to take classes in a lot of different areas and see what I like."

RESOLUTION

**ESTABLISHING TOWNSHIP
PLANNING COMMISSION**

WHEREAS, the Township Board of Dallas Township, Clinton County, Michigan desires to proceed under the terms and provisions of Michigan Public Act 168 of 1959, as amended, The Township Planning Act, and create thereunder a planning commission for said Township.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

1. The Township Board does hereby create a Township Planning Commission consisting of 7 qualified electors and property owners of the Township, under the authority of and subject to the powers, duties, and limitations provided in Michigan Public Act 168 of 1959, as amended, and further subject to the terms and conditions of the within Resolution and any amendments thereto, which might hereafter be adopted.

2. The members of the Township Planning Commission shall be appointed by the Supervisor of the Township, with the approval of the Township Board for terms of three years each, except that of the members first appointed, one-third shall serve for one year, one-third for two years, and one-third for three years. Successors shall be appointed no more than one month after the term of the preceding commission member has expired. Vacancies shall be filled for the remainder of the term by action of the Township Board.

3. The members first appointed to the Township Planning Commission shall be appointed not sooner than 60 days following the publication of the within Resolution and shall be representative of major interests as they exist in the Township, such as agriculture, recreation, education, public health, government, commerce, transportation and industry. One member of the Township Board shall be appointed to the Planning Commission whose term of office shall be commensurate with his term on the Township Board.

4. The members of the Township Planning Commission shall receive as compensation for their services such sum or sums as shall be determined from time to time by resolution of the Township Board.

5. After appointment, said Planning Commission shall meet to elect a chairman, vice-chairman, and secretary from its members and create and fill such other offices or committees as it may deem advisable. It may appoint advisory committees outside of its membership. The terms of all officers shall be one year. It shall meet at least four times each year, and such additional times as are determined to be necessary to accomplish the functions of the Commission.

6. In accordance with said Public Act 168 of 1959 as amended, said Planning Commission shall make and adopt a basic plan as a guide for the development of unincorporated portions of the Township, and conduct the necessary public hearings in connection therewith. It shall further make recommendations concerning new plats and other land development matters referred to it by the Township Board.

7. All final decisions of said Planning Commission other than those involving the election of its own officers and the adoption of its rules of procedure shall be subject to the approval of the Township Board before the same shall become effective.

8. Any amendments which may hereafter be made to said Public Act 168 of 1959 (as currently amended) shall hereby be declared to automatically control the activities and functions of the Township Planning Commission created hereunder.

9. This Resolution shall take effect 60 days following publication of the same in a newspaper having general circulation in the Township, unless a legal referendum petition is filed in connection therewith, and then at such time as the same has been approved by a majority of the electors voting thereon, at a subsequent regular or special election, the Township Board reserves the right to amend or repeal the within Resolution at any time hereafter by a majority vote of the membership on the Township Board.

10. The Township Clerk shall, within 10 days after the adoption of the within Resolution, transmit copies of the same to the Secretary of State for the State of Michigan, and to the County Planning Commission and Regional Planning Commission, exercising planning jurisdiction within the Township, and shall further secure the newspaper publication of the same as herein set forth within 30 days of said adoption date, and prepare and secure affidavits of the foregoing as evidence of their accomplishment.

**ORDINANCE NO. 345
CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY
ELECTRIC FRANCHISE ORDINANCE**

AN ORDINANCE, granting to CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right, power and authority to construct, maintain and commercially use electric lines consisting of towers, masts, poles, crossarms, guys, braces, feeders, transmission and distribution wires, transformers and other electrical appliances on, under, along and across the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local electric business in the CITY OF ST. JOHNS, CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN, for a period of thirty years.

THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. That wherever the word "Grantee" appears in this ordinance, it is hereby intended to designate, and shall be held to refer to the Consumers Power Company, a Michigan corporation, its successors and assigns.

SECTION 2. The right, power and authority is hereby granted and vested in said Grantee to construct, maintain and commercially use electric lines, consisting of towers, masts, poles, crossarms, guys, braces, feeders, transmission and distribution wires, transformers and other electrical appliances on, under, along and across the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local electric business in the City of St. Johns, Clinton County, Michigan, for a period of thirty years.

SECTION 3. No highway, street, alley, bridge or other public place used by said Grantee shall be obstructed longer than necessary during the work of construction and maintenance and shall be restored to the same good order and condition as when such work was commenced.

SECTION 4. All towers, masts, poles and other supports shall be set and all wires shall be suspended or buried in a careful and proper manner so as not to injure persons or property. The Grantee shall have the right to trim trees if necessary in the conducting of such business, subject, however, to the supervision of the City Manager of the City. The Grantee shall at all times keep and save the City free and harmless from all loss, costs and damage to which it may be subject by reason of the negligent construction and maintenance of the towers, masts, poles, wires and other structures and appliances, the erection, burial and maintenance of which are hereby authorized.

SECTION 5. The Grantee shall be entitled to charge the inhabitants of said City for electric energy for light, heat and power, the rates as approved by the Michigan Public Service Commission and at present effective within said City. Said rates shall be subject to review and change at any time by the Michigan Public Service Commission or its successors, upon proper application by either said Grantee or the City, acting by the City Manager, being made thereto, and the regularly filed rates as approved by said Michigan Public Service Commission or its successors, as applicable to said City of St. Johns, shall at all times be the lawful rates.

All bills for electric energy shall be payable monthly. The Grantee may collect the minimum charge as specified in said schedule. It shall also furnish and maintain commercially accurate meters to measure the energy furnished. Said Grantee, shall at all reasonable times have access to the premises of its customers, for the purpose of reading, inspecting, removing and replacing such meters.

SECTION 6. The form of accounts kept by the Grantee shall conform to the orders and rules of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

SECTION 7. The value of the property comprising the Grantee's electric distribution system, used in supplying local service within the City of St. Johns, is hereby fixed and determined to be \$1,649,150.13, as of the effective date of this ordinance.

SECTION 8. The City of St. Johns determines that in improving, repairing, rebuilding and maintaining the streets, alleys, bridges and other public places in the City, no benefit accrues to the personal property of the Grantee, but if said Grantee owns

real estate, such improvement shall be paid for by it, in accordance with its benefit.

SECTION 9. The City shall have the right to establish and enforce reasonable standards of service and to order extensions of service and maintenance of fixtures, appliances and equipment in accordance with the rules, regulations and orders of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

SECTION 10. The joint use of Grantee's facilities in said City shall be permitted only upon such terms and conditions as may be imposed by the Michigan Public Service Commission.

SECTION 11. In case the City elects, under its charter, to purchase or lease the property of Grantee, used in or useful for the distribution and sale of electricity in said City, the price to be paid therefor shall be the value as set forth in Section 7 hereof, plus the cost of any additions, extensions or improvements which may be made to the said electric properties of Grantee after the effective date of this ordinance, together with the cost of the transmission lines and all improvements thereon necessarily expended in furnishing electric service to the City.

SECTION 12. In consideration of the rights, power and authority hereby granted, all of which shall vest in the Grantee for a period of thirty (30) years as aforesaid, said Grantee shall faithfully perform all things required by the terms hereof, and such performance by the Grantee shall be in lieu of all license fees, rentals or charges of every name and nature, except property taxes, which the City might otherwise levy and impose.

SECTION 13. This franchise shall not be deemed exclusive.

SECTION 14. The Grantee may lease, assign or otherwise alienate this franchise upon the condition that its successors shall be bound by and perform all of the obligations and terms hereof.

SECTION 15. The enactment of this ordinance shall be submitted for ratification to the vote of the electors of said City, and the same shall be and become valid and binding upon the approval and ratification of this ordinance by the affirmative vote of at least three-fifths of the electors of said City voting thereon at a regular or special municipal election to be held in the manner provided by law. This ordinance shall not be submitted to the electors unless the Grantee shall within thirty (30) days after the adoption hereof, file with the City Commission its written acceptance, subject only to the approval of the electors. Upon the acceptance hereof, and approval by the electors as aforesaid, this ordinance shall constitute a contract between said City and said Grantee, for the full term of thirty (30) years from and after the date of approval by said electors.

SECTION 16. This ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its passage.

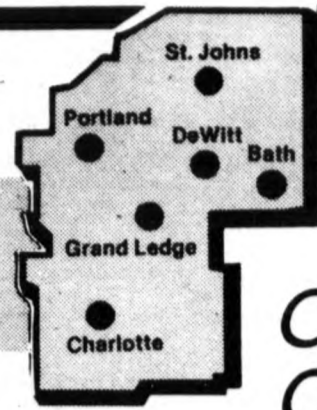

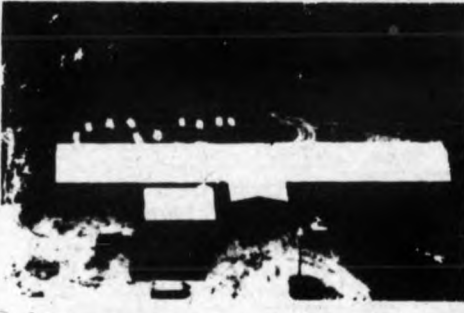

Buying on credit popular with RV buyers

Buying on credit is a way many U.S. families purchase their homes, their cars and, increasingly, their recreation vehicles — such as motor homes, travel trailers, camping trailers, truck campers and van conversions.

A recent study on RV consumers by the Survey Research Center of the University of Michigan shows that 50 percent of all new RV's and 30 percent of all used RV's are purchased with credit.

"It is not only important for the family to know what kind of family camping vehicle they want, but also it's important for every RV buying family to know what types of financing options are available before visiting their local RV dealer," according to David Pickering, director of the Michigan Association of Recreational

Vehicles and Campgrounds.

Consumers have two common types of RV loans — direct and indirect — and a third alternative called a second mortgage.

Direct loans are loans negotiated between the RV buyer and a financial institution like a bank, credit union, sales installment finance firm or savings and loan institution. To secure a direct RV loan, a buyer will shop for an RV and when he finds that one he wants, he'll go to one of these institutions and request a loan.

"It's usually a good idea to apply for a direct RV loan at financial institutions where you have an account or have borrowed money before", said Chester Sims, vice president of MARVAC and chairman of the association's finance committee. "In these cases," Sims said, "the institution already knows and trusts you and the

loan may be more easily and quickly granted."

Indirect loans are those negotiated through an RV dealer. The potential RV owner goes to a dealer, picks the RV he wants, and then the dealer offers him a finance plan and the interest rate.

Generally, "indirect loans have less restrictive qualifications and are therefore easier to come by than direct loans," said Pickering.

The third financing alternative involves taking out a second mortgage on the increased trapped equity in your home or property. This contract can be negotiated with the bank holding your original mortgage or with another institution. Second mortgages can usually provide borrowers with funds at lower than normal interest rates and longer terms resulting in lower monthly payments.

Overall, the average loan for a new family camping vehicle is negotiated for seven years, while the average loan for a used RV is paid over a three- to five-year period. Typically, a 20 to 25 percent down payment is required, according to a survey at RV loaning institutions.

To purchase an RV and qualify for a loan, family income does not have to be high as reflected in the fact that at present, more than half of all U.S. families which own RV's have yearly incomes of less than \$20,000. Some new RV's sell for about \$3,000. The best-selling RV on the market sells at an average of \$9,800, which is the travel trailer. Nearly 80 percent of all new RV's sell for less than \$12,000, according to Pickering.

What is important for anyone planning to buy an RV, is for them to become familiar with the financing options available and then choose the one that best meets their requirements.

Low-interest loans available

Low-interest loans for small businesses in the tri-county region are available now that the Capital Region Business Corp. has been certified by the Small Business Administration in Washington D.C.

As a Certified Development Co., the CRBC can make long-term, fixed-asset loans to small businesses that wish to expand and create jobs in Clinton, Eaton and Ingham counties.

The Tri-County Regional Planning Commission funded and assisted in the development of the Capital Region Business Corp. with the support of the region's banks, businesses, the Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce, the Urban League and other community leaders. Participating banks provide senior loan officers who serve as members of the CRBC Finance Committee.

Herbert Maier, CRBC director; and Martyn Johnson, business development specialist, both trained in loan packaging, will conduct CRBC activities.

Here's how it works. The bank and CRBC work with the applicant to complete the loan package which is then reviewed by CRBC's Finance Committee and submitted to SBA for final approval. Through this joint CRBC/Bank program, fixed-asset, long-term financing is available to small business concerns for 15 to 25 years. The CRBC portion of the loan may not be more than 50 percent and is typically 40 percent of project cost. The maximum amount CRBC will lend is \$500,000 at a rate determined from time to time by the Secretary of Treasury taking into consideration the current average market yield on outstanding marketable U.S. obligations with comparable maturities.

To be eligible for a loan under this program, a small business must be a for-profit corporation, partnership or proprietorship with a net worth of not more than \$6 million and net profits after taxes must have averaged less than \$2 million during the previous two years.

Because of the competitive nature of economic development and the need to establish a regionwide effort, this program will be coordinated with all of the economic development efforts in the tri-county area.

The CRBC corporation will help fill the financing void

between the economic development corporations and smaller amounts provided by banks.

This effort is intended to supplement the small business lending program of area banks giving the economy a real "shot in the arm" by providing lower net-effective interest rates to small business and industry thus providing more jobs for the capital region.

1. That he is the State Treasurer of the State of Michigan and makes and files this complaint under, by virtue of and pursuant to the provisions of Act No. 206 of the Public Acts of 1893, as amended, and Act No. 380 of P.A. 1965, as amended.

2. That Schedule A annexed hereto is the tax record required by the act first above mentioned and contains the description of all lands in the aforesaid county upon which taxes, which were assessed for the years mentioned therein, have remained unpaid for more than one year after they were returned as delinquent, the description of all lands in said county heretofore bid upon in the name of the State and thus held and upon which taxes which were assessed subsequent to the tax for which such lands were sold to the State have remained unpaid for more than one year after they were returned as delinquent.

3. That extended separately in said schedule against each description of said lands therein contained are (a) the total amount of delinquent taxes upon said description for the non-payment of which the same may lawfully be sold at the next annual tax sale, (b) interest computed thereon as provided by law to the first day of May, next ensuing, (c) a collection fee of four per cent which shall be a minimum of \$1.00 as provided by Section 211.59, C.L. 1970, as amended, and (d) \$10.00 for expenses, all in accordance with the provisions of the act first above mentioned.

4. That all of the aforesaid taxes, interest and charges are valid, delinquent and unpaid, and have remained delinquent and unpaid for sufficient time to authorize and require, as provided by the foregoing acts, the sale of the aforesaid parcels of land against which they were assessed and are extended in said schedule at the next annual tax sale for the non-payment thereof, and that the said taxes, interest, collection fee and expenses so extended in said schedule against each parcel of land therein described constitute a valid lien upon each of the said several parcels of land described in said schedule as therein and against which extended in favor of the people of the State of Michigan, the payment of which lien this court may enforce as a preferred or first claim upon such lands by the sale thereof.

Wherefore your plaintiff prays:

a. That within the time provided by law this court may determine and adjudge that the aforesaid taxes, interest, collection fee and charges are valid and constitute a valid lien upon each of the said several parcels of land described in said schedule as therein extended;

b. That within the time provided by law, this court make a final judgement in favor of the State of Michigan against each parcel of said lands for the payment of the several amounts of taxes, interest, collection fee and expenses as computed and extended in said schedule against the several parcels of land therein contained, and the amounts listed in the column headed "aggregate" shall constitute the amounts adjudged against the said several parcels, unless so amended by this court;

c. That said judgement provide that in default of the payment so ordered of the said several sums computed and extended against said lands in said schedule, the said several parcels of land, or such interest therein as may be necessary to satisfy the amount adjudged against the same, shall severally be sold as the law provides;

d. That your plaintiff may have such other and further relief in the premises as to this court may seem just and equitable.

And your plaintiff will ever pray, etc.
