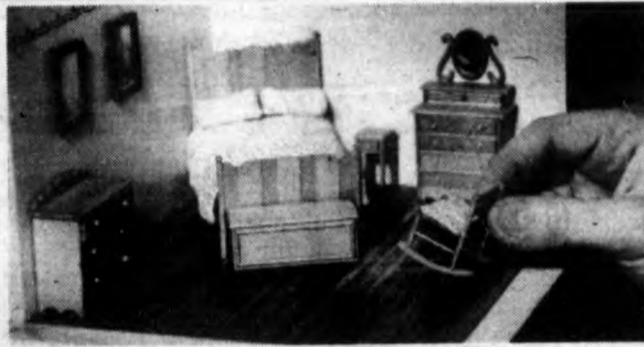


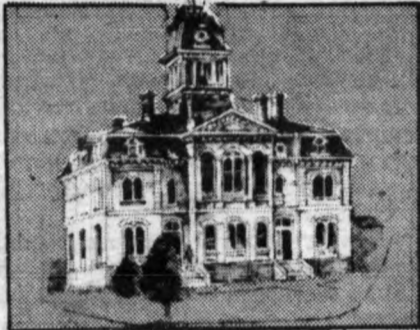

Blanchard appoints Democrats

Governor changes Watertown's horses

When Gov. James Blanchard appointed four Democrats to the Watertown Township Board on an interim basis to fill vacancies created by last month's recall, the political makeup of the board made a dramatic shift. Before the recall, there were seven Republicans and no Democrats. Now the Democrats hold a 4-3 advantage.

It all came about on Feb. 14, when Blanchard appointed Willard Huntoon as supervisor, Phyllis Rathbun as clerk and James Davis and Tom Mauro as trustees. All four are on the Democratic ticket for a March 22 election to fill the spots permanently.

Clinton County Clerk Jane Swanchara said it was Blanchard's right to appoint interim replacements, since the recall didn't leave a quorum on the board. "It's understandable that he would appoint Democrats," she said, "since he's a Democratic governor." She also said the interim board has all the powers of an elected board.

The shift in control could be significant, since all four Democrats have been described as "extremely friendly with PAL (People's Action League)." Which raises the question: Is PAL running the township board?

Charlene Borgeson thinks so. She's the Republican nominee for clerk, and will face Mrs. Rathbun in the election. "When I walked out of that office on Tuesday (Feb. 15, after Blanchard made the appointments), the PAL people literally moved in and took over," Mrs. Borgeson said. "In no official capacity, as far as I can

see. They started looking through all the files and making copies of things. I just think it's totally inappropriate.

"I'll tell you — Barb Boughton (a PAL member and a leader of the recall movement) is orchestrating the whole thing down there. She walked in with Mrs. Rathbun the day they took over the office. She was there first thing in the morning. At the meeting (Thursday night, Feb. 17), the PAL people were out in force. They're trying to get as much accomplished as they can before the election, now that they have the people they want in there."

According to Mrs. Rathbun, PAL members were in the office only to help her learn the file system. "I asked Mrs. Borgeson to stay on and help with the filing, so we would both know where things were, but she declined the offer," Mrs. Rathbun said. "It was just all unfamiliar to me, so I had two or three ladies helping me out. Without their help, I would have been lost. It was for the benefit of the township that they were there."

Regardless, Mrs. Borgeson is worried the interim board will make important decisions in the time before the election — decisions influenced by PAL. The citizens' group has been the biggest opponent of developer Jerry Granger and his landfill in the township. The old board's decision to settle its dispute with Granger out of court to four members' Jan. 18 recall.

"There is a movement afoot now to replace Steve Schultz as the township's attorney," Mrs. Borgeson said. "At the meeting (Feb. 17), a committee of two — Tom Mauro and Willard Huntoon — was appointed to research the possibility of replacing Schultz."

Members of PAL voiced strong disapproval of Schultz when he negotiated the settlement with Granger. "It doesn't surprise me," Schultz said when told of his

possible replacement. "I wasn't even aware that they were talking about that, though. I was never contacted about it. In fact, I've tried to get in touch with Mr. Huntoon on several occasions, but the line at the township office always seems to be busy.

"If the board chooses to explore that, it's certainly their prerogative."

Mrs. Borgeson doesn't think the interim board should make such important decisions. "I just feel they should wait until the people elect a board before they vote on any important issues," she said.

According to Mrs. Rathbun, the interim board feels the same way. "There isn't really a lot of time to make any important decisions," she said. "We only have one more meeting. We probably won't make any major changes, aside from considering a new lawyer. We might keep Mr. Schultz and we might not. We just want to keep things running smoothly until the new board comes in."

The four board members who were recalled — all Republicans — are Supervisor Vaughn Montgomery, Clerk Mildred McDonough and trustees John Fox and Forest Shipman. And if local voters stick with tradition and vote Republican, the March 22 vote will see the four Republican candidates elected. Along with Mrs. Rathbun, they are Richard B. Ackerman for Supervisor and Leon Pete Clark and Jack M. Fraser for the two trustee spots.

"We were a little disappointed that Gov. Blanchard appointed the Democrats," Mrs. Borgeson said, "but not surprised. This township has always been a Republican stronghold, and I guess the Democrats saw it as a way to get their foot in the door down here."

Blanchard's Press Secretary, Sue Carter, did not respond to queries and offered no comment on Blanchard's selections.

For battle against hunger

Food bank deposits growing

With rising unemployment and decreasing government benefits hitting the area, hunger is becoming a bigger problem in the county, according to Karen Penix of Clinton County Community Services. So to help ease some hunger pangs, the Clinton County Food Bank is expanding.

"We've always had a food bank here," Ms. Penix said, "but we've had a lot more people interested in it lately. There are a lot more people who can't get food stamps or other benefits, so this is the only way they can get food. What we've done is expand to have distribution centers in some of the other parts of the county."

Joining the two centers in St. Johns are distribution points in DeWitt, Bath, Elsie and Maple Rapids, Ms. Penix said. All are presently operating, with the exception of the DeWitt location, which is at the DeWitt Medical Center. "We hope to have that open by the beginning of March," Ms. Penix said.

The reason for more distribution centers is "Because it's often hard for people to have to drive all the way into St. Johns to pick up their food," Ms. Penix said. "Gas costs money, too, so it doesn't make sense for someone to drive all the way here from Bath or someplace."

To help with the increased collection and distribution

of food, Ms. Penix has enlisted the help of churches and service groups from throughout the county. "The response has been very good," she said.

Ms. Penix said it isn't hard to be eligible for the free food — if you're a first-timer. "The first time someone comes and asks for food, we usually don't ask many questions," she said. "But if they come back the next week, we ask a lot more questions. Usually, they have to prove that it's an emergency and that there isn't anywhere else to get the food."

In January, 27 people received food, Ms. Penix said. She expects the number to be even higher in the coming months, so the food bank is appealing for donations.

"We need every kind of food we can get," she said. "We're also taking cash donations. The thing we really need, though, is paper products — napkins, soap, anything that isn't food — because they can't buy those things with food stamps."

Also high on the most-wanted list is powdered milk, sugar and flour. Since there is no refrigeration available at the food bank, all items must be non-perishable.

Lack of detectives leaves crimes unsolved

Crime has not increased significantly in Clinton County, but more detectives are needed to solve crimes that are reported, Clinton County Sheriff Anthony Hufnagle told the county board Tuesday.

"There has not been a major increase in crimes being committed in this county, or at least being reported," Hufnagle told commissioners in his annual report. He cited a total 1982 increase of 85 complaints from the previous year. Last year, Hufnagle said, 1,100 criminal complaints were received, compared to 1,015 in 1981.

Among crimes which increased, the report said, was burglary, up by five reports to 124 in 1982. The major area of increase, however, was in alcohol-related complaints, Hufnagle said. Driving Under the Influence of Liquor complaints rose from 32 in 1981 to 125 last year, and other liquor law infractions also were up, the report said.

"The drinking driver continues to be a serious hazard, and we have increased our enforcement of all liquor law violations," the sheriff explained.

Categories where reports of serious crimes dropped included: criminal sexual conduct, down three to 10; robbery, which dropped from six in 1981 to four in 1982; assault, down by eight to 30; larcenies, down by nine to 283; and motor vehicle thefts, which dropped from 26 in 1981 to 19 last year.

Unchanged were arson, which remained at three, and murders and negligent manslaughter, with no reports in 1981 or 1982, the report said.

Hufnagle pointed out that reports do not necessarily indicate all of the crime occurring, particularly among thefts from uninsured homeowners, who he said are less likely to file a report those who need police reports to collect insurance claims.

As for solving crimes, Hufnagle said, the county needs more detectives. "This was a very active year for our investigative division," he said. "The staff has been reduced from six to three, and they could use some additional persons to help out. It doesn't do much good to take a criminal report if they can't follow up on it."

The cases-closed rate last year was 26 percent, Hufnagle's report said. But fewer cases were solved because fewer were assigned, the report says. Of 829 cases, only 59 percent were assigned, compared to an assignment rate of 64 percent in 1981.

The success rate for cases assigned went up, however, from 42 percent in 1981 to 44 percent in 1982, resulting in the arrests last year of 119 persons, reports said.

Cases closed by the Clinton County Detective Bureau in 1982 included 121 breaking and enterings at residences and businesses, seven armed robberies, 21 cases of criminal sexual conduct and five assaults.

Three years ago, the detective bureau included officers from Bath and DeWitt townships and a Michigan State Police trooper; declines in cases solved are mainly due to staff cuts, Hufnagle says.

"There have been less cases assigned and the

throughness is not as good as it could be because we have a tendency to bite off more than we can chew and then spin our wheels. There are lots of good cases out there" going unsolved, he said.

Traffic problems dropped for the sheriff's department, Hufnagle said, but jail problems were "traumatic."

Traffic fatalities remained constant at 12 in 1981 and 1982. But injuries resulting from accidents dropped by 31 to a total of 319 last year. Total accidents were also down, by 82, to 704 accidents last year, he said.

The good news about traffic accidents was offset by bad news about the county's jail, however. "It was a very traumatic year, to say the least, as far as the jail was concerned," Hufnagle said. The problem: the same number of inmates sent to jail are serving longer sentences, due to stricter sentencing guidelines, forcing the jail's average population up.

Because of state laws regulating prisoner populations, excess prisoners have been "boarded out" at other county jails, at an average cost of \$25 per prisoner per day, the sheriff said.

In all, Hufnagle estimated farming out prisoners cost the county almost \$65,000 last year. "The problem is there and from all indications, it is going to stay there and probably get worse," he said.

Hufnagle also took the opportunity to commend two deputies, who confronted and subdued a shotgun-wielding suspect Dec. 8. Given citations for courage and action above and beyond the call of duty were Terry Haneckow and Mark Finnila.

Cyclist injured

A Lansing woman arrested in the injury of a DeWitt cyclist was among the incidents reported by Clinton County law enforcement agencies during the past week.

As he was riding his bicycle north on Airport Road north of State Road in DeWitt Township Feb. 17, Kenneth Redmond, 32, 1205 Sandhill, DeWitt, was struck from behind by a car driven by Sally Ann Will, 34, Lansing, DeWitt Township Police said. Redmond was taken to St. Lawrence Hospital with leg injuries, police said. Will was arrested and charged with one count of

felonious driving and one count of drunk driving, police said. She was arraigned Feb. 18, police said.

Six businesses on Sheffer Ave. in DeWitt Township were broken into Feb. 17, DeWitt Township Police said. Three of the businesses — Cadillac Coffee Co., Trees, Inc. and J. Rollins, Inc. — reported stolen merchandise, police said. The other three businesses reported only damage, police said.

Hand tools valued at \$4,000 were taken Feb. 18 from a garage at 231 E. Second, Ovid, Clinton County Sheriff's Deputies said.

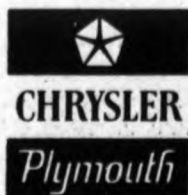

Rabbit food replaces meat-and-potatoes menu

Few get fat in today's restaurant trade

Editor's note: The signs say "Home-cooked Meals," "Eat Here," "Fine Dining" or boast "Billions Sold." From taverns to school cafeterias, from fast food stands to fancier spots where the lights are low but the prices aren't, Clinton County has 150 places that serve prepared food.

How is the food business faring? Has the wolf at the door kept many families from going out? Are people ordering different items than they did a few years ago? Which restaurants get high marks for cleanliness? To answer these and other questions, we have prepared a series, "Going out." Following is the first installment.

Mashed-potatoes smothered by gravy, stacked slabs of roast beef, sliced carrots swimming in butter and steaming-hot rolls. Had enough? How about a slice of pie for dessert. Too much?

For many, apparently, the answer is an overstuffed "yes."

The once popular meat-and-potato menu is no longer the bread and butter of the food business. It's been replaced by what many refer to as "rabbit food," to please today's soup and salad society.

Restaurant wner Susan Hospodar thinks she knows why.

"People don't work as hard as they used to. Everyone's got a light job and there's machinery to do all the heavy jobs, so people just don't work up an appetite like they used to."

Going out

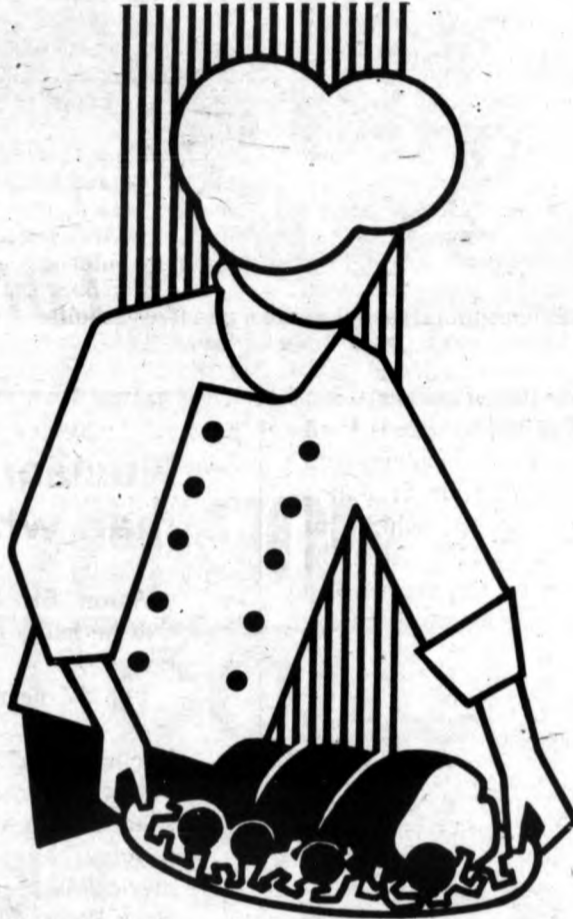
Most professional cooks also say people's tastes have changed; they cite increased emphasis on nutrition, physical fitness and economy. Whatever the reason, most restaurant owners randomly surveyed by the Clinton County News agreed: few are getting fat in the food preparation business.

"I used to have a whole crew come in together for lunch," said Mrs. Hospodar, 13-year owner of St. Johns' Colonial Restaurant. "I asked them why they're not coming in anymore and they said they're all bringing their lunches in a sack to save money."

And if turnouts are lighter, so are the types of meals being served. "People are moving away from the red meats. I think it's because they're more health conscious," said Lee Campbell, manager of St. Johns' Big Boy.

"People are more aware of their nutrition, diets and health," agreed Judy Minner, who along with her husband, Charley, recently purchased the Road House in St. Johns. "What we see a lot of people go for is the salad bar."

"I've noticed the heavy foods, like pork chops with dressing, just don't go anymore," Mrs. Hospodar added. "But soup and salads sell out every day."



Some restaurant owners said they cope with people's fickle appetites by offering many menu items, from Mexican food to steaks and pizza. Others said consistency is the best approach.

"I have not really noticed any decline in patrons," Wheel Inn owner Juanita O'Leary said. "Our menu stays pretty much the same, and we get a lot of repeat customers. I think it's because of our consistency."

There's no sure recipe for success in the food trade, but being part of a franchise helps, Campbell says. "I

think right now franchises are doing better because they have more than one restaurant to keep them in business."

Others said the best way to satisfy customers is to keep prices low. "The night spots with 10 or 12 items, people just don't have the money to go there," said Sam Terranova, owner of Sam's Kitchen in DeWitt. Terranova said he has kept customers coming back by specializing in breakfasts and by offering daily specials under \$3. "The places that are hurting are the fancy food spots," he said.

According to county records, one of the few relatively expensive restaurants in Clinton County, Someplace Else, was closed in December. The US-27 restaurant has since been sold to a partnership which includes Dr. Alfredo San Juan and John Khavari-manesh, both of St. Johns.

Another in DeWitt Township, Mijo's, where prices range from about \$5 to \$15, is also struggling, a spokesperson said. "The economy has a lot to do with it," she said.

But if some restaurants are being starved out as cost-conscious customers hunt for bargains, plenty of hopeful investors are still going into the business, armed only with high hopes and compliments on their home cooking. And that has created a problem, according to Lois Elliot-Wilson, Clinton County sanitarian for the Mid-Michigan District Health Department.

"Quite a few people are trying to sell out because business is bad," she said. "But at the same time, a lot of people want to go into the food business because they're out of work and want to create something. They have to realize it's not that easy."

Complying with state health codes can be costly, and many are finding it takes more to get by in the restaurant trade than a few good recipes, she said. Complicating her task is the fact that many restaurants have not been inspected regularly, if at all, during the past few years.

"We need much more education in food service sanitation," she said. "We have some very good operators and some others who just don't understand what the health department requires."

To improve sanitary conditions in county restaurants, Mrs. Wilson is encouraging owners and operators to participate in a management certification program which begins March 17.

Meanwhile, she continues to inspect restaurants to prepare the first complete report on Clinton County's restaurants in years. "They don't always appreciate seeing me arrive," she says.

Advocate for 'older adults' loves her job

When it comes to older adults, Brenda Hamilton is an expert. As coordinator of the Clinton County Senior Citizens Office, Mrs. Hamilton cuts red tape faster than you can say "governmental bureaucracy."

The Senior Citizens Office exists to help "older adults," Mrs. Hamilton says — "senior citizens is worn out," she adds.

"We know that there are older people out there who are having problems and many are not even aware that we are here to make their lives easier," she said.

At present, her office has contacts with about 22 percent of the county's elderly, and Mrs. Hamilton says she would like to see the number grow. Several programs are available which could be of benefit, she pointed out.

For example, there are several heating assistance programs. "When you think that the average income of the Clinton older adult is \$4,500-5,000, there must be more of them who could use these programs," she said.

Home Heating Credit is one of the more popular heating assistance programs. Under this program, funds go directly to applicants. Applications are available, along with aid in filling out forms, Mrs. Hamilton said.

Another program is Targeted Fuel Assistance (TFA). Over the past several years, the Senior Citizens Office has helped 100 households obtain TFA, which sends funds to heating companies.

Home Weatherization and Emergency Needs are two more programs available.

The main reason many do not apply for such programs is fear of red tape and long, complicated forms, Mrs. Hamilton said. But with help from her office, the forms can be completed in 20 minutes, and applicants are notified if they will receive aid in 30 days, she said.

"Many older adults aren't aware of property tax rebates either," she said. One county resident whose in-

come was \$6,000 paid \$843 in taxes, she said. "We were able to get back \$667 of that for this particular person." Another couple's income was \$12,500, and rebates earned back \$650 of their original \$1,000 tax bill. "Older people need to know that they can get a rebate, and we're here to help them get it," Mrs. Hamilton said.

Sponsored by Capitol Area Community Services, her office does more than just help the elderly with heating and taxes, Mrs. Hamilton pointed out. Also available are home services such as cleaning, home-bound meals and grocery shopping. Legal aid is also available at no charge.

"We help people with any problems they might be having with the Department of Social Services, also. I've gone to the DSS with several older adults just to help them answer some of the endless questions," she said. "I act as liaison, plus I try to help the older adults feel more at ease."

A Maple Rapids native and Fulton High School graduate, Mrs. Hamilton has been coordinator of the Senior Citizens Office for four years. She has an MA and specialist degrees in gerontology from The University of Michigan. And she loves her work. "Older adults are so appreciative of the things I do for them, and it's a joy to come to work."

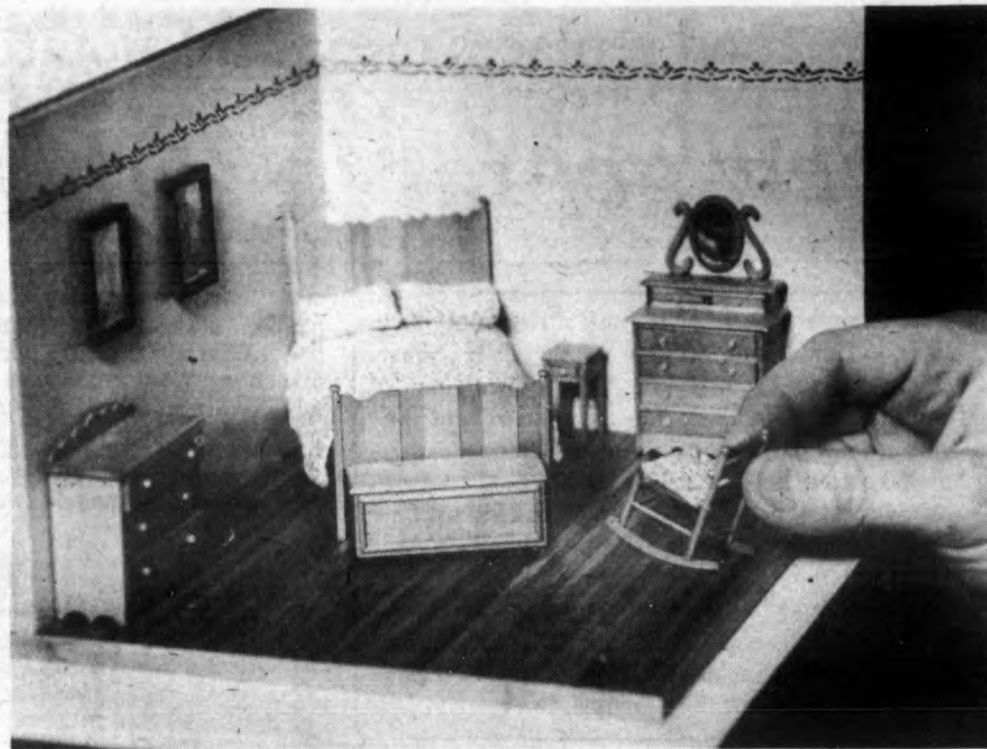
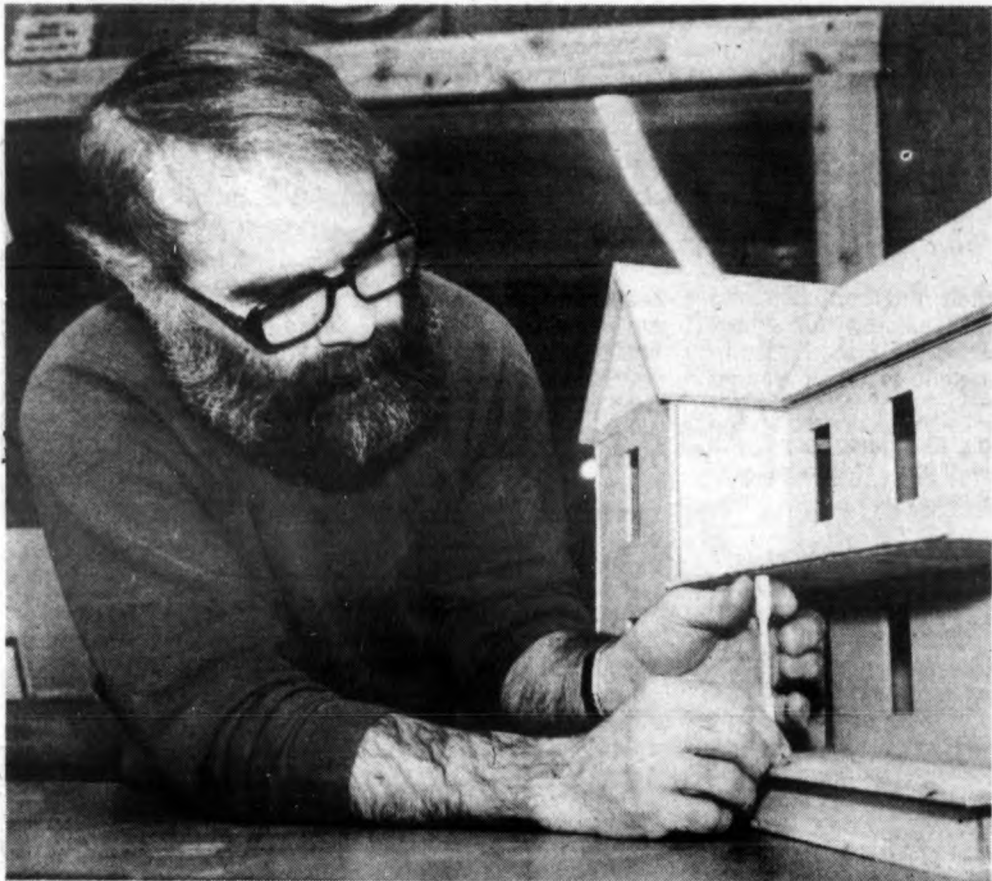
When young, Mrs. Hamilton knew the love and affection of nine grandparents and great-grandparents. "I think that's quite unusual for someone to have so many loving older relatives. I learned a great deal from them. My being involved with older people as a vocation seemed very natural."

"The Older Americans Act was legislated to provide direct services to older people, and that's what this office is all about."

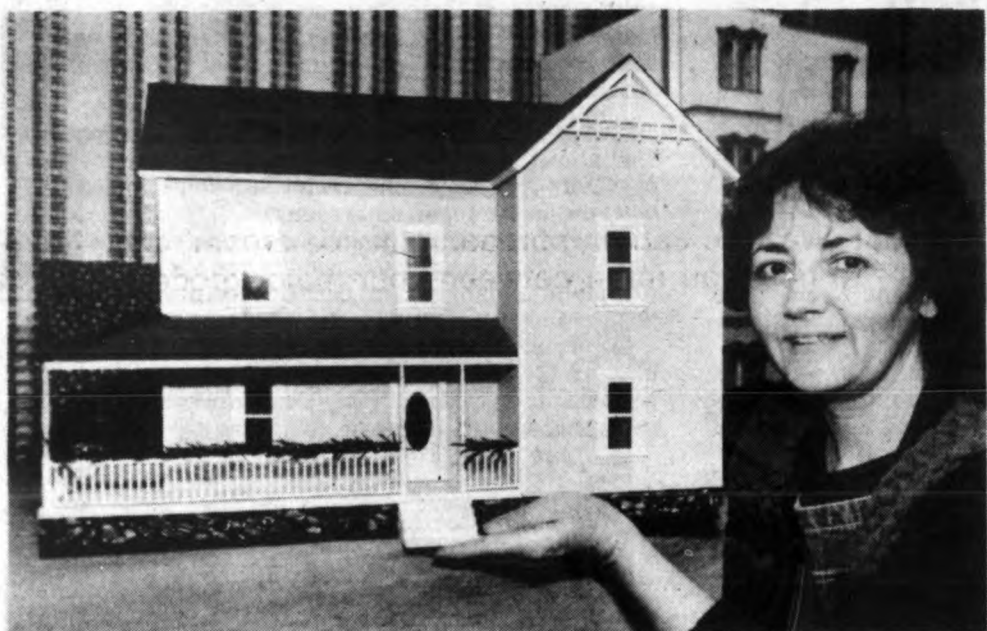

Nuclear Power paying off for the man who saw energy's future.

Aaron Brookhouse is happy that he had a good vision of the future.

For 27 years he has helped make the electricity that lights Michigan's homes and powers its industries. From his early jobs in traditional generating plants, he watched Michigan's first commercial nuclear power plant, Big Rock Point, guide the state into the nuclear age in 1982.

Then, in the late 1960's, construction of the Palisades Nuclear Plant began near South Haven. Brookhouse realized that the electric utility industry was poised for a major thrust into the nuclear era. He wanted to be a part of it.

"I had the feeling that nuclear power was the coming thing, that everybody would be going this way," says Brookhouse. "I wanted to get in on the ground floor."

He did, and he isn't sorry. Brookhouse, then in his mid-30s, went through an intensive training program and earned a nuclear reactor operator's license. When Palisades generated its first electricity in 1971 he was there, working as a shift supervisor of other reactor operators. He has been at Palisades ever since.

Brookhouse and others like him have helped nurse the plant through its early years to its present state; early in 1983 the Nuclear Regulatory Commission said Palisades had the most improved regulatory performance of any nuclear plant in the Midwest.

He and his fellow workers are proud of that, and of their role in the nuclear power industry. But he's bothered by what he calls a small, uninformed minority who are critical of the power source.

"I think that those who know enough about nuclear power generally are for it," Brookhouse says. "If the rest had more contact with it, or were more familiar with it, they also would support it."

"Nuclear power is safe for

those who work with it, and for everyone else. I only live 10 miles down the road, and I feel very comfortable about it."

A nuclear plant is so carefully designed and has so many backup systems that any imaginable problem can be handled, he says. He adds that the people who run the plant also are well prepared.

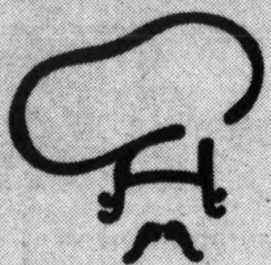
Brookhouse points out that it takes a lot of work and study to earn a reactor operator's license, which is required to work in the plant's control room. The training is capped by a 6½-hour written test, followed by a rigorous oral examination. As a senior reactor operator, Brookhouse had even more training and more extensive testing.

Loan program is designed to create new jobs

Low-cost loans for business expansion or development are available in Clinton, Eaton and Ingham counties, but the main goal is to provide jobs, and larger, manufacturing companies are expected to benefit most, a loan administrator says.

"The purpose is obviously to create jobs. We would like to see one job created for each \$15,000 loaned," said Martyn Johnson of the Tri-County Regional Planning Commission (TCRPC), which is processing the loans made available through the federal Small Business Administration.

Johnson, a business development specialist with the Capitol Region Business Corporation, which will provide loans under the aegis of the TCRPC, said loans as high as \$500,000 will be available. Many inquiries have already been received since the program began six months ago, he said.

"We're still in the very early stages, but we have three or four very good prospects in the manufacturing-type areas. We've had 74 people contact us so far."

The loans will carry an interest rate of about 12 percent, which could save applicants from two to six percentage points over conventional loans. But because the loan criteria stresses job creation, and because economies are negligible with loans less than \$100,000, the program caters to manufacturing concerns, not small businesses, Johnson said.

"This would be good for an existing business that wanted to expand, primarily a manufacturing-oriented business. The program has not excluded retail and service businesses, but it is much easier to make a case for manufacturing types of businesses."

There's still hope for those interested in expanding or investing in smaller businesses, however. "If a business comes to us and we can't help them, we can assist them in finding the kind of help they need," Johnson said.

"We have a grant from the Tri-County Manpower Consortium to assist businesses with business planning, and we are putting together a resource group" of experts on financing, organization and other areas, he said. Such aid is offered free of charge for now, Johnson said. "A lot of our funding for such programs is being cut off, and we hope to eventually be self-supporting."

Teacher talks stalled in stalemate

"No progress" was made last Thursday during nearly six hours of negotiating between teachers and the St. Johns school board, a joint release said Friday.

According to the release issued by St. Johns Education Association (SJEA) President Ted Slicer and Superintendent Earl Gabriel, no progress was made in efforts to resolve the year-long teacher contract dispute.

St. Johns teachers will continue to work under an extension of their old contract, and another negotiating session will be slated soon, a school spokesman said.

The two sides met with a state mediator from 4:30 to after 10 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 17. Teachers have requested a salary increase of two percent for the first semester, plus seven percent the second semester.

The board, however, has insisted teachers must ac-

cept a salary freeze to help the district weather a financial crisis brought about by reductions in state aid and declining enrollment.

A media freeze imposed on both sides during a 90-day cooling-off period which began last Nov. 10 was extended by the mediator, reports said. The three-month recess in negotiations averted a teacher strike which had been planned for Nov. 12, and expired Feb. 10.

Ovid-Elsie teachers and their school board, meanwhile, have requested fact-finding in an effort to come up with a new contract. "However, we've received notice the state will no longer pay for fact-finding because of its budget problems," teacher spokesman Dean McKay said.

The fact-finding bill could cost each side from \$800 to \$1,600, reports said.

Fowler teachers are also working without a new contract for the 1982-83 school year. So far, efforts by a state mediator to resolve the Fowler dispute have been unsuccessful, but "we're getting close," Superintendent Jim Andros said. What could be the final round of talks has been set for today.

Clinton County districts which have settled teacher contracts are, in order, Pewamo-Westphalia, where teachers accepted a wage freeze; Bath, where teachers obtained a 3.5 percent salary hike; and DeWitt, where teachers bargained for 5.5 percent step-increases plus a three percent raise this year, and a six percent raise next year.

St. Johns burns first-place Ionia

Feb. 18 — St. Johns 84, Ionia 58: That was not a typographical error you just read. The Redwings actually beat the league-leading Bulldogs by 26 points. How?

"Rebounding," St. Johns coach Al Werbish said. "We were just awesome on the boards. We outrebounded them, 57-31, and that might be a team record for us."

The result was a big win which left St. Johns at 5-3 in the Mid-Michigan 'B', one game behind Ionia and Corunna, who share the lead at 6-2. There are two more league games remaining.

It was a third-quarter spurt which helped the Redwings to the win. They outrebounded (18 to three) and outscored (22-9) the Bulldogs in that quarter to open up a big lead.

"We were also taking very good shots," Werbish said. "We shot 48 percent for the game, and that's very good for us. Defensively, we were very aggressive. We played with a lot of intensity and confidence, and that's what you need to win."

Sophomore center John Keenoy had an outstanding night, finishing with 20 points on eight-of-11 shooting from the field. Kurt Thelen had his best game of the year, tossing in 18 points and grabbing a career-high 13 rebounds. Marty Martens had a career-high also, picking off 14 caroms. Steve Gonzales had 12 points and nine assists and drew praise from the coach for his defensive play.

"Steve had a very good night guarding Todd Gorsuch, their big scorer," Werbish said. "Gorsuch only had seven points. Steve deserves a lot of credit for that."

St. Johns will be looking to pick up another MMB win when Ovid-Elsie invades the Redwings' gym tomorrow night. The last time the two met, O-E blew an 18-point lead, allowing St. Johns to get the win. Werbish is expecting another barnburner.

"They're coming off a very big upset of Corunna," he said. "I'm expecting a close game. But if we can play with as much confidence as we had against Ionia, we can beat anyone in the league."

Sitting is hard for LCC players

For any athlete, it's never easy having to sit out while everyone else is playing. When he has to sit out a whole season, though, it's even harder.

Such is the case for Warren Hengesbach and Jeff Casler, two of Clinton County's finest basketball products. Both are currently members of the Lansing Community College (LCC) squad, and both are having to miss this season. Their reasons for being out are different, but they both feel the same way about it — they'd rather be playing.

Warren Hengesbach (Pewamo-Westphalia High School, 1979): After an extremely successful 1981-82 season in which he averaged 15 points and seven rebounds a game and was named the Most Valuable Player in the state junior college tournament, Hengesbach was obviously looking forward to this season.

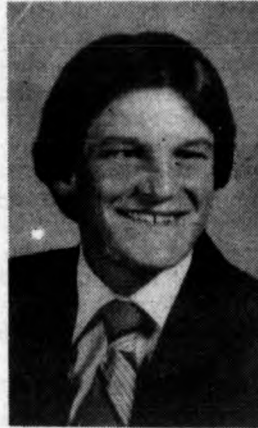
During a practice on July 26 of last year, though, the 6-2 forward turned the wrong way to catch a pass and tore up his knee in the process. Surgery the following day to repair ligament and cartilage damage closed the door on the 1982-83 season for him.

"It was really hard at first — knowing I'd miss the season," Hengesbach said. "But I've kind of gotten used to it now. The knee is coming along pretty well. I can't practice with the team yet, but I've been shooting and running some two-on-three continuity drills and things like that. It still doesn't compare to playing in a game, though."

Hengesbach had to spend six weeks on crutches and two more weeks wearing a leg brace after the surgery. "That was such a long time," he said. "I really didn't think I'd ever walk again."

More than anything, the injury put a damper on Hengesbach's desire to move from LCC to a four-year school. A good season would have made him very attractive to a Division I school.

"Warren is definitely a Division I player," current P-W basketball coach Steve Spitzley said.

"There's no question. He could play anywhere he wants to."

The plan now is for Hengesbach to play next year at LCC and then move to a bigger school, where he would have two more years of eligibility. "All the schools in the MAC (Mid-American Conference) were interested in me," he said. "And the coach at Florida Southern, who used to coach at Jackson Community College, was also interested. I just hope I can come back and have a good season. Hopefully, they'll still be interested."

For now, Hengesbach is just interested in getting back on the court. "When you turn on the cable (TV) every night and see five or six college hoop games," he said, "it really makes you feel out of it. I'm itching to get back."

Jeff Casler (St. Johns High School, 1982): The Redwing turned redshirt. When Casler left St. Johns for LCC last year, many people had images of the 6-1 high-scoring guard making an immediate impact on coach Art Frank's LCC Stars — Casler included.

For a number of reasons, though, it didn't work out that way. Much to his surprise, Casler was redshirted by Frank at the start of the season.

"I didn't expect to be redshirted," Casler said. "When I went in there, I was told that I'd play right away. But the coach thought it would be better for me if I sat out a year. They have a lot of guards down there right now."

He wasn't too happy about the decision at first, but in time, Casler realized it probably was for the best. "I'm not too upset about it anymore," he said. "I guess it is the best thing. When I got there, I thought I could just walk out on the court and play. To be honest, I was a little out of shape. I didn't practice or anything over the summer."

Which is a mistake he won't make again. This summer Casler said, basketball will be on his daily agenda. "I'm going to be in shape and ready to play when I get there next year," he said.

The only competition Casler has seen this year has been an occasional game in the St. Johns City League, but "It doesn't really compare," he said. "The court is smaller and it's not very competitive. I just play there for fun."

Casler still practices every day with the Stars, but being a redshirt, it just doesn't feel the same. "It's hard practicing when there isn't a game to look forward to," he said. "I probably wouldn't have gone to LCC if I knew they were going to redshirt me, but it's turned out for the best. I just want to play."

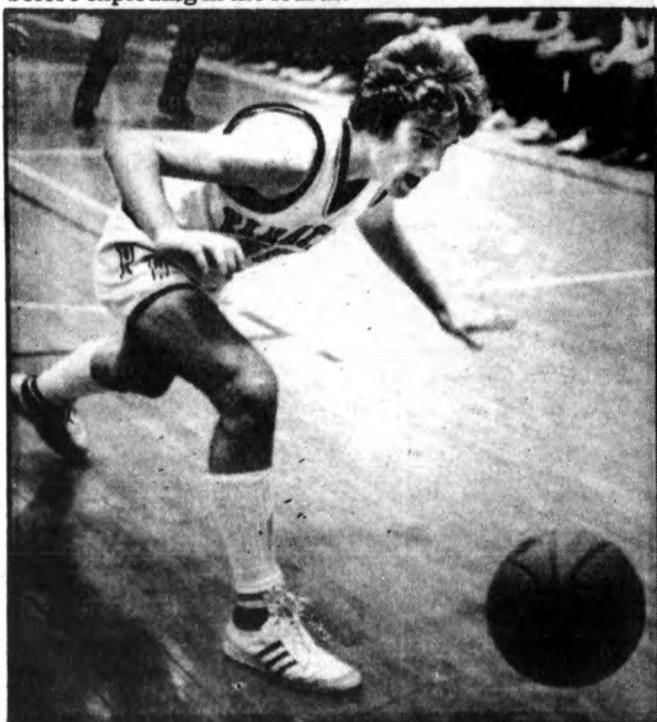
DeWitt gets revenge on Pirates

"We played much better than we did earlier in the week," P-W coach Carol Bogard said.

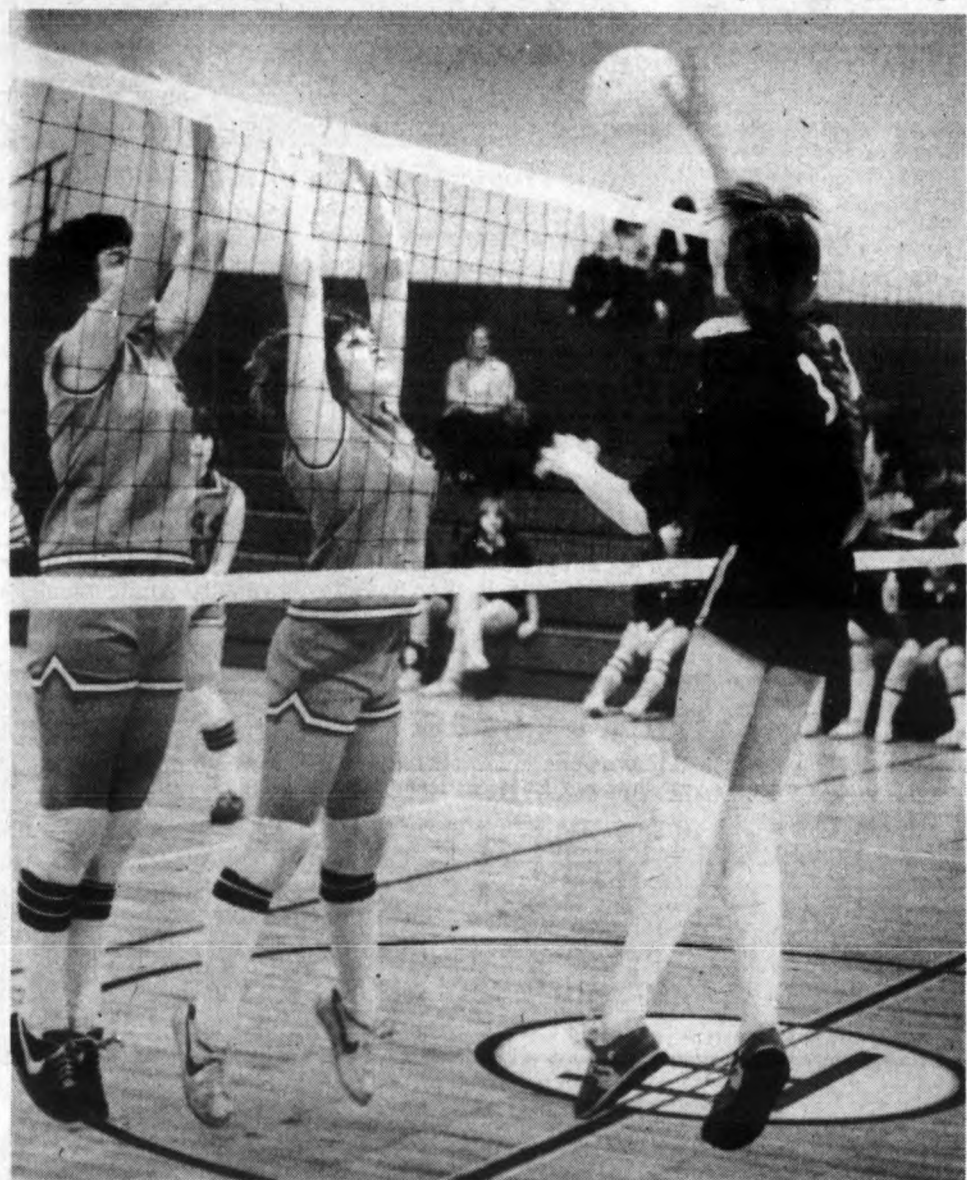
Patty Theis had five spikes, Jackie Bauer had four and Janell Fedewa added three for P-W. St. Johns was led by Susie Casler's seven sets.

Maid of honor was Gerianne Stevenson of Chicago, sister of the bride. She carried a nosegay of multi-colored daisies.

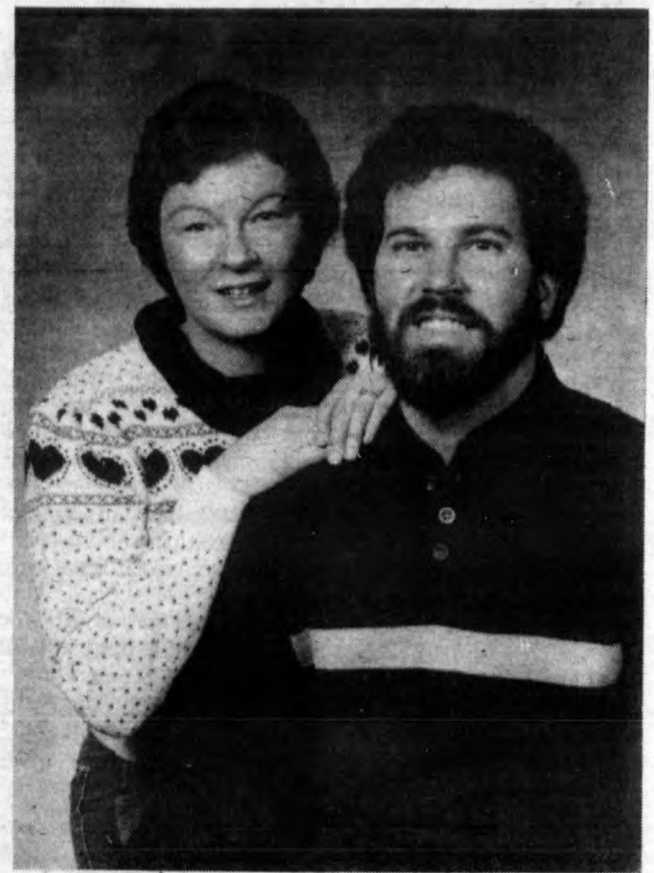

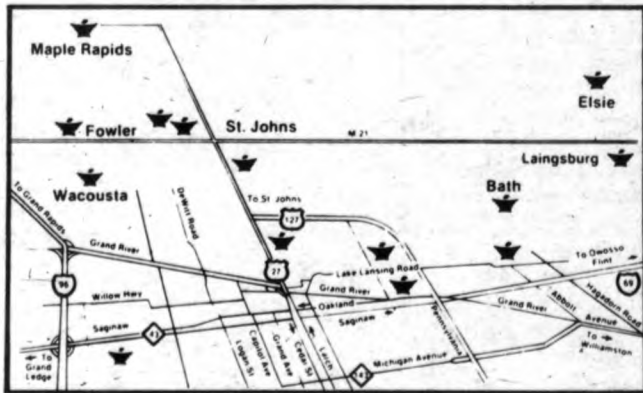

ORDINANCE NO. 345

**CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY
ELECTRIC FRANCHISE ORDINANCE**

AN ORDINANCE, granting to CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right, power and authority to construct, maintain and commercially use electric lines consisting of towers, masts, poles, crossarms, guys, braces, feeders, transmission and distribution wires, transformers and other electrical appliances on, under, along and across the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local electric business in the CITY OF ST. JOHNS, CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN, for a period of thirty years.
THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. That wherever the word "Grantee" appears in this ordinance, it is hereby intended to designate, and shall be held to refer to the Consumers Power Company, a Michigan corporation, its successors and assigns.

SECTION 2. The right, power and authority is hereby granted and vested in said Grantee to construct, maintain and commercially use electric lines, consisting of towers, masts, poles, crossarms, guys, braces, feeders, transmission and distribution wires, transformers and other electrical appliances on, under, along and across the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local electric business in the City of St. Johns, Clinton County, Michigan, for a period of thirty years.

SECTION 3. No highway, street, alley, bridge or other public place used by said Grantee shall be obstructed longer than necessary during the work of construction and maintenance and shall be restored to the same good order and condition as when such work was commenced.

SECTION 4. All towers, masts, poles and other supports shall be set and all wires shall be suspended or buried in a careful and proper manner so as not to injure persons or property. The Grantee shall have the right to trim trees if necessary in the conducting of such business, subject, however, to the supervision of the City Manager of the City. The Grantee shall at all times keep and save the City free and harmless from all loss, costs and damage to which it may be subject by reason of the negligent construction and maintenance of the towers, masts, poles, wires and other structures and appliances, the erection, burial and maintenance of which are hereby authorized.

SECTION 5. The Grantee shall be entitled to charge the inhabitants of said City for electric energy for light, heat and power, the rates as approved by the Michigan Public Service Commission and at present effective within said City. Said rates shall be subject to review and change at any time by the Michigan Public Service Commission or its successors, upon proper application by either said Grantee or the City, acting by the City Manager, being made thereto, and the regularly filed rates as approved by said Michigan Public Service Commission or its successors, as applicable to said City of St. Johns, shall at all times be the lawful rates.

All bills for electric energy shall be payable monthly. The Grantee may collect the minimum charge as specified in said schedule. It shall also furnish and maintain commercially accurate meters to measure the energy furnished. Said Grantee shall at all reasonable times have access to the premises of its customers, for the purpose of reading, inspecting, removing and replacing such meters.

SECTION 6. The form of accounts kept by the Grantee shall conform to the orders and rules of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

SECTION 7. The value of the property comprising the Grantee's electric distribution system, used in supplying local service within the City of St. Johns, is hereby fixed and determined to be \$1,649,150.13, as of the effective date of this ordinance.

SECTION 8. The City of St. Johns determines that in improving, repairing, rebuilding and maintaining the streets, alleys, bridges and other public places in the City, no benefit accrues to the personal property of the Grantee, but if said Grantee owns

real estate, such improvement shall be paid for by it, in accordance with its benefit.

SECTION 9. The City shall have the right to establish and enforce reasonable standards of service and to order extensions of service and maintenance of fixtures, appliances and equipment in accordance with the rules, regulations and orders of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

SECTION 10. The joint use of Grantee's facilities in said City shall be permitted only upon such terms and conditions as may be imposed by the Michigan Public Service Commission.

SECTION 11. In case the City elects, under its charter, to purchase or lease the property of Grantee, used in or useful for the distribution and sale of electricity in said City, the price to be paid therefor shall be the value as set forth in Section 7 hereof, plus the cost of any additions, extensions or improvements which may be made to the said electric properties of Grantee after the effective date of this ordinance, together with the cost of the transmission lines and all improvements thereon necessarily expended in furnishing electric service to the City.

SECTION 12. In consideration of the rights, power and authority hereby granted, all of which shall vest in the Grantee for a period of thirty (30) years as aforesaid, said Grantee shall faithfully perform all things required by the terms hereof, and such performance by the Grantee shall be in lieu of all license fees, rentals or charges of every name and nature, except property taxes, which the City might otherwise levy and impose.

SECTION 13. This franchise shall not be deemed exclusive.

SECTION 14. The Grantee may lease, assign or otherwise alienate this franchise upon the condition that its successors shall be bound by and perform all of the obligations and terms hereof.

SECTION 15. The enactment of this ordinance shall be submitted for ratification to the vote of the electors of said City, and the same shall be and become valid and binding upon the approval and ratification of this ordinance by the affirmative vote of at least three-fifths of the electors of said City voting thereon at a regular or special municipal election to be held in the manner provided by law. This ordinance shall not be submitted to the electors unless the Grantee shall within thirty (30) days after the adoption hereof, file with the City Commission its written acceptance, subject only to the approval of the electors. Upon the acceptance hereof, and approval by the electors as aforesaid, this ordinance shall constitute a contract between said City and said Grantee, for the full term of thirty (30) years from and after the date of approval by said electors.

SECTION 16. This ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its passage.

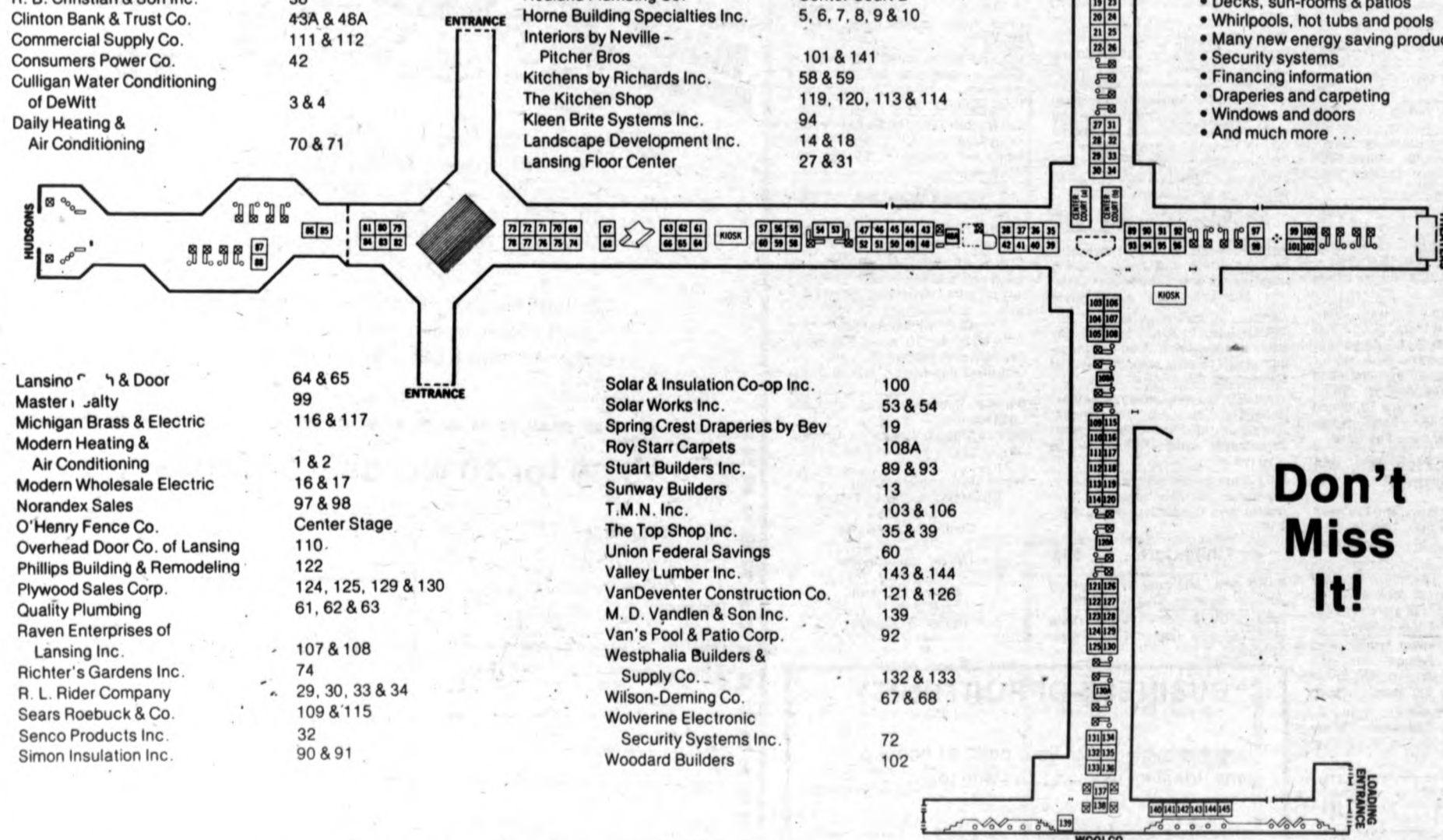

1. That he is the State Treasurer of the State of Michigan and makes and files this complaint under, by virtue of and pursuant to the provisions of Act No. 206 of the Public Acts of 1893, as amended, and Act No. 380 of P.A. 1965, as amended.

2. That Schedule A annexed hereto is the tax record required by the act first above mentioned and contains the description of all lands in the aforesaid county upon which taxes, which were assessed for the years mentioned therein, have remained unpaid for more than one year after they were returned as delinquent, the description of all lands in said county heretofore bid off in the name of the State and thus held and upon which taxes which were assessed subsequent to the tax for which such lands were sold to the State have remained unpaid for more than one year after they were returned as delinquent.

3. That extended separately in said schedule against each description of said lands therein contained are (a) the total amount of delinquent taxes upon said description for the non-payment of which the same may lawfully be sold at the next annual tax sale, (b) interest computed thereon as provided by law to the first day of May, next ensuing, (c) a collection fee of four per cent which shall be a minimum of \$1.00 as provided by Section 211.59, C.L. 1970, as amended, and (d) \$10.00 for expenses, all in accordance with the provisions of the act first above mentioned.

4. That said judgement provide that in default of the payment so ordered of the said several sums computed and extended against said lands in said schedule, the said several parcels of land, or such interest therein as may be necessary to satisfy the amount adjudged against the same, shall severally be sold as the law provides;

d. That your plaintiff may have such other and further relief in the premises as to this court may seem just and equitable.

And your plaintiff will ever pray, etc.
