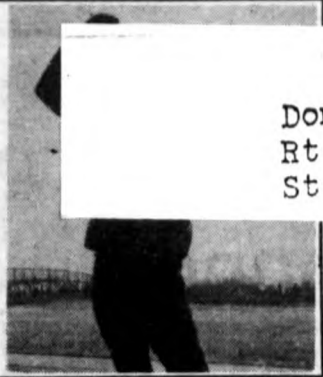

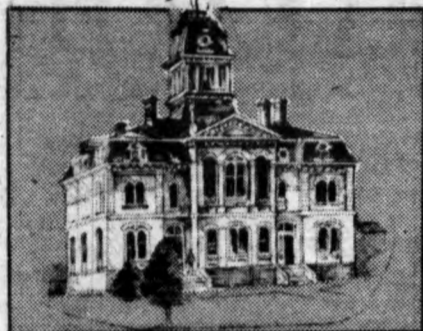

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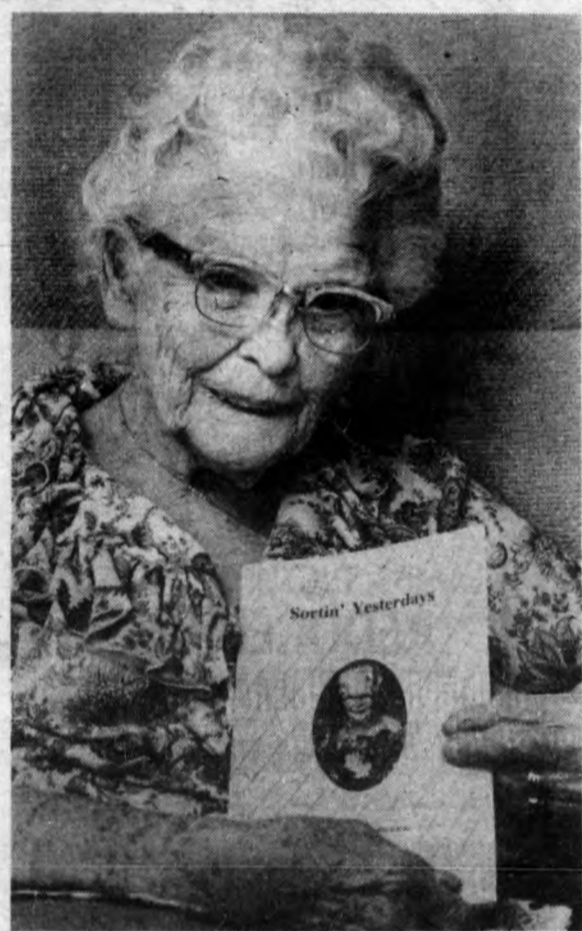

Memories fill her new book

Loui Fritz, an 84-year-old DeWitt Township resident with a razor-sharp memory, has used that memory to help her write a book, *Sortin' Yesterdays*.

The book took Mrs. Fritz more than two decades to complete, and is a chronicle of her life since the turn of the century.

"After writing some of it in the 60's, she put it away and didn't pick it up again until the winter of 1981-82," said her daughter, Florence Hartman. "She had a goal — to finish her book. Every morning when she got up, she said a prayer: 'God, let me finish my book and see it in print.'"

Mrs. Fritz's prayers were answered last April, when the book was finally completed. Several months later, the book came out in print.

Sortin' Yesterdays includes many events in Mrs. Fritz's life, including the memory of her mother's death in 1912, when Loui was only 13. She also writes of her marriage to Ernie Fritz on Feb. 18, 1920 in St. Johns. He passed away in 1978 after 56 years of marriage.

In 1938, Mrs. Fritz and her children debuted with their new band, "Ma Fritz and Her Younguns." The family group performed first in a talent show in Ithaca, and before long became famous in Clinton County. They went to Chicago in 1940 and appeared on WLS radio.

In 1952, Mrs. Fritz became a correspondent for the Clinton County Republican-News, covering Gunnisonville. She began to lose her hearing in 1967, and is now almost totally deaf. Once her hearing started to fail, Mrs. Fritz started collecting and making dolls, and that new hobby began to consume her life.

In addition to seeing her book in print, another of Mrs. Fritz's goals was realized last summer, when she got to see her great-granddaughter, Julie Parkinson, married.

Bank swamped with calls

Rate is lowest since '80

"It seems a lot busier today," a Clinton Bank & Trust loan department secretary said Friday.

"The phones have really been busy," Consumer Loan Officer Kurt Thelen agreed. "I've had 10 calls myself this morning on mortgages and three more on home improvements. It looks like this program is really going to go over well."

The program Thelen referred to is Clinton Bank & Trust's new 30-year fixed home mortgage rate of 12 3/4 percent, which requires just five percent down. The rate is the best home mortgage rate offered by the St. Johns bank in three years, and one of the best rates available in the state.

The last 30-year mortgage rate offered by Clinton Bank & Trust three years ago was 14 percent, and rates climbed as high as 18 3/4 percent at one point, a bank officer said.

Bank President Brandon White announced the rate at a press conference Thursday, and calls were "coming in regularly" at all of the bank's 14 Lansing area branches the next day, Thelen said. Clinton has branches in Bath, DeWitt, Fowler, Wacousta, Elsie, Laingsburg and Maple Rapids, in addition to four Lansing branches and headquarters in St. Johns.

White said "a variety of factors" made possible the availability of \$20 million for such loans — enough to finance 400 \$50,000 homes. Vice-president Brian Fox, in

charge of the new loan program, said action by the Federal Reserve, more than "Reaganomics," made the program possible.

Both cited bottled-up demand for housing as a major reason the program was implemented. With inflation down, housing prices have dropped, Fox explained. If inflation rises, housing prices also will increase, making investments at the current rate secure.

The offer "reflects confidence in the nation's economic recovery," a press release said. "I think the key to turning things around is the psychology of the consumer," Fox added.

Ernie Stuart, president of the Lansing Homebuilders Association, who was also present at the Lansing press conference, agreed. "We're going to see an upturn" in housing starts, he said. "Rates below 13 percent will definitely bring people back in to the market."

If such a recovery occurs, houses built now could be very wise investments, Fox speculated. "When home building starts up again, lumber prices are going to go right through the roof," he predicted. "Houses built at today's prices will be worth a lot more in a few years."

As of Tuesday, Fox said, several applications had already been processed at the St. Johns bank alone — a total well above that for the entire month of January.

"The phones have been going crazy ever since word got out. We've just been swamped with calls," he said.

Inspections just beginning

How clean is your favorite restaurant? Until this week, there was little chance of finding out.

Tuesday, March 1 marked the first full year of regular Clinton County restaurant inspections in many years. At this time a year ago, thanks to staff and funding cuts, most restaurants in the county had long been inspected infrequently, if at all.

"There just wasn't enough staff to do the food service inspections mandated by the state," says Lois Elliott-Wilson, Clinton County sanitarian for the Mid-Michigan District Health Department.

"Many establishments had not been inspected routinely. In some cases, it had been eight years since they were last inspected."

Mrs. Wilson says it is "fortunate" there was no outbreak of food poisoning during recent years. In addition to ignoring possible health risks, the county's inconsistent inspection record has not made her present efforts to improve sanitary conditions any easier, Mrs. Wilson says.

Left alone for years, many restaurant owners now resist suggestions and orders from the health department, she said. "Nobody's died from eating here yet, they'll say."

Since her full-time restaurant inspecting job was funded by the county board over a year ago, Mrs. Wilson has visited most of the county's restaurants twice. She has discovered sanitary conditions ranging from "terrible" to "outstanding" in her unannounced visits, but few restaurants have felt the heat of the health department's full enforcement powers.

"It doesn't do any good to be a cop," Health Department Director Joe Latoff said. "Many have not been inspected for a long time, and it's our duty to educate them."

If conditions are bad enough, Mrs. Wilson can close a restaurant down on the spot. If owners refuse to comply

with her recommendations, they can also be closed, with Latoff's approval, following hearings. But the goal of inspections is to improve conditions, not close places down, Latoff and Mrs. Wilson say.

"We need more education in food service sanitation. We have some very good operators and we have some who just don't understand what the health department requires," Mrs. Wilson said. "I see myself as an educator."

County restaurant owners are being urged to attend a training program sponsored by the health department

at the Road House in St. Johns March 17, Mrs. Wilson said. The \$100 fee for participation is tax deductible. "Some of them really need this program," she said.

Thanks to laws designed to protect consumers, just being a good cook is not enough to get by in the restaurant business these days, Mrs. Wilson says. Restauranters must also know what temperatures food can safely be stored at, what local and state laws require for sewage disposal and water quality, how much light is required in food preparation areas, and the proper pH for cleaning dishes, among other things.

Arriving with clipboard in hand (see related story), Mrs. Wilson rates restaurants on a standard form containing about 50 items. The final ratings are posted on a large board in her office, scoring restaurants on a scale of from one to 100. But "the scores can be misleading sometimes," Mrs. Wilson cautions. "One critical item can really bring a score down. If a piece of equipment is broken, for example.

"On the other hand, there could be a lot of little things that could really chop down a score. So when you look at a score, it doesn't necessarily mean it's good or bad."

Mrs. Wilson said some new restaurants and those open seasonally were inspected once. Scores are listed in order of their first and second inspections, and restaurants which changed ownership between inspections or since inspections were completed are indicated with a box (□).

Loss of appetite part of her job

Lois Elliott-Wilson doesn't go out for dinner very often, and she's not telling where she goes when she does. "It wouldn't be fair," she says.

Perhaps her fondness for home cooking has something to do with her job as restaurant inspector for Clinton County and the Mid-Michigan District Health Department. Whatever the reason, most restaurant owners would prefer to see her arrive "off duty," without her clipboard and 007-style attache case full of inspection devices.

"The line I usually get is, 'Can you come back another time? We've really had a bad day today'."

Mrs. Wilson seldom reschedules her visits, however, unless it is very obvious the day she has chosen is not a typical one.

Once she arrives at a restaurant, she says, she first announces her presence to the owner or manager. She then opens her brief case, puts pencil to clipboard and begins inspecting.

"I have a light meter here," she says going through the neatly-packaged contents of her case (white gloves not included). "I use this to measure the light in food preparation areas.

"Many owners have been turning lights way down in their kitchens to try and save money, but I've told them they're just asking for an accident."

Twice as much lighting is required in food preparation areas as is required in dining areas, she explained. And lighting regulations are seldom enforced in dining areas, she said — a fact which may explain why diners are sometimes forced to use matches to read their menus.

Mrs. Wilson's traveling inspection kit also contains thermometers in a variety of shapes and sizes. Temperature is very important when it comes to preventing bacteria growth, she says. Dishwashers are checked to make sure water is hot enough, and food which is pre-prepared must be kept cold enough — below 45 degrees — or hot enough — above 140 degrees.

Other areas on her inspection list include proper labeling and handling of food, employee hygiene, food equipment and utensils, water (many restaurants have private wells), sewage and garbage disposal, lighting (light bulbs must also be covered to prevent glass from falling into food), ventilation, cleaning of floors, walls and ceilings, dressing rooms and washing areas, storage of non-food items and, of course, insect, rodent and animal control.

"I have this inspector (a spray cannister) for flushing out cockroaches," Mrs. Wilson says. "But I haven't really seen that many. Often they aren't the operator's fault anyway, but come in beverage containers. Once you get them, they're hard to get rid of, though."

Mrs. Wilson admits her job has some occupational hazards. For one, she doesn't find dining out as appetizing as she used to. "And when most people get sick, they usually think they have the flu. Of course, with my experience, my first reaction is food poisoning."

Hot spots aren't so hot this year

The posters in the window beckon you to lands of palm trees, eternal sun and bikini-clad, bronzed bodies. It's enough to make any Michigander pack up and leave the harsh winter for a week or two.

If only we were having a harsh winter. With February temperatures in Michigan hitting 60 degrees, who needs Jamaica?

"I used to have people come into the agency and say 'I want to get out of here. I want to get out of here,'" said Mary Wingert, manager of Spartan Travel in St. Johns. "But this winter has been so mild, they're not doing that anymore. The weather has definitely cut down on the number of people booking trips to warm-weather spots."

Instead, said Ms. Wingert, trips to Las Vegas and Atlantic City are currently high on the list of vacationers from Clinton County. "This is always a very busy time of year for travel agencies," she said. "And right now, we're getting an awful lot of couples in their 40's and 50's booking trips to Vegas and Atlantic City. That's very popular now."

Despite the relatively warm Michigan winter, though, Ms. Wingert said some travelers are still heading south. Among the most popular destinations is Mexico, where devaluation of the peso has made vacationing a bargain. "I was talking with a friend of mine who just got back from Mexico," Ms. Wingert said. "He told me that he stopped in a really nice restaurant on Mexico's west coast and had a big seven-course meal, with nachos and everything. And the total price — including the tip and the beer he drank — was just three dollars."

"We've had a lot of people booking trips to Mexico — both the package trips and the cruises. You can stay in a

nice hotel down there for just \$20 a night. But a lot of people are taking advantage of it, so it's very hard to get a hotel room down there right now."

The St. Johns branch of Spartan Travel, which opened in Southpoint Mall last August, isn't as busy as the other three branches of the company, but "Business is getting better," Ms. Wingert said. "The economy has had some effect on things. What we're seeing is that a lot of families are saving up for one big vacation every three years or so, instead of taking a vacation every year."

Cocaine dealer gets 10-20 years

Daniel Ford Tate, arrested almost a year ago in DeWitt on drug dealing charges, was sentenced to 10 to 20 years in prison by Circuit Judge Randy Tahvonen Monday.

Found guilty by a jury of selling over 50 grams of cocaine to undercover agents, Tate became the first to be prosecuted and convicted in Clinton County under new tougher drug violation laws which call for minimum sentences.

"He was absolutely the first," said Rich Koenigsknecht, chief assistant prosecutor who handled the case for Clinton County Prosecutor Jon Newman. "We've never had anybody arrested with that much to qualify."

The law requires a minimum sentence of 10 years for convictions of delivery of more than 50 grams of cocaine, Koenigsknecht explained. Tate and a partner, Shone Allen Six of Lansing, together were charged with selling 103 grams of cocaine to undercover cops. For amounts more than 250 grams, the minimum sentence is 20 years.

Tate, 27, was arrested at his home at 11651 US-27, DeWitt, near 8 p.m. March 31, 1982, and charged with delivery and conspiracy to deliver 50 grams — about

two ounces — of cocaine.

His arrest came just minutes after the arrest of Six, 31, who has since pleaded guilty to selling about four ounces of cocaine to undercover officers outside of Micky's Bar on US-27. Six attempted to flee after being told he was under arrest, and scattered \$8,800 in police drug buy money along US-27.

"He slipped out of his jacket as they grabbed him and began running," Koenigsknecht said, recalling the scramble after wind-blown bills. "I guess he thought the officers chasing him would be more interested in recovering their money than in him, but they got most of the money back and him too."

Six awaits sentencing March 14, he said. As for Tate's sentence, Koenigsknecht was happy. "I'm very pleased. We wanted this guy to do some time, and it looks like that's what he's going to do."

Lt. Gene Wrigglesworth of the Tri-County Metro Narcotics Squad, which made the arrests, also was pleased. "To say we're happy is an understatement," he said.

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Roads have past, history buff says

A swampy morass of meandering streams and rivers, Clinton County was no paradise in the early 1800s. In fact, in a late-blooming state considered "uninhabitable" by early surveyors, the flatland now known as Clinton County was left to mosquitoes and Indians even longer than most in Michigan.

Today, county residents can thank their less-than-enthusiastic forebears for a straightforward, uncomplicated system of roads, in which main traffic arteries follow the points of the compass, not the whims of natural features. At least that's the opinion of Dud McKean, secretary of the Clinton County Road Commission.

It seems by the time Clinton County was settled — in Maple Rapids in 1832 and a year later in DeWitt — roads were being built along township borders, which followed the straight north-south, east-west maps made by surveyors, McKean said.

There is one exception, however. "Round Lake Road was part of the Grand River Indian Trail," he said. "It was probably just a branch of the trail criss-crossing the state, and follows the Looking Glass River, which empties into the Grand River."

McKean, who researched the history of the county's roads for a recent presentation to about 35 members of the Clinton County Historical Society, said he's glad more roads don't follow "inherited" routes. "We still have problems with Round Lake Road today, what with all the sharp curves in it."

The first recorded road in the county, he says, was Dexter Trail, blazed by Judge Samuel Dexter, founder of Dexter, in southeast Michigan near Ann Arbor, and Ionia. Also among the county's earliest thoroughfares were Turner Street and DeWitt Road, he said.

Such roads were important, McKean says, because most early communities were founded along early transportation routes — rivers, in the case of Maple Rapids and DeWitt, and later, railroads, in the case of Fowler, Ovid, St. Johns and Pewamo.

"The notable exception is Westphalia, which was founded by a group of German immigrants, not near any river, stream or highway," he said.

Also opening the county to early settlement were bridges erected around the early 1900s — the same bridges which are now being closed due to decay.

"One of the main reasons Clinton County was not settled earlier was that it was basically flat lowlands and swamps. That's clear by the fact that we have over 100 bridges in the county, compared to an average of about 50 in other counties," McKean said.

Several old bridges were recently closed, and one over the Looking Glass River in Victor Township collapsed in January when struck by a pickup truck. "It's getting to the point now where almost a nudge from a finger could push some of them over," he said.

The road commission clerk said money will be needed to restore and repair the bridges, and urged local residents to make sure the county gets its share of state license plate fees by filling in 19, Clinton's number, on all license plate application forms.

"If you buy your car in Lansing, chances are the forms will be filled in with Ingham County's number and they'll get the fees for their roads," he said.

McKean said he was impressed with the historical society's expertise on local history topics. "I thought I would present the great enlightenment that Judge Dexter, who founded Ionia, also founded Dexter, but most of them already knew it," he said.

"I was very impressed. They are the unsung people, dedicated to preserving our local history, and they really deserve credit."

Seats up for grabs in all school districts

County residents who think they can do a better job running their local schools will have a chance to run for school board seats June 13.

School board spots are up for grabs in every county district for the annual school election, and millage proposals are also being considered by many districts.

A breakdown of the proposals and positions open for the Monday, June 13 election follows:

- **St. Johns** — Two four-year terms, presently held by President Robert Craig and Trustee Marian Kurncz, expire this year. Neither has yet announced plans to seek re-election, and no millage proposals have been discussed, a school spokesman said.

- **DeWitt** — One four-year term presently held by Trustee Diane Cranmer is up for re-election. None of the district's millages expire, and no new proposals have

been discussed yet, a spokesperson said.

- **Bath** — Board seats presently held by President Richard Wilkins and Trustee Judith Penrod, both four-year terms, expire in June. Millage proposals are being considered, Superintendent Ken Dyer said.

- **Fowler** — One trustee, Ruth Feldpausch, will be up for re-election to a four-year term. Also, the district's 23 operating mills expire, and new proposals are under consideration, Superintendent Jim Andros said.

- **Ovid-Elsie** — Four-year terms held by Treasurer Merle Green and Vice-President Burton Case expire. Neither has decided on plans to run for re-election, Superintendent Dave Porrell said. All of Ovid-Elsie's voted millage expires in June, and proposals are being considered, Porrell said.

- **Pewamo-Westphalia** — One four-year term presently held by Treasurer Anthony Thelen expires in June. Thelen has not announced his plans yet, Superintendent

Roy Thelen said. All of Pewamo-Westphalia's operating millage expires, but board members have not yet begun discussing millage proposals, Thelen said.

In all districts, a minimum of 20 signatures are needed on nominating petitions, and signed petitions must be returned to the districts by 4 p.m., April 11. Petitions are now available in many districts.

The number of signatures needed on nominating petitions is one percent of the total votes cast for the top vote-earner in the most recent school board election.

Talks still stalled on new contract

No new negotiating sessions were scheduled for St. Johns teachers and school board negotiators as of Tuesday, a school spokesman said.

Bargaining sessions resumed earlier this month when a 90-day cooling off period expired Feb. 10, but no progress was reported by either side and talks broke off again.

State mediator Ed Connors has been in contact with both groups, but has not set a new date for negotiations

to resume. The latest demand from teachers is for a two percent increase for the first semester of the current year, and a seven percent increase for the second semester. They have also asked that next year's step increases be figured as if the current year raise was nine percent.

The board, meanwhile, is sticking by demands that teachers accept a wage freeze to help allay financial problems in the district.

Half of the county's six districts have settled teacher contracts. Pewamo-Westphalia teachers accepted a wage freeze, Bath teachers settled for a 3.5 percent pay hike, and DeWitt teachers, after a week-long strike in November, bargained for 5.5 percent this year and 5.9 percent next year.

Still negotiating, along with St. Johns, are teachers in Fowler and at Ovid-Elsie.

Fowler teachers are close to settling and could be ready to sign a new contract by mid-March, Superintendent Jim Andros said.

Ovid-Elsie teachers and their school board have agreed to split the cost of hiring a state mediator, following a decision by the Michigan Employee Relations Commission to discontinue funding mediators for teacher contract disputes. The mediator will cost the school board and the teachers association about \$600 each, Superintendent David Porrell said.

Driver was drinking, police say

A St. Johns policeman, Robert Moinet, 27, of DeWitt, remained in "serious" condition at Sparrow Hospital Tuesday, following an auto accident a week earlier.

Moinet, a member of the St. Johns Police force for about five years, was injured in a crash Monday night, Feb. 21 on US-27 just south of Price Road, Michigan State Police reports said.

Moinet was the only passenger in an auto driven by City of DeWitt policeman Nicholas Stonebrook, 27, of DeWitt, who had been drinking when the crash occurred, according to police reports. Both officers were off duty at the time of the two-vehicle crash, reports said.

Trooper Dennis MacDonell, who is still investigating the accident, said Stonebrook was headed south on US-

27 near 11:45 p.m. when he attempted to pass a semi-truck and struck the left rear corner of the semi-trailer.

Stonebrook, who was not wearing a seatbelt, was treated at Sparrow Hospital and released. Moinet's seatbelt failed to restrain him, reports said, and he received facial and head injuries in the crash.

The driver of the semi-truck, Daniel Peak, 26, of St. Louis, was not injured, MacDonell said.

A Sparrow Hospital spokesperson said Moinet was listed in serious condition Tuesday.

DeWitt Police Chief Wendell Myers refused to comment on the incident, but said through a spokesperson that Stonebrook was still an employee of the department and has been for just over one year.

St. Johns Police Chief Lyle French said Moinet appeared to be recovering well from surgery, and that he looks forward to having him return to the force.

A one-day fund-raising drive by Federal Mogul employees in St. Johns netted \$3,559 for the Clinton County Food Bank last week.

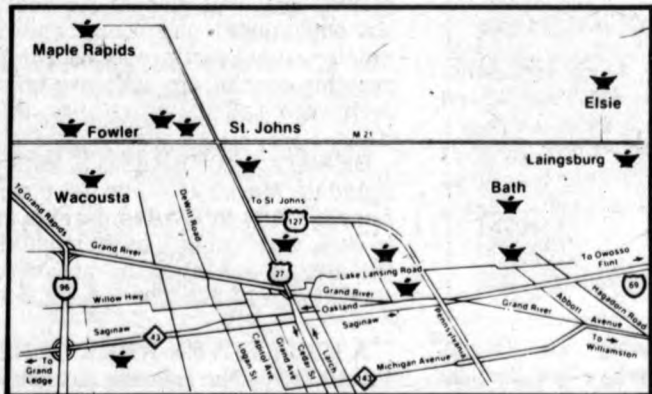

Why everyone?

Brace yourself. March Madness, a.k.a. the state high school basketball tournament, is about to begin. It's a grand and glorious party, whose purpose is to decide where the best basketball teams in Michigan are located. Teams from Class A, B, C and D will fight it out until four champions remain — one from each class.

How do you get an invitation to this all-important affair? Heck, you don't need an invitation. Everybody's invited. From Paw Paw to Pinconning, Clare to Clio, DeWitt to Detroit. It doesn't matter if your basketball team is 25-0 or 0-25. Everyone is allowed to compete.

Sound like a stupid way to run a state championship? You bet.

Think about it for a second. In Michigan high school football, most of the good teams spend the season worrying about getting in to the playoffs. Only eight teams from each class make it, so every game is crucial. Sure, league championships are important, but so is making the state playoffs. When you make it, like DeWitt did last fall, it really says something about your team.

But what does it say about your basket-

ball team when you make the playoffs? All it says is that you have a basketball team. Big deal.

Look at the pros. In every major league (with the exception of pro hockey, in which every team except the Detroit Red Wings makes the playoffs), the teams fight it out during the regular season to decide who makes the playoffs and the right to fight for the championship. It makes the regular-season games really mean something, because every win or loss could be the difference between making the playoffs or sitting at home.

But in high school basketball, all that incentive is gone. The thing that high school coaches love to talk about is winning league championships. Winning the league, they'll tell you, is much more important than the state playoffs. All the emphasis is put on league titles.

Alright, so there's your incentive for league games. But what's going to compel you through the non-conference schedule? DeWitt has all the incentive in the world when Okemos is the opponent, but what's going to make the Panthers break their backs when playing a non-league team like Laingsburg? Win or lose, both teams are still going to make the playoffs, so where's the incentive to go all-out?

I certainly don't mean to imply that basketball players don't try their best during every game. I'm sure they do. But the regular-season games need to have more emphasis put on them. Every game on a team's schedule should be a must-win. When everyone makes the playoffs, though, it doesn't work the way.

So the solution is simple. Limit the number of teams which make the playoffs. Come up with a point system, like they use in football, if need be. Anything which would cut down on the number of participants. It doesn't really matter how many you limit it to, but it should be something to work for. A reward, not a gift.

I am a granddaughter of Henry M. Perrin. He was a Vermont man, a graduate (by his own efforts) of Dartmouth and Albany Law School, one of the founders of Clinton Bank & Trust, a state senator and the head of a very prosperous land business in the early days of this county.

If you would like to see how his name is spelled, take the first drive into the cemetery and see it on a tall granite obelisk brought from his native Vermont.

He arrived when the railroad ended here and helped cut brush off the courthouse square. He planted a double row of maple trees from the railroad to Floral Avenue, and he built a great many houses in this town. He could read seven languages and speak three, or was it four? He donated to this city the land on which PERRIN-Palmer school is built. I could go on much farther.

In the Gratiot County history, we are told that PERRINTON was named for him and his brother, since they had large land holdings there in the early days.

People of little education, and especially those who suffered from the phonics gap, are apt not to correlate letters and sounds. These would frequently say "Perring." While we are on the subject, this is the way to spell "impostor"; and "lying on the floor" would be better than "laying."

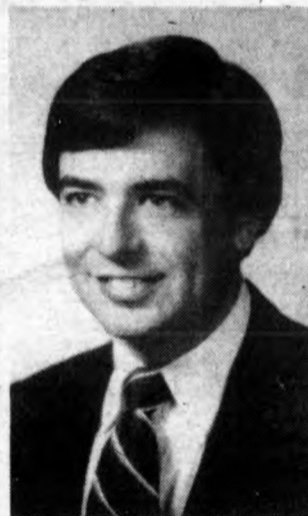

Marauders overcome poor shooting to top Wings

Feb. 25 — Ovid-Elsie 59, St. Johns 55: As St. Johns coach Al Werbish was quick to point out, Ovid-Elsie is a team which learns from its mistakes. The first time the two teams met this year, O-E let a huge lead slip away, allowing the Redwings to pick up the win.

Not this time, though. The Marauders once again picked up a big lead, but "They learned from the first time," Werbish said. "They weren't going to let us catch up again. You don't rally twice against a team. They deserved to win the game. They played hard and were more aggressive than we were."

The win left St. Johns and O-E in a tie for third place in the Mid-Michigan 'B' at 5-4, with one league game remaining. The Redwings play fifth-place Chesaning tomorrow night, while the Marauders must tangle with first-place Ionia.

"Defensively, I think we played a very good game," Marauder coach Bob Foreback said. "Our defensive game plan worked really well. Our offense was pretty bad, though. We only shot 32 percent, and that's low for us."

The two teams took turns stinking up the gym in the first half. In the first quarter, it was O-E's turn, as the Marauders shot a miserable 14 percent (three-of-21) from the floor, while St. Johns grabbed a six-point lead.

Then it was St. Johns' turn. In the second quarter, the Wings hit only 13 percent of their shots. During that period, the Marauders scored 17 unanswered points to take a 29-18 lead at the half.

"That second quarter is what killed us," Werbish said. "From then on, we played them pretty even. We were taking good shots in that quarter, but they just wouldn't fall for us."

In the second half, the Marauders opened up a 15-point lead before St. Johns started to whittle away at it. "We really had a chance to put the game away, but we missed a lot of free throws in the fourth quarter," Foreback said. "We only hit eight of 16 free throws. If we had been able to knock those free throws in, we would have had a more comfortable lead."

For O-E, junior Mark St. Pierre led the attack with 14 points. Pete Hurst added 11 points, while Jon Martin and Paul Horak each had nine. Martin led all rebounders with 11. St. Johns was led by Steve Gonzales' 14 points and Kurt Thelen's 10 points.

After the game against Ionia on Friday, the Marauders will close out the regular season Saturday night at home against Bay City All Saints. "They started out pretty slow this year," Foreback said of Bay City, "but they've been doing better. They've beaten some pretty good teams, so it should be a good game."

March 1 — Mt. Pleasant 80, St. Johns 67: The Redwings had a very hard time keeping up with Jones Tuesday night, and it ended up costing them the game.

The Jones is Mt. Pleasant's Tom Jones, an all-state candidate at guard who burned St. Johns for 36 points.

"We just couldn't keep up with him," Werbish said. "We tried doing some different things on him, but nothing worked. Mt. Pleasant is just a very good team."

Jones' shooting helped Mt. Pleasant shoot 56 percent from the floor during the game. The Redwings also had a good shooting night — 51 percent from the field — but a first-half lapse spelled their doom. Twice in the half the Wings committed four consecutive turnovers, allowing Mt. Pleasant to take a 47-30 halftime lead.

"We played them even up after that," Werbish said, "but we just have to learn that you've got to play four quarters of basketball if you want to win."

Dave Clouse had a very good game for St. Johns, scoring 14 points on seven-of-eight shooting. Steve Gonzales added 11 points, while Scott Furry scored eight points. John Keenoy had eight rebounds.

"Scott Furry had one of his better games of the year for us," Werbish said. "And Dave Clouse played super. He's shooting about 65 percent from the field now, and that's going to help him get a lot of playing time."

"We only got two serves in during that entire first game," Fowler coach Mary Staley said. "We had good set-ups, but our serving was very bad."

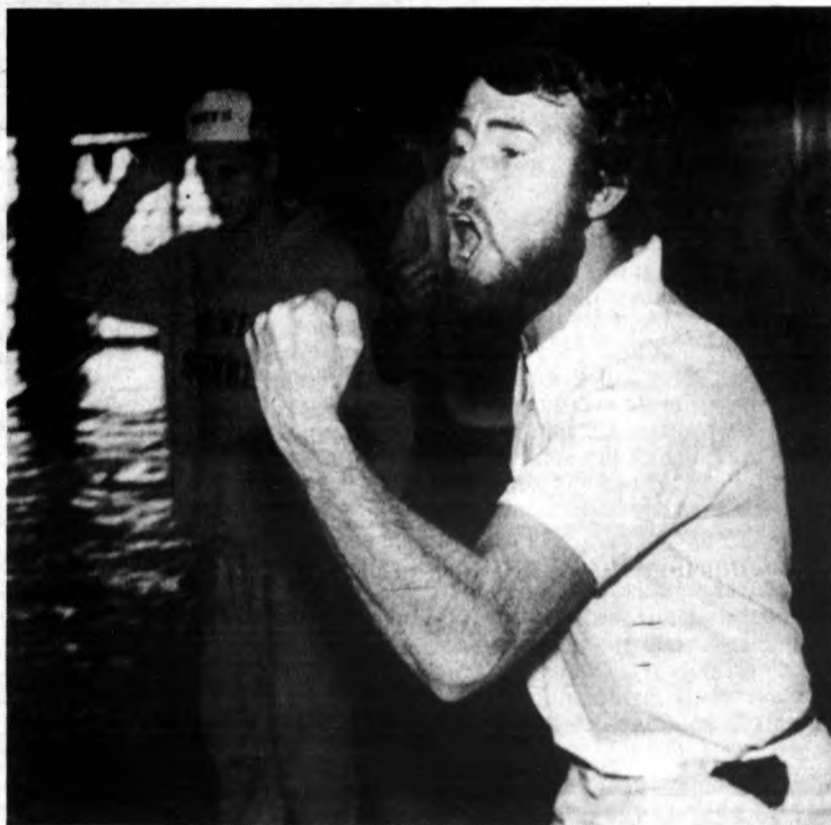

- Four hub caps were taken Feb. 24 from a 1980 Buick parked in the Ovid-Elsie High School parking lot, Clinton County Sheriff's Deputies said.

- Two subjects were arrested Feb. 24 in the theft of a 12-volt battery taken from a pickup truck belonging to John Joseph Swanchara, Lot 133, Searles, St. Johns, Clinton County Sheriff's Deputies said.

- A single-speed bike, valued at \$90, was taken Feb. 25 from Bruce Fedewa, Lot 223, Searles, St. Johns, Clinton County Sheriff's Deputies said.

Majority of fires not in city

The St. Johns City Fire Department handled 88 fires last year, resulting in a total amount of \$104,625 worth of damage, Fire Chief Clare Maier told the City Commission at its meeting Monday night.

The majority of those fires — 49 of them — occurred outside the city limits, Maier's report said. Those fires caused a total of \$85,000 worth of damage. The 39 fires in the city caused \$19,625 worth of damage, the report said.

The most common fires in the city were ones involving vehicles, with 16 cases reported. There were 12 residential fires in the city last year. Among the country fires, 20 were residential and 11 involved vehicles.

Maier also said the addition of a volunteer firefighter in January has raised his staff to a full compliment of 20.

Later in the meeting, commissioners authorized \$1,492.87 to be used for improving the worn-out street signs in the city.

The commissioners also adopted the final reading of the city's new parking plan, which provides for stickers to be placed on cars, replacing the old permits which sat in the window of a vehicle. The stickers are purchased for use in designated 10-hour parking spots in the city.

Acting on a recommendation from the Park Board, commissioners voted to raise the fee for softball teams in the city's league from \$80 to \$100. Also, the fee for non-residents was raised from \$5 to \$7. Registration for the league is slated for mid-April.

ORDINANCE NO. 345 CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY ELECTRIC FRANCHISE ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE, granting to CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right, power and authority to construct, maintain and commercially use electric lines consisting of towers, masts, poles, crossarms, guys, braces, feeders, transmission and distribution wires, transformers and other electrical appliances on, under, along and across the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local electric business in the CITY OF ST. JOHNS, CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN, for a period of thirty years.

THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. That wherever the word "Grantee" appears in this ordinance, it is hereby intended to designate, and shall be held to refer to the Consumers Power Company, a Michigan corporation, its successors and assigns.

SECTION 2. The right, power and authority is hereby granted and vested in said Grantee to construct, maintain and commercially use electric lines, consisting of towers, masts, poles, crossarms, guys, braces, feeders, transmission and distribution wires, transformers and other electrical appliances on, under, along and across the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local electric business in the City of St. Johns, Clinton County, Michigan, for a period of thirty years.

SECTION 3. No highway, street, alley, bridge or other public place used by said Grantee shall be obstructed longer than necessary during the work of construction and maintenance and shall be restored to the same good order and condition as when such work was commenced.

SECTION 4. All towers, masts, poles and other supports shall be set and all wires shall be suspended or buried in a careful and proper manner so as not to injure persons or property. The Grantee shall have the right to trim trees if necessary in the conducting of such business, subject, however, to the supervision of the City Manager of the City. The Grantee shall at all times keep and save the City free and harmless from all loss, costs and damage to which it may be subject by reason of the negligent construction and maintenance of the towers, masts, poles, wires and other structures and appliances, the erection, burial and maintenance of which are hereby authorized.

SECTION 5. The Grantee shall be entitled to charge the inhabitants of said City for electric energy for light, heat and power, the rates as approved by the Michigan Public Service Commission and at present effective within said City. Said rates shall be subject to review and change at any time by the Michigan Public Service Commission or its successors, upon proper application by either said Grantee or the City, acting by the City Manager, being made thereto, and the regularly filed rates as approved by said Michigan Public Service Commission or its successors, as applicable to said City of St. Johns, shall at all times be the lawful rates.

All bills for electric energy shall be payable monthly. The Grantee may collect the minimum charge as specified in said schedule. It shall also furnish and maintain commercially accurate meters to measure the energy furnished. Said Grantee shall at all reasonable times have access to the premises of its customers, for the purpose of reading, inspecting, removing and replacing such meters.

SECTION 6. The form of accounts kept by the Grantee shall conform to the orders and rules of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

SECTION 7. The value of the property comprising the Grantee's electric distribution system, used in supplying local service within the City of St. Johns, is hereby fixed and determined to be \$1,649,150.13, as of the effective date of this ordinance.

SECTION 8. The City of St. Johns determines that in improving, repairing, rebuilding and maintaining the streets, alleys, bridges and other public places in the City, no benefit accrues to the personal property of the Grantee, but if said Grantee owns

real estate, such improvement shall be paid for by it, in accordance with its benefit.

SECTION 9. The City shall have the right to establish and enforce reasonable standards of service and to order extensions of service and maintenance of fixtures, appliances and equipment in accordance with the rules, regulations and orders of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

SECTION 10. The joint use of Grantee's facilities in said City shall be permitted only upon such terms and conditions as may be imposed by the Michigan Public Service Commission.

SECTION 11. In case the City elects, under its charter, to purchase or lease the property of Grantee, used in or useful for the distribution and sale of electricity in said City, the price to be paid therefor shall be the value as set forth in Section 7 hereof, plus the cost of any additions, extensions or improvements which may be made to the said electric properties of Grantee after the effective date of this ordinance, together with the cost of the transmission lines and all improvements thereon necessarily expended in furnishing electric service to the City.

SECTION 12. In consideration of the rights, power and authority hereby granted, all of which shall vest in the Grantee for a period of thirty (30) years as aforesaid, said Grantee shall faithfully perform all things required by the terms hereof, and such performance by the Grantee shall be in lieu of all license fees, rentals or charges of every name and nature, except property taxes, which the City might otherwise levy and impose.

SECTION 13. This franchise shall not be deemed exclusive.

SECTION 14. The Grantee may lease, assign or otherwise alienate this franchise upon the condition that its successors shall be bound by and perform all of the obligations and terms hereof.

SECTION 15. The enactment of this ordinance shall be submitted for ratification to the vote of the electors of said City, and the same shall be and become valid and binding upon the approval and ratification of this ordinance by the affirmative vote of at least three-fifths of the electors of said City voting thereon at a regular or special municipal election to be held in the manner provided by law. This ordinance shall not be submitted to the electors unless the Grantee shall within thirty (30) days after the adoption hereof, file with the City Commission its written acceptance, subject only to the approval of the electors. Upon the acceptance hereof, and approval by the electors as aforesaid, this ordinance shall constitute a contract between said City and said Grantee, for the full term of thirty (30) years from and after the date of approval by said electors.

SECTION 16. This ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its passage.

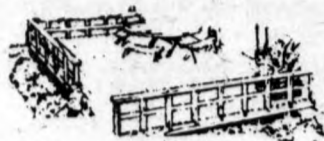
