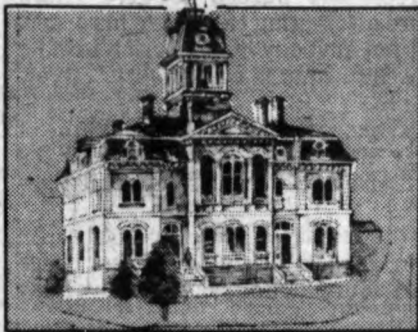

## Four elected to twp. board

About 800 voters turned out in Watertown Township Tuesday to elect four new board members, according to unofficial vote totals. More than 1,100 voted Jan. 18 in an election which recalled the township's supervisor, clerk and two trustees.

Elected township supervisor Tuesday was Democrat Willard Huntoon, who garnered 454 votes to Republican Richard Ackerman's 374. Huntoon, 36, of 8463 Corrison Rd., is the owner of Pure Water of Grand Ledge and a sales representative for Wolverine Water Treatment.

In the closest race, Republican Charlene Borgeson edged Democrat Phyllis Rathbun by just 19 votes for the clerk's office, 430-411. Mrs. Borgeson, 46, of 13744 Summer Ln., was the township's deputy clerk and acting clerk until Rathbun was appointed interim clerk by Governor James Blanchard following the Jan. 18 recall election.

Both Republican candidates for trustee seats defeated their Democratic opponents Tuesday. Leon "Pete" Clark Jr. was the largest vote earner in the election with 550, followed by Jack Fraser with 427. The Democrats, James Davis and Thomas Mauro, received 331 and 361 votes, respectively.

Clark, 28, of 9900 Looking Glassbrook Rd., is a farmer and a member of the township's planning commission. Fraser, 57, of 13505 Forest Hill Rd., is retired, and a member of the Looking Glass Valley Farm Bureau.

The recall of Supervisor Vaughn Montgomery, Clerk Mildred McDonough and trustees John Fox and Forest Shipman was brought about by a board vote on Sept. 23 to settle a long dispute with landfill developer Jerry Granger. Board members who voted for the out-of-court lawsuit settlement said it was the best they could have hoped for, since a pending state law would have soon taken all authority out of their hands.

Members of the recall committee, however, said that the settlement was premature and gave the green light to the Clinton County Zoning Board of Appeals to grant Granger a special use permit for the dumping of hazardous waste.

## St. Johns man busted at bar

A St. Johns man arrested Wednesday, March 16 at a DeWitt Township bar has been charged with delivery of an ounce and a half of cocaine, Tri-County Metro Narcotics Squad officers say.

John Joseph Makara, 27, of 2530 W. Maple Rapids Rd., St. Johns, was arrested in the parking lot of Richard's Pigeon Inn in DeWitt Township after he allegedly sold cocaine to an undercover narcotics agent, Lt. Gene Wrigglesworth of the Metro Squad said.

Following the arrest at about 1:30 p.m., officers obtained warrants and searched Makara's residence, finding a few ounces of marijuana, Wrigglesworth said. They also searched a house owned by Makara at 15281 Boichot, DeWitt. Wrigglesworth said LSD and Quaaludes were found at the rented home.

The suspect's business, J & S Irrigation, located at 4741 N. East St., DeWitt Township, across the street from the Pigeon Inn, was also searched, but no drugs were found, Wrigglesworth said.

## Stemming from accident

## Officer fights DUIL charge

City of DeWitt policeman Nicholas Stonebrook waived his arraignment in district court last Friday and entered a plea of not guilty, a court spokesperson said. Stonebrook was charged with driving under the in-

fluence of alcohol following a Feb. 21 crash on US-27 when the auto he was driving struck the trailer of a semi truck near the intersection of Price Road.

Stonebrook, 27, of DeWitt, and St. Johns Policeman Robert Moinet, also a 27-year-old DeWitt resident, were both off duty at the time of the 11:45 p.m. accident. Stonebrook received minor injuries, and Moinet, who was seriously injured in the accident, has since been released from Sparrow Hospital following surgery and treatment of facial and head injuries.

Clinton County Prosecutor Jon Newman speculated Stonebrook could lose his job if convicted of the drunk driving charge. DeWitt City Police Chief Wendell Myers suspended Stonebrook following the accident, but had no comment about further action following the officer's plea last week.

Stonebrook was hired by DeWitt City Police just over a year ago, Myers said. The charge carries a maximum sentence of 90 days in jail, a \$500 fine and loss of driver's license. The minimum sentence is a \$100 fine.

Stonebrook and his attorney will be asked to present their case sometime in April, a court official said.

## DeWitt site of break-in binge

Five break-ins in DeWitt Township's Country Meadows Village Center resulted in a loss of an "undetermined" amount of money Monday night, said DeWitt Township Police Chief Carroll Lee.

The DeWitt Medical Center and three doctors' offices inside, as well as an insurance company at 13109 Schavey, were burglarized. "We have reason to believe this is a group that has been hitting other places as well," Lee said Tuesday.

In all, 102 complaints were reported during the week beginning March 13 and ending March 20, Clinton County Sheriff's Department reports said. The complaints resulted in 28 arrests, 15 by sheriff's deputies. Among them were:

- A group of Bath area teens could face prosecution for unauthorized entry of a home, according to Bath Township Police reports.

A spokesperson said a warrant was being sought for the arrest of at least one youth on charges of operating a vehicle under the influence of liquor. The charges stem from an incident which occurred Sunday morning, March 20 in Prigris Park, when a Blazer containing seven teens rolled over.

The driver had been drinking and was "horsing around," a spokesperson said. One teen was injured in the accident, and others, attempting to summon aid, broke into a nearby home, frightening the homeowner into fleeing.

Bath Township Police Department withheld the names of the homeowner

and all of the teens involved, awaiting the issuance of warrants.

- A breaking and entering was reported at Adgate's Market in Westphalia, March 19. An undetermined amount of money was taken from the store's safe, reports said. The break-in is under investigation.

- DeWitt City Police recovered a vehicle which had been reported stolen by Lansing Police. The 1979 Mercury was recovered on Cherry Street in DeWitt March 18.

- Ronald D. Nevins of 15507 Webster Rd., Bath, was arrested by Bath Township Police March 18, on a warrant issued by Meridian Township Police for driving on a suspended license.

- Charles E. Minner (no address given) was injured in a one car accident March 12 on Herbison Road in Wafertown Township, sheriff's reports said. Minner was headed west on Herbison Road near 1:04 a.m. when he struck a bridge abutment on the east end of the west-bound lane near the intersection of Wacousta Road, reports said. Minner was taken to Ingham Medical Hospital for treatment of injuries. No citation was issued.

- Fire broke out at 2:20 p.m. Tuesday, March 22, between a hot water heater and a dryer at the home of Roger Beebee, 704 S. Wight, St. Johns. According to St. Johns Fire Chief Clare Maier, the fire mainly resulted in smoke damage and no injuries were reported.

## Judge hires judge as lawyer

Former Ingham Circuit Judge Don Reisig has been hired by Clinton County Circuit Judge Timothy Green to represent Green's side in a dispute with the county board over the friend of the court's salary.

Green says he initially met directly with the board's attorney, John Clary of Grand Rapids, in an attempt to resolve the dispute. When that meeting and another with three legal experts failed to produce a compromise, however, Green hired Reisig, County Board Chairman Roger Overway said.

"He talked to Reisig, who was set to go on vacation for two weeks, then he sent the letter," Overway said. "The letter" was a memo from Green which temporarily excused Clinton County Clerk Jane Swanchara and Treasurer Gerald Shepard from following Green's order to give Friend of the Court Colleen Steinman an immediate raise to \$30,000.

Green first ordered the raise — a \$5,333 hike — March 3, when he issued an administrative order to Mrs. Swanchara and Shepard. The pay hike, including payments retroactive to Jan. 1, was to go into effect March 11.

In his order, Green said Mrs. Steinman deserves the increase because of her legal training and because other counties pay their friends of the court more — an average of nearly \$39,000, according to his own study.

Green refused to comment on the dispute Monday. "It would not be appropriate for me to comment at this time since the matter may be resolved by negotiation," he said. Mrs. Steinman has also refused to comment on the dispute.

Commissioners say she does not deserve an increase, and at a special meeting March 8, they directed that no raise be paid. Board members had already given Mrs. Steinman a \$3,000 raise in January, more than recommended by County Administrator William LeFevre, Overway pointed out.

LeFevre's study of counties shows she is well paid, Overway said. He and other commissioners say Green's selection of comparison counties is unfair, since most of the counties are larger and all have attorneys as friends of the court.

A law degree is not required to become friend of the court, and it was agreed Mrs. Steinman's salary would not be based on her legal training, Overway says.

Overway said he could not rule out the possibility the matter could wind up in court. Overway and other county officials met with Reisig and a panel of three legal experts March 9, he said, but no compromise was reached. Present were Genesee County's Chief Circuit Judge Harry B. McAra, Cooley Law School Professor and former Dean Robert Krinock, and Bill Rye, a personnel department employee with the State Court Administrator's Office.

Overway said Green has agreed to give board members notice before attempting to enforce his order. "He has agreed not to put anybody in jail, or at least told us he would notify us first. That is a possibility," Overway said.

Mrs. Swanchara and Shepard, caught in the middle of the dispute, both say they would have followed the judge's order rather than disobey and risk possible fines or jailing by Green.

Reorganization of the friend of the court system in Michigan expected in June is likely to put the office under the circuit court's jurisdiction, anyway, Overway admits.

"We hope we can work out a settlement," he said.

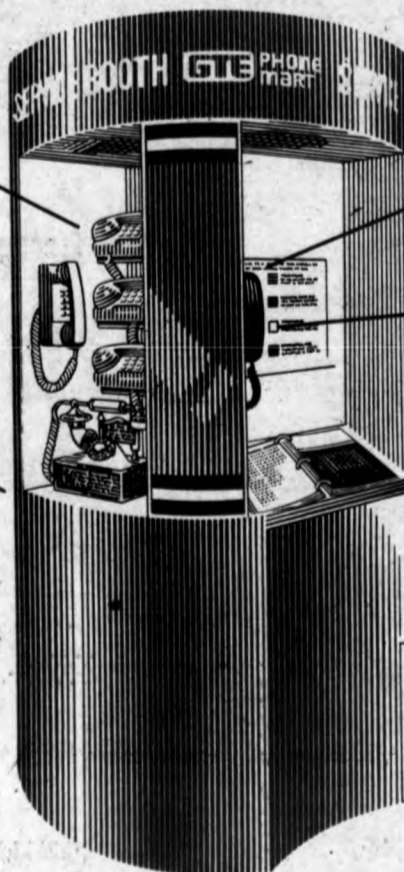

# Mother nature gets last laugh on winter

After a winter of unseasonably warm weather, a snowstorm on the first day of spring surprised many Clinton County residents.

According to the U.S. Weather Bureau at the Capital City Airport, 11.3 inches of the unfamiliar white stuff fell in the period from late Sunday afternoon to Tuesday morning. The weather bureau reported 14.1 inches for the entire winter.

The snow caused all schools in the county to close Monday and Tuesday. The County Courthouse and Department of Social Services were among the many offices which decided to shut down at noon on Monday.

Two meetings — the Bath Township Board and Fowler School Board — scheduled for Monday night were also cancelled due to the weather. The Fowler meeting was re-scheduled for Monday, March 28.

Clinton County Sheriff's Deputies reported no major accidents as of noon Monday. Icy and snowy roads were blamed for 11 fender-benders, however, a Sheriff's Department spokesman said.

Despite the heavy snowfall, all of the county roads, except for a "small percentage" of the gravel roads, remained open, Road Commission Superintendent Robert Ancel said.

Students throughout the county got an unexpected vacation when Bath, DeWitt, St. Johns, Pewamo-Westphalia, Ovid/Elsie and Fowler schools were closed due to heavy snow for the first time this year. Also closed were all parochial schools in the county, and the Clinton Intermediate School District.

Although most students enjoyed their holiday, some had to shovel snow. Among the unlucky was Bruce Riley, a senior at St. Johns High School.

Normally, Riley works indoors from 7 to 9 a.m. at Clinton Bank and Trust, 200 N. Clinton, St. Johns. Then he goes to school. But when the snowstorm hit town, Riley had a big job on his hands.

He had to clear all of the sidewalk along Walker and Clinton Streets which rings the bank. That kept him busy for about six hours on Monday.

"I was just getting used to the warm weather," said Riley, who competes in low hurdles, discus and pole vault events for the St. Johns track team. "I had a week of practice outside. Now it will probably be another week before we get outside again."

Though the spring storm caught many St. Johns residents by surprise, most were not complaining.

"I really don't mind it," said Dave Barber, owner of Julie K, 110 N. Clinton St., St. Johns. "We've had a mild winter. In a way, it's kind of fun."

But Barber was thinking about another "fun" activity as he leaned on his snow shovel.

"I guess I wish it (the snowstorm) would have happened a month earlier. I've already played golf this year, so that's going to mess up those plans."

## Humphrey gives city an A-

"I'm a little biased because I have to evaluate my own performance, but I'd say we're doing very well," City Manager Randy Humphrey said.

Humphrey, who reported on the state of St. Johns to members of the St. Johns Area Chamber of Commerce during the Chamber's luncheon meeting last Thursday, says the city rates about an A minus.

"There are areas where we could improve, but I think we're doing a good job of maintaining services, even in spite of cutbacks in state funds."

So far, state budget cuts have trimmed the city budget by about \$50,000, but city services have not suffered, Humphrey said. "We're here to serve the public and to run this city like a business."

In his community update, Humphrey covered a variety of topics and praised the Chamber for its strong support of the city. He congratulated the chamber on its recent reorganization and complimented members who worked with the city's parking committee to come up with a new parking plan last year. The plan, which provides free one-hour parking in front of downtown businesses, was given final approval by the city commission in January.

Humphrey told chamber members \$900,000 in improvements to the city's downtown railroad crossing topped the list of recent city projects. The city's share of the improvements totals \$38,000.

Heading the list of future needs, he says, is a new fire hall and more room for the city library. "We have a fire hall reserve fund and so far, we've earmarked about \$40,000," Humphrey said. The money will most likely be used to erect a pole-barn style fire hall between the police station and Spring Street, he said.

"Nothing concrete" has been planned for either the fire hall or the library yet, he said.

Lots of space is still available at the city's industrial park on the east side of US-27 north of town, he said, and efforts are underway to attract industries to the location.

Humphrey also reported on the city's recreation program, which he said has grown in "mammoth proportions" during recent years. "We now have more than 1,000 adults participating in our recreation program," he said.

# Fowler teachers close to signing

Fowler teachers and their school board have reached a tentative agreement, but details of the contract settlement have not been released.

Teachers in Fowler, Ovid-Elsie and St. Johns have yet to sign new contracts for the current school year. The county's other three districts, Bath, DeWitt and Pewamo-Westphalia, have reached settlements ranging from a nearly six percent increase in DeWitt to a wage freeze agreement in Pewamo-Westphalia. Bath teachers settled for a 3.5 percent pay hike.

Fowler Superintendent **Jim Andros** said teachers are expected to ratify the tentative pact March 30, after their bargaining group, the Ingham County Education Association, looks over details the previous day.

"The board should get a chance to approve it in early April," Andros said. The superintendent refused to say if the contract called for a salary increase, but said the new contract would be a two-year settlement, effective from 1982-84.

In St. Johns, meanwhile, teachers and the school board may abandon state mediation in favor of direct negotiations, Superintendent **Earl Gabriel** said Monday. The school board was scheduled to hold a special meeting Wednesday night to consider such talks, Gabriel said.

Teachers have requested a two percent raise for the first semester of the current year, and a seven percent raise for the second semester, now in progress. Board members say the district cannot afford salary increases, and have asked teachers accept a wage freeze.

Gabriel said he hopes both sides can meet soon to resolve the dispute.

At Ovid-Elsie, teachers and the school board have resorted to help from a Michigan Employee Relations Commission fact finder. Both sides will meet and present their sides to the fact finder March 24, Superintendent **Dave Porrell** said. A report is expected about three weeks later. The fact finding service, once provided by the state at no charge, will cost the teachers group and the board about \$600 each.

A cop out? Certainly not. A surprise? Maybe. But Fowler basketball coach Denny Smith's decision to name four most valuable players this season can best be described as a tribute to team balance.

"This has been an excellent ball team," Smith said, "and I knew that we were good. But I also knew we had that missing ingredient: size. Still, we had five excellent athletes out on the floor, and they all gave 100 percent."

The four starting seniors — Dave Koenigsnecht, Jim Farley, Glen Feldpausch and Marty Hamilton — were the recipients of the team MVP trophies at Sunday night's awards banquet. Since the school provides just three trophies for post-season honors, Smith reached into his own pocket for the fourth.

A look at the final-season statistics and one can understand the magnitude of the Eagles' team balance. All four seniors averaged in double figures, with Farley (13.6 points/game) nosing out Feldpausch (13.2 points/game) for top honors. Hamilton (12.7/game) took third while Koenigsnecht (11.3/game) placed fourth on the list.

If one's overall stats stood above the rest, it would have to be Koenigsnecht's. The 5-foot-11-inch forward grabbed a team-high 7.9 rebounds per game on average, in addition to leading the Central Michigan Athletic Conference in steals (106) and assists (126).

He joined Farley on The Clinton County News' All-County first team's squad this season.

Even with five outstanding starters, however, the Eagles proved no match for the Concord Yellow Jackets at last Friday's regional final game at Charlotte High School. Concord overcame Fowler's 14-9 first-quarter lead and came away with a 70-58 victory which propelled them into last night's state quarterfinals.

"Concord just an an outstanding night," Smith lamented. "We went in there thinking we could beat them, and I still think we can. But they (Concord) shot 63 percent from the floor. That's astronomical. Pros don't shoot that well."

Leading the way for the Yellow Jackets was all-stater Scott Clark, who shot a sizzling nine-for-12 from the field. He finished with 21 points in just over 3½ quarters of play.

"He made a believer out of me," Smith conceded.

The Eagles looked strong through most of the first half, using their quickness and court savvy to negate Concord's decisive size advantage. But disaster struck in the final minutes of the second quarter, and it struck quickly.



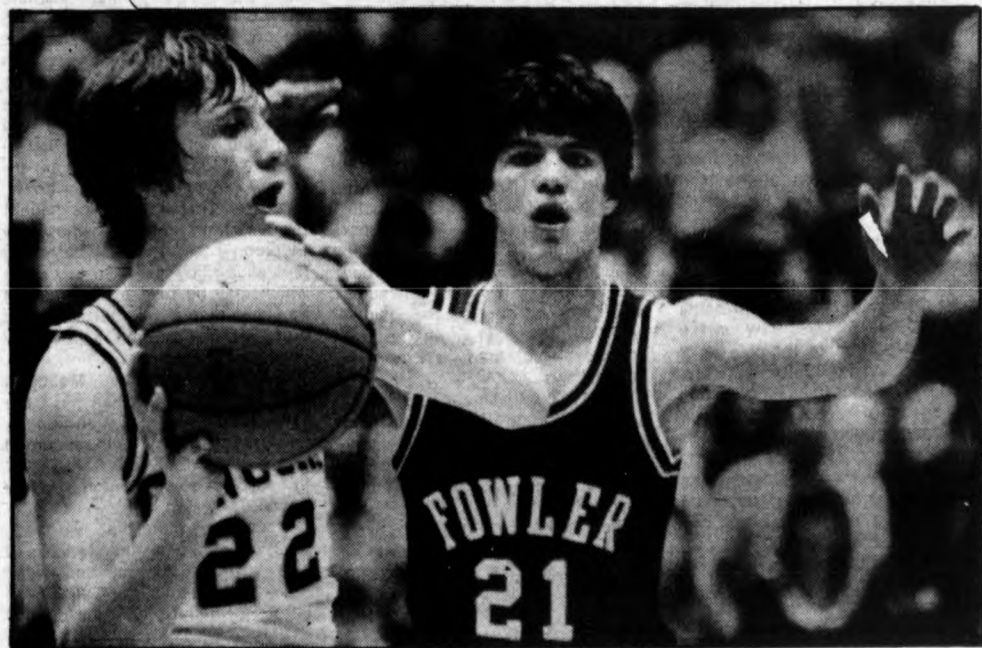
Fowler senior Glen Feldpausch goes to any height to play good defense. Photos by Bob Stern

After Feldpausch's bucket increased the Fowler lead to 24-19 with 2½ minutes remaining before intermission, Concord rattled off 10 straight points, including a three-point play at the buzzer.

"I don't know if it was a mental lapse on our part or

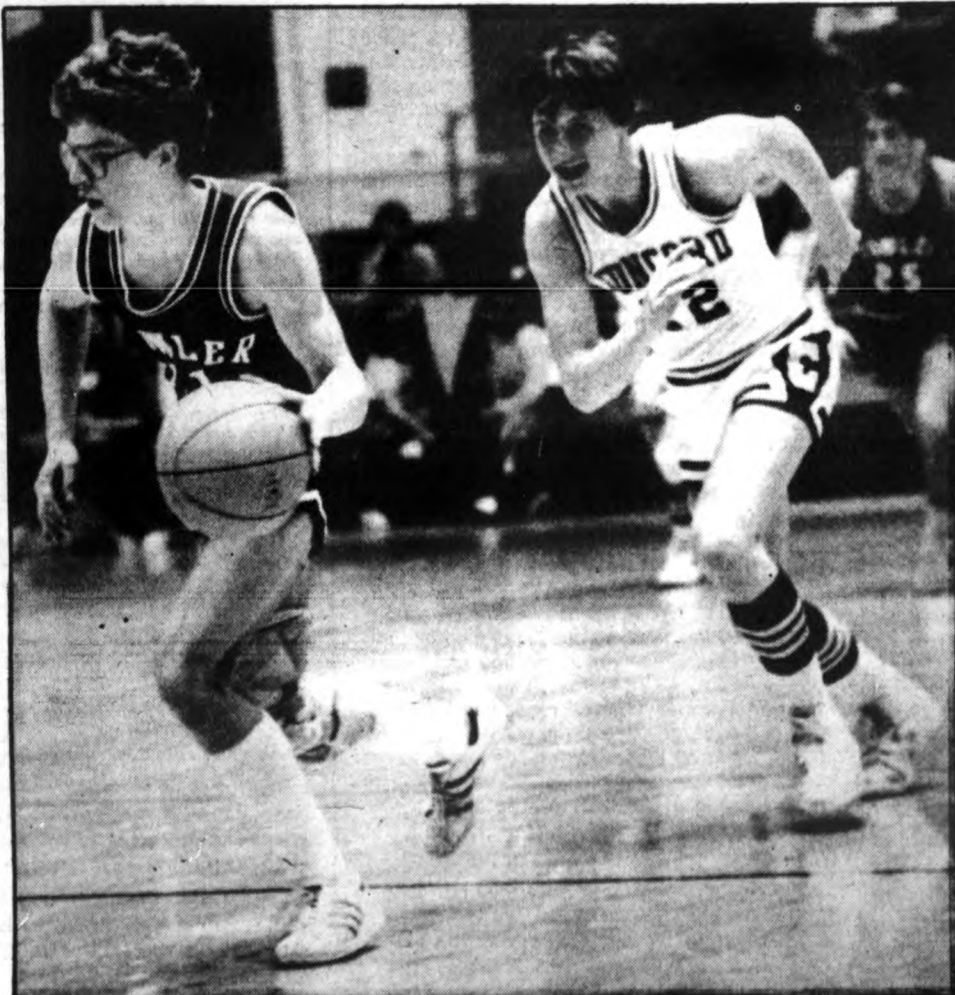
not," Smith said. "Whatever the case, we were never able to recover from it."

Indeed. Although the Eagles stayed within striking distance the entire third quarter and part of the fourth, they never regained the lead.

On the academic side, Gonzales will be looking at a pre-med curriculum. "I want to go into sports medicine or something like that," he said. "Maybe even coaching. I just like sports too much to ever leave it."

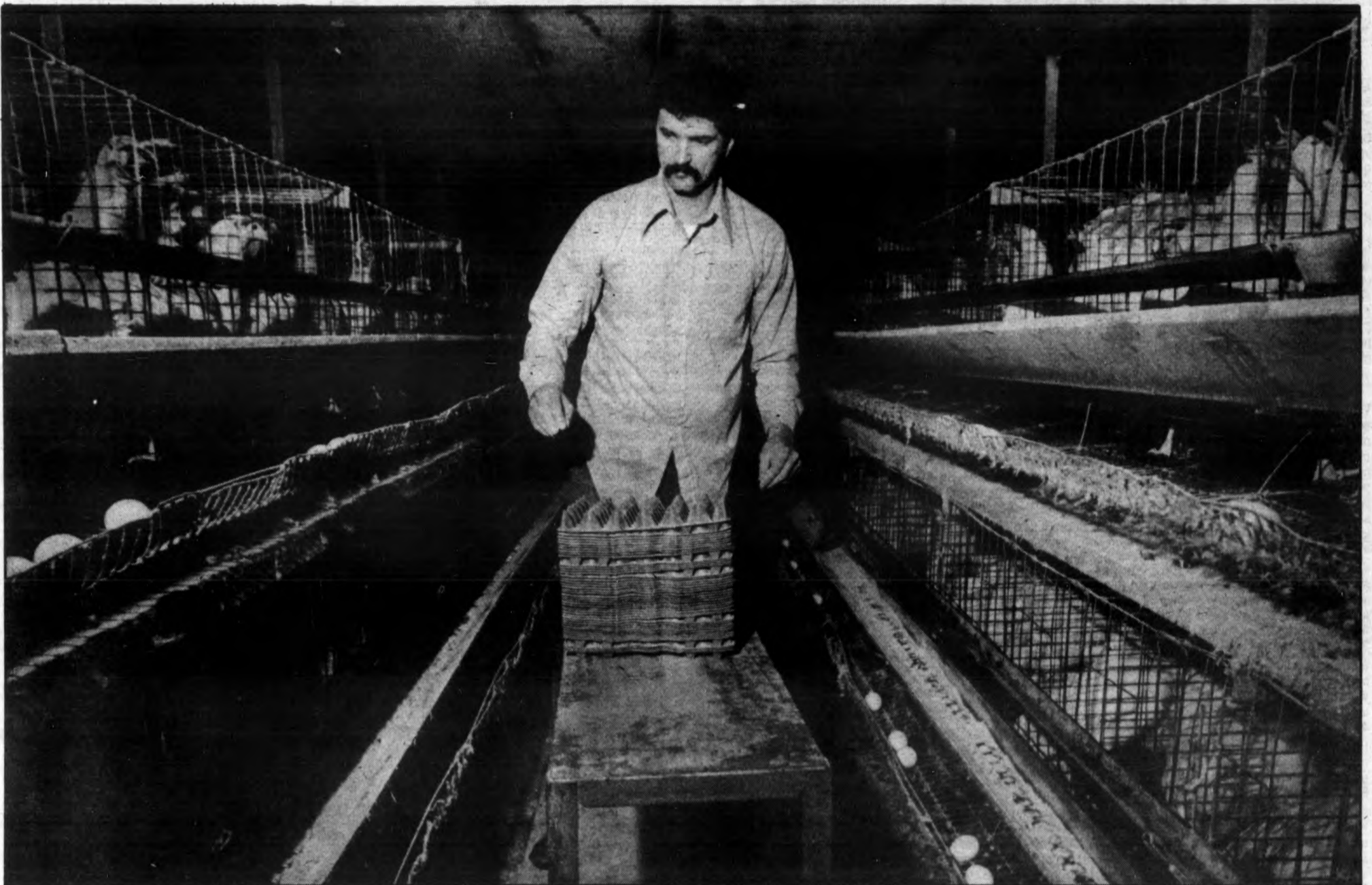

## That's not chicken feed

With four 320-foot rows of 5,000 hens each, Richard Rehmann spends plenty of time putting all his eggs in one basket (top). He collects as many as 18,000 eggs per day at his farm on West M-21 west of Fowler, and gets part-time help picking them up from his eight-year-old son, Mike. His chickens, which live to a ripe old age of 15 or 16, consume two tons of chicken feed each day.

To detect imperfections in eggs, Rehmann uses an electronic candler (bottom left), which detects flaws in yoke or shell. Eggs are then washed, sorted and dried automatically. After sorting eggs are picked up with a vacuum lift (bottom). Rehmann says his hens are white leghorn (left), the most popular egg-laying breed. He'll have an open house April 29-30 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. "Bring the kids along," Rehmann said. (Photos and layout by Bob Stern)
