

City to sue well diggers

St. Johns commissioners voted Monday to sue "either or both" of the two Grand Rapids well drillers contracted for troublesome Well 10.

Commissioners lost patience when the well, which was supposed to produce 300 gallons per minute, only produced a trickle after months of work.

Either Walter W. Meinert, P.E. of Grand Rapids, or Raymer Co. of Grand Rapids, or both, will be sued, St. Johns City Manager Randy Humphrey said. Humphrey said City Attorney Paul Maples will decide who to sue, but Maples could not be reached for comment.

In other action, commissioners passed a resolution to apply for federal funding on a one-mile stretch of M-21 from Clinton Avenue to Scott Road. The action could result in a state analysis of the road, Clerk Richard Coletta said. No local funds would go toward the repairs, Coletta said.

Also, the city commission authorized April 23 for the March of Dimes Walk-A-Thon. The 30-kilometer walk will begin at 8 a.m. at South Point Mall.

Commissioners approved April 29-May 8 as "White Cane Week." Weather permitting, the St. Johns Lions Club will be out selling white cane lapel pins April 29-30.

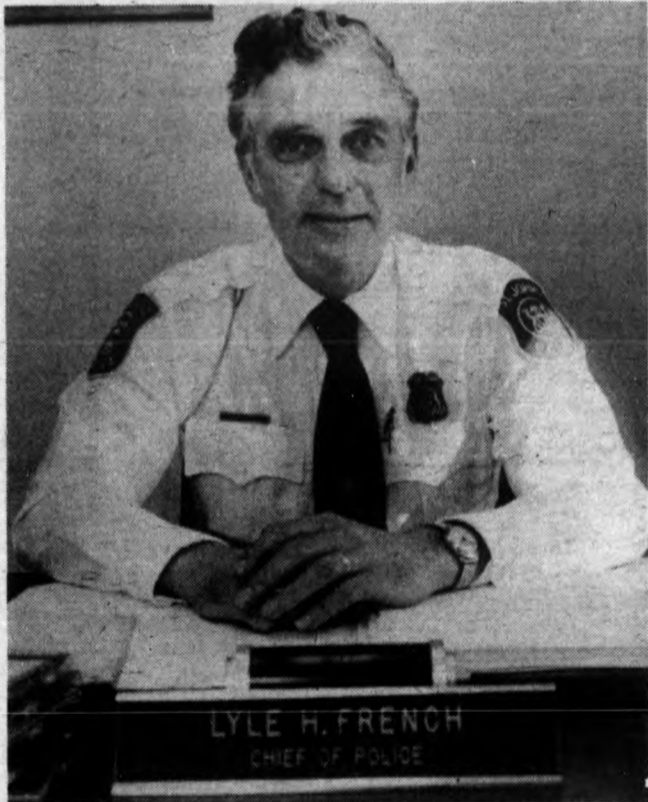
Pending state approval, the city also authorized the naming of two streets as "Zeeb" and "Kuntz." Virgil Zeeb and Anthony Kuntz were St. Johns residents who did much to serve the community, city officials said.

Crime drop keeps city quiet, chief says

St. Johns Police Chief Lyle French says St. Johns has been a relatively quiet town since he joined the police force 27 years ago, and it's remained that way during the nine years he's been chief. (Photo by Bob Stern)

"I'd always like to say there wasn't any crime at all, but then we'd be out of a job," St. Johns Police Chief Lyle French joked.

His annual report to city commissioners Monday night came pretty close. "It was a good year," said French, who reported a 7.4 percent drop in serious crimes in the city during 1982.

"In the 27 years I've been here, we've had just one murder and a few rapes over the years, but we just don't have the serious types of crime in St. Johns. I guess it has a little to do with the size of the town and the type of people who live in the community."

There were no murders again in 1982, and goose eggs were also recorded in suicides, fatal accidents, arsons and concealed weapons violations.

French was also pleased to report big drops in thefts, vandalism and driving under the influence of alcohol complaints. The latter category dropped by 59, from 89 in 1981 to just 30 in 1982.

"I really can't say why that is," the chief replied when asked about the drunk driving drop. "That's a good question. The officers say they aren't out there."

"We had three new officers last year, so I thought maybe they were being too lenient, but usually new officers are just the opposite, a little too gung ho, if anything."

Drunk driving arrests were up county-wide, but French said it's too soon to tell why they dropped in St. Johns. "I don't know yet what were doing right," he said.

Larcenies dropped by 23, to a total of 194, and thefts of bicycles, a common local problem, fell by 25, from 67 two years ago to 42 last year, the report said.

Twenty-two stolen bicycles were recovered, and two

adults and two juveniles were arrested for bicycle thefts, the report said.

"The most drastic increase was in breaking and enterings," the report said. B&Es remain one of the city's more serious crime problems, but French said he was satisfied many of the past year's break-ins were solved.

Of 53 B&E complaints — up from 32 the previous year — French reported 21 were break-ins at businesses. Of those, 18 were solved by the arrest of 12 adults and four juveniles, who composed three different break-in rings, French said.

Of the seven B&Es at homes, one was cleared up by the arrest of a juvenile, the report said. The remainder were at buildings, schools, and autos and resulted in the arrests of four juveniles and one adult. Only 13 of all break-in cases remain open, the report says.

In other categories, the report said:

- Robberies increased from one to two;
- Criminal sexual conduct reports went from three to five;
- Reports of child abuse and/or neglect fell from eight in 1981 to just one complaint last year;
- Assault and batteries were up by nine, to a total of 36, while assaults dropped from seven to two;
- Narcotics arrests were up by four, from eight to 12;
- Shoplifting arrests dropped from eight to six;
- Attempted suicides climbed by three, to six, but suicides dropped from two to zero;

"We had some big things too," French said, citing several arrests for thefts of tin ingots at the St. Johns Federal Mogul plant; an incident in which an armed St. Johns policeman barricaded himself in his home; and a fraud investigation of Holloway International Investment.

"But all in all, I'd say it's been a pretty quiet year."

Key in car causes theft

Leaving keys in the ignition resulted in two stolen vehicles last week, Clinton County Sheriff's reports said.

Eugene L. Schneeberger, 1154 W. Pratt Rd., had his 1983 Yamaha snowmobile stolen sometime between Thursday and Saturday, reports said. Value of the snowmobile was unknown.

Donald Lee Chant Sr., 3288 S. DeWitt Rd., reported his 1981 Volkswagon pickup truck stolen on Saturday. The truck's value was unknown, but the purchase price was \$8,000, reports said.

among the missing items are two table lamps, two blankets, photographs, magazines and dishes. Also taken from the barn were two car waterpumps, and two sets of car bolts, reports said. The loss was estimated at \$300.

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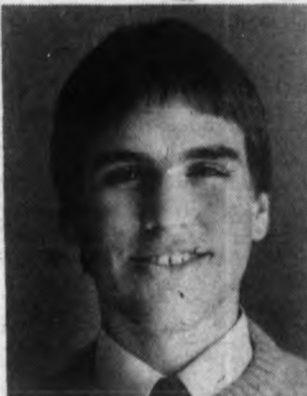
New sports editor hired

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Nothing equals goose eggs

In tune with the Easter season, the Paine-Gilliam-Scott House Museum of St. Johns is displaying the intricate "egg art" of two St. Johns women.

The museum is showing eggs (such as the three pictured here) in a display put together by Ginger Crosby and Jane Idzkowski.

Egg art is a craft where goose eggs are sliced with razor blades, held together with rubber bands and glued with metal hinges to form the foundation for a decoration. Beads, fabric and jewels are then used to trim the shells.

The acknowledged founder of egg art is Carl Faberge, court jeweler for the Russian czars in the early 1900s. Faberge's egg-shaped creations were lined with jewels and were regarded as "the ultimate in egg decorating."

Among the more unusual eggs on display in St. Johns are a Little Bo' Peep re-creation, a banjo inside an egg and religious scene with a crucifix and one of Mrs. Crosby's relatives. The banjo and the religious scene were made from double-yolked eggs.

Also on display is a 110-year-old wedding dress worn by the former Amanda Sickles. In 1873, Miss Sickles married LaMont George Bates in Elsie.

The museum has a total of seven wedding dresses, ranging from 1873 through 1915.

The egg art display has been at the museum since March 13 and will remain there through Mother's Day, May 8, museum officials said. The museum is open on Sunday, from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., and Wednesday, from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m. It will be closed, however, Easter Sunday.

Want to buy Florida land?

"We'll get back to you tomorrow."
And the check is in the mail, right?

Forgive us if we've become a little skeptical when aides of Governor James Blanchard tell us they'll return our calls or answer our questions.

We called the governor's press secretary several times two weeks ago, but she didn't return our calls, although her secretary assured us she would.

When we did get through with our question about Blanchard's appointment of four Democrats to the traditionally Republican Watertown Township Board, she said she'd look into the matter and get back to us the next day.

By nearly 5 p.m. that day, we still hadn't heard from the Governor's office so we called again. "Sorry," we were told, "I haven't had a chance yet to find out" what criteria Blanchard used to appoint interim board members following recall of the township's supervisor, clerk and two trustees.

We thought it would be interesting to hear how the decision was made, particularly after some critics of the appointments charged that Blanchard's choices were influenced by recommendations from organizers of the recall.

We also wanted to find out how much the governor knew about the real issue at stake in the election — Granger Landfill — and if his appointments took into consideration the touchy issues of landfills and hazardous waste disposal.

We didn't expect to hear any earth-shaking statements, but we did expect some kind of response, even if only a "no comment" relayed by a low-level staff member. After all, we're not a major metropolitan daily newspaper, and Watertown Township's recall certainly is not as important as the state's economic problems or the governor's efforts to get a new income tax bill passed.

The previous administration was always helpful and responsive when contacted on such occasions. Although Governor Milliken's press aides may not have known much about our local issues when contacted, they soon found out and were always prompt and helpful with statements and answers.

Perhaps we're being too hard on the new administration, which is no doubt busy trying to settle in and get organized. But returning a call only takes a few minutes. We're still waiting.

Having read your article about food establishments in Clinton County brings back memories of my milk hauling days in the 1930s. We hauled in 10-gallon cans and we got many, many "extras" in the cans, such as straw, kerosene, cats, etc. Yes, now and then a can looked like chocolate milk. We also joked about it — maybe it came from a black cow. However, I lost my appetite for milk, especially chocolate.

Thanks to our health department, inspections have become better. They work on a bacteria level and also visually inspect each farmer's milk operation. We still have farmers that get lax and disregard the milk inspectors' rules. The guilty ones are hauled into court, fined, shut down for a period of time, and it is published in the local papers.

I think Ms. (Lois Elliott-) Wilson should publish the facts every six months or yearly. That would certainly keep these restaurants on their toes.

We're not talking about how many have died or might die — it's keeping the germs and bacteria out of the foods as much as possible.

The Detroit Free Press reported (March 24) that 21 customers were struck in Traverse City from eating hamburgers at a restaurant. Doctors isolated a very rare form of bacteria. E.coli 0157.7, which was found in the hamburgers.

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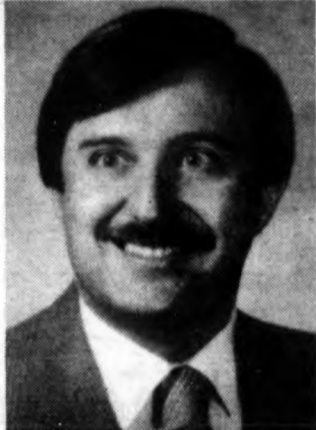

'B' winner delights O-E

When Corunna's basketball team won the Class B state championship at Ann Arbor's Crisler Arena last Saturday, Ovid-Elsie coach Bob Foreback was almost as excited as the Cavaliers' fans.

"It was really one of the most exciting things that's happened to me in my coaching career, because I've known them so well," said Foreback, a veteran of 14 years at Ovid-Elsie. "They've been a pain in my side for three years."

Foreback and his junior varsity assistant, Jack Nutter, were on the court congratulating the players and coach Frank Davis after the Cavaliers edged Oak Park, 52-49.

It was the first state basketball title for Corunna and the first for a school in the Mid-Michigan 'B' League.

Foreback's team handed Corunna one of its four losses this season — a 67-57 setback in February — and nearly upset the Cavaliers in the district finals. Corunna nipped O-E in that one, 47-44.

"I don't think we would have had as good a chance as they would have had (to win the state title), because they had better talent," Foreback said. "I told our team back then that the team that was coming out of our district would have an excellent chance to make it to Ann Arbor."

Sportswriters and sportscasters didn't give Corunna much of a chance to win the state title. Many kept predicting that the Cavaliers would lose. Even some coaches who had faced the Cavaliers — like St. Johns' Al Werbish — didn't think much of their chances.

"I had them going to the quarterfinals of the state, based on their individuals," Werbish said. "But what you can't measure as a coach is how much internal drive the players have."

"A lot of people might have thought they set their goals too high," Foreback said, "but as Al McGuire says, 'The game's played from the head up.'"

Deak's team fast, strong

Here is one of the nice things you can expect from DeWitt's baseball team this season.

Well, opposing coaches might not think it's so nice.

"We do a lot of bunt and run, where we try to get two bases on a bunt," said Panther coach Frank Deak. "The runner on first steals, and rounds second when the bunt is down.

"It's a calculated risk — if they pop it up, he'll get doubled off first base. They've got to be at second base before the ball is thrown to first. And they usually are.

"We also do that for a guy on second base coming home."

DeWitt can use plays like those because three of its players — catcher Tom Deak and outfielders Scott Maiers and Ken Rajala — have been timed at 4.6 seconds in the 40-yard dash.

While speed is a weapon, it isn't the entire Panther arsenal. Solid team pitching, hitting and defense have been DeWitt trademarks during Deak's five-year reign as coach. His record bears this out — 103-33.

To reach that level of consistency, Deak strongly encourages his players to join summer baseball leagues. Everyone on last year's varsity team, and all but two off the junior varsity team, played in the summer.

"My son, Tom, played about 80 games last summer," Deak said. "That's a lot of games."

The payoff for DeWitt could come this spring, as senior pitcher Steve Sontich and junior catcher Deak key the effort.

Sontich, a 6-foot-6 righthander, was 8-2 last season with a 0.88 earned-run average. He batted .338.

Deak, an all-Capital Circuit selection as a freshman and sophomore, is up 20 pounds from last season because of weight training and hopes to better his .333 batting average in 1982.

Pitching is vital for high school baseball teams, particularly in the state tournament at the end of the season when games come quickly. Coach Deak needs more than Sontich, and is looking for a No. 2 starter from senior Dave Pettit, junior Grand Ledge transfer Steve Holland and Tom Deak.

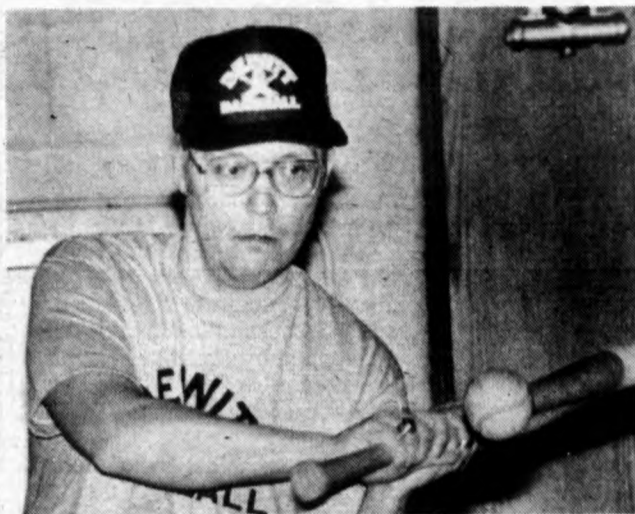
Sophomores Tim Miller and Kelly Lathrop will also get a chance.

"They don't know it yet," Deak said, "but both of those guys will pitch in both of our first double-headers."

Holland, a 6-3, 220-pound lefthander, and brother John, a 6-0, 195-pound third baseman, will see a lot of action in the infield. Seniors Eric Wiefelich and Sam Dalman are set at shortstop and second base.

For the Bath girls, sprinter Barb Nichols was fifth in the 60-yard dash and sixth in the one-lap dash.

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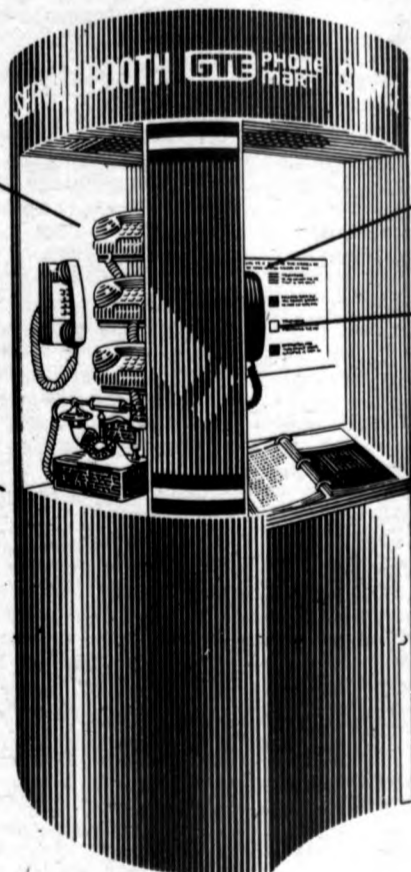

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Marriage up, divorce down, booze is tops

More people are getting married, less are getting divorced, and alcohol is the drug of choice in Clinton County.

It may sound like cause and effect, those are unrelated facts — just a few of the tidbits heard by county commissioners during a flurry of annual reports presented Tuesday.

Commissioners heard updates from the Clerk's office, from the Capitol Area Substance Abuse Commission, from the Clinton County Intermediate School District's Youth Employment and Training Program and from the Capital Area Community Services Job Club.

County Clerk Jane Swanchara reported that nearly 100 more marriage licenses were issued last year than in 1981, and that divorces dropped by about 20, to 300. Marriages outnumbered divorces in the county by almost 180, she said. "It's the same way nationally, with marriages outnumbering divorces."

Other vital statistics reported by Mrs. Swanchara revealed:

- Births remained virtually unchanged, at about 240 last year, but deaths declined by about 20, to 140;
- Pistol permits dropped by about 40, to 130, and applications for enrollment of farmland under tax-saving Public Act 116 climbed to 210.

- The circuit court disposed of 1,376 cases last year, including 173 criminal cases and 751 divorces (including cases reopened or left over from previous years).
- And the clerk's office administered 17 elections during 1982.

"It was a good year, but it was a busy year," Mrs. Swanchara said. "We're glad to get through with the elections."

Gerald DeVoss, director of the Capitol Area Substance Abuse Commission, told commissioners the economy kept his agency much busier last year.

"The recession has hit substance abuse extremely hard," he said. "All of our programs have waiting lists. There's been a tremendous increase in substance abuse. Because of the recession, people are turning to drugs and alcohol. Others who may have already had a problem are now out of work and find they can no longer afford their addiction."

DeVoss said the average age of problem drinkers has dropped from 35 to about 22 in the last 10 years, and told commissioners that booze is best as far as Clinton County residents are concerned.

His figures said 74 percent of the Clinton residents who participated in substance abuse programs sought help for alcohol problems, whereas marijuana accounted for less than eight percent. Similar percentages were recorded in Eaton and Ingham counties.

"There are very, very few one-type addictions," however, he cautioned. "Most kids, if they're into alcohol, are also into marijuana."

Commissioners also got their first look at a revised solid waste management plan, passed a resolution urging state officials and legislators not to take a pay raise next year, and rejected a protested rezoning request.

The rezoning, from industrial to agricultural, would have allowed owner Roy Pung, owner of Pung Sand &

Gravel, to request a permit to mine gravel from a 10-acre site in Watertown Township, one-half mile west of Airport Road and a quarter-mile south of Herbison, just west of Westwind Subdivision.

About a dozen residents of neighborhoods which surround the site showed up to protest the request, including Wellington Fuller, who said, "It would be foolishness when there are three (gravel) pits in the area that are not even open yet. We have continuous truck traffic (from other gravel pits) there already and that road would become a year 'round washboard. We have to eat dust."

Zoning Administrator Jack Nelson cited other nuisance problems, including noise in the subdivision equivalent to "restaurant clatter," and pointed out that homeowners expected to be protected from re-zoning when they purchased their lots.

Others present cited "numerous objections," and nuisances which would "totally destroy" property values.

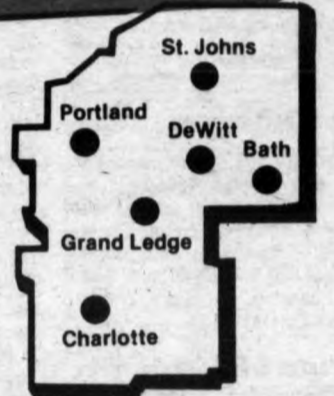
