Girl abducted, raped

A 16-year-old girl was abducted from a city street near the county courthouse at 3:30 p.m. Monday and taken south of St. Johns, where she was raped.

St. Johns Police Chief

Lyle French said the victim was walking on Wight Street near the intersection of McConnel when a man pulled up in a dark-colored, older model car and opened the door.

"As she approached the vehicle, he reached out and

grabbed her by the wrist and pulled her into the car," French reported Tuesday. "He then drove out on County Farm Road, about one-quarter mile south of Parks Road, and sexually assaulted her."

The assailant then turned the car around and brought the girl back to the same intersection where she was abducted — about two blocks from the courthouse and Rodney B. Wilson Jr. High — and dropped her off, French said. The rape was reported at 3:56 p.m.

"I can't remember ever having something like this," said French, who has been with St. Johns Police for 27 years. "We've had rapes before, but nothing like this."

He said police are looking for an older black or dark-colored, full-sized, four-door sedan, with fenders that are badly rusted near the wheel wells.

The suspect was described as a white male, approximately 30 years old, 5'11" to 6', about 240 lbs., with short dark hair, a clean-shaven face and a mole on one cheek.

Anyone seeing such a vehicle on County Farm Road between 3:30 and 4 p.m. Monday, May 2, and anyone with any other information should contact the St. Johns Police Department, 224-6721, or the Clinton County Detective Bureau, 224-8550.

Superintendent sticks with closing plan

Superintendent Earl Gabriel said he would "stand by" his controversial recommendation, and board members were expected to vote last night (after press deadline) on closing two rural elementary schools.

"I still think the recommendation of the task force is a proper recommendation," Gabriel said Monday. "We've tried to listen to what the public said and we've refuted some of their arguments that were incorrect or proposals that were not as feasible."

Gabriel and board members expected to hear plenty more from the public Wednesday night. Parents whose children attend the two targeted schools — East Olive and East Essex — packed meeting rooms at two previous meetings, and last night was likely to be no exception.

Including costs for heating, electricity, busing and staff salaries, the closings are expected to save the district about \$192,000, a special task force report says. Adjusted for inflation, the savings would top \$200,000 the first year, according to Rick Terres, controller.

Parents, though, ask "Why us?" They say other, older schools within the city should be closed before their schools. Also, many parents say they don't want their children to attend Perrin-Palmer, which some have described as a "dump," or a "fire-trap."

Under the closing plan, all of East Olive's students would attend Riley Elementary next fall. Of the 150 students now attending East Essex, 107 would attend Eureka; the remaining 43 would attend city schools, with kindergarten through fourth grade students

transferred to Perrin-Palmer and fifth graders sent to Central Elementary.

Gabriel and his task force of school administrators Steve Bakita, Gordon Vandemark and Rick Terres say the closings are a must to make the system more efficient. Bus routes, road conditions, enrollment and furnace types were among the factors which pointed toward East Olive and East Essex, they say.

In conjunction with a plan to send all sixth grade students to Rodney B. Wilson Jr. High next fall, the closings will streamline the seven elementary school system to five, allowing more efficient use of staff and resources.

Enrollment, they say, is the big reason closings are needed. Combined classes, started last year to remedy small class sizes, have not worked, and classes are likely to get even smaller, forcing more combinations, if present trends continue.

"It's just not efficient to operate seven buildings when we can operate with five," Gabriel said. Parents have accused him of trying to railroad the plan and say his mind was made up when he started as superintendent in February, but that's not so, Gabriel said.

"If I had been here earlier, I'd have started earlier and we would have had more time to deal with it. If we'd have had representatives (on the task force) from every one of those areas, we'd have never come to terms because everyone would be there to protect their area."

He said closing the schools will save enough money to prevent any need for additional millage next year. The need for such a plan was obvious, he said.

"As I went around visiting the various schools, I'd see

an empty room here and an empty room there and lots of combined classrooms. It became clear."

The board was also expected to consider a compromise plan to keep one multi-purpose room, a bathroom and a kitchen open in each school so they can be used as community centers, he said.

Such a plan would reduce projected heating savings by half and cut estimated electrical cost savings by a quarter, he said.

"In the eyes of the people it doesn't represent a compromise because they want the total school open," Gabriel said.

"I don't want to appear cold and impersonal, but we have taken a very clinical approach to the problem."

Crashes keep Bath busy

Bath Township's Fire Department was kept hopping last Wednesday, when six calls were received between 8:15 a.m. and early evening. Elsewhere in the county, a breaking and entering, personal injury accidents and an assault topped the list of county crime reports.

Clinton County Sheriff's reports listed 94 complaints and 19 arrests during the week.

Among the complaints were:

• Activity began in Bath Township last week on Wednesday, April 27, at 8:15 a.m., when a one-car accident was reported on I-69, west of State Road. Reports said Susan Marie Zilch, 19, of Perry, was headed west on I-69 attempting to pass a slow moving semi when she swerved to miss a piece of sheet-metal stove pipe in the road. Reports said she over-corrected and lost control, driving into the median and through the oncoming east-bound lanes before rolling her auto and coming to rest on the south side of the divided highway. Ms. Zilch was taken to Lansing General with neck and possible shoulder injuries, reports said.

• About five hours later, township emergency crews were called again to the scene of an I-69 accident in which five persons were injured. Reports said Theresa Dunham, 26, of Laingsburg, was cited for failure to stop in an assured clear distance after her auto rear-ended another driven by Randy Camp, 29, of Owosso, on east-bound I-69 near Chadwell Road.

Injured were Ms. Dunham and Camp, and three passengers in Ms. Dunham's auto, Kacey Fletcher, 15, of Perry, and Angela, 5, and Autumn Dunham, 1.

None were seriously injured and all sought their own treatment, reports said.

• EMT crews were called again at 4:08 p.m. to transport Brian Petroska of 14509 Clark Road to a hospital for treatment of insulin shock; and again for two injuries in the evening and a grass fire earlier in the day at 10 a.m., reports said.

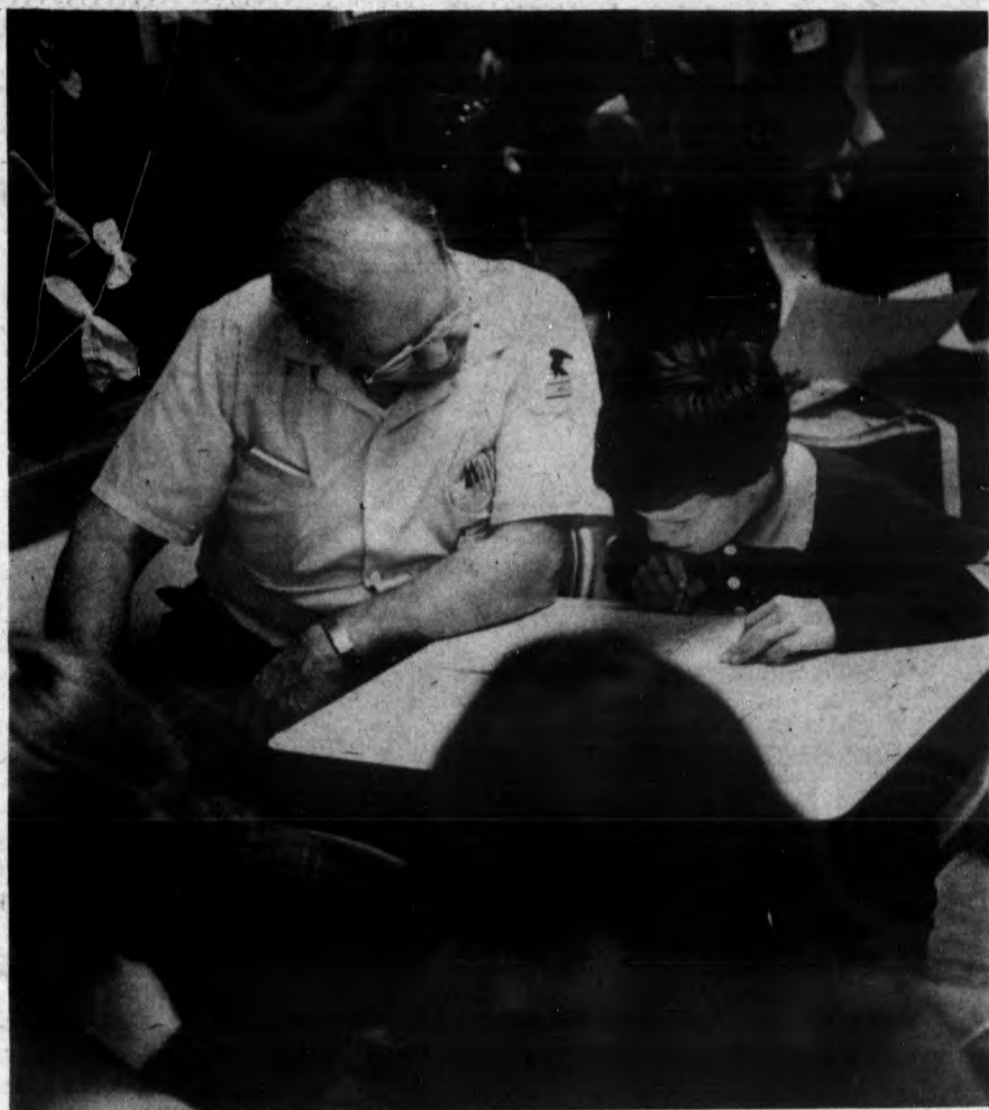

25-year milestone is tribute to commercial nuclear energy

The recent 25th birthday of America's commercial nuclear power program had special significance for one Michigianian. The milestone was a quiet tribute to Gil Keeley and his colleagues who have helped write nuclear history.

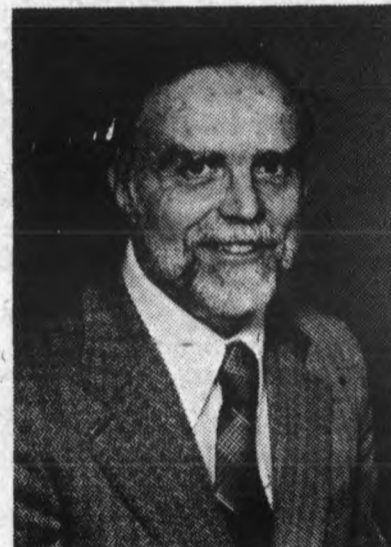
It began on Dec. 18, 1957, at Shippingport, Pa., only half an hour from downtown Pittsburgh. Quietly, in the early morning darkness, a new era dawned. For the first time, a power plant generated commercial electricity from nuclear power. Keeley was there, part of the team responsible for checking out the plant's systems, training operators and putting the plant into operation.

It wasn't the last time Keeley had a hand in nuclear history. Five years later he had moved to Consumers Power Company to help Big Rock Point, near Charlevoix, become Michigan's first (and the nation's fifth) commercial nuclear power plant. He has been with Consumers Power ever since, helping build a nuclear power program that in 1982 produced almost 19 percent of the company's electricity.

The success of nuclear power doesn't surprise him. Even in its infancy, Keeley and his colleagues saw nuclear power as the key that would end man's dependence on non-renewable fuels like oil and coal. "There was never any doubt that commercial nuclear plants would work," he says.

Experience has justified the optimism, says Keeley, pointing out that the technology has produced nuclear plants which are generating electricity safely, reliably and economically.

In fact, Keeley says the most frustrating problems have been bureaucratic, not technical.

"Although the regulatory process has produced some benefits, it has become overly conservative," says Keeley. "It is slowing the construction of specific nuclear plants, and development of the industry in general. Take hearings, for example. If I averaged up all my time in the last seven years, I've probably spent over 50 percent of it in hearings."

But, Keeley is optimistic that will change. "Coal, oil and gas can't provide all of our future energy. Eventually, necessity will make the regulatory process efficient and reasonable—the same way engineers have made nuclear power itself reliable and efficient."

"It's the same old story," says Keeley. "It's a matter of economics and need. I just hope the changes happen in time."

Still talking, not walking

Monday's strike deadline passed without a walkout as St. Johns teachers' spokesman Mike Gehoski said negotiations are "very close" to settlement of a new contract.

Gehoski said teachers met Sunday afternoon and accepted the recommendation of St. Johns Education Association (SJEA) officials to continue working during negotiations.

Teachers had earlier voted to strike May 2 unless "significant progress" was made on the contract talks. When the five-day deadline to notify the board of a strike drew near, teachers agreed to continue working but set a shorter 24-hour strike notification requirement.

"We have extended the agreement from last year," SJEA Chief Negotiator Gehoski said Monday. "We will continue working under last year's contract."

He said negotiations last Thursday were "somewhat successful." St. Johns Superintendent Earl Gabriel agreed.

"We have made good strides in non-economic issues," Gabriel said. "We'll only get a contract if we talk and not walk."

As far as details of the talks are concerned, both sides continued their refusal to comment publicly. "Had they gone on strike, we were ready to make our proposals public," Gabriel said.

Michigan Education Association officials, representing the SJEA, will examine the school's financial books before the two sides meet again, but neither finances nor settlements in other districts will play a large part in determining the final contract terms, Gabriel said.

"I've never negotiated from the standpoint of what the neighbors do or from the standpoint of what's in the bank, but from the standpoint of what is fair and equitable," he said.

The superintendent said his goal is to settle on a contract before the end of the current year, and that both sides would like the next agreement to be effective "longer than one or two years."

Meanwhile, a strike is not likely this year, Gabriel said. "I have been told, not by official sources, that they have put off any thought of a strike until fall."

St. Johns and Ovid-Elsie are the only two districts in the county without new teacher contracts. Previous settlements in the remaining four districts have ranged from Pewamo-Westphalia's wage freeze to DeWitt's nearly six percent raise.

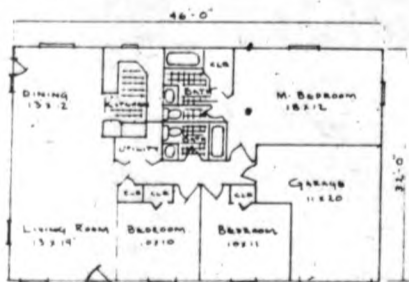

Under state law (Act 5 of 1982), the increase in State Equalized Value for existing property would result in a 9.40 base tax rate for 1983 operating purposes. This is .12 mill lower than 1982 operating tax rate. However, the State of Michigan's budget and cash flow problems have resulted in a substantial cut in state funds to which the City, by law, is entitled. Delays in state payments already have caused a loss in City revenues. The City's proposed 1983-1984 budget assumes further cuts and delays in state payments to the City will occur.

The 1983-1984 proposed budget assumes the continuation of the same total millage rate of 13.32 (9.72 mills for operating and 3.60 mills for debt service). In order to restore the existing millage rate, a transferred millage rate of .32 mill needs to be levied above the base operating tax rate. This will provide an estimated 3.4% increase in City operating tax revenues, while not however, affecting the total levy. The City may levy, under charter, up to a maximum of 10 mills for operating purposes but chose not to increase the total levy over last year's total tax effort.

E. Essex principal stays cool

When St. Johns administrators talk about closing East Essex Elementary School, they are talking about closing a big part of Beverly Baker's life.

In her 35 years as teacher and administrator, Mrs. Baker has seen the school grow from one room to four, and finally into a modern facility.

But when people are talking about closing the school, Mrs. Baker isn't talking. She offers some carefully worded phrases which only scrape the surface of her emotions.

"You want to remember that I'm half administrator and half teacher," said Mrs. Baker, East Essex's kindergarten teacher in the morning and principal in the afternoon. "You've kind of got to go down the middle of the road."

Her cautious approach has kept her away from special meetings in which administrators explained the proposed closing to angry parents.

"I don't think there's much I can do," Mrs. Baker said.

Her work days have been interrupted lately by

parents trying to enlist her support in their battle against administrators. But Mrs. Baker has chosen to remain neutral.

"They come in here and they talk to me, but they don't tell me much of anything," she said. "I've got a job to do."

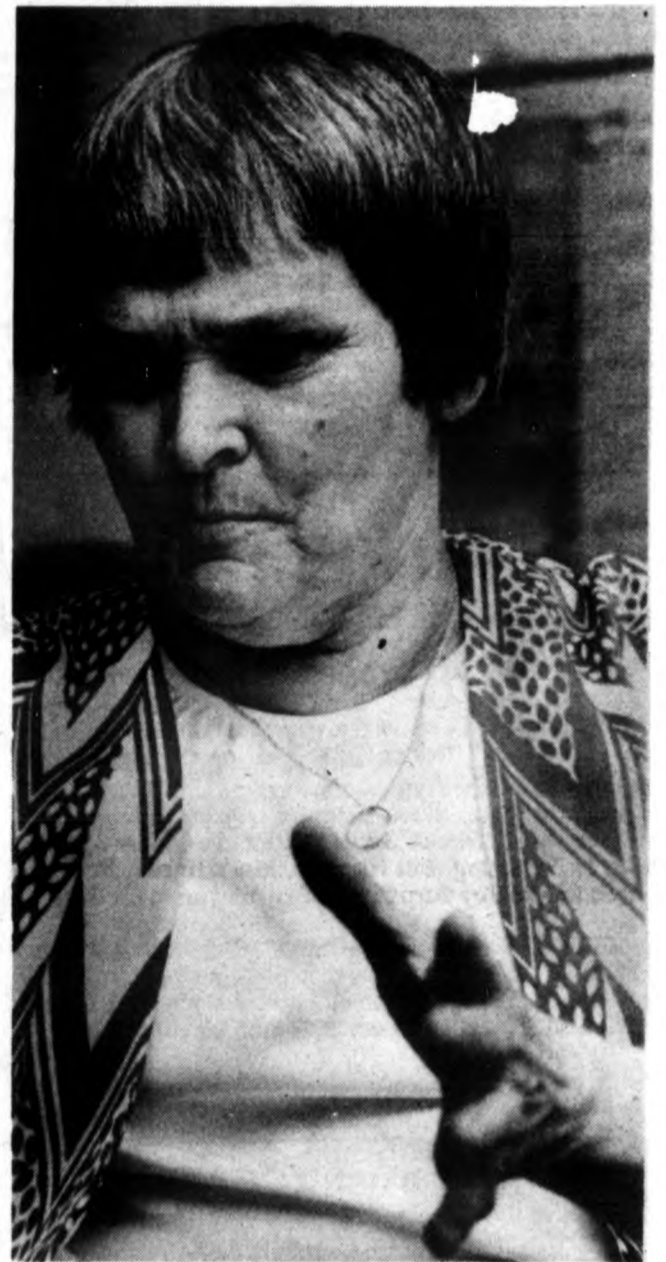
"I'm just playing it kind of cool. I've really got to play it cool."

Parents want to keep East Essex open because of its value as a community center.

"It's a definite community center, and a very strong community," Mrs. Baker said. "They're a very close knit sort of community."

In the proposed reorganization of administrative staff, Mrs. Baker would become principal and kindergarten teacher at Eureka. She said she is excited about that community, but her ties to East Essex are evident.

"I've just got strong feelings," she said. "I just know that sometimes things have to be done. There's not much you can do about it."

Judge is critical of Husted's plea bargain

A plea bargain which reduced charges against David Husted of St. Johns from first- to fourth-degree criminal sexual conduct drew some acrid comments from Circuit Judge Timothy Green Monday.

Husted, in court for arraignment on charges stemming from incidents in September, 1981, involving a then 16-year-old girl and a then 19-year-old male, will be sentenced June 6.

He was originally charged with rape, or first-degree

criminal sexual conduct (CSC), and gross indecency, a third-degree CSC charge. First degree CSC is punishable by a maximum life prison sentence.

But prior to Husted's District Court preliminary exam Thursday, April 7, a deal was worked out in which first- and third- degree charges were dropped in return for Husted's guilty plea to fourth-degree criminal sexual conduct, which consists of unauthorized touching of another person's private parts.

"Gentleman, I'm concerned about (the other charges) being dismissed," Green said at the arraignment Monday morning. "I wonder whether the defendant was grossly over charged, in which case a great injustice is being done to him, or whether the charges are correct, in which case it would be a great injustice to society."

Prosecutor Jon Newman explained the plea bargain was made to spare the victim from public attention and the ordeal of testifying.

He said the charges were correct, but were brought "on the testimony of (the victim), without any substan-

tial corroboration of her testimony. Obviously, the people would have had some problems" proving the charges, he said.

Green also questioned the timing of Husted's arrest, which came about a year after the alleged violations. "Why was the charge even brought?" Green demanded.

"We were satisfied it was a valid and truthful complaint, even though we had some doubts as to our ability to prove it," Newman replied. If Husted were sent to trial, the victim's role would be known and she would suffer, he added.

Pointing out he had earlier criticized defense attorney James Theophelis for making comments to the press, Green reversed himself and complimented Husted's attorney. "I must compliment you most highly for your work on behalf of your client ... getting a possible life sentence reduced to a misdemeanor."

Fourth-degree CSC carries a maximum two-year sentence.

Green added that further remarks about the plea bargain were "best left unsaid."

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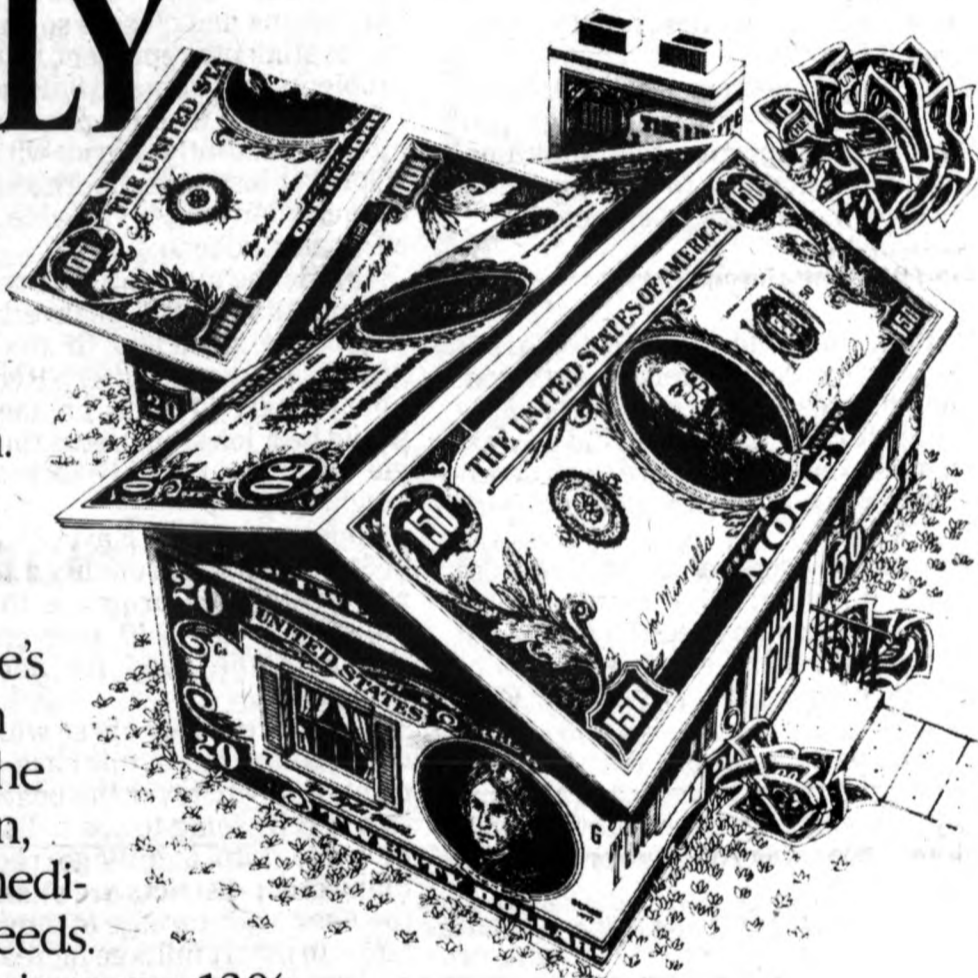
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Yellow Brick Road paved with protests

In the movies, local government is run town-meeting style and anyone with something to say usually gets his chance to spout off. Then "Mr. Deeds" or some other Jimmy Stewart character gets up, scrapes the ground with a toe, "Aw, gees" some and delivers a simple-but-simply-perfect solution to the crisis.

That's the movies. Real-life local government usually resembles Hollywood's version about as much as "Oz" resembles Detroit.

We're not saying everyone shouldn't have the opportunity to express themselves. We take pride in our awareness of the public's right to access and free expression and we defend both vigorously.

What we are saying is that sometimes the desires of a minority run contrary to what is best for the majority. At times like these, vocal protests and organized dissent can intimidate elected decision makers. Single-issue recall drives are not at all uncommon, and a room full of angry voters can seem like a cast of thousands.

Plan takes courage

When we encountered a plan to close two neighborhood schools, our first reaction was, "Why not put it to a vote?"

Not a strict ballot question — "Should these schools be closed?" — but a millage proposal: "Would you approve two additional mills (roughly equivalent to the projected savings) to keep these two schools open?"

Great idea, right?

On second thought, maybe not.

For one thing, most in the affected areas would vote yes, but would likely be outvoted. Even if enough votes were organized to carry the election, is it right that all should pay extra to keep open schools that have been determined to be losing students and less efficient?

Secondly, such a proposal doesn't address the first basic question: Why these schools? That has already been answered by a special district task force report, citing a variety of reasons for targeting East Essex and East Olive.

Finally, no such millage election will resolve the most important central question: Should any schools be closed when enrollment declines? We think the answer to that is clearly "yes."

Because of our press deadline, we can't tell you how the school board voted last night, or

No change of heart

Some who called us with news of the recent court-ordered end to dumping of hazardous waste at Granger landfill were downright smug.

Because we have argued that efforts by a vocal and organized special interest group, People's Action League (PAL), were standing in the way of progress, they felt they had proven us wrong.

We have said PAL's roadblock to construction of a special hazardous waste landfill could end up causing serious problems. Because PAL's lawsuit has prevented Granger from building a more secure pit for disposal of hazardous wastes, and because Granger promised in the face of PAL pressure not to dump dangerous wastes in their new landfill, such dangerous substances have been dumped into the least secure of Granger's two landfills.

Leaks were inevitable: Unlike diamonds, landfills are not forever. Experts agree all landfills eventually will leak. Therefore, we

That's good. Elected officials must sometimes be reminded that they represent the desires of thinking, breathing and, yes, shouting people.

But if these same officials back down and fail to take needed action in the face of pressure from what is clearly a minority, then that's bad.

So what is the answer? In the past few weeks, we've seen good examples of two instances in which the needs and desires of a small group have hit the will of the majority head-on, catching local officials in the middle.

In the first, the People's Action League scored a hard-fought victory in their fight against hazardous waste disposal at Granger landfill.

In another major battle, parents are battling the St. Johns School board to keep two neighborhood schools open.

Both could be described as classic examples of the so-called NIMBY syndrome, which holds that watertowers and other necessities are fine as long as they are "Not in My Back Yard."

But the cases differ, both in outcome and in their affect on the communities in which they have taken place. We support any group or individual's efforts to express opinions and effect change, but believe some changes are better than others. The following editorials explain why.

even if they voted. Whatever decision board members reached was undoubtedly a hard one.

We can say, however, that empty classrooms and classes so small only a handful of students represent an entire grade are problems that demand hard answers.

We feel the task force report is sound and, albeit reluctantly, agree with its findings. It is hard to lose a neighborhood school, but it is even harder to lose valuable programs needed by all students.

That is the alternative. For if the district is not maintained at peak efficiency, dollars cannot be stretched to the limit and programs will soon suffer. Requests for additional funds in such an inefficient district would be a joke, but you'd find few who struggle under the recently increased tax burden laughing.

Superintendent Earl Gabriel says he doesn't believe in running a school district by referendum. He promises that streamlining the system now will save enough dollars to eliminate the need for additional millage next year.

We don't entirely agree with his opinions on referendum, but in this case, we believe he is right. And whatever the board's decision, we find it refreshing to see a district acting now to avoid future millage requests when so many other districts are clubbing voters over the head with threats of similar action in an effort to extort millage increases.

still argue hazardous wastes must be put in the most secure possible landfill, and then monitored carefully.

Eventually, Granger may obtain relief from the latest court order. By proving they have taken steps to prevent future leaks, they likely will be able to accept hazardous wastes again. We hope by then a more secure landfill will be constructed, so that local drinking water and the environment can be protected.

For now, though, we applaud the tenacious PAL members who have persevered where many would abandon hope. Many things have changed since PAL first began their battle against hazardous waste disposal. Not the least of those changes is increased public awareness of waste disposal dangers, and increased state and local government sensitivity to the public health hazards posed by landfills. We can certainly thank unethical, inept management of the Environmental Protection Agency for illustrating the results of poor regulation and untimely response to such problems.

But most of all, we can thank PAL for keeping all of us aware of an unpleasant problem in our midst.

Scott, Furry spark Redwing boys at Mason

Darren Scott and Scott Furry led the St. Johns boys track team to a third-place finish in the Mason Kiwanis Invitational Friday, April 29.

St. Johns finished with 47 points. Holt ran away with the team title with 119 points, followed by Mason with 74.

Scott had a second-place finish in the 440, sixth in the 220, a leg on the third-place 880 relay and a leg on the fourth-place mile relay.

Furry finished second in the 120 high hurdles, fourth in the 330 low hurdles, and aided a pair of fourth-place finishes in the mile relay and 440 relay.

With Jeff Hackett, Steve Gonzales and Chris Loucks running well, all of the St. Johns relays posted their best times this season. Two-miler Tom Raymon also lowered his personal best to 9:56.3, good for third place in the invitational.

"We haven't been beat yet in running, but our field events have been weak," said coach Randy Rude, whose team is 1-2 in dual meets. "We don't really have a long jumper, we don't really have a high jumper, and our shot put hasn't been as good as we hoped. But we won every running event against Alma (in an earlier dual meet)."

St. Johns travels south Saturday for the East Lansing Relays. The nine-school meet starts at 11 a.m. at East Lansing High School.

At the Ovid-Elsie Relays Friday, April 29, Fowler finished in seventh place with 31 points and host Ovid-Elsie placed eighth with 30. Chesaning nipped Corunna, 89-85, for the overall team championship.

Fowler distance man Glen Feldpausch was celebrating after finishing sixth in the mile run at the Ovid-Elsie Relays. Why? Because he broke a school record that had stood since 1967.

Feldpausch's time of 4:42.8 was considerably faster than Jim Simon's old record of 4:47.

"He's cut down his time every time this year," said coach Tom O'Rourke. "I'm not sure how fast he can go, but we think he can get down in the thirties."

Dave Koenigsnecht tied a school record in the 100 dash with a time of 10.3, which was good for second place. Koenigsnecht also joined Jim Farley to set a meet record in the long jump at 40-10 3/4.

Eagle leaps far

The long jumping success of Fowler's Dave Koenigsnecht cannot be traced to excellent practice conditions.

Since Fowler has neither a track nor an official long jump facility, the high school parking lot serves as his training runway.

"You can't wear spikes," Koenigsnecht explained. "You basically have to work on your steps when you get to the meet."

But Koenigsnecht can cope with that. He's coped with it well enough to win back-to-back state Class D long jump championships. Last year, he soared 23-5 3/4 at the state meet, putting him among the best in the state.

He came up with the longest leap among Clinton County boys this year when he bounded 22-1 1/4 at the Olivet Relays.

The Fowler senior also excels in the high jump, with a personal best of 6-5, and the 100-yard dash, with a best time of 10.3.

Koenigsnecht has narrowed down his college choices to Central Michigan University and Western Michigan University. Though CMU has offered him a partial scholarship for track, he is leaning toward college golf.

"I will tryout for golf wherever I go," he said. "If I would go 24 (feet in the long jump), it might change things."

Despite using only 10 girls, the Eagles scored 59 points in the meet to beat Michigan Lutheran Seminary by six points.

Fowler coach Kim Spalsbury had originally placed Becky Klein in the long jump. But when he arrived in Mt. Pleasant and saw that his girls had a chance to win the team title, he switched her into the 800-meter relay.

Klein helped that relay team to a meet record, ran on meet-record units in the 1,600-meter relay and sprint medley relay, and won the 100-meter dash in a meet-record 12.6.

"For this time of year, it was a very good performance for her," said Spalsbury, who gets to show off his team again on Saturday at the Pottersville Invitational.

Though she only placed seventh, Beth Wirth was one of Fowler's bright spots with a personal-best 15-2 1/2 leap in the long jump.

Elsewhere in the county, the St. Johns girls finished second at the Mason Kiwanis Invitational Friday, April 29. The Redwings scored 71 points. Mason won the meet with 122.

Bath finished third at Mason with 53 points and ninth

at the Stockbridge Metric Invitational Saturday, April 29, with 40 points.

Barb Nichols sparked the Bees at Mason, finishing second in both dashes and helping the 880 relay team also finish second. But she saved her best for last.

Mason was leading the mile relay by about 50 yards when Nichols got the baton for her anchor leg. All she did was run a personal-best split of 1:0 in stunning fashion.

"I was amazed," said Bath coach Liz Lentz. "I didn't think she could do it. My assistant coach didn't think she could do it."

Bath couldn't repeat that feat on Saturday, as Redford St. Agatha finished ahead of them in the 1,600-meter relay.

"I think we would have won it if we would have been in a faster heat," Lentz said. "The girls were running in a heat with no one near them at all."

"The Stockbridge meet did not go as well, but the girls did not get home (from Mason) until 11:30 and we had to be back at the school at quarter to eight. Barb was talking about the mile relay and she figured she had 16 hours to go out and do it again."

One of Bath's best surprises came when freshman Debbie Nichols ran a 12:27 (converted) in the two-mile to place sixth at Stockbridge.

Fowler is the only undefeated baseball team in the county. The Eagles won their first seven games by averaging 8.9 runs a game and allowing less than three per game.

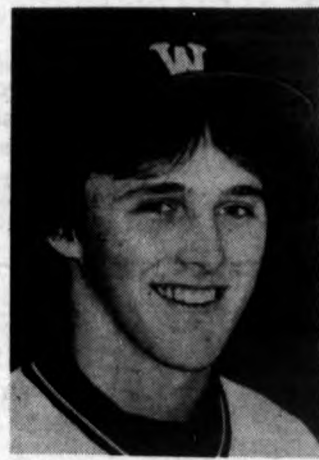
Bill Kohagen leads the pitchers with a 3-0 record. Dan Simon and Steve Weber have won two games apiece.

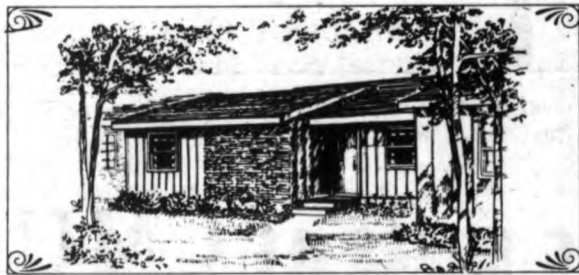
