No leads yet

Authorities have no new leads on the abduction and rape of a 16-year-old St. Johns girl from a city street at 3:30 p.m. Monday, May 2.

"We've had a lot of calls about old, black cars, and some people have called about the (composite) picture, but there's been nothing to go on yet," St. Johns Police Chief Lyle French said.

According to the victim, a man in an old, dark-colored, four-door sedan pulled her into his auto near the intersection of Wight and McConnel streets, then took her south of town on County Farm Road, south of Parks Road, and raped her.

"She walked up to the car and asked him what he wanted and he said 'I want you' and pulled her in the car," French said. The abductor later drove the girl back to the same city intersection, about two-blocks from St. Johns Junior High, and dropped her off, reports said.

St. Johns Police and Clinton County detectives published a composite sketch last week. The assailant is described as approximately 30 years old, 5'11" to 6', about 240 lbs., with short, dark hair, a clean-shaven face and a mole on one cheek. The auto he was driving was badly rusted near the wheel wells.

"We always preach about this and tell kids do not approach a car with a stranger in it. We tell them not to walk alone, to go in groups if possible," French said. "If someone approaches them, we tell them to keep walking, and if they chase you, to run to the nearest house and pound on the door or scream and yell to attract attention. If you see something suspicious, get the license number and call us."

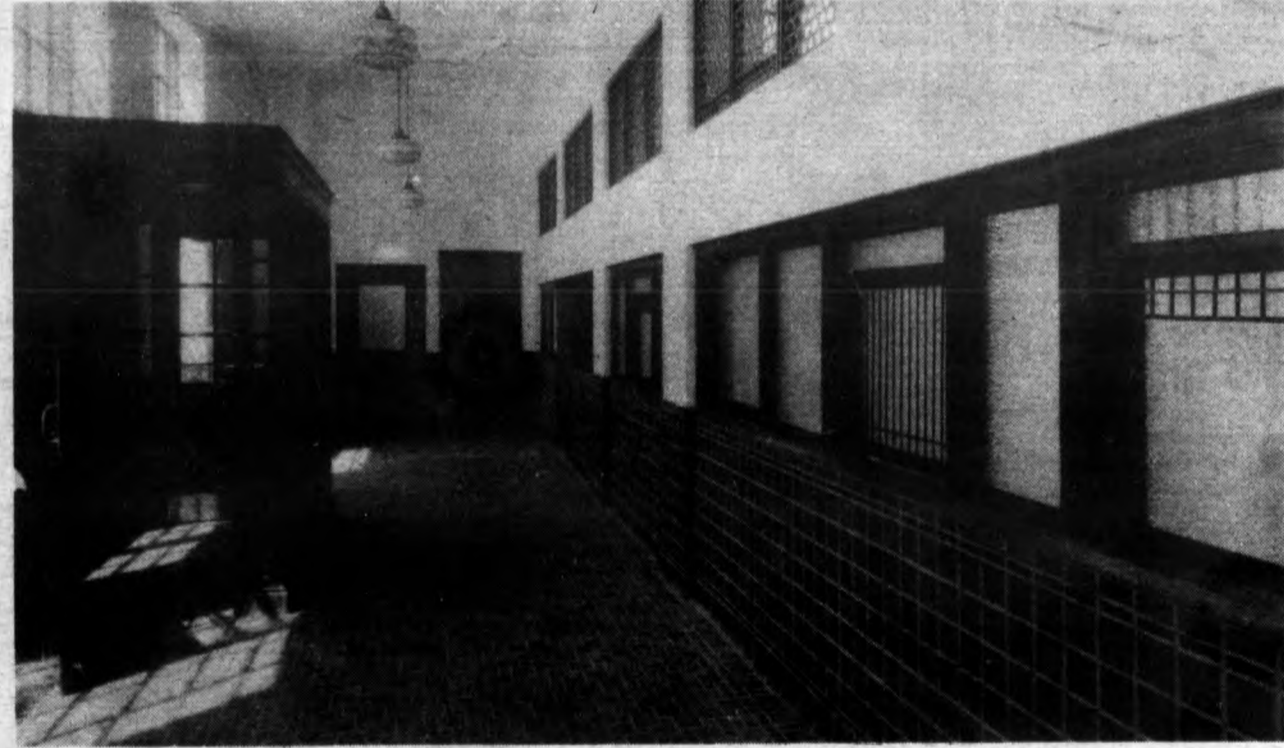
French, who called the incident the worst he has seen in 27 years of St. Johns police work, urged parents to talk to their children about safety.

"Sometimes it takes something like this to make people wake up. We hate to say it, but everybody gets complacent and says it can't happen here. Well it has."

Same address, but new look

They've been knocking down walls inside the St. Johns Post Office. But don't fret — the building won't come tumbling down.

The construction is part of a three-week interior remodeling project which the building badly needed, according to Postmaster Dave Yallup. Construction is expected to be completed by Saturday, May 14, he said.

The building has remained virtually unchanged since it was built in 1936. But during the same time, postal service in the St. Johns area has changed a great deal, Yallup says.

"When they built this, they had a lot of room," he said. "They probably had half the routes we have now."

Remodeling the building includes changing the location of the mail window and post office boxes. The mail window will be moved from the north end of the lobby to the west end. The number of post office boxes will be increased and they will run along the north wall where the mail window was.

All of that restructuring will make the backroom more space efficient, Yallup said. The supervisor's desk in the backroom will be moved from a corner to the middle of the room when the remodeling is completed.

Yallup would not disclose the cost of the remodeling, but he said it will mean that St. Johns will not need to build a bigger post office building for "a few years."

"We're trying to maintain the same look it had in 1936," he said. "They've done a real fine job of squeezing the best use out of this building for nearly 50 years."

John Briggs, area maintenance technician for 80 U.S. postal offices around Lansing, has been doing the bulk of the work.

"It keeps him hopping," Yallup said. "We've been waiting since last November (to schedule him for the work). I'm sure this is the biggest job he's undertaken since he's been in this job."

Assigning the work to Briggs means "a considerable amount" of savings for the postal service, Yallup said. Big projects are normally contracted out, he said.

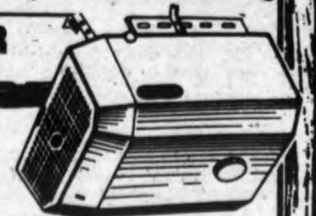
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Area youth have plenty of talent

Priests agree on freeze letter

Most Catholic pastors in Clinton County say the nuclear arms race is a moral issue, and support a recent pastoral letter calling for a halt of nuclear weapons production.

"My personal opinion is that any sane person would want to halt nuclear weapons production," said Fr. David Stotenbur of St. Jude Catholic Church in DeWitt. "Certainly the scale of horror and madness of nuclear warfare makes it an unacceptable method of settling international conflicts."

Fr. Stotenbur said he has no doubt that the issue is a moral one, and welcomed the stand taken by Roman Catholic Bishops Tuesday, May 3, in a 238-9 vote supporting a pastoral letter calling for what amounts to a nuclear freeze.

"This is one of the most important moral questions of our day," Fr. Stotenbur said.

Pastors at other Catholic churches in Clinton County agreed, with the exception of Fr. William Hankerd at St. Joseph Catholic Church in St. Johns. Fr. Hankerd said many in his congregation are opposed to the pastoral letter, which was fought by the Reagan administration, but declined to elaborate and said he wished not to be quoted.

Fr. Stotenbur, however, said complaints that the Catholic clergy should not become involved in political issues are unfounded.

"It depends on whose ox is being gored," he said. "When people don't like what the church says, it's a political issue. When they want the church to take a stand, it's a moral issue. People wanted the church to take a stand on civil rights, for instance."

"I don't think anyone could say this is not a moral issue when it affects the life and death of mankind ... Even our political life should be governed by moral principals. Isn't that what Watergate was all about?"

Fr. James Schmitt, pastor of St. Mary's Church in Westphalia for 12 years, wholeheartedly agreed. "There just isn't any kind of escape from this kind of warfare," he said. "It certainly is immoral."

"Some of the kids have asked me, and I've told them that defensive warfare is one thing, and the church has supported that, but with atomic warfare there just isn't any escape."

Fr. Denis Spitzley, pastor of Fowler's Holy Trinity Church, also expressed strong support for the pastoral letter. Part of the controversy during two years spent drafting the pastoral letter centered on a proposal to insert "curb" in place of the recommended "halt" in nuclear arms production and deployment. Spitzley said he was pleased "halt" survived.

"I'm very glad they came down as hard as they did," he said. "I'm glad the word halt is in there instead of curb. You don't curb production and deployment of nuclear weapons, just as you don't curb abortion. You halt them."

Spitzley said his congregation has been active in establishing a justice and peace commission, and a Pax Christi (Christians for peace) cell is being organized in Fowler.

"I guess I want to say if you believe that human life is sacred, and we can document that nuclear arms, by existing, are denying some people welfare, then those are moral questions."

"I would cite one of my favorite passages from the Bible, John 10:10. Jesus said: 'I have come that they might have life and have life abundantly.'"

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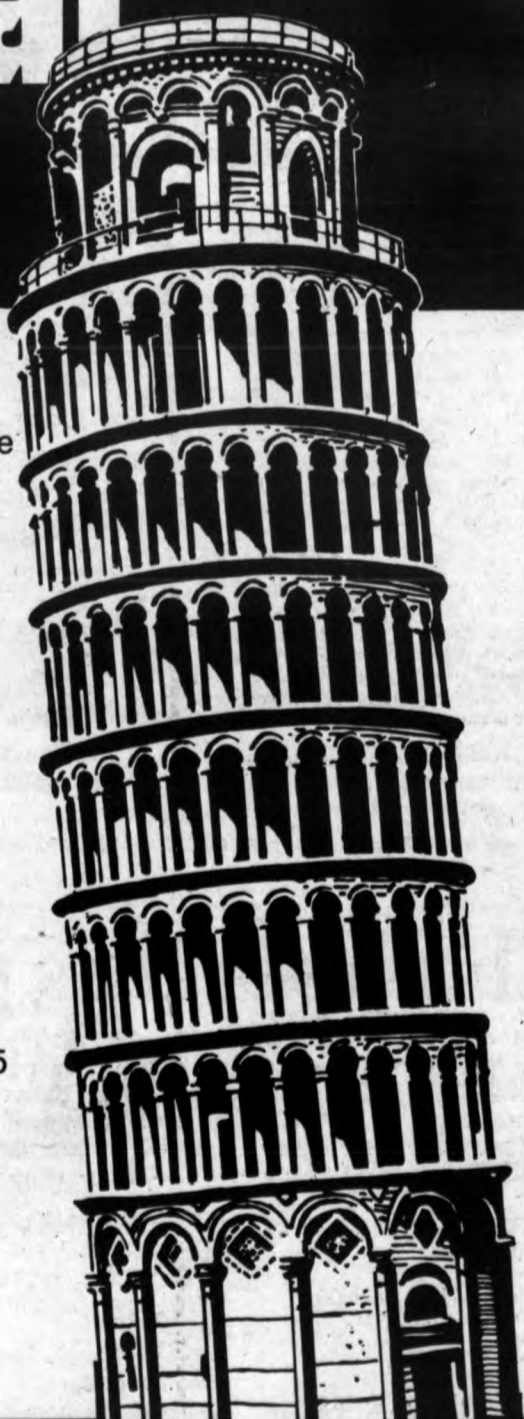
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Board decides not to decide on closings

Action by the St. Johns Board of Education to keep open East Essex and East Olive elementary schools next year isn't causing superintendent Earl Gabriel to ask for increased millage.

Gabriel said he can live with the board's decision to delay any action on the school closings until December. "When you lose a battle, you don't gain anything by going out and pouting," the superintendent said.

Since the May 4 meeting, which drew about 350 to the St. Johns auditorium, Gabriel has been working on a budget he can present to the board for approval before July 1. Closing the schools would have saved the district an estimated \$192,000, but now the dist deficit of about \$500,000, according to Rick Terres, controller.

Though the district is counting on increased state aid to slice the deficit, it may have to dip into its \$656,000 fund equity to come up with a balanced budget, Terres said.

Board members failed to act on the recommendation of an administrative task force, partly because of alternative proposals presented by East Olive and East Essex parents.

East Olive parents suggested the hiring of a professional consultant to conduct a study and figure out other solutions.

The East Essex proposal hinged on a plan to close Central Elementary School, which they said would save the district \$138,627 the first year and \$176,916 annually after that.

Parents again accused Gabriel of trying to railroad the task force plan through the board.

"The Board must choose between a hurried, rush to judgement as we see this administrative proposal currently on the table, or it can take a logical, rational approach to the problem," said Ronald Lyon, spokesman

for the East Olive PTO.

"We do not plan on falling under a dictatorship here," said East Olive's Sue Pouch, evoking an "Amen" from a loud voice in the crowd.

According to a survey done by East Olive parents of 269 families in East Olive, no one in the area wants his children to go to another school. The survey also reported 40.8 percent — or about 90 children out of 221 — would attend a non-public school if East Olive was closed.

"Can you imagine the impact upon the St. Johns School District if the remaining three rural elementary areas react in the same way as East Olive by sending their children to non-public schools?" asked Lyon. "What will happen to your state aid then?"

Parents threatened legal action if the board voted to close their schools. "If a division is made, we want our schools back," said spokesman Douglas Cook.

"We are here to fight and to stand for a way of life we believe in," said East Essex parent Gayla Phillips. "The schools are an important part of that way of life."

Board members voted unanimously to delay any decision until December.

"It's rather distressing that we have to be under the wire here in May," said President Robert Craig.

The next move, Gabriel said, is to check out the East Essex plan to close Central. He expects a committee of task force members and concerned East Olive and East Essex parents will be formed in time to discuss the proposal in October.

"We're going to give it a good, hard review," he said. Gabriel said the board's action will mean 13 combined

classrooms next year, instead of the two which would have resulted had the task force plan been adopted.

The superintendent said the task force recommended the closings for reasons the public did not always realize. The task force felt the closings would maintain and improve the educational program, make more effective use of staff and make the district more cost effective and fiscally responsible, Gabriel said.

"Our purpose in proposing this was not just to save money," he said.

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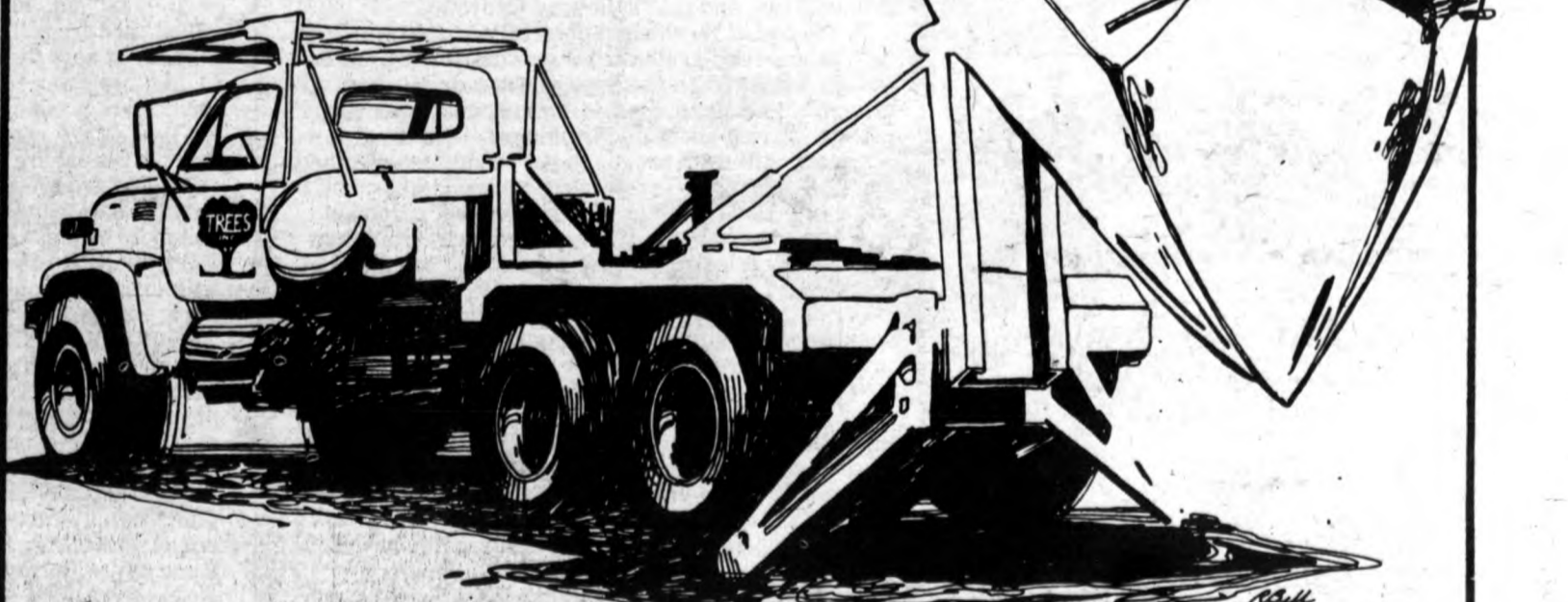
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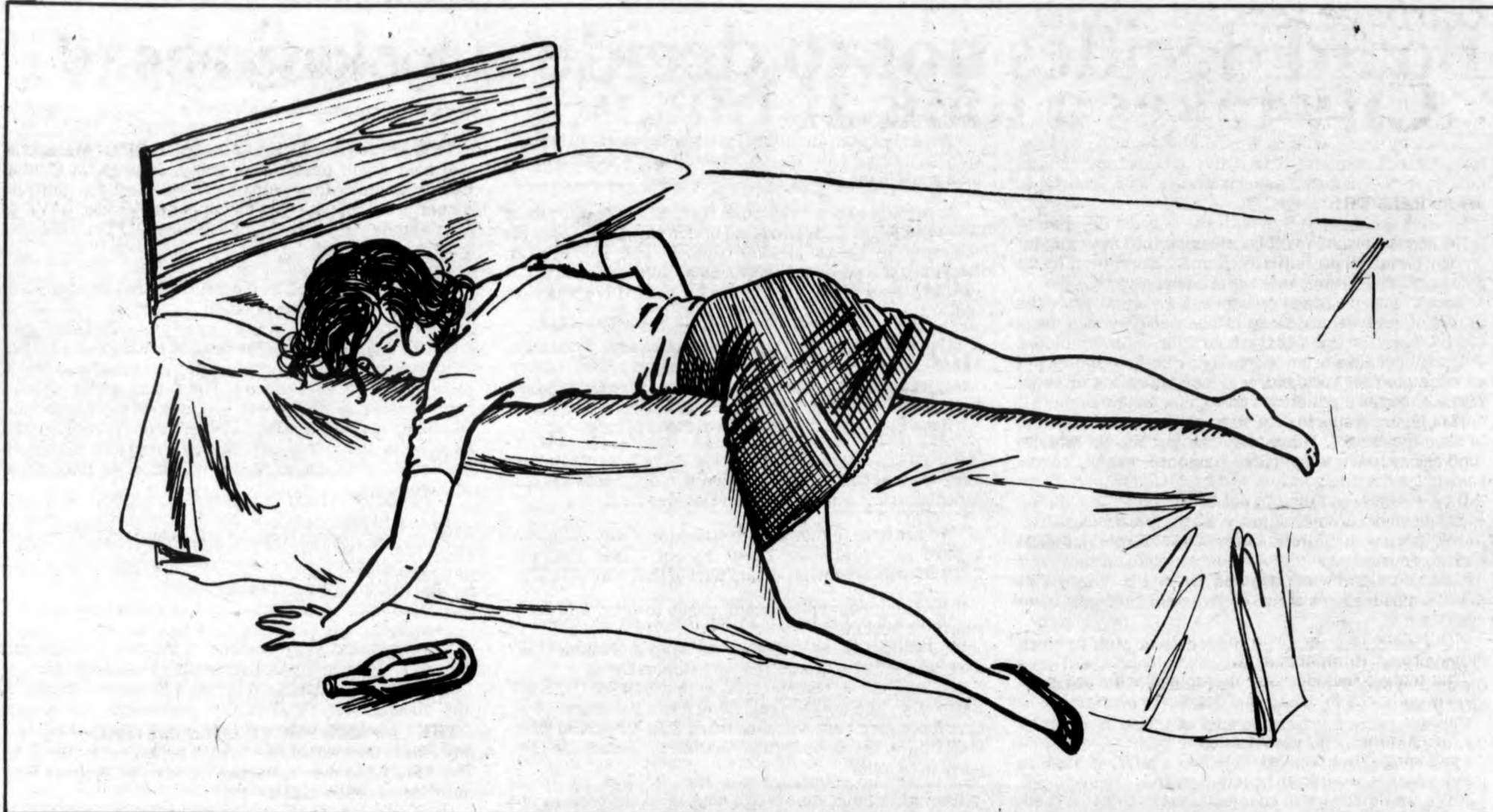
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She's back in control, thanks to AA

It wasn't the headache or the upset stomach or even the ashtray-flavored, parched mouth in the morning that made her stop. It was fear.

"In the back of my mind, all of the time, I was afraid. I can't say enough how much self deception there is in an alcoholic's mind. I was always afraid I would lose control, but I didn't want to admit I was an alcoholic. To me it was more acceptable to be crazy."

"I was thinking about this interview," she said, curled up on an overstuffed sofa, gazing out a large picture window at the tall pines and stubbing out her cigarette. "I was thinking about how most people emphasize the drinking pattern. But I wanted to talk about the emotional aspect."

Reliving 11 hazy years of drinking, she stopped occasionally to collect her thoughts, to clarify dates and events, or to tend to her three-year-old daughter. Though obviously difficult to share with a stranger, her recollections were matter of fact and candid — up to the part about her decision to finally seek help from Alcoholics Anonymous (AA). At that point, the emotional aspect of alcoholism was painfully clear.

'I was afraid of the kind of parent I would be. Leaving her with friends so I could drink, abusing her, coming home drunk...'

"I just had to get to the point where I didn't want to drink anymore. Every time I drank, I knew something bad would happen. I didn't know what, I just knew something really bad was going to happen if I didn't stop."

"I was 26 and I was an unwed mother. I never thought I would grow up to become an alcoholic and an unwed mother at 26, a welfare recipient. I was a total failure."

"The things I heard... I felt like I'd come home," she said, pausing a moment as memories of her first regular visits to AA welled up. "I heard all the fears, worries and resentments I had felt, all of the things people hide deep down in their hearts... I heard people say these things out loud. I'd never heard honesty like that. They were even laughing. I hadn't laughed in years."

Her daughter came in from outdoors, interrupting the conversation to show her mother a pine cone she'd found.

"The day I came home from the hospital after having her, I went to AA," her mother resumed, collected and matter of fact again. "They say you should get sober for yourself, but she was what motivated me to stay sober," she said, zipping the little girl's jacket up tighter and sending her back out to play.

"I was afraid of the kind of parent I would be. Leaving her with friends so I could drink, abusing her, coming home drunk..."

Talking with the attractive, 29-year-old woman, it is hard to imagine she could be anything but a caring,

single parent. On May 15, she will have gone three years without a drink or any other mood-altering drug. You won't find her celebrating in a bar, though. If friends ask her out for a drink, she says "no." If they persist, she'll joke simply, "I dance on tables. And I don't like to dance on tables."

Stories of personal crisis often are fraught with melodrama and self-pity. But this one is dispassionate, spiced only with a healthy sense of humor. She is in control now, she has conquered fear twice: the fear that forced her to stop drinking and another fear which made her start more than a dozen years ago while attending St. Johns High School — insecurity.

"Tenth grade is when it started. I was 15. I was allowed to have a drink with my parents, but most of all it was something I did with my friends. Usually a group of us would drive around in a car before games and dances and drink. We'd have big field parties with kegs.

"At that time it seemed like the only thing to do for fun. The crowd I hung around with, whatever we did, drinking went with it. I liked to drink and I liked friends who did and I didn't have any friends who didn't."

"I was bashful and kind of shy, but when I drank, I was outgoing and popular. I think a lot of my drinking was because of emotional problems. I was uncomfortable around people."

Family activities also centered around beer, wine and booze. "I was around a lot of family drinking and learned that's the way you socialize, that's the way you have fun, and that's the way you relax."

By the age of 18, she had been jailed for drunk driving. "The week I graduated, I was starting to get the shakes inside. When you really need a drink, they come from inside, not outside, you know. I was really getting worried about my drinking. I could drink 18 beers and still walk around, but I wouldn't remember what I'd done."

She attended less than a term of college, dropped out, and came home to find a job. "It was a job that paid for my drinking and my cigarettes, and that's all that I cared about."

Drifting in and out of jobs and relationships, she spent her evenings in bars, hanging around with "a pretty rough crowd."

"I missed a lot of work, sleeping in with hangovers, and I said a lot of things I didn't mean, causing trouble with my personal relationships and family. I had some minor auto accidents. I was getting into trouble."

"Sometimes I'd pray and say 'God, help me out of this and I'll never drink again.'"

From Louisiana to northern Michigan, she worked at various jobs, never far from a bottle. Firings, scrapes with the law, a drunk driving accident which paralyzed a loved one — none could make her admit she was an alcoholic. Following one episode, in which she "completely lost control" and became hysterical, she admitted herself to St. Lawrence Hospital.

She managed to stay sober for nine months and attended AA meetings regularly before drinking nine beers one night. "I don't remember anything after the second. I stayed drunk for a year."

Now, she and her daughter live in southern Clinton County in a rented portion of a new home. She attends college and about five AA meetings every week.

"I feel like I've gotten younger by about 10 years. I've lost weight, my hair and skin are healthier and I sleep better. I go to a lot of meetings to keep it that way."

"Another reason I go to meetings is that I forget to be grateful I didn't go to prison, that I don't drink and abuse my child."

Taking another sip of coffee, she joked about the reputation of reformed drunks, then reluctantly offered a word of advice to drinkers. "People will say 'Well, I just had an accident, but I'm not an alcoholic because I don't drink like that.'"

"Just stop and think, it's not how much I drank, it's what I did when I drank."

Here's help

It's the number three killer, behind heart disease and cancer, and it may be the number one problem in Clinton County.

According to Gayle Nutt, supervisor of the Clinton County Substance Abuse Center, alcohol is a big problem because it is easy to get, and because rural, conservative communities sanction use of alcohol rather than other drugs.

But in terms of lives destroyed, she and other experts point out, alcohol is more deadly than so-called hard drugs like heroin and cocaine.

Ms. Nutt says the typical alcohol abuser referred to her program by the courts, an employer or themselves is a single man between the ages of 21-24. Half of the people she sees are employed full time; 23 percent are looking for work.

"Those who are actually looking for work are finding it takes longer to find a job. As a result, they feel more helpless and more hopeless."

But there is plenty of help available for people with drinking problems and their families. Following are some of the groups available for counseling:

Garbage fees up slightly

City takes a look at budget

St. Johns residents will be assessed the same amount in taxes and will pay slightly more for services if the city commission approves the proposed 1983-84 budget.

An increase in the operating millage rate from 9.52 to 9.72 is offset by a .2 drop in the debt levy, which keeps the total mills at the 1982 figure of 13.32.

Partly because of an increase in the garbage pickup service charge, residents will pay more for city services. Cost for a resident who owns a \$50,000 home will be \$13.10, according to City Manager Randy Humphrey.

"It's peanuts," Humphrey said. "We're thinking we've done real well to hold the line this time."

Cost for hauling garbage will be raised from \$49.50 to \$57.20, effective in August, Humphrey said.

"If you look at other cities, it's a reasonable rate," he said. "It's not uncommon to pay \$75-\$80 in other cities."

The proposed \$3.8 million budget includes a fund equity of \$1.5 million which Humphrey said is "down a little." It also includes a bond retirement fund of \$400,000 on 3.6 mills.

"Our debt levy is down substantially compared to other cities," Humphrey said.

The budget includes few major projects, and some minor cutbacks in areas that formerly received more funding.

For example, \$48,000 has been designated for street resurfacing. That will cover 14 city blocks, Humphrey said, which is down from previous years.

"But we think we will cover the blocks that are really bad," he said. "It's the right amount of dollars to do what's absolutely necessary."

Another \$10,000 is targeted for sidewalk improvement, which means \$20,000 worth of repairs. The fund is

set up so that homeowners match the city funding.

About \$70,000 is budgeted for the water main extension project on Townsend Road and Lansing Street, Humphrey said.

The mobile equipment fund, which upgrades the quality of city vehicles, has a budget of \$260,000. Purchase of a \$22,000 dump truck is the biggest project, Humphrey said.

In action from Monday's city commission meeting, Ed Idzkowski requested that the 100-block of Spring Street have more than a two-hour limit for parking. Idzkowski owns a building in the block which he rents to a dentist, and several patients have been getting tickets.

The issue was referred to the parking advisory committee.

Ovid man arrested for break-in

Most of the damage was on the south side of the school, but the entire school was painted in places. Janitors using a sandblaster had removed most of the paint by Tuesday, and investigators were talking with several suspects, who left initials painted on walls as well, reports said.

An Eaton County tracking dog, "Zeb," led deputies to a suspect in two break-ins reported May 4. Arrested and charged with breaking and entering a non-residence was Lee Alan Steffen, 18, of 130 Oak St., Ovid. Reports said George Maron, owner of Riverside Laundromat in Ovid, reported a brick had been thrown through a sliding glass door at the front of his business at 420 S. Main, Ovid, and some pop and candy had been taken. The same day, Jim Besko, of 119 W. Elm, Ovid, reported \$315 worth of tools stolen from his garage.

Then came Bronson

I was expecting a gravelly, cigarette-scorched voice, the kind you hear coming from the sunlight-starved "regulars" whose world revolves around a bar stool, an ashtray and a bottle.

Instead, she sounded like one of the many receptionists and executive secretaries I talk to during the course of a newsgathering week: professional, cool and eager to be of assistance.

That's why I was thrown off guard for a moment. "Mr. Bronson?" she said. "I've decided to consent to an interview. Where would you like to meet?"

We chose her house in southern Clinton County. I was impressed with the attractive home when I arrived, and even more impressed when I learned she was a single parent, renting a well decorated and spotless downstairs apartment and taking care of her three-year-old daughter while studying to complete a rigorous college program. This was obviously not your typical problem drinker, I thought.

I was wrong. Except for the fact that she apparently has completely conquered her problems and is in complete control — a fact which sets her light-years apart from most — her story was a good illustration of the damage alcohol can wreak.

She'd dropped out of school, hadn't had a steady job for years, lost friends and family support and generally slipped farther and farther down the slippery slope of alcoholism. Though she told her story for the most part without emotion, the fear and

despair she must have felt at times was vivid.

When she discussed her high school days, it was as if we had run in the same crowd. There was the drinking before games, the parties after games, the "grassers" and "keggers." We graduated a year apart in the early 1970s, she in St. Johns and I in East Lansing.

High school was where some learned their limits, then learned to ignore them. Drinking was cool. Mom and dad drank, sisters and brothers at college talked about kegs of beer at "T.G.s" — it was obviously the adult thing to do.

In the second instance, you call the people who are opposed to closing the rural schools a minority. What hidden information do you have about the number of citizens for this proposal and the numbers against?

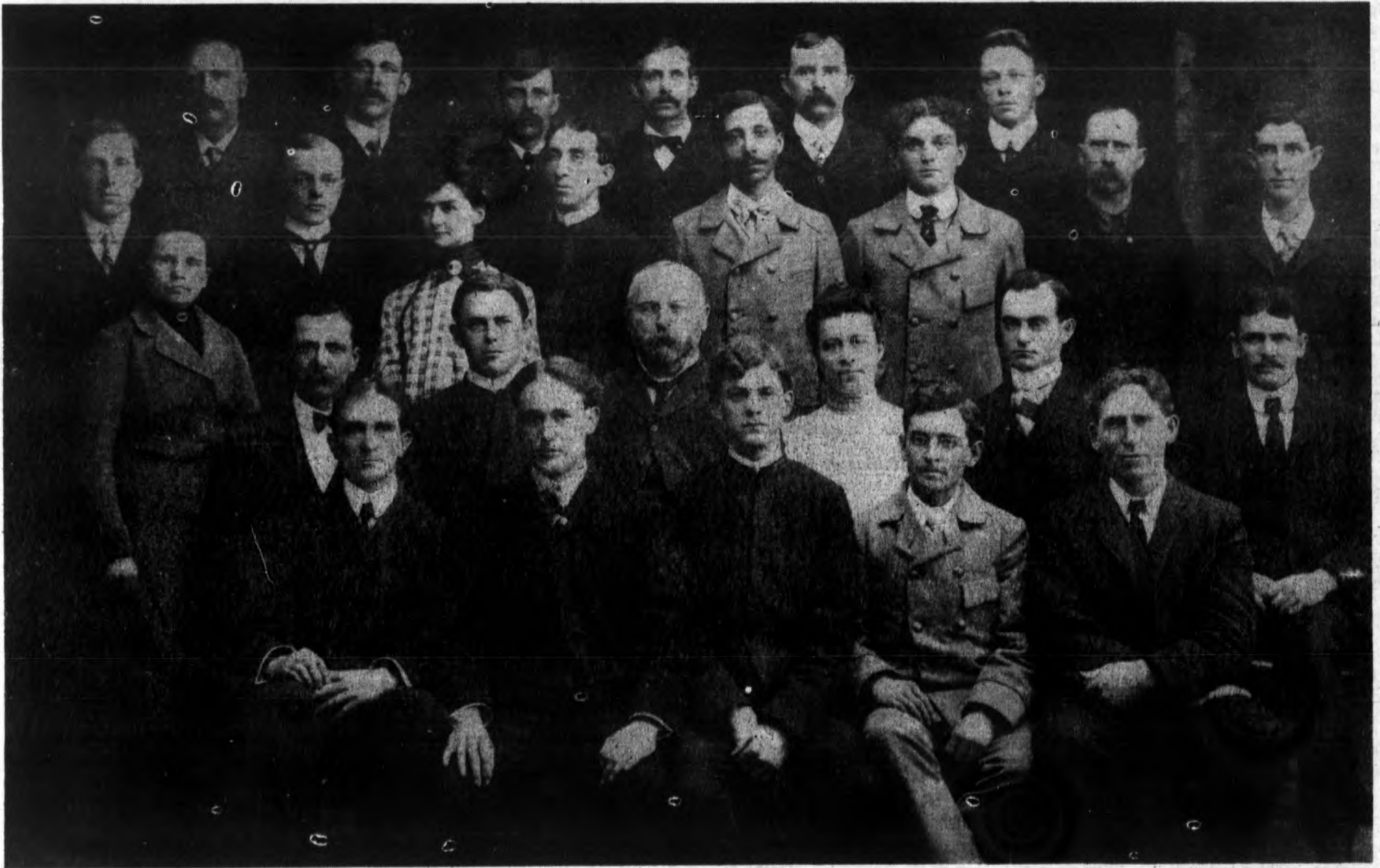

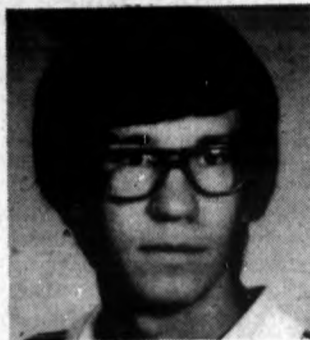

Redwing girls close in on track title

Four down, one to go.

The St. Johns girls track team hiked its Mid-Michigan 'B' League record to 4-0 by beating Ovid-Elsie Wednesday, clinching at least a share of the championship. The Redwings can finish their dual meet season unbeaten by topping Chesaning next Wednesday at St. Johns.

At the Corunna Relays last Friday, St. Johns set a school record in the mile relay by running 4:13.7. The team of Kathleen Voisin, Melinda Roberts, Chris Rapelje and Caren Rojas had never run faster than 4:19 this season.

"When they ran before, they were all running in four events, so this time, they had time to rest," said St. Johns coach Terri Brown.

The distance medley team of Kim Heibeck, Roberts, Tina Simmon and Becky Irrer also won at Corunna. St. Johns finished fifth out of 10 teams.

St. Johns came close, but it couldn't beat DeWitt at

the Clinton County track meet Monday at Ovid-Elsie. The Panthers scored 70 points, while St. Johns had 61. Bath scored 48, followed by Fowler with 26 and Ovid-Elsie with 21.

Fowler coach Kim Spalsbury proved prophetic when he analyzed the meet before it began. "We're going into the meet with the idea of simply qualifying people for regionals," he said. "It's DeWitt's meet anyway. Don't be surprised if we finish third or fourth."

Spalsbury accomplished one of his goals when Beth Wirth clocked a 2:31.6 in the 880 run to qualify for the Class D regional meet. He was also pleased by the performance of Kelly Hafner, who lowered her personal best in the 440 dash by 2½ seconds to 1:02.9.

"She ran just about the same time in the mile relay, so it wasn't a fluke," Spalsbury said. "This really sets up our mile relay for the state meet. She had been our weakest link."

Fowler won its fourth invitational this season when it nipped Concord and Potterville at the Potterville Invitational. The Eagles scored 81 points to Concord's 78 and Potterville's 76.

Fowler won the meet when its mile relay team of Lana Hafner, Jan Schmitt, Kelly Hafner and Becky Klein finished first, and Concord's relay placed fourth.

Freshman Cindy Schneider placed third in the 880-yard run in 2:36.1, which qualified her for the Class D regional meet.

Becky Klein won the 220-yard dash, the 440-yard dash, and ran a leg on the first-place 880-yard relay.

In another strong effort, Emily Feldpausch ran a season-best 12:38.9 in the two-mile run.

Earlier in the week, Fowler took control of the Central Michigan Athletic Conference race by beating Potterville, 74-49, and Portland St. Patrick, 112-6, at Potterville.

Highlighting the meet was a school record by Klein in the 100-yard dash. Aided by wind, she smashed her previous mark of 11.6 with a 11.3. She also won the 440 and 220 dashes, posting a season-best 26.4 in the 220.

Feldpausch and Lana Hafner were double winners. Feldpausch won the mile and two-mile runs, and Hafner won the high jump and 880 run.

Bath senior Vaughn Svendsen has devised this rather simple strategy for his best race, the 880-yard (half mile) run.

"I usually go out and take the lead," he said.

"The first lap, I try to stay smooth and keep a good pace. I usually try to hit 59 seconds for the first lap. The second lap is a little slower right now, but by the end of the season I hope to have it a little faster."

Svendsen is down to 1:58.5 in the half mile, which easily is the best in Clinton County. He also leads county milers and is part of the county's fastest mile relay team.

He blitzed the half mile and mile fields at Monday's county meet, setting two meet records. His became the first county runner to break 4:30 in the mile when he went 4:27.5.

His goal this season is to finish in the top three in the half mile at the Class C state meet. He also would like to place in the mile.

Bath was primed, but the St. Johns boys track team wasn't ready to yield its title at the Clinton County track meet Monday at Ovid-Elsie.

The Redwings won the meet with 65 points, outdistancing Bath by 13. Fowler finished third with 38 and Ovid-Elsie was fifth with 32½.

Leading the Redwing charge was Scott Furry, won both the low and high hurdles and ran a leg on the winning 440-yard relay team. Other St. Johns winners were sprinter Chris Loucks, quarter miler Darren Scott and two-miler Tom Raymon.

Picking up crucial points with second-place finishes were Steve Gonzales in the low hurdles and Brian Devereaux in the two-mile.

Earlier, Furry ran a personal-best 15.0 in the 120-yard high hurdles at the East Lansing Relays. He placed third in the race, which featured some of the finest Class A talent in the state.

"He ran a great race," said St. Johns coach Randy Rude. "His concentration was good. I think he clipped one hurdle with his knee, but each time he runs, he gets a little quicker."

The Redwings' two-mile relay placed second. Anchor Raymon covered the final half mile in 2:03, after Scott, Mark Webster and Devereaux ran steady splits in the 2:06-2:07 range.

The Redwings also won a Mid-Michigan 'B' dual meet when they whipped Ionia, 78-54, at the Bulldogs' track. One of the surprises there was Brub Zamarron winning the long jump in 19-7¼. Zamarron, St. Johns' best pole vaulter, had only tried the long jump once before.

"He wanted to try it, and I said, 'Go ahead,'" Rude said. "We don't have anybody else to put in there, so I said you may as well try it."

Fowler's Dave Koenigsknecht had a banner week. The Eagle senior won the high jump, long jump and 100-yard dash as his team whipped Portland St. Patrick, 122-4, and lost to Potterville, 74-58, in a triangular meet at Potterville.

Then, in a return trip to Potterville for the Potterville Invitational, Koenigsknecht set a school record in the 100 dash. Pushed by a slight wind and Potterville's Doug Johnson, Koenigsknecht was timed in 10.1.

"Their straightaway runs east and west, so if there's any wind, it helps you," said Fowler coach Tom O'Rourke. "With this one, I'm pleased, because he had to run in prelims and semifinals and finals."

Koenigsknecht came back in the county meet to win the long jump and 220 dash and finish second in the 100 and high jump.

Also at the county meet, sophomore Joe Bertram won the discus with a school and meet record toss of 141-10.

"He had two of them over 140, so we're to the point of thinking maybe he'll make it to the state meet," said O'Rourke.

Miler Glen Feldpausch continued to lower his school record. He was timed in 4:42.4 at Potterville and 4:40.9 at Ovid-Elsie.

For the host Marauders, one of the bright spots was miler Pete Prujillo. He set a school record with a time of 4:36.

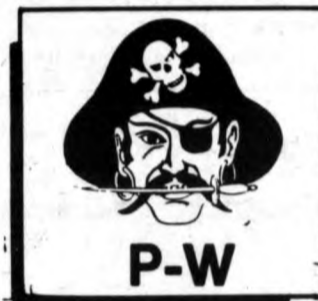

P-W biggest problem this season has been the walks allowed by its pitching staff. Pirate pitchers allow more than 10 walks per game, Somero said.

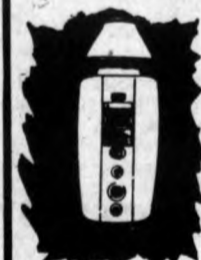
But P-W walked only six Laingsburg batters, which contributed to the ease of the win.

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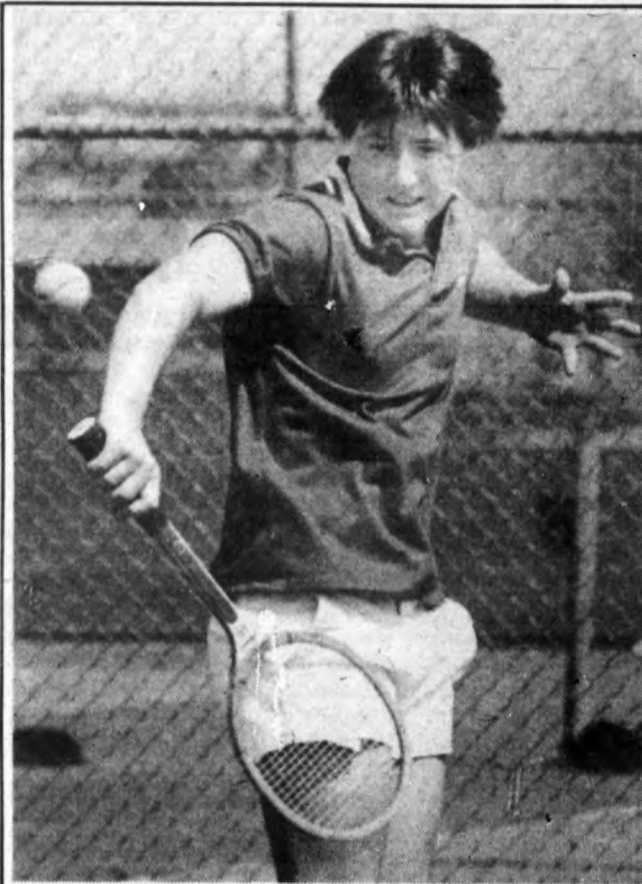

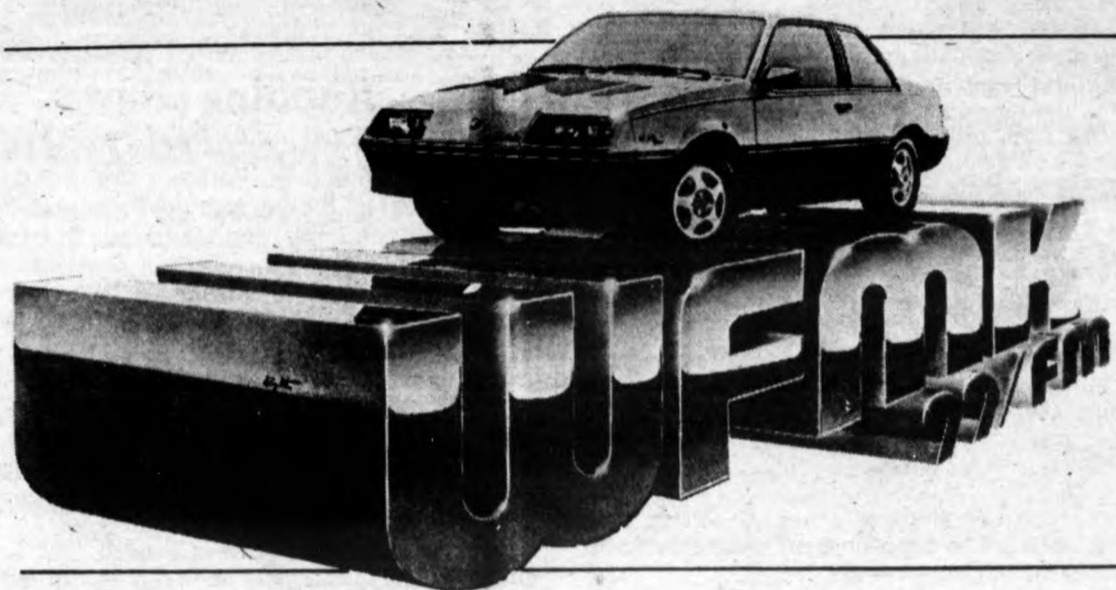

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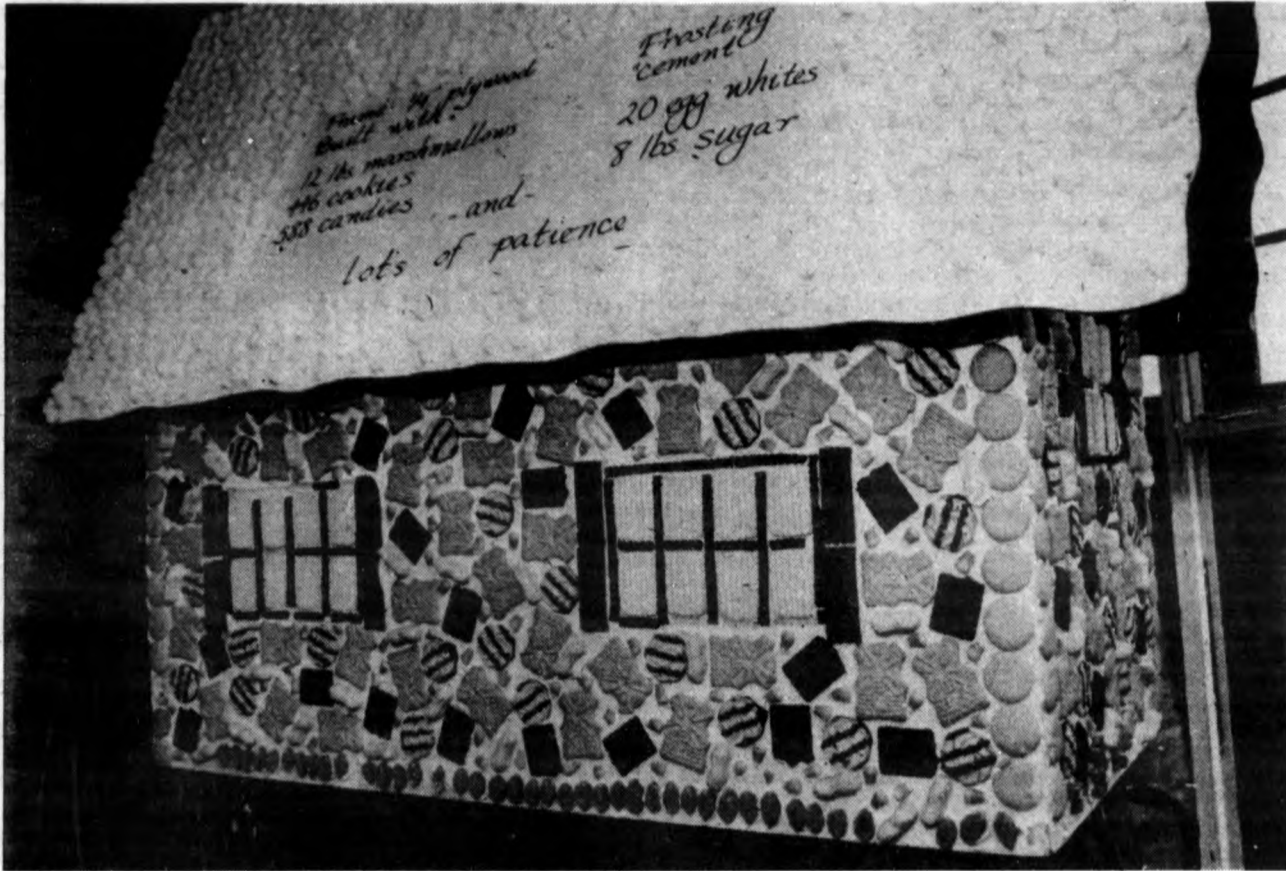

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Masons in Clinton County 'making good men better'

When Kenneth Richards worked as a custodian for the physical plant at Michigan State University, he got to know football coach Biggie Munn quite well.

"Biggie and I had our battles, but we were also very close friends," said Richards, who retired from the university in 1973 after 37 years of service.

One day in 1949, when Richards was helping a crew work on the basketball floor at Jenison Field House, Munn strolled near him. The veteran coach, flanked by trainer Jack Heppinstall, had prepared a seemingly innocent question.

"Are you a Mason?" he asked Richards.

"I didn't know the first thing about it," Richards recalled.

Richards decided to join the fraternal organization dedicated to equality, brotherly love and charity when he discovered that many of his co-workers were Masons.

"I didn't hesitate (to join)," said the 69-year-old retiree. "And I never was sorry."

"Once you're initiated, you'd be surprised at the fellows who are willing to help. I enjoy my Masonry. I enjoy the fellowship. I enjoy going over to Ovid, or over to Elsie."

"There's rum-dums in every organization. But you can't go too far wrong if your associates are of Masonic caliber."

Richards, of 201 Ralph St., Lansing, is secretary for the DeWitt Masonic Lodge. He also serves as deputy district instructor for the six Masonic lodges in Clinton County.

About 750 Masons meet in lodges at Wacousta, DeWitt, St. Johns, Ovid, Elsie and Maple Rapids, Richards said. A couple of hundred more live in the county but belong to other lodges.

About 115,000 Michigan residents are Masons. The world population of Masons is nearly five million.

A candidate for Masonry must be at least 21 years old, believe in God and have high moral standards.

"All it intends to do is to take good men and make them better," said Richards. "It's not a religion, though the two are intermingled."

Masons quote from the Bible during their meetings, but hesitate when asked about verses. "Masonry is not a secret organization," Richards explained. "But it is an organization that has a few secrets."

Each of the levels of Masonry has its own "ritual" book, filled with letters which stand for words. For example, "K" and "S" might stand for King Solomon.

To interpret what word each letter stands for, new members are tutored by older ones.

If a Mason in Clinton County has a question about a letter, he contacts Richards. If Richards isn't sure about the meaning of a letter, he has to check a master key for Masons in Grand Rapids.

"I go to Grand Rapids five or six times a year to check the words out," he said.

A typical Mason meeting starts with the presentation of an American flag and an inquiry about members in need. After going over the minutes of the previous meeting, petitions of Mason candidates are presented and a committee is appointed to investigate those candidates.

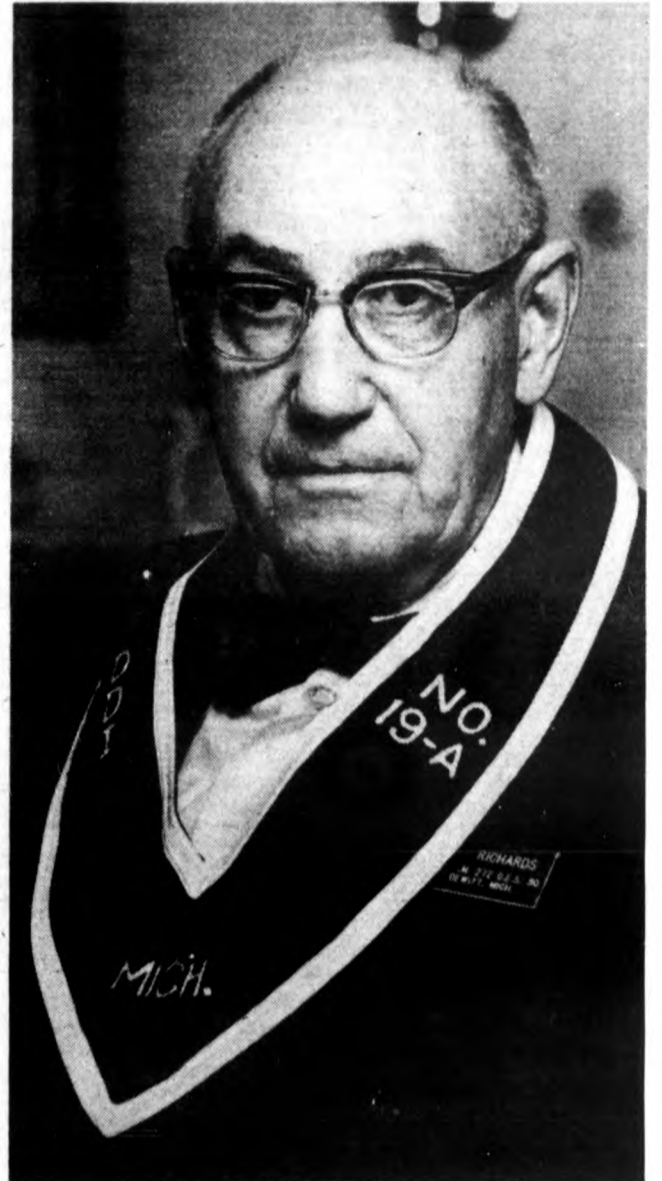
Involvement with community activities is then discussed. "We're getting more and more involved in community affairs, and helping people," Richards said.

Masons generally do charitable work behind the scenes. Among other things, they sponsor loan funds and scholarships to help students further their education, and support research projects aimed at fighting life-threatening diseases.

"We do not take the lead," said Richards, explaining the Masonic philosophy. "But we're always ready to help."

Meeting dates and times vary at the six county lodges. St. Johns Masons meet on the first Monday of the month. Maple Rapids has its meeting on the second Monday. Ovid has its meeting on the first Tuesday, while Elsie meets on the second Tuesday. Wacousta and DeWitt each meet on the first Thursday.

All meetings begin at 7:30 p.m., except for Wacousta's, which starts at 8 p.m.

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VILLAGE OF WESTPHALIA

ORDINANCE NO. 131 PREAMBLE

An Ordinance pursuant to Act Number 4 of 1974, to provide for the construction of public improvements and the funding of same by special assessment upon the lands and premises benefited thereby, to define certain terms, to provide a procedure whereby said assessments may be levied, to provide for public hearings and methods of payment and collection of said assessment, to provide for the creation of liens against said properties specially benefited by said improvement and to provide for refund and retention of monies obtained by said levy for combining of projects and judicial review of actions taken pursuant to the terms hereof.

The Village of Westphalia Ordains:

Section I. DEFINITIONS.

A. **PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT.** As used herein, the term "public improvement" shall include, but not be limited to, the construction, maintenance, improvement, repair and extension of, a water system including all apparatus necessary thereto, sanitary sewers and all apparatus necessary thereto, storm drains, water-courses, bridges, culverts, sidewalks, curbs, streets, alleys, and the grading and paving thereof.

B. **SPECIAL ASSESSMENT DISTRICT.** As used herein, the term "special assessment district" shall include those lands and premises which will be specially benefited by the public improvement and which the Village intends to specially assess for all or part of the cost of said public improvement.

C. **COST.** The term "cost" as used herein in connection with the amount necessary to construct the public improvement shall include construction costs, engineering plans, specifications and supervision, land acquisition through condemnation or otherwise, legal fees, financing costs, notices, advertising and publication, administrative costs, purchase of equipment and all other costs incident to the making of the public improvement and the funding thereof.

D. **VILLAGE.** As used herein, the term "village" shall refer to the Village of Westphalia, Clinton County, Michigan.

E. **COUNCIL.** As used herein, the term "council" shall refer to the Council of the Village of Westphalia, Clinton County, Michigan.

Section II. SPECIAL ASSESSMENT FOR PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT.

All or part of the cost of any public improvement may be defrayed by the levy of a special assessment on all the lands and premises within the Village specially benefited thereby.

Section III. PROCEDURE.

A. **RESOLUTION.** The Village Council may determine by resolution that all or part of the cost of a public improvement shall be defrayed by special assessment to be levied upon the lands and premises which will be specially benefited thereby.

B. **PETITION.** Citizens desiring the construction of such public improvement may present a petition requesting that said improvement be made. Such petition shall be signed by owners of lands and premises comprising not less than fifty one percent (51%) of the total assessed value of property located within the proposed special assessment district according to the last certified general property tax roll; provided, however, that in the case of public improvements involving construction of paving, curbing or other similar improvements to village, streets and alleys, such petitions shall be signed by owners of not less than fifty one percent (51%) of the front footage of the property to be assessed. It shall be the duty of the Council to establish a uniform method of assessment of property occupying a corner lot subject to assessment on more than one side.

All petitions requesting public improvement shall be submitted to the Village Clerk and it shall be the duty of the Clerk to verify the authenticity of said signatures as being genuine and belonging to owners of the requisite amount of property or having the requisite assessed value as hereinbefore set forth. Provided further, that said petition shall be advisory only and shall not be deemed to require action by the Council. Within thirty (30) days after the receipt of said petitions, the Clerk shall report to the Village Council as to whether said petitions have met the requirements of this Ordinance.

C. Before proceeding to construct any public improvement pursuant to subparagraphs A or B above, the Council shall, by resolution, refer same to the Village President or such other person designated in the resolution directing that a report be prepared, said report shall include the necessary plans, engineering specifications, detailed estimates of costs of said public improvement and its useful life expectancy. The report shall also include a map of the proposed special assessment district(s) and any such other information as will permit the Village Council to consider the costs and necessity of the proposed public improvement and the portion of the costs thereof, if any, to be defrayed by special assessment upon the lands and premises to be benefited thereby.

Provided, however, that in the event that the proposed public improvement involves the construction of any sewer, drain or water-course, the Council shall cause a map to be made of those lands and premises which, in the opinion of the Council, will be benefited by the drainage, and which the Council intends to assess for the cost thereof. Said lands shall constitute a sewer district and said map shall show: (1) the boundaries and division of all the lots and premises in the district; (2) the proposed route and location of the sewer through the district; and, (3) the depth, grade and dimensions of the sewer or drain. Said map, along with an estimate of the costs of the proposed work, shall be deposited with the Clerk and notice shall be given by publication in a newspaper in the village for two (2) weeks or by posting copies of such notice for a period of two (2) weeks in three (3) public places within the Village. Said notice shall state the intention of the Village to construct the sewer, drain or water-course and shall designate the place where the map and estimates of costs can be found and shall set forth the time and place when the Council will meet to hear any suggestions and objections from persons interested or liable to be assessed for the work.

D. Upon the receipt of the report set forth in subparagraph C above, the Council shall review same and if it shall determine the necessity of said public improvement, a resolution shall be passed stating such necessity, the estimated cost thereof and the portion of said cost to be defrayed by special assessment on the lands and premises to be benefited thereby. Said resolution shall also set forth that part of the cost, if any, to be paid by the Village at large and shall designate the boundaries of the special assessment district and the method of assessment, e.g. by front footage or otherwise. Said resolution shall also direct that all information available to the Village be placed on file for examination by interested persons and notice shall be given as provided in Section C above. The Council shall not finally determine to proceed with the construction of said public improvement until such report has been filed and until after public hearing has been

held by the Council for the purpose of hearing objections to the making of such improvement.

E. After the presentation of the report required by Section C above, and if received prior to the public hearing on necessity, and before the adoption by the Village Council of the resolution to proceed with the making of public improvement as hereinafter provided, if written objections thereto have been filed by the owners of property in the district which will be required to bear more than fifty percent (50%) of the costs thereof or by a majority of the owners of property to be assessed, no resolution determining to proceed with the improvement shall be adopted except by the affirmative vote of not less than five (5) members of the Council.

F. At the public hearing on the proposed improvements, all persons interested shall be given a reasonable opportunity to be heard, after which the Council may modify the scope of the public improvement in such manner as they shall deem to be in the best interest of the Village as a whole; provided, that if the amount of work is increased or additions are made to the district, then another hearing shall be held pursuant to notice prescribed in Section C hereof. If the Council shall determine to proceed with the improvement, a resolution shall be passed approving the necessary profiles, plans, specifications, cost estimates and assessment district and the assessor shall be directed to prepare a special assessment role in accordance with the Council's determination and report same to the Council for confirmation.

G. No deviation from original plans or specifications as adopted shall be permitted by any officer or employee of the Village without resolution of the Village Council being first obtained. A copy of the resolution authorizing such changes or deviation shall be certified by the Clerk and attached to the original plans and specifications on file.

H. The Council shall specify the provisions and procedures for financing said public improvement. Unless the Village has available any general and/or revolving fund or otherwise, the money required for the payment of costs of the public improvement or that part thereof which will accrue before the special assessments will be paid, or monies available from the sale of bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of said special assessments shall be obtained, no contract or expenditure except for the costs of the necessary legal procedures and engineering plans, specifications and estimates of costs shall be made for the improvement. The foregoing notwithstanding, the Village may enter into contracts for such public improvements contingent upon the availability of necessary funds.

I. Pursuant to the direction of the Village Council, the assessor shall prepare a special assessment roll of lands and premises within the special assessment district to be benefited by the proposed improvement and shall assess each land or premise in the amount benefited thereby. The amount spread in each case shall be based upon the detailed estimate of costs as approved by the Council. In the event that the proceeds of the special assessment are not required to defray the expense of any public improvement prior to the completion thereof, the special assessment roll therefore may be made within sixty (60) days after the improvement is completed and shall be based upon the actual cost thereof. Upon completion of said special assessment roll, the assessor shall file the same with the Clerk for presentation to the Council for review, confirmation and certification.

J. Upon receipt of said special assessment roll, the Council, by resolution, shall accept such assessment roll and order it to be filed in the office of the Clerk for public examination and shall, by resolution, fix the time and place the Council will meet to review the special assessment roll and direct the Clerk to give notice of public hearing for the purpose of affording an opportunity for interested persons to be heard. Such notice shall be given as provided in Section C hereof. The hearing required by this Section may be held at any regular, special or adjourned meeting of the Council and all interested persons or parties shall present their objections, if any, in writing, to the assessments against them. The assessor shall be present at every meeting of the Council at which such special assessment is to be reviewed.

K. The Council shall meet at the time and place designated for the review of said special assessment roll and, at such meeting, or a proper adjournment thereof, shall consider all objections thereto submitted in writing. The Council may correct said roll as to any special assessment or description of any land or premise or other errors appearing therein or it may, by resolution, annul such assessment roll and direct that new proceedings be instituted. The same procedure shall be followed in making the new special assessment roll as in the making of the original roll. If, after hearing all objections and making a record of such changes as the Council deems justified, the Council determines that it is satisfied with said special assessment roll, and that assessments are in proportion to the benefits received, it shall thereupon pass a resolution reciting such determinations, confirming such roll, placing it on file in the office of the Clerk and shall direct the Clerk to attach a warrant to such certified copy thereof within ten (10) days commanding the assessor to spread the various sums and amounts appearing thereon on a special assessment roll for the full amounts or in annual installments as directed by the Council. Such roll shall contain the date of confirmation endorsed thereon and shall from that date be final and conclusive for the purpose of the improvement to which it applies, subject only to adjustment and to achieve conformity with the actual cost of the improvement as hereinafter provided in Section III, Subparagraph O of this Ordinance.

L. All special assessments except such installments thereof as the Council shall make payable at a future time as provided in this Ordinance, shall be due and payable upon confirmation of the special assessment roll.

M. The Council may provide for payment of special assessments in annual installments. Such annual installments shall be determined by the Village Council and shall not exceed those authorized by law, the first installment being due upon confirmation of the roll or at such time as it shall be specified by Council and interest shall be charged on all deferred installments at a rate not to exceed six percent (6%) per annum commencing upon the date of confirmation and payable on the due date of each installment. The full amount of the assessment or of any deferred installments, with interest accrued thereon to the date of payment, may be paid in advance of the due dates thereof; provided, that each taxpayer shall have at least thirty (30) days from the date of confirmation to pay the full amount of said assessment or the full amount of any installments thereof without interest or penalty. Following said thirty (30) day period or such further time as shall be specified by the Council at the time of confirmation of the special assessment roll, the assessment or first installment thereof shall, if unpaid, be considered as delinquent and the same penalties shall be collected on such unpaid assessments or unpaid first installments thereof, as are provided to be collected on delinquent general Village taxes. Deferred installments shall be collected without penalty until thirty (30) days after the due date thereof, after which time such installments shall be considered as delinquent. Such penalties on said installments shall be collected as are provided to be col-

lected on delinquent general Village taxes. After the Council has confirmed the roll, the Village Treasurer shall notify, by mail, each owner of property appearing on said assessment roll that the roll has been filed, and shall state the amount assessed and the terms of payment. Such notice as herein provided is an accommodation to such property owner and/or taxpayer and failure on the part of the Village Treasurer to give such notice, or of such owner to receive said notice, shall not invalidate any special assessment roll of the Village or any assessment thereon nor excuse the payment of interest or penalties.

N. In the event the Council provides for payment of special assessments in annual installments as hereinbefore set forth, the second such installment shall be due on the July 1 following the confirmation of said special assessment roll and shall be due on July 1 of each succeeding year.

PROVIDED THAT SAID ASSESSMENT SHOULD BE PAID IN FULL UPON THE TRANSFER OR CONVEYANCE OF TITLE TO ANY LAND OR PREMISE SITUATED WITHIN THE SPECIAL ASSESSMENT DISTRICT.

O. Special assessments and all interest, penalties and charges thereon from the date of confirmation of the roll shall be, and remain, a lien upon the property assessed. Said lien shall be of the same character and effect as the lien created by general law for county and school taxes and for general Village taxes, until paid, and the lands upon which same are a lien shall be subject to sale for collection thereof in the same manner as are lands in which delinquent Village taxes constitute a lien. If special assessments or installments thereof remain delinquent as of February 28, they shall be returned delinquent, with interest, penalties and charges added, to the county Treasurer for collection in the same manner as are village, county and school taxes.

P. The Village President shall, within sixty (60) days after completion of each public improvement authorized hereunder, compile the actual costs thereof and certify same to the Council. When any special assessment roll shall prove insufficient to meet the costs of the improvement for which it was made, the Council may make additional pro rata assessment. No additional assessments for any public improvement which exceeds twenty-five percent (25%) of the original assessment shall be made, unless such additional assessment be reviewed at a meeting of the Council, for which meeting notices shall be published as provided in the case of review of the original special assessment roll. Provided, however, that no property shall be assessed in excess of the benefits received. Should the entire amount as finally collected on the assessment roll prove larger than necessary by five percent (5%) of the total cost of the improvement or more, the Council shall make a refund of the entire amount of the excess thereof pro rata according to the assessments. If the entire amount as finally collected on the assessment roll proves larger than necessary by less than five percent (5%) of the total cost of the improvement, the Council may transfer such excess to the general fund of the Village or make a refund thereof pro rata according to the assessment.

Section IV. ADDITIONAL PROCEDURES.

In any case where the provisions of this Ordinance may prove to be insufficient to carry out fully the making of any special assessment authorized hereunder, the Council shall provide by Ordinance the additional steps or procedures required to effectuate the purpose hereof.

Section V. SPECIAL ASSESSMENT ACCOUNTS.

Monies raised by special assessment to pay the cost of any public improvement shall be held in a special fund to pay such costs or to repay any money borrowed for said public improvement. Each special assessment account shall be used only for the public improvement for which the assessment was levied except as otherwise provided in this Ordinance.

Section VI. CONTESTED ASSESSMENTS, JUDICIAL REVIEW.

A. An action may not be instituted for the purpose of contesting or enjoining the collection of a special assessment authorized hereunder unless:

1. Within forty-five (45) days after the confirmation of the special assessment roll, written notice is given to the Council indicating an intention to file such an action, stating the grounds upon which it is claimed that the assessment is illegal; and,
2. The action is commenced with ninety (90) days after confirmation of the roll.

B. If a portion of an assessment roll adopted hereunder is determined to be illegal, in whole or in part, the Council may revoke its confirmation, correct the illegality, if possible, or reconfirm it. Lands and premises which are not involved in the illegality may not be assessed more than was imposed upon the original confirmation without further notice and hearing thereon.

C. Whenever the Council shall deem any special assessment invalid or defective for any reason whatsoever, or if any Court of competent jurisdiction shall have adjudged such assessment to be illegal for any reason whatever, in whole or in part, the Council may cause a new assessment to be made for the same purpose for which the former assessment was made, whether the improvement or any part thereof, has been completed and whether any part of the assessment has been collected. All proceedings on such re-assessments and for the collection thereof shall be made in the manner as provided herein for the original assessment except respecting the correction of proceedings adjudicated to have been violative of law. If any portion of the original assessment shall have been collected and not refunded, it shall be applied on the re-assessment and said re-assessment shall, to that extent, be deemed satisfied. If more than the amount re-assessed shall have been collected, the balance thereof shall be refunded to the person making such payment.

Section VII. COMBINATION OF PROJECTS.

The Council may combine several districts into one project for the purpose of effecting a saving in cost; provided, however, that for each district, there shall be established separate funds and accounts to cover the cost of the improvement relating to said district.

Section VIII. SEVERABILITY.

If any section, paragraph, clause, phrase or part of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, or any agency, department, or commission, empowered by state law for such purpose, such decision shall not effect the validity of the remaining provisions of this Ordinance; and the application for those provisions to any person or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

Section IX. REPEAL OF FORMER ORDINANCES.

All ordinances or resolutions inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section X. TITLE.

This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as "The Village of Westphalia Special Assessment Ordinance," and the powers specified herein shall be cumulative of those otherwise specified by law and not in limitation thereof.

Section XI. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall be published and recorded and shall take effect twenty (20) days after its passage.

Because of a new state law (Act 5 of 1982) the City's base tax rate is estimated to be reduced to 11.403 mills for 1983. However, the City has complete authority to establish the number of mills to be levied from within its authorized millage rate.

In order to maintain the level of City services as proposed in the 1983-84 fiscal year budget, the City proposes to levy an additional millage rate of .847 mills (.85 cents per 1,000 SEV) above the 11.403 mill base tax rate or a total operating rate of 12.25 mills (\$12.25 per 1,000 SEV). This will provide an estimated 7.43% increase in revenues for operation purposes above the base tax rate of 11.403 mills.
