Still heated

Tempers were still smoldering over a plan to close two neighborhood schools during a board meeting last week, in spite of a school board vote to put off the decision until December.

Parents were present to again voice opposition to the plan to close East Essex and East Olive elementary schools, and some presented their own alternatives for streamlining the system to eliminate combined-grade classes.

Board members voted to put the hotly-contested plan on the back burner two weeks ago during a special meeting, when a standing-room-only crowd demanded consideration of other alternatives.

The plan was suggested by Superintendent Earl Gabriel, who insisted he needed a quick decision to plan ahead for the 1983-84 school year. Gabriel said the board's decision not to decide was not a major disappointment. "It takes more than that to set me back," he said.

Meanwhile, parents have been proposing alternatives. They also requested an inspection by the state fire marshall's office of an older city school, Perrin-Palmer, after some parents said they did not want their children transferred from a newer rural school to the city "fire trap."

Administrator Gordon Vandemark reported on the inspection at the board's most recent meeting Wednesday night, May 11. According to the report, the school was cited for non-compliance in six areas, including fire alarm systems, storage of hazardous substances, door frames and latches, rubbish and incineration, special requirements and "other areas."

Vandemark and Gabriel said the report was no surprise, considering the building was built in 1938, and say compliance will not be difficult. The areas cited were already being worked on in some cases, Gabriel said. "There's very little we can't do ourselves," he said.

The fire marshall's report recommends replacement of ceilings in six rooms and the Perrin-Palmer gym; removal of wood paneling in the library, office and a corridor; alterations to various doors and windows; repair of the school incinerator and installation of automatic sprinklers in the incinerator area; and installation of three fire alarm pull stations, among other things. In all, 16 changes were recommended.

Of more concern, Gabriel said, was a decision on renovation of Cental Elementary. Parents have proposed that Central could be closed instead of the rural schools, and board members are considering the suggestion along with other alternatives.

Gabriel queried board members on their feelings about proceeding with renovation, and was told to investigate the chances of cancelling contracts for work on the building, in particular, a contract for tuckpointing the masonry exterior.

Gabriel agreed to look into the legal ramifications of voiding the contract.

In other school business, teachers representatives will be auditing school books today, May 19, in an effort to bolster their demands for a raise.

Negotiations are slated for a new round May 31 at 7 p.m., Gabriel said. Teachers have agreed to continue working during talks.

A + for her

Okay, students, here's a multiple choice test.

- Honors students and scholarship winners are:
 - a.) Nearsighted and wear thick glasses;
 - b.) Always carrying lots of books;
 - c.) Shy and uncomfortable around anything but slide rules and audio-visual equipment;
 - d.) None of the above.

If you checked box "d", you've probably met Nancy Thelen. Nancy is definitely none of the above.

And she is definitely a straight-A student.

"I did get some A minuses thrown in there, in phys-ed, speech and economics," the St. Johns senior says modestly. Her 3.97 grade point average is among the highest in her class, and has earned her co-Valedictorian honors, with Scott Furry and Lauryn Escher. "That's L-A-U-R-Y-N," she added helpfully.

Her academic achievement also earned her one of only two special scholarships granted by the University of Michigan, the first annual Arvin M. and Arvella D. Bently Scholarship, which will cover tuition, fees, room, board and books for four years. It's the academic equivalent of the "full-ride" athletic scholarships usually given to people who are better at putting points on a scoreboard than earning high grade points.

That's not saying Miss Thelen doesn't know the score when it comes to sports. She participated in track and basketball as a freshman, in addition to being a three-year member of the quiz bowl team.

So how does she do it? Plenty of studying. About five or six hours a week, sometimes more.

"When we'd have a big test coming up, some of us would get together and stay up studying 'till one or two a.m. I work best if I have a deadline. If we have three days to do something, I'll wait until day three."

Some parents might trade a month's vacation — without the kids — for a sure-fire method of getting their children to study like Nancy does. But there was at least one occasion when Nancy's mom was less than enthusiastic about the homework she was bringing from school.

"My mother was not too thrilled when I brought my cat home," Miss Thelen said, gesturing toward the cat carcass she has been dissecting for biology class. "But we just opened some windows. When you've got a test coming up, that's what you've got to do."

Otherwise, Betty Thelen, an administrative assistant with the local MSU cooperative extension office, has been very supportive, her daughter said. So have her older brothers and sisters, Keith, 31, Neil, 29, Mary, 26, and twins Lois and Lynn, 23. "They've been just tremendous," she says.

And so has counselor Bob Tissot, of whom Nancy says, "If I had a mentor, he's been it."

The 18-year-old scholarship winner plans to study

medicine at UofM, with hopes of specializing in either pediatrics or surgery. She tries not to look too far ahead to the dozen years of study, internship and residency before she can begin practicing, because at 18, 12 years sounds "overwhelming."

But that hasn't stopped her from working steadily at summer jobs — including lifeguarding at the city pool — since she was in the eighth grade, saving her pay for college costs. "I'll still have three years to pay for beyond the four covered by the scholarship," she points out.

Now, about that test. For those of you who chose answers other than "d", here's a make-up question. This one's tricky.

2. Students who choose to attend UofM next fall instead of MSU will do so because:

- a.) There is plenty of audio-visual equipment to go around;

District home recently sold

After nearly one year on the open market, a three-bedroom ranch home built by students in the Clinton Intermediate School District has been sold to a DeWitt couple.

The home, at 1115 Primrose Road, DeWitt, sold for a little over \$70,000, said Jay Johnson, principal of the Shared Time program of the CISD.

Students from Bath, DeWitt and Fowler High Schools, under the supervision of instructor Richard Vitek, completed the home in June of 1982. When the intermediate school district had trouble finding a buyer, it contracted a realtor.

Selling of the house resulted in a small profit for the intermediate school district, Johnson said. A standard 7 percent fee paid to the realtor significantly reduced the profit.

Because of the difficulty in selling this home and another Shared Time program home in St. Johns, the program has been put into mothballs for the 1983-1984 school year. Johnson said that the retirement of an instructor, high interest rates and a high unemployment rate among contractors also contributed to the decision.

Ben Wieber, the retiring instructor, supervises about 30-35 students from Bath, DeWitt and Fowler, Johnson said.

Cons current

Scam season has begun again, according to Bath Township Police.

A department spokesperson said two complaints were received from township residents Monday, May 16, in the Coleman Road area. Both reports said two Mexican or Indian men, one about 25, another between 15 and 17, attempted to convince residents to have their driveways sealed with some "stuff."

The requested price was \$9 at one home and \$12 at another, reports said. The pair was driving a maroon, late model pickup truck with white, out-of-state plates. With spring home-fix-up scams back in swing, residents were urged to contact local authorities if they suspect they are being conned.

In other police activity throughout Clinton County last week, two men were injured in separate accidents and two break-in and several larcenies were reported.

Clinton County Sheriff's reports said 99 complaints in the county resulted in 16 arrests.

A Haslett man was listed in serious condition by Sparrow Hospital Tuesday, following an accident Saturday night at the intersection of I-69 and Marsh Road, Bath Township Police reports said.

Ronald T. Bauer, 22, of 2405 Meridian Rd., Williamston, was attempting to turn left from westbound I-69 onto Marsh Road when his vehicle was struck from the rear by another westbound auto driven by David C. Fountain, 31, of 5949 Edison, Haslett.

Fountain was taken to Sparrow Hospital, where he was listed in serious condition, reports said. Bauer was not seriously injured. Both men were driving on restricted licenses and both had attended the same party prior to the 9:50 p.m. accident, reports said. No charges have been lodged and the accident is under investigation.

Grand Ledge resident Gregory Todd Skinner, 22, of 10313 N. Cochran Rd., Grand Ledge, was listed in fair condition at St. Lawrence Hospital Tuesday, following an accident on West Grand River Highway just east of Clin-

tonia Road at 12:33 a.m. Friday, May 13, sheriff's reports said.

Reports said Skinner was headed east on West Grand River when his vehicle left the road and struck a culvert, then flipped over. Skinner was thrown from the auto, which rolled over on top of him, pinning him to the ground.

Nothing was reported missing in two separate break-ins last week, sheriff's reports said. The first occurred at the residence of George Haney, 5953 W. Cutler, DeWitt, and was reported May 9. A walkout basement door had been broken, possibly with a blunt instrument, but nothing was missing, reports said.

The second occurred at Our Town Pizzeria, 131 S. Main St., Fowler, and was reported by Susie Fedewa of Dexter Trail, Fowler, on May 14. A door had been broken, but nothing appeared to be disturbed and it was unclear if entry had been gained, reports said.

Their office is in the clouds

"Most people already think we're crazy anyway, so this won't bother anyone," Al Schiffer joked, banking his single-engine plane into a steep dive past his brother Mike's bi-plane.

It may have looked like a dogfight from the ground, but Al was just being accommodating, helping the guy from the newspaper shoot some photos of crop-dusting.

Al coaxed the slower, older "utility" plane into a tight turn and dropped down through bumpy air just in time to be overtaken by Mike, who was laying down a wide swath of fertilizer from the Schiffer's new Ag Cat spray plane. The two planes skimmed along at treetop level, side by side for a few seconds, then peeled away, climbing steeply in opposite directions.

If people watching from the ground figured the pilots must be crazy, they're probably not alone. Some of the Schiffers' former co-workers probably thought they were nuts, too, a few years back, when Al and Mike dumped high-paying desk jobs and went into the crop-dusting business, flying two planes from a hanger full of tools and toys near Elsie.

"I took that up once, but never again," Al said, pointing to his cousin's ultra-light aircraft. "I guess if you weren't a pilot, you wouldn't know the difference. But I like to have control when I'm in the air."

The Schiffers both have college degrees — Al is a Purdue grad, Mike earned his degree from Central

Michigan University — but prefer working among the clouds to climbing corporate ladders. They spray crops throughout the Midwest. "I'd say farms around here account for only a small fraction of our work," Al says.

And as far as the crop-dusting business goes — also known as "aerial agricultural application" — bad news for farmers is good news for the Schiffers.

"Business hasn't been too great in the last couple of years, mainly because there haven't been any blights or disease outbreaks," Al said. "But this spring has been really busy because of all the rain. It's just been too wet for farmers to get out in their fields, so we're doing a lot of the work they can't."

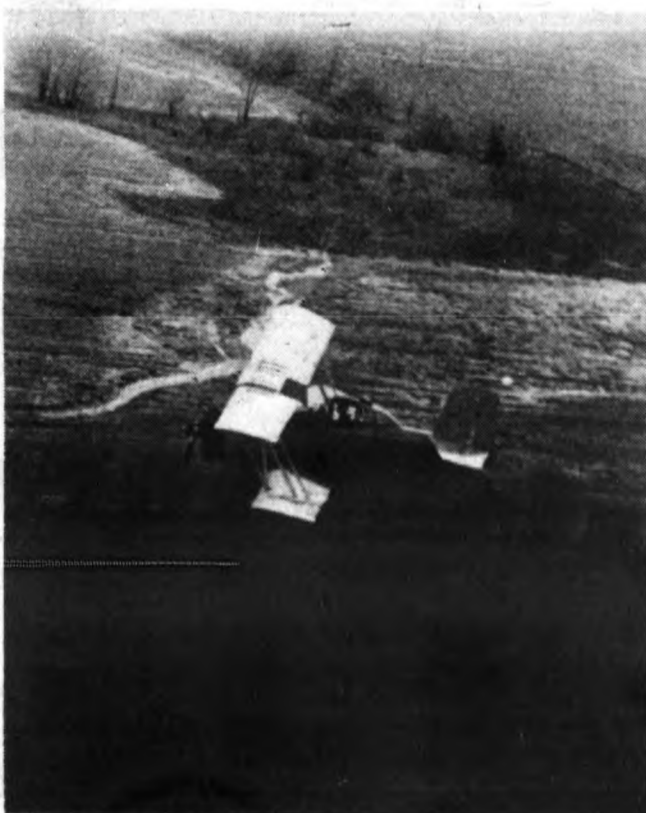
"We've had five times the fertilizer work this spring that we usually do."

The Schiffers recently attended a fly-in sponsored by the Michigan Agricultural Aviation Association, the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Michigan State University. There they flew their spray planes, loaded with red dye, over a strip of paper stretched across a field, to check their spraying equipment.

They also attended talks and workshops, including presentations by a variety of crop-dusting supply companies and experts.

"We landed and took off about 30 times yesterday," Al said, bringing the wind-buffed light plane in for a 747-smooth landing on a narrow strip of grass between two farm fields.

"When you do this over and over, you get sloppy."



Sign in DeWitt draws many second looks

Heading north on US-27, it's one of the first things you notice as you near DeWitt. Heading south on US-27, it escorts you out of town.

A frequent topic of conversation, it has brightened the days of many students, politicians, housewives and businessmen in the community.

Introducing... the famous DeWitt sign. Beaming good cheer at passing motorists, it sits near the highway at McNalley's Capitol Standard, 13393 N. US-27.

"I look at it every time I go by," said DeWitt Mayor Lynn E. Thayer. "If it's just a minute a day that gets your mind off troubles, it's worth it."

John McNalley, owner of the combination gasoline station-donut shop which the sign helps promote, is the

man who comes up with all of the sign's happy messages.

He originally bought the sign to advertise such things as tire sales and oil changes. But when people-oriented messages proved to be popular, McNalley kept putting those up instead of the standard advertising.

"I think it helps me," McNalley said. "I have people stopping in all of the time saying, 'Who thinks up these signs?'"

Because they see the sign change every day, some people think McNalley relies on a book filled with messages. Actually, he thinks up all of the catchy phrases by himself.

He wasn't intending to brighten up the community when he first started using the sign for messages in 1979.

He was simply trying to cheer up his son, Scott, who was paralyzed with Guillain-Barre syndrome.

Every Sunday, McNalley would put a message about Scott on the sign. He would take a snapshot and show it to him in the hospital.

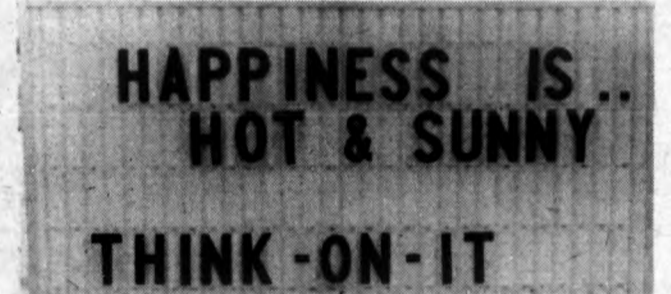
During the week, he would leave the message up on the sign because so many people were asking him about Scott's health.

Scott, now a 16-year-old junior at DeWitt High School, has recovered from the affliction after being paralyzed all the way up to his chin.

The first sign for Scott read, "Scot's Doing Betr. Thanks." Yes, you read that correctly. McNalley has this philosophy about spelling. Whenever possible, he tries to misspell.

"Big words and spell it wrong," he explained. "It makes people talk about the sign," said Paul Hood, one of McNalley's attendants.

For example, McNalley will spell "hesitates" like it sounds — "hes-a-tates." Two more typical McNalleyisms are "Red Reckers Are Ready" and "We're Hear For U."



Some motorists think it is funny, but others are downright disgusted.

"I had a school teacher stop by once," McNalley said. "She said I'm slaughtering the English language."

Misspelled or not, getting your message on the sign is considered an honor in DeWitt. School officials, government officials, Boy Scout leaders and businessmen have asked McNalley to run public service announcements for them.

"I never try to play politics on the sign," said McNalley, a former Clinton County commissioner. "That's wrong. But a lot of people miss it (public service announcements) in the paper."

The sign seldom proclaims anything negative or controversial. On Sunday, it often takes a spiritual tone, as in "God Is Good," or "Sunday's Are The Best."

However, don't be surprised to read something like "Sondais Ere The Besst" in the future. Nothing is sacred with McNalley.

"That's a seven day a week job," he said with a smile. "Misspell everything."

McNalley has one more dream he has yet to fulfill on the sign. Since both sides of it have different messages, he would like to put, "Read The Other Side," on one side. But so far he has chickened out.

"I'm afraid someone would do it and get into an accident," he said.

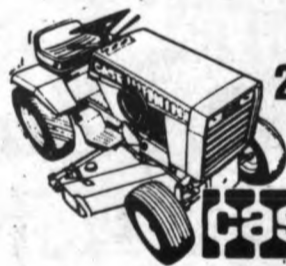
McNalley's fear about causing high-speed collisions might be justified.

"I'm going to kill somebody sometime trying to read the back side of it," said a grinning Mayor Thayer.

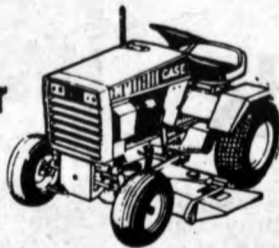

Big brother is looking for your help

Carol Field is a professional matchmaker. She loves to introduce people to each other and watch their relationship grow into something exciting.

But don't call Carol if you need a date this weekend. She matches up children of single parents with adults who have the time and the desire to become involved as Big Brothers and Big Sisters.

According to Mrs. Field, director of Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Clinton County, the idea is to find mature volunteers, 18 or older, who will agree to spend at least an hour a week with a child. Children are referred to her by parents, schools, churches and other social agencies, and are matched up with adults who provide friendship and guidance.

Although many relationships last much longer, Big Brother/Big Sister volunteers are asked to spend at least a year in the program, Mrs. Field says.

To make sure each "Big" and "Little" make a compatible team, Mrs. Field spends a lot of time working on matches. "When I first started matching, some Bigs would say that they could get along with any type or age of child. I believed them. Usually, the matches didn't last too long.

"Now I interview the Bigs and the Littles several times before I do any matching."

In addition to matching, Mrs. Field spends time with the agency's activity committee planning monthly events for teams of Bigs and Littles. A recent outing was a trip to the Shrine Circus in Lansing, funded by the Kiwanis Club.

"Sometimes we go canoeing or bowling together. Our big activity of the year, of course, is our Christmas party, sponsored mainly by VFW Post 4113. Unmatched boys and girls also come to this event and spend the afternoon with a special volunteer Big."

Since it was organized in Clinton County seven years ago, the agency has grown from a first-year total of 17 matches to a 1983 total of 44. A new program that may help make even more matches has been introduced, allowing couples to be both Big Brother and Big Sister to a child.



Many groups and businesses help out with the activities, and one of the most active supporters of her programs is McDonald's of St. Johns, Mrs. Field said. "They contribute not only financially, but time-wise also," she says. Two McDonald's employees, Jane Miller and Trudy Viers, are on the board of directors of Big Brothers/Big Sisters, and five others are themselves Big Brothers or Big Sisters.

"We're thankful for McDonald's and all the other organizations that help," she said. "They really show true community spirit by the good-will offerings."

Funding for the program comes from many sources, with the largest share from The United Way. In addition to contributions from businesses like McDonald's, the agency depends on community groups, individuals and its own fund-raising activities. "We're in the black right now and we feel really fortunate, because many social agencies cannot say that," Treasurer Jody Smith said.

Mrs. Smith serves on the Big Brothers/Big Sisters Board of Directors, along with Gary McCampbell, current president, and officers Terry Cornwell, John Field, Jane Miller and 10 other board members.

"More people are always needed for the board," Mrs. Field said. "Meetings are once a month, and we ask members to serve on a committee."

Needed most, however, are Big Brothers. Knowing there is a waiting list of Littles is the most difficult part of her job, Mrs. Field said. "We have a list of 36 unmatched children, 27 boys and nine girls," she said.

Although there are usually plenty of volunteer Big Sisters, Big Brothers are in short supply. "We need more Big Brothers. We need them desperately," the director said.

One reason for the shortage, she speculates, is hard economic times. But being a Big Brother or Big Sister doesn't have to cost much and expenses are tax deductible, Mrs. Field pointed out.

"Big Brothers and Sisters have to realize that they are not entertainment packages," she said. Most needed, she added, is attention, and that is free.

That, Jane Miller says, is why she became involved in Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Clinton County. And she's glad she did.

Her Little Sister loves to draw pictures and presented her with a pictorial diary of all the things they had done together. "It was a beautiful birthday present," smiled Jane.

Jane became involved in the program in April a year ago, and says the experience has been rewarding both for her and her Little Sister. "I try to give her lots of love, because I do care a lot for her." Jane says the two are working on building her Little Sister's self-esteem.

As for her own outlook, the 20-year-old student and part time McDonald's employee says the pay-off has been in learning about responsibility. "It's forced me to grow up some."

Trudy Viers, mother of a 10-year-old boy, decided she wanted a Little Sister last July so she would have so-

meone to do "girl things" with. "We like to bake cookies," she says. "Going shopping is also a fun outing for us."

Trudy says her aim was to introduce her Little Sister to the joys of family life. "My Little Sister comes over and has dinner with my husband and my son and I quite often. We have a good time," she said.

Trudy has helped her Little Sister realize a dream of becoming a Girl Scout, but like Jane, she says it is too early to tell how much impact she will have on her Little Sister's life.

"We'll have to see what happens in 10 years," she said. "I hope I have had some positive influence on my Little Sister. I have learned a lot from her, I know that."

Carol Field is one of those persons who exudes enthusiasm. When she talks about her work with Big Brother/Big Sisters, her eyes sparkle and her laugh is infectious.

Originally from Iowa, Carol came to Michigan in 1972 after a short stint as an elementary school teacher. "Every 20 minutes I got a new batch of kids," she recalls. "It was difficult to teach them a whole lot, let alone get to know them."

Attracted by the music therapy program at Michigan State University, she began working for a degree which she hoped would give her a chance to combine her love of people and love of music. While in Kalamazoo for an internship at Kalamazoo State Mental Hospital, however, she met and married St. Johns native John Field.

And since there is not much demand for music

therapy in St. Johns, she began working in a local nursery school and with local senior citizens.

Mrs. Field became a licensed social worker in 1979, in order to become eligible for the Clinton County Big Brother/Big Sister program, and has devoted most her time and energy to the program since.

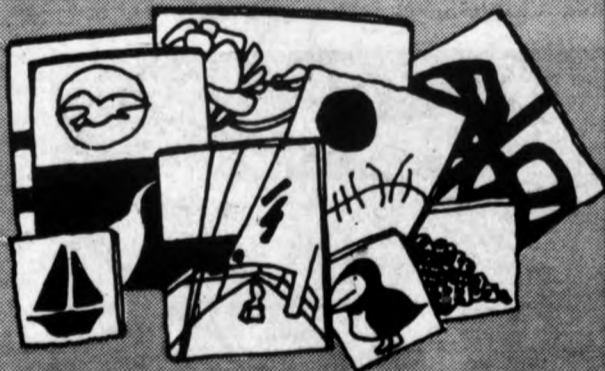

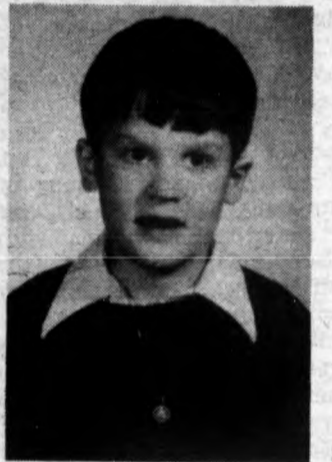

Miss Roberts has the second highest grade point average in her class. She is

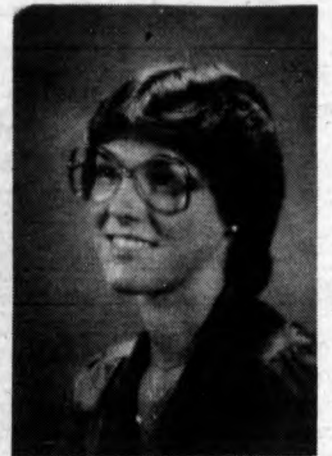

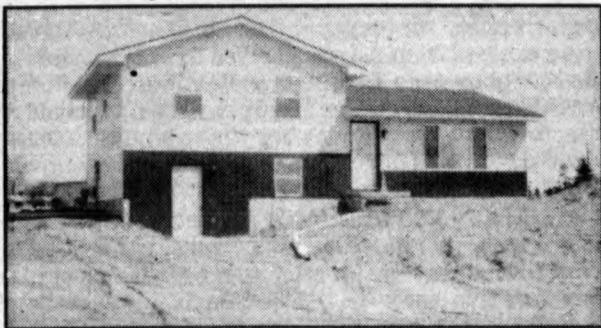

If you have questions, give us a call.

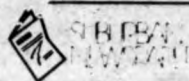

In his editorial of 5 May, 1983, editor Peter Bronson defended the recommendations of the Reorganization Task Force of the St. Johns School Board. The decision now pending will have a long-range effect on the educational system of our district. The decision to close a school or schools should be considered only in the light of the future direction of the district.

For myself and others, many questions remain unanswered:

- 1. What is the long-range plan of our school district?

- a.) A new building to house all elementary students?

- b.) All elementary students in existing city schools?

- c.) Continue the neighborhood school concept?

- d.) Other?

- 2. What is the five- and 10-year student population projection?

- 3. How many buildings will we need to close?

- 4. Is the renovation of Central, while closing newer schools, the best direction in which to go?

- a.) If we renovate and build a multipurpose room at Central, will we have achieved previously stated criteria of "providing facilities comparable with other elementary

schools" and "continuing the neighborhood concept"?

- 5. Why has the board of education approved spending over \$75,000 of the one-half mill levied in September, 1980 on the renovation of Central, while not voting to approve the total, five-year, nearly \$1 million proposed plan?

- 6. Is there another way to achieve the goals of cost efficiency, balanced classroom population and fewer combination classrooms?

I, for one, would like to have these questions answered satisfactorily before further action is taken. I challenge the St. Johns Board of Education to reevaluate action already taken, obtain citizen input — not just from parents — and make some long-range plans which will help guide us through these difficult decisions. I believe you will find people to support you and aid you when we know what to expect in the future.

We need a consistent goal to work toward and we need to be a part of the decision-making process.

Mr. Bronson, I take exception to your NIM-BY (Not In My Back Yard) syndrome label. I believe these questions to be valid and pertinent, not selfish.

The law, backed by President Reagan, calls for financial institutions to withhold 10 percent of interest and dividends paid to savers. Presently, banks send out 1099 forms, which list the amount of interest earned for the year.

Supporters of the law say it will make for an efficient collection of taxes. They also say it will crack down on tax cheaters who don't report interest earnings on their tax forms.

Bank administrators oppose the law because they say it increases their costs and paperwork. They also fear customers will blame them for collecting the taxes, instead of blaming the government for enacting the law.

"People tend to complain with the people they have contact with," said Carl Carlson, vice president in the Lansing area for Michigan National Bank, which has a branch office in DeWitt.

"If a person has been wronged, they tend to complain to the teller, even though the teller may not have control over what happened. There's a lot of confusion. We've had customers say they'll just take their money out of the bank and keep it at home. That doesn't make a lot of sense."

Idzkowski said the law could reinforce negative stereotypes about banks.

"Banks are seen as a quasi-government figure, anyway," he said. "A lot of people just don't understand it."

Increased costs is a concern of banks across the country, as well as Clinton County. Samuel Armacost, president of the second largest bank in the country, Bank of America, said it could cost \$8-\$10 million for his bank to put the system in place.

"Our system, of course, will have to cost much less,"

said Idzkowski. "Certainly, it could be measured in the thousands."

Carlson said Michigan National Bank is looking at "many thousands" of dollars in added expense because of the law.

Banks have incurred much of the expense already in revamping computer software. Bank administrators have also been attending seminars to learn about the new law and retraining tellers so they can answer customer inquiries.

"We're not in favor of it by any means, for the obvious reasons," said Dan Redman, vice president of Central National Bank of St. Johns. "It does create more work on our part. Not that we don't like work. But it is a headache."

Unless Congress can iron out the details of a repeal and then override a presidential veto, the law will go into effect July 1.

The House of Representatives was expected to vote for a repeal this week. If the repeal is passed, then the Senate would have to agree on the repeal before it could be sent to the president.

The president has promised to veto any repeal, but he may consider signing a compromise proposal. The Senate has already passed a plan to delay the law for five years.

Early in May, bank lobbyists began to tell inquiring bankers not to spend any more money gearing up for withholding, pending further developments.

"We're still preparing for it," said Idzkowski. "We're on hold right now."

"We've done some work with our tellers," Redman said. "We are working on it and looking at it. But we're waiting to see if it's going to happen."

Redwing softball team ready for challenge

After a week jammed with challenges, the St. Johns softball team has one more waiting for it on Friday.

The Redwings face powerful Lansing Eastern in the semifinal round of the Lansing State Journal Softball Classic. The game starts at 8 p.m. Friday, at Lansing's Ranney Park.

"We've got a little team motto we've had all year — respect all, and fear none," said St. Johns coach Jan Szymczak. "That's how we'll look at it."

St. Johns earned the chance to play Eastern by beating Williamston, 15-8, in the opening round. Tina Trefil's inside-the-park home run highlighted that victory.

Last week, the Redwings rebounded from a pair of

one-run losses to Ionia and swept DeWitt, 5-1 and 9-7.

St. Johns erupted for five runs in the sixth inning to steal the opener, and got two hits and four RBI's from Brenda Eiseler in the second game. Eiseler also picked up the pitching victory in relief.

The Redwings raised their record to 12-3, 6-2 in the Mid-Michigan 'B' League by sweeping Ovid-Elsie Tuesday.

Janine Scott pitched a three-hitter in the opener as the Redwings won, 12-0, and St. Johns won the second game, 14-3.

Shari Kemp ignited the offense with four hits, including two triples and a home run. She finished with nine RBI's.

On a down note, however, the Redwings saw their state tournament hopes fade away when Jackson stopped them, 3-2, in a preliminary pre-district game Monday.

In the Central Michigan Athletic Conference Tuesday, Fowler kept pace with Portland St. Patrick by beating Fulton, 13-3. Both teams are tied atop the league standings at 7-1.

Patty Wieber raised her pitching record to 6-1, and collected two triples, a single and three RBI's for the Eagles. Dar Schmitt had three hits and four RBI's, and Becky Klein had three hits and three stolen bases.

Fowler whipped Potterville, 20-7, on Monday, and Pewamo-Westphalia nipped the Vikings, 22-21, Tuesday.

Pewamo-Westphalia fell out of the first-place race by losing twice to Portland St. Patrick, 14-11 and 20-4. Inconsistent pitching doomed the Pirates in the second loss, as P-W issued 14 walks and surrendered 10 hits.

"When you're loading the bases like that, and they're getting hits, forget it," said P-W coach Bonnie Somero, whose team fell to 4-3 in the league, 6-9-1 overall.

Ovid-Elsie's season has been marked by inconsistency, as evidenced by a loss last Saturday in the Mason Invitational. O-E jumped out to a 6-0 lead over the host Bulldogs, but frittered it away in the last three innings. The Marauders wound up losing, 7-6.

"I'm sick of losing close ballgames, but I think that's because of our youth," said coach Mary Hudecek, whose team slipped to 9-12 after losing to Holt, 10-5, in the other game of the Mason Invitational.

O-E had swept Fulton on Friday, winning 11-3 and 13-6. Mary Perrien hit a home run in each game and pitched the Marauders to victory in the second game. Vicki Foreback, the team's only senior, also hit a homer in the first game.

O-E faces Durand at Durand in a preliminary pre-district game on Friday.

Eagles set for track regional

Since the Fowler girls track team has won everything in sight this season, it's tempting to label the Eagles as favorites to repeat as state Class D champions.

Coach Kim Spalsbury is resisting that temptation. In fact, he's downright worried about four other teams — Pottersville, Akron-Fairgrove, Michigan Lutheran Seminary and Detroit St. Andrew.

"It's really wide open," said Spalsbury, whose girls face their first test Saturday at Pottersville in the Class D regional meet.

Fowler has captured such prestigious meets as the Spartan Relays and Central Michigan Relays this season. But Spalsbury isn't impressed.

"In relays, our depth makes a difference," he said. "But in invitational competition (like the state meet structure), we only beat Pottersville by five points, and their distance girl only ran one event."

That distance girl, Sabrina Batchelder, could affect Fowler's state meet chances if she runs well on Saturday. Batchelder is entered in the 880-yard run with Fowler's Lana Hafner, Beth Wirth and Cindy Schneider.

Only the top two runners automatically qualify for the state meet. Others have to meet a qualifying time.

"We'd like to get two people in the state meet, because we think we have a chance to place both," said Spalsbury, citing a rule change which means there will be eight places, not six, at this year's state meet.

Fowler hiked its Central Michigan Athletic Conference record to 3-0 last Wednesday by beating Fulton, 72-53.

Highlighting that meet was the 400-meter relay team of Nancy Sillman, LuAnn Wieber, Denise Pung and Connie Thelen. Running without spikes on Fulton's hard surface, they turned in a quick 54.1.

At St. Johns, freshman Kathleen Voisin set a school record in the 440-yard dash and momentarily unseated Fowler's Becky Klein as the area's fastest quarter miler.

Chasing winner Barbara Stinson of Jackson, who blazed the distance in 57.8, Voisin clocked a 1:00.5 last Friday in the Holt Invitational. Her previous best was a 1:01.3, which set a meet record in the Clinton County track meet.

Half miler Chris Rapelje lowered her time to 2:29.5, and miler Becky Irrer recorded a personal-best 5:25.8. Discus thrower Theresa Pope also had a personal best at 106-5.

St. Johns, which finished third out of nine teams, got its only victory in the mile relay.

Goodbye, Okemos. Goodbye, Mason. "Good riddance," says the DeWitt tennis team. "We're glad to see you go."

DeWitt is glad to see a new season come. 'Tis the season for Class C-D regional competition, and the Panthers will probably be able to qualify a team for the state meet for the first time in their history.

With the state meet coming two weeks after the regional, Servis is trying to be creative with his practice schedule. To break up the monotony of two weeks of practices, he has scheduled a match against DeWitt alumni for Tuesday, May 24.

At the Capital Circuit meet, No. 4 singles player Tom Kolberg and the No. 3 doubles team of Jason Abbey and Joe Stants were beaten in the finals by Okemos players. Okemos, winning its 11th consecutive league title, scored 21 points, followed by Mason with 11 and DeWitt with 7.

GEAR RESTRICTIONS FOR STREAM FISHING DURING SALMON AND STEELHEAD RUNS

The Natural Resources Commission, at its July 11, 1980, meeting, under the authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, approved the following gear restriction for a period of five years beginning October 1, 1980:

Double or treble pointed hooks exceeding 3/8 inch between point and shank and single pointed hooks exceeding 1/2 inch between point and shank may not be used on any stream except St. Mary's, St. Clair, and Detroit rivers before May 15 or after August 31 of each year.

COMMISSION ORDER NO. CFI-104.82

(Under authority of Act 165, P.A. 1929 and Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended)
STATEWIDE TROUT AND SALMON REGULATIONS

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on December 4, 1981, under the authority of Act 165, P.A. 1929, as amended, and Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, ordered that for the period beginning April 1, 1982, and ending March 31, 1984, no person shall take, or attempt to take, any species of trout or salmon from any of the waters of this state except by hook and line during the open seasons prescribed, and within the minimum size limits and maximum possession limits indicated below.

Statewide open seasons on all streams and designated trout lakes shall be from the last Saturday in April through September 30 (longer on waters designated by the Director for extended fishing under Act 165) on all trout and salmon. Statewide open seasons on all other inland lakes and the Great Lakes shall be any time for all trout and salmon. Size limits shall be 8 inches on Lower Peninsula streams, 7 inches on Upper Peninsula streams, and 10 inches on lakes. The daily limit for trout and salmon shall be 5 fish singly or in combination but no more than 3 lake trout or splake, except that an additional 5 brook or brown trout may be taken from streams from the last Saturday in April through September 30 only and no more than 2 lake trout or splake may be taken from Lake Michigan or its tributary streams.

Enlistment up in most U.S. forces

Economic hardship in Clinton County may be the cause of increased enlistment in the armed services, according to local recruiters.

Improved benefits may also be driving high school seniors into military service.

Though officials have a hard time explaining the reasons for the signups, one thing is certain. The increased supply of recruits means recruiters can focus on the cream of America's crop.

"We're getting very, very selective," said Capt. Clyde Vasey, operations officer for the U.S. Army's Lansing District Recruiting Command.

For a man to join the army, he now must score 31 or better on a Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) test. Women must score at least 50. In October of 1982, the entrance score was only 16.

Vasey said the army is no longer considering high school dropouts for enlistment. "We don't look forward to seeing them walk in the door," he said. "We can't offer them much."

But the army can offer high school graduates up to \$20,000 worth of college aid through the Army College Fund in a delayed entry enlistment plan of two-, three- or four-year hitches. Recruits serve their active duty, then attend college while Uncle Sam foots the bill.

In a five-month period through February, 1983, 120 men and women in the Lansing area enlisted in the delayed entry program, Vasey said.

Four of those are high school seniors in DeWitt, said Sgt. Gary Fox, army recruiter for East Lansing, Lansingburg and southern Clinton County. By contrast, Fox has only recruited five people from the larger East Lansing-Lansingburg area.

"The economy has helped the recruiting a whole lot," Fox said. "These high school seniors are pretty smart. They see that Dad has been laid off for a year, and they see that their brothers have graduated from high school and haven't been able to find work. So they don't want to get caught in that trap."

"We recruit more people than the other services have in this area. I think that's mainly because of the benefits we offer."

The Marines have also enjoyed good success in the county, according to Gunnery Sgt. Ronnie Polk, recruiting supervisor for Clinton and five other mid-Michigan counties.

"St. Johns for the Marine Corps has been very good," said Polk. He named about six St. Johns recruits but said the Marines aren't recruiting as well in DeWitt and Bath.

Recruits in the county are choosing the Marines because it is a challenge, Polk said.

"The Marine Corps is considered to be the elite," Polk said. "And they figure if they're going to go, they may as well go with the varsity."

Neither the Marines nor the Army has a recruiting office in St. Johns. That distinction belongs to the Navy. Its office at 1515 N. US-27 is opened when people call for appointments, according to Petty Officer Michael Jones, recruiter for DeWitt, St. Johns, Bath and Lansing.

The office used to be a full-time station for a recruiter four or five years ago, according to Lt. Fred Kinkin, enlisted programs officer for the state.

Twelve people from the St. Johns area have enlisted since September. "That's good for a part-time office," Kinkin said.

"Those best qualified are going into the Navy," said Senior Chief Journalist George Mills, public affairs officer for Navy Recruiting District, Michigan. "The state of the Navy requires the very best."



DeWitt youths report for duty

Debbie Hammon wanted to become a legal secretary, but she didn't want to do it the conventional way.

"I don't want to start college right now," said the DeWitt High School senior. "Homework bores me. I want something that's more of a challenge."

Her challenge begins in August, when she begins her three-year hitch in the U.S. Army. Hammon will report to Fort Jackson in Columbia, S.C., for training as an administration specialist.

Because Hammon scored higher than 50 on the army's entrance exam, she is eligible for a maximum of \$20,000 worth of college aid after completing her enlistment. As a bonus, the army will pay for 75 percent of her college costs if she takes classes while enlisted.

Hammon plans to take advantage of that by taking classes at Arkansas State or the University of Arkansas. Her father lives in Paragould, Ark., about 15 miles from Arkansas State.

The Army College Fund includes over 300 colleges across the nation. Students taking classes at any of those colleges have their credits transferred in full to any other college in the program, army officials said.

Another DeWitt senior, Bob King, signed up for four years because he didn't want to find himself without a job. King has been encouraging friends to sign up for the same reason. One of his classmates, John Stenberg, joined for two years, and another recruit may be on the way.

County youths flocking to armed services

Almost 98 percent of Michigan men born between 1960 and 1965 have registered with the Selective Service System, according to a recent report.

A spot check of Clinton County post offices supported that statistic, as officials reported no resistance to the man-

datory registration law.

"Sometimes the advertising for it isn't too strong, and the kids just forget about it," said Pewamo postmaster John Cotter. "I know of none here, but I imagine that would be the reason."

Clinton County had 2,467

of the 420,487 registered males in Michigan, the report said. But because youths can go to any post office to register, compliance percentages in each town are impossible to compute.

"We might get one or two a week, but there's no way

of telling how many are signing up because they can register at any post office," said Fowler postal clerk Alan Kramer. "I never heard anybody make the comment that they weren't going to register."

Michigan ranks 23rd in the nation with a registration compliance per-

centage of 97.72. The national compliance percentage is 95.6.

Approximately 9.7 million men in the United States have registered through February, the report said.

To register, a man goes to a local post office within

30 days of his 18th birthday and fills out a form which asks for his name, address, phone number, social security number and date of birth.

"It's really no big deal," Kramer said. "It only takes a minute or so to fill out."

Because of a new state law (Act 5 of 1982) the City's base tax rate is estimated to be reduced to 11.403 mills for 1983. However, the City has complete authority to establish the number of mills to be levied from within its authorized millage rate.

In order to maintain the level of City services as proposed in the 1983-84 fiscal year budget, the City proposes to levy an additional millage rate of .847 mills (.85 cents per 1,000 SEV) above the 11.403 mill base tax rate or a total operating rate of 12.25 mills (\$12.25 per 1,000 SEV). This will provide an estimated 7.43% increase in revenues for operation purposes above the base tax rate of 11.403 mills.

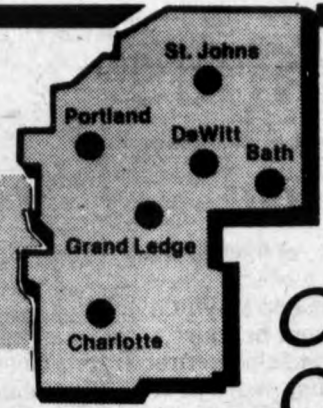

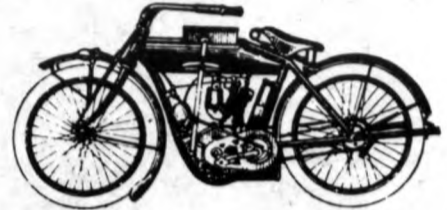
