Fed up with law

Tip tax takes bite of waitress pay

Restaurant owners say they're not affected, but their employees have had to tighten their belts because of a new law enforcing tip reporting.

Since April 1, bar and restaurant employers have been required to deduct 8 percent of their gross sales from employees' tips as a federal income tax. The new law is an effort by the Internal Revenue Service to crack down on unreported income.

"In 1981, the compliance rate for (reporting) tip income was 16 percent," said IRS District Director Charles A. Parks. "This is fundamentally unfair to the overwhelming majority of taxpayers who pay their fair share of tax."

Waiters and waitresses have protested the new rules with fervor. One editorial cartoon showed a waitress over the caption: "If you feel you have received good service, please send a check to the IRS in my name."

In Clinton County, those affected by the law estimated a loss of about \$40 from their weekly pay. Though some of that can be attributed to the recent 38 percent increase in the state income tax, most of it is a result of the new IRS tip law.

Waitresses have varied opinions about the tip reporting. The rule's effect on individual waitresses differs with the amount of tips they receive on a weekly basis. No matter how generous customers are when they tip, the waitress still stands to lose money.

"It's going to hurt you, no matter what," said Sandy Renkiewicz, a waitress at Elias Brothers Big Boy in St. Johns. "But some people it won't hurt as much."

Another employee complained that the new rules make it almost pointless for her to work overtime.

"I think the percentage they're requiring us to report is out of line," said Marlia Burdick, bartender-manager at Rich's Pigeon Inn in DeWitt Township.

Burdick is one of many tipped employees who have had to tighten budgets because of the new rules.

"I have definitely had to start watching my pennies," she said. "You used to be able to use your tips for less than practical things. Now you use them for necessities. It goes from a state of being able to live to down to being able to survive."

Though tipped employees were initially in an uproar, the anger has cooled for many. Some are not even aware of the crackdown on tip reporting and have been reporting their tips without complaining.

"My wages are a little smaller, but I get by," said Carol Thomas, a senior at Ionia High School. She started work in mid-April as a waitress at the Village Restaurant in Muir.

"People are going to accept it once it's started," said Mark Storey, Big Boy assistant manager in St. Johns. "I've hired new waitresses that haven't complained. That's the way it's supposed to be done, so that's how they do it."

Need still exists for free commodity cheese

The need for free surplus dairy products has not gone away, if the demand for them by Clinton County residents is any indication.

The cheese and butter distribution will be held again in St. Johns next Tuesday through Thursday for income-eligible residents. Both senior citizens and persons under age 59 are able to receive the commodities. The last distribution in March resulted in over 2,500 pounds of cheese and 1,000 pounds of butter being given to 504 senior citizens.

The food is given to residents at the county senior citizens office and the community services agency, both at 100 S. Ottawa St.

According to Brenda Hamilton, senior citizens coordinator, the free distribution will be held every two months. Income limits are \$6,075 for a one-person family; \$8,175 for a two-person family; and \$10,275 for a three-person family.

To prove eligibility, take a copy of one of the following: a social security, supplemental security income or

Veteran's Administration check, a benefit report from the social security, a copy of a homestead property tax credit form or a home heating credit claim, state or federal tax returns, a recent Department of Social Services benefit report or a rental or lease agreement from subsidized housing.

Persons who sign up will receive a registration punch card good for one year.

The commodities, once shipped from Kansas City to Lansing and then transported to St. Johns, are stored at Andy's IGA and the Kroger supermarket. Hamilton and others pick up the cheese commodities and take them to the senior citizens office. Getting the food to the recipients involves many workers.

"All of the employees volunteer to work extra hours at no pay to help get the cheese passed out," Hamilton said. "We have people in outlying areas who also help distribute so the seniors don't have to come into town."

Agreement reached on Friend's salary

Clinton County commissioners and Circuit Judge Timothy Green have ironed out a compromise in their dispute over Friend of the Court Colleen Steinman's salary.

Commissioners Tuesday approved a recommendation by the finance committee to set Steinman's salary at \$24,668 effective retroactive to last Oct. 1.

Green, who raised Steinman's salary to \$30,000 in March through an administrative order, could not be reached for comment Tuesday.

Granger takes steps to plug landfill leaks

A leak of polluted water has been plugged and plans are being made to prevent future problems at Granger Landfill, a spokesman says.

"We have met the court order deadline of May 2, and I've been informed verbally that DNR samples have shown that the contamination has abated," said Granger spokesman Kurt Guter.

Guter says tests taken by Department of Natural Resources technicians have shown that Granger has plugged the leaks which prompted Attorney General Frank Kelley to obtain a court order April 22, stopping the landfill from accepting hazardous wastes.

But a long-time adversary of Granger, the People's Action League, is not satisfied yet, PAL President Jan Hook said.

"We're not ready to say we're satisfied yet, but we're being patient," Mrs. Look said. "As far as the monitoring, progress looks like it is moving forward the way we wanted it to be. But as far as encapsulation, as far as actual plans are concerned, we haven't seen a lot."

Granger was ordered by Ingham Circuit Judge Carolyn Stell to, as of May 2, stop receiving hazardous

wastes at the southern Clinton County site; to put a stop to leaks which were releasing pollutants onto nearby farming and residential areas, then into the Oppenlander Drain and the Looking Glass River; and to develop a plan to permanently enclose 50 acres of the landfill designated as containing hazardous wastes. Granger was also ordered to install groundwater monitoring wells to check for future contamination.

Prior to the order, Granger was permitted by the DNR to accept 35,100 cubic feet of paint sludges, cyanides and metals such as barium, cadmium, copper, chromium, lead and zinc. Several months ago, Granger also disposed of PCB sludge from a toxic waste cleanup near Howell.

Granger's plans to build a hazardous waste landfill were stymied by PAL, when former Circuit Judge Ray Hotchkiss granted PAL attorneys an injunction preventing Granger from obtaining a DNR hazardous waste landfill operating permit.

As a result, hazardous wastes have been dumped in the oldest and least secure of Granger's two landfills. A newer, more secure landfill, opened recently, is not permitted for hazardous waste disposal under terms of a

hard-fought battle with PAL over its special use permit. Guter declined to reveal estimates of the costs of compliance with the court order, and would not estimate the loss of revenue from hazardous waste disposal.

But Mrs. Look, whose PAL members are studying recently-released records from the landfill, estimated the losses could be substantial. "I know from past figures that (owner Jerry Granger) was making from \$4 to \$6 million per year, gross, and a sizable amount of that was from hazardous waste, which earns from \$50 to \$200 per barrel, depending on what's in them," she said.

"I know he was hurting on overtime for a couple of weeks, because his people had to work 14-hour days to comply with the court order. As for encapsulation, we estimate just the clay walls will cost \$1.5 million."

Guter said plans have been submitted to Ms. Stell for construction of two more clay walls around the 50-acre area — two already were built under an earlier agreement.

Granger also has filed a motion asking Ms. Stell to lift the Hotchkiss injunction of a year ago — a move that would make it possible for Granger to build and open a hazardous waste landfill.

Granger attorney Gary Trepod could not be reached for comment on the motion, but Mrs. Look vowed PAL would fight it. She said the motion by Trepod will not be heard by Judge Stell until the present court order is complied with, and that, she said, could be as late as August or September.

As for the old site, Mrs. Look predicted Granger may never be allowed to dump hazardous wastes there again. "It would be foolish of them to assume they're ever going to open that site again. It would just cause problems," she warned.

Two-car accident sends five to hospital

A 21-year-old St. Johns woman and four women from Owosso were hospitalized Monday following a two-car accident at Lansing Street and US-27.

Nancy Ann Baker, of 8254 N. Scott Road, St. Johns, pulled out onto US-27 from Lansing Street in front of a vehicle driven by Cathy Ann Selbig, 21, of Owosso, Clinton County Sheriff's Department reports said. Baker's vehicle was struck broadside.

Baker was treated and released at Clinton Memorial Hospital. Selbig was also treated and released. Selbig's three passengers, Julie Crugher, Marcy Desjardins and Penny Flury, all 20 and all of Owosso — were treated at Clinton Memorial Hospital and transported to Owosso Hospital Monday night.

Baker was cited for failing to yield, reports said.

Over the Memorial Day weekend, Sheriff's deputies made 11 arrests for drinking-related charges. In all, 80 complaints resulted in 29 arrests during the week ending May 29.

Bullets chipped a building 27 times at 5137 Industrial Parkway, Watertown Township, damaging concrete blocks and light housings, reports said. Damage was

Burnell Grieve, 28, of Laingsburg, was eastbound on M-21 when he crossed the centerline and struck a vehicle driven by Lloyd Gilbert Schautz, 29, of Owosso. Kelly Edward Russell, 19, of 402 S. Main St., Ovid, then struck Grieve's vehicle as it sat in the eastbound lane, reports said.

Grieve was listed in fair condition Tuesday at Lansing's Sparrow Hospital. Schautz and Russell were not hospitalized.

DeWitt Township Police reported a break-in which resulted in a loss of \$5,000. The incident occurred late Monday, May 23 or early Tuesday. A window was pried open in the back of Central Advertising, 3801 Capital City Blvd. and over \$5,000 in cash was taken from a desk drawer, police said.

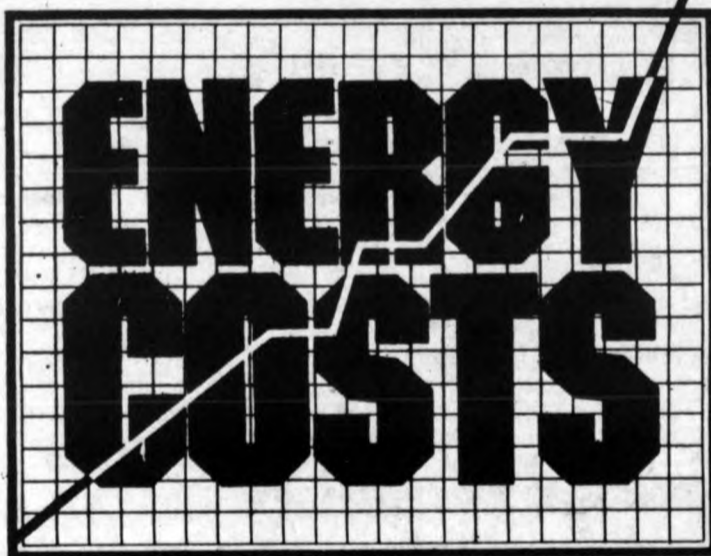

Giving until it hurts

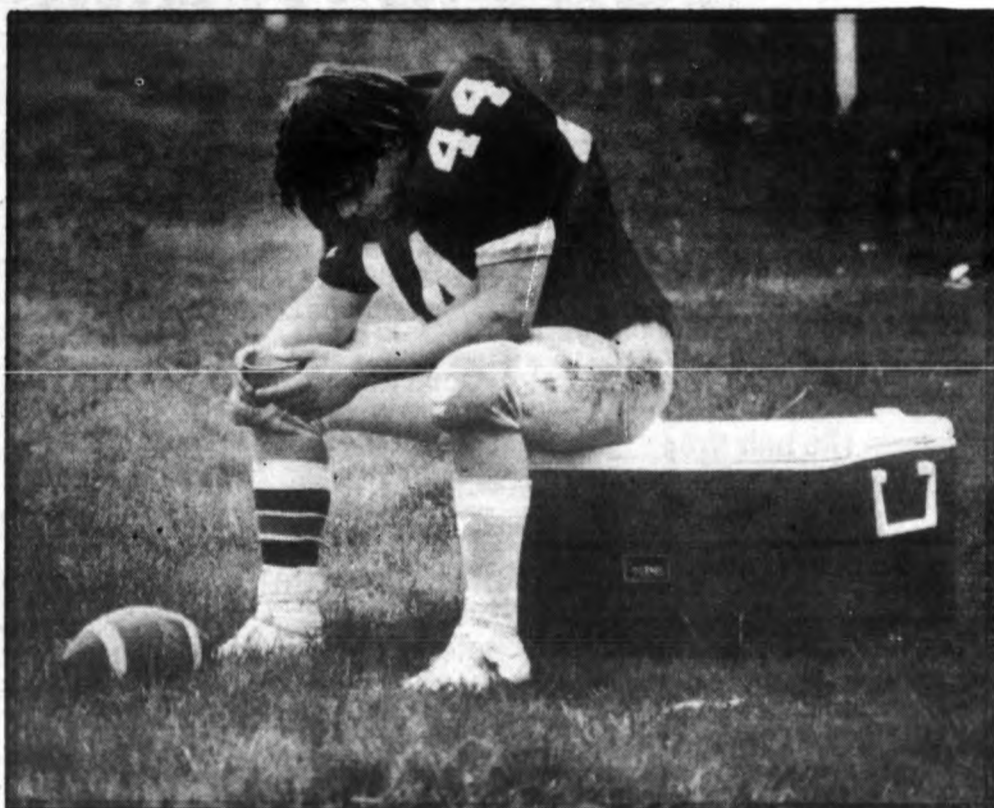
The USFL isn't the only game in spring football. The Bath Cardinals, a team playing in a charity league, may work just as hard as any others do.

In the minds of many local motorcycle shop owners, the controversial motorcycle helmet repeal law is dead.

But when you talk to members of American Bikers Aiming Toward Education (ABATE), the issue comes alive.

"I just don't care for the government stepping in and mandating safety," says Leonard Bradshaw of Perry, a third-year ABATE member. "I just think there's other

ways to do it."

ABATE members and other supporters gathered at the Capitol to protest Michigan's law requiring helmets for all motorcycle riders. The rally drew criticism from some motorcycle shop owners who are tired of the issue after years of haggling.

"It's sort of a dead issue," says Doug Sears, owner of College Bike Shop in East Lansing. "The rank and file motorcycle rider doesn't care about it anymore. If he does, he doesn't verbalize it anymore."

Sears blames the media — particularly television news — for spurring helmet repeal rallies like the one recently held in Lansing.

"I think the issues are all clouded by those people getting all over TV," Sears says. "It's all personal. There's nothing left to be discussed. It all boils down to a personal view."

Sears argues that the media enjoy covering the rallies because they are often attended by bikers who wear blue jeans and leather jackets, fitting the stereotypical mold.

"That's the only reason they're on the news," he says. "It's sensationalism."

Another motorcycle shop owner in Charlotte says fewer than 1 percent of all riders are pushing for a repeal of the law.

"It's not a very strong movement," says Bill Morris, owner of Kawasaki Bike Shop. "Go out and stop 40 motorcycles with riders who have \$189 helmets and ask them what they think of it."

Morris dropped by the Lansing rally to see who turned out to push for the repeal.

"My average helmet I sell in the store is more than \$100. The guy that was down there was not wearing a \$100 helmet," he notes.

Bradshaw answers the common charge that many of the riders pushing for a repeal are Harley-Davidson owners, which represents less than 10 percent of the riding public.

"If a guy buys a Harley, he's got a lot of money invested in it," says Bradshaw, a Harley-Davidson rider himself. "He wants to protect his freedom."

He adds repealing the helmet law would not necessarily lead to more deaths, as critics claim. In fact, he said it would cause motorcyclists to become more aware of safety.

"They found that in states where they repealed it, the death rate went down," he says. "Now, they put a helmet on your head and you're safe, so you can go crazy. When you don't have a helmet, your attitude becomes, 'I'd better watch it. I can get hurt.'"

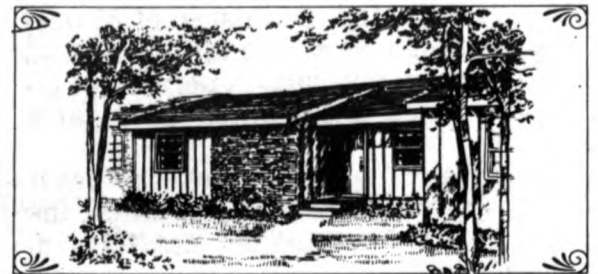

Here's one idea good for ash can

The state Senate has voted 18-15 to declare June 8 as Pride in Tobacco Day. Such a day, according to sponsor Harry DeMaso of Battle Creek, would recognize the contributions that the tobacco industry has made in the economy.

Presumably, those observing the day will overlook the effect tobacco has had on the health of the country in general. They will ignore the statistics which point out the dangers to one's health from smoking and the new evidence of dangers to non-smokers from being near those who do.

A lot can be ignored by the senators who voted for the resolution. They can ignore the many patients literally dying in hospitals across Michigan because of the effect that tobacco has had on their lives. They can also ignore the fact that the government — both state and federal — spends millions of dollars to alert people to smoking's dangers. They can also ignore that \$27 billion in medical costs are incurred annually to care for patients with illnesses caused by smoking.

Senate ignores facts which prove dangers of smoking cigarettes

Despite ignoring those facts, the dangers will persist. It is a bit ironic that such a measure would be supported by the Michigan Senate and, as of Tuesday morning, was in a House committee awaiting further action. This is the same state which took a progressive step and mandated non-smoking areas for restaurant patrons. The health reasons were recognized then.

This is also the state which bans smoking in public buildings; not only for safety reasons, but for health reasons, too. It's also the state where many local governments ban smoking at public meetings.

Residents who still doubt whether smoking is a health hazard need only call the American Cancer Society for some details. The staff there can provide you with information about the effects smoking has. Consider:

- Smoking is attributed as a cause of 83 percent of all lung cancer cases in men and 43 percent in women. Overall, 75 percent of all lung cancer cases are blamed on cigaret smoking.
- The death rate for male smokers versus male non-smokers is double. For women, the death rate is 30 percent higher than for non-smoking women.
- At current smoking rates, lung cancer will become the number one killer of women, surpassing breast cancer.
- Smoking is linked to cancers of the mouth, pancreas and bladder and is a cause of heart disease, gastric ulcers, bronchitis and emphysema.
- Of all cancer cases, smoking is linked to 25 percent of them.

It is ironic, too, that at the same time many individuals are raising money to combat smoking, the Senate is recognizing it as a virtue. This stand may be a bit confusing to the many smokers who have or are trying to quit because they recognize what smoking can do.

DeMaso's resolution commending the cigaret industry is dubious. One cannot recognize the industry without also recognizing what it contributes to society — both good and bad. Traditionally, if one honors an industry it is to recognize past achievements and to promote its expansion. One cannot recognize accomplishments while at the same time condemning what has been done.

Like a cigaret, this resolution should be allowed to burn itself out.

To the editor:

As the 1982-83 school year draws to a close, I feel compelled to express my gratitude and congratulations to the parents of DeWitt High School students. In my years of teaching, I have never had the pleasure of working with more courteous, bright and responsible young men and women as the student body of our high school this year.

I am convinced that their excellent attitudes and performance — both academically and athletically — is the result of home environments that encourage respectful behavior toward education. Of this, all parents have the right to be very proud of their sons and daughters.

Academically, our high school is producing students who have consistently excelled far beyond the norm both on standardized testing and in their desire for more demanding academic skills. Students in all areas are tackling programs of higher learning that require far more work than the average high school class — certainly more than when I was in school.

As an example, our enrollment for advanced placement English — a rigorous course designed to prepare students for college writing skills — has increased from eight students in 1979 to 55 this year. Athletically, DeWitt has witnessed a football team which shared the Capital Circuit title and a berth in the state playoffs; the basketball team sported a record of 20-4 and the district championship; the volleyball team advanced to the regional finals and the baseball team won the Capital Circuit championship. As of May 20, the boys tennis team won the state regional title and is ad-

vancing to the state finals, and the girls track team is again a contender for the Class C state championship.

A far more difficult area in which to measure excellence is attitude. Our student body this year — from freshmen to seniors — is truly one of the finest I have ever had the pleasure to work with. These young people are well-mannered and responsible. This spirit is positive and proud — as well it should be. At a recent leadership conference, DeWitt students represented their high school as superior to any participating, both in curriculum and spirit. They returned to school having been asked to share the "secret of their success" with the other student participants.

With the recent reports lamenting the state of education in our country, I feel it is necessary to inform you of the excellence in which your sons and daughters participate, fostered, I must believe, by home atmospheres which expect a positive performance in school. As these young men and women are proud of their achievements and their school, so should all of their parents be who are responsible for so many fine children.

As many of my students will confirm, my standards of achievement are high. The student body of DeWitt High School has been most successful in meeting them — both in academics and behavior — beyond almost any I have ever encountered. I thank you, their parents, for the home environment, the expectations, and encouragement, which produced these young men and women. I know that the vast majority of the high school faculty joins me in this gratitude. You have every right to be very proud of your parenting.

School districts line up millage requests

Four school millage requests and several candidate races will be decided June 13 when Clinton County voters go to the polls.

ST. JOHNS does not have a millage proposal, but the district does have five candidates vying for two terms on the school board.

Barry Dean of 915 W. McConnell, James Graham and William Jackson, both of Rt. 3; Gary Whitford of 7596 S. Chandler and incumbent board President Robert Craig are up for the two seats. All are St. Johns residents.

The two winners will get four-year terms.

OVID-ELSIE voters will also elect two members to four-year terms. Robert S. Parker of 5153 N. Chandler, Elsie, Edward W. Thornton of 5280 N. Shepardsville Road, Elsie, and Arthur E. Kelley of 7580 Welter Road, Ovid are running against incumbents Burton Case and Merle Green.

Voters will also be asked to renew 23 mills for one year.

PEWAMO-WESTPHALIA is asking for a 22-mill package, which represents 21.59 renewed mills and 41 additional mills. The district school board race offers an unopposed incumbent, Treasurer Anthony Thelen, who

seeks another four-year term.

FOWLER voters, like Ovid-Elsie's, are being asked to renew 23 operating mills. Fowler is also asking one-half mill in additional funds for maintenance. Superintendent Jim Andros said the additional one-half mill will generate about \$38,000 for repairs to school roofs, doors and parking lots.

Incumbent Ruth Feldpausch is running unopposed for another four-year term.

DEWITT does not have a millage request before the voters, but one four-year term will be decided. James Ryan of 1120 S. Geneva, and David Harfst of 905 W. Geneva, both of DeWitt, are running for the seat held by Diane Cranmer.

BATH has the largest non-renewal millage proposal in the county — one mill. Bath voters will also decide who should get two four-year terms from among President Richard Wilkins, Trustee Judith Penrod, Josephine Miller of 5831 Clark Road, Bath, and Thomas White of 12645 Kruger Lane, DeWitt.

Mortgage options may help you buy

There's good news for home buyers who have been waiting out the slump in housing to purchase or refinance a home.

Lower interest rates have breathed life into a market that had seen little movement in three years. But buyers will find the market a little different from the one they were used to, says the National Association of Home Builders.

The traditional 30-year, fixed-rate loan that housed four generations of Americans has come back to life. But it has been joined by a number of alternatives. These loans answer to any number of names, but whatever the label, they usually boil down to one of the types discussed below:

Adjustable Rate Mortgage (ARM): Also called a variable rate mortgage or a rollover mortgage, an ARM is usually a 30-year loan with an interest rate that rises or falls at regular intervals along

with rates win the money markets. This loan was intended to shift some of the risk involved with long-term loans from the lender to the borrower.

The interest rate on an ARM may be adjusted at intervals ranging anywhere from six months to five years.

Currently, the most popular plan calls for changes in the interest rate and monthly payments every five years based on the going rate for 5-year Treasury notes.

These loans may carry an interest rate as much as one or two percentage points below the interest rate on a 30-year mortgage. The decision as to which is the better deal depends on the buyer's circumstances.

A young buyer just starting out or a buyer on a fixed income might be willing to accept a higher interest rate in exchange for certainty of monthly payments down the road. Someone who has a solid

financial foundation or someone who moves every few years might be willing to take a chance on higher interest rates in the future in exchange for lower rates now.

For buyers in the upper end of the market -- those who will need a loan that exceeds \$108,300 -- an adjustable rate mortgage may be easier to obtain. This is because lenders find it more difficult to sell these larger loans and must, therefore, hold them in their portfolios.

Graduated Payment Mortgages (GPM): A GPM is a fixed interest rate mortgage that allows buyers to qualify for a mortgage with a lower income by providing lower monthly payments in the early years of the loan. The lower payments are possible because a part of the interest is deferred until later years.

The most popular plan calls for monthly payments to increase at a rate of 7.5 percent each year for the first five years. Thereafter, payments remain fixed for the life of the loan.

Both FHA and VA offer graduated payment plans. Because GPMs involve deferred interest the buyer will ultimately pay more for the loan, but the lower initial payments allow many young buyers to own homes earlier than they could otherwise.

15-Year Fixed-Rate Mortgage: Few among today's home buyers remember, but the 30-year loan is a fairly recent development. In the days when mortgages typically ran for 15 or 20 years and mortgage interest rates were 4, 4 1/2 or 5 percent, the housing industry pushed for longer loan maturities to help more buyers qualify for loans.

But as interest rates rise the advantage of stretching out payments diminishes. For instance, with a 15-year loan, the monthly payments on a \$50,000 mortgage with a 13.5 percent interest rate are \$649. This is only \$77 more than the \$572 monthly payments required for a 30-year loan at the same rate.

With the 15-year loan, the buyer accumulates equity in the home at a much more rapid clip and total interest payments over the life of the loan are much lower.

The buyer should keep in mind, however, that because the interest portion of payments is lower, tax deductions will also be lower.

Graduated Payment Adjustable Rate Mortgage (GPARM): The GPARM is a hybrid combining the features of the Graduated Payment Mortgage and the Adjustable Rate Mortgage. As with the GPM payments start out at a lower level and increase gradually for a number of years.

The difference is that the interest rate will be ad-

justed periodically, usually every three or five years. With most GPARM plans, it is only with the step of the graduated payments that the buyer is faced with an adjustment in the interest rate.

In some cases, the buyer has the option of extending the graduated payments for one more period should the last step of the graduated payments coincide with an increase in the interest rate. These loans may involve a slightly higher interest rate.

Land Leases: Another method used to make home ownership more affordable in the early years of the loan is to buy the home and lease the lot it is sitting on.

At present this type of financing is only available in a few areas of the country. Land leases usually require a lower downpayment since only the home and not the land is financed. Generally land leases run for a longer term than the mortgage, and in most cases the homeowner will have the option of buying the land after a certain initial period. One point to remember, since the rental payment involves no interest, it is not tax deductible.

Buydowns: Monthly payments may also be reduced by the use of a buydown -- an upfront payment of part of the interest on the loan. This payment

may be made by the builder or seller of the home, by the buyer, or by a parent or employer. One of the most common types of buydown is one that reduces the monthly payments by 3 percentage points the first year, 2 points the second year and 1 point the third.

Balloon Mortgages: Balloon mortgages are short-term loans, usually on the order of three to five years. Monthly payments are usually comparable to those for a 25 to 30-year loan, with most of the payment going to interest. The principal balance of the loan is due in one lump sum at the end of the three to five year period.



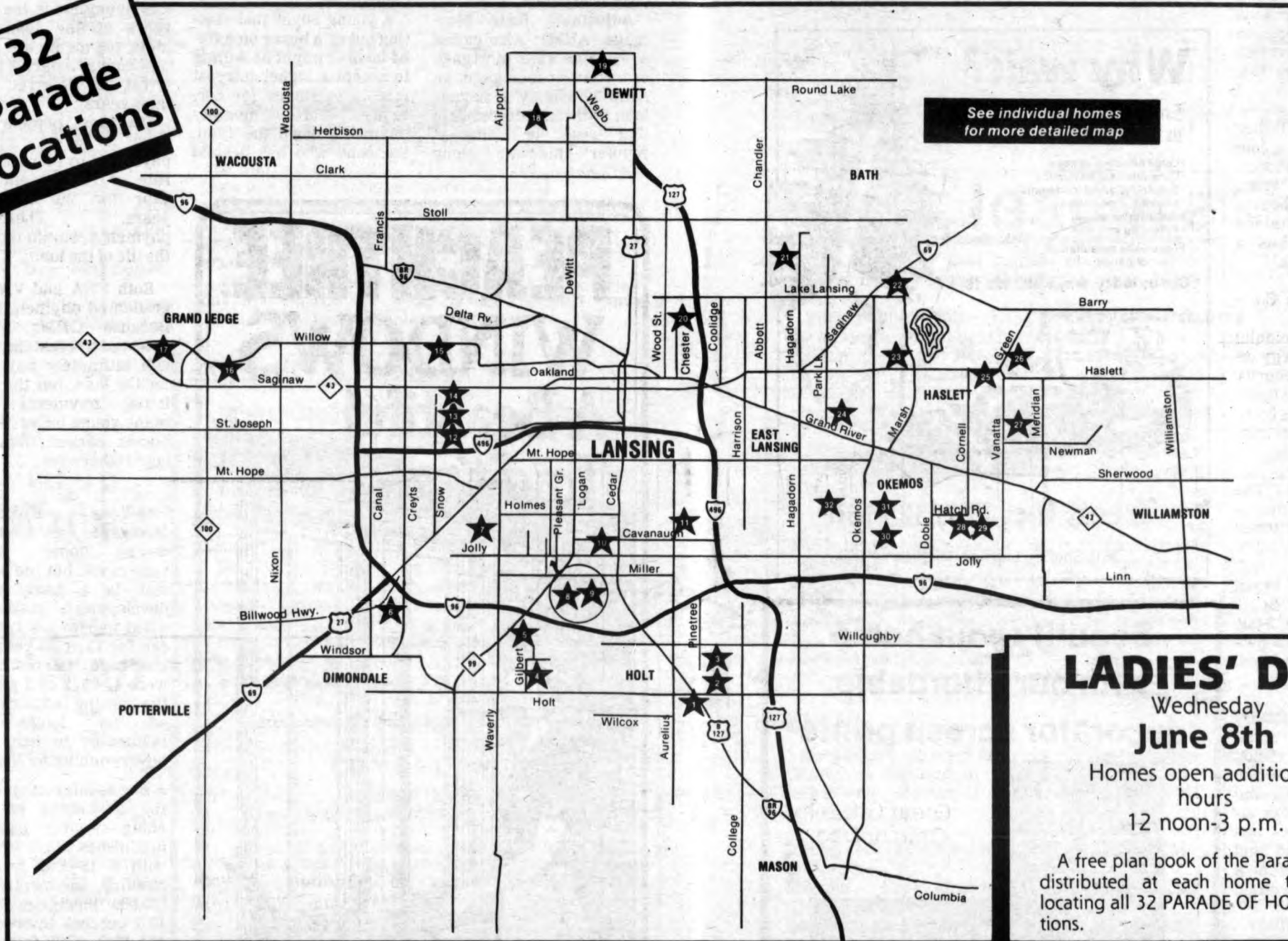

Track leaders

Most track and field coaches would give their right arm for a runner like Fowler senior Becky Klein.

They might consider giving their left arm, right leg and left leg, too. She is that good.

Klein has scored 246½ points this season, after scoring 185¼ as a junior. Since it takes 62 points to win a dual meet, one could say that Klein's points alone have been worth almost seven victories for Fowler.

"For most people, scoring close to 100 points in a year would be phenomenal," said Fowler coach Kim Spalsbury.

Klein has lofty goals for Saturday's Class D state meet in Traverse City. She wants to go faster than 57.5 in the 440-yard dash and help her teammates go faster than 4:05 to break the Fowler mile relay record.

In the fall, she plans to attend Grand Rapids Baptist College, where she may try out for track, softball and basketball. But her main emphasis will be on homework, not legwork.

"It's enjoyable for high school, but I don't think it's much of a future for me," she said of her track career.

The whippy right arm of Patty Wieber contains most of the hope for Fowler's softball team as the Eagles resume their quest for a Class D district championship.

Webberville, champions of the Mid-State Athletic Conference and fifth ranked in a state coaches' poll, challenges Fowler Friday in a noon game at Portland. Wieber, Fowler's ace with a 9-1 record, will match wits with Webberville's Donna Schultz.

"Both teams have good pitchers," said Fowler coach Betsy Smith, whose team holds a 13-5 record and a Central Michigan Athletic Conference co-championship. "It's just going to be who's on. That's going to be our toughest game this year."

Wieber has been one of the hottest pitchers in the Lansing area of late. She has won four of her last five games by shutouts, including last Friday's 12-0 pre-district win over Potterville. In that one, Wieber and Becky Kohagen combined on a five-inning no-hitter.

"She's worked awful hard," said Smith, who worried about her pitching early in the season when all-conference hurler Julie Pung was sidelined with an injury.

"I give her a lot of credit for working extra hard. She's been working basically on her control. She's at the point this year where she's got about 10 more strikeouts than walks, which is a big improvement over last year."

If Fowler wins, it will face either Saranac or Portland St. Patrick, the other CMAC co-champion, in the district final.

Another CMAC team, Pewamo-Westphalia, bowed out of the state tournament by losing, 8-3, to Howard City Tri-County last Friday. P-W finished its season 8-10-1.

"Even though it wasn't the winningest season, it was one of the most enjoyable for me to coach," said P-W coach Bonnie Somero. "I've had winning seasons before where it really wasn't that enjoyable coaching — where the kids got cocky."

Ovid-Elsie and Pewamo-Westphalia are gone, but Fowler is still alive as the state baseball tournament moves into the district stage.

After drawing a bye, Fowler opens post-season action Friday at noon on its own diamond. The Eagles, 14-5, will play either Saranac or Springport.

Fowler coach Neal Hoffman looks at his team's district chances with guarded optimism. The Eagles enter district play without centerfielder Jim Farley, who suffered muscle damage below his knee in a recent collision with leftfielder Tom Simon.

Simon suffered a deep bruise on his lower leg, and his status is questionable.

"It hurts a little bit, but we have to make do with what we've got," Hoffman said.

Hoffman will pitch Dan Simon, 3-3, in the opener, and Bill Kohagen, in the championship game if the Eagles win. Steve Weber, 4-1, will be ready in relief.

Ovid-Elsie gave Haslett a scare before losing, 4-3, in a pre-district game last Friday.

"We should have won the game," said O-E coach Jack Nutter, whose team finished 12-10-1.

O-E was sitting on a 3-2 lead going into the sixth inning when Haslett's Jim Hastings smacked a two-run home run. The game-winning blast bumped Haslett's record to 18-1.

O-E left 13 runners on base, including five in the final two innings. Pete Hurst had two hits in the game, in-

cluding an RBI single in the fifth which gave O-E its lead.

After the game, Nutter announced that Hurst was headed for Saginaw Valley State College to play football and baseball. Another Marauder, Dan Bukovcik, is bound for Central Michigan University, where he will try out as a walk-on.

"We had a pretty good team," Nutter said. "If we'd just had a little more pitching, we could have been tough. Our pitchers walked a lot of guys, plus, we didn't do well in the clutch."

Pewamo-Westphalia lost its pre-district game and its

seven-game winning streak to Lansing Catholic Central, 4-2, at Lansing's Municipal Park last Friday. The Pirates, Central Michigan Athletic Conference champions, finished 11-6.

"It was a real successful year, no matter how you look at it," said P-W coach Jim Cotter.

Jon Walter, P-W's ace, lost the game when the P-W offense stalled. The Pirates had scored 36 runs in their previous three games.

"He threw a real competitive game," Cotter said. "He just challenged them. He only gave up five hits, and if you give up five hits you should win the game."

St. Johns boys: Scott Furry achieved a season-long goal by cracking the 15.0 barrier in the 120-yard high hurdles when he won the event in 14.8.

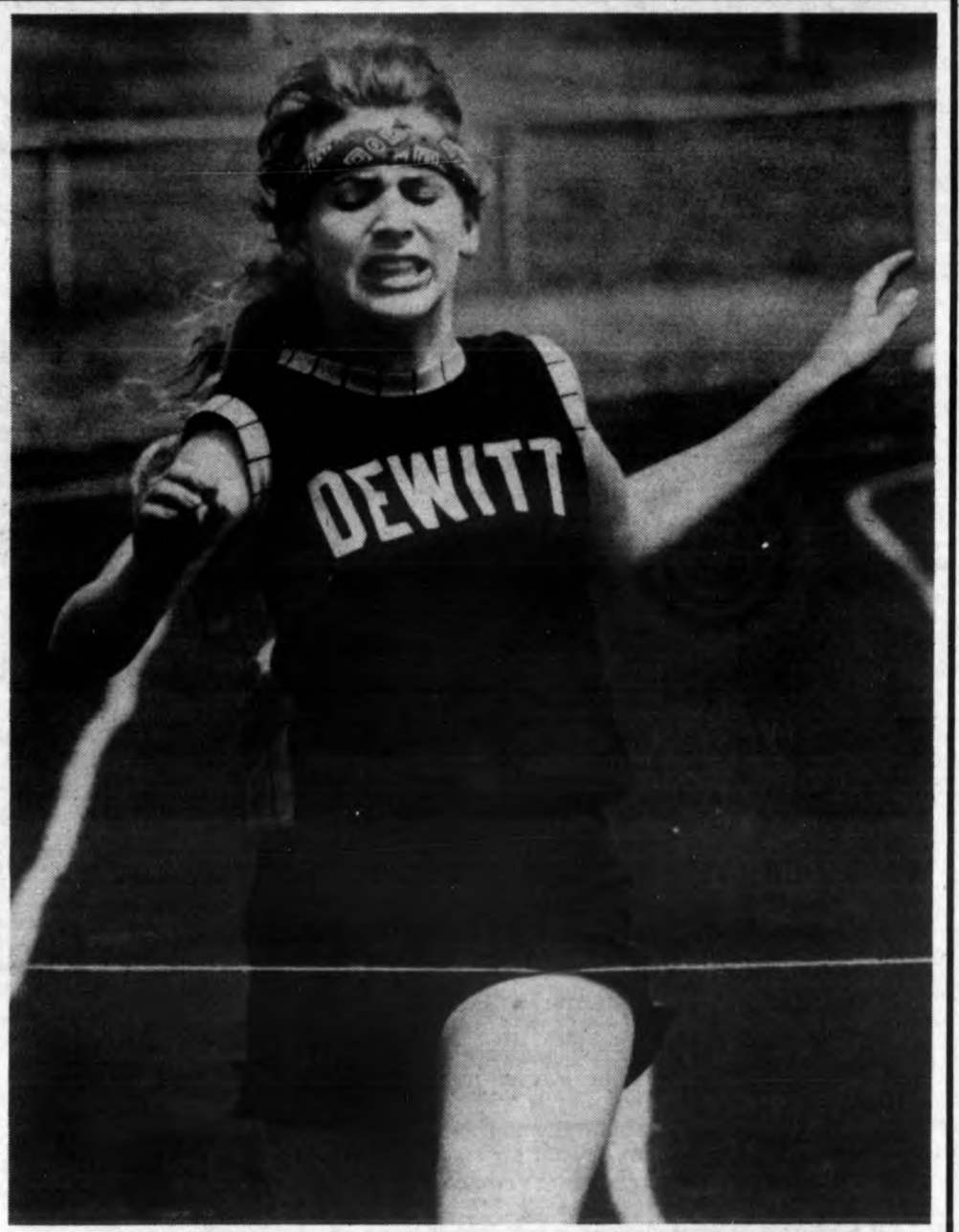
"I think he nudged one hurdle, but other than that it was practically a perfect performance," said Redwing coach Randy Rude.

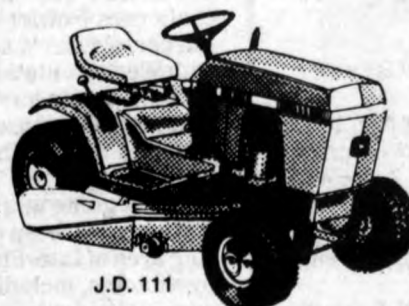

Eagle girls win CMAC track; boys second

If ever there is a track and field runner who knows what it means to be a day late and a dollar short, it is Fowler's Brenda Witgen.

Witgen has spent most of the 1983 season finishing either one place out of winning a medal, or split-seconds away from qualifying for the Class D state meet. She finally ended her frustration at the Central Michigan Athletic Conference meet last week in Pottersville.

On her final attempt in the long jump, Witgen jumped 15-1½ to move from fourth place to second. Thus, she finally earned a medal.

"It was a moral victory for her," said Fowler coach Kim Spalsbury, whose Eagles easily won the team championship, 165-116, over Pottersville.

Becky Klein powered the victory by setting conference records in the 100- and 220-yard dashes. She went 11.2 in the 100 and 25.8 in the 220.

Unnoticed by most observers was another excellent time in the 220. Jan Schmitt, one of Fowler's steadiest relay runners, crossed the finish line in 26.9, lowering her personal best by .5.

Klein's time in the 220 was also a personal best — partly because she knew she did not have to come back and run in the mile relay. "I just pumped myself up," she said.

In the state Class D meet Saturday at Traverse City, Klein will run the 440-yard dash with a chance to qualify for the Quad-state meet to be held June 11 in Fort Wayne, Ind. That meet will bring together the fastest four quarter-milers in Michigan to form a mile relay unit.

Spalsbury said that Klein would have to run close to 57.0 in the event to qualify. Last year, she had the sixth fastest quarter-mile time in the state.

Other CMAC champions from Fowler were: Emily Feldpausch, mile and two-mile runs; Lana Hafner, 880 run; the 880 relay team of Connie Thelen, Schmitt, Hafner and Klein; and the mile relay of Kelly Hafner, Beth Wirth, Nancy Sillman and Schmitt.

Fowler boys: Sophomore Joe Bertram won both the shot put and discus events, but Fowler could not overtake Pottersville in the conference meet. The Vikings beat the Eagles, 179-122.

Bertram blew away everyone in the discus, winning

by over 24 feet and maintaining his status as Clinton County's leading discus thrower. He threw 45-0½ to win the shot put, and topped that with a toss of 47-4 at a freshman-sophomore meet at Ovid-Elsie last Thursday.

"He physically has the makeup for a discus person," said Fowler coach Tom O'Rourke. "He's worked extremely hard."

O'Rourke has a difficult job because Fowler does not have track facilities, but Bertram has made his coach's job easy by dedicating himself to long practices.

"Joe has waited around (at practice) until I've had some time," O'Rourke said. "He's always the last weight person out there. It's really a skill to be able to toss those, and he's really worked at it."

Fowler also received a strong effort in the 220-yard dash, when Dave Koenigskecht was timed in 23.0 and Seth Wright in 23.8. Both were personal bests.

The 880 relay team of Dean Koenigskecht, Wright, Bill Snyder and Scott Ruhl also posted its best time — 1:35.9.

Dave Koenigskecht had somewhat of an off day in the long jump, but he still managed to set a meet record at 21-10.

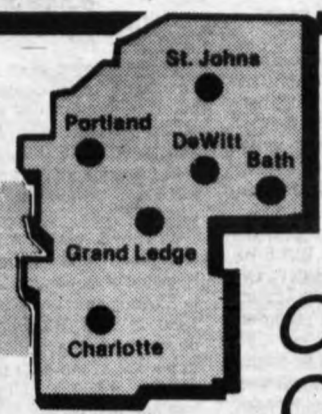

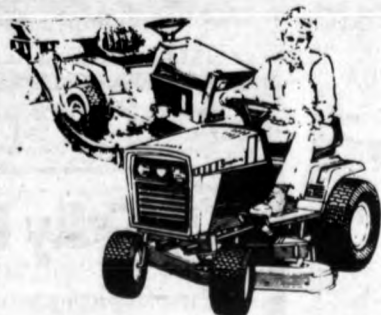

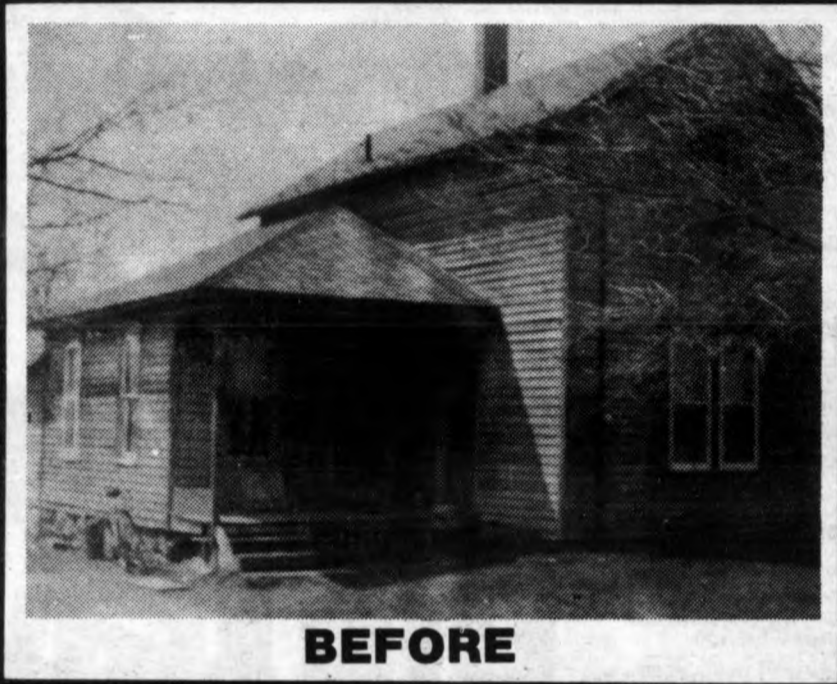
