Candidates meet public

Gary Whitford was there early, clutching a stack of documents with results of his own private voter-opinion poll.

Incumbent Bob Craig showed up at the last minute, carrying a stack of professional looking campaign flyers, depicting him holding hands with a youngster, coat slung over his shoulder, tie loosened.

Barry Dean brought a stack of computer printouts and took a seat between James Graham and Bill Jackson.

Two hours later, the five candidates for two St. Johns school board seats had been grilled by the crowd of about 50 on everything from class sizes to conflicts of interest.

They also were asked to rate the quality of St. Johns schools — Craig and Whitford said above average, the rest said average — and the level of staff morale — most agreed "below average," due to unsuccessful teacher contract negotiations.

The gathering was a "meet the candidates night" sponsored by an organization of parents and teachers who have banded together to oppose a plan to close two rural schools, East Essex and East Olive. The closing plan has been tabled until December, but that didn't stop many from criticizing the board's handling of the issue and asking candidates' opinions.

"One of the biggest reasons you're not getting millage (requests) passed is because the board members and the administration aren't laying their cards on the table," Roger Dershem complained. "They're not telling the whole story."

Others said the board lacks "credibility," and asked how each candidate would restore public confidence.

"I'd like to see the board's agenda published a week in advance," said Graham, a farmer.

"I disagree," said Jackson, an attorney. "I would need the flexibility to put other items on the agenda."

Dean, owner of Dean's Hardware, suggested hiring or appointing a publicist or public relations person to promote the schools, and stressed "following proper procedures."

Whitford, a tool designer for Oldsmobile, said the present agenda format must be changed. "Reducing public input is no way to shorten interminably long meetings," he said.

Craig, a Michigan Farm Bureau employee, said he was one of the first on the board to express concern about the new agenda, which allows public comments only at the beginning and end of board meetings. He said changes have already been made, and promised a citizens committee will soon be appointed to investigate alternatives to school closings.

Asked prior to the public questions how many board meetings each has attended in the past year, Jackson said three; Dean, "at least 20"; Graham, six; Whitford, six. Craig has presided at all but a couple of regular and special board meetings.

Other comments by candidates during the meeting were:

• Whitford: "Personally, I don't want to run, but I feel it is a necessity. I feel a responsibility."

• Jackson: "I would toughen management policy of the schools as far as money management is concerned. Over spending of budget items ... is very poor management technique."

• Dean: "My wife is a teacher and my kids attend the schools. I feel that is a great benefit. I recognize that could create a possible problem in your minds when considering teacher contracts, but I do not see it as a problem."

• Graham: "I think combination classes can work. It's a teacher and parent attitude that they don't."

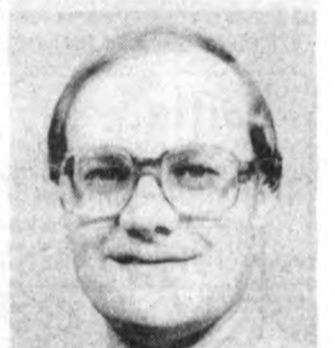
• Craig: "I'm proud of what we've done. I'm proud of the improvement in our assessment scores. I'm proud but never satisfied."

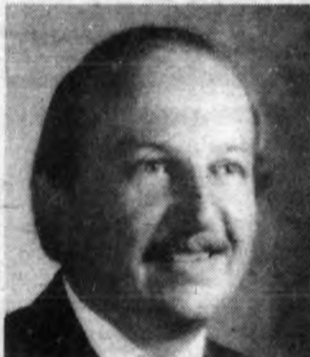


Five in race answer questions

Board hopefuls reply to queries on issues

Editor's note: We mailed the same questions to six candidates seeking the two seats on the St. Johns Board of Education. To inform voters about their personal backgrounds, qualifications and stands on issues, their replies, edited for brevity where necessary, are published in alphabetical order.

• **Bob Craig**, 32, of 812 W. Park St., is manager of commodity activities for Michigan Farm Bureau. He and his wife Monica have two children, neither of whom is old enough to attend St. Johns Public Schools. They have lived in St. Johns for seven years. A four-year member of the school board, Craig has been board president for almost a year.

Why are you seeking election?

Craig: I care about kids and the quality education they need. I pledge to maintain and improve our school system for our children, within available financial resources. I believe that by working together, we have a real opportunity to improve our community and to make the benefits of education accessible to all people.

What are your qualifications to serve?

Craig: I believe my four years of experience on the St. Johns school board, which includes a good record of service and leadership, are my best qualifications for re-election.

What would you change if elected?

Craig: I will work for: citizen involvement and parent participation in our schools; honest and open communication with all segments of the community; continued efforts to attract and motivate dedicated teachers; improvement in discipline to provide a better learning environment; quality education at an equitable cost; obtaining additional state and federal grants to fund energy conservation; innovative teaching methods and renovation of buildings and grounds.

Do you believe schools or a school should be closed if enrollment continues to decline?

Craig: I will consider all sides of this problem with an open mind, obtain facts, look at several alternatives and then make an independent decision. There are several alternatives to school closings, including combination classrooms, increased busing to balance class sizes, and new educational programs to improve quality of our system and stem enrollment decline. If these alternatives are not feasible and there are compelling economic and educational reasons to close, then that should be done.

Should teachers be allowed to strike?

Craig: No, because under state law, teachers' strikes are illegal. As an elected public official, I will uphold the law. I do believe in collective bargaining.

What is your opinion of the superintendent's recommendation to close East Olive and East Essex elementary schools?

Craig: I am undecided on the administrative task force's recommendation, and need more time to study this while looking at all alternatives, including those proposed by PTOs, the 1982 citizens committee report and others. This is why I voted, along with other board members, to delay a decision until December.

• **Barry Dean**, 40, of 905 W. McConnell St., St. Johns, is owner of Dean True Value Hardware. He and his wife Ricki have two children, both attending St. Johns Schools. He has lived in St. Johns 36 years.

Why are you seeking election?

Dean: I seek a position on the board to insure that the students of this district will continue to receive quality education.

Accident is fatal

A DeWitt man was killed in a motorcycle accident, and two DeWitt residents were seriously injured when their golf cart rolled over last week.

In all, Clinton County Sheriff's reports listed 74 complaints during the week ending June 5, including two personal injury accidents, five property damage accidents and two car-deer collisions.

Among the incidents reported to county law enforcement agencies were:

- Scott Allen Webb, 20, of 1213 Longspur Dr., DeWitt, was killed June 4 in an accident on Round Lake Road, west of Babcock Road, sheriff's reports said. Webb was rounding a curve, westbound on Round Lake Road, when he lost control of his motorcycle, went off the road and struck a tree. He was pronounced dead at the scene. The accident was reported at 8:46 p.m., reports said.

- Ellen Danes, 66, of Stoll Road, DeWitt, was listed in fair condition by Sparrow Hospital personnel Tuesday, following injuries she sustained in an accident on Prarie Creek Golf Course in DeWitt at 8:15 p.m. June 2.

According to DeWitt Police reports, Ms. Danes and Emil Tahvonen, 61, of Tucker Drive, DeWitt, were injured when Tahvonen lost control of the golf cart he was driving. The cart containing two passengers, Mrs. Danes and Georgette Theroux of Lansing, began rolling downhill backwards after the brake was released, reports said. Ms. Theroux jumped free before the cart flipped over, and was uninjured. Tahvonen suffered a broken back, and was hospitalized briefly, a spokesperson said. Ms. Danes, who was listed in serious condition in Sparrow's intensive care unit immediately following the accident, has since been listed in "fair" condition.

- A St. Johns woman and an Indiana man were treated and released by Clinton Memorial Hospital emergency personnel June 3, following a two-car accident on US-27 south of Parks Road, sheriff's reports said.

Reports said Judith Ann Vancamp, 1768 W. Maple Rapids Rd., St. Johns, was headed north in the right lane of US-27 when her auto was struck from the rear by an auto driven by Samuel Scott Miller, Elkhart, Indiana. Ms. Vancamp's vehicle burst into flames upon impact and the fire spread to Miller's vehicle, reports said. Both were taken to Clinton Memorial by ambulance, where they were treated for injuries and released.

- Two Lansing sisters who were making early morning rounds delivering papers May 30 have been given credit for solving a minor crime wave in DeWitt, DeWitt Police reports said.

Nancy Czarnomski and Rosemary Clement were delivering copies of the Detroit News at approximately 3:30 a.m. Sunday morning when they spotted a pair of boys spray painting city and private properties.

The sisters gave chase through city streets and managed to catch one of the boys. They held the juvenile suspect for police, who obtained the names of the other boy and two 14-year-old girls who participated in the painting spree.

Police have petitioned probate court for warrants charging all four with curfew violation, and the boys with malicious destruction of property over \$100.

The four youths apparently snuck out of their homes at about 2:30 a.m. two nights in a row, a spokesman said, decorating DeWitt with toilet paper early Sunday morning and then returning to add a fresh coat of spray paint Monday morning.

The two boys have been ordered to clean up their artwork on signs, fences, houses, mailboxes, a cement driveway and doors and windows at DeWitt's Country Meadows office building, reports said. The damages were estimated at \$400.

- A break-in at the 14358 Watson Rd. home of Loren and Judy Mears was reported to Bath Township Police Wednesday, June 1. Entry was gained by breaking windows in the rear door of the residence, reports said, and the theft occurred sometime between Sunday, May 30, and the following Wednesday. Taken were two rifles, a .22 cal. revolver, stereo equipment and many items of jewelry, reports said. The break-in is being investigated, and leads have been turned over to the county detective bureau, a spokesperson said.

- DeWitt Township Police recovered a boat, reported stolen from Lansing, hidden in some brush off Daggett Road near State Road. The \$1,500 boat, motor and trailer was reported stolen to Lansing Police June 1, and was recovered the following day.

- A set of tools and other items valued at about \$715 were reported stolen May 31, sheriff reports said. Armond F. Smith of 5863 McNeal Rd., Greenbush Township, told deputies the tools were taken from his truck, which was parked at his home when the theft occurred. Smith said the initials "AFS" are etched on the tools.

DBR: Do you support the millage request?

MRS. PENROD: Yes.

Thomas H. White, 43, of 12645 Kruger Ln., DeWitt, is a salesman. He and his wife, Enid, have two children, one of whom attends Bath Public Schools. He has lived in the district for 11 years.

DBR: Why are you seeking election?

WHITE: Due to my past experiences in construction, insurance and general business, I believe that I can contribute to the overall spectrum of school board decisions.

DBR: What are your qualifications to serve?

WHITE: I have lived in the community for 11 years and have participated in many school-related activities. Currently, I am president of Bath Athletic Boosters.

DBR: How can your district save money?

DBR: Do you support the millage request?

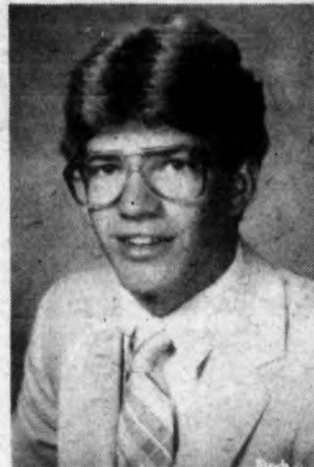

"We have always done the improvements in the park," Reasoner said. "This is our summer project."

In other action Monday, trustees approved \$5,300 for the upgrading of low spots on Drumheller Road west of Webster Road. Sand and gravel will be used to fill the low spots, township supervisor Richard Brook said.

Trustees also discussed possible road improvement projects for 1984, including: Drumheller Road from Center to Chandler; Chandler Estates and Nelson subdivision; Robson Road; Angle Road, from Clise to Howe; and Howe from Angle to Center.

"We'll do as many as we've got dollars for," Brook said.

Trustees authorized \$2,000 to repair Clemons County

Drain, under Chandler Road, in conjunction with \$800 from the Clinton County Drain Commission.

Also approved was:

- The filling of a part-time police officer position in the township. The position will be filled by June 20, Brook said.
- The switching of the regular township board meeting from July 5 to July 6.

• The hiring of zoning administrator Rick Crawford as part-time summer tax collector. "It may take him one hour a week, it may take him three hours a day," Brook said.

• The donation of a 1967 pickup truck by trustee Paul Shaheen. The truck will replace the township's present pickup, which is being used for maintenance work.

New computers captivate teacher

Randy Smith has been pushing the benefits of computers for the last five years in his job as a middle school mathematics teacher in DeWitt.

He's seen how students have gobbled up computer time in his exploratory class, "Adventures in Math." But the thing he looks forward to the most is when DeWitt's new computer literacy program takes root.

"This year's sixth graders are probably the luckiest group, computer wise," Smith said. "They have the potential to have six years of computer experience."

DeWitt has come a long way since Smith began making a pitch for computers in 1978.

Back then, he had to thoroughly explain the national fascination with computers to the school board before they would authorize purchase of the district's first two

computers. Smith made a proposal for a federal grant to obtain the computers.

When the Computer Literacy Committee was formed in September of 1982, Smith was a key figure. After the recommendation was made to purchase computer equipment, Smith went out and got competitive bids from merchants.

"It was fun," he said. "I enjoyed it. It was a little easier for me to do it, because I know the people I had to talk to."

With the purchase of 42 computers for \$62,541, the district will have over 50 computers next year. That is a necessity as far as Smith is concerned.

"It's almost a given that 85 percent of the jobs that these kids apply for will involve some kind of computers," he said.

"The cartoon 'The Jetsons' is not that far away. I have a good feeling it will come in these kids' time."

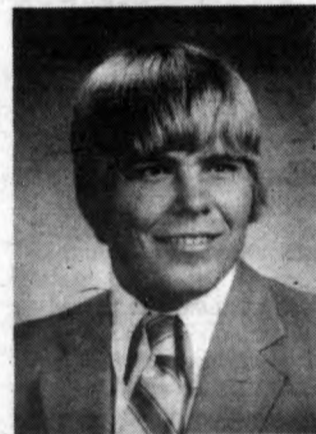

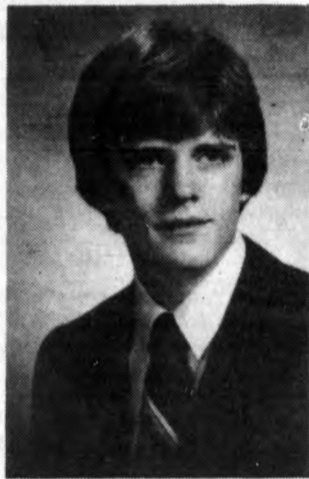

Best of bunch is hard to choose

The hours are long, the job is often unpopular and the pay is low. So why are five well-qualified men seeking one of two seats on the St. Johns school board?

Beginning with incumbent Robert Craig, we have a candidate who can offer four years of experience on the board, dealing with the often exhausting intricacies of budgets, enrollment, state aid, etc. Because of the difficulty of grasping such issues and the many ongoing problems which face a board of education, we feel experience gives any candidate an edge. As in a title fight, the holder of office must be clearly less capable than his opponent: any draw goes to the incumbent.

Does Craig measure up? The answer is yes and no. Against opponent James Graham, he does. Graham, a low-key, likeable, common-sense candidate, puts many issues into perspective by comparing them to farming. His approach is fine, but we feel others boast a wider variety of experience. Craig is certainly one of them.

So is Barry Dean. Dean, involved in just about every community organization he can find time for, has certainly paid his dues in St. Johns. He knows his neighbors and has done his homework, attending more board meetings than any other candidate except Craig. He also has offered some concrete suggestions, which is, surprisingly, not that common in campaigns of this nature. We heartily support his calls for better communication and cooperation.

However, we disagree with his suggestion to hire a publicist to "work on the corporation image" of the system. Most of the communication problems astutely identified by Dean and other candidates can be solved without the aid of a hired "flack" to boost the schools. Such a move, we feel, would only further erode the already wobbly credibility of the system, and a "corporation image" is the last thing our local schools need.

Also, we have problems with Dean's response to questions about a possible conflict of interest. How can you vote on teacher contracts if your wife is a teacher? he was asked. Dean said he sees no problem. We do, and we wish he had simply promised to abstain on contract votes. We do not believe Dean and his wife would discuss confidential negotiations, nor do we believe he would support teacher raises simply because it would boost his family's income.

It has been pointed out that board member Lee Ormston's wife is a teacher, and such a situation is not legally a conflict of interest in the eyes of the state. Still, we see no reason to invite or support a situation in which potential for conflict exists. Especially when other highly qualified candidates are available.

Among them is William Jackson. With experience in the State Attorney General's office dealing with school issues, and a sound background in finance and law, Jackson is a well-qualified contender. We believe Jackson's thinking on many issues is sound, and were impressed with his readiness to tackle problems with new solutions, including a refreshing suggestion to evaluate teachers as well as students to improve local education.

We also agree with his statement that the board has been content with "management by crisis." The lawsuit-averting settlement with former superintendent Donald Burns is a good example of a problem that was ignored too long.

Here, we believe, is a candidate that offers a sound background, fresh ideas and a healthy willingness to communicate them publicly.

If a match between Craig and Dean could be called a draw, we believe Jackson emerges the winner in a similar round, mainly because Craig is responsible, as board president, for many of the problems cited correctly by Jackson.

That brings us to the dark horse contender, Gary Whitford. Whitford says he is "not as well known," as the others, and offers what most would agree is an unorthodox approach to the issues. Is this a deliberate attempt to garner support for an underdog? Or is Whitford simply a person who puts his personal beliefs ahead of the opinions of others.

We believe the latter. Where others say the system needs more money, Whitford says "Education does not equal dollars," that we can't simply throw money at the problem; where others say they want to serve, Whitford says he doesn't particularly want to, but feels it is a necessity and a responsibility; where others stress preparing students for jobs, he stresses making them "responsible, caring adults."

Candidates answer questions

What are your qualifications to serve?

Dean: I am a graduate of Michigan State University and have many years of business experience which I feel would be of great benefit in areas of budget, financial analysis and future planning. I also have gained valuable experience serving as president of Jaycees, Rotary Club and Chamber of Commerce. I am currently a trustee of Clinton Memorial Hospital and Clinton Area Care Center. I serve on the Parking and Cable TV committees for the city of St. Johns and coach a little league softball team. I belong to the First Congregational Church of St. Johns.

What would you change if elected?

Dean: I would suggest: 1.) A refinement of the new board meeting format, which stifles spontaneity and leaves one frustrated when one hears something that he may want to comment on, but is unable to respond because he did not "reserve" the right earlier or must speak after action has already been taken. 2.) That we work to establish a positive, open, honest communications system, one that promotes good working relationships between the board, community, administration and staff.

Do you believe schools or a school should be closed if enrollment continues to decline?

Dean: The district-wide census currently being taken should give us a better idea on future enrollment, and should a further decline be indicated, the closing of one or more schools must be considered.

Should teachers be allowed to strike?

Dean: Teachers strikes are illegal. I would, however, strive to settle staff contracts before frustration developed into a strike.

What is your opinion of the superintendent's recommendation to close East Olive and East Essex elementary schools?

Dean: Faced with declining enrollment, most people would agree that a school might have to be closed. Those persons also add "as long as it isn't mine." At first glance, the cost savings as presented make the closing of East Olive and East Essex attractive; however, I must concur with the board's decision to further study for the following reasons: 1.) A savings of \$50,000 will be realized due to staff reduction even with no schools being closed — the study implied this came from closing East Olive and East Essex. 2.) The entire matter seemed to be rushed, with no time for public input in the planning stages. A proper procedure must be followed in developing and presenting a proposal.

• **James L. Graham, 42, of Rt. 3, St. Johns, is a dairy farmer. He and his wife Ardith have three children who attend St. Johns schools. He has lived in the school district 36 years.**

Why are you seeking election?

Graham: I am seeking election because I am not satisfied with the quality of education that my children are receiving.

What are your qualifications to serve?

Graham: I graduated from St. Johns High School in 1959 and have attended many short courses since. I am and have been active in many community and state organizations. I also have business management experience, being a farmer.

What would you change if elected?

Graham: I would change the way the meetings are being conducted to allow for more CITIZEN input on topics that are being discussed by the board.

Do you believe schools or a school should be closed if enrollment continues to decline?

Graham: In the future, there will have to be some schools closed if enrollment continues to decline. But at the present time, I think that we should wait until the census is completed to make any decisions.

Should teachers be allowed to strike?

Graham: At the present time I don't think that they should be able to strike, because of the law that says public employees are forbidden to strike. When the law is changed, fine.

What is your opinion of the superintendent's recommendation to close East Olive and East Essex elementary schools?

We like his style. In a campaign with many "hot" issues — salaries, school closings, staffing — it has been Whitford, we feel, who has made the least effort to dodge tough questions and tricky issues.

Moreover, we feel his viewpoint would be welcome as a means of stimulating discussion, at least. The constant refrain seems to be "communication" and "credibility." Both, we believe, are enhanced by the introduction of new views and the resulting discussion. What better communication than seeing elected officials consider and explain their votes before the public; what better credibility than knowing why decisions are made?

We give this round to the dark horse, mainly because his unique style has found its mark in Craig's failure to stimulate frank discussion of issues by board members, which in turn fosters public confidence.

Therefore, we urge voters to select William Jackson and Gary Whitford on June 13.

Graham: At the present time, I think that the recommendation should be given more study.

• **Bill Jackson, 39, of Rt. 3, Mead Road, St. Johns, is a lawyer. He and his wife Yvonne have two children who attend St. Joseph School. He has lived in the St. Johns school district 11 years.**

Why are you seeking election?

Jackson: I am very concerned that decision-making in our school district is delayed or put off until a crisis develops. I would like to offer leadership to encourage the district to attempt to anticipate problems before they become a crisis, in order to provide more time for a planned, deliberate resolution of problems.

What are your qualifications to serve?

Jackson: I believe my experience as a former cost accountant, former assistant attorney general, and practicing attorney will be helpful.

What would you change if elected?

Jackson: We must control spending. Only by controlling spending can we meaningfully discuss and decide school programs, salaries for teachers and other matters.

Do you believe schools or a school should be closed if enrollment continues to decline?

Jackson: Yes, but the question remains as to which school or schools should be closed.

Should teachers be allowed to strike?

Jackson: Yes, as a last resort.

What is your opinion of the superintendent's recommendation to close East Olive and East Essex elementary schools?

Jackson: I disagree, because the recommendation is premised on the fact that Central School would remain open. In order for Central School to remain open, several hundreds of thousands of dollars in renovation will have to be completed. I do not believe this is a wise expenditure of public monies. Instead, I am in favor of closing Central.

• **Gary D. Whitford, 39, of 7596 Chandler Road, St. Johns, is a tool designer. He and his wife, Judy, have four children in St. Johns Schools. He has lived in the school district 16 years.**

Why are you seeking election?

Whitford: Several people approached me about running the past and again this year. This time, however, I came to the realization that the responsibility for new direction started with me and the time was now.

What are your qualifications to serve?

Whitford: 1.) A taxpayer in the school district for 16 years; 2.) Four children in St. Johns Public Schools; 3.) A deep and abiding concern about items one and two, as well as everyone else's children and tax dollars.

What would you change if elected?

Whitford: I would make a serious attempt at being responsive to the public's needs and demands. Some ways of accomplishing this would be personal contacts, phone contacts, mailings and grocery store polls concerning upcoming or controversial issues. Also, I would continue to make decisions as I have in the past, prayerfully and, I trust, with the prayers of many others to help me.

Do you believe schools or a school should be closed if enrollment continues to decline?

Whitford: We have to face the fact that declining enrollment is a problem. However, leaving any community without a school is not elimination of fat. It is more like surgically removing an arm or leg in order to lose weight.

Should teachers be allowed to strike?

Whitford: A slim majority of teachers can decide that all should strike. I do feel that, given the present economic and social issues, the teachers were very wise not to strike at this time.

What is your opinion of the superintendent's recommendation to close East Olive and East Essex elementary schools?

Whitford: I feel it was shortsighted and, in his own words, "clinical." That is, it didn't consider people's feelings and wishes. It may have been appropriate for decisions involving machinery, but not when the future of people are involved.

Eagle girls repeat as state champions

As his Fowler girls track team celebrated its second consecutive state Class D championship, coach Kim Spalsbury pondered a question.

"In the hotel afterwards, while we were celebrating, some of the parents asked me, 'What makes us better than the other teams?'" Spalsbury recalled. "I said, 'They're just class kids and they come through when the pressure's on.'"

The pressure was certainly on at Traverse City High School Saturday. Fowler won by the narrowest of margins, 58½-58, over Ann Arbor Greenhills. Fowler became the state

champion after a series of incredible events. With two events to go, Greenhills had a 8½-point lead. Spalsbury had lost hope.

"We thought Greenhills had too many points coming up," he said.

When a Greenhills runner finished fifth in the 3,200-meter run, it apparently clinched the team championship. Fowler's Emily Feldpausch had finished seventh, but it wasn't high enough.

But Fowler stayed alive when the Greenhills runner was disqualified for running inside the track three times. A runner from Colon was disqualified for the same infraction, moving Feldpausch up to fifth place.

Even with those breaks, Fowler's chances seemed no better in the meet's final event, the 1,600-meter relay. Fowler had to win and Greenhills, the second seeded team, had to finish fourth for the Eagles to win the championship.

Fowler got the help it needed when Grass Lake and Covert dropped their best times by five seconds apiece and bumped Greenhills down to fourth.

But that was only a sliver of the slew of miracles that put Fowler in position to win the title. As Spalsbury said: "Everything that had to happen for us happened for us."

Jan Schmidt, entered in the slow heat of the 400-meter dash, was able to

run in the fast heat when another coach scratched his runner at the last minute. Pushed by fast competition, Schmidt finished sixth.

Cindy Schneider was entered in the slow heat of the 800-meter run, but another late scratch enabled her to join the fast heat and teammate Lana Hafner. Schneider passed Hafner with 130 yards to go, then watched an inspired Hafner pass six people to finish fourth.

Becky Klein won both the 200- and 400-meter events and anchored both the 800- and 1,600-meter relay teams to victories.

Spalsbury didn't want to discount Klein's performance. But he also

didn't want to downplay the importance of Schneider.

"Cindy was the only one we took that didn't score in the meet, but her presence made a big difference for Lana," he said. "Becky couldn't have done it alone. It's what all the other people did that was important."

"Lana doesn't ordinarily look as tired as she did in that point of the race. She said to me later, 'I was tired, but when Cindy came by, I said I had to get going.'"

The state championship ends an era of excellence for Fowler track, as Klein, Hafner and Feldpausch will hang up their high school spikes. In the last three years, that trio has

accounted for 24 Central Michigan Athletic Conference first-place medals.

"That's what made it extremely special for all of us," said Spalsbury. "Those kids got to go out on top."

Fowler baseball team loses a heartbreaker

Track leaders

When Fowler sophomore Joe Bertram woke up on Saturday, he could not have imagined himself as the state Class D discus champion.

He had a modest goal for the meet at Traverse City. "Seventh or eighth place," he said.

But when the last disc was flung, Bertram stood above all the rest of the throwers with a school-record distance of 148-0.

"I was more relaxed than normal," Bertram said. "I had nothing to lose, and I just went after it. I just used a smooth release instead of trying to throw it hard."

Bertram's state title surprised many coaches because he wasn't seeded in the top flight of discus throwers. His early tosses may have intimidated some of the favored competitors, according to Fowler coach Tom O'Rourke.

"He had a problem being nervous, and he wasn't really that nervous," O'Rourke said. "We convinced him he could throw with those guys. His first three were all over 140, and it put a little pressure on them."

Simon were locked in a superb duel. Dunigan struck out 11 — five in the final two innings. Simon struck out nine and allowed only three hits.

Doug Leik's two-out RBI single in the third inning doomed Simon and the Eagles.

Earlier, Fowler rallied for two runs in the eighth to beat Saranac, 8-6. A bases-loaded error with two outs by the Saranac shortstop allowed Bill Kohagen and Steve Weber to score.

Fowler softball ends

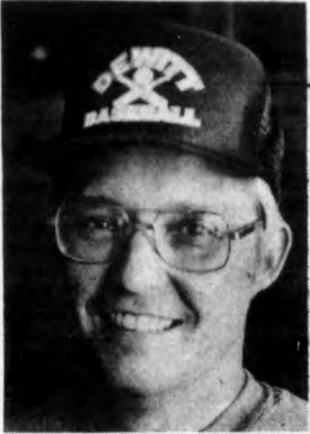
Webberville halted Fowler's softball season last week by clubbing the Eagles, 14-4, in five innings in Class D district action at Portland.

Klein will run one leg on the Michigan mile relay team, and Koenigsknecht will long jump in the meet, which brings together the finest high school track athletes in Michigan, Ohio, Illinois and Indiana.

Koenigsknecht is a three-time champion in the Class D long jump. He jumped 23-0¼ last week in Traverse City to win his final state meet.

Klein has captured three state titles in the 400-meter dash and one in the 200 meters. She has also been a part of five state championship relay teams.

Bath's mile relay places at 'C' meet

Bath did not enjoy a banner Class C state meet at Bangor last Saturday.

"It's not like somebody winning the 100, 220 and long jump. This is really a milestone in conditioning and training. This girl must have a 48-pound heart."

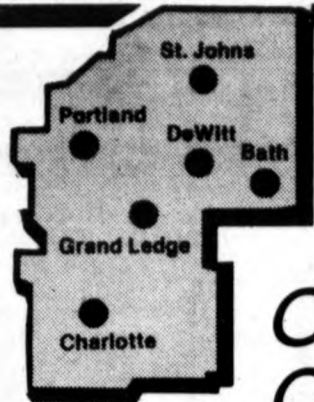
