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Whitford, Craig win

Voters preferred new faces to incumbents in many school districts during Monday's annual school election. A light voter turnout in all of the county's six districts was blamed on a lack of millage requests and, ironically, good weather.

"I think the farmers just didn't want to come out of their fields," said a spokesperson in one rural district. Busy catching up on chores after poor early spring weather, many preferred work to voting, she explained.

Rural voters turned out in St. Johns, however, to boost Gary Whitford to victory. Whitford swept all but one rural precinct to earn the top vote total in a five-candidate race for two board seats. Whitford, 39, of 7596 Chandler Rd., a tool designer for Oldsmobile, earned 780 votes to win a two year term on the St. Johns board. The only rural district Whitford failed to carry was that of James Graham, where he lost by one vote. Graham finished third, with 622 votes.

The second place finisher in the race was incumbent Board President Bob Craig, who won a third two-year term on the board with 647 votes. Craig, 32, of 812 W. Park St., is a Michigan Farm Bureau employee, and was named president of the board a year ago when then president Ron Huard did not seek re-election.

Next in the balloting was Graham, 42, of Rt. 3, a dairy farmer. Graham's 622 votes came mainly in rural precincts, a school district spokesperson said.

He was followed by St. Johns attorney Bill Jackson, 39, of Mead Road, who earned a total of 537 votes.

Last among the five candidates was Barry Dean, owner of Dean's True Value Hardware. Dean, 40, of 905 W. McConnell St., earned 519 votes, carrying most city precincts but failing to win many votes in rural areas.

A total of 1,177 voters cast 3,356 votes in the annual school election, according to unofficial Tuesday totals.

Elsewhere in Clinton County:

•**BATH** — Jo Miller and Richard Wilkins emerged winners in a four-way race for two seats on the Bath school board.

Mrs. Miller, a former school cafeteria employee and Bath resident for 31 years, was the top vote earner, with 297.

She was followed by Wilkins, 47, an accountant and current president of the school board. Wilkins, a lifetime resident of the school district, earned 329 votes.

Tied for third place with 249 votes were candidates Thomas H. White, 43, of 12645 Kruger Ln., DeWitt, a salesman; and Judith Penrod, 42, of 14311 Chandler Rd., Bath, a registered nurse.

A district spokesperson called the turnout of 646 voters "medium," and gave a pair of millage requests credit.

•**DEWITT** — Only 179 voters showed up at the polls in DeWitt, and they chose David P. Harfst over his opponent, James C. Ryan, by a margin of only three votes, 85-82.

Both are 41-year-old residents of Geneva Drive, DeWitt, and both are consultants. Both are newcomers, and Harfst will replace Diane Cranmer, who did not seek re-election. "With no millage on the ballot, (voters) place very little importance on an election," a spokesperson said of the small turnout.

•**OVID-ELSIE** — Voters returned incumbent treasurer Merle Green to the board, but rejected incumbent vice-president Burton Case in favor of challenger Edward W. Thornton.

Thornton, of 5280 N. Shepardsville Rd., Elsie, won the most votes, with 577.

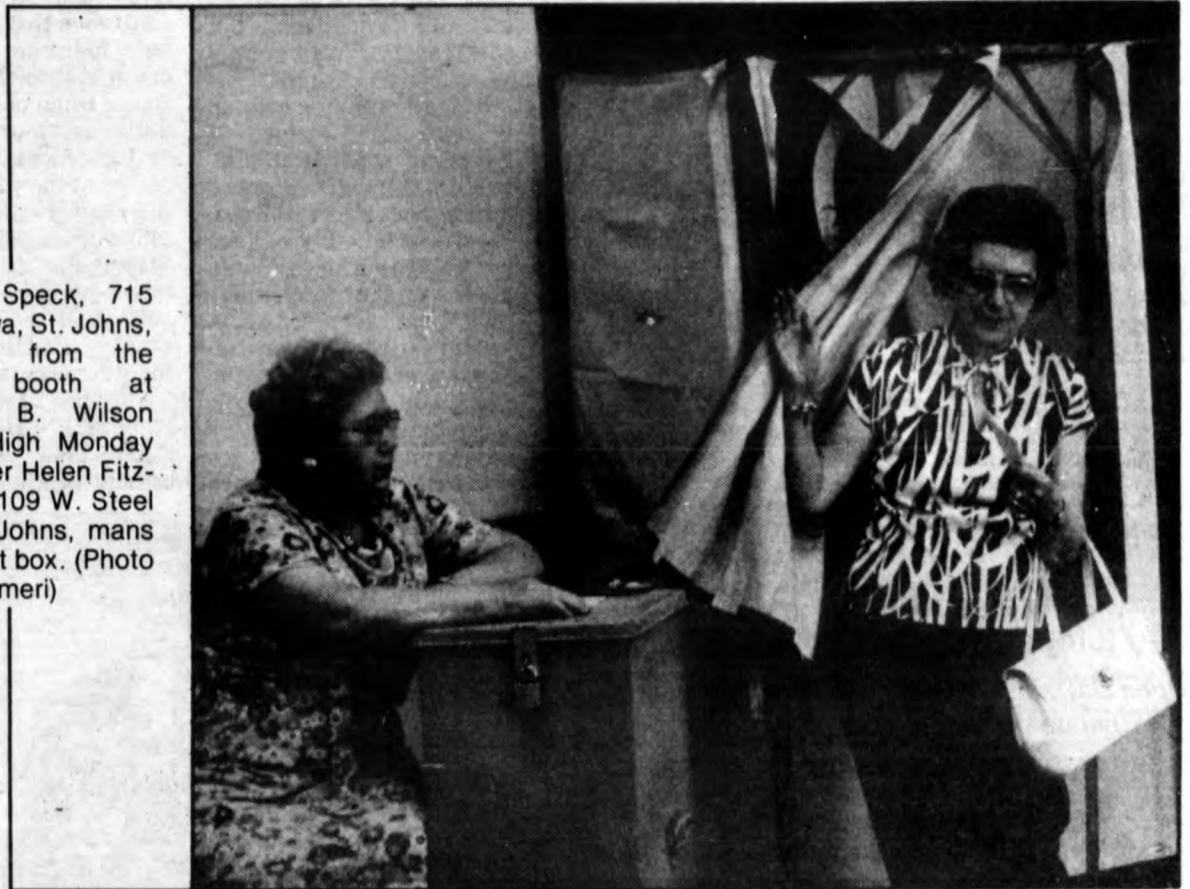
He was followed by Green, with 463; Case, with 395; Arthur E. Kelley, 7580 Welter Rd., Ovid, with 304; and Robert S. Parker of 5153 N. Chandler, Elsie, with 189.

A total of 936 votes were cast by about 465 voters, a turnout called "quite light" by a district spokesperson.

•**FOWLER** — Ruth Feldpausch, who was unopposed for one seat on the board, was re-elected with a total of 337 votes. Turnout was called "very light."

•**PEWAMO-WESTPHALIA** — Anthony Thelen, unopposed for re-election, earned 220 votes. "It was a lower turnout than usual because we had only one candidate," Superintendent Roy Thelen said.

Local credit union charged with sexual harassment suit

Roy Ebert, manager of the St. Johns Michigan Federal Credit Union, has been replaced following a lawsuit charging Ebert and the credit union's board of directors with sexual harassment of five local women employees.

The women have charged Ebert and the credit union with several counts of sexual harassment, and are seeking at least \$40,000 in damages in a Clinton County Circuit Court lawsuit.

In the suit filed Wednesday, June 8, four former employees and one woman still working at the State Street office accuse Ebert of verbal and physical sexual harassment, including "repeated sexual demands, unconsented touching, and propositions to engage in sex."

The complaint says Ebert created an "intimidating, hostile and offensive employee environment," and subjected the women to "ridicule, public humiliation and embarrassment before co-workers." Requesting the circuit court minimum amount of \$10,000 on two counts and \$20,000 on a third, they will seek an undetermined amount of damages for "metal anguish, humiliation, loss of benefits and attorney fees," documents in the county clerk's office say.

Ebert, who was mayor of St. Johns from 1974 to 1977, was elected to city council in 1970. He was an unsuccessful candidate for the St. Johns school board last June. Reached at his home Friday afternoon, he refused to comment on the lawsuit.

Mary Michaels has replaced Ebert as acting manager, but Ms. Michaels and Don Messer, credit union board president, both refused to comment on Ebert's status or a decision to change all locks at the credit union last Friday afternoon.

Those charging Ebert and the board are Credit Union employee Sherri Jokpe and four other former employees who have either quit or been laid off: Christine Brawner, LuAnn Feldpausch, Yvonne Makara and Tammie Witt. All of the women are "in their 20s," according to their attorney, Edith Harsh, an Okemos lawyer who specializes in sexual harassment and labor cases.

Members of the Credit Union Board were also named in the suit, which alleges negligence, saying the board was notified of the problem but failed to warn or replace Ebert. Board members are Messer, Jack Desprez, Sue

Peterson, Robert Eldridge, Eldon Baese, Orville Sillman, John Bradley, Ace Linman, Marvin Nunemaker and Adam Bailey.

According to state and federal officials, a complaint was filed with the Michigan Civil Rights Commission and the federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission on Jan. 18, 1983. The state and federal agencies notified the Credit Union 10 days later, on Jan. 28, a spokesman for the state agency said.

Public Information Officer James Horn said action on the complaint will be suspended, awaiting resolution of the lawsuit, and called the group action relatively rare. "We have not seen many jointly filed complaints of sexual harassment," said Horn, whose office handles 400 to 600 labor complaints each month. "But thanks to reports in the media and more awareness, it is no longer a closet matter."

The January complaint was made by Ms. Jopke, Ms. Brawner and Ms. Feldpausch, and by Cindy Weber of Fowler. Miss Weber is no longer interested in pursuing the complaint, however, and wants nothing to do with the lawsuit, her mother said on her behalf Monday.

Only one of the five women could be reached for comment, and she referred questions to Ms. Harsh, who would not comment on facts which are not already part of the public record. Ms. Harsh did say, however, that complaints were made to Ebert and board members on more than one occasion, and pointed out the women are seeking monetary damages, not reinstatement in their former jobs at the credit union.

Reached at his home, Ebert said "no comment," and referred questions to Credit Union attorney Paul Maples. Maples, however, said he would not represent Ebert or the board in the case, which has been referred to the Credit Union's insurance carriers.

Meanwhile, board members have been in touch with Lansing labor attorney Lawrence Schneider, Schneider said. "I've advised them to contact their insurance companies and see if this is covered under any of their policies," he said of the potentially costly lawsuit.

Ms. Harsh said she does not expect a hearing set for June 20 to be held on schedule because, to her knowledge, the Credit Union has not yet found legal counsel.

The hearing before Circuit Judge Timothy Green is for consideration of Ms. Harsh's request for a change of venue. Citing the fact that Ebert is a former mayor of St. Johns, and that most of the 7,000 members of the credit union live in Clinton County, she has asked that the trial be moved. She also pointed out that the savings and lending institution was begun as a credit union for Federal Mogul, a large employer in the county.

Accident fatal

Drinking was involved in a crash which left five area young people injured and claimed the life of one of Fowler's top athletes and students in the just-graduated Class of 1983.

The two-car collision in Dallas Township early Saturday morning killed 19-year-old Jim Farley Jr., Walker Rd., Fowler, and left Kathy Geller, 21, of W. Clinton, Fowler, in critical condition at Lansing's Sparrow Hospital.

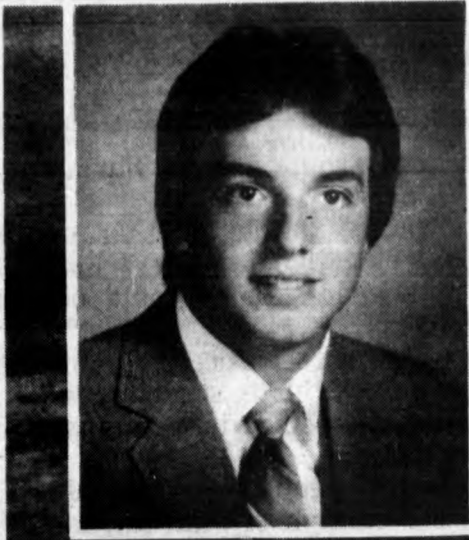
Farley, a National Honor Society student and star athlete in four sports at Fowler High School, was pronounced dead at Ionia Memorial Hospital after the accident near 1 a.m., Clinton County Sheriff's Deputies said. Miss Geller, a passenger in a vehicle struck by Farley's, was listed in critical condition Monday at Lansing's Sparrow Hospital.

Farley was driving north on Jones Road near 1 a.m. Saturday when he ran a stop sign at M-21, reports said. A vehicle eastbound on M-21, driven by Jeffrey Jegla, 18, of 8565 W. Price, St. Johns, struck Farley's vehicle in the left front corner, deputies said.

Farley's passenger, Dale Wohlfert, 18, of 450 N. Main St., Fowler, was taken to Ionia Memorial and treated for multiple cuts and bruises.

Two of Jegla's passengers — Gail Hengesbach, 18, of 14546 W. Price, Westphalia, and Dennis Jegla, of 8950 W. Pratt, St. Johns — were treated and released at Ionia Memorial. A third passenger, Diane Martin, 18, of 13365 Price, Fowler, was treated and released at Clinton Memorial Hospital. Jeffrey Jegla was not treated, Ionia Memorial officials said.

Though details of the accident were sketchy, Clinton County Sheriff Anthony Hufnagel said occupants in both cars had been drinking and speculated a graduation party may have been involved.



"There probably was some drinking involved, but I really can't tell you to what extent," Hufnagel said on Monday. "We don't have any tests back. Nothing has established that anybody was intoxicated."

Miss Hengesbach denied any reports of drinking in the Jegla car, and said that none of the occupants had been to a party.

No citations for alcohol usage have been issued, though the incident is still under investigation, Hufnagel said.

Farley was a top athlete and student at Fowler, earning all-conference honors in football, basketball and baseball as well as academic top ten honors.

Playing centerfield on the Fowler baseball team this spring, Farley also found time to long jump and run sprints for the track team. He qualified for the state Class D track meet in the 440-yard relay before dropping out with an injury.

"He was such a competitor in the classroom and on the athletic field," said Denny Smith, a teacher and basketball coach at Fowler. "The guy was a winner, no matter what he did. He wanted so badly to excel, and he did."

Farley is survived by his parents, James and Theresa (Thelen) Farley; a brother, Kenneth Lee Farley; and three sisters, Sue M. Farley, Lisa M. Farley and Mae L. Farley, all of Fowler; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Otto Thelen of Westphalia.

Farley's death a shock in Fowler

Denny Smith remembers how Jim Farley used to muscle his 5-foot-9 frame in position for rebounds for the Fowler High School basketball team.

But he also remembers how Farley charmed his nine-year-old son, Craig.

"Jimmy was every little kid's favorite," Smith said. "He loved little kids."

Craig, like most residents of Fowler, a little village on the western side of Clinton County, was in for a shock Saturday morning. He was watching cartoons when his mother broke the news about Farley's death in a car accident.

"He turned off the television, went up on the couch and stayed there until supper," said Smith as he took a break from a baseball practice where he was coaching Craig. "He's really torn up. He's got a lot of questions."

Farley's death rocked Fowler from end to end, according to coaches, teachers and friends who knew him and the lives he touched.

"Jim had a part in a lot of people's lives," said Steve Spicer, Fowler's head football coach and athletic director. "Jim's one of those kids that a lot of people know — not just at Fowler but in a lot of schools around the league."

Spicer's assessment was supported by St. Johns senior Steve Gonzales, who starred in football, basketball and track for his school just as Farley did at Fowler.

"Everybody knew Jim Farley," Gonzales said. "It (his death) was quite the shocker. We don't compete with them in football, but everybody on the team knew about him. He's very competitive."

"He had everything going for him. That was the reaction from all my friends — he had everything going for him."

Dave Koenigsnecht, a friend of Farley's since first grade, competed in football, basketball and track with him.

"We both just loved sports," said Koenigsnecht, a three-time state Class D long-jump champion. "We played a lot together and got along well. We competed against each other a lot."

Spicer put Farley at tailback for his senior season, and he responded with a school-record 1,037 yards and 92 points.

"Jim was a leader by his actions," Spicer said. "We only had six seniors this year, and Jim was one of the big people that brought us together as a team."

In basketball, Farley was a feisty power forward on a very small team. "Jimmy was the finest 5-foot-9 rebounder that I've ever seen," Smith said. "And when he was hot, we got the ball to him. He was our leading scorer."

Farley had been lifting weights and exercising an injured knee in preparation for summer football drills at Albion College.

"I saw him everyday last week at the high school, lifting weights and treating the knee in the whirlpool," said Kim Spalsbury, Fowler girls' track coach and Farley's former English teacher. "He was working on meeting his next challenge."

"I guess he'll never get the chance to meet that challenge now."

ORDINANCE NO. 7 Resolution For Imposition of PROPERTY TAX ADMINISTRATION FEE

WHEREAS, the Township of Riley, Clinton County, Michigan, is a township with responsibility for the assessing of ad valorem property taxes, the collecting of property tax levies and the handling of review and appeal matters arising therefrom, and

WHEREAS, 1982 PA 503 provides for, among other things, the imposition of a property tax administration fee on property taxes; and,

WHEREAS, 1982 PA 503 provides that a property tax administration fee shall not be imposed for levies that become a lien in 1983 or any year thereafter unless a township board shall approve and authorize imposition of the same by resolution or ordinance; and,

WHEREAS, it is the desire of this Township Board to approve and authorize the imposition of a property tax administration fee in accordance with the provisions of 1982 PA 503.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED by the Township Board of the Township of Riley, Clinton County, Michigan, that:

1. The Township of Board does hereby approve and authorize the imposition of a property tax administration fee of one (1%) percent on all sums voluntarily paid for property taxes before February 15 of the succeeding year in which the same shall become due and payable.

2. That as used in this resolution, the term "property tax administration fee" is defined as a fee to offset costs incurred by the Township of Riley in assessing property values, collecting the property tax levies and in the review and appeal processes.

3. That if apprehensive of the loss of personal property tax assessed upon the roll, the Township Treasurer may enforce collection of the tax at any time, and if compelled to seize property or bring an action in December shall add one (1%) percent for a property tax administration fee.

4. The Treasurer is hereby directed and authorized to take such steps as may be necessary to implement the provisions of this Resolution.

5. This Resolution shall apply to all property tax levies that shall become a lien in 1983 or any year thereafter and this Resolution shall continue in full force, and effect unless and until revoked or rescinded by resolution of this Township Board.

6. That in addition the Township Board hereby reserves the right and authority to waive all or part of the property tax administration fee imposed by this Resolution for a specific tax levy and collection period by the adoption of a resolution to that effect.

7. All resolutions or parts of resolution in conflict with the provisions of this resolution be and the same hereby are rescinded.

Fowler's tragic loss is reminder for all

The tragic death of Jim Farley, one of Clinton County's finest scholar athletes, should serve as a reminder to us all.

Jim ran a stop sign and sped onto M-21 early Saturday morning near Fowler. An oncoming vehicle struck his auto in the left front corner, killing the 19-year-old Fowler High School graduate and injuring five other young people.

Clinton County Sheriff Anthony Hufnagel said occupants in both cars had been drinking. Though no one has openly admitted it, the drinking may have started at one of many graduation parties going on Friday night.

Fatal accidents like Farley's seem to occur every year at this time, when high school seniors hit the streets to celebrate their freedom. The old refrain, "No more classroom, no more books," has been replaced by a shorter phrase: "Let's party."

Graduation parties may seem like innocent ways to commemorate a once-in-a-lifetime achievement. But they can also result in tragedy. Law enforcement officials dread the weeks when another class graduates, as do hospital emergency personnel and ambulance crews. They have seen it so many times before — needless deaths, young people maimed or killed, their lives destroyed or

Jaws of Life helps in rescue

Practice paid off for the St. Johns volunteer fire department last week when it used the Jaws of Life rescue tool for the first time in a real-life situation.

Firemen needed about 10 minutes to extract Leon Vine, Jr., 44, of Lansing, from a battered El Camino as it rested on US-27 near French Road. Sparrow Hospital officials credited that quick action with helping to save Vine's life.

"We've probably cut eight to 10 cars apart in drills," said St. Johns Fire Chief Clare Maier. "I think the training paid off in this case."

When Maier surveyed the vehicle's condition, he decided to use the Jaws of Life. Firemen dispersed to handle different responsibilities, with John Kochenspargar grabbing the Jaws of Life.

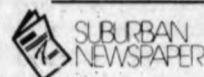
Stationed on the driver's side, Kochenspargar started cutting off the roof. He later handed the Jaws of Life to fireman Rick Knight, who cut the back corner on the passenger side. Then the firemen peeled back the roof.

Knight finished the job by cutting open the passenger door. Then Vine was transported by Ashley ambulance to Clinton Memorial Hospital. Vine was listed in serious condition in the intensive care unit of Sparrow on Mon-

Decision desired

The decision to delay action on closing any St. Johns elementary schools until December has frustrated parents of Central Elementary School.

They want the board to decide this summer because they feel the delay will only widen the rift between city and country residents in the school district.

"I think it's a very unpleasant decision, and the sooner it's made, the sooner the wounds will heal," said Jenny McCampbell, a Central parent and originator of the Central PTO.

McCampbell said Central parents share her feelings of discontent with the board's decision to delay the possible closing of East Essex and East Olive schools until December.

"Our whole Central PTO feels that way," McCampbell said. "I would guess that most taxpayers would feel that way, too."

Board members have voted to appoint a committee of three trustees — Peter Apostol, Lee Ormston and Marion Kurnz — to recommend later if a citizen's committee should be named.

McCampbell disagrees with people who want to see a citizen's committee appointed. She feels that citizens have already had enough input.

"It's ultimately the school board's decision," she said.

In other action, board members authorized purchase of eighth grade physical science materials — mostly textbooks — for a maximum of \$17,000.

Resurfacing of the southern half of the high school parking lot was also approved for a maximum of \$45,000.

Beverly Baker, principal of East Essex Elementary School, announced her retirement, effective July 1.

The truth in taxation hearing for the budget was set for June 22, at 8 p.m.

P-W pressbox gets new look

Coaches, announcers and reporters will no longer have to freeze at Pewamo-Westphalia football games.

Student workers have been putting the finishing touches on a renovated press box which includes a new level and six glass windows. Before, the press box had only two levels and was open to the elements.

"It's just a total improvement," said P-W Athletic Director Bonnie Somero.

Two coaches, Kurt Mabie and Steve Spitzley, proposed the renovation last December, after concluding that the press box was too small. They were also concerned about the roof, which they felt was not safe.

So the coaches came up with a plan to raise money by selling submarine sandwiches and candy. "We're basically the financial wizards behind the thing," joked Mabie, the assistant varsity football coach.

Students sold 8,300 submarine sandwiches, which raised \$4,300 for the press box and other school projects, Mabie said.

The money paid for about \$4,000-\$5,000 worth of materials from Westphalia Builders, Mabie said. Labor was provided by students in the Clinton Intermediate School District's Shared Time building program.

Most of the workers were Pewamo-Westphalia students taught by instructor Ben Wieber. But students from Fowler, Bath and DeWitt also helped with the renovation.

The finished press box has a new 12-foot by 30-foot level atop the old 12-foot by 18-foot level. It also has a reinforced roof.

Athletes and non-athletes alike pitched in to help with the project, Mabie said. A P-W art student, junior Patty Arens, made her contribution by making a body outline of a Pirate — the school's mascot.

Arens' creation is 4½-foot by 4-foot and is mounted on the press box facing toward the high school.

"It's a lot like the New England Patriots emblem," Mabie said.

Fowler athletes garner respect at champions meet

Becky Klein is a household name to everyone who follows track and field in Fowler.

But when she travels to a different state for a meet — like last Saturday's Midwest Meet of Champions at Fort Wayne, Ind. — her reputation remains in Clinton County.

"There was some question, if you looked at the paper, whether Becky belonged there," said Fowler girls coach Kim Spalsbury. "Her times were only the seventh and eighth best in the state."

Leading the skeptics were Klein's teammates on the Michigan girls team. Of the four girls on Michigan's 1,600-meter relay team, Klein was the only one not from a Class A school. Michigan's anchor runner, Dieder Bradley of Pontiac Central, was particularly worried about the small-town girl.

"She asked me a lot of questions," Klein said. "She wanted to see how I was, because I had the slowest time going in. I think she was scared."

"She just kept asking me question after question. She was like a reporter."

"I think she was worried about Beck blowing it," said Fowler's Dave Koenigsknecht, who competed in the

boys long jump at the same meet.

The race began when South Lyon's Sue Tomanec ran a 58.0 split for 400 meters. She handed the baton to Klein, who proceeded to run the fastest 400-meter time of her life — 55.9. Carline Isabell of Flint Northern and Bradley brought the baton home in first place.

Bradley had a message for Klein after the race. "You surprised the hell out of me," she said.

(Bradley's split time of 55.3 was the only one faster than Klein's on the relay.)

For Koenigsknecht, the day began with a jump of 21-6 in the preliminaries of the long jump. Since many of the

jumpers came in with personal bests beyond 23 feet, he figured his day was done. But the jump qualified him for the final round in seventh place.

In the finals, he scratched on a potential 23-foot jump and fell backwards when he landed after another long leap. But his final jump measured 22-5, which was good for fourth place. Lansing Everett's Scott Reed finished third at 22-7.

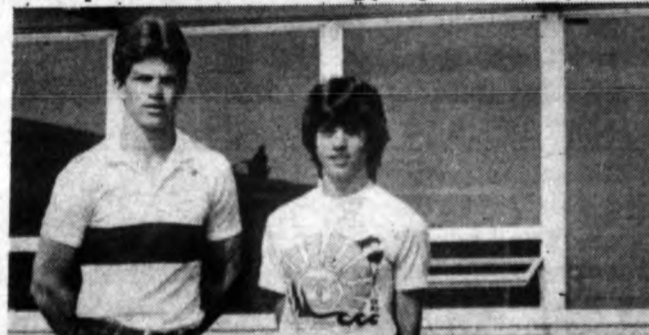
Koenigsknecht, like most of the jumpers, was nowhere near his personal best. He attributed that to the long jump runway and pit.

"The board was good, it was even angled uphill," Koenigsknecht said. "But the pit was angled up with the board. It was up about a foot — not from the board, but 10 feet down the runway, the runway was angled up."

"I've watched it for five years, and I've never seen anybody jump over 24 feet," said Spalsbury.

Klein and Koenigsknecht put Fowler on the minds of many people in Fort Wayne — people who had never even heard of the town.

"A lot of people were very impressed that a school our size had a kid there," said Spalsbury. "And many schools don't have two. It will probably be a very, very long time before we ever get another kid down there, if we ever do."

DeWitt softball season ends

Larry Baird had seen just about everything this year as coach of the injury-riddled yet combative DeWitt softball team. Then came an amazing incident last Saturday.

Ann Arbor Gabriel Richard had just beaten the Panthers, 6-1, in a regional opener in Ann Arbor when the Michigan Center coach addressed the Gabriel Richard coach. Baird overheard the following conversation.

Michigan Center coach: "Now you're going to play a good team."

Gabriel Richard coach: "As far as I'm concerned, the championship game has already been played."

Gabriel Richard, which went on to win the regional and advance to the state semifinals, had nothing but nice things to say about the 16-12 Panthers.

"They didn't have enough compliments for us," said Baird, whose club loses only one senior. "He (the coach) said we were in the same situation they were three years ago, when they had a lot of young players. The last two years they've been dominant."

Alicia Seegert, Gabriel Richard's pitcher who is bound for the University of Michigan on a full-ride scholarship for softball, was certainly dominant against the Panthers. DeWitt got one hit — a single by Tami Deak in the seventh inning.

"We were just hitting it at people," Baird said. "We hit the ball hard three, four, five times, but just at people. We put the ball in play, but you can't direct speed."

DeWitt jumped to a 1-0 lead when Toni Hufnagel scampered to third base on a throwing error by Seegert. Deak laid down a squeeze bunt to score Hufnagel.

Gabriel Richard scratched two runs off DeWitt sophomore pitcher Sheila Milner in the fourth on a walk, an error, a passed ball and a fielder's choice.

The winners, 27-7, bunched four of their seven hits off Milner in the sixth to score four runs.

Milner, 15-11, finished with six strikeouts.

After the game, four Panthers were named to the 11-player All-Region team. Catcher Lisa Ives, outfielder Hufnagel, pitcher Milner and second baseman Rikki Bouts each made the first team.

DeWitt girls voted out of crown

First came a championship. Then came a co-championship.

Then came a tie for second place with Mason, and a ton of disappointment for the DeWitt girls' track team.

The Panthers won the dual-meet portion of the Capital Circuit race and left the league meet at Eaton Rapids thinking they were co-champions with Charlotte. The league meet on May 25 ended with Charlotte scoring 141½ points, DeWitt 119 and Mason 118½.

But when Mason coach Jim Glazier saw the results in the Lansing State Journal, he phoned Eaton Rapids with a protest. Mason long jumper Peggy Davis was listed in fifth place, but her best jump was good enough for fourth place. Eaton Rapids officials had listed her second-best jump as her best.

Eaton Rapids athletic director Tim Culver acknowledged the error and promised Glazier he would bring it up when the league athletic directors met on June 1. The athletic directors discussed it and voted 4-1, with DeWitt dissenting and Lansing Catholic Central absent, to give Davis fourth place.

That left Mason in second place with 120½ points, and DeWitt in third with 120. Charlotte was awarded the league championship. The Panthers and Bulldogs tied for second.

To support his stance, DeWitt athletic director Ron Mead cited the National Federation track rule book, which states that a clerical error must be called to the attention of the meet director within 30 minutes of the completion of the meet.

Though Mason athletic director Mike Clear argued that Glazier noticed the mistake as soon as he could have, Mead favored a strict interpretation of the 30-minute clause.

"From a technical standpoint, I could vote no and be 100 percent correct," Mead said. "But if you want to talk about being fair, the actual performances should determine the standings, not a clerical mistake. I guess I support that (the majority's) standpoint."

DeWitt coach Barry Kloenhamer found no fault with crediting Davis for her performance. But he found plenty of fault with officials from Eaton Rapids who ran the meet.

He pinpointed three instances where he said meet officials cost DeWitt points — instances which he believes cost his girls a co-championship. The events were:

- The 880-yard relay.

DeWitt was disqualified for handing off the baton outside of the exchange zone. Kloenhamer disagreed, and he was prepared to produce a picture to illustrate his point. Eventually, meet officials agreed and the relay was reinstated.

• The 440-yard relay. Kloenhamer said that while he was arguing for the 880-yard relay team, his 440-yard relay team — the same four girls — was adversely affected. "They were psychologically down," he said.

• The mile relay. The meet announcer gave point totals before the event began that had DeWitt so far behind Charlotte and Mason that even a victory in the mile relay wouldn't have mattered. Actually, DeWitt's points from the 880 relay had yet to be figured in, so a Panther victory in the mile relay would have moved them ahead of Mason. But

DeWitt finished second in the race. "Those girls are not dumb," Kloenhamer said. "They heard the score and figured we lost the meet."

DeWitt will not appeal the athletic directors' decision to the Michigan High School Athletic Association. "You can request an appeal, but it will be denied," Mead said. "It would not serve any purpose."

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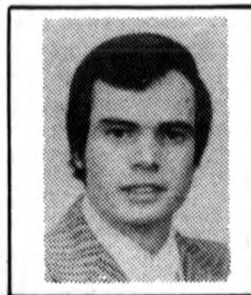
