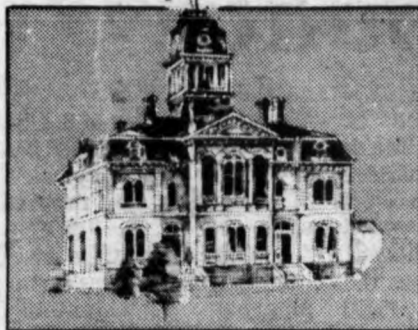

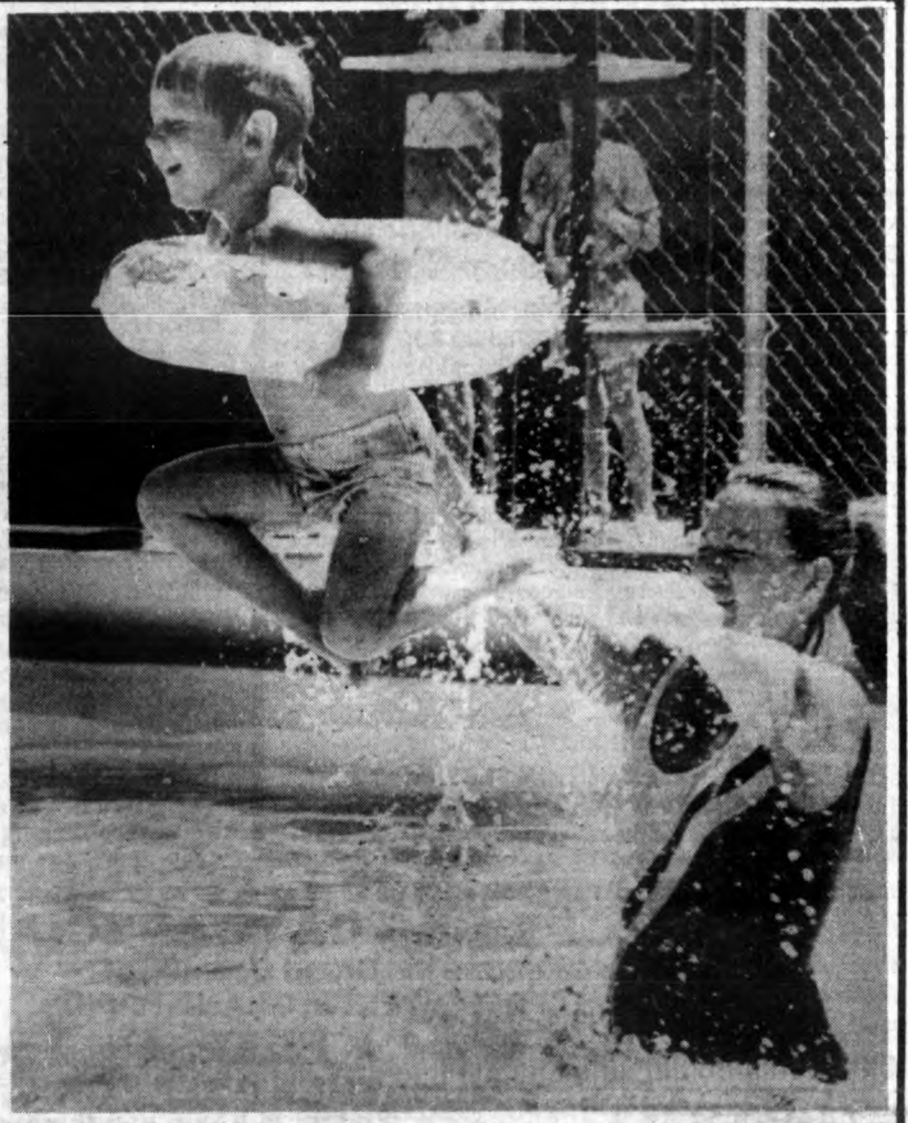

## Reaction to President's plan mixed

# Merit pay gets poor grades in county

Some area school superintendents see little merit in President Reagan's suggestion that education, like the private sector, could be improved by rewarding performance with extra pay.

Three of five county school superintendents surveyed said they are either opposed to the so-called merit pay plan or have serious doubts about its practicality. And others who said they favor merit pay, including Earl Gabriel of St. Johns and David Porrell of Ovid-Elsie, pointed out there are stumbling blocks to be removed before merit pay can be used effectively. (Jim Andros of Fowler was on vacation and could not be reached for comment.)

"I just think it's an impossible system to operate," said Pewamo-Westphalia's Roy Thelen, the most critical among those contacted.

"We would just be in a situation where if they (teachers) do a good job they'd get a pat on the head like a puppy and we'd say 'good work.' It's just very hard to be objective in that situation."

Ken Dyer of Bath and Steve Garrett of DeWitt agreed with Thelen that determining who would receive merit pay would be one of the most controversial parts of the plan. Many opponents of merit pay say the system would be prone to abuse through office politics, favoritism and popularity contests.

"My major concern is how you would determine that teacher A is better than teacher B," said Dyer. "These are subjective judgements and you could get into personalities."

"Who is to determine merit?" Garrett asked. "Is it an administrative function?"

Gabriel says yes. "These are the same people who are in classrooms with from

130 to 150 kids a year, kids they evaluate. If they can do it, so can we," he said. Gabriel believes the plan could effectively stimulate excellence and provide needed incentive to teachers.

"I don't think we should ever overlook any recommendation in any area. If there is a way we can work it out, I think we should implement (merit pay). Recognition of competent performance can be a motivation in itself."

Gabriel also said he does not believe teacher competition for merit pay would cause bitterness and staff resentment — a concern voiced by Thelen and Dyer. "I think there would be no more friction than in any other industry where merit pay is used," Gabriel said.

"I don't think it would be a problem on the staff," Garrett agreed. "The big problem would be public relations," he said, pointing to what Gabriel said was the weakest part of the proposal.

"That's the major stumbling block," Gabriel said. "How do you deal with the public when you have one second grade teacher receiving merit pay and another second grade teacher who is not. Are any parents going to be satisfied if their child is not taught by the teacher who received merit pay?"

"Obviously, that would be the big problem," Dyer agreed. "We have parents now in Bath who want special teachers, especially in the elementary and kindergarten levels. We try to honor their requests, but in many cases they just can't have a choice."

The superintendents also agreed that there is no question some teachers do better work than others. "There is no question some teachers are far superior to their peers. And there is no question something has got to be done in education. Maybe merit pay is it," Dyer said. But Thelen said merit pay is not need-

ed. "Most parents already know who the good teachers are and who the terrible ones are. Offering the good ones an extra \$500 proves nothing."

And Dyer rejected the notion that education needs help of any kind. "There seems to be a general indictment. The president comes across that way on the quality of education."

"I think the quality of education is fine here in DeWitt and at many schools. We have surpassed what's been recommended," Dyer said, referring to a Presidential task force report on education which spawned the merit pay suggestion.

The superintendents also speculated that any merit pay proposal would meet heavy opposition from well organized teacher associations.

"I think something has to be done to reward and recognize teachers who do an outstanding job," Porrell said. "I'm in favor of the concept, but there is a lot of

work that needs to be done to make it fair before we could use it. For one thing, the (teachers') unions won't go for it."

Barbara Mason of the Ingham County Education Association, which represents all but one Clinton County district — Pewamo-Westphalia — confirmed that prediction.

"We have not taken a formal position," she said. "But if you look at the trends, the ICEA would be opposed to it at least until the time when all salaries come up to a level where they are equitable — higher in other words."

Ms. Mason said Clinton County teacher salaries are low for Michigan schools, and far from the average salary suggested by one national education official, \$40,000.

"Merit pay is extra money, and I don't think any district in Clinton County has any extra money," she added.

## O-E contract ready

Ovid-Elsie teachers and their school board reached tentative agreement on a new contract last week, following a long negotiating session Thursday.

Details of the pact are not being released before the board considers the package at a meeting July 11, and Superintendent Dave Porrell would not say if teachers would be receiving a raise, or if the agreement includes the coming year as well as the 1982-83 school year.

Elsewhere, as Ovid-Elsie and St. Johns school districts struggle to settle teacher contracts for last year, others in Clinton

County will be entering a new round of negotiations for the coming year.

Only DeWitt — where teachers walked out in February before obtaining a roughly six percent raise for each of two years — and Fowler — where teachers accepted a wage freeze last year in return for a five percent raise this year — will not be negotiating teacher contracts this summer.

Teachers in St. Johns say they won't show up for work in the fall unless their 1982-83 contract is settled, and teachers in the Ovid-Elsie school district also are have been trying to work out an agreement for the past school year after receiving a report from a state fact finder two weeks ago.

# Vandalism epidemic reported in county

A St. Johns man was arrested following a fight in Bath and an epidemic of vandalism was reported to Clinton County law enforcement agencies during the past week.

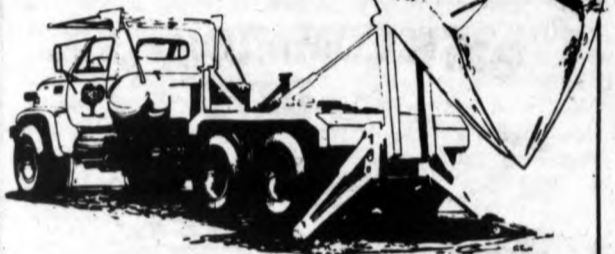

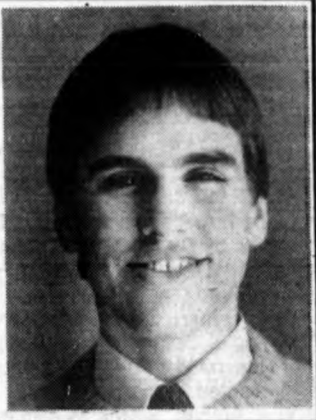

What image does the word "athlete" project in your mind?

I think of someone who is strong and swift and ready for battle. Athletes are a disciplined lot — men and women who train their bodies better than the rest of us. The image I get of athletes is generally associated with someone living a full life, in the physical sense.

Events of the past month have reversed that image in my mind. Instead of associating athletes with life, it has been much easier to think about athletes and death.

On June 11, an automobile accident killed a 19-year-old athlete and rocked Clinton County. News about Jim Farley's death spread rapidly, saddening many people who knew him on and off the field.

On June 25, another athlete in the prime of his life perished. Larry Gordon, a 28-year-old linebacker with the Miami Dolphins, died of a heart attack while jogging in the desert.

Then came the June 29 death of Joe

Delaney. The Kansas City Chiefs halfback drowned after jumping into a pond in an attempt to rescue three boys. Delaney was 24.

Farley, Gordon and Delaney were vibrant athletes in peak physical condition. One year ago, no one in his right mind would have predicted their deaths. It simply wouldn't have been logical.

But examination of these incidents reveals one obvious fact — death is a reality. As much as we romanticize athletes and their superior physical skills, death is as much a reality to them as it is to us. Sooner or later, everyone will die.

One remarkably skilled athlete, basketball's Julius Erving, has considered that fact and adjusted his life accordingly. When it comes to the issue of death — particularly life after death in what the Bible describes as heaven or hell — the 33-year-old Erving does not wish to be ignorant.

"I never dealt with it casually, because to deal with it casually can do more harm than good," he said during a recent visit to Lansing.

As much as we romanticize athletes, it doesn't change facts. Each one is going to die. Julius Erving is on top of world now as a member of the World Champion Philadelphia 76ers. But one day, The Doctor is going to die, and his spectacular slam dunks will only be memories.

Unlike many athletes (or everyday people, for that matter), the Sixer superstar has looked beyond his career. He's examined the Bible and come to a conclusion. "I'm going to heaven," he said. "I don't have any doubts about that."

### 24 Entrain July 9, 1940 From St. Johns For CCC Camp

### Young Men From Clinton and Shiawassee Counties Pass Physical Tests Here

CLINTON COUNTY REPUBLICAN NEWS, JULY 11, 1940 — St. Johns was the concentration point Tuesday, July 9 for a group of young men from Clinton and Shiawassee counties who had made application to enroll in Civilian Conservation Camps. Summoned here for a physical check-up, they assembled at the municipal building, where they were examined under the direction of Captain Reynolds, CCC official.

Twenty-six of the group from Clinton and 14 from Shiawassee successfully passed the test, thus filling the current quota for each county. Late Tuesday afternoon they entrained for the Grand Haven Camp, where they will be enrolled for the next six months. The 12 from this county follows:

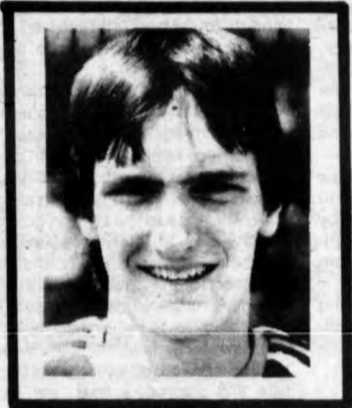

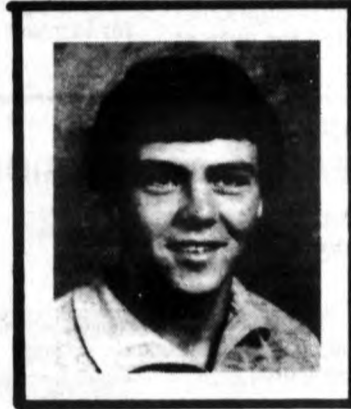

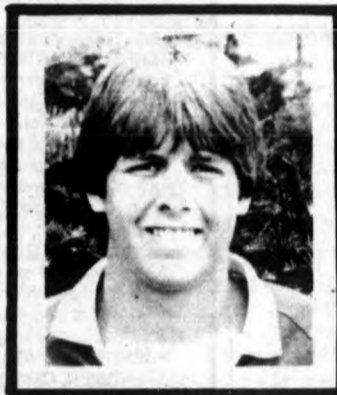

## Our 1983 All-County baseball team

Here is the 1983 Clinton County News-DeWittBath Review All-County baseball team.

**Steve Sontich, DeWitt, pitcher:** Possessing an accurate curve and sharp fastball, Sontich was DeWitt's ace with a 10-1 record. He pitched the Panthers past No. 1-ranked Montague and Union City in the state tournament. The senior also batted over .400 with five home runs.

**Tom Deak, DeWitt, catcher:** A first-team all-state pick as a junior, Deak set school records for most RBI's (41), runs scored (43) stolen bases (33 in 34 attempts) and hits (42). He was a clutch hitter in DeWitt's march to the state Class C championship and also displayed a strong, accurate arm.

**Steve Holland, DeWitt, first baseman:** DeWitt's cleanup hitter, Holland's biggest hit was a three-run double in the championship game against Lake Fenton. The junior also won that game to finish with a 9-2 mark as a pitcher.

**Jon Thelen, Pewamo-Westphalia, second baseman:** An all-conference first team pick as a sophomore, Thelen batted .426 and made only two errors in 17 games for the Pirates. He also stole 10 bases and had 13 RBI's.

**Marty Hamilton, Fowler, shortstop:** A first-team all-

conference pick for the second consecutive year, Hamilton hit .316 this season. The senior was noted for his defense as he anchored the Eagles' infield.

**Eric Smith, St. Johns, third baseman:** A first-team all-league pick in the Mid-Michigan 'B', Smith batted .353 and collected 20 RBI's. The senior also had four home runs and stole 10 bases.

**Ken Rajala, DeWitt, outfielder:** A first-team all-state selection, Rajala batted .345 as DeWitt's leadoff man. One of the senior's finer moments came in the state tournament, when his strong throw from rightfield cut down a Montague runner at the plate to quiet a potential rally.

**Dave Clouse, St. Johns, outfielder:** A first-team all-league player, Clouse clouted five home runs and drove in 19 runs for the Redwings. He also had one of the highest batting averages in the county — .433.

**Dan Fox, Ovid-Elsie, outfielder:** Ovid-Elsie's Most Valuable Player, Fox tied a school record with six home runs. He finished with a .362 batting average and 20 RBI's. Fox got hits in seven of his team's 10 league games.

**Frank Deak, DeWitt, coach:** Years of building a respected program at DeWitt culminated when a

veteran Panther team won the state championship this year. Deak guided the team to a 28-7 record — 10-0 in the Capital Circuit.

## St. Johns claims another all-sports trophy

The foundation for St. Johns winning three of the last four all-sports trophies in the Mid-Michigan 'B' League can be traced back to a school board decision four years ago.

That's when trustees decided to cut back on schedules for freshmen sports instead of eliminating them all together.

That decision, said athletic director Steve Bakita, has been a big factor in Redwing athletic excellence since then.

"They read the community, and the community said we'd like to have these programs for these kids," Bakita said of the board members.

Bakita said several schools who chose to eliminate freshmen sports during the financial crunch four years ago have seen their athletic programs suffer. Forced to compete against sophomores, freshmen athletes often get discouraged and give up on sports, he said.

Bakita and principal Bill Swears mentioned several other reasons why they think St. Johns has dominated the Mid-Michigan 'B' in the last four years:

- Good athletes. "It's not really just the outstanding one, but a volume of solid ones," Swears said.

- Numbers. St. Johns is the only Class A school in the league. "Some of the schools do not have all sports," said Bakita, mentioning swimming, golf and tennis. "We do fill all sports."

- Coaches who are employed as teachers in the St. Johns district. Only one of the head varsity coaches is not a teacher in the system. "Your successful programs normally come when your coach has been there for awhile," Swears said. "The parents know what to expect, the kids know what to expect."

- Support from the community — particularly parents. Bakita said this support has pushed St. Johns "near or at the top" in gate receipts among league schools. "Parents go through a lot bringing their kids to and from practice," he said. "If parents have a good attitude, it reflects on the field."

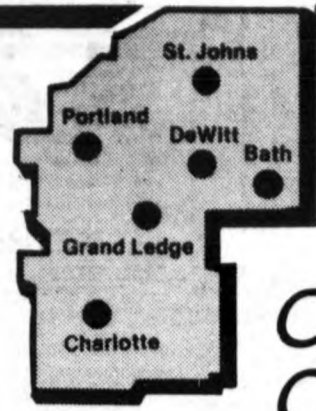
