Drain commissioner pulls plug on career

Harry Harden hasn't had much time to rest during his 7½-year tenure as Clinton County Drain Commissioner. Though he enjoys his work, you could say the job has been a drain on his time.

"You're on duty seven days a week," Harden said. "I think it's the most complex job of any department head in the county, outside of the prosecutor. Here, you've got problem solving all the time with people."

The 65-year-old drain commissioner will have solved his last problem on Aug. 1 when he steps down.

"I was going to retire last April, but I hung around because of some of the court cases," Harden said. "The wife and I talked about it and we came to the conclusion that you've got to retire sometime. You could go on being a public servant until you die."

"It's not a glory job. All of your calls are problem calls."

A committee consisting of county Clerk Jane Swanchara, Prosecutor Jon Newman and Probate Judge Marvin Robertson will pick Harden's successor. The appointee would then have to run for the office when Harden's term expires in 1984 if he or she wants to retain the job.

In 1976, Harden was picked to succeed retiring drain commissioner Dale Chapman, who had served 16 years. Harden had worked 10 years for the federal government as an engineering technician in Clinton County before being hired as drain commissioner.

Harden, who lives on a 200-acre farm in Elsie, singled out maintenance as the thing he's most proud of as drain commissioner.

"We've come a long ways in maintenance," he said. "We've probably got close to 300 miles here that are checked every year."

His biggest disappointment has been the unresolved status of Remy Chandler

drain. The drain, which involves about 15,000 acres in Bath and DeWitt townships, has been bogged down in court for Harden's entire tenure. Problems arose when bids came in \$600,000 higher than the original estimated cost.

The drain, which spills over into Ingham County, has been nothing but trouble for Harden. "It's been a big headache," he said.

The retiring drain commissioner offered this advice for the next one:

"I've learned it's a full-time job here," he said, mentioning reports of other drain commissioners who come to the office only one day a week. "Plus, you've got to be available on weekends. You get called at night."

"You've got to have a real grasp on the drain code, in order to function and keep yourself out of trouble."

A special concern in Clinton County is administering drains on farmland. Harden estimated that between 70 percent and 80 percent of the county's state equalized value of \$531,939,504 is farm property.

"Drains have to be adequate to drain the farmland in order for the farmers to have top farm production," he said. "A good farmer depends on his drains."

Harden plans to do some farming himself after this month. He hopes to help his sons, Charles and Robert, farm soybeans, corn and wheat in Elsie.

Though Harden and his wife own a home in Ponta Gorda, Fla., they plan to live there for winters only. The rest of the time they will remain in Elsie, where Harden will maintain his involvement with the Duplain Church of Christ. At the church, he is an elder who also teaches Sunday school.

The drain commissioner has already planned a trip to the Bahamas for this winter. "I want to do some traveling and some other things in life that a guy just doesn't do unless you have the time to do it," he said.

Yes, indeed, parking at courthouse is difficult

Ever had difficulty finding a parking space around the Clinton County Courthouse?

If you have, chances are your problem can be traced to one of three things — a major Circuit Court trial, a funeral or an important church service.

"We have trouble during peak hours," said William LeFevere, county administrator.

Though the problem is not severe, county officials are taking steps to address the issue. County planner Tom Warstler is conducting a parking study of the courthouse which he expects to complete in August.

City of St. Johns officials are working closely with Warstler. Together they hope to clip problems before they blossom.

"We've anticipated some long-term problems, so we're working on some long-term solutions," said Rick Coletta, city clerk. "We're just sort of Boy Scouting it — trying to be prepared."

Coletta said the 103 parking spaces which presently ring the courthouse are quite sufficient. But county and city officials are concerned about possible increases in the number of county employees and jury trials. That, they say, would create a need for more spaces.

"Now I wouldn't call it a problem most

of the time," he said. "Further down the line, if we lose some spaces, the number of times someone could not find a space up there would probably increase. That's the time you've got a problem. We're just anticipating when that line might be crossed."

Among other things, LeFevere said the

county is considering entering into cooperative agreements with three nearby churches to gain parking spaces. The churches are First Congregational, First United Methodist and St. Joseph Catholic.

Other options include closing off Maple Avenue, buying property, leasing property or converting the lawn area north of

the courthouse into a parking lot. LeFevere said the latter would be the most unpopular choice.

"That's the only green area we've got left," he said. "I don't want to see that destroyed. I don't think anybody wants to see that green space destroyed."

County jail renovation crews begin

Workers scurried around the county courthouse last week as the first phase of Clinton County's jail renovation plan began.

"They're preparing the site," said county administrator William LeFevere. "There's a lot of sitework that has to be done."

County officials hope to move into a new building by January, 1984, LeFevere said. That's when the first phase of construction — estimated to cost \$588,691 — is expected to be completed.

The project includes renovating the present Sheriff's Department building and adding a new section. When completed, it will increase the jail's capacity by 14 cells, LeFevere said.

The basement of the new section will house the detective bureau, squad room, showers and lockers. Offices for the

sheriff, deputy sheriff and captain will be on the first floor. Ten minimum security cells will occupy the second floor.

An entrance facing Cass Street will accommodate the public.

Occupying the present building will be a work release program with four cells and an increased area for dispatch workers, LeFevere said.

The second phase of the jail project is scheduled to begin no sooner than 1985. That calls for building an enclosed security garage north of the existing jail. Construction of holding and detoxification cells and a storage area for records are also in the plan.

Estimated cost for the second phase,

which will result in 20 more cells for the jail, is \$800,000, LeFevere said.

"When we get completed, we hope to be able to satisfy the rules and regulations set by the state Department of Corrections," LeFevere said.

Vandals cause \$1,000 damage at shopping center

Vandalism at Southpoint Mall in St. Johns has resulted in over \$1,000 worth of damage, according to city police.

Vandals have marred the lobby area of the mall by cutting trees and plants and slicing water hoses, police said. Police have no leads on who the vandals may be, but suspect teenagers may be involved. Shops in the mall have not been damaged, police said.

Clinton County Sheriff's Deputies reported 113 complaints for the week ending July 10. Of those, 29 involved arrests, reports said. Eleven arrests of drunken drivers were reported.

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Teacher pact picture gets clearer

Ovid-Elsie teachers and administrators have ratified a new contract, ending about 15 months of dispute in pleasant fashion.

"I think it's a fair contract," said Superintendent David Porrell after the Ovid-Elsie Board of Education voted unanimously to approve the agreement. "I think it's one we can afford. I'm glad it's over."

Teachers in the district voted overwhelmingly to accept the contract, which calls for a 5 percent pay increase in 1983-84 and an equal hike for 1984-85. Teachers approved the terms by a 60-5 vote.

Administrators were pleased with the agreement because the 5 percent increase was less than increases in some other districts.

"I think 5 percent is very reasonable, considering the settlements in other districts," Porrell said. "I know of three or four districts that are at 6 or 7 percent."

Teachers also agreed to accept a pay freeze for the 1982-83 school year. That was part of the recommendation by state labor relations fact finder George Roumell, Jr., who maintained that the district could not afford to grant wage or benefit increases for that year.

Teachers in St. Johns are still negotiating last year's contract as teachers in Bath and Pewamo-Westphalia begin a new round of talks for their 1983-84 contracts.

DeWitt and Fowler teachers will sit out negotiations this year. DeWitt teachers walked out in February before obtaining a roughly 6 percent raise for each of two years and Fowler teachers accepted a wage freeze last year in return for a 5 percent raise this year.

A district-by-district breakdown of contract progress follows:

• **ST. JOHNS** — Teachers in St. Johns say they won't show up for work in the fall unless their 1982-83 contract is settled.

Wage freezes were requested in many county districts throughout the state last year, as board members asked teachers to help hold the line on shrinking budgets. A wage-freeze was requested in St. Johns, and salaries remain the biggest stumbling block in the path of contract

talks, which began a year-and-a-half ago.

No new negotiations have been scheduled since the school year ended, but teachers and Superintendent Earl Gabriel both say they'll end a self-imposed news blackout and take their story to the public if progress is not made by August.

• **BATH** — New negotiations are set to begin in Bath, where teachers settled for a 3.5 percent pay hike in a one-year agreement last year. No date for talks has been set, but Superintendent Ken Dyer expressed hope the contract could be settled by fall.

• **PEWAMO-WESTPHALIA** — Pewamo-Westphalia teachers were the first in the county to settle last fall when they accepted a wage-freeze package for one year. Now talks are ready to begin again and Superintendent Roy Thelen said he hopes negotiations will be finished in time for the beginning of school. Pewamo-Westphalia is the only district in Clinton County in which teachers are not represented by the Ingham County Education Association.

Commission takes steps to end contamination

A pair of rusting, leaking gas tanks at the St. Johns Department of Public Works will be replaced.

City commissioners voted Monday to accept a \$3,200 bid from Applebee Oil Co. of St. Johns to replace the underground tanks. The 2,000-gallon tanks had been leaking gas and pumping fuel with rust in it into department of public works vehicles, clerk Richard Coletta said.

The tanks are expected to be replaced this week.

Commissioners also authorized the use of the city band shell by St. Johns senior citizens Aug. 16-17 for the Senior Citizen Kitchen Band Festival. Bands from around the state will be coming for the festival, Coletta said.

COMMISSION ORDER

CFI-104.82A

(Under authority of Act 165, P.A. 1929 and Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended)
STATEWIDE TROUT AND SALMON REGULATIONS

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on December 4, 1981, under the authority of Act 165, P.A. 1929, as amended, and Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, ordered that for the period beginning April 1, 1982, and ending March 31, 1984, no person shall take, or attempt to take, any species of trout or salmon from any of the waters of this state except by hook and line during the open seasons prescribed, and within the minimum size limits and maximum possession limits indicated below.

Statewide open seasons on all streams and designated trout lakes shall be from the last Saturday in April through September 30 (longer on waters designated by the Director for extended fishing under Act 165) on all trout and salmon. Statewide open seasons on all other inland lakes and the Great Lakes shall be any time for all trout and salmon. Size limits shall be 8 inches on Lower Peninsula streams, 7 inches on Upper Peninsula streams, and 10 inches on lakes. The daily POSSESSION limit for trout and salmon shall be 5 fish singly or in combination but no more than 3 lake trout or splake, except that an additional 5 brook or brown trout may be taken from streams from the last Saturday in April through September 30 only and no more than 2 lake trout or splake may be taken from Lake Michigan or its tributary streams.

This order amends and supersedes Natural Resources Commission Order CFI-104.82 dated December 4, 1981.

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Uh, uh Township rejects roofers

By a 4-3 vote, DeWitt Township trustees denied a rezoning request by a township resident who sought a change from residential to business to accommodate a roofing business.

Betty Fate, 1236 W. State Road, approached the board with a request to store equipment in a pole barn. Her attorney, Tim Holland, presented reasons for rezoning the nearly one-acre parcel, but the majority of trustees disagreed.

Clerk Greg Whitlock, supervisor Leonard Pung and trustees Charles Rademacher and Douglas Hammond voted down the rezoning. Treasurer Alta Reed and trustees Charles Mann and Mike Verlinde favored Mrs. Fate's request.

Trustees reasoned that the rezoning was not in line with the township's master plan for the area. A change in zoning, they said, would open the door for other businesses to move into the residential area.

"It was just too wide of a rezoning," said Whitlock. "My main concern is that it did not conform to the future land use of DeWitt Township."

Mrs. Reed argued that other businesses in the area have been built after rezoning.

She cited the Baltic Inn, which she said was built on land originally zoned agricultural.

The pole barn is already erected, Mrs. Reed said, and the logical thing would be to rezone the land. "What use is that building to her unless it is commercial?" she said.

In other action, trustees began a process which would crack down on residents who rarely mow their lawns.

A weed ordinance ordering residents who own two acres or less to cut their lawns if the grass is over a foot high was passed. The ordinance could not be enforced until late August or early September, Whitlock said, because of the legal notification process involved.

Trustees responded to angry residents, who called township hall at least three or four times a week to complain about the long grass. "Certainly there's a need out there to control this," Whitlock said.

The township will seek a circuit court injunction against Williams Plumbing and Heating of Plainwell. The company violated the township's building ordinance, Whitlock said. The company worked on the house of Bruce Angell, 2207 E. Clark Road, without securing the proper permits, Whitlock said.

Board junks salvage plan

Robert Hanes' application for a special use permit for a proposed auto salvage yard was officially denied last week by Bath Township trustees.

Trustees voted 5-0 to deny the permit, as recommended by the township planning commission. Opposing the permit were clerk Kathleen McQueen and trustees Daniel Carleton, Robert Leiby, Paul Shaheen and Robert Sober. Supervisor Richard Brook and treasurer Carl Crofts were absent.

Hanes, of 6684 Coleman Road, wanted to operate an auto salvage yard on Watson Road, but area residents protested the plan. Trustees agreed with planning commissioners who thought the auto salvage yard would not fit in with the land's rural zoning.

"I think that they did the right thing," said zoning administrator Rick

Crawford. "It wasn't very appropriate for the neighborhood."

Hanes was not present at the meeting. Trustees also accepted the resignation of police officer Louis Doerner, effective July 8. The 57-year-old officer gave no reasons for his resignation, McQueen said.

Howard Wooldridge, a part-time officer, will temporarily fill in for Doerner, McQueen said.

Crawford said 38 notices of zoning and junk violations were issued between March 1 and June 23.

"Most of these are violations of the junk and junk car ordinances," he said. "Next year at this time I wouldn't expect nearly that amount because people will get the message that the township is cleaning up."

"We had a lot in March, but each month after that there hasn't been that many."

DeWitt comes clean

A change in janitorial services will not mean a change in cost for the city of DeWitt.

Lansing Ice and Fuel has been contracted to come in three times a week to clean up city hall, Clerk Marge Lotre said. Under the previous system, a high school student came in for about an hour every day to clean up.

The student has graduated and the city has had to look elsewhere for its janitorial service. Lansing Ice and Fuel offered its services for \$116 a month.

"Over a year's period, it's going to run about the same," said Lotre, comparing the price of the contracted work to that of the high school student.

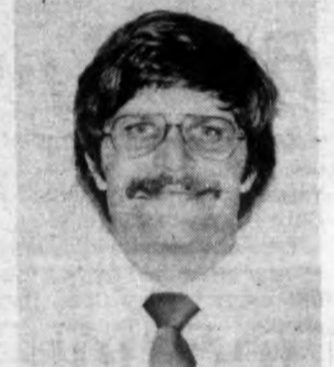

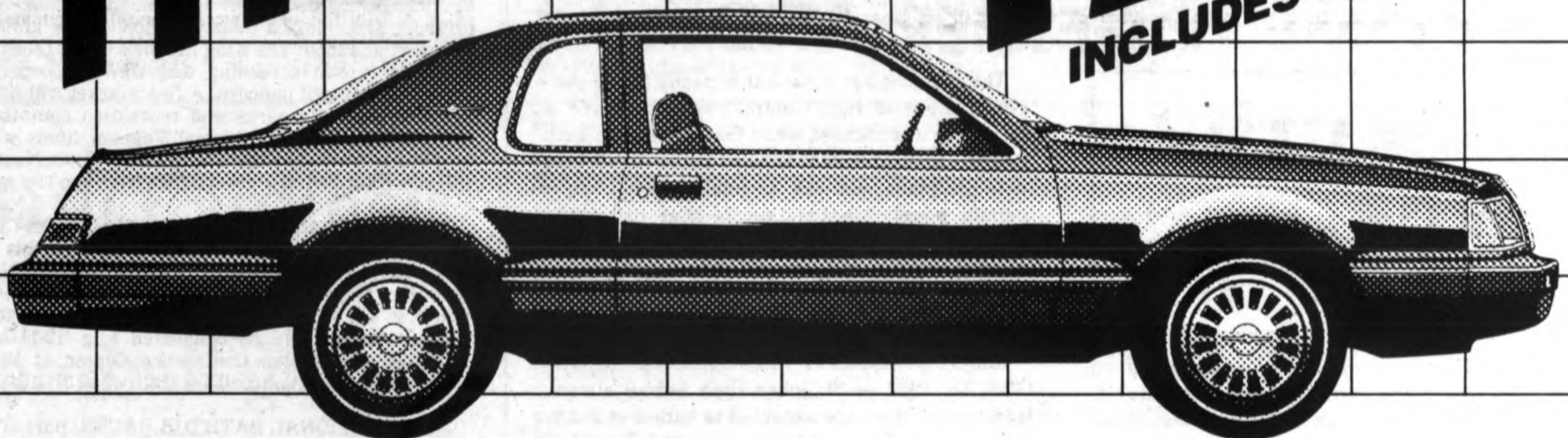

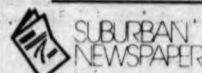

Nurse residence completed & occupied New Years Day!

Comfortable, compact, homelike \$32,000 structure provides living quarters for workers

CLINTON COUNTY REPUBLICAN NEWS, JAN. 4, 1940 — This building will fill a long-felt need in connection with Clinton Memorial Hospital. During the past two years, it has been necessary to discontinue the practice of having nurses live in the hospital. This has been brought about by a gradual increase in the patient population. Also, on several occasions, when contagion has developed after patients have been brought to the hospital, it has been highly necessary to make use of the isolation department which since 1927 has been used as living quarters for nurses.

The new building is 42 x 44 feet of brick and concrete construction and is as nearly fireproof as the hospital itself. On the upper floor there are seven two-bed rooms. On the first floor there are three two-bed rooms, and quarters for the superintendent and matron. On the lower floor there are two two-bed rooms, a large, comfortably furnished living room, a small apartment-type kitchen, small laundry and a large storage room for trunks.

The building has a normal capacity for 26 people. It is heated from Central power plant and is located as was planned when the hospital was built in 1927. Several institution telephones connect the new residence with the hospital, which enables certain people who are on 24-hour call to be notified at any time of day or night if needed for some emergency at the hospital building.

Patterson wins fourth Owosso feature race

Guard rails were being knocked out faster than a hockey player's front teeth Sunday night at Owosso Speedway.

Two accidents during the 25-lap Late Model feature race knocked out pieces of guard rail. The second incident happened on the 24th lap, and rather than restart the race, leader Kris Patterson of St. Johns was declared the winner.

"They did the smart thing by cutting it short," said Patterson, who won his fourth feature on the 1/2-mile, dirt oval this season. "One lap wasn't going to make that much difference."

Patterson was stuck in fifth place when he saw an opening on the eighth lap. Between the first two turns, he went under three cars to quickly move into second place. Then he went past the lead car and into the lead before going into the third turn.

On the next lap, three drivers — including Ovid's Al Taft — crashed into the guard rail, knocking out about 200 feet. Track officials decided to suspend the Late Model feature and run the sports stock feature on the 1/4-mile asphalt oval inside the dirt track.

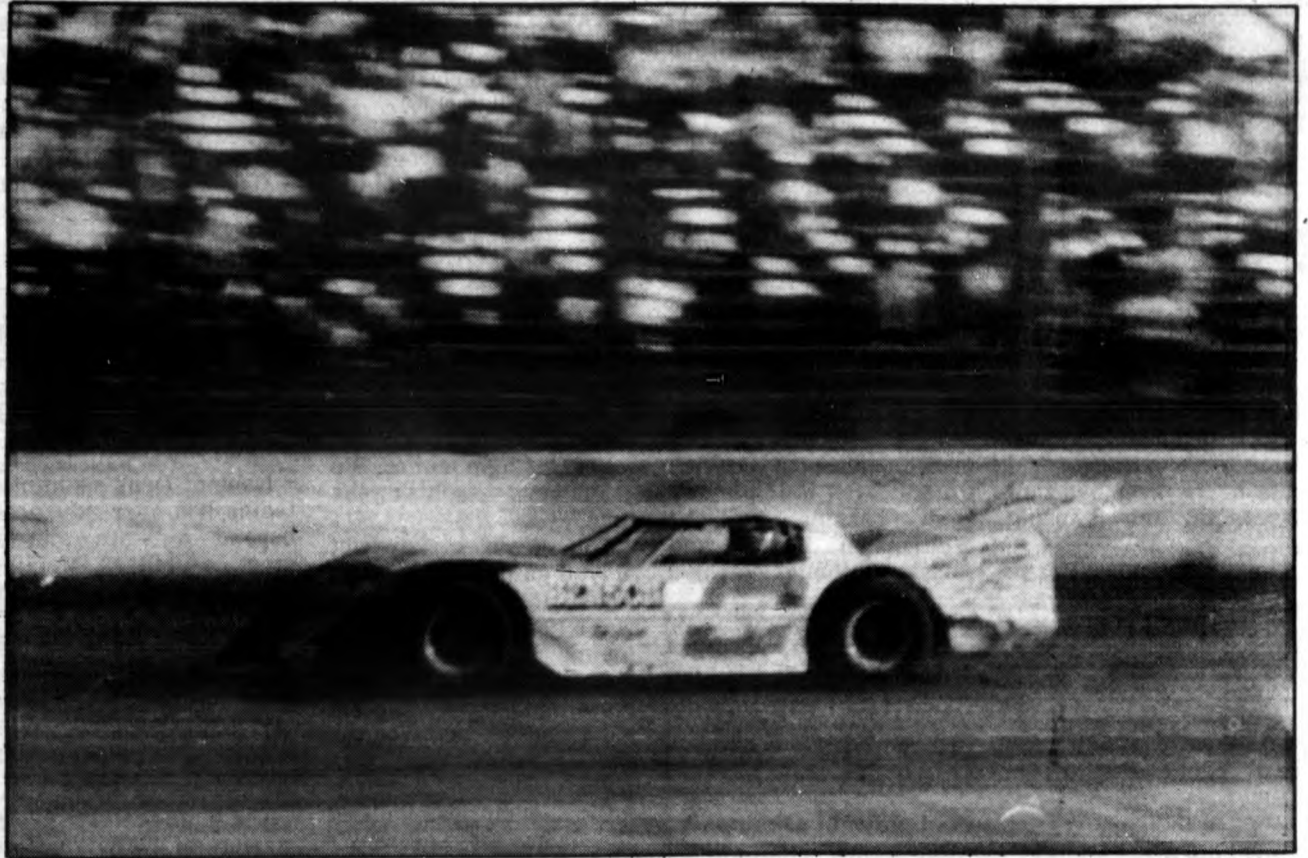
After that race, which was won by Elsie's Larry Miller, the Late Models continued their race, only to have it cut short again when Bay City's Ray Laney smashed into a different section of guard rail on the 24th lap. Patterson was a comfortable winner over Flint's Dennis Berry.

The sports stock race featured an accident which boosted Miller into the lead.

Dave Kurka of Ovid was leading for the first seven laps and preparing to pass Chapin's George Harris when disaster struck. Kurka and second-place driver Bud Ostrander of Elsie approached Harris, who was high on the track, from the low side. Harris dropped down and the cars collided, giving Miller, the third place car, the opening he needed.

Miller had earlier posted the night's fast time at 15.21, and Elsie's John Forsythe captured the fast-car dash.

Spartan Speedway: Patterson ran better than he expected in the Busch Racing Series 83-lap feature at Spartan Speedway July 6. Running his first race on

asphalt this season, Patterson finished fourth. Denny Nyari of South Bend, Ind., won.

"I was surprised I did that well," Patterson said. "I was running in the top three, but with two laps to go the tires started to go on me."

Tire problems doomed another Clinton County racer — Ovid's Jim Aldrich. He took the lead on the ninth lap and led for 35 laps until his tires wore out. Aldrich, however, did manage to win one of the heat races.

Aldrich came back on Friday to capture his sixth Spartan Speedway feature victory, when he held off Ben Snider and Ray Gadd to win by one car length.

Racing notes: Patterson is leading the points races at three tracks — Owosso, Ionia and Hartford. He is also leading in points on the Busch circuit. Ovid's Al Taft, having a quietly successful year, is second in points at Owosso.

Bath Cardinals win third MCFL football game

When a football team beats another one, don't assume that the winning coach is going to be happy. Coaches look beyond the score at things that fans often overlook.

Such was the case with Phil Bailey, the Bath Cardinals head coach, after his team stopped the Madison Heights Rams, 14-6.

"We're fully three touchdowns better than that team, but you can't make the mistakes we made and penalties we had and expect to do well," Bailey said.

The Cardinals improved their Michigan Charity Football League record to 3-1, but Bailey was distressed by 152 yards in penalties.

"It's uncalled for," he said. "That's just not very good. People just aren't thinking and I just don't know what to coach on it."

County AD's boost all-conference squads

Though one of Michigan's largest high school athletic conferences has come out against the naming of all-conference teams, Clinton County athletic directors are unanimously supporting them.

"I'm for doing anything for the kids," said Bath athletic director Mike Alley.

Athletic directors from the Ottawa-Kent Conference, a group of 24 schools in the Grand Rapids area, recently voted 15-9 to stop naming all-conference teams beginning in the fall of 1984-85.

Those athletic directors criticized all-conference teams for the problems they create when someone is left off the team who may have deserved selection.

"Regardless of the system, and I've worked in all kinds of them in 26 years, inevitably kids are left off that should have been on, and others are overlooked that maybe should not have been overlooked," East Kentwood athletic director Jim Czanko told The Grand Rapids Press.

"Instead of being a positive thing, it turns into something that creates ill feelings. In theory you have an all-conference team, but in reality you probably don't have the best in the conference."

When contacted, five of the six county athletic directors supported the present system of selecting all-conference teams. The sixth, Pewamo-Westphalia's Bonnie Somero, could not be reached for comment.

County athletic directors and coaches agreed that the benefits of naming all-star teams outweigh the drawbacks.

"I like the all-conference, I like the all-county, I even like the all-state," said Pewamo-Westphalia baseball coach Jim Cotter. "Anything that gives recognition to the kids is great. But the bigger the area, the less likely you are to get a true caliber all-star team. I think the best all-star team is the all-conference."

Steve Bakita, St. Johns athletic director, favors naming all-conference teams. His league, the Mid-Michigan 'B,' is committed to working out problems connected with them.

"We probably address that question three or four times a year as a conference," Bakita said. "We address it to try to refine it. We've had some little problems with it, but this year it went pretty decent."

"Everybody in the Mid-Michigan 'B' is in general agreement that we should," said Ovid-Elsie athletic director Bob Foreback. "I know that for sure because we talk about it. The advantages outweigh the disadvantages."

Foreback said problems arise with all-conference selections when parents, coaches and players put too much emphasis on them. He prefers an "icing on the cake" emphasis, instead of all-conference becoming a goal for a player.

DeWitt Athletic Director Ron Mead supports all-conference teams across the board. "It's particularly

important in team sports," Mead said.

Fowler athletic director Steve Spicer is bothered by coaches who vote with a bias for certain players and pad statistics to get players on all-star teams. He said he supports all-conference teams because they give players recognition.

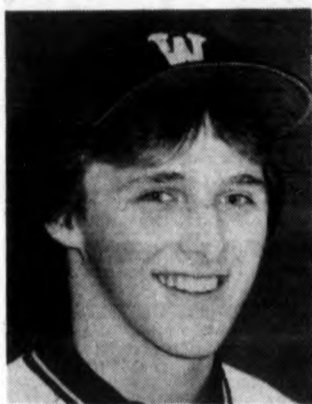

"You've got to be good, plus have luck on the draw," said Cavazos of the

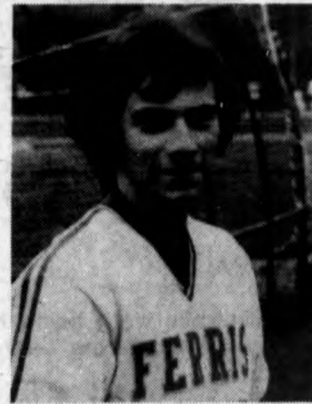
double-elimination tournament. "I think this year's squad is much better than the kids that I had when we finished fourth. They've played a lot of games."

ORDINANCE NO. 347

AN ORDINANCE TO VACATE A PORTION OF CASS STREET RIGHT-OF-WAY WITHIN THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS, MICHIGAN.

THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

Section 1. Vacation of Street Right-of-Way. The City Commission of the City of St. Johns hereby vacates a portion of Cass Street right-of-way, being more particularly described as follows:

A portion of Cass Street right-of-way being 33 feet North and South, commencing at the intersection of the West right-of-way line Linden Avenue and Northerly right-of-way line Cass Street; running thence South 33 feet; West to the East right-of-way line Maple Street; North 33 feet; East to the Linden Avenue Westerly right-of-way line, as recorded in the original plat, City of St. Johns.

Section 2. Compliance with Charter. The City Commission, in adopting this Ordinance, certifies that a public hearing has been held after due notice to those persons entitled to receive notice, and that a Resolution declaring the City Commission's intent to vacate said right-of-way and other provisions of the City Charter relative to vacating streets and alleys have been complied with; that notice of said public hearing was, pursuant to charter, served upon persons entitled to receive notice.

Section 3. Easement Retained. Notwithstanding the vacation of said street right-of-way, the City of St. Johns retains for itself, for the benefit of the public, an easement under, over and across said vacated premises, for the installation, maintenance, and repair of any drain, sewer, water pipes, gas pipes, electric and telephone lines, and other essential utilities, said easement being perpetual and unlimited unless hereinafter released by the City Commission.

Section 4. The effective date of this ordinance shall be the 20th day after its passage.



Musical talents lead to a recording studio

Bet you never heard of the recording studio in Bath. It's not surprising. No one promotes it. In fact, it isn't even labeled as such.

It's simply the house of Richard Andrews. Andrews got together with two friends from Bath — Monte Boutwell and Mitchell Wells — to make a record. Using relatively primitive equipment, they turned out a disc that has been selling throughout Michigan since February of last year.

"I don't like to blow my own horn, but I'm a pretty good producer," said Wells, 23, a Bath High School graduate who lives in DeWitt Township.

"He's got a good ear for what people like to listen to," said Andrews, 24, who has been playing in bands with Wells since eighth grade.

The record's songs — "People in the News" and "Freedom in the Prison" — have a distinctive sound that fuses different types of music together. The music bears some similarity to The Police, a New Wave band.

"It's almost Pop," Wells said. "If you played it in England, they'd accept it as Pop. You could put it in the Pop-New Wave vein."

Whatever you call it, people tend to bob around when they hear the beat.

"People in the News has something for everybody," said Wells, the group's lyricist. "They're old ladies that like People in the News. They do their aerobics to it."

Producing quality music is important to Wells, who grew up adoring the imaginative tones of King Crimson, Yes and Genesis. He linked up with Andrews and Boutwell, who shared his taste in music, as the three went through school in Bath.

"We started playing music in eighth grade," Wells said. "We used to skip shop class and go play."

"More music-music than mindless dance music," added Andrews.

In 1979, the trio teamed up with Claes Roswall, a drummer from Sweden who had moved to Lansing. They formed a band called "The Visions" and cut a tape called, "Music During War."

In "Music During War," Wells developed a theme in his lyrics that he eventually extended to the record. His basic message is that people can not satisfy a void in their lives by trying to fill it up with anything found on earth.

"A lot of the songs that I write are to try to make people aware that there's something inside," Wells said. "People try to hide from emotions. People need to realize that they have the need."

"The truth is that everyone of us has a void that God put inside of us. The whole idea behind this music is that using all of those temporary things is never going to fill it."

A glance at the lyrics of "Freedom in the Prison" reveals this spiritual emphasis. Wells quotes biblical passages to accentuate his points about the meaning of life:

"As Moses lifted up the serpent, so must the Son of Man be lifted up. For God so loved the world He gave His only begotten Son that whosoever should call on Him should not perish but have everlasting life."

References to a spiritual void in peoples' lives are also prevalent in "People in the News." One line reads: "A future with no ending, a future with no start, for this I pray to God at night that He will break their hearts."

"The modern world steals love from people," Wells explained. "People are bored dead until they ask Christ in their life."

"I have no qualms — God means business. Before John wrote, 'God is love,' God inspired Moses to write,

'God is a God of war.' I just want to show that God loves you, but God means business."

The musicians also mean business in marketing their record. Boutwell, a film-making major at Lansing Community College, produced a video rendition of "People in the News" which has recently been shown on WSFL-Channel 47 in Lansing.

"He's been promoting it pretty good," said Andrews, mentioning how it was shown on New York television when Boutwell visited there.

The film is scheduled to open soon at the Odeon Theater in the Frandor shopping center. The group also plans to send it this summer to Sweden, where drummer Roswall has contacts with record companies.

"If they get into our music over there, we might end up going over there," Wells said. "We want to get bigger. I'm just trying to get an 'in' in the music business."
