Ebert replies to suit

Charged with several counts of sexual harassment, St. Johns Michigan Federal Credit Union officials responded last week, denying any wrongdoing.

Former Credit Union Manager Roy Ebert "denies any and all alleged wrongdoing on his part and specifically denies intentionally inflicting emotional distress on any of the plaintiffs," according to court documents.

Credit union board members, also named in the suit because they allegedly were informed about harassment of five female employees and failed to take action, also responded; saying the women have no tangible evidence of physical injury and have not seen physicians to confirm claims of mental injuries stemming from Ebert's alleged harassment.

The women are four former employees — Christine Brawner, LuAnn Feldpausch, Yvonne Makara and Tammie Witt — and one present employee, Sherri Jopke. They are requesting a minimum of \$200,000 each in damages for alleged physical and verbal sexual harassment, consisting of unconsented touching and repeated demands for sexual favors.

The Credit Union Board fired Ebert during a June 21 board meeting, two weeks after the lawsuit was filed in Clinton County Circuit Court. The former St. Johns mayor has refused to comment on the case.

Attorney Lawrence Schneider, representing the Credit Union board, has asked the five women to produce any evidence they may have, including tapes, memos, photos, oral statements and documents, and has filed briefs arguing the board is not responsible for any possible sexual harassment by Ebert.

Such harassment would be "outside the scope of (Ebert's) actual or apparent authority," Schneider's response to the charges says. It also says Ebert did not treat the women any differently than he treated male employees, and that the women failed to notify Ebert or complain, "and did not exhaust administrative and/or internal remedies," before filing suit.

Edith Harsh, who represents the five women, says the board was notified. Federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission records say a complaint, by three of the five women and a sixth who is not taking part in the lawsuit, was filed Jan. 18, 1983, and the credit union was notified of the complaint 10 days later.

Mrs. Harsh appeared in court July 5, along with a flock of attorneys representing Ebert and the Credit Union Board, for a hearing on her request to move the trial out of Clinton County. Mrs. Harsh insists an impartial jury cannot be found because most of the Credit Union's 7,000 shareholders live in Clinton County and because Ebert is a former St. Johns Mayor.

The July 5 hearing was cut short, however, when Circuit Judge Tim Green announced he would disqualify himself because his court reporter is the daughter-in-law of one of the defendants, a credit union board member.

He speculated a visiting judge would be assigned by the state court administrator's office. But his colleague, Circuit Judge Randy Tahvonen, has agreed to hear the change of venue motion on Aug. 10 at 1:30 p.m. Tahvonen has his own court reporter.

Huard leads study

After electing new officers, the St. Johns School Board wasted no time tackling the tough school-closing issue again at their July meeting last week.

Holding their first meeting since the annual June school election — the traditional turning point toward the coming school year — board members began by making good on their promise to form a citizens' committee to study a controversial administration proposal to close two rural elementary schools, East Olive and East Essex.

Ron Huard, senior trust officer at Clinton Bank & Trust and president of the school board until he decided not to seek re-election two years ago, was appointed chairman and told to have the citizens' committee report back to the board in December.

The July 13 action by board members reinforces their decision to postpone consideration of closing East Olive and East Essex elementary schools until December. At their June board meeting, some parents urged board members to make a decision on school closings before December. But in the face of well-organized opposition to the cost-saving plan last spring, board members tabled their decision for further study, and are sticking by a promise not to vote on school closings until December.

Huard said the committee will begin compiling information in late August, after the board appoints 32 members. He said he accepted the chairman's role upon a request by former board member Marian Kurncz.

Huard said the committee will analyze every school in the district. Rural parents have urged closing of Central Elementary as an alternative to closing rural schools.

"I don't think there's any unit in the district that should not be considered," he said. "I think the people who will be nam-

ed to this committee will not only be concerned with the existing problem, but also with other problems."

In addition to making a recommendation on East Olive and East Essex, long-range planning will be part of the committee's emphasis, Huard said. He plans to appoint sub-committees in such areas as finance, student population trends, building use, transportation routes and shifting of students between schools to allow closings.

"I have no presumption of casting influence either way," said Huard, referring to the East Olive-East Essex issue. "Given the opportunity, I will make efforts to broaden the scope of the recommendation."

In other action, board members voted on officers for the 1983-1984 school year. Re-elected to a second term as board president was Robert Craig. Other officers are vice-president Lee Ormston, who replaces Neil Barnhart; secretary Peter Apostol, who replaces Ormston; and treasurer Leonard Puetz, who was re-elected to that office. Trustees are Peter Apostol and Thomas Irrer, elected a year ago, and Gary Whitford, who was elected in June to replace Mrs. Kurncz, who did not seek re-election.

Whitford made a motion to switch the board's meeting time from 8 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Apostol and trustee Thomas Irrer supported Whitford, but Craig, Ormston, Puetz and trustee Neil Barnhart voted to continue meeting at 8.

An auction of surplus school equipment was authorized for September at Greenwood School, DeWitt Road.

The Knights of Columbus presented a \$300 check to the board for special education programs. The money was raised through the Knights' Tootsie Roll drive.

Aug. 10 was established as the date for the next regular board meeting.

Heart fails

A DeWitt Township woman died en route to a Jackson Hospital Sunday after suffering a heart attack during the Michigan 500 at Michigan International Speedway (MIS).

Madeline W. "Wanda" Keefer, 63, of 390 W. Stoll Road, was pronounced dead at 2:45 p.m., a spokesman at Jackson's W.A. Foote Memorial Hospital said. MIS is located in Brooklyn, Mich., south of Jackson.

Mrs. Keefer collapsed while walking near a spectators' tent, where she was a guest, an MIS official said. Although she was stricken during a heavy

thunderstorm which delayed the race for over two hours, the MIS official said there was no reason to believe Mrs. Keefer's death was caused by the storm or the race.

"It would not be correct to say it was storm- or race-related," the MIS official said. "Though it is unofficial, we understand she recently underwent heart surgery."

Mrs. Keefer is survived by her husband, Vernon; two daughters, Sharon Robinson of Florida and Julie Keefer of LeRoy; a brother, Elbridge Wolfgang of Dansville; two sisters, Marjorie Briedinger of Berkeley, Mich., and Melba Best of St. Louis, Mich.; and her mother, Iva Allen of Indiana.

Skydiver injured

A Bath man was injured during a skydiving show, St. Johns firemen were kept busy battling a barn fire, three Perry residents were arrested on theft charges, and a three-car crash in DeWitt Township injured three persons during the past week.

Ron Haney of State Road in Bath Township saw his summer plans bite the dust when his heel was shattered in a sky-diving accident during Bath's Community Days.

Haney was injured when he joined other skydivers in a show presented just prior to the Bath Cardinals football game Saturday near 7 p.m.

Township police said cannisters have been placed around town to raise money on his behalf.

St. Johns firemen made two runs Monday to the scene of a barn fire at the home of Robert Grams, 2114 S. DeWitt Road. The first call came at 2:28 a.m., St. Johns Police said. Firemen spent six hours battling the blaze, which totally destroyed the barn and its contents of hay. No livestock or equipment was

in the barn, reports said, and the loss was estimated at about \$40,000.

Firemen were again summoned at 11:30 a.m. to return to the fire, which had been smoldering all morning, and remained on the scene most of the afternoon.

Three Perry residents are being held on charges of larceny and may be charged with breaking and entering, according to DeWitt Township Police. The three, Defrese Alan, 18, Franklin Dumont, 19, and William Hansen, 20, are being held in connection with break-ins in the Clark and Schavey roads area, near Luroma and Ducharme streets, and in the Westwind subdivision, reports said.

The three were picked up July 18 near 2:55 a.m., when DeWitt Township officer Andy Lindemann spotted them on bicycles near the intersection of Stoll and Turner roads. Upon questioning, the three became evasive, and eventually confessed to thefts and break-ins, a department spokesman said. The three are lodged in Clinton County Jail.

Three adults — none wearing seatbelts — were injured in a three-car pile-up Tuesday Morning, July 19, but two infants safely strapped into car seats survived the crash unscathed, DeWitt Township Police reported.

The accident occurred at the intersection of Clark and DeWitt roads at 7:30 a.m., when Daniel Robert-

son, 26, of Lansing, ran a stop sign while headed north on DeWitt road and struck a vehicle driven by Kevin Hornbeck, 25, of Welling Road, Eureka.

The impact of the crash forced Hornbeck's vehicle to strike another driven by Rhonda Desess, 23, of Lansing.

Injured were Hornbeck, Ms. Desess and a passenger in her auto, Anthony Montague, 23, of Lansing. All were taken to Sparrow Hospital.

Uninjured were two infants in Ms. Desess' auto, both riding in infant seats in the back seat; and Robertson, who was cited for failing to stop.

A Lansing man was charged with breaking and entering by the Clinton County Detective Bureau after being picked up by DeWitt Township Police near the scene of a break-in at the Edwin J. Leyanna VFW Post, 12250 North US-27, DeWitt.

Douglas Lovegrove, 19, of Lansing, was discovered walking along US-27. Stopped and questioned by DeWitt Township officer Andy Lindemann, Lovegrove was found to have lots of change, reports said. He was released, but the next day, the manager of the VFW reported locks on a back door had been broken and about \$20 in cash and food had been taken.

A B&E at the home of Donald Flitton of Grove Road, Lansing, was reported to Clinton County Sheriff's deputies July 15. Flitton reported entry to his home had been gained by breaking in a rear door. Taken was a color TV and other items valued at \$543.

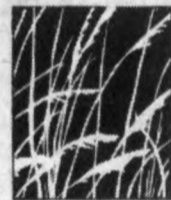

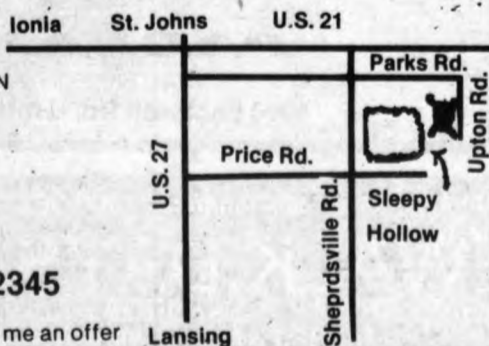



Huge crowd expected for Ag Expo events

More than 50,000 visitors are expected during the three days of commercial farm equipment displays, field demonstrations and tours planned for Ag Expo at Michigan State University.

The annual event is slated for July 26-28.

Unlike Farmers' Week and Natural Resources Days, which consist primarily of workshops, seminars and association meetings, Ag Expo puts the farmer in touch with the latest in farm equipment technology and field crop demonstrations.

"The two are compatible, in fact, even blend in purpose," said William Bickert, MSU Cooperative Extension Service agricultural engineer and Ag Expo chairman. "Farmers' Week and Natural Resources Days is designed to enable farmers to learn about improved

business management and develop personal skills in a series of workshops and classroom settings."

Ag Expo is more action-oriented, with more of a show-and-tell format that enables participants to see results of equipment performance and crop variety trials.

"It makes it possible for farmers to talk in one spot with equipment manufacturers and MSU specialists that they would otherwise have to do a great deal of travel to visit with," Bickert said.

During Ag Expo, 400 farm equipment manufacturers will cover 35 acres with just about every type of equipment and kind of supply used on the farm. Examples include irrigation systems, field machinery, dairy equipment and supplies, livestock handling equipment, grain harvesting, handling and storage systems; buildings,

seed and fertilizer supplies, and farm computers and software systems.

"This complete machinery exhibition will allow farmers to see the latest machinery available on the market and enable them to compare systems," Bickert said. "This can help them make long- and short-term management decisions to maintain or increase their farm production efficiency."

This year's activity will be augmented by daily tours of key agricultural research departments and walking tours of corn, soybean and alfalfa planting demonstrations. Free shuttle buses will operate between these sites and the main Ag Expo exhibition area.

A sizable portion of Ag Expo is devoted to analyzing pressing farm problems. At least 18 university booths, MSU specialists and technicians will be available to assist farmers with questions about soil testing, insect identification, animal health and other topics.

Details of Ag Expo may be obtained from the county cooperative extension service office.

Corn and soybeans are featured

Farmers who attend Ag Expo at Michigan State University can see corn and soybean planting techniques and the effects of plant population density.

Alfalfa planting practices will also be demonstrated.

These field demonstrations are part of the agronomic activities planned for the three-day event, which is intended to provide Ag Expo participants practical information for farm use.

The corn and soybean demonstrations will be in two parts: 16 acres of planting demonstrations and a corn and soybean population wheel. Free shuttle buses will run between the demonstration site and the Ag Expo exhibition area from 12:30 to 4 p.m. each day.

The planting demonstrations will be conducted on soil that has been either ridged, no-tilled, moldboard plowed or chisel plowed. A 30- by 75-foot portion of each of the 10 plots will have been planted in either corn or soybeans

earlier to show the results of the various planting techniques. Planters will operate in the remainder of each of the 300- by 75-foot tracts.

The planting wheel will have two rows each of 45 corn hybrids and six rows each of 15 public soybean varieties. Each row will be 75-feet long. The corn plant population will run from 15,000 to 35,000 plants per acre. The soys will range from 75,000 to 250,000 plants per acre.

"The planting wheel is intended to show the plant response to per acre plant population density according to soil type and cultural practice, given local weather conditions," said Jim Kells, MSU Cooperative Extension Service agronomist.

The alfalfa demonstrations will compare clear seeding, planting in oats and sod seeding. Milo Tesar, MSU agronomy researcher, says farmers will see how to get three to five tons of alfalfa per acre from first-year seeding.

Ag Expo is free and there will be free parking and complete noon meals and refreshments available at the site.

Water quality to be featured at Ag Expo

Farmers and others interested in maintaining lake or pond water quality will want to attend Ag Expo.

During the three-day event, the MSU Institute of Water Research will have information that visitors can use on their farms or in their communities.

Among the displays will be large aquariums of fish to illustrate food chains and the animal-plant interactions necessary to maintain high quality aquatic life in lakes and streams. Several methods for aquatic plant control and fish management will be demonstrated.

Lois Wolfson, MSU Institute of Water Research aquatic ecologist, said the major problem in Michigan lakes and ponds is an overabundance of aquatic plants caused by excessive nutrient levels in the water. These nutrients come into lakes in runoff from excessively fertilized farmland, water from urban storm sewers and seepage from septic tanks near shorelines.

Too many plants interfere with recreational activities such as swimming, fishing and boating. Plants may clog motors and get tangled in fishing lines. Fish stunting and overpopulation of smaller fish may also occur, Wolfson said. As plants die and decay, oxygen in the water is depleted and fish may be stressed or killed.

Wolfson, research manager Joe Erwin, and extension aquatic specialist Don Garling from the Michigan Department of Fisheries and Wildlife will help visitors understand the importance of good waste management.

Expo visitors can get help to identify problems they have encountered in water management and learn about possible solutions.

Where does money go?

For several years now, statistics have shown that farmers get an average of 32 cents out of every dollar we spend in the supermarket or restaurant. That was bad enough when you consider what each individual farmer has invested. However, recent government data indicates that the 32 cents has now dropped to only 28 cents.

Where does the rest of the dollar go? In a new brochure published by the American Farm Bureau, the figures show that labor gets 32 cents, and the remaining 40 cents goes to the providers of the various marketing services from packaging to profit.

A breakdown of this 40 cents would seem to indicate that nobody is getting rich as is sometimes alleged.

Think safety when using toxic pesticides

Farmers and homeowners need to think of safety and follow label directions when using pesticides, the county cooperative extension service advises.

Pesticides are poisons, and like other poisons, can cause illness or even death if not used with full precautions. Read the label on the pesticide container for the precautions that are needed for the safe use of that pesticide and then follow them.

Read the first aid information in the section of "precautionary statements." This could be critical in

case of an accident. An antidote is sometimes given in the first aid instructions. Do not administer the antidote, should it be available, except under the direct orders of a physician. Antidotes are themselves dangerous drugs.

The signs (what others can see) and symptoms (what the patient feels) of poisoning are so similar to any number of illnesses that diagnosis and treatment must be left to a competent medical doctor. Symptoms of poisoning appear very shortly after an excessive exposure to a pesticide. You should suspect poisoning, therefore, whenever an illness appears within 12 to as long as 24 hours after exposure to a pesticide.

Signs of a severe poisoning are obvious and the need for immediate medical attention is equally obvious. Some of the signs are: staggering or unconsciousness, pallid skin, sweating, salivation; twitching or convulsions, difficult breathing and contraction of the pupil of the eye. Get the patient and a labeled container of the pesticide used to a doctor immediately.

The early signs and symptoms of poisoning are easily mistaken for a variety of common illnesses and the need for medical attention can easily be dismissed. The symptoms may disappear without treatment if the exposure has been relatively small, but the early symptoms may be an indication of worse to come. Do not shrug off the symptoms if they appear within 12 to 24 hours after exposure to a pesticide.

Some of the early indications of poisoning are: fatigue, dizziness, numbness; stomach cramps, nausea, diarrhea, vomiting, headache, blurred vision, chest or back pain, sweating and salivation.

If you have some combination of these symptoms within 12 to 24 hours after exposure to a pesticide, have someone drive you to a doctor; do not try to drive yourself. Let the physician decide if it is poisoning.

Follow these procedures if there is suspected poisoning:

- Give artificial respiration if breathing is impaired. Call emergency personnel if the patient is unconscious or convulsive.
- Call a doctor and explain that a poisoning is suspected. Arrange for the doctor to come to the house or to meet at the nearest hospital.
- Have someone stay with the patient and keep the patient quiet, warm and as comfortable as possible.
- Take the patient and a labeled container of the pesticide used to the hospital as rapidly as possible. Do not let the patient drive and don't forget the pesticide label.
- Show the label of the pesticide to the physician. Important information is on the label. The information is in the section on "precautionary statements" and includes "first aid," "symptoms" and "statements of practical treatment." A 24-hour medical emergency telephone number is also given on most labels. This will put the doctor in direct contact with another doctor who has full knowledge of treatment of poisoning with that specific pesticide.

Pesticides are used safely on a large scale. An accident, a moment of carelessness or prolonged exposure, however, can result in poisoning. Stay alert to possible poisoning and be prepared to act immediately if poisoning is suspected.

Grain stocks show higher levels

The June 1 grain stocks report showed higher stock levels for corn, soybeans and oats compared to the same time last year. Corn stored in all positions at nearly 177 million bushels was 34 percent higher than a year ago, according to the Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service.

Sharp increases in stocks were noted in both on and off-farm storage facilities. Of the corn in storage, 73 percent was held in on-farm locations. Slow sales continue to be evident despite the price increase during the quarter.

Soybean holdings at over nine million bushels reflect a 16 percent increase from last year. Old crop oats in storage totaled nearly seven million bushels, more than double last year's quantity.

Oat prices have remained in the \$1.60 range and have not prompted large scale sales. Old crop winter wheat continues to be the only major crop in Michigan to display lower stock levels. On June 1, holdings totaled just under seven million bushels, 26 percent below last year's level.

Nationally, corn stored in all positions on June 1 totaled a record high 5.08 billion bushels, 30 percent more than last year's level. Of the total corn on hand 64 per-

cent was stored on farms.

Soybean stocks in all positions totaled a record high 867 million bushels up 33 percent from a year ago, and 28 percent above June 1, 1981.

Old crop wheat stored in all positions totaled a record high 1.54 billion bushels, 32 percent greater than the 1.16 billion bushels on hand a year earlier.

Old crop oats stored in all positions totaled 229 million bushels, 51 percent more than a year earlier and 30 percent greater than June 1, 1981.

Soil erosion also erodes food resources

Soil erosion on Michigan's 7.5 million acres of cropland caused additional damage to food-producing resources this spring.

Soil erosion, once believed to be under control, is a serious problem, said Warren Suchovsky, president of the Michigan Association of Conservation Districts. According to Suchovsky, erosion problems result from changes in cropping practices and more intense tillage.

Serious soil erosion has been overlooked in the past few years because severe sheet and rill erosion is no obstacle for the large four-wheel drive tractors used to

day. Application of commercial fertilizer masks loss of fertility associated with soil erosion.

"Soil erosion can no longer be considered a minor concern or accepted as part of normal farming practices," said Homer Hilner, state conservationist with the soil conservation service in East Lansing. Hilner and other conservation leaders toured farms in Clinton, Eaton, Ingham, Ionia and other counties to evaluate the current erosion situation.

"I've never seen erosion as bad as it is this year. We've got erosion in fields where I've never seen rills and gullies before," said Frank Brown, Barry County farmer and regional councilman for the Michigan Association of Conservation Districts. "We have less cover on the land to protect the soil from the impact of raindrops."

According to Hilner, people don't see erosion problems when driving past clean tilled fields. "People

need to stop and walk out into the fields to see and evaluate soil erosion problems. People on our tour were amazed by the amount of erosion they saw when they walked across the fields," Hilner said.

Robert Ditson, state resource conservationist for the soil conservation service, said the state's erosion problems can be controlled by resource management systems that include grassed waterways, contour farming and no-till conservation tillage.

The soil conservation service has requested extra funds to address severe erosion problems in Michigan. One proposal has been approved and the soil conservation service will receive additional funds in 1984 to address erosion problems in southwest lower Michigan. Status of the requests for southeast lower Michigan and west-central lower Michigan is not known, but officials expect them to be approved and funded in fiscal year 1985.

AgriCom, which is compatible with most computer systems, offers several options including marketing advice, futures quotations, cash prices, agricultural weather, market news, legislative reports and commodity news and financial information.

Farm Bureau staff, in cooperation with Corlee Computers, will have several types of computer systems and the AgriCom service available.

Equipment saves cash

Selecting the right equipment for various farm jobs can help farmers increase production efficiency and keep costs down.

Farmers can make the equipment selection process more efficient, too, by attending Ag Expo, the largest farm equipment show of its kind in Michigan.

The event at Michigan State University features 35 acres of farm equipment and displays. Visitors will see just about every type of machinery and supplies needed to help improve farm production efficiency.

William Bickert, MSU Cooperative Extension Service agricultural engineer and Ag Expo chairman, said the machinery displays represent almost every mechanized area in a typical farm operation. 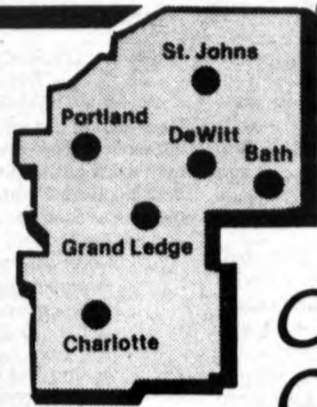

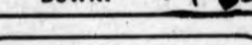
