## Church gets 'no'

The unwelcome task of choosing between religion and real estate values was awaiting county commissioners Tuesday, along with a gallery packed by people divided over a proposed Eagle Township church.

Commissioners eventually voted 6-1 to deny a special use permit to Eagle Wesley Chapel for construction of a small church on about 8 acres at the northwest corner of the Grange Road/1-96 intersection in Eagle Township. But not before both sides in the dispute had their say.

"There will be nothing but positive effects on the community," said Maynard Beery, site developer of the chapel. Along with members of the congregation, Beery argued that clay-laden soil makes the corner lot unsuitable for development as a commercial lot, and that by introducing a new form of waste treatment the church could pioneer methods that could open up similar lots to development for residential and commercial use.

But township residents, including 132 who signed petitions opposing the church at that location and many more who sent letters of protest, said the lot eventually could be developed for commercial uses, providing increased tax revenue for the township. They insisted Lansing is pushing northwest into the township and pointed out the lot is only 10 minutes by freeway from Delta Township's growing convention center.

Allowing a church to be built would remove the property from tax rolls, they said, and would also discourage development of commercial establishments, which state law will not allow to serve liquor within 500 feet of church property.

"If a church builds there, I'm limited as to who I can sell my property to," said

Robert Rademacher, whose property lies to the north of the church's parcel. "If a motel wants to sell liquor by the glass, they're saying I can't sell my property to a Holiday Inn or a Red Lobster if they're closer than 500 feet to the church."

Three Eagle Township officials were present to voice their opposition and remind board members the township board voted against church construction at the corner. "Don't get me wrong, I'm not against religion. I attend church every Sunday," said Township Clerk Alice Sullivan. "But there are other places for this church."

When the vote was taken, some commissioners said they favored construction of the church, but would bow to protests by the community and urge it be built elsewhere. Board Chairman Roger Overway recalled similar problems in DeWitt.

"I've lived with this problem since I moved to DeWitt in 1966," he said. "There were two churches and a Masonic temple downtown which stymied the growth of downtown DeWitt for years."

Only commissioner Richard DePond voted in favor of the church.

In other business, county commissioners:

- Approved a maximum \$1.5 million request for low-interest, tax free Economic Development Corporation financing aid to the A.J. Sparks Co. of Watertown Township for a 28,000 square-foot expansion of the John Henry Co. commercial printing plant at 5800 W. Grand River;

- And attended a brief reception in the county's Probate Court office in honor of a national award received for the county's Pioneers in Educational Programming Delinquency Diversion and Intervention Plan.

## Charge is dropped

Drunk driving charges against suspended City of DeWitt policeman Nicholas Stonebrook have been dismissed, and Stonebrook has now been charged with felonious driving.

Visiting District Judge Peter O'Connell of Mt. Pleasant ruled that blood tests taken at a Lansing hospital before Stonebrook was arrested on the drunk driving charge are inadmissible evidence, and granted a motion by Stonebrook's attorney for dismissal of the charge during a hearing Tuesday, July 19.

"In the judge's opinion, what he's saying is that if you get blood tests without first making an arrest, the results are inadmissible," Clinton County Prosecutor John Newman said. Newman immediately filed a felonious driving complaint, and Stonebrook demanded a preliminary examination on the new charge. No date for the exam had yet been set, a court spokesperson said last week.

Stonebrook was suspended by DeWitt

City Police Chief Wendell Myers shortly after the one-year city officer was charged with drunk driving. The charges were filed about a week after a Feb. 21 accident on US-27 involving Stonebrook and another off-duty officer, St. Johns patrolman Robert Moinet.

The accident occurred near the intersection of Price Road and US-27 when the auto Stonebrook was driving hit the left rear corner of a semi truck while headed south on US-27 at about 11:45 p.m. Stonebrook, 27, of DeWitt, had been drinking, Michigan State Police reports said.

Moinet, also a 27-year-old DeWitt resident, was seriously injured in the crash, but has since recovered and returned to duty with St. Johns Police July 1.

If convicted of felonious driving, Stonebrook faces a maximum penalty of two-years in jail and and/or a \$1,000 fine, Newman said. The dismissed drunk driving charge carries a maximum penalty of 90 days in jail, a \$500 fine and loss of driver's license.

## Merchants hit street for Sidewalk Days

Shoppers will find bargains without entering a store today when merchants wheel their wares into the wild outdoors in an annual local tradition, St. Johns Sidewalk Days.

For the first time in the long history of St. Johns Sidewalk Days, activities will be held at the new Southpoint Mall and Southgate shopping center, as well as downtown. And with more merchants that ever participating, the event could be one of the biggest ever, Chamber Manager Joanne Martis says.

A farmer's market and flea market will be sponsored by the organizer of Sidewalk Days, the St. Johns Area Chamber of Commerce. Also sponsored by the chamber will be a moonwalk concession (resembling a well-fed trampoline) at the St. Johns Police Department parking lot.

Both markets and the moonwalk will be held all three days of the three-day festival, which begins today and ends Saturday.

Activities sponsored by other organizations at all three locations in-

clude: contests in pizza eating, frisbee throwing, bubble gum blowing, videogame scoring and water balloon tossing, all at Southpoint Mall; fundraisers by non-profit groups; an open house at the Senior Citizens' Center on Clinton Avenue from 1-4 p.m. today; a pig roast in the American Legion parking lot on Walker Street beginning at 11 a.m. Friday; clowns, pony rides and a dunk tank, all three days at the mall; and, of course, plenty of good bargains.

Vendors were still needed for the farmer's and flea markets, Mrs. Martis said early in the week. "Stalls are available on a first-come, first-served basis."

Hot and sunny weather was forecast for all three days; good news for shoppers and merchants, who together could make this year's Sidewalk Days one of the biggest ever. "We're up by 10 merchants this year from last year," Mrs. Martis said. She credited new businesses opened at the Southpoint Mall with helping to boost the total participating businesses to 40.

# Bakery broken into, but no 'bread' taken

An airplane landed on Airport Road, appropriately enough; a DeWitt Township policeman was assaulted while making an arrest; a Warren truck driver was critically injured in a four-car pileup on I-69 in Bath Township; and no dough was reported missing after a bakery break-in.

These and other activities were part of a total of 110 complaints handled by county law enforcement agencies during the past week, according to sheriff's department figures. Among reports were:

- Frederick Boeger, 53, of Warren, was listed in "serious" condition Tuesday at Sparrow Hospital while awaiting transfer from the hospital's critical care unit, a hospital spokesperson said. Boeger was blamed for an accident on I-69 at the intersection of Marsh Road in Bath Township July 20, Bath Township Police reported.

The accident occurred at about 4 p.m., when Boeger slammed his semi truck into the rear end of three cars stopped at a red light. The cars were all headed west on I-69, as was Boeger, reports said.

Boeger's truck hit the rear of another semi driven by Kurt Pfost, 31, of Vicksburg. Pfost and a passenger in his truck, Eula Risema, 37, of Kalamazoo, both were treated for injuries and released at Sparrow Hospital.

Upon impact, Pfost's truck was pushed into the rear of an auto driven by Molly Beehler, 21, of Owosso, slightly injuring Ms. Beehler and her passenger, LeAnne Spayd of Perry. Both sought their own treatment.

The Beehler vehicle was pushed into a car driven by Wilhelm Porteners, 51, of Pontiac, and containing his

wife, Jacoba, of the same address. Both sought their own treatment for injuries.

The accident is under investigation and no citation has been issued, reports said.

- A small private aircraft was forced down by engine trouble and landed on Airport Road in Olive Township July 19, sheriff's reports said. The plane was towed to Capitol City Airport by DeWitt City Police after being located by a National Guard helicopter. The pilot was uninjured.

- DeWitt Township officer Andy Lindemann was assaulted by Greg Nevils, 23, of Lansing, while arresting Nevils near 4 a.m. Saturday morning, reports said. Lindemann saw Nevils driving erratically on Sheridan Road near Turner Street and pulled him over near Sheridan and Northdale, reports said. Nevils tried to walk away, but was advised he was under arrest for drunken driving. A pushing and shoving match ensued and Nevils was subdued and forced into the back of Lindemann's patrol car, kicking Lindemann several times in the process.

Nevils has been charged with operating a vehicle while under the influence of liquor, resisting arrest and assaulting an officer, reports said.

- DeWitt Township Police were told no cash was taken during a break-in at Westside Bakery, 3625 N. Turner, Tuesday morning. Drawers were ransacked and several offices had been entered, but money in the bakery was not taken in the break-in, which was reported at 5:56 a.m.

- Bath Township Police arrested a Park Lake Trailer Park resident for disorderly conduct Sunday night, reports said. Ellen Spayd, alias Coulson, of Lot 49, was taken into custody after refusing to heed the warning of a township police officer who had been called to quell noise from a loud drinking party, reports said. Ms. Spayd was arrested at 10:58 p.m. and was lodged in Gratiot County Jail.

- A DeWitt Township resident lost his pickup in a "swap" car theft near 4:30 a.m. July 24, reports said. Richard Wood of 10720 Norris Road reported he heard his 1979 Datsun pickup being started and driven away. Police investigating the theft found a stolen 1964 Chevrolet truck, reported missing from Ionia County, down the road from Wood's home. Police speculated the Chevrolet broke down and was traded-in for a newer model.

- Terry Fernand Maniez, 34, of 6266 W. Mead, St. Johns, appeared in 65th District Court July 18, where he was ordered to stand trial on a three-count felony for alleged thefts of tin ingots from Federal Mogul Corp., St. Johns Police reported. Maniez was charged with embezzlement, possession of stolen property and conspiracy to embezzle. His is the latest of several arrests which resulted from a lengthy investigation of employee tin thefts at the St. Johns plant.

Maniez was released on a \$2,000 personal recognizance bond, and no trial date was set.

- A boat trailer was reported stolen by Samuel Bennett of 2000 W. Maple, Lansing, July 19. Reports said Bennett went fishing on Lake Ovid at 6:30 a.m. When he returned to his car, his boat trailer was missing.

- About \$900 in stereo equipment was reported stolen when the Morris Neal family of 614 Lakeview Dr., DeWitt Township, returned from vacation at 12:20 p.m. Sunday, July 24. Reports said the home had been entered through a basement window.

- Three aluminum bleachers valued at a total of \$240 were reported stolen from DeWitt High School July 18. The bleachers are about 16- to 18-feet long, reports said.

- About \$1,000 damage was done to 12 stop and yield signs in Fowler July 18, reports said. Sheriff's reports speculated a four-wheel-drive vehicle was used to push the signs over.

- A \$100 AMF Sportster moped was reported stolen by Erik Ferden of Lot 194, Searles Trailer Park, St. Johns, July 18.

- Several cases of malicious destruction of property were reported, including: Diana L. Good of 3807 N. Hollister Road, Elsie, reported someone put about 15 lbs. of sugar in the gas tank of her Chevrolet van on or about July 9; and Jeffrey Cole of 437 W. Cherry St., Mason, reported tires on his car were slashed while it was parked on Grand River in Watertown Township July 23, resulting in about \$300 in damage.

## Paving approved

Streets, curbs, gutters and sidewalk in St. Johns will be improved following action by the city commission Monday night.

Commissioners approved a \$42,642 bid by Spartan Asphalt of Holt for street paving and a \$5,540 bid by B.B.R. Progressive Concrete of Grand Ledge for curb and gutter work. Also approved was \$2,000 for sidewalk work near railroad crossings at Lansing and Clinton avenues.

A public hearing was set for Aug. 8 at 7:45 p.m. for residents in an area stretching from S. Lansing Ave. to the city limits. The city is considering a special assessment for water hookups, city assessor Diane Edwards said.

A car wash sponsored by the St. Johns junior varsity cheerleaders was authorized for July 28-29 next to the city police department. The car wash will run from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

# County to appeal back pay for deputies

A ruling which could cost the Clinton County Sheriff's Department the equivalent of two deputies' salaries for the rest of the year will be appealed by county commissioners.

County officials were notified of the decision earlier this month, shortly after an administrative law judge for the state Department of Labor ruled that 18 deputies are entitled to almost \$13,000 in back pay and penalties.

The news comes just weeks after a state arbitrator ordered the department to give deputies a 17 percent two-year raise, which touched off a battle for more money between Sheriff Anthony Hufnagel and the county commission. After threatening to eliminate midnight road patrols, Hufnagel finally settled for half of the \$30,000 he had requested to fund the raises.

Now faced with another big bill resulting from labor disputes with deputies, commissioners first decided to pay the amount from the sheriff's budget, using cuts in overtime and lay offs if necessary to make up the difference.

Then, after being told by the county's attorney that they had a good chance of

winning an appeal in Clinton County Circuit Court because the administrative law judge did not consider some evidence, commissioners voted Tuesday to file an appeal.

"An appeal will not cost much, because most of the (legal) legwork is already done," Earl Lancaster told fellow commissioners. However, if the appeal fails the county must pay the amount, plus attorney's fees and interest, he pointed out.

The latest labor trouble began when deputies filed a complaint with labor officials almost three years ago, a department spokesman said. The complaint asked for three years' of back pay for daily 15 minute briefing sessions held at the beginning of each shift.

"The contract originally called for deputies to work 40 hours and 75 minutes per week," explained Capt. Bob Ferry, who has participated in negotiations on behalf of the department. "The 75 minutes was made up of 15 minutes per day in shift briefings held at the beginning of each shift when the previous shift went over various details."

But when negotiations began on the 1982-83 contract, the deputies, represented by the Police Officers Association of Michigan, requested payment for the briefings. "We said if they

wanted to be paid for them, we'd eliminate them," Ferry said.

Later, though, when negotiations were deadlocked over the deputies' request for an extra day of personal leave, the department suggested a trade: unpaid briefing time in return for the personal day. The trade was agreed upon, but not put in writing, and the contract was ratified, Ferry said.

The department later tried to eliminate the 15-minute briefings, but was blocked by the deputies union, which filed complaints in January, 1981, requesting 18 deputies be paid time and a half for each 15 minute briefing period during the past three years.

The Department of Labor eventually ruled the deputies were entitled to pay for

18 months of briefings at their standard rate of pay, Ferry said — a decision which was confirmed when an administrative law judge overruled the department's appeal June 30.

The department has been told to pay the 18 deputies \$10,713 in back pay, plus \$2,052 in penalties, for a total of about \$12,766, Ferry said.

If forced to make the payments from the present year's budget, manpower cuts could be necessary, Ferry said. One deputy has already been laid off as a result of budget cuts following the recent pay hike arbitration. "It could cost us two more positions," Ferry said of the briefing-pay ruling. "If it comes from this year's budget, that amount would represent pay for two deputies for 15 weeks."

## Mishler named state president

The rainbow for Kay Mishler led her to a pot of gold in Grand Rapids.

That's where the St. Johns woman was elected as president of the Department of Michigan American Legion Auxiliary. Mrs. Mishler, 102 E. Cass St., ran unopposed for the office at the 63rd annual convention.

Upon election to the top post Saturday, July 16, she announced the state auxiliary's theme for her one-year term. Because she enjoys rainbows, the theme will be, "A Rainbow Over Michigan."

Rainbow pins on dresses and rainbow emblems on straw hats will be worn by many of the state's 28,408 auxiliary members during Mrs. Mishler's reign.

"I'm partial to rainbows," she said. "I just

think rainbows are neat."

Mrs. Mishler's presidency, which runs from July 17 through July of 1984, is the first for a woman from St. Johns.

The former Oldsmobile employee — she left her job after a car accident in 1968 — plans to travel 70,000-80,000 miles in Michigan alone during her term. Husband Keith, a former St. Johns postmaster who retired last year, will log many of those miles with her in the couple's 1977 Chrysler New Yorker.

"He has so graciously volunteered to be my chauffeur this year," she said. "He had traveled with me before, but not to the extent he will this year."

Mrs. Mishler joined American Legion Auxiliary Unit 153 in St. Johns in 1950 and has moved up

the state ladder ever since. She has held numerous offices statewide, including historian, chaplain, second vice-president and first vice-president. In St. Johns, she serves as secretary for the 136-member auxiliary unit.

As state president, her duties include supervising committees, visiting units when invited, riding in parades and overseeing American Legion Auxiliary Unit projects. She also will be working to help the organization meet its national membership goal of one million members.

# Open house honors Allaby

A two-day open house honoring the 50th anniversary of Allaby & Brewbaker, Inc. in St. Johns was a grand event for the some 250 people who attended.

The insurance agency's founder, A.T. Allaby, Sr., might have had a hard time imagining that scene. His roots can be traced to a

cramped, second-floor office at 108 1/2 Clinton Ave. in 1933.

Allaby stayed in St. Johns for all of those years and earned a reputation around town as "Mr. Insurance." He died just before the 50th year celebration, at the age of 78 in April of 1982.

"If he was here and we were paying this tribute to him, he'd think it would be

ridiculous for us to be frogging around and paying this tribute to him," said Leon Brewbaker, Allaby's associate since 1965.

"He did a lot of things in the background. He did a lot of charitable things in the background that no one really knew about."

During the open house last Wednesday and Thursday, Brewbaker said several of Allaby's original policy holders stopped by the agency, located downstairs at 108 Clinton Ave.

On Wednesday, District Court Judge Frederick Lewis delivered a 10-minute memorial speech. Then, agency employees presented the Allaby family with an oil painting of the agency founder, which will hang near the front of the office.

Allaby came to St. Johns

from New Brunswick, Canada, and started what is thought to be the first insurance agency in St. Johns. He was originally affiliated with Auto Owners Insurance Co. of Lansing.

"Mr. Allaby was always known in St. Johns as THE insurance man," Brewbaker said. "He was very ethical. He gave them excellent service. If you called him, he referred to himself as 'Allaby the insurance man.' He was very proud of that."

Brewbaker, a State Farm agent since 1956, hooked up with Allaby in 1965.

"He was getting to the age where he wanted to slow down and he wanted an associate to step into his shoes, so we joined forces," said Brewbaker. "It was a means of perpetuating the agency, really."

Since 1965, the agency has grown from a staff of four to 14 total employees. It ranks as the largest agency in Clinton County and among the top 10 percent in size in the Lansing area, according to Brewbaker.

Brewbaker, 57, said he plans to retain the Allaby & Brewbaker name as long as he is with the agency. "It's been a good household name around the area," he said. "We're proud to have his name on there."

But thanks to some Clinton County residents, even that excuse is getting lamer. Headed by Rev. David Lord of St. Johns, the Clinton County Child Safety Committee is trying to raise money to give away child restraint devices to families who need them.

A few restless kids might disagree, but I think it sounds like a great idea.

### She's keeping the faith

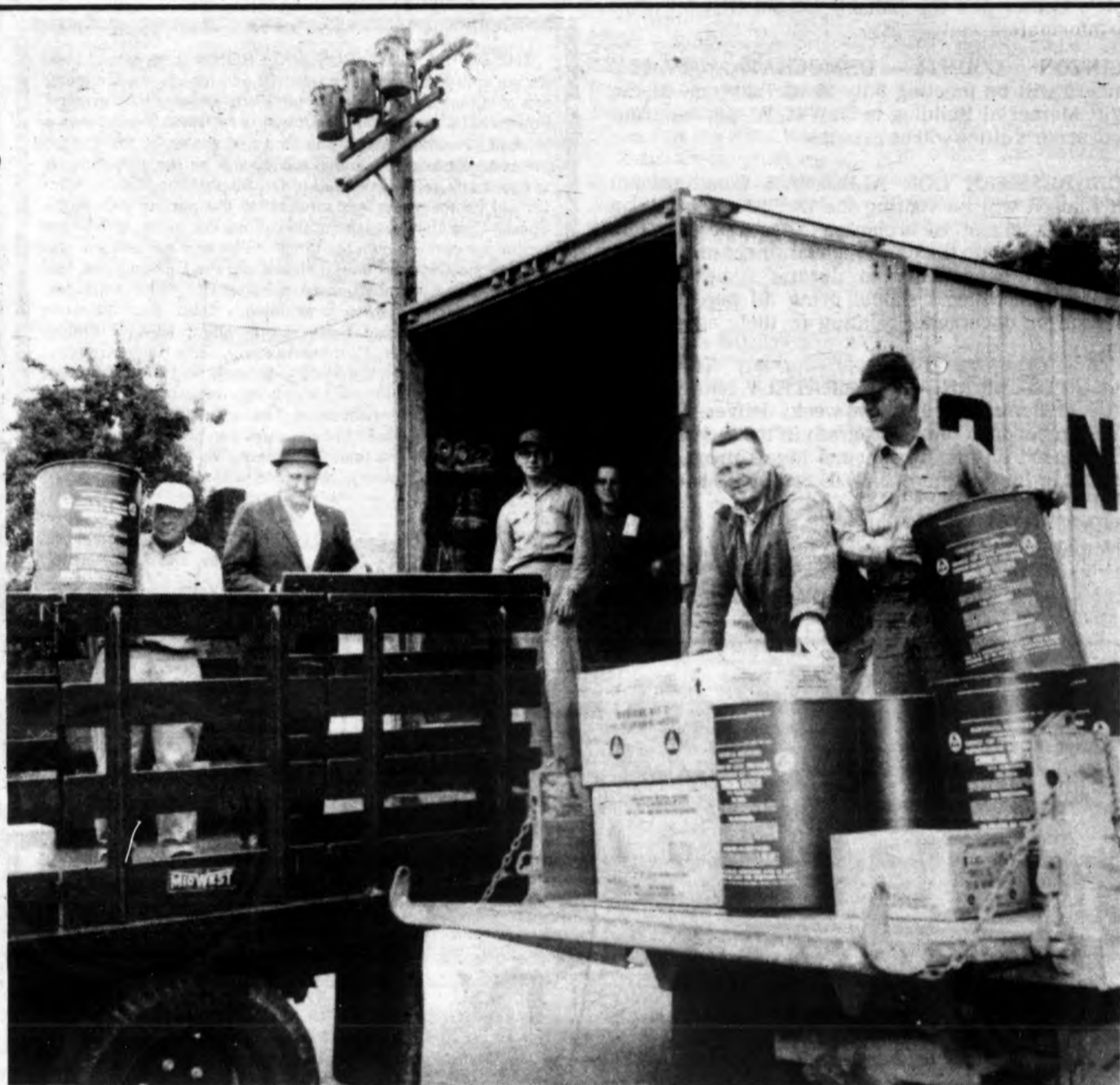
To the editor:

# Car seats for every child is Lord's prayer

On June 25, a Lansing man driving north on US-27 near DeWitt was injured when another driver suddenly turned in front of him. A one-year-old riding in the back seat of his auto was unhurt.

Three weeks later, three adults were injured in a three-car pileup just a few miles away on Clark Road, when a Lansing driver ran a stop sign, crashing into a Eureka woman's auto and bouncing it into the path of an auto driven by a Lansing woman. Two infants in the back seat of the third vehicle were unscathed.

There are plenty of coincidences: In both accidents, the driver at fault was unhurt; both occurred at intersections on Clark Road; both were handled by DeWitt Township Police; all of those injured in the two crashes were not wearing seatbelts.

One fact is no coincidence: Both wrecks could have caused the tragic deaths of innocent infants if not for a new state law requiring use of child restraint seats.

"I have heard of a number of cases where restraint devices have basically saved a child's life," Capt. Larry Jones of the DeWitt Township Police said. "These children could easily have been hurt very badly if they hadn't been in a child restraint seat. They were one-year-olds, and a one-year-old gets tossed around a lot in an accident. They have no way of anticipating the impact. Even at 35 miles-per-hour, when you hit something, that child is still going 35 miles-per-hour and that's the speed at which they'll be stopped, by the windshield or whatever."

Since the child restraint law went into effect in April, 1982, any child under age 4 riding in the front seat of a passenger vehicle must be in a child restraint device; children under 1 must be in a restraint device no matter where they ride. In the first three months after the law went into effect, one in every three pre-schoolers involved in an auto accident was spared a serious injury or death, state police studies say.

But there are still problems with the child restraint law. For one, pickups, vans and recreational vehicles are exempt, mainly because most infant seats are not easily adapted to pickup use, a state police spokesman said. Some would like to see that loophole closed, especially in rural areas where the family pickup often doubles as the family car.

Another problem is cost: Good infant seats which can be adapted to toddlers retail for about \$50, giving families on tight budgets a good reason to ignore the law.

But Rev. David Lord is taking care of that, at least as far as Clinton County children are concerned.

"All you have to do is stand on the street corner and realize that people aren't using them," Lord says. "We have this law, but the seats are not inexpensive."

Lord's answer? Pass out free infant car seats and instructions instead of tickets. "We had this pilot program where the sheriff's deputies carried car seats. Instead of giving people a ticket when they stopped them for a violation (of the child restraint law) they'd give them a seat. The deputies said it was really neat, a really positive experience."

All Lord and his Clinton County Child Safety Committee need is a truckload of child restraint seats. While you're at it, make that a trainload.

"We tried to get a manufacturer to give them to us, but they didn't go for that and we decided that was pretty adventurous. But they will give us a discount, and we figure at the wholesale price, we can get them for half or less than half of retail, plus shipping. If we can get enough to buy a boxcar load, our shipping costs will be lower."

Lord knows that's a big order. "Ideally, if we could raise \$100,000, we could give away 20 to 25 seats per month. I realize that's pretty optimistic, but we think we can get various groups in the county motivated."

To start with, the committee has obtained a \$20,000 "seed money" loan from the Mid-Michigan District Health Department. Health Department Director Joe Latoff, who helped Lord hatch the plan, is a member of the committee, along with Rev. Robert Gillette, Rev. Keith Laidler, deputy Terry Haneckow, posse member Clarence LeVeck, Fr. Tom Nenneau, Karen Pease of the Jaycettes and John Reynolds of the National Highway and Traffic Safety Administration.

"So far the response has been great," Lord said. "We hope to get into operation by Labor Day. We'd like to provide every person who needs one with a seat and instructions on how to use it."

The Child Safety Committee will hold an organizational meeting at 7:30 p.m. today in the St. Johns High School Library.

"We'd like to emphasize it as a health threat," Lord says, pointing out accidents are the leading cause of death and injury among children. "When polio was a health threat, we set about providing free vaccinations. We'd like to do the same here."



## Ovid racer pays the price for winning

Auto racing fans at Spartan Speedway know the routine all too well.

Late Model stock cars circle the asphalt track in Mason every Friday night, and one driver — Ovid's Jim Aldrich — usually finishes in first place. He's won eight of the 10 races he's entered this year.

Interestingly, winning has created some popularity problems for Aldrich. Certain fans have come to dislike him, much like certain baseball fans dislike the winning ways of the New York Yankees.

"There's a certain amount that boo you all the time," said Aldrich, a Bath High School graduate who has been racing at Spartan Speedway since 1966. "They say I shouldn't be here, I've got too good a car. But it's not my fault that I'm faster than they are."

"Nobody likes a winner that many times. I can see their point. Once I get in the lead, it's usually over — a race for second."

Evidence of Aldrich's speed came last Friday, when he posted the night's fast time of 14.47 for one 1/2-mile lap. The next fastest time was 14.79.

"That's quite a difference over a 30-lap race," he said.

Avoiding accidents is critical to any racer's success, and the 35-year-old Aldrich has dodged every crash in his path this season. Last Friday's feature race provided a good example of this when he steered around a six-car crash on the 10th lap.

"I've had my fair amount of breaks," he said. "The car's been good, but a fair amount of experience helps. Between the two, if you stay out of trouble, it's a pretty good combination."

"Basically, it's looking ahead. You've got to pay attention on all sides."

When Aldrich came out of Bath, he started racing at

Spartan Speedway. He's been there ever since, though he once entertained dreams of the American Speed Association circuit.

"To go any further now, it just takes a lot more money," said Aldrich, a truckdriver. "You've either got to have a good backing or a real rich Daddy."

In 1973, he enjoyed one of his best seasons when he captured four victories in the Busch Racing Series. He then won track championships at Owosso Speedway in 1974 and Spartan Speedway in 1977.

Aldrich built his present car, a Pontiac Firebird with a 355 horsepower Chevrolet engine, before the 1982 season. That became his finest year as he took 13

feature races and track titles at Owosso and Spartan.

Two victories at Stueben County Speedway in Angola, Ind., give him a total of 10 victories this season. He is well on his way to defending his track championship at Spartan, leading by about 500 points over Perry's Ray Gadd.

Despite this success, Aldrich is not thinking about jumping to a higher level of competition. In fact, he is thinking about selling his race car and taking a vacation.

"I'll wait until the middle of winter and decide," he said. "It'd be hard to quit, but I'm thinking of taking a year off."

## Sillman's Store aims for another city crown

A glance at all of the trophies at Sillman's Store on M-21 in St. Johns can make one curious about how long owner Orville Sillman has been active as a sponsor.

As one might expect, it's been a long time. Ten years, to be exact. That's when Mike Stoddard of St. Johns approached Sillman and asked him to sponsor his softball team in the St. Johns Men's League.

Stoddard still coaches the team, but he has trouble recalling how many city championships it has won. "We used to win it every year when we first started," he said.

Mrs. Stockman said her husband could open up the speedway again this season. "If something came up that he had the money to operate it, he'll open it up. He likes doing it."

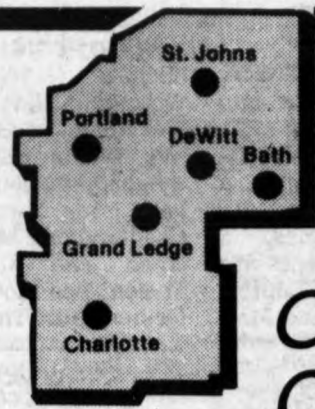

# Senior band preps for St. Johns show

Bands like the St. Johns Senior Citizens Fun Band aren't very picky when it comes to choosing members.

At the festival, awards will be given in categories such as best performance, oldest average age, best costume and longest distance traveled. Registration deadline for the festival is Aug. 10, with a \$10 entry fee required.
