Teachers consider three-year contract

School will start on time in St. Johns if both sides approve a tentative three-year teacher contract negotiated near dawn Monday morning.

The 11th-hour agreement could avert a teacher strike and end nearly two years of bargaining if ratified by teachers. The school board will consider the contract during a special meeting Aug. 24, just a few days before teachers are scheduled to return to work. Teachers, who will meet to consider the pact on Aug. 22, have promised to strike if a contract is not approved by their first day of school.

Details of the agreement are not being released by either side, but districts of similar size in Clinton County have granted teachers raises ranging from five to nearly seven percent.

Superintendent of Schools Earl Gabriel and St. Johns Education Association President Ted Slicer both refused to discuss details of the tentative contract, but Slicer said the agreement, if approved, would cover three years: the past school year, 1982-83; the coming year, 1983-84; and the next, 1984-85.

The items still at issue in the final hours of talks were "salary and teacher qualifications in regards to lay offs," Gabriel said. "Agreements on all economic and non-economic issues have been reached to the satisfaction of both parties."

Teachers began negotiating with the school board in January, 1982, and board

members soon demanded teachers accept a wage freeze to help hold the budget line. Similar demands were made in the county's other five districts, but all have since settled with teachers.

Pewamo-Westphalia was first to settle with a one-year wage freeze agreement; Bath followed with a 3.5 percent one-year increase. Both districts are resuming negotiations for the coming year.

DeWitt teachers went on strike for a week in February before winning pay hikes of nearly seven percent for each of two years.

Fowler teachers accepted a wage freeze for the past school year in return for a five percent raise this year; Ovid-Elsie teachers got a five percent raise this year and next year, but took a wage freeze for 1982-83. They settled a month ago, leaving only St. Johns bargaining 1982-83 contracts.

The St. Johns agreement was ironed out following a series of marathon "shuttle negotiations" from 6 p.m. Thursday to 2:30 a.m. Friday; again Friday from 10:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m., and on Monday from 9 p.m. to 4 a.m., Superintendent Earl Gabriel said.

"We put the board members in one room, the teachers in another and the negotiators went between them," he said.

Part of the agreement calls for an earlier start of school — by one day — than previously announced. Teachers are to report on Aug. 29; students, Aug. 30. There will be no school Friday, Sept. 2, and the following Monday, Labor Day, Gabriel said.

Businessman fed up with 'regular' thefts

If you happen to see a dozen or so trailer axles sitting around somewhere, Greg King would appreciate it if you'd give him a call.

That goes for a new stereo and about 400 lbs. of pressure treated lumber, too. All of the items were stolen from King Manufactured Homes on US-27 in DeWitt Township in recent weeks, and King is getting fed up.

"Someone is walking in here at night and having a good ol' time," he said.

First taken on July 27 were 16 trailer axles, worth \$2,000, King said. They measure about eight feet long and weigh 150 lbs. each, he said. "It's just amazing anyone could take that large of a load out of here and not be seen. They must have had a big truck."

A week or two later, a stack of Wolmanized lumber came up missing. Last weekend, it was a stereo. In all, he estimates the losses at about \$2,200.

"This weekend they stole the stereo our workers listen to. It was brand new and it was my own personal stereo

I brought in for our office, and that's what I'm mad about," King said Monday.

Angry about the "pretty regular" thefts, King lashed out at area law enforcement agencies. "I'm not expecting them to do any miracles, I'm just expecting them to do some follow-up," he said. "We were hoping they would at least come back and have a look around or something."

Capt. Larry Jones of the DeWitt Township Police Department, which has responded to the complaints, said such thefts are routinely turned over to the Clinton County Detective Bureau for investigation.

"Whenever there are reports of thefts continuously in a certain area, we give that special attention," he said. "But unless there's a regular pattern, we can't afford the man hours to sit on it five nights in a row. We have to be virtually certain, or at least sure of a high probability that a place is going to be hit," to establish a stake-out, he said.

"It's a sad thing to say that we have to put this on the back burner, but it's a fact of police life."

Sgt. Dick May, chief of the Detective Bureau, agreed

with Jones that there are few clues to follow in the axle theft. "They're very hard to trace. They have no serial numbers, probably, and unless someone reads about it in the paper and sees them laying around, there's not much to go on."

"Maybe we'll hear by the grapevine that someone's building trailers all of a sudden, and then we'll go by and look at the trailers. But even then it could be tough to identify them."

"I can see where Mr. King is upset, they have had a lot of larcenies," May said, adding that he would send Crime Prevention Officer Jay Trost to King's business to see if there are ways in which security could be improved.

Although the Detective Bureau has been cut from six to four since the Michigan State Police and Bath Township pulled their officers out, problems like King's have little to do with manpower, May said. "That's just a situation where you could have 20 officers on duty, but you're still going to have thievery."

Meanwhile, Jones offered some words of reassurance — to King, not speeders. "We do use his lot for (traffic) radar checks, so we're often there at night."

Bette Munger selected to head E. Essex School

Bette Munger, a kindergarten teacher at Central Elementary for 13 years, was appointed principal of East Essex Elementary by St. Johns school board members last week.

Mrs. Munger, who began her teaching career at Central, will take over for Beverly Baker, who retired as East Essex principal at the end of the 1982-83 school year.

Mrs. Munger was chosen from a field of five candidates. Although East Essex

was one of two rural elementary schools targeted for closing by an administration cost-saving task force, Mrs. Munger's contract as principal will be for at least one year, Superintendent Earl Gabriel said.

"I don't anticipate any school closings in the current school year," he said.

The closing plan, which recommended shut down of East Essex and East Olive before the coming school year, drew heavy flack from parents and community members in both neighborhoods. Bowing to public pressure, the board voted last

spring to table the recommendation until December, when it will consider the findings of a citizens' committee headed by former board president Ron Huard.

Also to be considered are counter-proposals calling for closing of Central.

Mrs. Munger, who was out of town all week and could not be reached for comment, lives at 300 S. Oakland, along with her husband, Benson, and two children, Heidi, 19, and Chad, 17.

In other business at their special meeting Wednesday, Aug. 3, board members tabled a recommendation on

purchase of new word processing equipment for the administration office. Two board members abstained after announcing they held stock in IBM, and another said more data was needed. Along with one member absent, the abstentions left too few votes for a decision, Gabriel said.

After checking regulations, it was later discovered abstentions are not required of stockholders, Gabriel said, and a vote is expected by the next regular meeting on Aug. 10.

Controller Rick Terres said the equipment would cost the district \$23,449.

Assault-rape investigated

Bath Township was the scene of a drowning and a beating/rape last week, and the county's 10th auto accident death in 1983 was reported.

Among the reports by county law enforcement agencies during the past week were:

• Clinton County detectives are investigating the

beating and rape of a Meridian Township woman in the Rose Lake area of Bath Township Friday night, Aug. 5.

A possible suspect is being sought on charges of first-degree criminal sexual conduct and assault and battery, a spokesman for the Detective Bureau said. Reports said the victim apparently voluntarily rode in the suspect's auto, and was taken to the Rose Lake area, where she was beaten and raped. She was later treated and released at a Lansing hospital.

• David Claudio, 16, of Waverly Road, Lansing,

was killed in a farming accident on the A. Duda and Sons Farms, Towar Avenue, Bath Township, on Aug. 4 at 11 a.m., reports said.

Clinton County detectives and investigators from the Michigan Department of Labor are looking into the accident, which occurred when a tractor driven by Claudio, a Duda Farms employee, fell from a bridge and pinned him under water, reports said.

• Mary E. Musat, 31, of 12347 W. Herbison, Eagle, was killed Aug. 2 when her auto collided with another vehicle driven by Harry Arnold Stark Jr., 27, of 4422 12th St., Moline, Mich.

The accident occurred Aug. 2 at the intersection of S. Tallman and W. Herbison roads.

Stark was taken to St. Lawrence Hospital for treatment of injuries. Two passengers in his vehicle, Marcus P. Klawieter, 25, of Byron Center, and Richard A. Nichols, 25, of Wayland, sought their own treatment for injuries, reports said.

Reports said the Musat vehicle was headed west on Herbison Road, and the vehicle driven by Stark, owned by Reurink Star Silo Co., was headed south on Tallman when the two collided. No stop or yield signs are posted at the intersection, sheriff's reports said. No citation was issued.

• Roger W. Hankins, 18, of 14155 Francis Road, Lansing, was injured in an accident one-tenth of a

mile north of Bancroft Road on Forrest Hill Road Aug. 2, when a dog ran in the path of his motorcycle. Hankins was headed south on Forrest Hill when he struck the dog. He sought his own treatment for injuries, Clinton County Sheriff's reports said.

• Walter McCrumb of 14335 Center St., Eagle, reported the theft of his auto, a 1972 Toyota Land Cruiser, on Aug. 7, sheriff's reports said. As officers attempted to locate the vehicle, Michigan State Police reported the vehicle was involved in a hit-and-run property damage accident in Portland, reports said. The vehicle was later found abandoned in Eagle.

A tracking dog from the Eaton County Sheriff's Department followed the trial of suspects for one-half mile before losing the scent. Later, however, two juvenile suspects were contacted and turned over to probate court, where they are also suspected of other crimes in the area, reports said.

• Two sets of golf clubs and two pairs of shoes were taken from an auto owned by Richard W. Hubble, 4807 Dunckel, Lansing, reports said.

The theft was reported at the Royal Scott Golf Course in Watertown Township on Aug. 2, sheriff reports said. The estimated loss was over \$1,000.

DeWitt Superintendent Steve Garrett makes no bones about the fact he is looking for another job.

"My contract was not extended and it ends next June," he said. "When your contract is not extended, that's the board's way of telling you they want to make a change."

Garrett's performance will be reviewed again by the DeWitt Board of Education before his contract expires, and could be renewed. If it is, he says, he will consider staying in DeWitt. "I like DeWitt and I think we have a good school system here. Things are going well."

Garrett recently interviewed for a job as superintendent of Swan Lake Schools, near Saginaw, and was also interviewed by Hastings Public Schools, he said.

"When you've been a superintendent for 12 years and a public school administrator for 22 years, that's your life's work," he said. "I don't particularly want to leave DeWitt, though, and I would consider staying."

Garrett became superintendent of DeWitt Schools almost four years ago.

DeWitt's ox gets roasted

Grand Marshall Ralph Woodruff, a long-time DeWitt resident and banker, will lead one of the biggest parades ever in the long history of DeWitt Ox Roast celebrations Aug. 20.

The theme of the 1983 version of the Ox Roast Parade is "Happy Birthday DeWitt," commemorating the city's 150th birthday, organizer Linda Hodges said. A more elaborate sesquicentennial celebration is also planned for October.

Among the attractions in the parade a week from Saturday morning will be:

- Woodruff, once president of Woodruff Bank in DeWitt, will lead the parade, accompanied by Mayor Lynn Thayer and DeWitt Citizen of the Year Art Newman. Following will be DeWitt's Sesquicentennial Queens, Chanin Theil and Denise Secord.

"I don't know where to start," Mrs. Hodges said when asked to highlight the 80 to 100 entries in the parade. "There will be lots of floats."

- DeWitt, DeWitt Township and Bath Township fire departments, local chapters of the American Legion, the Clinton County Sheriff's Posse, District Judge Fred Lewis' bagpipe band, Capital City Corvette Club autos, high school and senior citizen bands and the Bath Shootin' Stars Square Dance Club will join the parade.

- Wayne Belbeck's Civil War soldiers, the 27th Virginia Infantry will be featured. "They're a very impressive group," Mrs. Hodges promised.

- Bears, big rats and comic-strip characters, best known to kids for the restaurants they represent, will also march in the parade, she said.

County fair centers on youth

"What does the phrase 'county fair' conjure up in your mind?"

Scenes of Tilt-O-Whirls, Ferris wheels and freak shows may flutter through your memory. Or maybe you used to go to the fair and try to knock down bottles with a ball to win a stuffed St. Bernard.

Unless you have traveled outside of Clinton County for a fair, you would have none of those memories. The Clinton County 4-H Youth Fair, which runs Monday through Thursday next week, has never been commercialized.

"The feeling of the people is they just don't want the commercial thing to take away from the kids," said Larry Phinney, president of the Clinton County Fair Board.

"It think it's kind of unique. There isn't over two or three fairs like that in the state of Michigan."

The Clinton County fair started off non-commercial in 1937, and has been non-commercial ever since, according to fair officials.

The closest it has ever come to being commercialized was when a commercial exhibit tent was introduced in 1981. The tent, which resulted because of large cuts in state funding, includes space which local merchants can rent.

Reaction to the tent was hostile at first, officials said, because of the fair's non-commercial tradition.

"We just got a lot of flack," said Phinney. "They didn't want a commercial fair, and that was it."

The attitude of the over 1,500 volunteer workers at the fair has not changed over the years. The majority, fair officials said, want to keep the fair as is.

"If you came to the fair and asked 100 of them that were working there, you probably couldn't find two that would want it another

way," said Phinney. "We're probably as commercial as it's going to be."

One innovation that fair officials have looked into is attracting national performers to the fairgrounds. Phinney said he wouldn't object to a national entertainer coming to the fair, if a promoter would pay the performer's guaranteed fee.

"We won't do it, unless we've got someone like that (a promoter), because we can't stand to lose \$4,000-\$5,000," said Phinney. "We operate on a tight budget. We don't have that much money to lose."

Plans for a national entertainer in the county would have to be formulated before February, fair officials said. A promoter approached officials

four weeks ago to ask about a performer, but dates for the fair were already set.

"We'd like to see something like that," said Phinney when asked about entertainers like Roger Miller, Tammy Wynette and B.J. Thomas who perform at other fairs. "Our fair is small enough, we'd be looking at a one-night show."

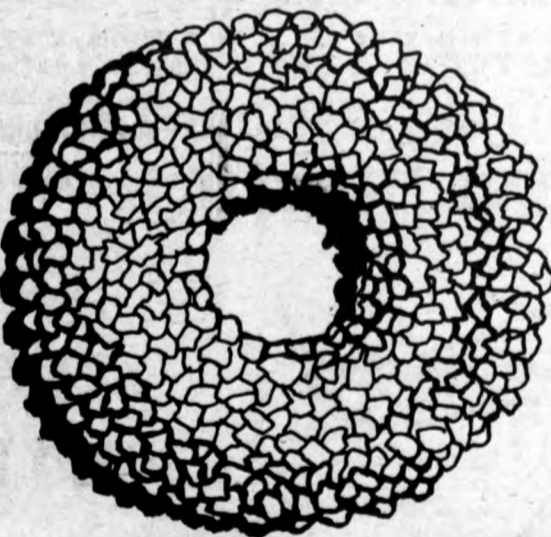

Clinton County Country Club: Address — 8103 N. US-27, St. Johns. Nine holes, par 36, 2,978 yards. Private liquor license.

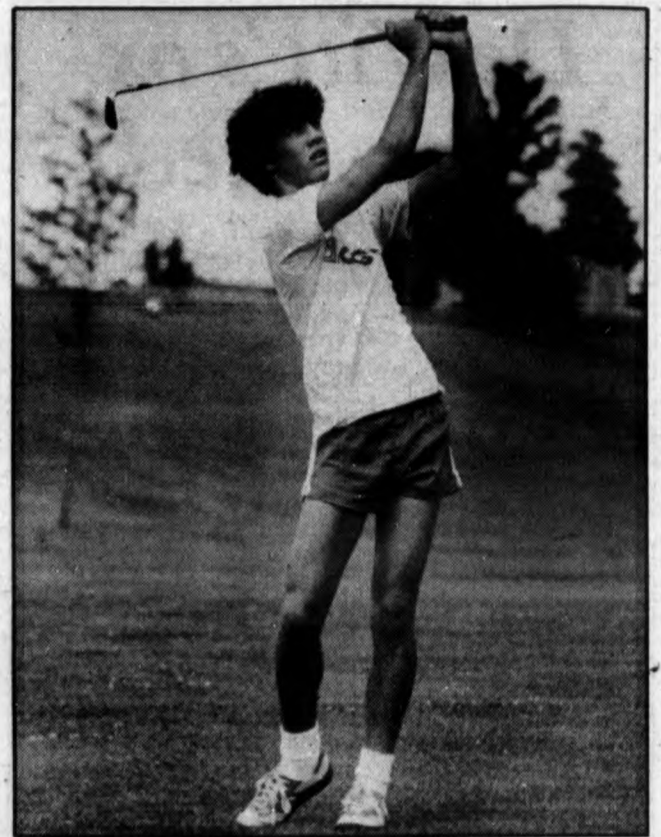
The club is private, with 165 members, but it does take public golfers who want to pay greens' fees. Public players have a better chance to get on the course on Saturday and Sunday.

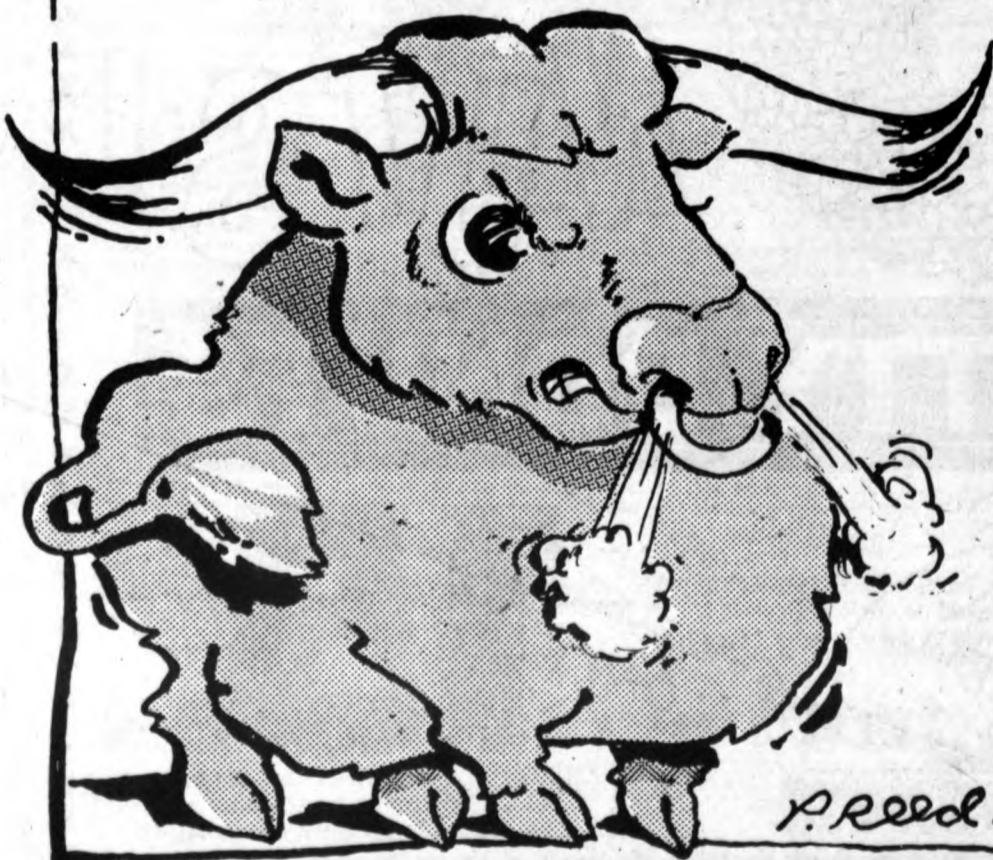

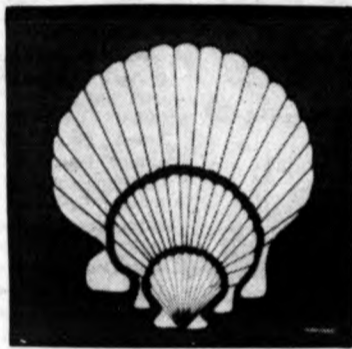

Don't move

Planning on a retirement home? If you live in DeWitt or St. Johns, don't move.

That's the finding of a survey of Michigan's "Swell Small Towns," published in the June issue of "50 plus" magazine.

St. Johns Area Chamber of Commerce Manager Joann Martis dropped the article off at the County News office Tuesday, after receiving a copy from former St. Johns resident John Martin.

Topping the national magazine's list of Michigan's 11 best retirement towns, based on housing, recreation and lifestyle, was none other than DeWitt. Not far behind was St. Johns.

Two towns in Clinton County? you ask. St. Johns and DeWitt ahead of historic Marshall, lakeside Leland and snap, crackle and popping Battle Creek? How did this come about?

"I chose them just from personal experience," said Lansing Magazine Editor Tony Petrella, who was himself chosen to pick Michigan's best for "50 plus". "I think both towns are charming. I know people in both communities and if they are indicative of the kind of people that live there, then they're the kind of people I'd like to live around."

Petrella, who lives in East Lansing, said he also considered Grand Ledge, Charlotte, Williamston, Mason and other Lansing area communities, but "St. Johns and DeWitt just stood out."

His descriptions of Clinton County's and Michigan's finest read:

DeWitt — Only five minutes north of Downtown Lansing, DeWitt has primarily a country setting, but it is in close proximity to the arts and culture of Lansing and Michigan State University in East Lansing.

St. Johns — "Classic small-town America, north of Lansing, St. Johns contains gorgeous, stately old homes and a nice shopping area. A pretty little town."

Other towns chosen by Petrella and Jeffrey P. Greene, editor of West Michigan Magazine, were Grayling, Holland, Ludington, Manchester, Traverse City, Charlevoix/Harbor Springs/Petoskey and Saugatuck.

"To sum it all up, they asked me for places in the state of Michigan that would be comfortable, nice small towns," Petrella said. "While neither DeWitt or St. Johns has the beaches that Saugatuck has, I felt they are cities or towns that are far enough away from Lansing to not have the problems of the big city, yet close enough to have the pleasures."

So, Petrella and "50 plus" say, St. Johns and DeWitt offer the best of both worlds. And although they'll probably say they already knew it, that's bound to make residents in both communities happy. Well, most anyway. The news may have come too late for John Martin, who discovered the story in the first place. He's moved to Florida.

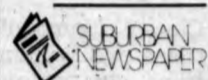

St. Johns teacher gives up his 'second job'

Citing teaching and family life as his top priorities, St. Johns basketball coach Al Werbish has resigned.

"The magnitude of the job is unbelievable," Werbish said. "When you teach mathematics like I do, it's a second full-time job."

Werbish said a typical day during basketball season lasted from 7:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. Practices and time spent on game nights were cutting into his class preparation and damaging his family life, Werbish said.

"Coaching today takes a lot of time," said St. Johns athletic director Steve Bakita. "I'm sure many people don't realize that. There were many, many hours Al put in."

Werbish said he decided to resign about 10 days after summer basketball camp was concluded. He had coached the Redwings for two seasons, posting records of 12-9 and 9-11, and would have coached a team with nine returning lettermen this season.

The decision to resign wasn't easy, but Werbish is confident he made the correct choice.

"My two closest friends have said to me, I'm glad you

made that choice, because it's the best one for you," he said.

"At least one day a week, I would be called out of class (for a basketball-related reason). The students love it, of course. But it kind of cramps me and rushes me in my class."

With the load of the varsity head coaching job off his shoulders, Werbish is looking forward to Monday, when he starts again as freshman football coach. Come November, he hopes to spend more time with his wife, Jan, and daughters Heather, 14, Missy, 4, and Pam, 1.

"My feelings are a feeling of relief, like the weight of the world is off my shoulders," he said.

Werbish said his junior varsity coach, Keith Haske, has applied for the varsity position. "If he got the job, he's going to complement what we've done," said Werbish, stopping just short of an endorsement.

Bakita said in-house applications for the position will conclude on Friday at 2 p.m.

"We'd like to fill this position as soon as possible, but we're not going to rush into it," he said. "Basketball season doesn't start until the middle of November, so we've got some time."

Fans might disagree with Ben Swanchara's explanation of why he's been a successful race car driver this season.

"I've been pretty lucky this year," said the 26-year-old St. Johns resident.

Swanchara's luck has carried him to nine victories in nine starts in the Pro Stock division at Ionia County Speedway. He's also won four times at Crystal Speedway, including the last three times he has raced.

Despite his perfect record at Ionia, Swanchara is not leading the points race. He lost valuable points by missing one race with a broken motor.

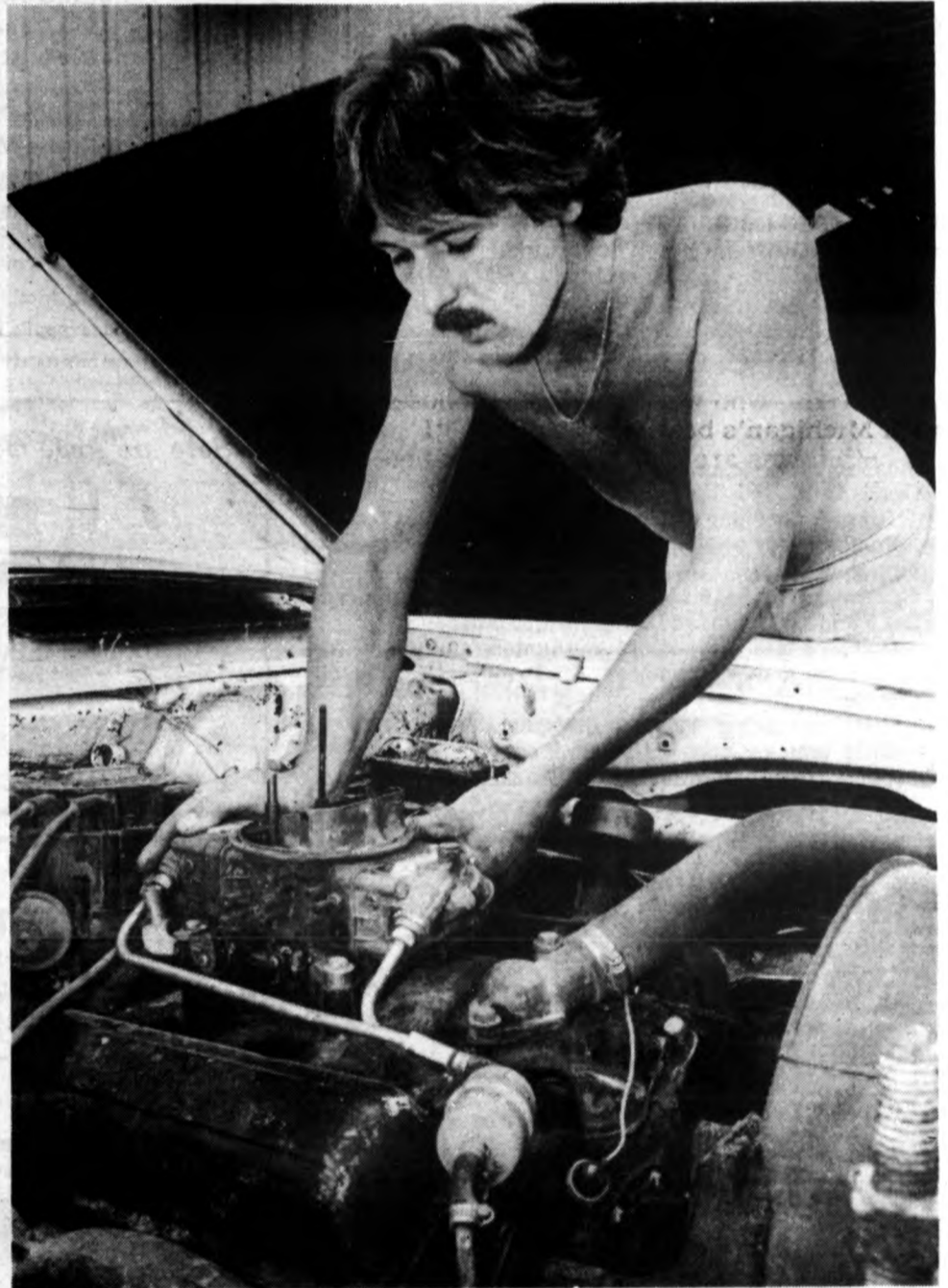
Winners of feature races get 50 points and second place finishers get 48, so Hendrickson, with his consistency, is leading by 18 points.

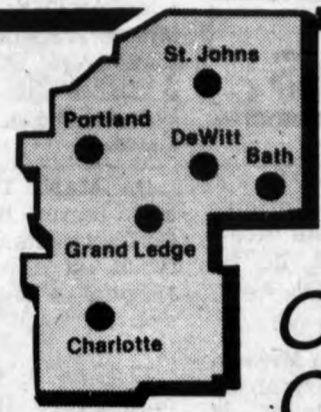

City cracks down on portable sign owners

Owners of mobile signs in St. Johns won't be able to leave them up year-round if a proposed city ordinance is adopted.

The ordinance would require purchase of permits for mobile signs at the rate of \$5 a day. A minimum charge of \$25 for three months would be enforced, with a maximum charge of \$75 for 15 days.

The permits would allow sign display for a maximum of 15 days every three months. Then, the permit would have to be renewed for another three months.

Signs would not be allowed to obstruct vehicular or pedestrian vision and could not have flashing lights, according to the ordinance.

City clerk Rick Coletta said the ordinance developed because many mobile signs were blocking vision around the city. He also said businesses have been getting around the city's sign ordinance by using mobile signs.

"To me, there's no good reason to allow them, and there's 1,000 reasons to control them," said Planning

Commission Chairman Jim Moore, who presented the ordinance to the commission.

Exempt from the proposed sign ordinance would be signs for real estate, rent or lease, building construction, politics, or garage sales.

At Monday's city commission meeting, commissioners referred the ordinance to the city attorney for drafting, Coletta said. He said it probably would be drafted as an amendment to the zoning ordinance, which would mean holding a public hearing.

Moore said the soonest commissioners could vote on the ordinance would be October.

About 20 people showed up at Monday's meeting to voice their disapproval for a water main plan in the South Lansing Street-Townsend Road area.

The residents objected to the city's plan of \$1,800 per unit of benefit assessments over five years, and asked for sewer instead, Coletta said.

Coletta said city officials will check into the residents' request for sewer. "We know it's going to be more expensive, but we don't know how much more," he said.

Commissioners also approved bidding for a new dump truck. Coletta said \$25,000 has been budgeted for the truck.

"It's probably a little high to give ourselves a little hedge against inflation," he said. "But a little car costs \$10,000-\$11,000 these days."

Project on hold

Landscape architect Bud Mills is "95 percent sure" he can build a 62-acre sports complex in Watertown Township, but he won't estimate a date for breaking ground.

"It's going to happen, but I don't know when," said Mills, whose project was approved by Watertown Township and Clinton County officials last December. "We fully expect it to be completed this fall."

Mills' only difficulty is the mechanics of financing, he said. Once that is settled, he said it will take three months to build the sports complex.

Meanwhile, Watertown Township officials have applied for a federal sewer grant which they hope will offset 70 percent of the project's \$500,000 price tag.

A public hearing was held on Wednesday to establish a sewer district in the area — the first step toward getting sewer service for the sports complex.

Township officials expect to know in 30-60 days whether they will receive the grant, trustee Don Lowell said. But even if the grant is not awarded the township, the sports complex will still be built if financing is arranged, Lowell said.

"It would be a different ballgame if we don't get the grant," he said. "He might put in sewer himself."

The sports complex, proposed for a site bordered by Grand River Avenue just south of Francis Road, will include eight lighted softball diamonds, eight lighted tennis courts, two soccer fields, ski trails, a restaurant and a pro shop.

"We're going to provide the total service for athletes," Mills said. "In other words, if someone comes to town and wants to play ball, they come to us and we find a place to play."

He hopes to open the sports complex in the spring of 1984.

"We're hoping we can get two or three ball diamonds done so we can get some good teams out there and show everybody what it's like," he said.

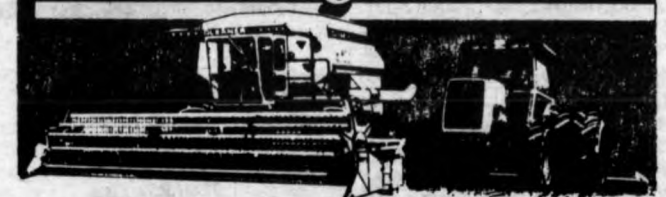
