If contract ratified

Raise to be 12.5%

Teachers will receive a pay hike of 12.5 percent, spread over three years, if they vote to ratify a new contract with St. Johns Public School Monday night.

The contract, negotiated last week after nearly two years of bargaining, calls for raises of one percent the first year, 5.5 percent the second year, and six percent for the third year.

The first year of the contract is retroactive to last year, when negotiations began. The contract would expire at the end of the 1984-85 school year.

Originally, the St. Johns school board demanded that teachers accept a pay-freeze for the 1982-83 school year, to help the board save money and maintain programs.

Three other Clinton County districts asked for and received such pay freezes: Pewamo-Westphalia teachers, now back at the bargaining table, agreed to a one-

year pay freeze last year; Fowler teachers traded a one-year pay freeze in 1982-83 for a five percent hike this year; and Ovid-Elsie teachers, among the last to settle, took a wage freeze last year in return for five percent raises this year and next year.

DeWitt teachers went on strike last February before winning pay hikes of more than six percent for last year and this year; Bath teachers settled for a 3.5 percent, one-year hike. Bath negotiations resume this year.

Board members, administrators and representatives of the teachers union and its parent organization, the Ingham County Education Association, have refused to comment on details of the contract until it has been ratified by both sides.

Ratification is expected by Teachers Monday night, Aug. 22, with board approval following at a special meeting Wednesday, Aug. 24.

Tahvonen rules himself out of credit union suit

Circuit Judge Randy Tahvonen has disqualified himself from hearing a sexual harassment lawsuit against the St. Johns Michigan Federal Credit Union.

Tahvonen sent letters to the six attorneys involved in the suit, informing them he and his wife maintain accounts at the credit union. He volunteered to disqualify himself if any of the attorneys involved objected.

Edith Harsh, who represents four former employees and one present employee of the credit union, asked that Tahvonen not hear the case. Clinton County's other circuit judge, Tim Lewis, disqualified himself July 5 after announcing his court recorder was related to a defendant in the case.

A visiting judge will be appointed by the State Court Administrator's office, a court official said. As of Tuesday, no appointment had yet been made.

First order of business for the new judge will be a hearing on a request by Mrs. Harsh for a change of venue.

Mrs. Harsh filed suit against the credit union, its board of directors and former manager Roy Ebert during the first week in June. The suit alleges Ebert "physically and verbally" harassed the women,

making "repeated demands for sexual favors."

Board members were notified of the problem but failed to remove Ebert, the suit alleges. Proceedings against one defendant, board member John Bradley, have been dismissed because Bradley did not serve on the board at the time of the alleged harassment.

Ebert, former Mayor of St. Johns, was removed by the credit union board June 21. Represented in court by St. Johns Attorney Bill Jackson, Ebert has denied the charges, but otherwise refuses to comment on the case.

The credit union board is represented by Lansing labor attorney Larry Schneider and attorneys retained by its insurance carriers.

Requesting the trial be moved, Mrs. Harsh says Ebert's election as mayor of St. Johns and the fact that most of the 7,000 credit union members live in Clinton County would make selection of an impartial jury too difficult.

Her clients, Christine Brawner, LuAnn Feldpausch, Yvonne Makara, Tammie Witt and Sherri Jopke, are seeking a minimum of \$200,000 each in damages.

He's champ of world

DeWitt's baseball team gave Clinton County residents a state championship to boast about. But a 10-year-old fifth grader from Bath may have topped that feat.

Andrew Soule traveled to the Netherlands and brought back a world BMX (bicycle motocross) championship.

Soule's competition for the July 30-31 event included the top three riders in his 10-Expert age group from 19 countries.

"He had to beat 19 national champions, along with the No. 2 and No. 3 riders," said Tom Soule, Andrew's father. "But the United States is more advanced in this sport than other countries."

For Andrew, the trip to the International Bicycle Motocross Federation championships was his first overseas. As a member of the Huffy Factory Team, he got all of his expenses paid for the venture.

"It was different," Andrew said of the

track, which was located in Slagharen. "It was beautiful. It was a nice track."

Fans cheered for the young bicycle racers like football fans cheering on their favorite high school teams.

"The crowds here (in the U.S.) are pretty laid back," said Tom Soule. "The European crowd was really loud and cheering and chanting all the time. The crowd got up mostly for Dutch riders. Andrew had two Dutch riders in his main (race), so naturally they were hoping the local boys would do well."

Soule, whose mother, Joyce, is an English teacher at Bath Middle School, has been racing BMX for five years and signing autographs for three years. BMX fans recognize his exploits, but few people in Bath have asked him what he does with his summers and after school.

"He just kind of goes away and comes back and doesn't talk about it," Mrs. Soule said.

Bath man arrested for rape

A Bath Township man has been arrested on rape charges and is being held in Clinton County Jail on \$40,000 bond, a police official said.

Kurt Smith, 39, of 6185 Slight Road, Bath Township, was arrested Sunday, Aug. 14 at 2 a.m. at the scene of an assault on an elderly woman, reports said. Smith, who was also wanted on a warrant from Lansing Police Department for non-payment of child support, was charged with first degree criminal sexual conduct.

Arraigned in District Court by Judge Fred Lewis, Smith was assigned attorney Jeff Martlew and ordered held on \$40,000 bond. Trial was set for Aug. 22 at 3 p.m., reports said.

Elsewhere in Clinton County, several breaking and enterings were reported and auto accidents resulted in many injuries. Clinton County Sheriff's reports listed 108 complaints in the county

during the week ending Aug. 15. Among them were:

• Vandals broke into an art room and damaged several doors in Bath High School Aug. 12, Bath Township Police reported. Weights were taken from the weight room and damaged, and several doors were painted with supplies taken from the art room. No estimate of damages was available.

• Craig Canfield of Ovid sought his own treatment for injuries and was cited for careless driving following a one-car accident on Center Road north of Slight, Bath Township Police said. Canfield, 16, and a passenger, Mark Dennis, also 16, of Ovid, were not seriously hurt when Canfield lost control of his speeding auto on a curve and hit a ditch and a tree, then flipped the auto over, reports said.

• Three persons were injured in an accident on Island Road at Park Street in Duplain Township near 3:50 p.m. Aug. 14, sheriff's

reports said.

Mildred Bradley, 63, of Ashley, was cited for failing to yield, after she turned into the path of an auto driven by Robert Miller, 29, of St. Johns. Miller and a passenger in his auto, Chris Maybe, 33, of Mead St., St. Johns, were uninjured, but Ms. Bradley and a passenger in her vehicle, Ann Robinson, 75, of St. Ignace, were taken to Clinton Memorial Hospital, where they were treated and released.

• A Laingsburg woman, Mary Donley, 19, of 8160 Laingsburg Road, was injured in an accident at the intersection of State and Eskes in DeWitt Township, township police reported. The accident occurred Aug. 12, when Ms. Donley struck the rear of an auto driven by Shirley Brisboe, 28, of 4425 Doncaster, Holt, as Ms. Brisboe was waiting to turn from State onto Eskes, reports said. Ms. Donley was cited for careless driving and taken to Sparrow Hospital for treatment of injuries.

• Two Fowler residents collided near the intersection of Second and Main streets in Fowler near 6 p.m. Aug. 12, sheriff's reports said. Injured was William Raymond, 26, who attempted to swerve to miss a car driven by Joseph Thelen, 59.

Raymond struck Thelen's vehicle in the rear and hit a utility pole as he attempted to miss Thelen, who was making a left turn. Raymond sought his own treatment, and Thelen was not injured. Also unhurt was a passenger in Raymond's auto, David Simmon of Fowler. Thelen had been drinking at the time of the crash, reports said.

• Eric Fitzpatrick, 16, of St. Johns, was cited for careless driving following an accident which left a DeWitt resident injured near 3:40 p.m. Aug. 11, sheriff's reports said.

Fitzpatrick was headed north on Francis just south of Herbison Road when he lost control of his auto and crossed over the center

line, striking an auto driven by Robert Clark, 31, of DeWitt.

Clark was taken to St. Lawrence Hospital for treatment of injuries. Fitzpatrick was unhurt and a passenger in his auto, Scott Flegler, 16, of St. Johns, was slightly injured, reports said.

• Mark Leonard, 83, of Ovid, was cited for failing to yield at the intersection of Park and Front streets in Ovid, causing an accident Aug. 9, which injured Susan Beehman, 48, of Ovid. Ms. Beehman sought her own treatment. Passengers in her auto, Kimberly Ray Pickering, 25, and Tony Visgar, 20, both also of Ovid, were not injured, sheriff's reports said.

• Both drivers were at fault in an accident at the unmarked intersection of Airport and Centerline roads in Bengal Township Aug. 9, sheriff's reports said.

Carl Martin, 16, of St. Johns, a passenger in one of the autos, was treated for injuries at Clinton Memorial Hospital. Uninjured were drivers David Kayder, 17, and Ivan Cooper, 16, both of St.

Johns. Neither slowed for the intersection, reports said.

• Judith Snyder, 41, of Bath, sought her own treatment for injuries following an accident at the intersection of Clark and Chandler roads in Bath Township Aug. 11, township police reported. Cited was Hoa Thi Kingsley, 35, of Grand Ledge, who failed to yield in the intersection.

• An automatic alarm system was credited with preventing thefts during an Aug. 10 break-in at the home of Larry Zalewski, 1004 Turner, DeWitt, DeWitt Police reported.

• Three Maple Rapids businesses were broken into during the night of Aug. 7, sheriff's reports said. Nothing was missing from Maple Rapids Laundry; \$280 in cash was taken from the Hide-A-Way Inn; and \$415 in cash, an AM-FM radio and an unknown amount of lottery tickets were taken from Carl's Market. All are located on Main Street.

• About \$50 in cash and a .22 cal. rifle were taken from the home of Mike Murphy, 170 Boichot, in a break-in Aug. 10.



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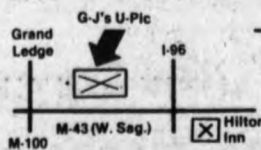
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CMH buys site for laundry

The former Pine Creek Nursery on US-27 in St. Johns has been purchased by Clinton Memorial Hospital for use as a laundry.

The property will be used for the hospital's present laundry facility - which serves the hospital and Hazel I. Findlay Country Manor, reports said. Hospital officials said it is hoped the move will help streamline the laundry operation and cut costs.

The first step will be establishment of a retail professional dry cleaning

business on the property. Later, expansion of the laundry services for other businesses is planned.

The project is being funded by budgets set aside specifically by the hospital board. Private and group donations, as well as proceeds from estate sales, are being earmarked for future rebuilding of Clinton Memorial and other hospital projects normally funded through donations, Chief Executive Officer Paul McNamara said.

Arrests down, but accidents up

Auto accidents caused more deaths and injuries in Clinton County during the first seven months of 1983, but fewer drivers were arrested or given tickets, according to a report from Clinton County Sheriff Anthony Hufnagel.

Statistics prepared by Capt. Robert Ferry say accidents climbed from a total of 353 in the first seven months of 1982 to 396 in the same period this year. Six fatal accidents resulted in as many deaths a year ago, compared to ten persons killed in nine fatal accidents this year, a 66 percent increase.

Other traffic statistics said both property damage and personal injury accidents were up, by 17 and 11 percent respectively; injuries climbed by four percent, to 167.

Fewer drunk driving arrests have been made,

however, and officers throughout Clinton County issued 246 fewer traffic tickets in the period from January to July 30, a decline of 20 percent. Arrests for operating a vehicle under the influence of liquor dropped by seven percent, from 72 in 1982 to 67 this year.

The major reason for the drop in traffic citations and arrests was an increase in non-patrol duties for deputies, which reduced road patrol time in the county, Ferry said.

"In the last seven months, our officers have spent 140 more hours in court, 102 more in filling out reports, 35 more hours on prisoner transports, and 98 more hours on jail assignment than they did a year ago," Ferry said. "You add all those hours up and it takes time away from patrol duty."

But best of all are the kids and their parents, because Clinton County's 4-H Fair is for families. Wandering around you may at first wonder, "Why is everybody smiling?"

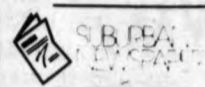
Take a closer look at some of the projects and the reason become clear: pride.

Fox watching chickens

To the editor:

Watching Don Albosta conduct an ethics investigation is, to many of us in the 10th District, a painful process. The obvious clumsiness of the probe is not the main issue here. What should be the issue is, as the Bay City Times indicated recently, Albosta himself.

Grandstanding for headlines in not new to politics. This Albosta caper, however, brings new meaning to the word hypocrisy. It's like putting the fox in charge of keeping order in the chicken coop. Albosta's record on ethical questions — as a campaigner and as a voting congressman — leaves an awful lot to be desired.

Recently, transcripts from a series of important hearings on EPA matters were drastically and secretly altered. The views of Republicans were made to look foolish or were entirely reversed in what amounts to gross misconduct on the part of certain House Democratic staff members. The question involves the very honor and integrity of the House and it has many members of Congress in an uproar.

What does Albosta have to do with this? Well, on June 29 he voted against setting up a select committee to investigate the charges publicly. Instead, he supported the Democratic move to assign the whole thing to a Democratic-controlled committee where, with no special prosecutors or additional staff, the matter can be safely bottled up. When ethical questions involve his own bailiwick, Albosta applies a strange double standard.

Even Speaker Tip O'Neill has little regard for Albosta's probe of the briefing papers controversy. O'Neill has said that the whole thing has been blown out of proportion and would be used for personal political advantage. The Speaker wants to take the investigation away from Albosta altogether.

That's a view, incidentally, that is shared by a number of Congressional Democrats. The Detroit News recently reported that "of more than a dozen Democratic sources interviewed by The News, only two had favorable comments about him." The revealing title of that article was "Albosta's Critics Outnumber Boosters."

Hopefully, Albosta's antics in the briefing papers story will shed new light on his performance as our congressman. It may even lead to a vindication of those who have called Albosta's own ethics into question in the past and took a lot of heat from Albosta for saying so.

Or maybe he will change his ways and clean up his own act with the ethical standards he is so willing to impose on others.

Information, please

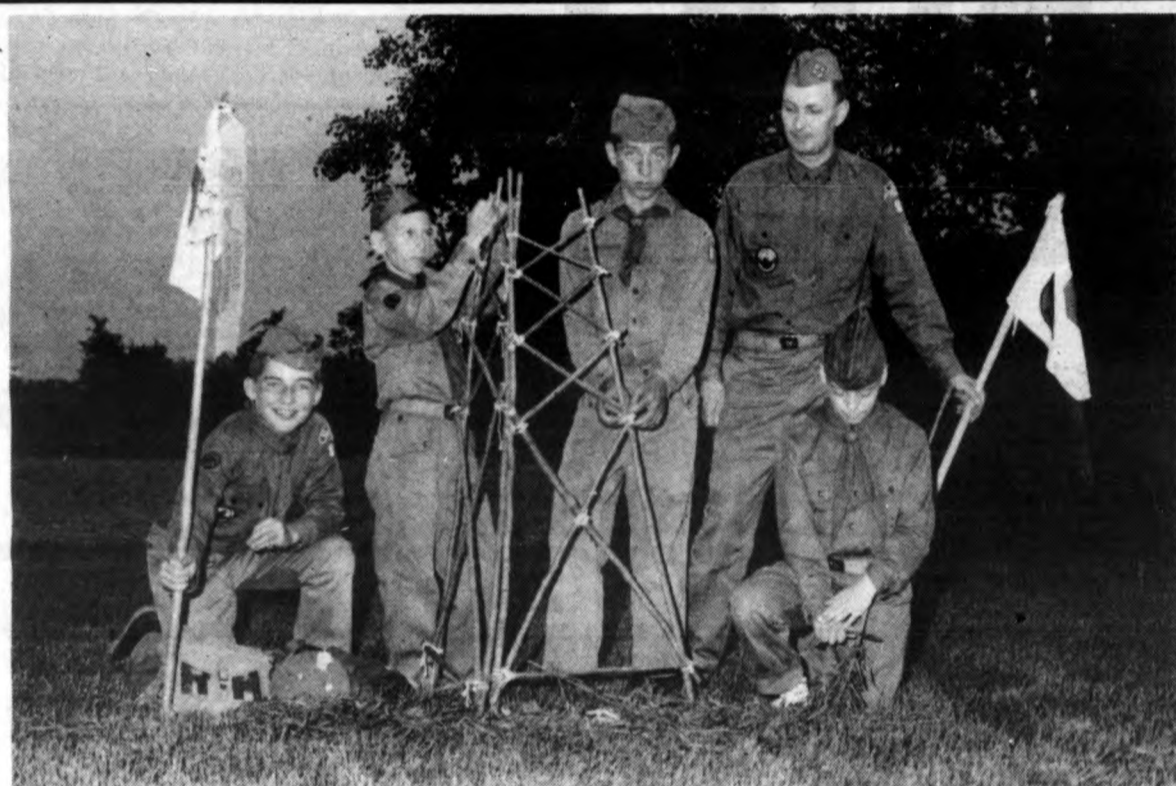
Phone customers who wish to change their listing in the phone book had better move quickly. General Telephone is collecting information for a new telephone directory.

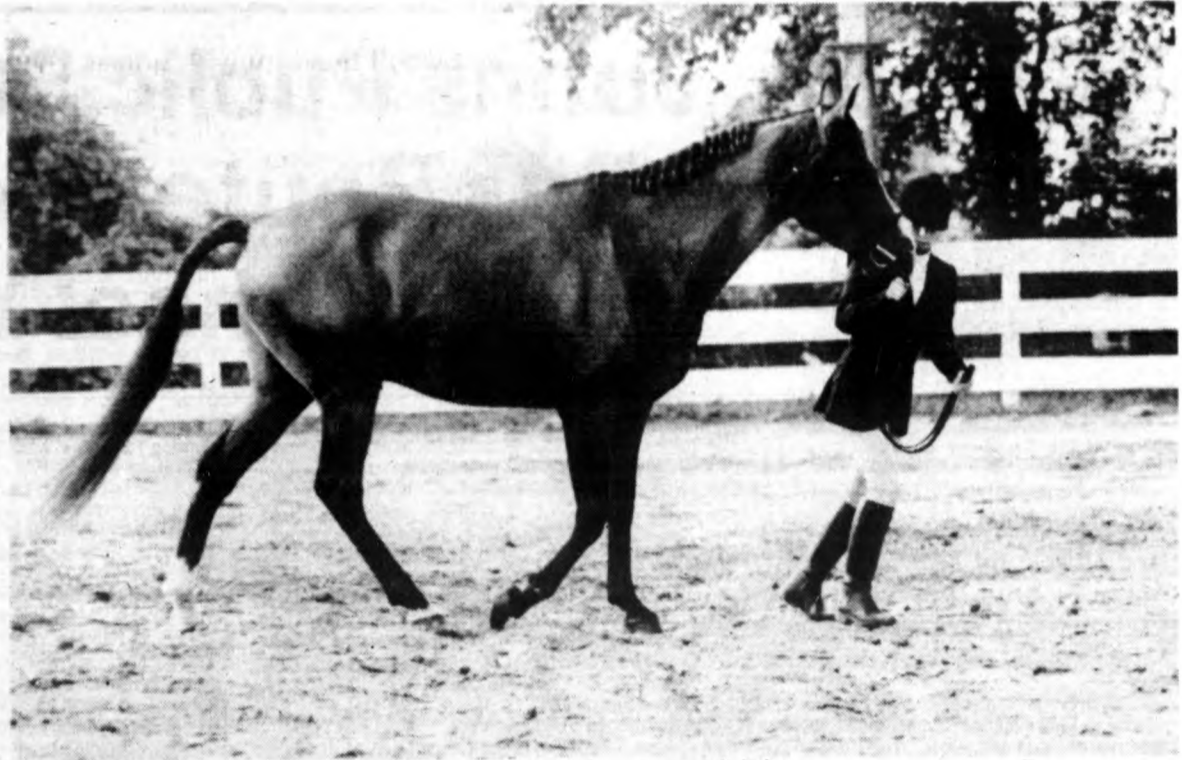

St. Johns Public Schools Bus Routes For 1983-84 School Year



The bus routes for the 1983-84 school year will reflect minor changes from the previous year. This happens because of declining enrollments and student population patterns. As in the past, some families will find it necessary to get their students to a designated bus stop on a main route of travel. If you see the bus route assigned to your neighborhood does not travel down your road, then you can expect a notice in the mail that will identify your designated bus stop.

Your bus driver will also be combining bus stops that are located close to each other during the first week of school. Other stops will be changed where an approaching vehicle does not have clear visibility of the entire school bus for a distance of 400 feet (state law).

All bus routes reflect the intent of the rules and regulations of the State of Michigan regarding the transportation of students.

Shuttle bus runs in town will run from the following points for students attending the school listed below. All shuttles start after 8:00 a.m.

Bus Stop

- North side of Perrin-Palmer Elementary School -- High School students only.
- West side of Teresa Merrill School -- High School and Elementary students only.
- Episcopal Church to corner of Spring and Gibbs; to Perrin-Palmer; to corner of Higham and Lansing; to Central Elementary School -- Elementary students only.
- Parents of kindergarten students are asked to bring their child to school the first day on August 30th. PLEASE NOTE: the first day of school is officially scheduled for Tues., August 30.
- If you have questions, please call Gordon Vandemark, Director of Transportation, at 224-9341, ext. 134.

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Township honors ex-officer for citizenship

Gus Wilcox used to have a theory about police work that he stuck by during nearly 11 years on the DeWitt Township force.

"Officers who do not get involved in community activity miss one of the important parts of police work," he said.

Wilcox made sure he was involved in the community by such things as coaching Little League, helping raise money for senior citizens and coordinating bike safety efforts. As a result, he was known as more than a police officer during his 1971-1982 tenure in the

township.

"I've had people say to me, 'It's good to see that this police department does something other than stop a car out on US-27,'" Wilcox said. "There's a whole lot more to it than that."

"I also think that kids, when they develop good habits on a bike, it will carry over to a car. I'd rather see a kid for the first time at a bike rodeo when they're 14 than seeing them for the first time when I stop them for running a red light when they're 16."

Wilcox, who lives on Valley Road in DeWitt Township, was honored Aug. 8

when the township board presented him a citizenship award. They also gave him his old badge, framed in a plaque.

"It was really kind of nice," said Wilcox, who presently works as a salesman for The Popoff Meat Co. in Lansing. "It was kind of touching. I was surprised."

Wilcox's main contribution to the community was his work with bicycle safety.

Frequent bicycle-car accidents in the township triggered a desire for a bicycle safety program which Wilcox helped launch. It evolved into the annual DeWitt Township Bike Rodeo — a 10-event safety

program which teaches children bicycling skills.

The rodeo, which is now named after Wilcox, features such events as riding 100 feet on a four-inch wide stripe, stopping safely within a certain distance, weaving in and out of cones, one-arm riding and flashing hand signals.

Wilcox has also put on bike rodeos for Ingham County Probate Court and Boys Club of Lansing, but he is quick to mention the support he has received from people like DeWitt Township firemen.

"It's great, and they named it after me, but I don't do it all," he said.

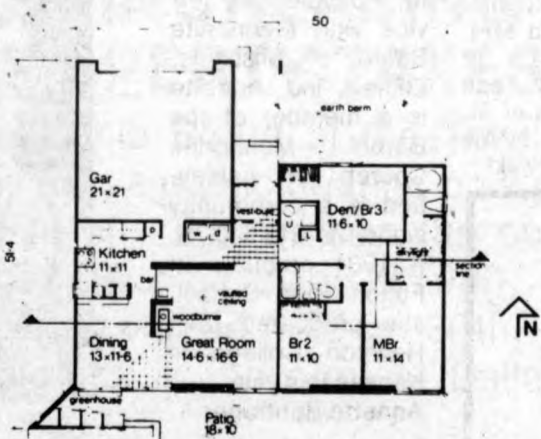

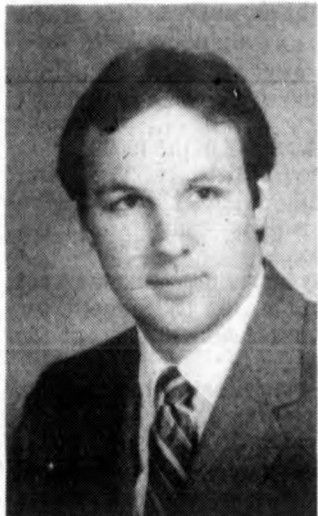

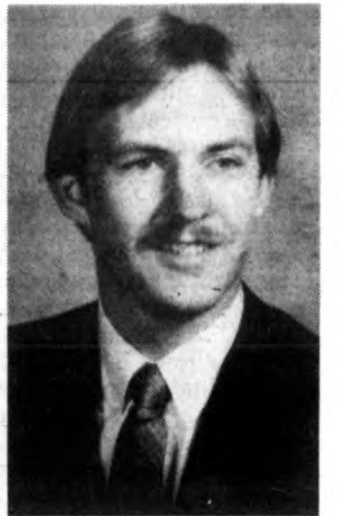

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Maple River project still draining patience

"It just goes on and on. The best way I can describe it is, it's about like being in quicksand." — John Quine, Clinton County surveyor, on the Maple River drain project.

Nearly 25 five years have gone by, and the story of the Maple River drain remains the same.

Haggling continues.

Clinton County records trace the beginnings of the project to 1959, when a petition was filed to consolidate Gratiot, Clinton and Shiawassee counties into a single Inter-County Drainage District.

Since the formation of that inter-county drain board, the Maple River has been the focus of conflict.

Drain officials have not been able to agree on assessments for the counties and engineers have sued the board to secure payment. That and previous litigation has stalled attempts by the drain board to proceed with the project.

The project had potential to succeed in the 1960s, when the federal government offered assistance. The drain was estimated to cost \$12.4 million back then, with the government paying a \$7.68 million share and local governments paying \$1.6 million.

In 1968, the inter-county drainage board set assessments for that \$1.6 million at 65 percent for Gratiot, 25 percent for Shiawassee and 10 percent for Clinton.

The situation took a more complicated turn with a Shiawassee Circuit Judge ruling in 1981.

Judge Peter Marutiak ruled that the three counties should withdraw from federal assistance. At the time of the ruling, Drain officials were concerned, partly because state soil conservation officials estimated the

cost of the project at \$30 million, with a \$10 million local share.

Two engineering firms — Bolt, McLeod and Johnson, Inc. of Port Huron and Pierson & Associates, Inc. of Lansing — were contracted to survey the project.

Drain officials knew the work would not be easy because the river is winding and narrow in spots. "Hydraulically, it's a nightmare," said Clinton County surveyor John Quine.

In addition to large engineering bills, the drainage board borrowed \$1 million from the Farmers Home Administration to use for land acquisition and other expenses involved with the drain.

With the federal plan legally scrapped, it left county officials with assessment percentages that were not adjusted. Gratiot's 65 percent of the assessments would have paid for dikes, levies and pumps under the federal plan, according to former Clinton County drain commissioner Harry Harden.

Without federal help, Harden said Shiawassee's 25 percent of the assessments would be too low. After the ruling, Harden said Shiawassee would have over 20 miles of drains to be dug, compared with five in Clinton and 10.5 in Gratiot.

After considering the revised nature of the project, the drainage board voted to set Shiawassee's assessments at 60 percent, Clinton's at 25 percent and Gratiot's at 15 percent.

In protest, Bennington Township in Shiawassee County filed suit in Circuit Court in Corunna last November to halt the project.

On Feb. 18, Marutiak disqualified himself from the case, so it has been assigned to Livingston County Circuit Court Judge Stanley Latrelle, who will hear the case in Howell. A court date has not been set.

Shiawassee Drain Commissioner Bob Tisch, who was pushing for one-third assessments at one time, said he favors a return to the original assessment percentages. "There's only one legal apportionment," Tisch said, referring to the 65-25-10 percentages established by the drain board in 1968.

Harden, on the other hand, would like to see Shiawassee assessed at 60 percent. "Half the cost of that project is in Shiawassee County if the project is dug," he said.

While the battle over assessment percentages rages, engineers have taken steps to secure their wages. Clinton County Circuit Judge Randy Tahvonen in June ordered that the drainage board pay the engineers in full — a bill that stands at \$249,000 plus interest, Harden said.

Harden said the drainage board cannot act to pay the engineers because of the litigation brought forth by Bennington Township.

In addition to that debt, FHA billed the drainage board \$684,951 this month, Harden said.

Harden warned that bills piling up now will eventually have to be paid by taxpayers in the three counties, either directly or indirectly.

"As soon as the counties can stop litigation, the better off they are," he said.

Clinton County has 4,019 parcels and 63,870 acres involved in the project, Harden said.

Robertson, county clerk Jane Swanchara and county prosecutor Jon Newman form the selection committee to pick a successor for retired drain commissioner Harry Harden.

"We hope to make a decision following that meeting," Robertson said.

Candidates are: Arden S. Pierson of DeWitt; Gary L. Hyde of St. Johns; Bruce L. Irish, Sr., of St. Johns; Jerry Wilcox of St. Johns and Daniel A. Simmon of Fowler.

Jeanette Smith, deputy drain commissioner, has served as acting drain commissioner since Harden's retirement Aug. 1. The new drain commissioner will serve out Harden's term until it expires in June, 1984.

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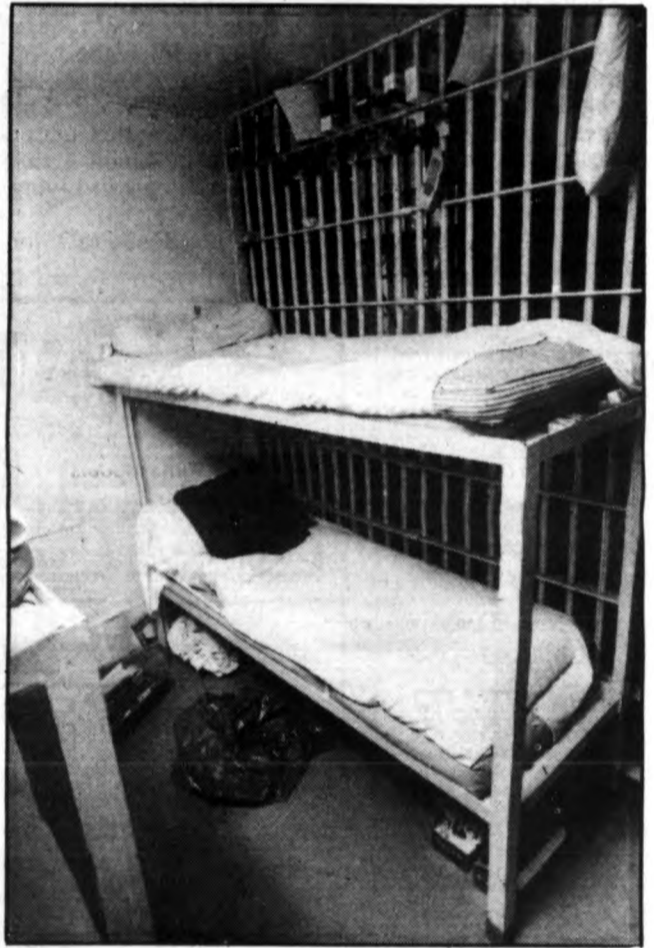

'Roughing it' joins three Rs in 5th grade

Along with "readin', 'ritin' and 'rithmetic," "roughin' it" will be added to the three Rs for St. Johns fifth graders this fall.

Two nights and three days of outdoor camping was added to the fifth grade curriculum by St. Johns school board members at their Aug. 10 meeting.

Although the Eagle Village Camping Program has been offered each spring for a couple of years, not all

fifth graders attended camp, Superintendent Earl Gabriel said. Costs of \$50 per pupil had to be raised by each class, and some chose not to take time away from studies to hold fund raisers.

Gabriel decided the camp was a worthwhile part of the curriculum following a visit to campers last Spring, however, and urged board members to fund the outings as a permanent part of fifth grade studies.

"I think it helps them develop independence and provides a valuable experience in dealing with the

unknown, which is particularly valuable when they will be entering junior high for the first time the following fall," Gabriel said.

Board members approved the \$10-12,000 annual expenditures, and moved the camp from spring to fall. "This way the friendships they make and the lessons they learn can carry over into the school year," Gabriel said. "Later, when they enter junior high, they will renew the friendships they make at camp."

"I think it's important to point out that this is money spent on the kids, particularly after recent negotiations," he said, referring to a new contract calling for teacher raises. "Not that we shouldn't spend money on teachers: It's just that some get a misconception of where all of our money goes."

Regarding contracts, Gabriel said he is optimistic contracts will be settled with bus drivers and custodians, as well as teachers, prior to the opening day of school, Aug. 30. Contract talks with a fourth bargaining group, secretaries, will also be underway, but could take longer, due to differences in contract language demands, he said. Teachers are considering a three-year pact for ratification by Aug. 24. Details have not been released.

Also at the Aug. 10 meeting, board members received a plaque from the St. Johns Lions Club, as thanks for use of school facilities during Lions All State Band activities in June. The board took its turn presenting plaques, as well, awarding recognition for service to former board member Marian Kurncz and Ruth LeBlond, who retired after 18 years as library aide at Rodney B. Wilson Junior High.

The library aide position will be upgraded to a fulltime job as librarian, Gabriel said.

City wins pedestrian safety award

It's the first day of school, and Mom gives her first grader this last bit of advice as he leaves the house.

The boy knows what is coming. He's heard it many times before.

"Look both ways before you cross the street," she says.

That message may seem boring to students who have heard it over and over. But mothers in St. Johns who have repeated that warning may be responsible, in part, for an amazing safety record in the city.

St. Johns recently earned an American Automobile Association Pedestrian Safety Achievement Award for going 10 years without a pedestrian fatality.

According to St. Johns Police Chief Lyle French, the city has gone over 22 years without a pedestrian fatality. The last fatality occurred June 18, 1961, when a five-year-old girl was killed south of Cass Street on US-27, French said.

For cities with 10,000 population or fewer, St. Johns may rank as the safest for pedestrians in Michigan.

Because one year of records is missing, AAA does not recognize the 22-year safety accomplishment. The longest record of pedestrian safety for cities under 10,000 is 18 years by Tecumseh, said Linda Lyles Daniels, contributing editor of AAA's Michigan Living magazine.

Daniels said the average pedestrian death rate for cities the size of St. Johns is two per year.

When questioned about St. Johns' safety record, officials are quick to credit other members of the community.

"I'd like to sit here and say the police department deserves all the credit, but I can't," French said.

French instead credited safety instruction in the schools and the presence of nine adult school crossing guards.

Administrator Steve Bakita said every St. Johns teacher talks about safety at some time during the school year. But he, too, was bouncing congratulations around the community.

"I don't want to take very much of the credit, but I'm sure that our teachers are part of that award, indirectly," Bakita said.

"There are many parents that probably spend hours talking about safety before the child starts in kindergarten," he added.

French mentioned the refinement of police radar as another reason for the excellent safety mark. Speeders, he said, have more a tendency to slow down when they know officers may be lurking with a radar gun.

"I think it's helped a lot since we've had radar," the police chief said. "It's been a tremendous asset to us."

Ten people have been injured in St. Johns in pedestrian-car accidents the last four years, French said. But even with the presence of two major highways — M-21 and US-27 — no one has been killed since 1961.


"With the volume of traffic here, I think it's remarkable," French said.

Bath fundraisers lift skydiver's spirits as they plan for Friday mini-air show

Ever since shattering his heel in a skydiving accident July 16, Bath Township's Ron Haney understandably has had trouble standing up.

But that won't be a problem on Friday. Haney plans to hobble around Bath to mingle with those putting on a mini air show on his behalf.

Organizers hope the show, which is centered at the Bath American Legion Hall, will raise \$2,000 to help Haney get back on his feet.

"My reaction is awe," said the 39-year-old skydiver, who lives near Park Lake. "I'm just flabbergasted. I'm still on a cloud — I can't believe what all of the people are doing for me."

Bath residents have been sympathetic to Haney's plight ever since his accident, which occurred during Bath Community Days. Haney was attempting a landing on the Bath football field when he came down too fast and shattered his heel.

Soon after the accident, Bath Township police officer Jack Phillips involved local merchants in a fundraiser for Haney. Phillips placed cannisters in various businesses in town so people could support the skydiver with their loose change.

Friday's venture, organized by Phillips, John Carter and Jim Spagnuolo, starts with a chicken dinner at 6 p.m. A balloon launch follows at 7 p.m., and at 7:30 p.m., ultra-light planes will flutter above the legion hall and at 8 p.m., parachutists will be dropping on targets behind the hall.

A dance at the hall, located at 5460 Clark Rd., starts at 9 p.m.

The mini air show also includes a beer tent, kiddie rides and clown Harold Wherry of Perry.

Haney is unemployed and has been living on \$135-per-week insurance through a local commercial sheet and metal union. "It's better than nothing, but you just keep getting further and further behind," he said.

Organizers will present the money raised on Friday and the cannister money to Haney in a lump sum, Phillips said.

Many of those involved in the fundraiser know Haney from skydiving. Phillips, for example, used to take jump lessons from Haney.

"He's got a good outlook on it," said Phillips of Haney's injury. "He's the kind of a guy that's hard to get down. I stop down to his house a couple times a week, and we talk about old times and how we want to get together and jump together. We haven't jumped together in three years."

Carter, a balloon pilot, has fond memories of a jump Haney performed earlier this year.

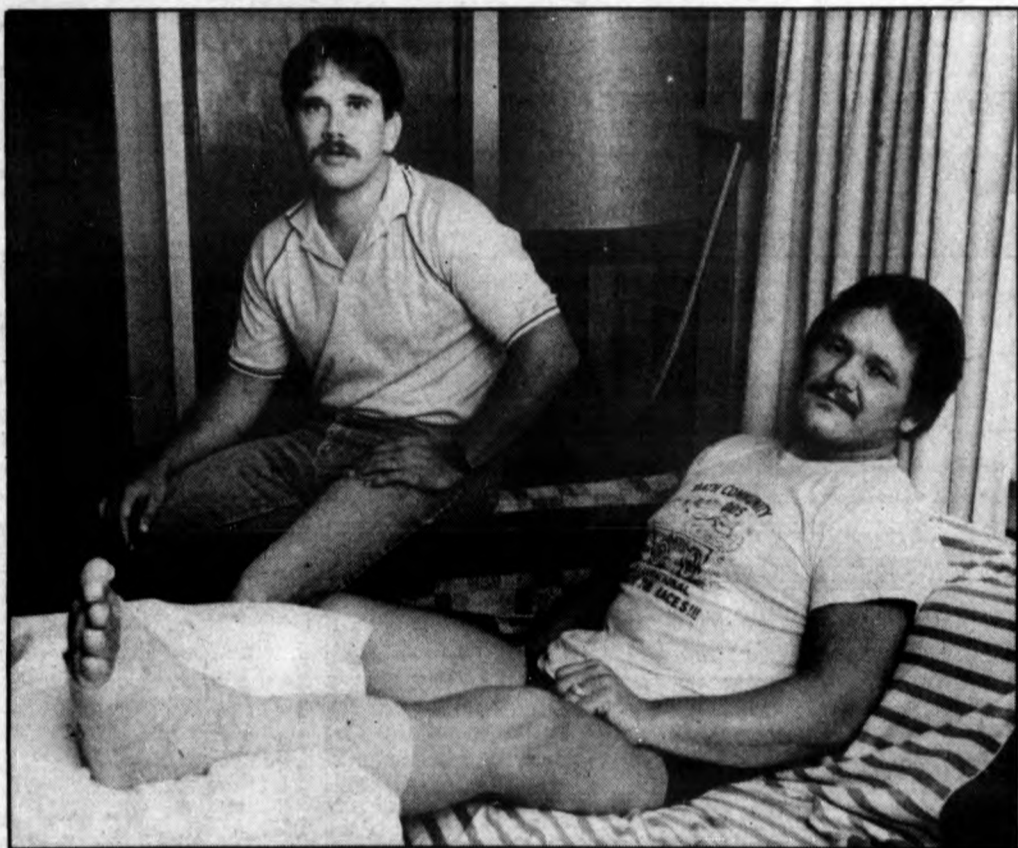
"I got to know him because he was a parachutist who wanted to jump out of a balloon," Carter said. "So, I took him up and he jumped out at 8,000 feet."

"It's like watching the coyote when he goes off the cliff. You expect to see that puff of smoke at the bottom, but then the chute opens."

"That was the first time I'd ever ridden in a hot air balloon," Haney recalled. "It was great. Once you get in a plane and jump out, you get no sensation of moving because the plane's going so fast, but jumping out of a balloon is like jumping off a building. You can actually feel yourself accelerate."

Haney concedes that life since the accident has been driving him crazy. He spends most of his hours sitting with his leg propped up in the air.

"When I don't have my foot in the air, it swells all up and puffs all up," he said. "If I stay up for an hour or so, I can just feel the pressure build up in my foot."

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MMB considers Lakewood, Greenville

Mid-Michigan 'B' (MMB) principals and athletic directors are considering adding Lakewood and Greenville to the league for 1984-1985.

Lakewood and Greenville have written letters to MMB officials expressing their interest, and the topic was discussed at Wednesday's executive council meeting in Chesaning.

The schools, which are located west of St. Johns, are interested in the MMB because their league, the Tri-River League, is disbanding after this season.

Four Tri-River League schools jumped to the Ottawa-Kent Conference, a Grand Rapids area league, to save on travel expenses. Lakewood and Greenville also applied to the Ottawa-Kent Conference but were turned down.

If approved, Lakewood and Greenville would give the MMB eight schools. Pre-

sent members are St. Johns, Ovid-Elsie, Chesaning, Corunna, Alma and Ionia.

"The Mid-Michigan 'B' is a good league for us," said Roger Eggers, athletic director at Lakewood. "It's basically the same type of league — rural, small cities outside the metropolitan areas. Ovid-Elsie's like that. They're a consolidated district, like ours."

Greenville athletic director Doug Vansyckle said the MMB is his school's first choice.

"There could be some other possibilities, but we'd like to check this one out first," he said.

A check of MMB officials revealed general support for the schools entering the league. But some schools were wary, primarily because of travel time.

"It's a league decision," said Chesaning athletic director Don Flory, whose school is at least 60 miles from both Greenville and Lakewood. "All I know is that it's a long ride away. Ionia's 60 miles from us and Lake Odessa is probably close to 80."

Under league bylaws, five of the six MMB schools would have to approve Lakewood and Greenville before the schools could join the league.

Alma athletic director Del Hahn offered his support, despite the long distance between his school and the applying schools.

"Scheduling-wise, it might be easier for us," Hahn said. "If you go to an eight-team league, you've only got to worry about two non-conference games (in football). My personal feeling is, I don't have any problem with either one of the two

schools."

St. Johns athletic director Steve Bakita agreed with Hahn, but expressed concern that Chesaning and Corunna would not be receptive to the move.

Ovid-Elsie athletic director Bob Foreback could not be reached for comment.

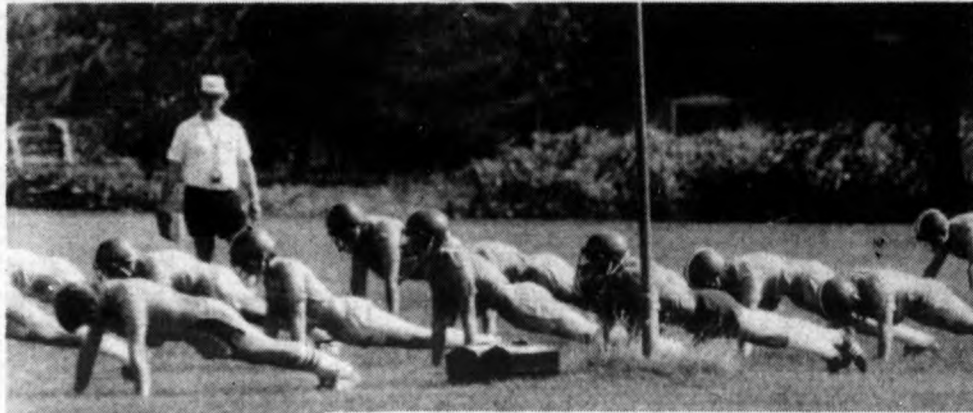
Greenville, Alma, Ionia and Lakewood were members of the West Central Conference in the 1960s and early 1970s.

Greenville and Lakewood have strong athletic traditions, with Greenville winning the Tri-River League all-sports trophy last year. Greenville won league championships in football, girls and boys basketball, baseball, softball and girls track last season.

Lakewood's strong sport has been basketball, where it won several Tri-River League titles and produced college players such as Jeff Heide and Larry Lubitz.

Safety regulations mark change in h.s. football

Football practices may have changed over the years, but one aspect of the drills remains the same.

Pain.

"The first day's the easy day," said Bruce Irish, former all-state tackle at St. Johns, as he watched the 1983 Redwings open conditioning drills on Monday. "Nothing to it. It's when you wake up the next day, and you can't move."

Irish, who played from 1969-1973 under current coach Joe Gonzales, and Roger Beebe, who played from 1962-1965 for coach Bill Smiley, mentioned several differences between today's practices and those of yesteryear.

"We never had water on the field and once you left the high school, you never could take your helmet off," said Beebe, an offensive guard and tackle who now works as an insurance agent in St. Johns.

Irish, also a St. Johns insurance agent, had not so fond memories of practicing behind the 4-H fairgrounds facilities after the county fair.

"It got to be interesting," he said with a smile. "You'd watch where you ran."

When you got down in the dirt back then, Irish recalled, you were taking some chances. "I can remember doing

down-ups on a couple of razor blades," he said.

Safety innovations brought about by stricter Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) rules have changed the game since Irish and Beebe played. One change was the institution of "conditioning week" — a week of practices without pads — in 1970.

Beebe recalled how his team started hitting blocking sleds and tackling dummies with full pads on the first day.

"We only had two weeks of practice before our first game," Beebe said. "Now they've got four weeks. They've got twice as much time."

"This is probably an easier way to get started."

Gonzales said players now drink water on the practice field because coaches are more aware of the dangers involved in dehydration. Also, a school district could be liable if a death occurs because a player was denied water.

St. Johns players listened to Gonzales explain the safety features of their helmets for 30 minutes before they started practice on Monday. Such meetings are required under MHSAA rules, Gonzales said.

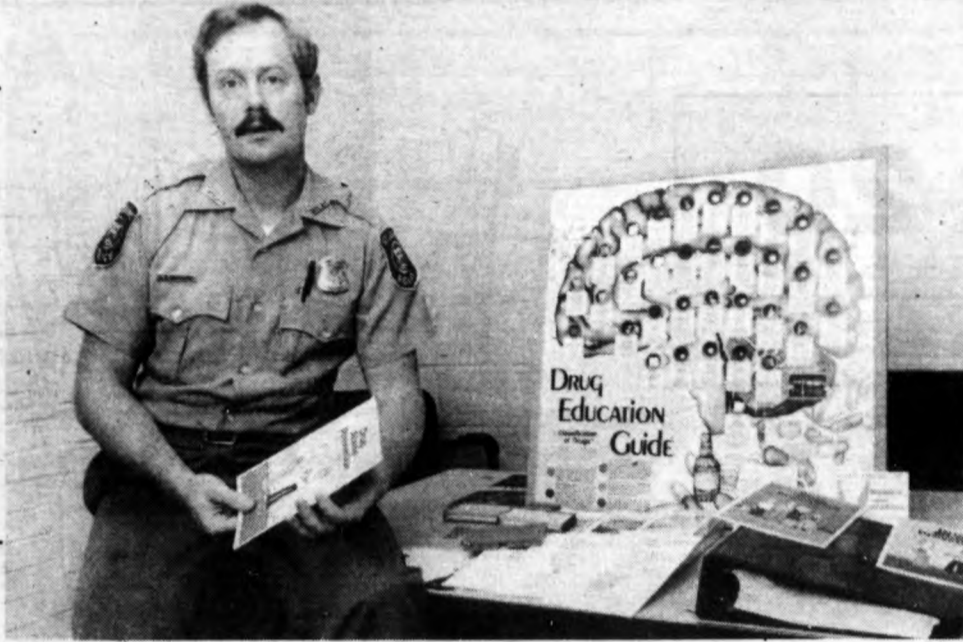
Patterson, Swanchara post wins

Softball tournament aids city drug abuse program

St. Johns police officer Gary Markman won't go so far as to say that the city has a drug problem. But the presence of drugs in St. Johns has him concerned.

"It's becoming obvious," Markman said. "We don't come anywhere near Lansing and Okemos, but they're here. There's no use putting our head in the sand."

The St. Johns Police Drug Abuse program spawned out of Markman's desire to promote more public awareness of the drug problem. The program helps users kick their habit by providing information or channeling them to an appropriate community agency, Markman said.

In an effort to raise funds for the program, Markman is organizing a 20-team

slowpitch softball tournament Friday and Saturday in St. Johns. A similar tournament last year raised \$1,400 for the program, which enabled Markman to buy a projector, slide presentation and pamphlets.

Markman said this year's money will be used to buy films and pamphlets. "We'd like to raise as much as we did last year," he said.

Tournament entry fee is \$70, plus two white-stitched Dudley softballs. Entry is limited to 10 men's teams and 10 women's teams.

The tournament, hosted by Bee's Chevrolet, will include Class C and D teams, Markman said. "We won't even let our competitive city league teams in," he said. "We want the teams that get in to be equal and have some fun."

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Ox Roast, like city, has long history

"DeWitt Merchants Boost Community Ox Roast" reads the headline, but not from this

week's newspaper. It's from page proofs of the Republican News, dated Thursday, Aug. 24, 1950, which reposes in the files of the DeWitt Memorial Association among yellowed bills and checks from earlier years.

The names vary but the message is the same: Articles and ads in the 1950 issue tout DeWitt's advantages and merchants invited folks of the Lansing area to the "DeWitt Ox Roast August 26 and 27," which was then a two-day affair.

Advertisers included Bill Buck, who had the Chevrolet Sales and Service and "a new Frigidaire Appliance Store, located directly across the street"; DeWitt Drug Store, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Percy Carris; Reed's Grocery, founded in 1903 by Harry Reed and purchased in 1944 by Kenneth Reed; Ferrin's Friendly Grocery; Woodruff Bros. Bank; Lankford's Variety Store, operated by Mr. and Mrs. George Lankford and children; Vincent Funeral Home; Bob Norris Barber Shop; Walker Lumber and Coal Co.; Looking Glass Farms (locker plant and meat processing); Culligan Soft Water Service and Johnson's Tavern.

Articles described the DeWitt Theatre as a modern structure, "the only theatre between St. Johns and Lansing," featuring all late-run movies. The DeWitt Grange, which had just marked its 75th anniversary; DeWitt's two churches, Community Church and the Methodist Church, and DeWitt Public Library were all cited for their activities and programs.

In the limelight was Boy Scout Troop 77, of which Ben Blivens was scoutmaster and Willard Reed, assistant scoutmaster. Billy Fuerstenau was leader of the Indian Patrol; Jimmy Tingay, Apache Patrol; Dick Hill, Panther Patrol; Robert Doak, Eagle Patrol; and Gene Foy, Mohawk Patrol.

The Republican News reported that DeWitt now had a fine recreation field "located south of the school house near the river." The DeWitt Recreation Association with Gaylord Ward as president and Ford Schavey, secretary-treasurer, oversaw the field's operation.

Among the league of softball teams using the field that summer, South Riley won the first round of play and was defeated in the second round. DeWitt Center (C&H Motor Court) had lost only one game in the second round. Other teams in the league were DeWitt Commercial, East DeWitt, Reed's, Rosevale Local 216, Bath and Westphalia.

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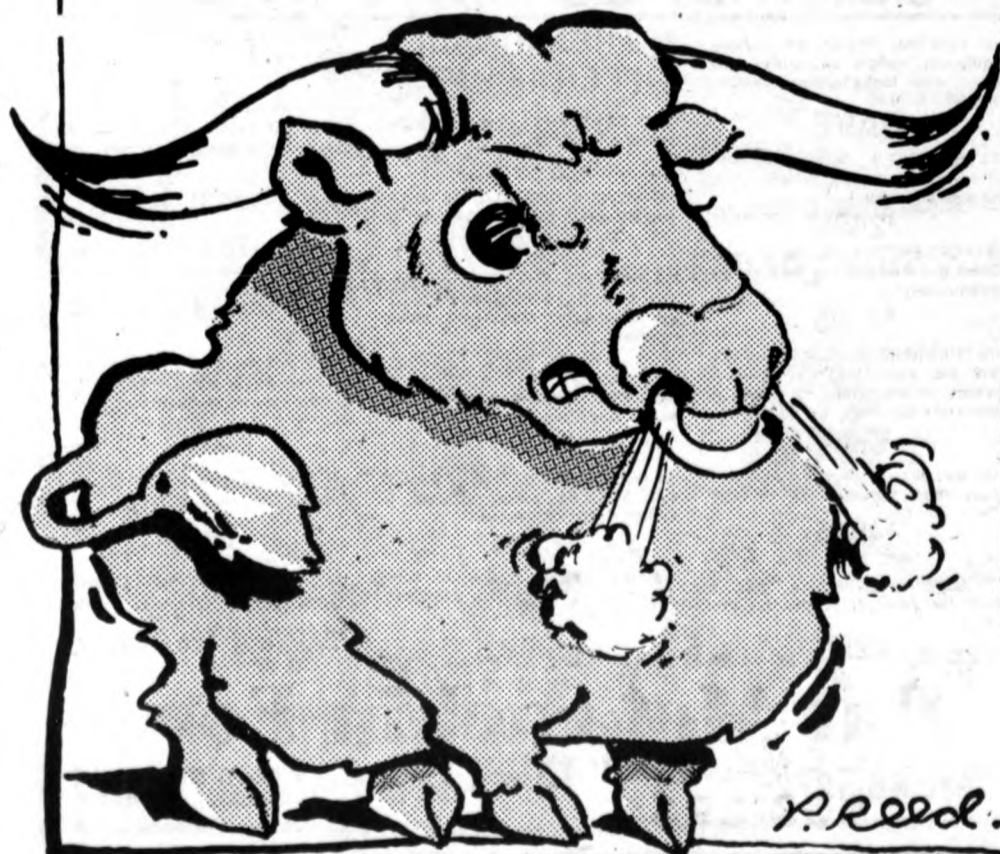
