## Teachers' contract next

Teachers voted Monday night to ratify a new three-year contract granting raises totalling 12.5 percent.

The contract was slated for a vote by the St. Johns school board during a special meeting Wednesday night, when ratification was expected to end a year and a half of negotiations.

The contract calls for raises of one percent for last year, a 5.5 percent hike for this coming school year, and a six percent increase for the 1984-85 school year.

Bargaining began with demands by school board members that teachers accept a wage freeze to help balance district books and maintain programs. Although three other county districts have since won similar concessions from teachers, St. Johns teachers refused, working through the 1982-83 school year without a contract rather than accept a wage freeze.

The one-percent hike granted for the past school year was described by one county school official as a "token wage freeze."

Members of the St. Johns Education

Association could not be reached for comment on the contract, and have previously refused to comment until the board has ratified the pact.

School officials have also refused to comment on details of the agreement, and could not be reached to provide estimates of how much the new contract would cost the district.

However, using figures provided to the board by Controller Rick Terres when the wage freeze demand was made last March, The County News has calculated the raise would cost the district almost \$438,000 over the three-year period.

Based on Terres' figure for teacher salaries in the 1981-82 school year totalling \$3,381,668, a one percent increase for the first year of the new contract would cost \$33,816; a 5.5 percent raise for the second year would cost \$187,851; and the third year's six percent hike, approximately \$216,200.

The salary figures are based on Terres' budget for teacher salaries only.

Still to be settled are contracts with non-instructional support personnel, including secretaries, aides and custodians.

Drain commissioner starts Sept. 1

## Pierson picked

Satisfied that DeWitt's Arden S. Pierson would not be torn by a conflict of interest, a three-man committee has appointed Pierson as Clinton County drain commissioner.

The committee, which consisted of Probate Judge Marvin Robertson, county clerk Jane Swanchara and county prosecutor Jon Newman, sharply questioned Pierson before naming him to serve out the term of retired drain commissioner Harry Harden.

Pierson works as president of Pierson and Associates, a Lansing engineering firm which has done extensive work in Clinton County. Committee members were concerned about how Pierson would influence the firm collecting \$135,000 from the Maple River Drainage Board for surveying work.

In response, Pierson assured committee members that the work had already been performed and that he would not use his influence as drain commissioner to collect the debt. "I think that would be a total conflict of interest," he said.

He also assured committee members that he would serve as a full-time drain commissioner. His wife, Barbara, would

take over as company president, and she would not contract any business in Clinton County, Pierson said.

Pierson, 46, of 513 N. Scott Rd., said he was excited to start his new job Sept. 1. He will serve until Harden's term expires and hope to earn a mandate from the people in the 1984 election.

"I know Clinton County quite well," said Pierson, county surveyor from 1971 to 1976. "I know most of the drains within the county. We've worked on several projects within the county."

Other candidates reviewed by the committee were Bruce Irish Sr. of St. Johns, Jerry Wilcox of St. Johns, Daniel Simmon of Fowler and Gary Hyde of St. Johns.

## DNR's tests at landfill show no contaminants

No news is good news for residents near Granger Landfill in southern Clinton County.

That was the word from the state Department of Natural Resources, which recently conducted tests to determine if groundwater near the site had been contaminated by leaks from the landfill.

"The work has been finalized and there is not groundwater contamination," said DNR spokesperson Debra Mulcahey.

The tests Ms. Mulcahey referred to were the latest in a series of samples ordered by an Ingham County Circuit Judge, as part of a lawsuit settlement last April between Granger Land Development and the Peoples' Action League (PAL).

The recent tests were taken along the west side of the landfill, just over a retention wall which was built to contain leachate, or leakage from the fill.

"There's been extensive sampling at

the site," Ms. Mulcahey said. "We feel that the results were consistent with the company's (Granger's) tests, so we were pleased."

The tests analyzed soil boring samples for chlorinated hydrocarbons, polychlorinated-biphenyl (PCB) and organichlorine pesticides, among other things, she said. "There were some other parameters tested, but we didn't find anything."

Previous tests for organic con-

taminants were also negative, DNR officials said.

The Ingham court agreement was brought about in part by Attorney General Frank Kelley, who joined the PAL suit against Granger, demanding an immediate stop to leaks from the landfill which were spilling into the Looking Glass River. The agreement also calls for Granger to construct a clay liner to encapsulate about 50 acres of the landfill, and allows PAL to request testing for groundwater contamination.

# Four injured on US-27

A DeWitt woman was injured early Tuesday morning, and three persons were admitted to Clinton Memorial Hospital Monday evening, following separate accidents on US-27.

A total of 109 complaints were handled by county law enforcement agencies during the week ending Aug. 21, sheriff's reports said. Among the complaints and others reported Tuesday were:

• Rachel Hilts, 58, of 644 Northcrest, DeWitt, was reported in good condition by a St. Lawrence Hospital surgical unit spokesperson Tuesday, following an accident on US-27 at the intersection of Northcrest at 5:50 a.m. that morning.

DeWitt Township Police reported Ms. Hilts was headed west on northcrest when she pulled onto US-27, striking the rear wheels of a tractor-trailer driven by Raymond Straley, 53, of Waterloo. Straley was not injured, and Ms. Hilts was cited for failing to yield.

• Eugene Bradley, 63, of Rt. 5, US-27, St. Johns, was

listed in fair condition by Clinton Memorial Hospital personnel Tuesday, following an accident which left three hospitalized Monday evening.

Clinton County Sheriff's reports said Bradley pulled onto northbound US-27 from his driveway, south of Centerline Road, into the path of an auto driven by Ferol Virginia Dickson, 53, of Rodney. Ms. Dickinson and a passenger in her auto, William Dickson, 52, of the same address, were listed in good condition Tuesday, a Clinton Memorial Hospital spokesperson said. The accident was under investigation.

• A Lansing man was sentenced in Clinton County Circuit Court Friday, Aug. 19, for involuntary manslaughter in the death of Bath resident Carl Otto last January.

Bath Township Police reported Robert G. Bouck, 38, was sentenced to from seven to 15 years in prison. He was convicted of killing Otto on Jan 22, at 3:53 p.m., when he struck Otto near

Otto's home at 16441 Center Road, Bath Township. Otto, 73, had been on a daily walk when he was run down, and Bouck was under the influence of liquor when the accident occurred, a police spokesperson said. Bouck had also had previous arrests on charges of drunk driving.

• DeWitt Township Police were called to the home of Jean Saub, 1421 E. Clark Road, near 3:15 p.m. Monday, when Ms. Saub reported a breaking and entering in progress. A spokesman said Ms. Saub interrupted the burglary when she came home, heard noises, and ran to a neighbor's home to report the break-in. Police arrived and found no one in the home, but following tips from neighbors, located and apprehended a 15-year-old boy hiding in a tree a block away on Boichot, just south of Clark.

The juvenile was released to his mother, and another suspect is being sought. The home had been entered through a back

bedroom window and ransacked. About \$100 in cash and a portable stereo was missing, reports said.

• DeWitt Township Police were kept hopping Wednesday, Aug. 17, when three breaking and enterings were reported. The burglaries, believed to be related, were all reported during the evening hours, and all involved entry to homes through back windows and doors. All three homes were ransacked, refrigerator doors were left open in two, but little was reported missing in the break-ins, reports said.

The first was reported at 5:15 p.m. by Lester Lichte, 1471 N. Turner, where entry was gained through a back garage window.

At 5:40 p.m., a second break-in was reported at 836 Boichot, the home of John Grammes, where a rear door window was broken and \$10 in coins was reported missing.

The third was reported at 6:55 p.m. by Don Gearhart, 14808 Wood Road. Entry was forced through a back window, but nothing of value was reported missing.

• Bath Township Police arrested Paul Feadorf, 30, of Lot 49, Park Lake Trailer Park Aug. 17, on

charges of malicious destruction of property and disturbing the peace. Feadorf was charged with banging on a trailer owned by Tom Russell, Lot 48, yelling obscenities and denting the trailer, reports said.

• Dennis Shaw, 35, of 9480 W. Winegar, Bath Township, was injured when his auto struck a deer on I-69 near Peacock Road Aug. 17, Bath Township Police reported. Shaw received facial injuries from flying glass and was treated and released by Sparrow Hospital following the accident at 7:40 a.m., when a deer ran into his path, striking the windshield and roof of his auto.

• An air compressor and an AM/FM stereo were taken from the home of Jeff Paradise, 110 E. Sturgis, between Aug. 14-19, St. Johns Police reported. Both items were in a garage, and the stereo was stolen from a car parked in the garage. Total loss was estimated at about \$406, reports said.

• A pickup truck owned by David Morris of Wright Road, Grand Ledge, was

reported stolen Aug. 16. The white, 1979 Chevrolet was taken from a cattle barn, where it was parked with keys in the ignition, reports said.

## Correction

In the Aug. 18 edition of this paper, it was reported that Joseph Thelen, 59, of Fowler, "had been drinking at the time of the crash" which occurred Aug. 12 in Fowler. This was not intended to imply that Thelen was drinking when the accident occurred, only that the officer investigating the accident had checked the "had been drinking" box on the accident report. The investigating officer said drinking was not a contributive cause of the accident. Also, William Raymond, involved in the accident, is not from Fowler; David Simmon was a witness, not a passenger in Raymond's auto; and Thelen's vehicle was struck in the front as he waited to make a left turn, not the rear, as reported.

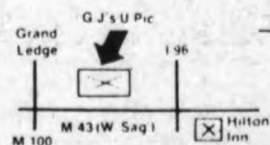

## Trash rates up

Trash removal rates have been hiked for St. Johns, thanks mainly to a court settlement between Granger Landfill and its opponents, but local residents won't feel the increase yet.

The city will absorb a seven percent increase in trash disposal fees, according to City Clerk Rich Coletta. "We anticipated there would be an increase, so we were ready for it," Coletta said Tuesday.

City commissioners were told of the hike during a meeting Monday night in a letter from Steve Palatka, owner of Steve's Refuse Service. Palatka requested and received a seven percent increase to cover a 6.1 percent hike in fees by Granger, plus a 7¢ per cubic yard surcharge imposed by Clinton County on the landfill as part of an agreement which granted Granger a special use permit for expansion last December.

The surcharge will set up a trust fund for future improvements at the site and monitoring of possible pollution from the landfill. The fee increase by Granger was brought about, in part, by court-ordered improvements and safeguards at the landfill imposed last April in settlement of a People's Action League lawsuit against Granger.

Also at Monday's meeting, city commissioners approved:

- Purchase of two new police cars, at a cost not to exceed \$18,500. The cars will be bought in conjunction with Michigan State Police car purchases, allowing the city to take advantage of lower costs.

- A request to let bids on tree trimming and removal in the city. Department of Public Works Superintendent Wendell Waggoner reported that 103 trees need trimming and as many as 18 may need removal. The program will also provide tree service to homeowners, Coletta said, much as driveway paving is provided through the city's paving program.

St. Johns board members have made the final selections on a 32-man committee which will examine school closings.

## Meal requirements planned for county

Help is available for children who cannot afford to purchase milk and meals at school.

Free or reduced-price meals are being offered to students who meet eligibility requirements set by the Clinton County Intermediate School District.

With a total family size of one, family income of \$6,318 or less would entitle the child to free meals and free milk. A \$8,991 family income or less would qualify the student for reduced-price meals.

Other maximum incomes include: family of two, \$8,502 for meals and milk, \$12,099 for reduced-price meals; family of three, \$10,686 for meals and milk, \$15,207 for reduced-price meals; family of four, \$12,870 for free meals and milk, \$18,315 for reduced-price meals; family of five, \$15,054 for free meals and milk, \$21,423 for reduced-price meals; family of six, \$17,238 for free meals and milk, \$24,531 for reduced-price meals; family of seven, \$19,422 for free meals and milk, \$27,639 for reduced-price meals and family of eight, \$21,606 for free meals and milk, \$30,747 for reduced-price meals.

The scale for each additional family member beyond eight goes up \$2,184 for free meals and milk and \$3,108 for reduced-price meals.

Application forms are available in each of the county's six high schools — Bath, DeWitt, Ovid-Elsie,

St. Johns, Fowler and Pewamo-Westphalia.

Names of household members, social security numbers of adult household members, total household income and a verifying signature are required to determine eligibility.

The committee, chaired by former school board president Ron Huard, will explore options in closing schools and examine whether programs should be placed in other buildings. Committee members also will provide recommendations on building renovation, construction and methods of financing.

An organizational meeting of the committee will be held Sept. 19. Other meetings have been scheduled for Oct. 3 and 17 and Nov. 7 and 21.

The committee will present its report and recommendations to trustees on Dec. 14 and will disband. Then, board members will decide how to respond to their recommendations on Jan. 11.

The best shoot ever held here occurred New Years Day when state champion Benson of Lansing was among the contestants and, incidentally, was trimmed in three of four events after being tied by Bryon Danley of this city.

In four different events in which Mr. Benson and Mr. Danley competed, each broke the same number of "pigeons." In shooting off the tie, Mr. Danley won three times. Many times during the day when there would be several entered in five target events, there would be three or four with perfect scores. A number of targets would be shot before final winner was decided. Carl Beach was successful in three of these five-target events. Will Smith won two, L. Monroe, Austin Phillips and Charles Miller, one each, also Dr. Sackrider and others from Owosso.

Glenn Danley won the grand prize for the best average on the first 25 shots, breaking twenty-two out of the first twenty-five targets. Glenn also won chickens in three other events.

Besides Mr. Benson of Lansing, another expert, Mr. McKinley, representing the Western Ammunition Co., was present, as were several other marksmen from Lansing and Owosso.

# Youth workers help Fowler

Thanks to the labor of 27 Clinton County youths, the Fowler School District has witnessed improvements it wasn't planning on this summer.

Superintendent Jim Andros estimated the youths — funded through three programs coordinated through the Clinton Intermediate School District (CISD) — have done over \$15,000 worth of work.

Primary projects performed by the youth workers were:

- Building a 40- by 24-foot storage building.

- Painting 15 classrooms and the high school gymnasium.
- Repairing and painting the high school concession stand.
- Repairing grounds and working with 500 feet of new and repaired fence.
- Repairing and reconditioning the football pressbox and bleachers.
- Resealing the gym floor.
- Rebuilding the backstop at the girls' softball field.

Gov. James Blanchard's Youth Corps Program, the Clinton CISD and CETA funded Youth Employment Training Program, and Clinton CISD and Vocational Education CETA Program provided the workers. They will keep working at Fowler until Friday, Aug. 12, Andros said.

"We would never have been able to do all the things we've done this summer," he said, referring to the extensive repairs. "We would never have been able to afford the manpower."

Painting was the most urgent task facing the workers at the beginning of summer, Andros said.

"All of the rooms that were done hadn't been painted in seven years," he said. "We just haven't had the money to do that."

Building the storage shed will give Fowler a genuine place for its athletic equipment. Items such as blocking sleds, volleyball standards and tackling dummies will be stored in the new building, which was paid for with funds from the athletic program.

"It definitely allowed us to have some more space in the (school) building," said Andros, mentioning that the bus garage had been used to store athletic equipment.

In a non-related item, Fowler trustees have decided to use the \$19,500 generated from the extra half-mill approved in June for repairs on four projects — road, chimney, door and roof repair.

Door repairs will make up the bulk of the cost — \$6,500 — followed by roof (\$6,000), chimney (\$3,500) and road (\$3,000) repairs, Andros said.

# Governor's plan adds county jobs

Gov. Blanchard's Youth Corps program has provided 98 jobs in Clinton County, according to Kelly Rossman, press secretary for the program.

Thirty-six of those workers were assigned to the Clinton Intermediate School District, she said, with 22 more through the Tri-County Regional Manpower Commission.

Twelve workers apiece were through the Clinton County Soil Conservation District and county fair, she said, and eight more worked at Rose Lake in Bath. Dept. of Transportation had five workers and three more will work for Bath Township, she said.

Clinton County received only 98 of 115 targeted Youth Corps workers because the demand for them was not great. The county has 3,145 unemployed workers, which represents .47 percent of the state's total number of unemployed. The 115 figure was based on .47 percent of 24,000 Youth Corps jobs.

In Bath Township, the three Youth Corps workers will start work in late August repairing the Park Lake Dike, zoning administrator Rick Crawford said. They will also clean up Prigoris Park and install recreation equipment for the Bath Senior Citizens Center.

The workers will provide about \$2,000 worth of labor to the township, Crawford said.

Neither the city of St. Johns, the city of DeWitt nor DeWitt Township has used any Youth Corps workers this summer.

## 'No instant, magical answers,' says ex-energy secretary

America's energy problems aren't over yet, but former Energy Secretary James B. Edwards says solutions are coming into focus that promise great hope for the future.

"The energy crisis is not over, but we can put the siege mentality that it spawned behind us," says Edwards. "We are in the midst of a long, sometimes very painful transition to new forms of energy. There are no instant, magical answers. There are no universal energy truths awaiting discovery. Our only tools are hard work, devotion, prudence and creativity."

America must realize it is not running out of energy, he says. But it is running out of cheap energy.

Edwards' comments on America's energy future appear in the current issue of "FOCUS: Views on Energy", a magazine published by Consumers Power Company. A former governor of South Carolina, he was the nation's top energy official during 1981-82.

Edwards expects electricity to supply an increasing share of the nation's energy in the future, with coal as a major fuel to generate the power. But he also cautions that the country can't rely solely on coal.

"It was counterproductive to advocate reliance on a single energy source to be our salvation, or to rule out particular energy sources," he says. "We need a mix of energy sources. We need to split wood and atoms and everything in between."

He says nuclear power must be an important part of that mix.

"Nuclear power is still the safest, cheapest, cleanest form of thermally generated electricity known to man," he says. "We have 600 years of reactor operating time in those big plants, and

there has not been one death or injury due to nuclear radiation. Nuclear power is safer than nearly any other large-scale form of energy generation."

Edwards defends the decision by America's utilities to build the generation of nuclear plants coming on-line during this decade.

"Demand for electricity was growing at about 7 percent (when the decisions to build were made)," he points out. "Nuclear power plants were, by any calculation, the cheapest investment. At the time of the oil crisis, utilities had about 95 gigawatts of new capacity on order. That was only slightly more than what would have been needed."

"Had utilities not ordered that much new capacity, they would have been guilty of dereliction of responsibility. No one could have foreseen the oil crisis and its impact on demand for electricity."

## Building redone

The history of the Wiggins Sanitarium in St. Johns dates back to the 19th century.

Built by Dr. Andrew J. Wiggins, it was originally a two-story Second Empire brick with mansard roof and a central tower over the main entrance.

In 1888, Dr. Wiggins was practicing medicine in an office with Dr. Arthur O. Hart in the Munger block, Clinton Ave., at Walker. Shortly afterwards, he opened the Sanitarium, which specialized in treatment of kidney, bladder and nervous disorders.

Dr. Wiggins died in 1900, after practicing in St. Johns for 35 years. In 1912, Drs. Arthur O. and Eugene Hart completely renovated the building, adding a third story and operating rooms in the back.

The hospital was abandoned by its owners in favor of the new Clinton Memorial Hospital in 1926.

# Yep, it's back to school time already

Footsteps echo in dark, well-polished halls and desks stand empty, awaiting Aug. 31, when students return.

Rodney B. Wilson, with freshly painted halls and walls and a new gym floor, will be the site of most of the major changes awaiting St. Johns students and parents this fall.

Although the complete transfer of sixth graders to the middle school has been held up along with plans to close two rural elementary schools, between 25 and 30 new sixth grade students will attend Rodney B. Wilson this fall, said Principal Bob Kudwa.

"It would have been 65 or 70 students, but some are not coming in," he explained. "There are room problems and the plan is inter-meshed with school closings and combination classes."

The plan to close East Essex and East Olive elementary schools has been put on hold for the coming school year, with a decision expected in December.

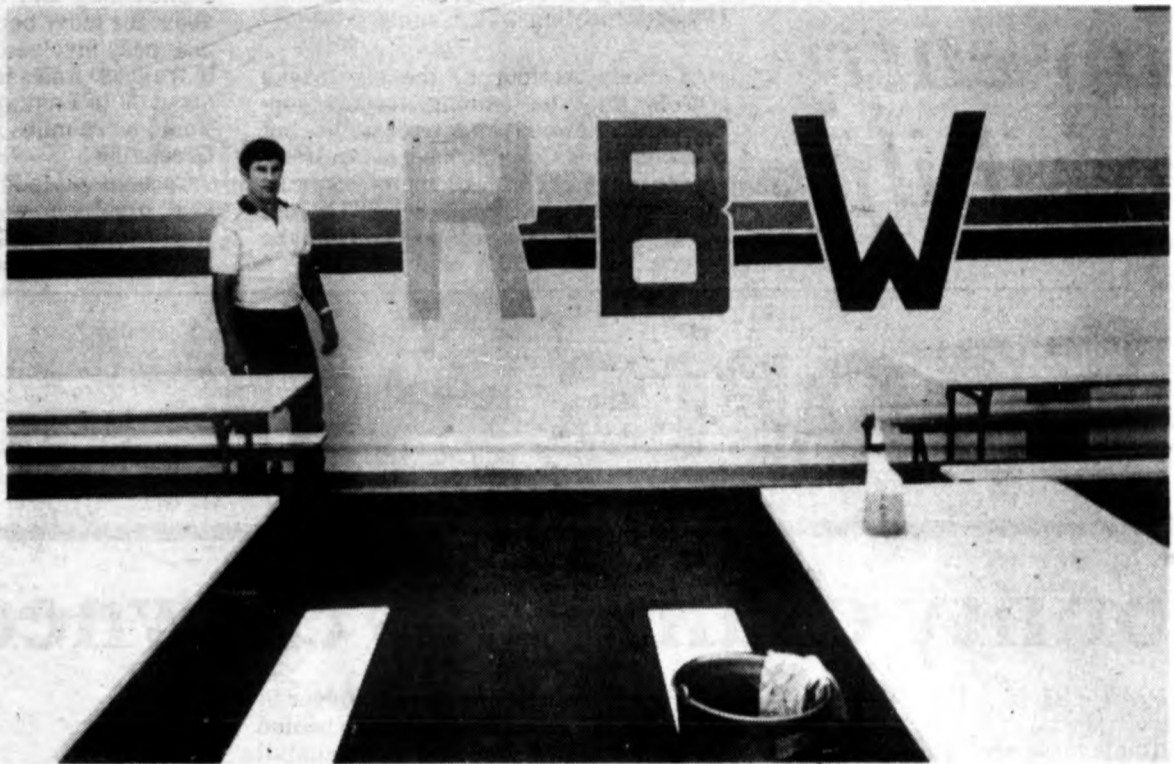
Meanwhile, rural sixth grade students who joined their city peers at the junior high last year enjoyed it, Kudwa said. Parents have also adjusted well, and early fears that sixth graders would be "rushed" into a social life have proven unfounded, the principal said.

"That concern is to most degrees non-existent once parents have their kids here for a while," Kudwa said. "In fact, what we've done at the middle school is to have sixth graders segregated with their own peer group. If activities, like dances, are too advanced, they're excluded."

Those who will attend Rodney B. Wilson this year will benefit from a half-hour per day physical education program, not generally offered in rural schools. Parents were given the option of keeping their children at rural schools, and transfers were based on many factors, including bus routes, he said.

Elsewhere in the district, Superintendent Earl Gabriel's administrative task force report urging the rural elementary closings dominates most discussions of possible changes.

"The major thing I look forward to for the coming year is the report in December," Gabriel said, referring

to a citizens' committee study of his task force report. Also studied will be suggestions from opponents of the plan that Central Elementary be closed instead.

Coming up next spring will be a major millage election, when voters will be asked in June to renew 17.75 mills, most of the district's 29.75 operating mills.

Other changes, according to Gabriel, include:

- The high school parking lot, including gravel drives behind the building, has been paved;

- Plans are afoot to install an information line for the public, providing late scores, school activities, weather closing news and election details;

- St. Johns will begin offering adult education classes at Fowler and Pewamo-Westphalia schools;

- An auction will be held to dispose of old desks, supplies and other materials, sometime in October.

Few changes have been made in the teaching staff, bus transportation routes or administration, the superintendent said.

# Dyer promises to leave Bath above water

Bath Community Schools are in a curious dilemma: They're looking for a few good adults to fill the shoes of kindergartners.

"We could lose more than 38 this year," Superintendent Ken Dyer said of the projected decline in kindergarten enrollment. At state aid reimbursement of \$2,300 per student, close to \$90,000 could be lost by the district if his prediction is accurate.

On the other hand, Bath would get the same amount of state aid for each student enrolled in the district's new adult education program. And Dyer would like to see that happen.

"This year, for the first time, we've joined a Haslett, East Lansing and Okemos adult education consortium," he said. "We have had our own correspondence-course program in the past, but it's just not the same as live presentations."

Dyer said there is little doubt there are plenty of adults in the community who could take advantage of the improved course offerings. And better attendance would be better for community relations, he added. "So many adults only see what's outside the building."

Adult education recruiting could also be the answer to sports-booster's fund-raising prayers, he said. A plan is presently afoot to do away with intramural programs at the middle school and revive intramural sports for seventh and eighth graders.

The cost of such an effort would be roughly \$9,000, Dyer said. Subtracting the present cost of intramurals — about \$3,000 — roughly another \$6,000 would have to be raised by boosters. And that's the equivalent of just three or four adult education students.

Of course, there's no guarantee school board members would channel revenue increases from the improved adult education program directly into intramural sports or any other specific program. Most

schools return state aid revenues to their general fund. But the comparisons point out the potentials for Bath, Dyer said, and are just one example of changes facing the district this fall.

Others include:

- Contract negotiations. All employee groups will negotiate new contracts and Dyer is confident Bath can keep its perfect no-teacher-strike record intact by settling with teachers soon. He said the 3.5 percent one-year raise granted to teachers last year will not be enough to offer teachers this year, but was confident talks, now underway, will end in a contract soon. "Unfortunately, our teachers are one of the lowest paid groups in this immediate four- or five-county area," Dyer said.

- New bleachers for the home side in the football stadium. Installed at a cost of about \$19,000, the bleachers should be ready by October, spanning 80 feet and 10 rows.

- Fresh paint. All doors, many hallways and old bleachers at the football field have been given a new coat of paint.

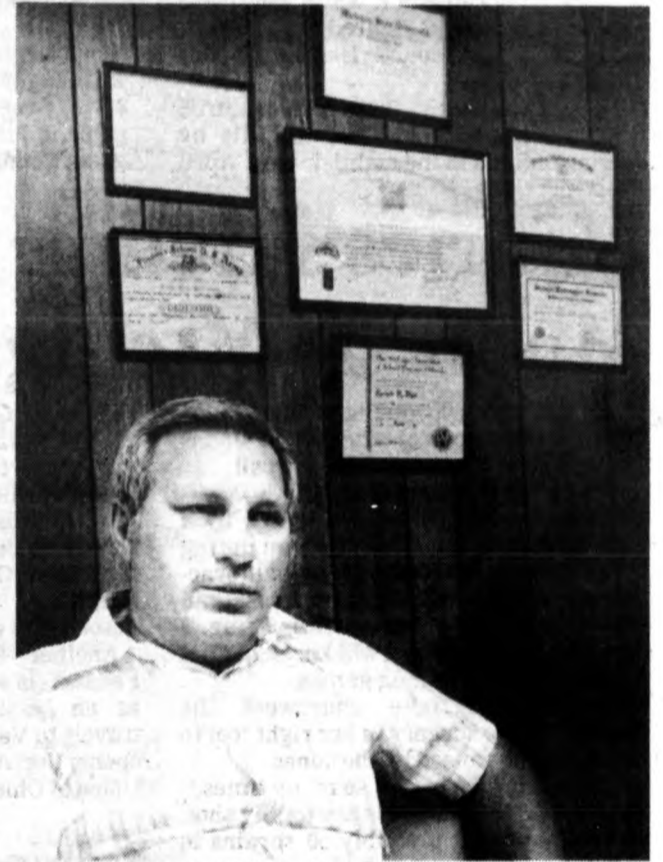
- A major millage election. All of Bath's 33.68 operating mills will be up for renewal at the annual school election in June, or sooner if board members choose. "That's the big question," Dyer said.

Other improvements promised include better elementary school restrooms, new acoustics in the high school gym, and new elementary school classroom shades and lighting fixtures.

Bath could also have a new superintendent before the year is out, though Dyer says he'll stay at least to the end of the school year if needed, before retiring after three and a half years.

And when he leaves, Dyer promised, the district should be in good shape. "My strength is business. I guess I've kept Bath afloat."

"We will be well-off this year. Financially, it may be the best year we've had since I've been here."

# Few changes planned for P-W

Except for students who are a year older — and much, much wiser, according to teachers — few things will change in the Pewamo-Westphalia schools this fall.

"Our district is in pretty good shape," said superintendent Roy Thelen. "Our programs will be pretty much the same as last year."

Three classrooms in the district have been closed due to enrollment drops, and one teaching position has been cut, Thelen said. "We're reducing one staff position, but we're doing it by attrition, not by lay off."

Thelen said there will be "nothing out of the ordinary" to greet students who return to classrooms in the district's elementary, junior high and high school

buildings.

Teacher contracts are being negotiated, but teachers there have never struck and are not likely to this year, Thelen said. Last year teachers agreed to a wage freeze for one year.

There will be no change in administration, and no changes in extra-curricular activities from a year ago, he said.

"The big change is that we're adding a secretarial block to our curriculum," he said. The two-hour program, provided by a \$15,000 state grant and \$15,000 from the district, will give junior and senior high school students hands-on experience with typewriters, word processors and computers, Thelen said.

# Long rides dim entry possibility

Prospects for Lakewood and Greenville joining the Mid-Michigan 'B' (MMB) League appear doubtful following a Aug. 17 league meeting at Chesaning.

As many as four of the six league schools may be leaning toward supporting Lakewood and Greenville, but Chesaning and Corunna have not expressed approval. Five MMB members must approve Lakewood and Greenville before the Tri-River League schools can join the league.

A meeting of the MMB executive council has been set for Sept. 21, 9 p.m., at Chef's Cafe in St. Johns. Officials from Lakewood and Greenville will be present.

Chesaning and Corunna are hesitant about the move because of the long travel distances involved. Corunna would have to travel 80 miles to get to Greenville and about 70 to Lakewood. Chesaning's trips would be 80 miles to Lakewood and 61 to Greenville.

Corunna athletic director Jim Duffield said problems would arise during the week, when girls' basketball and wrestling teams would face 1½-hour bus trips to

Lakewood or Greenville.

"If they took a vote, the travel would prohibit us from voting them into the league," Duffield said.

Chesaning athletic director Don Flory wasn't as direct, but he did say his school would have "some real reservations" about Lakewood and Greenville joining the league.

St. Johns athletic director Steve Bakita said he would be surprised if league officials vote to admit Lakewood and Greenville. "It could go through, but it's rather doubtful," he said.

The Wooden Nichols are comprised of St. Johns school district students who live near DeWitt, mainly in Riley Township.

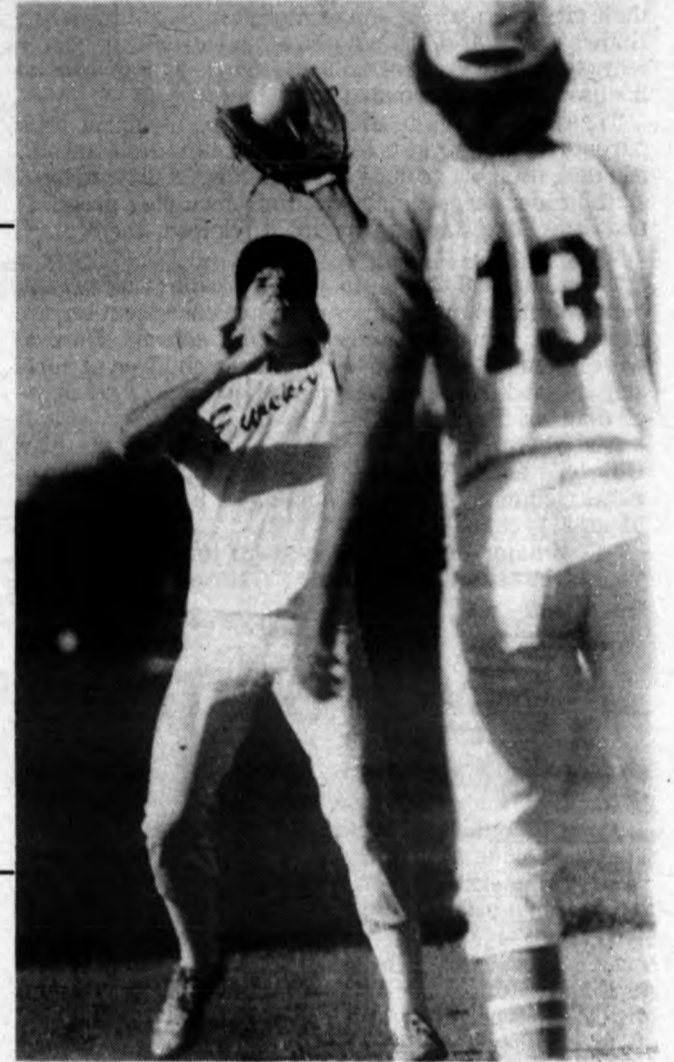
In other action Saturday, Clinton County teams brought home two more state titles.

St. Johns' \$25,000 weight room was christened this week by football players lifting in preparation for the season opener.

The weight room, which features brand new equipment from Universal Gym Co., was paid for primarily by the St. Johns Football Boosters without the aid of school funding.

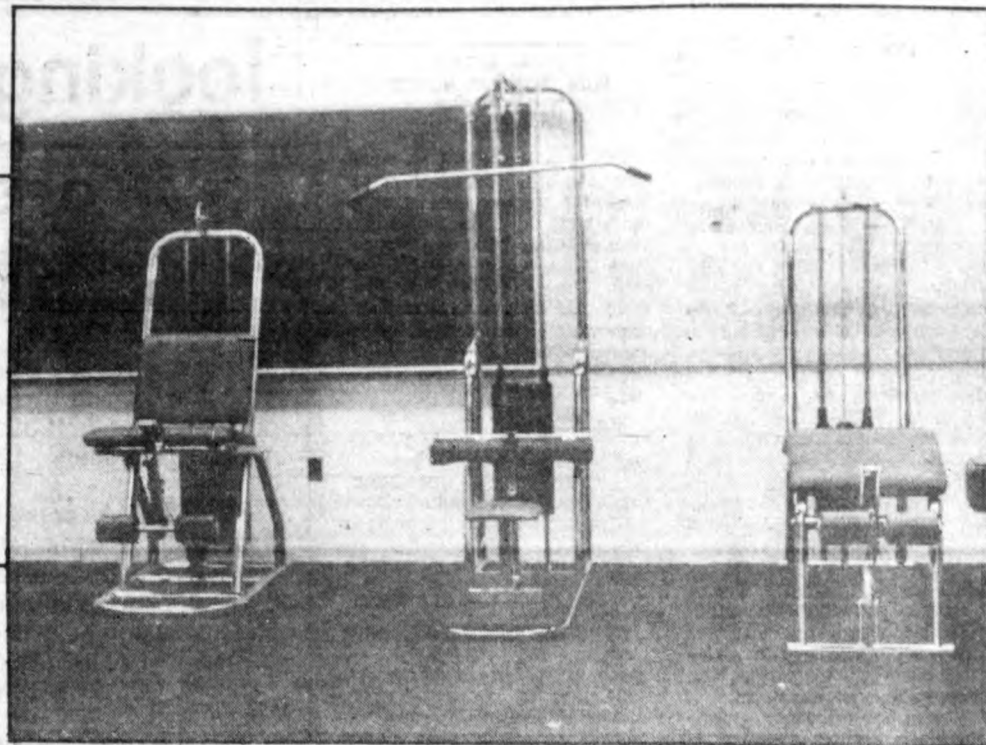

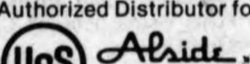

# New judge to visit in Credit Union suit

A visiting judge has been appointed to hear a Clinton County lawsuit alleging sexual harassment by the St. Johns Michigan Federal Credit Union, but no new hearing dates were set as of Monday, a circuit court clerk said.

Judge Lawrence Root, of the 49th Judicial District, Big Rapids, will visit St. Johns to hear a lawsuit in which five women have charged that former credit union manager Roy Ebert made repeated demands for sexual favors from female employees and was guilty of unconsented touching and verbal and physical sexual harassment.

The suit also asks damages from the credit union's board of directors, claiming the board was notified of the problem, but failed to remove or warn Ebert. Those filing suit are four former employees and one present employee of the credit union, all local women in their 30s.

Okemos attorney Edith Harsh, who represents the women, has requested that the trial be moved from St. Johns, arguing in briefs that selection of an impartial jury would be difficult since most of the 7,000 members of the credit union are county residents and because Ebert was

mayor of St. Johns from 1974 to 1977. Her request for a change of venue will be the first order of business when hearings resume.

Both of Clinton County's circuit judges have disqualified themselves from hearing the case: Judge Tim Green because his court reporter is related to a credit union board member and defendant; Judge Randy Tahvonen because he and his wife maintain accounts at the credit union.

Ebert, replying to the suit through briefs filed by his attorney, Bill Jackson of St. Johns, has denied any wrongdoing and all of the charges. He was replaced by the credit union's board on June 21, however, shortly after the suit was filed.

The board insists, through Lansing labor lawyer Lawrence Schneider, that Ebert treated male and female employees alike, and that rules regarding treatment of employees were made clear to Ebert. The board should not be liable for damages because any harassment would have been "outside the scope of (Ebert's) actual or apparent authority," Schneider argues.

Seeking a minimum of \$200,000 each are present credit union employee Sherri Jopke and former employees Christine Brawner, Tammie Witt, LuAnn Feldpausch and Yvonne Makara.
