The maize blues

Pat Zeeb displays a typical ear of corn from his field near DeWitt. Zeeb and other area farmers say the hot and dry growing season and late start in the spring have left bare spots on ears and resulted in smaller plants than normal. At this time of year, corn plants are usually 10 and 12 feet tall. This year, the plants are very immature, ranging from six to seven feet, Zeeb said. Clinton County farmers still are much better off than farmers elsewhere in the Midwest, however, and central Michigan is one of the areas least affected by one of the worst growing seasons in recent history. Busts break up Buck Night bash

Picking up easy money during vacation can be risky business, patrons of the Northside Drive-In Theatre in DeWitt Township have discovered.

As James Bond was rubbing out no-good-niks on the giant silver screen one recent Wednesday evening, some real-life undercover agents for the Tri-County Metro Narcotics Squad mingled with young movie-goers in an attempt to wipe out drug trafficking and alcohol sales.

The action among the parked cars, in fact, was more entertaining than Hollywood's latest on the screen, Lt. Gene Wrigglesworth said. Many of the cars were parked facing away from the movie and the "main feature" was drug and beer sales, he said.

"It was a virtual circus," the Metro Squad detective said. "It reminded me of a farmers' market where you sell fruit and vegetables, but in this case they were selling beer, marijuana and LSD."

Trading places with drug buyers for the evening, Wrigglesworth and undercover officers arrested four Lansing residents during what he referred to as a "Mini-Woodstock" — the Wednesday and Thursday "WILS Buck Nights" held at the drive-in on US-27 between Lansing and DeWitt.

Tammy Sue Hill, 18, of 3220 Schultz, was charged with delivery of marijuana, a four-year felony; Kristin Gebhardt, 18,

of 5305 Tulip Ave., was given an appearance ticket for minor in possession of alcohol; David Cary, 22, 3120 Creston, was charged with obstructing and hindering police officers; and the identity of a fourth teen charged with sale of marijuana has been withheld during the ongoing investigation, Wrigglesworth said.

More arrests are expected, but cleaning up the "war zone" behind the concession stand in the drive-in sounds like a job for Superman, the way Wrigglesworth describes it. "To be quite frank, not to exaggerate, we could have made 500 arrests that night. We just didn't have the manpower," he said.

"People were hawking trays of joints the way people sell newspapers."

The investigation was prompted by complaints from neighbors, said Capt. Larry Jones of the DeWitt Township Police Department. "We've been getting complaints all year long, ever since Buck Night started," he said. "Mostly they were concerned about the kind of crowd and the drugs. The crowd has gotten unruly and out of control, and people have been parking along Stoll Road and walking in."

The Northside's own security guards were uncooperative, Wrigglesworth added. "They do nothing to curtail it," he said of sales by drug dealers and beer vendors, who offer all you can drink to anyone willing to pay \$3 and have their hand stamped. "It's just gotten completely out of control this year. They're there drinking and buying drugs from (age) 13 on up."

Owners of the Northside could not be reached for comment, but a spokesman for WILS said the drive-in's security force, headed by former DeWitt Township Police Chief Bruce Angell, has been beefed up. Also, frequent warnings will be broadcast over the theatre's public address system, reminding patrons that underage drinking is illegal and warning them to "keep their fun restricted to their cars."

But while he didn't deny drugs may be sold during movies, WILS Sales Manager Terry Knust suggested some of Wrigglesworth's descriptions may be about as believable as the script of "E.T."

"I can't say for sure because I wasn't there, but that could also be a glamorization or exaggeration. I can't see how someone could be hawking drugs without

our security being aware of it. I'm not going to deny it, but I don't know if this has been blown out of proportion."

Knust admits his station's target audience is mainly in the 18 to 25 age group, but challenged any attempt to connect the type of hard rock music played on WILS-FM to the behavior of the crowd.

"We were assured by the management we would not have that many of the type of movies known as exploitative," he said, "and for the most part the caliber of movies has been pretty decent."

"I don't know how you could make that association. It's been brought up before in a number of articles, but I don't know how you can say rock music makes people behave in a certain manner."

Knust said problems at the Northside are caused by large crowds which line up for the sell-out Buck Nights, and word-of-mouth being spread among out-of-school teens.

"Once word-of-mouth passes that it's a happening, it generates huge crowds. You know how peer pressure is. We get

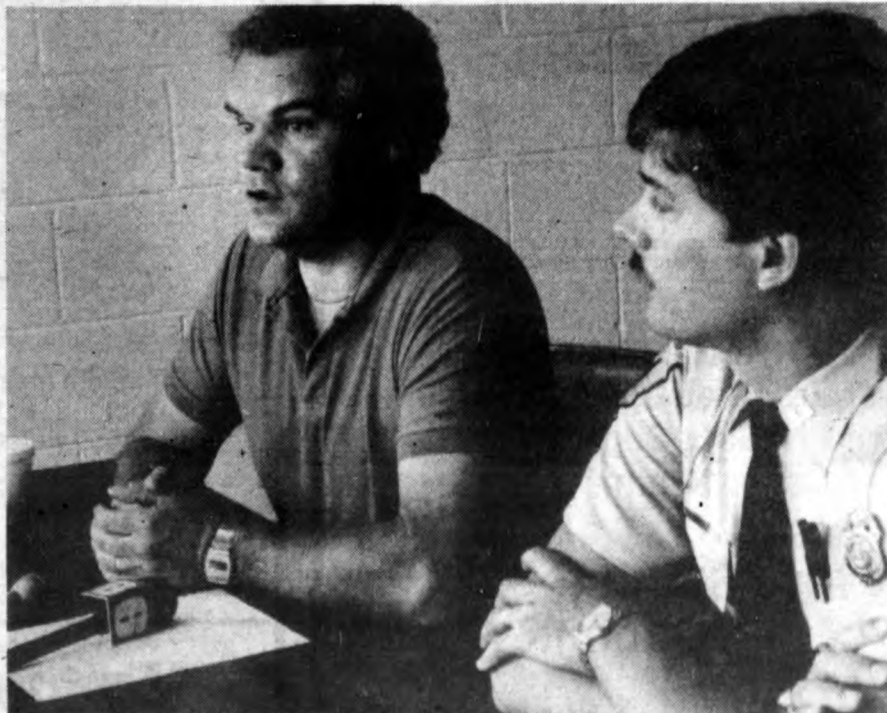
1,000 cars on a Wednesday night, and for every car there are two-point-something passengers, so you're talking more than 2,000 people."

Most Hollywood movies target young audiences, and drive-ins are a natural place for kids to hang out, he added.

News of the busts and the possibility of future arrests may already have thrown a wet blanket on the drive-in party, Knust said. "Thursday night (following the busts), the crowd was considerably less than we normally have on a Thursday night. We think with school starting back up again, (the problem) will take care of itself."

Will Buck Night, often advertised by WILS as "Lansing's biggest party," be staying alive long enough to spawn a sequel next summer? Though not exactly in the Twilight Zone, its future is less certain than release of "Rocky V" and return of "Return of the Jedi," Knust said.

"We definitely will be taking a look at it over the winter."

Teen fails to stop, killed in intersection

An accident at the intersection of Colony and Forrest Hill roads northwest of St. Johns Saturday, Aug. 27, left a Muir teen dead and a Middleton man in serious condition.

According to Clinton County Sheriff's reports, the accident occurred at 3:14 p.m., when Donald Scott Bennett, 17, of Borden Road, Muir, either failed to stop for a stop sign or failed to yield the right of way to Roger Eugene Brown, 38, of 203 Caroline St., Middleton.

Brown, headed north on Forrest Hill Road, struck Bennett's vehicle broad-

side in the intersection, killing Bennett, who was headed west on Colony Road.

Brown was listed in serious condition by Sparrow Hospital personnel, a spokesperson said. Bennett was pronounced dead on arrival at Sparrow, the report said.

Elsewhere in the county, law enforcement agencies handled several larcenies, an assault on a police officer and another personal injury accident.

Among the reports filed by area law enforcement agencies in the past week were:

- Julie Ludwick, 24, of St. Johns, was listed in good condition at Sparrow Hospital Tuesday, following a one-car accident at the intersection of Alward and DeWitt roads Saturday, Aug. 27, sheriff's reports said. Ms. Ludwick was cited for not being able to stop in an assured clear distance after running off the end of the road at the "T" intersection.

- DeWitt Township Police officer Andy Lindemann was treated by Sparrow Hospital personnel for muscle strains and a lost tooth-filling Tuesday morning, following a struggle with a Lansing man at 12:55 a.m. Tuesday morning.

Reports said Lindemann responded to a breaking and entering complaint at 112 Normandy, DeWitt Township, when he spotted a man near the front door of a house trailer. He asked the suspect, Robert Kosloski, 32, 102 W. Bennett, Lansing, to leave, and the two got into an argument.

When Sgt. Don Bey arrived to back up Lindemann, a struggle ensued and Kosloski struck Lindemann in the face three times before being subdued and taken to Clinton County Jail, where he was held on charges of assault and battery of a police officer.

The complaint had resulted from a domestic argument, a spokesman said, and no break-in charges were filed.

- Bath Township Police and firefighters were called to a large house fire Thursday, Aug. 25, when neighbors spotted smoke rolling from the home of Alice Smith on Clark Road. Although it was first thought children were in the home, the structure was empty and no injuries were reported. The fire was caused by a short in a

refrigerator, which overheated lint and dust buildup. Extensive smoke damage was reported, but no estimate of the loss was provided.

- A DeWitt teen was arrested on charges of hubcap theft by St. Johns Police, following an investigation of a theft reported by Edward Moore, 1377 Parks Road, St. Johns, Aug. 24.

Moore reported hubcaps stolen from his car, which was parked in the St. Johns Kroger parking lot. A warrant was obtained for the arrest of James Wilcox, 17, 4240 W. Pratt Road, DeWitt, reports said.

- A breaking and entering at the manager's office and community room of Dutch Hills Trialer Park in Bath Township resulted in theft of petty cash and vandalism to the building, Bath Township Police reported. The break-in was reported Thursday, Aug. 25, when workers discovered walls had been spray painted and a fire extinguisher was emptied into laundry machines. The investigation has been turned over to the Clinton County Detective Bureau.

- A large window at Bath High School was broken by vandals sometime prior to Monday, reports said. The loss was estimated at \$120.

- An \$80 "bug zapper" was stolen from the home of William Miller, Airport Road, DeWitt, reports of Aug. 26 said.

- Three suspects are being held by Eaton County Sheriff's officers on charges of breaking and entering the home of Clifford Barnes on Francis Road, Lansing. 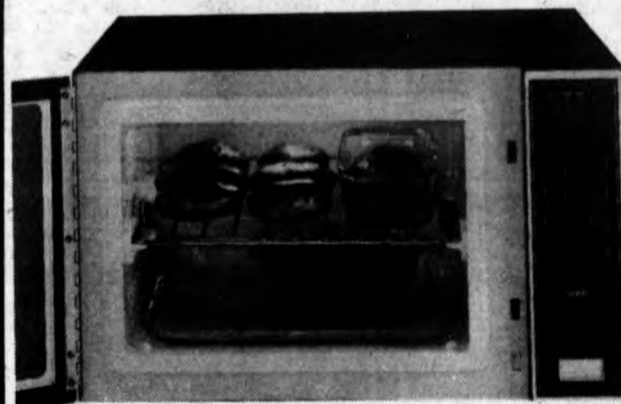

Red Cross needs green to continue

Staring at patterns in the cork ceiling as the plastic bag hanging from your recliner slowly fills with blood, you may wonder who will receive the red and white corpuscles pumping from the crook of your arm.

Will it be a young accident victim, struggling for life on some operating table, or something less melodramatic, perhaps a hapless hemophiliac in need of a transfusion?

And where does your blood, that fast-moving product manufactured in the marrow of your bones, go next? Who pays all those friendly nurses to jab people's arms and fill out forms. Who pays for the bloodmobiles, the cookies they give you after you've given blood, and the highly-polished American Red Cross Building, with its steady trickle of donors coming and going?

The answer, say organizers of the 1983 Capitol Area United Way Campaign, is you.

The Red Cross, located on Grand River Avenue in Lansing, is the major single recipient of United Way donations in the Lansing area. In addition to funding local programs such as Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts and agencies which provide food, medical care, counseling and research, United Way contributions are the major source of revenue for the Red Cross.

This year, the recommended allocation for the Red Cross is \$490,000 — more than a tenth of the total fund-raising goal for the entire Lansing area, which includes 50 United Way agencies providing everything from leader dogs to legal aid. And although most think of blood when they hear Red Cross, the agency uses United Way funds to provide many services.

Families trying to contact overseas servicemen can turn to the Red Cross for help, along with fire victims and those in need of special medical equipment for recuperation. First aid courses, home health care and nursing, hospital volunteers and blood pressure clinics are just a few more services provided by the Red Cross.

Perhaps the most costly, however, particularly during this year of floods, fires and other natural calamities, has been disaster relief.

Nearly \$38 million was spent on disaster relief by the Red Cross as of June, shorting the fund by almost \$3 million. The Mid-Michigan Chapter has been asked to contribute \$29,000 to the Disaster Relief Fund, to insure that future earthquake and hurricane victims can get food and shelter.

But if tornadoes in Oklahoma and storms in California seem too distant to prompt a donation, there is always plenty of demand for blood. And as holidays like Labor Day approach, Red Cross volunteers are busier than ever trying to lay in extra supplies in readiness for highway accident victims.

Donating blood is simple and takes less than an hour.

Blood mobiles make frequent local visits to make donations even easier.

But if needles are your nemesis and the mere thought of seeing that much of your own sap makes you sick, don't feel left out. Local United Way volunteers will be glad to take your donation in green instead of red.

Local drive has high '83 goals

Don't try telling Jim Robinson you gave at the office. If you haven't, he'll know.

As Clinton County chairman for the 1983 United Way Campaign, Robinson knows plenty about who has donated and who hasn't, and he's determined to see that those in the latter category join the former.

"I don't know how people could not participate when they've seen what's being done," he said. "The complaint is always 'I don't know where the money is going.' I guess we just need to communicate better so they see that there is good being done."

Although the local fund-raising drive doesn't kick off until Sept. 19, Robinson has already communicated the need for donations to his own employees at Sealed Power in St. Johns, and, through volunteer organizers, to employees at Federal Mogul, another St. Johns manufacturing plant. Robinson was pleased to report Friday that the two groups donated \$3,000 and \$5,000, respectively — enough to account for 15 percent of the county's goal.

Divided into seven groups, Clinton County campaign coordinators Brandon White, Sandra Bisson, Paul McNamara, Dale Abraham, Mick Boog, Dan Redman and Tom Rapson will meet with Robinson Sept. 8 to map out campaign strategy.

Last year, \$47,142 was raised in Clinton County, 93 percent of the goal; this year, Robinson says he's confident \$50,000 can be raised.

DeWitt bytes on computer class project

Enjoying one of the last quiet days before school resumed, DeWitt Superintendent Steve Garrett relaxed behind his desk in the Griswold Administration Building last week and reflected on changes facing returning students this year.

As in many area districts, computer classes are one of the major new offerings for DeWitt students this fall. "Our emphasis is on that this year," Garrett said.

To make computer classes available to all high school students, it was necessary to jockey staff members to create a full time computer instructor position, he said. Two new teachers have been hired, replacing one who resigned and providing enough extra staffing for the computer classes, Garrett said.

Elementary students will also benefit from the program, thanks to an in-service program for elementary teachers on the first day of school, he added.

Elsewhere, changes include the return of swimming instruction at the middle school, which was dropped for a year two years ago, and more evening recreation offerings for adults, Garrett said.

Adults interested in more than games will also find Lansing Community College course offerings at DeWitt Public Schools this year for the first time, Garrett said. Sign-up for classes in accounting, dance, career planning, personnel management, American government and composition will be held Sept. 19.

No millage renewals will be slated for the coming year, but two board slots currently held by Robert McConnell, president, and Dick Smeage, vice-president, will be up for grabs.

Garrett pointed out his own contract has not been renewed by the school board, meaning that unless the board changes its mind, Garrett will be leaving in June.

Garrett said the district is "fiscally sound," and gave its finances an "A" grade in comparison with similar districts. Teachers are in the second year of a two-year agreement, so there is no threat of a repeat of last year's teacher strike, he said.

Roof repairs are being completed to stop leaks in the district's six square acres of mostly flat roofs, Garrett said. "You don't really realize there are that many roofs until you get up there and start walking them."

Asked what changes will have the most impact on the community, Garrett highlighted curriculum improvements in science and plans to improve language arts. Then he returned to the subject of computers.

"Everyone has felt the need to jump on the bandwagon as far as computers are concerned, but we must work to make sure they don't become playthings or just electronic workbooks," he said.

Fresh paint greets students at Ovid-Elsie schools

A fresh coat of paint and some new faces greeted students as they returned to classes at Ovid-Elsie Public Schools Wednesday.

"One of our biggest changes was reinstatement of a principal at North Elementary School," said Superintendent David Porrell. "We hired Ellen Malek, who has been a reading teacher at North Elementary for about 16 years."

Also hired was Marty Mater, a new fourth grade teacher who has been working in the district as a substitute. Malek replaces a laid off teacher who turned

down a chance to be recalled, Porrell said.

A fresh coat of paint inside and out dressed up school buildings during the summer, and roof repairs were completed at E.E. Knight Elementary in Elsie, Porrell added.

Like other districts, Ovid-Elsie has gone "on line" with computer classes this year, and students throughout the district will be benefiting, the superintendent said.

"The biggest change is at the high school, where we've added six semester courses in computer concepts. So far, we've got 160 students in six sections."

The class is limited to junior and senior high school

students, but others are not. One is a new shared time vocational program in data processing offered by the Clinton Intermediate School District, Porrell said. The other is a six-week course in keyboarding, which will be required for eighth graders this year.

All of the district's 23 operating mills will be up for renewal this year, along with two school board terms currently held by Lou Terpstra, vice-president, and Jack Schwark.

In general, Porrell said, Ovid-Elsie's budget outlook is much healthier, thanks mainly to state aid increases.

"Our financial condition is much improved from a year ago. I'd say it's as good now as it was about five years ago."

Fowler adds elementary school counselor

Adults wishing to return to school will find it easier in Fowler this fall, thanks to local classes offered in cooperation with St. Johns Public Schools.

Fowler Superintendent Jim Andros says formation of an Adult Education Consortium with St. Johns is one of the biggest changes in his district this year, and one of the most important for the community.

"This way we'll be able to offer the courses in our own buildings," he said. Fowler will receive rental fees for building use, while St. Johns receives state aid reimbursement for each participant in the high school

graduation equivalent courses, he said. And students will not have to drive elsewhere for evening classes.

Other big changes in Fowler include new computer course offerings for high school students and the hiring of an elementary school counselor, Andros said.

All of the district's operating millage will be up for renewal in 1984, and two board seats, now held by George Martin and Patricia Snyder, will be up for election.

Teachers are in the second year of a two-year contract, so negotiations will be resuming soon, Andros said.

Safety record is no accident

Memories of kindergarten are fading faster than the bleached Levi's we wore in high school, but one lesson remains: "Stop, Look and Listen."

Although different approaches may be used to instill the need for caution while crossing today's streets, local schools still exhibit plenty of concern when it comes to pedestrian safety.

Who can forget the awesome authority of a white Safety Patrol belt? How about the friendly adults who guided kids across major intersections with a smile?

Thanks to local schools and police departments, these and other safety programs stress the importance of traffic safety at an early age. Parents, too, play an important role, of course.

All deserve a great deal of credit in St. Johns, where 22 years have passed since the last pedestrian fatality.

The American Automobile Association has presented St. Johns with an award, honoring the last 10 years of pedestrian safety. Although 10 people have been injured by autos while walking in St. Johns during the last four years, a pedestrian has not been killed in the city since 1961. One year of records

is missing, or St. Johns would have easily broken the state record of 18 years without a pedestrian death.

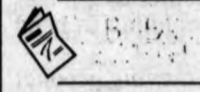
Regardless of recognition, however, St. Johns should be proud of its achievement. The average pedestrian death rate for cities of similar size is two per year, according to Auto Association officials.

Fulton talks are at a standstill

Fulton teacher contract negotiations are at a standstill, according to a spokesperson for the Fulton Education Association.

The Fulton teacher contract expired Aug. 31, but state mediation was expected to resolve the dispute and teachers had not voted to strike, Ms. Gray said.

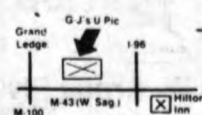

New English teacher spells basketball

Board okays teacher pact, hires two

"You'd better believe it," negotiator Mike Gehoski said when asked if he was glad St. Johns teacher contract negotiations had finally been settled.

"Now let's get going with some education for a couple of years."

Final ratification was approved unanimously by the school board Wednesday night, Aug. 24, ending almost two years of negotiations. The contract will provide teachers with 12.5 percent in pay hikes over three years, in increments of one percent for last year, when teachers worked without a contract; 5.5 percent

for the current school year; and six percent for the 1894-85 school year.

Superintendent Earl Gabriel said he was "very pleased" the bargaining had finally ended, but added he is ready to begin working on the next teacher contract.

According to Gabriel and Gehoski, who represented 152 teachers as chief negotiator for the St. Johns Education Association, the major non-salary item in the contract is an early retirement incentive clause.

Any teacher whose retirement would allow return of a laid off teacher or replacement by an entry-level teacher is entitled to a lump sum payment of \$5,000, Gabriel said.

Such an incentive would save the district \$10,000 in the first year if an entry-level teacher is hired to replace a teacher who is at the top of the salary scale, and about \$7,000 the first year to bring back a laid off teacher, he explained.

"We would be sharing half of our savings with the (retiring) teacher," he said, "but that's only the first year. Savings would increase after that."

Gehoski called the incentive a "pretty good sized item" in bargaining. "It's

something teachers have been looking for for about two or three years," he said.

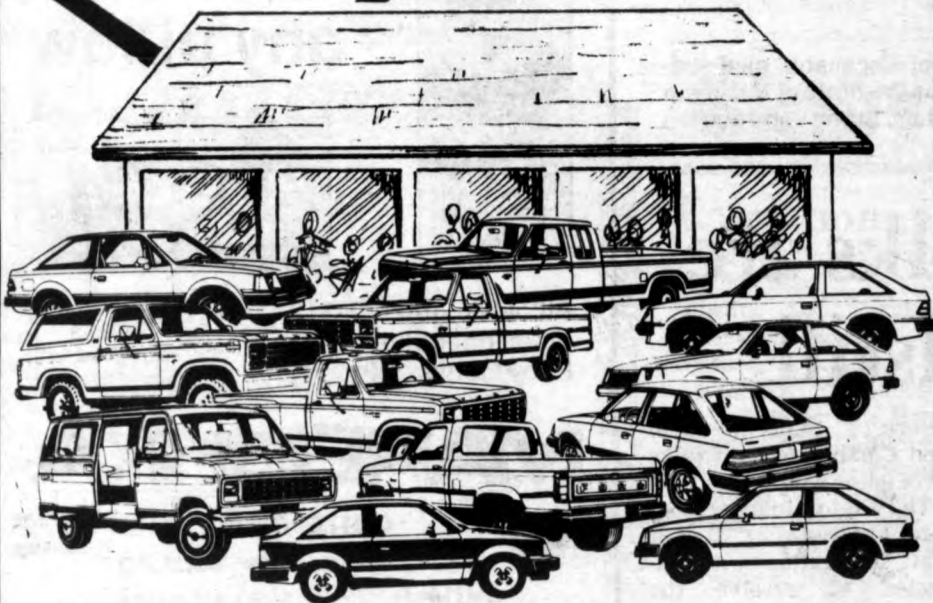
Other contract changes cited by both Gabriel and Gehoski centered on definitions of qualifications for teaching positions. Future lay offs are most likely to be made among the elementary teaching staffs, due to declining enrollments, Gehoski explained. The new contract language defines who would be eligible for transfer to teaching jobs at the junior high, and how to qualify for such jobs.

During their special board meeting, board members also approved the hiring of two staff members. Gerald Ernst, several times winner of "coach of the year" honors in various state-wide high school basketball polls, was hired as an English teacher and future hoop coach; and Susan Schwartz, a Fowlerville teacher for 12 years, was hired as a full time librarian for the junior high.

Also approved was an increase in daily pay for substitute teachers, from \$38 to \$45; a move that makes St. Johns "more competitive" with neighboring districts, Gabriel said.

Still to be worked out are contracts with custodians, bus drivers, secretaries, teacher aides and cafeteria workers.

Drought cuts county yields

Farmers in Clinton County aren't telling horror stories like their compatriots in the rain-starved Corn Belt. But they do predict a below-average year for crops.

In an informal survey of county farmers, all predicted an off-year for yields. However, many were looking forward to high prices as a result of the nationwide drought conditions.

One St. Johns area farmer, David Motz, was counting his blessings after a recent trip to Indiana, Illinois, Iowa and Nebraska. On one stop, he spoke with a farmer who told about 90-100 degree weather and no rain for 30 consecutive days this summer.

"They weren't smiling," said Motz, who farms about 1,200 acres with his father, Francis, near French Road. "That was pretty bad. They figure it's the worst drought since 1936 in the Corn Belt."

As a result of the nationwide drought and the planting encouraged by the Payment in Kind (PIK) program, county farmers said Michigan might have the highest per-acre corn yield in the nation this summer.

"We've had a touch better weather than other places," said Thomas Irrer, who farms about 1,000 acres midway between St. Johns and Westphalia. "We've had hot, but not hot enough to hurt pollination."

Roughly 48,000 Clinton County acres normally planted in wheat and corn were taken out of production this year and set aside under the U.S. Agriculture Department's PIK program.

Farmers setting aside the land collect government surpluses for the same amount of corn or wheat they would have raised on each acre.

Considering the summer drought conditions and late planting schedule caused by heavy spring rains, many farmers have been thankful for PIK.

"We should have done more," said Motz, referring to the 250 acres he and his father decided to set aside. "We could have gone to the lake. It's a good thing we had that PIK program, or we'd be pretty bad off."

"It's a good year to do it because of the dry weather, and the spring was so late," said Paul Felzke, who set aside 500 of his 2,500 acres in the DeWitt area.

Irrer is also pleased with PIK, primarily because he figures his yields will be down 15 percent from last year.

"I'm happy," he said. "It's kind of a Band-Aid to get us through another year, and that's kind of what we need."

Farmers enrolled in PIK have been setting aside poorer land and planting corn and wheat in good soil, producing higher per-acre yields, according to some farmers.

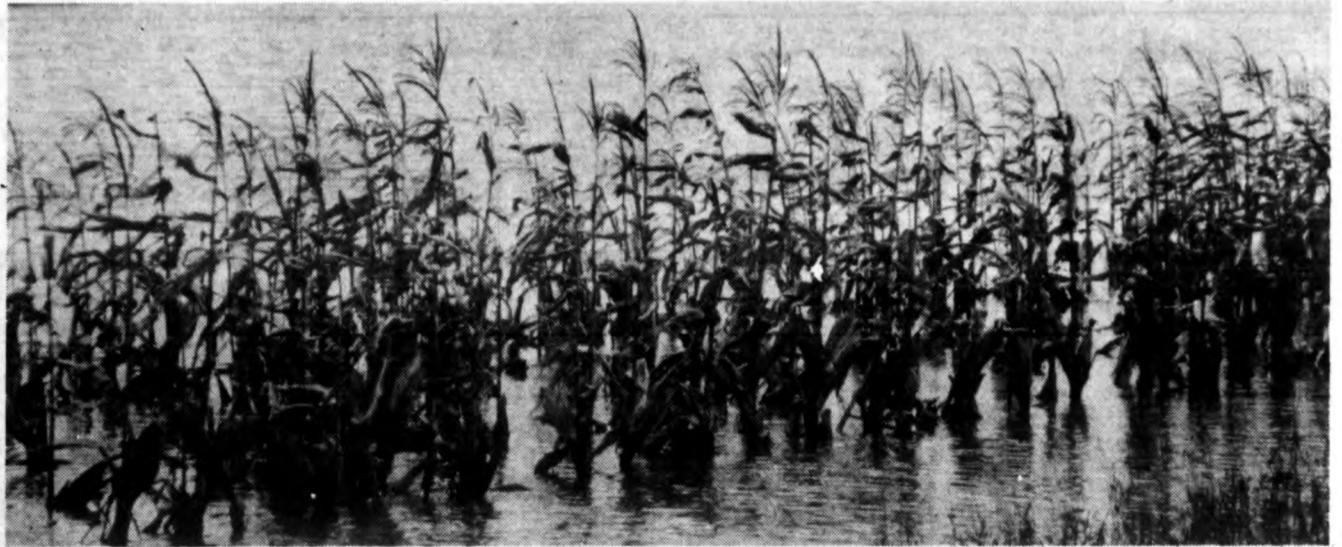
"Plant the best and give Uncle Sam the rest," said Robert Zeeb of DeWitt Township, who set aside 386 of his over 900 acres.

Participation in PIK has also given farmers like Irrer more chances to catch up on jobs they've put on the back burner for years.

"We spent more time fixing up and cleaning up than we usually do," Irrer said. "We ran a land leveler, and we haven't done that in three or four years."

While county farmers hope high prices will offset below-average yields, they fear the possibility of a September frost. If that occurs, farmers say it could escalate the economic hardship they've already endured this year.

"It would be pretty devastating," said Peter Kurncz, Sr., who farms 2,000 acres between St. Johns and Elsie. "I would say it would do another 25 percent's worth of damage to us."




Farmers struggling throughout the Midwest to raise corn without the cooperation of Mother Nature would probably be glad to trade some of their dry, dusty soil for a little of the rain which left local farm fields under water just a few years ago.

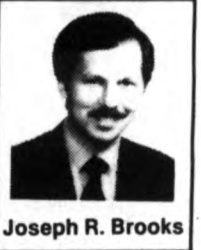

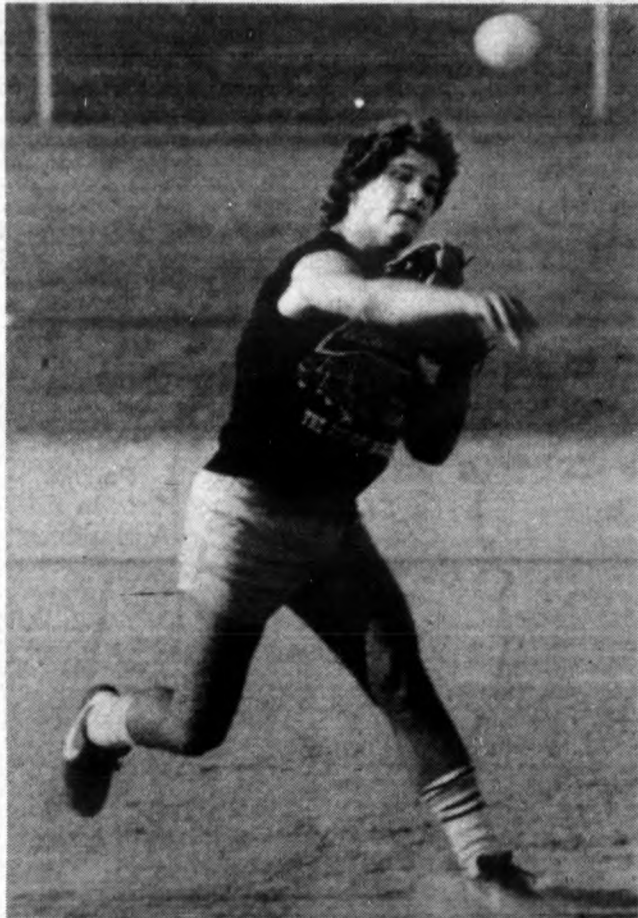

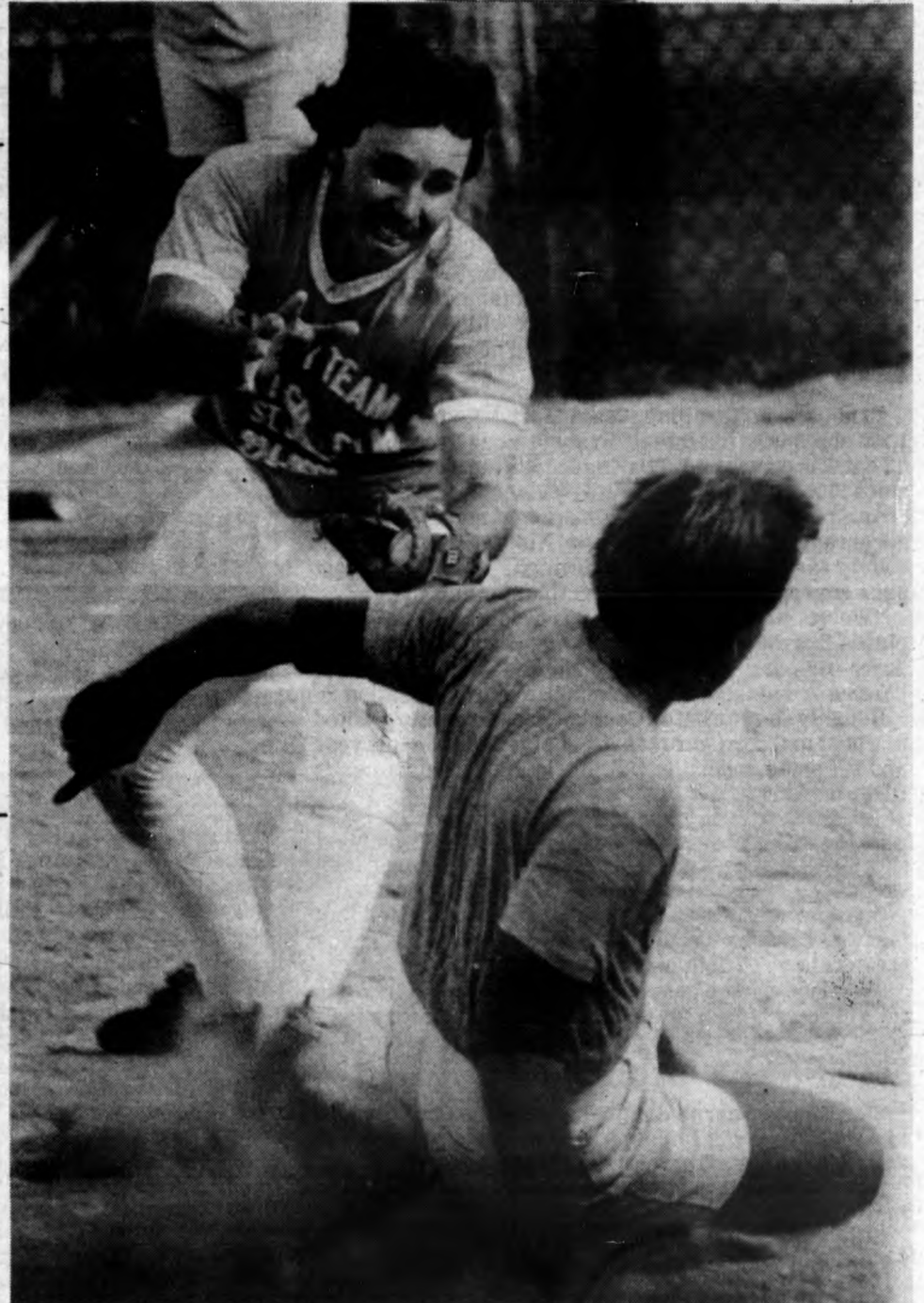

Up until last Wednesday, Jerry Ernst had been leaning toward accepting the Ann Arbor Pioneer basketball coaching job.

But that's when the St. Johns board of education made the two-time Michigan Class C Coach of the Year an offer he couldn't refuse. They hired him as a high school English teacher and offered him the head coaching position vacated by Al Werbish's resignation.

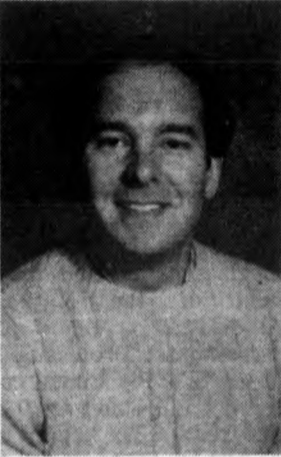
Ernst pondered the offer and decided on the smaller, rural school because he said there would be less pressure and better educational opportunities for his children.

Ernst, an Alma College graduate, did not grow up near St. Johns but heard about the Redwing coaching vacancy through his mother, Mrs. Steve Leslie, who lives on Hyde Road.

After interviewing with both St. Johns and Ann Arbor Pioneer school officials, he came away more impressed with St. Johns. "I was more on a personal level," he said.

The 34-year-old coach built a reputation for excellence during a six-year tenure at Reed City. His overall record was 113-28, including regional championships in 1979 and 1980 and the state Class C crown with a 28-0 team in 1980. His Coach of the Year awards came after those seasons.

He left Reed City that year for a varsity job in Sandusky, Ohio, only to lose that coaching job because he was pink-slipped as a teacher.

From there, he moved to Boyne City, where he accepted the boys and girls coaching jobs in 1982. He worked on a summer basketball program there before jumping to Deckerville in August when that school offered him both teaching and coaching jobs.

Ernst is candid about his desire to leave St. Johns for a better job. He said he hopes to coach at a small college one day.

"I'm looking at it that way, but I told them (St. Johns officials) at least three years so my son can graduate," he said.

(Ernst's son, Stephen, is a 15-year-old sophomore.

Redwing basketball fans can expect to see fast breaks and pressure defense this year. Ernst's coaching philosophy is to hike the tempo and shuttle fresh players in and out.

To help his players gain confidence, he also said he hopes to schedule inner-city Detroit schools for summer scrimmages next year.

"Some of the kids in the staging area asked him if his bike had been in a fire," Tom Soule recalled. "We just put a couple of decals on it."

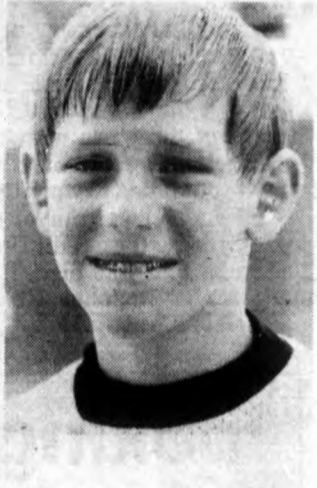
Andrew not only entered the competition. He won.

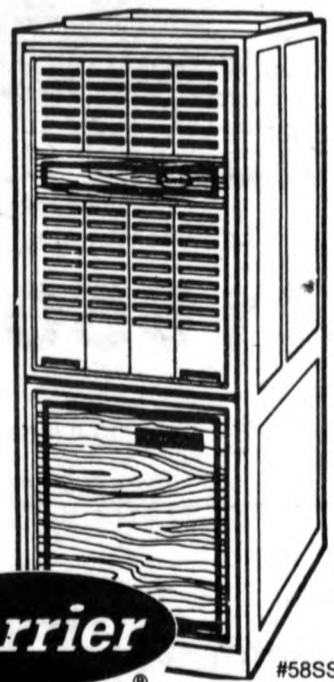

Credit Union trial resumes, but not here

A lawsuit charging the St. Johns Michigan Federal Credit Union and former manager Roy Ebert with sexual harassment will be back in court again soon, but not in St. Johns.

Hearings will resume at 11 a.m. Tuesday, Sept. 20 in Big Rapids, when Mecosta County Circuit Judge Lawrence Root will consider a request to move the trial out of St. Johns permanently.

The request for a change of venue has been filed by Edith Harsh, who represents Credit Union employee Sherri Jopke and four former employees, Christine Brawner, Tammie Witt, LuAnn Feldpausch and Yvonne Makara.

They have charged Ebert with several counts of verbal and physical sexual harassment, including unconsented touching and repeated demands for sexual favors. They also have charged the Credit Union's board of directors with responsibility for Ebert's actions, claiming the board was notified of the alleged problems but failed to warn or remove Ebert.

Ebert, who was mayor of St. Johns from 1974 to 1977, was fired by the Credit Union board June 21, just weeks after the suit was filed. Replying through attorney Bill Jackson, of St. Johns, Ebert has denied any wrongdoing and all of the charges.

The Credit Union board also has denied responsibility, insisting Ebert was aware of anti-discrimination and harassment policies, and saying Ebert treated all employees, male and female, the same.

Mrs. Harsh insists the trial must be moved. She says Ebert's election as mayor and the fact that most of the 7,000 members of the Credit Union are county residents make selection of an impartial jury in Clinton County impossible.

Both of Clinton County's circuit judges disqualified themselves: Judge Tim Green because his court reporter was related to a Credit Union Board member; Judge Randy Tahvonen because he holds an account in the Credit Union.

The five women first filed complaints with state and federal departments of labor last January. Labor department records say the board was notified of the complaints within 10 days.

The five women are seeing damages of at least \$200,000 each.

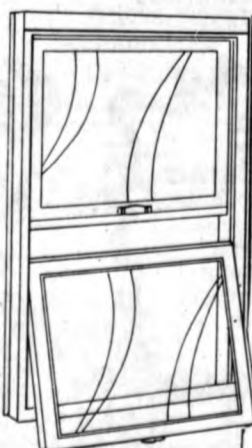

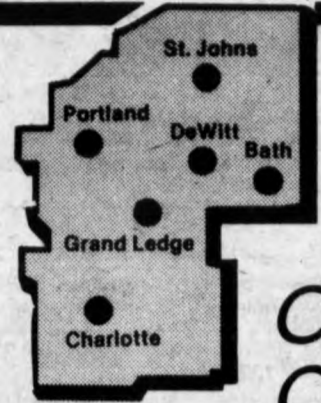

St. Johns youths wheel and deal hubcaps

Even though their business, C & B Hubcap Sales, is based in two stores around St. Johns, people seldom respect Chris Connelly and Bob Sabo as businessmen.

Instead, many people call them thieves. That's what happens when you are 16 years old and your business is selling hubcaps.

Bad reports about Connelly and Sabo stirred suspicions in the St. Johns Police Department a couple of years ago, and officers responded by confiscating their hubcaps.

"We hauled them in, but we couldn't find any that were stolen," Police Chief Lyle French said.

Students at St. Johns High School still accuse the young businessmen of thievery. No one produces proof, however, and the young businessmen simply go about their business.

"We know we don't steal them, and what other people think we just brush it off," said Connelly, who said the business stocks 2,500-3,000 hubcaps.

Sabo and Connelly, who have known each other since first grade, started seriously collecting hubcaps in sixth grade. From a base of 125 hubcaps, they gradually built up a supply and sold the ones they could spare.

The businessmen said they started to develop an eye for hubcaps to the degree that they could find stray ones wherever they went.

"We always used to go out on long bike rides around the country and look for caps," said Sabo.

"Everywhere you can go you can find caps," Connelly said.

Hot spots for finding hubcaps in St. Johns are along US-27 at Swegles Street, the bridge over the railroad tracks and the curve by Travers Street, they said.

Once they got a reputation as hubcap collectors, people started bringing hubcaps to them. Their inventory expanded so much that they had to rent office space to display the hubcaps.

Now, after four years in business as equal partners, they operate out of offices at 101 W. Higham Street and 1002 E. State St.

Because of their devotion to business, Connelly and Sabo work more hours than most high school students. During the summer, Sabo works six days for 56 hours and Connelly works seven days for 48 hours. Forty-two hours of work for seven days is typical during the school year.

"I put my business before anything," said Sabo. "To me, it's not that important if I'm going with a girl right now. If I was going with a girl, she'd have to understand that I don't have much time."

To illustrate his point, Sabo stated his five goals in life: 1) Own a Cadillac Seville. 2) Become a millionaire. 3) Get a good education. 4) Make wise investments. 5)

Expand the business.

"Whenever I get down in the dumps, that's what keeps me motivated," he said.

Connelly's goals are not so specific, but he shares Sabo's devotion to business.

"I just want to live a comfortable life," he said. "I also want a Mercedes."

Customers buy hubcaps from the St. Johns teenagers by entering the store and dickering for a price. Sabo and Connelly use a guide for base figures and quote prices which they feel are fair.

"We sell quite a few to people from out of state," Connelly said. "I get mostly out-of-state people. It's just an impulse item. When you see it, you stop."

If and when they dissolve the partnership, they have an agreement to split the hubcap inventory and profits right down the middle. A split is definitely possible, since Chris entertains dreams of moving to Arizona while Bob relishes the traditional atmosphere of St. Johns.

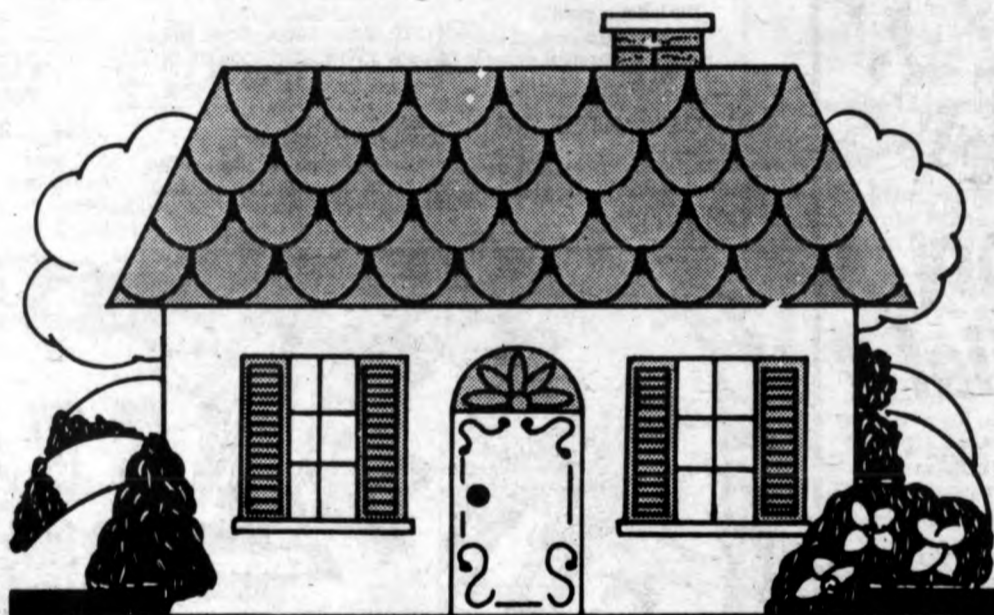
Though the entrepreneurs say they won't be able to finance college solely on their business profits, they do believe they are better off than the typical high school student who works at a fast-food restaurant.

"We make enough to make ourselves happy," said Connelly.
