Watertown ready for growth spurt

Portions of Watertown Township near the new I-69 Freeway will be ready for development soon, thanks to approval of federal funds for sewer construction.

Don Lowell, director of the Clinton County Economic Development Corporation, said 70 percent of the cost of new sewers near the interchange will be funded by the Economic Development Authority Jobs Act, a U.S. Department of Commerce project.

The total cost of the project will be about \$575,000, with roughly \$402,500 coming from the federal grant, Lowell said. The rest will be provided by township funds and a special assessment on property owners in the sewer construction district, he said.

Approved Aug. 29, the grant will fund sewer construction along Grand River Avenue from Airport Road to just east of Lowell Road, and will include funding for a pump station to run the sewers west of Lowell Road. The sewers will extend west to just east of the interchange, Lowell said, about one-half mile altogether.

Included is construction of 4,500 feet of forced main sewer and 4,000 feet of gravity main sewer, Lowell said. Only the

gravity main sewer can be tapped into, he said.

The sewer will serve the Mid-Michigan Ball Land project, an athletic/entertainment/restaurant complex being developed by Delta Township architect Bud Mills.

Also benefiting from the new sewers will be promised developments on about 60 acres of land zoned for light industry, owned by McClean Construction Co. of Ludington, a contractor which purchased local land while working on the highway, Lowell said. He said the land could be used for industrial development, or could also be rezoned for use as multi-family housing or a subdivision.

"We are anticipating some development there, although we have no firm information yet," he said. Lowell also predicted development of fast food franchises and other highway support businesses normally found near highway interchanges.

"We expect more to come along before the highway opens a year from this fall."

In addition to improving the township's tax base, the new developments will provide jobs, Lowell said. "They've promised 67 full time jobs at the Ball Land project, plus between 420 and 425 part time jobs," he said.

Bath gets surprised

Bath Public Schools received some cheery news from an auditor last week but Superintendent Ken Dyer cautioned district parents about excess optimism.

The auditing firm of Weinlander, Fitzhugh, Bertuliet & Shairer said Bath wound up with a \$55,000 surplus for the 1982-1983 school year. That hiked the district's fund equity from \$287,000 to \$342,000 and means that the superintendent won't be recommending any budget cuts.

But even with the increase, Bath's fund equity is only 12½ percent of the total budget. The auditor recommended a 15-25 percent fund equity.

"It (the surplus) is a positive thing, but like the auditor says, we're still not where we should be," Dyer said.

Declining enrollment is costing Bath state aid, Dyer said. The bulk of the \$55,000 will go toward balancing the budget since he anticipates more student losses than the 38 that were projected for budget figuring.

"We'll probably lose as high as 50 students," Dyer said. "I wouldn't be surprised if we lost that many by the fourth Friday."

Dyer said the latest count had Bath dropping 37 students — from 1,094 in 1982 to 1,057 this year.

The superintendent said the surplus came about because of a number of factors. Those included a \$16,000 increase in state aid, a \$7,000 hike in federal aid, \$5,000 more in interest income and assorted savings in utilities, supply accounts and instructional expenses.

In other action, board members reinstated middle school basketball for

boys and girls at a cost of \$6,000. Dyer said the district would pay \$2,000 and the Bath Athletic Boosters \$4,000 to finance the 12-game seasons.

Board members approved purchase of a four-wheel drive truck for \$11,993, Dyer said. The truck will be used for maintenance.

In another purchasing move, board members authorized \$75,559 to buy three school buses. The buses will replace three 1975 buses and save the district almost \$3,000 per bus, Dyer said.

Another \$3,460 was approved to upgrade word processing and computer equipment, Dyer said.

City getting ready for M-21 repaving

Final payments to contractors for repaving projects in St. Johns were approved during a city commission meeting Monday night.

Completed are water main and valve replacements along M-21 at Spring, Oakland, Prospect, Lansing and Maple streets, Clerk Rick Colletta said. Still to be completed are similar improvements at US-27 and Baker Street, he said.

The work is being done in preparation for a state-funded repaving project along M-21, which will resurface nearly two miles between Morton and Scott streets, Colletta said.

The cost of the state project was estimated at about \$500,000, the clerk said.

Also at Monday's meeting, commissioners approved an update of the city's

master plan for development. Revised each decade, the new plan is intended to remain in effect through the 1980s, Colletta said. "It basically just reiterates what growth should go where," he said. "There are no major changes. It's pretty much the same as it was."

Commissioners denied a request from the local Cemetery Association for funds to repair the city mausoleum. Funding a private organization with tax dollars could have been challenged in court, City Attorney Paul Maples advised commissioners.

Election inspectors were appointed for the city's November City Commission election, and the commissioners approved a resolution endorsing the county's solid waste plan.

Two injured in crashes had been drinking

A Lansing man was arrested for indecent exposure and a St. Johns resident was jailed on charges of drunk driving last week.

A total of 103 complaints resulted in 28 arrests by county law enforcement agencies during the week ending Sept. 11, sheriff's reports said. Among those and more recent complaints reported as late as Tuesday were:

- Robert Wray of Lansing was arrested by sheriff's deputies Sept. 10 after allegedly exposing himself on US-27 near St. Johns. Following a complaint, the vehicle in which Wray was riding was located in Olive Township and Wray again exposed himself in the presence of several officers and witnesses, reports said.

- Jerry Potter, 34, of 7749 N. Welling, St. Johns, was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol by DeWitt Township Police following a head-on collision near 11:05 p.m. Sept. 10.

Reports said Potter was headed south in the north-bound lanes of US-27 near the Clark Road intersection when he struck a vehicle driven by Catherine Howard, 20, of West Bloomfield. Both vehicles swerved at the same time, in the same direction, and collided head-on, reports said.

Potter refused treatment for injuries. Ms. Howard

and two passengers in her auto, Jill Bruce, 19, and Jocelyn Rasalan, 20, both of Saginaw, sought their own treatment for minor injuries. The relatively minor injuries were credited to seatbelt use by all involved.

- A Pewamo man was injured when he lost control of his auto while headed north on Wright Road, one-half mile north of Walker Road, near 2 a.m. Monday, Sept. 12.

Sheriff's reports said Kenneth Walter Steen, 39, of Rt. 4, Colony Road, Pewamo, had been drinking when the accident occurred. He was cited for careless driving. Steen was transported to Sparrow Hospital, where he was reported in fair condition Tuesday.

- Jeffrey Scott Brown, 18, of 8902 Herbison Road was listed in fair condition at St. Lawrence Hospital Tuesday, following an accident Saturday night, Sept. 10.

Clinton County Sheriff's reports said Brown was lost control of his car on Grange Road near Herbison and ran off the road, causing the vehicle to flip end over end. Brown had been drinking and was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol, reports said.

- An armed robbery was reported to Bath Township Police near 10:07 p.m. Sept. 6 by Adolph Olsen of Outer Drive, Bath. Reports said Olsen was watching TV in his home when a man came to the door, pulled a gun, entered the home, robbed Olsen and fled on foot. Police would not reveal what Olsen lost in the robbery, and the incident is being investigated by the Clinton County Detective Bureau.

- A large amount of cash was taken from a safe at the Elsie Oil Co. Phillips 66 gas station, 901 N. US-27, sometime Saturday night, Sept. 10, St. Johns Police reported. The break-in was reported the following day and there were no signs of forced entry, reports said.

- Parr's Pharmacy, 201 N. Clinton, was the scene of a breaking and entering sometime Sunday night, Sept. 11, St. Johns Police reported. Taken was a small amount of drugs. Entry was gained through a back window.

Fowler's football team will honor the memory of Jim Farley Friday night, when their game against Vestaburg will be dedicated to the outstanding athlete and honor student.

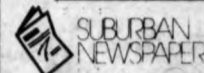
How appropriate that the community also has remembered the accident victim still struggling to return to normal.

Memory Lane...

We all take all these kinds of things for granted, don't we? This item from 1924 tells the following:

Iodized salt will soon be placed on retail market here

CLINTON COUNTY REPUBLICAN NEWS, MAY 8, 1924 — In the issue of May 1, 1924, the Republican-News carried a story concerning the use of iodized salt a preventative for goiter. The introduction of this new product is claimed to be one of the most important events in Michigan's health history, due to the extraordinary prevalence of goiter in this state.

Here's another first for Clinton County, also from the files of The Republican News of 1924.

Orval Harris to fly first plane purchased here

CLINTON COUNTY REPUBLICAN NEWS, MAY 8, 1924 — Within a few days, "ethereal blue" above St. Johns and vicinity will resound to the throb of an aeroplane motor, the first to be owned by a local citizen. The machine, an army type biplane, driven by a 90 horsepower Curtis O.S. 5 motor, has been purchased by Orval Harris, an employee of the St. Johns Gas and Oil Company, and will be delivered here about May 15.

For sometime past, Harris has been an aviation student under the direction of Ross Becker, Saginaw aviator, from whom he purchased the plane. He says that he is not thoroughly adept at flying and is anxiously awaiting the arrival of his machine, which was part of the U.S. Army surplus war material.

Harris intends to provide a hangar for his aeroplane by remodeling a building on his south Lansing Street property, and hopes to get possession of a piece of land nearby for a flying field.

The lodge was first chartered in 1868, according to current Worshipful Master Keith Harter of St. Johns. Membership flourished at one time, Harter said, but has dwindled. With 22 members, it now ranks as

the smallest in Michigan.

The lodge formerly met in the Masonic Association building on Washington Street. Purchase of the church building, which has been closed for 2½ years, gave the lodge more capacity and added conveniences, Harter said.

Members have been meeting in the new lodge since July.

Society meeting

The Clinton County Historical Society opens its 10th season by taking part in the DeWitt Sesquicentennial Celebration.

The first meeting of the new year for the society will be held Sept. 15, at 7:30 p.m., at the DeWitt Library meeting room, reports said. A program about DeWitt will be presented by the 150th anniversary committee, covering topics such as the old settlement at New Albany. Those who want to participate in a walking tour of the original sites of DeWitt and New Albany are asked to bring their walking shoes. There will be a social hour following the meeting.

In October the Society will participate in the dedication of a marker honoring the wife of Captain David Scott, founder of the settlement of DeWitt. In marking the gravesite of Mrs. Scott, the Society follows the tradition set 50 years ago when the gravesite of Captain Scott was marked by the Pioneer Society, the direct ancestor of the Historical Society.

The marker also honors all pioneer women who sought to bring new life to the wilderness.

Reports said the Historical Society takes great pride in opening its 10th year by honoring the 150th birthday of DeWitt, the first settlement in the county.

Fowler unites to throw social benefit

When Kathy Geller heard about the social benefit that 12 organizations and 32 businesses in Fowler were going to hold for her, she nearly climbed out of her hospital bed.

"She was really happy and she started asking whether she should come," said Barb Thelen, Kathy's sister.

But doctors have advised the 21-year-old Fowler woman to remain at Lansing Sparrow Hospital while the benefit is going on this Sunday. After what she's been through this summer, they are afraid the festivities could overwhelm her.

On June 11, Miss Geller was involved in a two-car collision in Dallas Township that claimed the life of Fowler scholar-athlete Jim Farley. Miss Geller, a passenger in the other car, was transported to Lansing Sparrow hospital and listed in critical condition.

Mrs. Thelen said her sister spent nine weeks in a coma. When she came out of it, Miss Geller had to

relearn such things as walking, eating, talking and caring for herself.

Throughout the ordeal, the doctors were careful not to give Mrs. Thelen, her six sisters or three brothers any false hopes about Miss Geller's recovery.

"It's kind of like wait and see," Mrs. Thelen said. "She did have a head injury, and they can't promise anything. The last two weeks she has made considerable progress."

Mrs. Thelen said her sister's progress has been such that she may be able to leave the hospital for a couple of hours this week. Though Sparrow still lists her in serious condition, doctors said she might be able to move out of the hospital and back with her family in a month.

Sunday's social benefit is described by organizers as a "community effort." A group of friends in the Westphalia area has joined forces with Fowler natives to sponsor the event, which runs from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. at Fowler Conservation Club.

Activities include a band for dancing, clowns,

children's games, horse and wagon rides and door prizes. A luncheon will also be provided.

Tickets are \$5 per person or \$10 per family, with all of the proceeds going to Miss Geller's medical expenses.

A 50-50 raffle drawing will be held at the benefit, as well as a raffle for a queen-sized quilt.

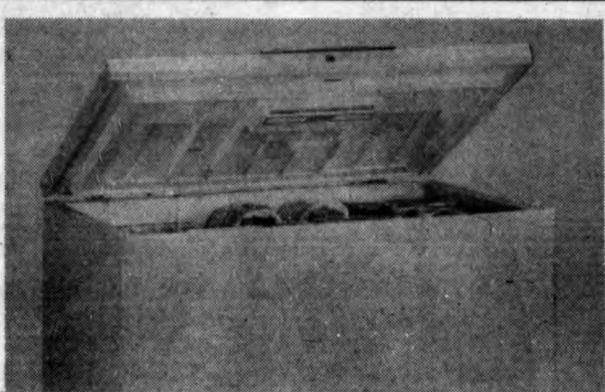

What's new? O-E comes out throwing

When Ovid-Elsie lost school record-holding quarterback Pete Hurst to graduation last year, area coaches might have figured that the Marauders had also lost their passing attack.

Schneider's tosses of 51, 10, 1 and 21 yards delighted O-E coach Russ Pope.

"I told everyone I was going to go to a ground-control offense," Pope said. "I guess you can't teach an old dog new tricks. He (the Portland coach) tried to overpower me by putting eight men on the line of scrimmage."

Pope, who told the team he was starting Schneider in the first half and senior Thad Ridsdale in the second half, went with a short passing game that netted 133 yards (nine completions in 15 attempts).

Schneider found Robert Skaryd on the two long touchdown passes. He also hit Jon Martin and Marcel Hirschegger for scores.

O-E rolled up 351 yards worth of total offense and limited Portland to 29. The Red Raiders, thanks largely to the efforts of O-E's Brian Kelly and Kevin Van Atta, had a negative 28 yards rushing.

Mike O'Dell ran 17 yards for a touchdown and led O-E

rushers with 76 yards.

The Marauders, stalking their first winning season in four years, travel to Bridgeport this week as a decided underdog. The Class A team whipped O-E, 32-6, last year and won the rest of its games.

"They have over 1,400 students in their high school and we have only beaten them once since I have been head coach," Pope said. "We will have to play a super game to beat them."

Owosso, using a no-huddle, one-back offense, broke to a 9-0 lead at halftime.

A field goal was set up by 30 yards of penalties for pass interference and unsportsmanlike conduct. The Trojans' touchdown was set up by a 37-yard punt return which Gonzales said should have been called back because of a clipping penalty.

After Bates pitched the ball over Chad Munger's head on an option play in the fourth quarter, Owosso punched in an insurance touchdown.

Gonzales refused to make excuses about the loss, but pointed to two first-half opportunities when St. Johns had the ball inside Owosso's 20.

"Our offensive line did not block for us," he said. "I thought we'd be in negative yardage. We weren't — we got 78 yards, which is not good."

On defense, senior middle linebacker Dave Clouse had a successful varsity debut. He recorded seven tackles.

However, St. Johns missed senior quarterback-monster back Mike Green, sidelined after being speared in the back in a pre-season scrimmage. Green's injury could keep him out for the entire season, Gonzales said.

"Now he's getting so he can walk, but he's still very tentative," Gonzales said.

Friday's opponent, Lansing Waverly, is coming off a 7-0 loss to Howell but will pose a stiff test for St. Johns. The Warriors are defending Capital Area Conference champions and feature 6-foot-1, 209-pound tailback David Carter.

Waverly also uses a 5-3 defensive scheme which is undoubtedly tuned to St. John's weaknesses.

"They show a lot of stunting, but we'll do a better job this week on that," Gonzales said.

St. Johns senior captain John Archambault, a monster back on defense, is expected to return this week from an injury.

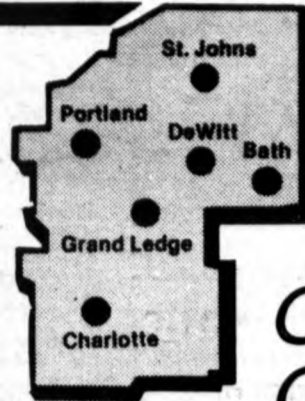

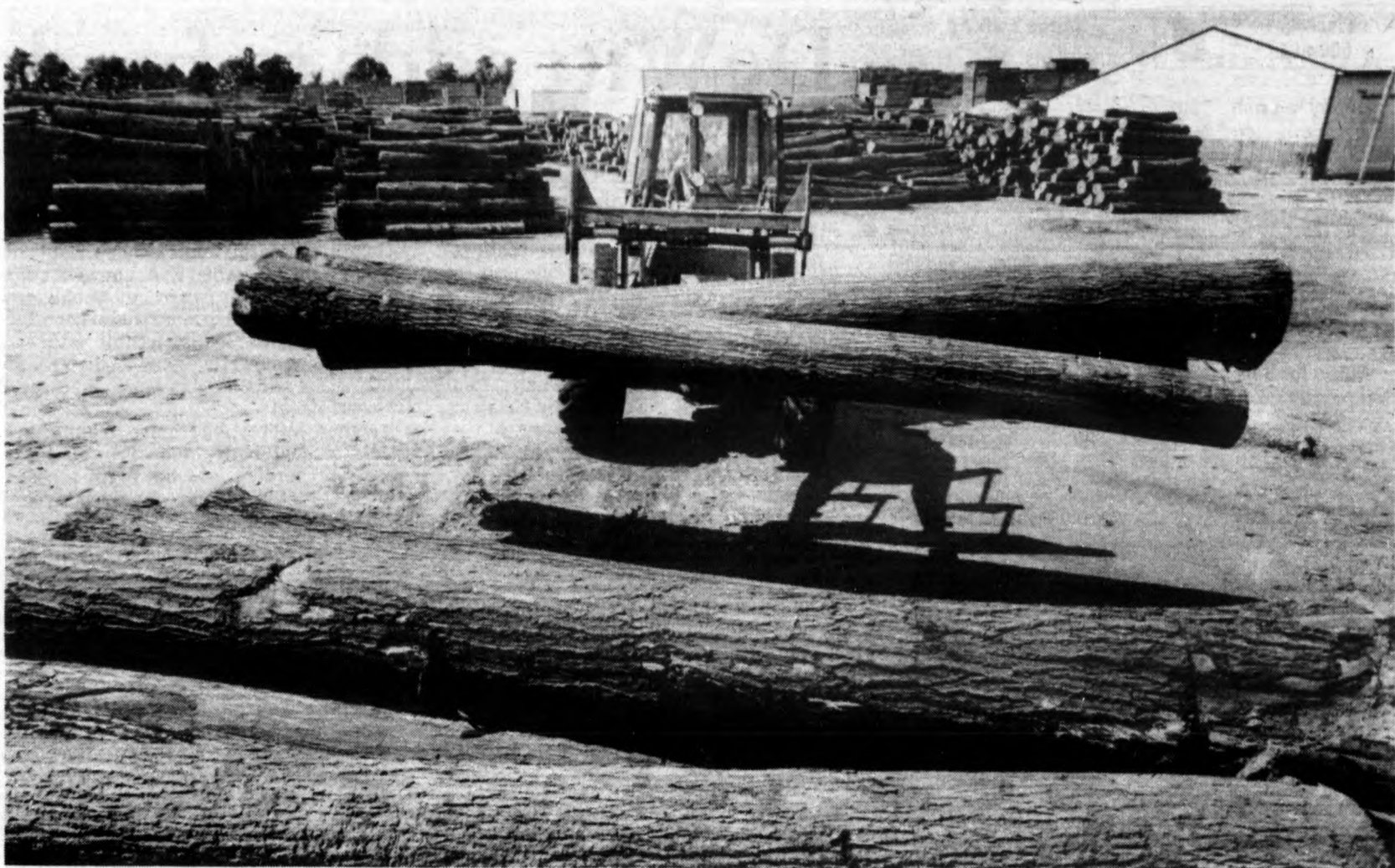

Forty workers buzz around the Devereaux Sawmill in Pewamo as the business goes about turning tall timbers into useful products.

The Devereaux Sawmill has been turning out wood products since 1966 in Pewamo, cutting 1/2 million feet of timber per month.

The sawmill spans twenty acres of yard space and eight buildings. With forty employees, it ranks as one of Michigan's largest hardwood sawmills and one of the few with a dry kiln.

After the logs are cut, they are dried in the gas-fired kiln for 1 1/2-2 weeks, depending on the type of wood. All logs are graded and numbered one through five for quality. The best logs are used for veneer.

Nothing goes to waste at the sawmill. Sawdust is sold to farmers for animal bedding. Bark is sold to nurseries to cover flower beds and the wood chips go to Muskegon Paper Co.
