



School enrollment down slightly

St. Johns is down only 66 students from last year's count of kindergarten through 12th grade students, according to figures announced after a Sept. 14 Board of Education meeting.

The district has 3,521 students this year, administrator Steve Bakita said. Last year's figure was 3,587, Bakita said.

"That's not too bad, in today's times, when you're losing 100-200 kids," he said. "We really haven't been losing as many

kids as other districts."

Bakita attributed that to people staying in St. Johns and retaining their jobs with stable companies in the Lansing area.

In other action, Superintendent Earl Gabriel was authorized to accept a grant of \$53,000 for two years through the Department of Commerce which will help make St. Johns Schools more energy efficient.

The grant will be used to install equip-

ment on hot water heaters to restore heat lost through stacks, school officials said. A small computer regulating thermostats in classrooms and boilers will also be installed, officials said.

Trustees also set the tax rate at 29.754 operating mills, which is the same as last year. The debt levy was set at 1.55 mills, down from last year's debt levy of 1.94 mills.

Trustees also commended two retiring

teachers — Anita Hamaker of Rodney B. Wilson Junior High and Kathryn Durner of Riley Elementary School.

Three appointments were also made — Suzanne Drabek as teacher of emotionally impaired at Riley, Julianne Lounds as teacher of educable mentally impaired at Perrin-Palmer Elementary School and Joe Sternburgh as Community Education Coordinator.

But Elizabeth Dambrose wasn't about to forget her unexpected stop in St. Johns. She had noticed a bright yellow school

Group studies school closings

Once again the St. Johns School District is looking into the possibility of closing a portion of its elementary school system.

A committee of 32 persons plus a chairman has been appointed by the school board to look into the feasibility of closing either East Essex, East Olive, or both. The appointments were made at the school board's regular meeting on Wednesday, Sept. 14. Any decision regarding those two schools would affect approximately 250 students.

Superintendent of Schools Earl Gabriel had originally proposed a plan to close the two buildings last spring, due to declining enrollment and as a money-saving measure. But a parents group from East Essex forestalled the decision until December of 1983. Gabriel had wanted the original plan to be implemented during the current school year.

The Citizens Committee on School

Organization was formed during the summer and held its first meeting at the St. Johns High School Library on Monday, September 19. Vice-chairperson Jenny McQueen noted that the committee will make its recommendations to the board at their regular meeting on December 14.

Although only one meeting of the committee has taken place, McQueen said she felt things were going well.

"So far we don't have much in the way of facts and figures except on enrollment,

but the administration is bending over backward to insure that we get all the information we need," she noted.

McQueen explained that the board gave the committee the charge of determining which if any of the elementary schools should be closed. The committee she said, is chaired by Ron Huard, and is comprised of parents from rural and city schools, non-parents, businessmen, farmers and

'Seat' fund campaign continues

Clinton County Child Safety Committee members have applied the brakes to their plan for immediate distribution of child restraint seats.

But the plan certainly has not come to a full stop.

Committee chairman Rev. David Lord says only about \$1,000 has been raised so far. That figure is well below the committee's goal of \$100,000 and does not generate enough interest payments to purchase the restraint seats.

"The response to the program has been favorable, but it takes organizations a while to get mobilized," said Lord. "Summertime is not your red-hot time to get organizations together."

At a meeting in August, the nine-member committee announced plans to raise \$100,000 so every county child could be fitted in a free child restraint seat.

Committee members showed the need for the seats by presenting statistics which listed automobile accidents as the No. 1 health threat to children. Community leaders such as doctors, police officers and service organization heads also offered their support.

To kick off the fund-raising effort, the Jaycettes presented the committee with a \$300 check. But throughout August, funds were only trickling in.

The committee is awaiting a contribution from the American Academy of Pediatrics which Lord said would be for about \$500. If and when the check comes, the committee will then be able to purchase seats.

Cost for the seats is about \$35. Since they are sold in quantities of 10, the cheapest purchase would be \$350, Lord said.

Committee members have scheduled meetings around the county to inform organizations about their efforts, Lord said. Meetings with service organizations, ministerial organizations, the Rotary Club and St. Johns Area Chamber of Commerce are fast approaching, Lord said.

"What we're trying to do now is let people know what the problem is and to mobilize the organizations in the community," Lord said. "We're hoping we can get our various organizations in the county going to contribute funds."

Free cheese to be distributed

Commodity food cards will not be issued during the week of Oct. 3-7, nor will cards be issued at Commodity Food Distribution Sites.

Families may register for Community Food Cards at any Capital Area Community Services office through Sept. 30 and after Oct. 10 between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Spring flowers can bloom in winter

Spring flowers put into cold storage can be preserved for blooming in winter if bulbs are potted and put into cold storage now.

Materials needed for this process, called forcing, include bulbs, a well-drained planting medium and clean containers with drainage holes.

Use only firm, healthy-looking bulbs for forcing. Storing them at temperatures between 45 and 63 degrees is ideal before planting.

Plant bulbs between Oct. 1 and Dec. 1. For flowering in late January, plant around Oct. 1. For February flowering, plant in mid-October, and for March and April flowering, plant in mid-November.

Loosely fill the container with soil so that the tops of the bulbs will be even with the top of the pot when they're placed on top of the soil. A six-inch pot can hold six tulips, three hyacinths, six daffodils or 15 crocus.

Set the bulbs on top of the soil and loosely cover them with more soil. Fill the pot to within 1/4 inch of the rim

to allow room for watering.

Label each pot with the name of the variety, the planting date and the date after which the pot can be removed from cold storage. Cold treatment can be provided by an unheated cellar, coldframe

or old refrigerator.

Water plants as they're going into cold storage. Check them often and water if the soil begins to dry. The soil must be kept moist if the bulbs are to develop good root systems.

After a minimum of 13-15

weeks of cold, the first planted bulbs can be brought out of cold storage. In the house, place potted bulbs in a cool area — 60 degrees — and direct sunlight. Plants should flower in three to four weeks.



River Walk Home Tour

The People's Action League is hosting its first annual Home Tour and Art Fair, Saturday, Oct. 1 from 12-6 p.m. in Wacousta.

The following eight homes are featured on this year's tour:

Emerick — originally built in 1859 as a barn, a fire gutted all but the shell in 1892. The home has a barn beam mantle, open galley kitchen and a figure eight pool overlooking the river.

Farmer — a colonial-style home built in the mid-60's. Its features include a traditional colonial interior, lovely landscaping and an above-ground pool surrounded by a wood deck.

Harlow — built in the early 1960's this bi-level has a formal living room and family room overlooking the river. It was one of the first homes built on Riverside Drive.

Stefanick — originally built in 1905, this farmhouse reflects the tremendous amount of work involved in restoration. It also features a collection of traps.

George — a contemporary ranch-style built in 1969, this home's features include an outdoor putting green, large deck overlooking the river and heirlooms.

Pete Clark — this ranch-style home was built in 1977 and designed by Gail Clark. It has a mud room complete with pot belly stove, an attractive living room with an extra large window overlooking the fields and a family room with a bar and knotty pine interior.

Leon P. Clark — the north wing of this home was built in the 1850's. Bought and remodeled in 1950's by the Clark's, it features large rooms and

an antique collection.

Hansbarger — some parts of this remodeled home are over 100 years old. Its setting includes an attractive lot with a large barn and duck pond.

Tickets for the home tour are \$3 advanced sales and senior citizens and are available at the Deere Barn in Grand Ledge, the Wacousta General Store or by calling Pat Block at 626-6285. Tickets will be available the day of the tour for \$4.

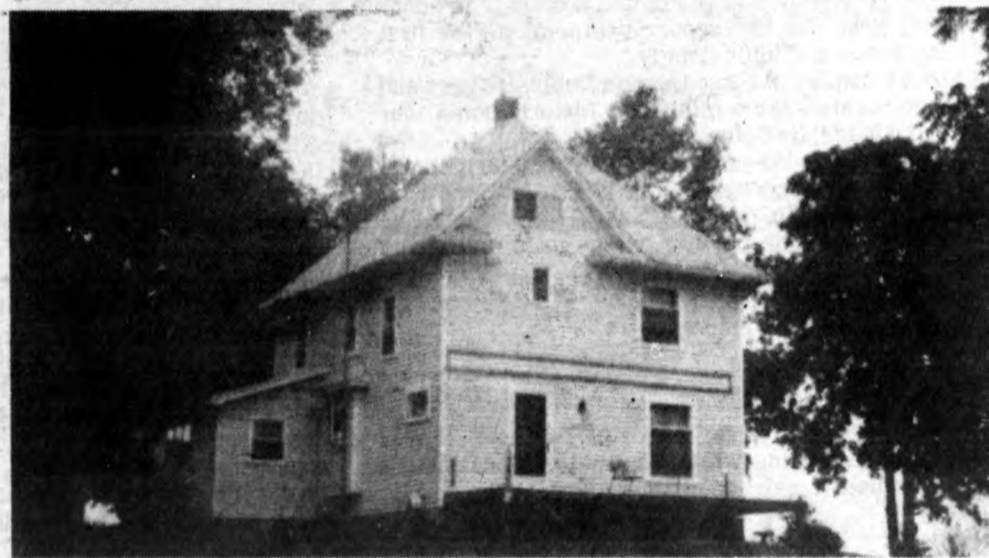

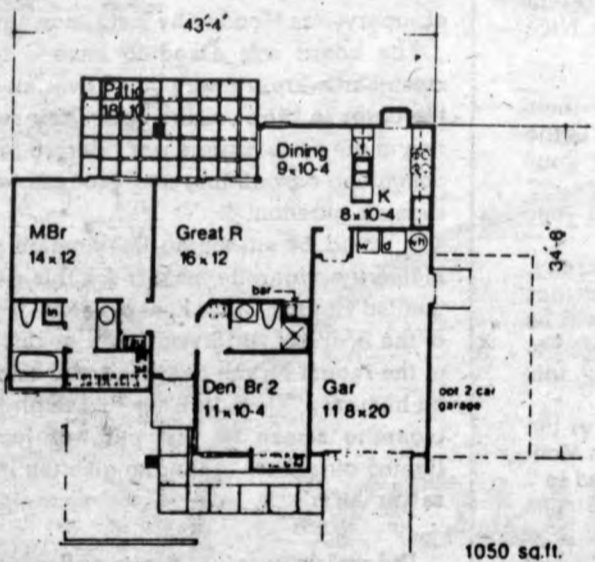
The Leon P. Clark Home: — features large rooms and an antique collection.

Founding family

Since the actual 150th anniversary of DeWitt's founding in 1833 by Captain David Scott and his wife, Eunice, occurs the first week of October, the sesquicentennial celebration culminates at that time.

The Clinton County Historical Society is sponsoring a reunion of the Scott founding family at Riverside Park on Saturday, Oct. 8. Ken Coin has sent out letters inviting the Scotts' descendants to return to their roots and take part in the historical occasion.

At 2 p.m. that day, the Clinton County Historical Society will hold a dedication ceremony at DeWitt Cemetery, where they have erected a marker in honor of Eunice Scott for her accomplishments as the first woman pioneer in Clinton County.

A history display at Faye Hanson Public Library and the sesquicentennial committee's historic home tour will also be held that Saturday.

Part of DeWitt's 150-year celebration will be a choral presentation directed by Phyllis Winter on Thursday evening, Oct. 6, at DeWitt High School auditorium. The program will include novelty act solo, duets and choral numbers.

Historic booklets

DeWitt Area Histories, a series of more than 12 booklets, each dealing with a topic or era of DeWitt's past, will be on sale soon at Faye Hanson Public Library.

Written by Kenneth Coin, the booklet project was funded through the joint efforts of the Clinton County Historical Commission, Clinton County Historical Society and the DeWitt District Library.

Each illustrated booklet contains 24 to 32 pages. A donation of \$2 per booklet will be asked. The entire series, more than 300 pages of history and heritage, can be obtained for a \$20 donation. Board ponders bird problem

CLINTON COUNTY REPUBLICAN NEWS, JULY 14, 1955 — Birds carrying lighted cigarettes could set the Court House clock tower afire and steps to avert this danger were recommended to the board of supervisors Monday by insurance underwriters.

The board was asked to have a quarter-inch mesh hardware screen placed over all openings in the tower to keep out the birds. The recommendation of the underwriters was referred to the board's committee on building and grounds for study and recommendation.

It would be stretching imagination pretty far to blame the cigarette-makers for this danger, commented County Clerk Paul Wakefield, who is clerk of the board of supervisors and obviously thinking of the recent hubub over cigarette smoking effects on humans. "They didn't say if the birds inhale the cigarette smoke or just puff, or just carry the lighted cigarettes around to give the impression of savoir faire."

Uranium search fever mounts on Upper Peninsula

CLINTON COUNTY REPUBLICAN NEWS, JULY 7, 1955 — The Ishpeming suboffice of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission reports numbers of uranium prospectors asking for information about western Upper Peninsula counties.

"Some days," says officer director L.P. Barrett, "three or four groups of individuals ask for information. If the prospecting fever keeps up at this pace all summer, the quiet of the northlands will be thoroughly shattered."

Conservation department geologists say no commercial deposits of uranium have been found in Michigan to date. Much of the upper western peninsula, which appears geologically best suited for uranium, has been prospected for other ores, but to date no indications of important radioactive ore deposits have been reported.

'Gypsies' hit DeWitt grocery

A band of gypsies is believed to be responsible for a robbery at Jim's Shoprite, 3940 Northeast St., DeWitt Township, Thursday, Sept. 15.

DeWitt Township police are searching for 8-10 "foreign-speaking people" whom they said generated commotion and escaped with money. The people, believed to be gypsies, entered the store and separated the employees, police said, enabling one man to escape with an undetermined amount of money.

The suspects left the scene in two cars — a late model Chevrolet Impala or Caprice, with silver, or a late model cream-colored Oldsmobile 98, police said. Both vehicles had Illinois license plates, police said.

Township police reports said they are looking for five white males, all with mustaches and dark hair, and four or five heavy-set females.

In all, Clinton County Sheriff's deputies reported 85 total complaints for the week of Sept. 11-18. Twenty-six of those resulted in arrests.

Ag intelligence

Satellite photos give farmers market's edge

Agricultural intelligence doesn't mean smart tomatoes — it means staying ahead of the competition by knowing what the competition is growing.

As the nation's participation in the world market for farm commodities has become more important in recent years, the U.S. Agriculture Department has developed and used the most sophisticated technologies to find out what, where and how much is being produced.

Modern data-gathering satellites like Landsat pass over all the major farming areas of the world — China, India, the Soviet Union, Argentina and, of course, the U.S. They take pictures in visible light, infra-red and other spectra, which they convert into radio signals.

These signals are analyzed by computers and converted by laser recording equipment into color pictures.

By the density of different colors, the analysts for U.S. foreign agriculture service can tell how much land is being cultivated, what kinds of crops are being grown, how much moisture the plants are getting, whether they are in good health and many other kinds of valuable information.

This intelligence-gathering activity benefits the farmer by giving him a kind of crystal ball to see market trends coming in advance. It's not magic; it's not foolproof; however, it does give farmers an edge, and in today's competitive market, that matters.

Smith to manage new grain division

American Bean and Grain recently announced that it is establishing a new division which will be responsible for consolidating and marketing grain and grain products from its various elevators located in Michigan, Minnesota, North Dakota, Wyoming and Nebraska.

This new division will be headed by Lawrence C. (Lon) Smith. Smith is currently manager of the Smith Brothers Vette Division located in Sunfield, Lake Odessa, Woodland and Woodbury. He will continue his present responsibilities until a suitable replacement has been found.

Corn will be delivered

In response to rumors that farmers may be unable to get delivery on payment-in-kind corn in their own states, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service officials have assured Farm Bureau commodity specialists that farmers will be able to get delivery either in their own or adjoining county.

"The rumors apparently came from prospective purchasers of PIK corn certificates," said Ken Nye, commodity specialist for the Michigan Farm Bureau. "But, ASCS

spokespersons have assured us that the reports have no justification and should not be a factor when farmers bargain with PIK certificate purchasers."

Farmers law working

Whether a neighbor complains about the odor from a farmer's hog operation or a stranger runs into a farm fence and then claims it is a hazard, Michigan's Right to Farm law is proving itself a valuable protection for those involved in the production of food and fiber, according to Michigan Farm Bureau's legislative counsel Robert Smith.

"So far, since the court decided the Right to Farm law is constitutional, there has been no reversal of that decision," Smith said. "There have been dozens of cases, many of which have been thrown out of court because of the recognition that odors and dust, for example, are part of a modern farm operation. If the farmer uses good management practices, he is protected from nuisance suits. The law has been very effective."

Soybean market opens

U.S. soybean farmers are pleased that poultry producers in Pakistan will now be able to purchase U.S. soybean meal. Farmers see Pakistan as a big potential market.

"Within the next few years, Pakistan could import as much as 200,000 metric tons of U.S. soybean meal, or about \$40 million worth," said Missouri farmer Joe Kroner.

According to Kroner, Pakistan recently removed its longstanding import duty on soybean meal. The tariff has been keeping Pakistani purchases of U.S. soybean meal down because it made U.S. meal too expensive. Now that poultry producers in Pakistan can afford U.S. meal, they'll use more of it. And Pakistan will buy more U.S. meal, Kroner said.

Corn production falls

The smallest corn crop in seven years highlights the overall decline in Michigan crop production for 1983. Corn production is expected to be just under 176 million bushels, according to the Federal/State-Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. This represents a 43 percent decline from last year's record crop, and 36 percent below 1981.

Spurring the decline in production is a significant decrease in harvested acres, which is the lowest since 1972. Late planting and hot, dry weather has played a major role in reducing yield potential. Currently, yields are expected to average 95 bushels per acre, well below last year's record, but only one bushel less than 1981.

Ag briefs

Rise in bread prices

The price of a 1-pound loaf of white bread increased a little over a cent, from 53.23 cents to 54.30 cents, from January-March 1982 to January-March 1983, according

to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. During that same time, the farm value of wheat declined from \$3.75 to \$3.57 per bushel, while the retail price of a hundred pounds of flour moved up from \$85.59 to \$87.31.

A breakdown shows that the farm value of wheat in that loaf of bread declined from 4.70 cents in January-March to 4.42 cents this year, and that the farm value of other farm ingredients in the bread also declined. The total farm value of all farm ingredients in the bread was 5.04 cents this January-March period, down from the 5.35 cents a year ago.

Finally! I-69 route approved

The federal government gave its stamp of approval to the routing of I-69 between Charlotte and Lansing that runs parallel to US-27.

The approved route starts with an interchange at Charlotte between I-69 and US-27 and then curves north around the commercial development along US-27. The curve ends north of US-27 about 600 feet east of Otto Road, and then runs north of and parallel to US-27 up to Kinsel Highway.

At a point southwest of the Potterville city limits, the approved route curves south around Potterville, and includes an interchange at Hartel Road. The alignment then shifts back toward US-27, and remains on the south side and parallel to US-27 up to Pinch Highway.

The route turns north at Pinch. An interchange with US-27 would be built just north of Pinch Highway. The route then runs parallel to Guinea Road until it crosses Oak Highway, where it turns east to interchange with I-96, at a point about midway between Davis and Millet Highways.

The 14.4 mile route requires the acquisition of 525 acres of right-of-way, 210 acres of which are active farmland. The

route would also displace 57 residential units, 14 commercial businesses and two farms.

This is the second routing of I-69 that has received federal approval. The approval means the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) can proceed with right-of-way acquisitions, and begin final drafting of the route to prepare for construction bids.

In 1976, the Federal Highway Administration approved the northern 'dog-leg' route for I-69, which would have routed the interstate through the northern, primarily agricultural portion of Eaton County. A series of lawsuits and court injunctions between the Michigan Department of Transportation and Citizens Concerned About I-69 (CCAI) eventually halted any further work on that route in 1980.

At that time, the Secretary of Transportation ordered the MDOT to examine alternative routes for I-69 that run parallel to existing US-27. After several public hearings, the MDOT recommended the route that received federal approval last week.

However, residents of Potterville are attempting to have the MDOT redesign

that portion of I-69 that runs south and west of the city. Basing their arguments on the future economic development of Potterville and the loss of farmland in the area, representatives of the city's

government and business community have worked with their legislators to attempt to have the intersection at I-69 and Hartel Road redrawn so that it runs closer to the city.

She added, however, that "The board has made it clear that they don't have to accept what the committee decides. They have the option to do with the report what they want."

The committee will be making a tour of all seven elementary schools, according to McQueen, and plans are for the administration to provide a bus for the tour, as well as persons from the administra-

tion who can answer committee members' questions. The board has also authorized "within reason" the expenditure of monies for gathering information.

Items to be taken under consideration by the committee are enrollment, bussing, re-organization of grades, and energy requirements.

"We're doing this in part to try to eliminate split classrooms and to use the buildings more efficiently," McQueen stated.

DeWitt capitalizes on Pirate miscue

Both coaches grumbled about miscues, but neither denied the excellent level of Class C football exhibited during DeWitt's 7-0 victory over Pewamo-Westphalia last Friday.

"When you can make as many mistakes as we did and still win, it says a lot for the kids," said DeWitt coach Gail Thornton, whose offense has produced only 21 points in two victories. "They really buckled down."

P-W coach Mike Folk and his assistant, Kurt Mable, spent several minutes consoling their players in the heart of DeWitt's rain-slicked turf.

"We told them they played good football, they had no reason to be ashamed," Folk said. "We could have gone out and scheduled some really small teams and probably won both of them (first two games), but that's not what we wanted to do. We felt we did a good job."

In essence, the game boiled down to one mistake in the second quarter.

P-W's Joe Trierweiler fumbled a punt deep in Pirate territory. DeWitt's Joe Wheeldon wiped out Trierweiler and Panther Pete Lucci recovered the ball on the P-W 11.

On the first play, Wheeldon burst up the middle and into the end zone. Steve Holland's extra point kick finished the game's scoring.

"There was a play where the offense was intense," said Thornton of Wheeldon's jaunt. "I haven't seen a hole like that in quite some time."

P-W coach Mike Folk, analyzing his team's second loss in three seasons, pointed to more than just the touchdown sequence. He was particularly disturbed by P-W's inability to score on its opening drive.

On that march, the Pirates advanced to the DeWitt 17. Tight end Ron Schafer broke into the open in the DeWitt end zone, but Pirate quarterback Kris Werner threw incomplete to another receiver. Then, a blocking breakdown on fourth down enabled Lucci to crash through for a sack.

"The guy that was supposed to block him thought the play was going left," Folk explained. "Then, he came back and ran into the other guy assigned to block him. It happens. It happens at the professional level. It's just a shame it happened at that time."

P-W seriously threatened to score after Wheeldon's touchdown. Aided by a DeWitt face mask penalty which moved the ball to the Panther 11, P-W tried to run it in. But Trierweiler was stacked up for no gain on a fourth-down play from the 4.

DeWitt gambled on the third and fourth down plays, slanting its line to the left. When P-W ran right, Thornton was overjoyed.

"Our people up front just leveled their people on the line, which enabled our linebackers to come up and make the play," the DeWitt coach said. "That's how you draw it on paper."

Folk was not second-guessing himself on the fourth-down call.

"I asked the kids what they thought would go, and they said they felt they could get three yards on it," he said. "It would have been the play I would have called, too. We ran it because we're a better running team than passing."

The second half featured several turnovers and a couple of milder P-W scoring threats. But the Panthers held on, clinching the victory on a last-minute interception by Jeff Proctor.

P-W won the statistical battle, totaling 214 yards to DeWitt's 123. Wheeldon gained 69 yards and Tom Deak had 47 for DeWitt, but Trierweiler was the rushing leader with 140 yards in 29 carries.

"I thought Joe Trierweiler was as good as any football player on the field," said Folk, whose offense was limited by running back Tom Schafer's bruised hip. "He played about as good a football game as any of our backs have played in years."

DeWitt missed on all six of its pass attempts and P-W completed two of nine for 1 yard during the game, which featured a steady second-half drizzle.

Defensive leaders for DeWitt were Wheeldon with 16 tackles and one interception, Jon Holland with 14 tackles and Steve Holland with 12 tackles and a fumble recovery.

P-W's Vern Miller had 15 tackles and Jon Thelen had 10. Bruce Cook contributed two sacks and five other tackles to the Pirate defense.

DeWitt hunts its third victory this Friday when Eaton Rapids, 0-2, comes to town for a Capital Circuit opener. P-W, 1-1, opens its home schedule with Lingsburg, 2-0, in a Central Michigan Athletic Conference opener.

Martin's jaunt saves O-E

Apparently Jon Martin doesn't care too much for overtime.

His team, Ovid-Elsie, was tied, 6-6, with Bridgeport last Friday with less than six minutes remaining. The ball was resting on the O-E 19, but Martin didn't care.

He took a handoff and dashed 81 yards for the winning touchdown to give the Marauders a 12-6 victory.

The 6-foot-3, 190-pound back broke two tackles along the way and used good blocks by end Marcel Hirschegger and guard Kevin VanAtta as he weaved through the defense.

"Martin isn't very fast, but he's got such long strides at 6-3," said O-E coach Russ Pope, whose team improved to 2-0.

Martin also scored O-E's opening touchdown, on a 5-yard run in the first quarter, and finished with 138 yards rushing in 16 carries.

"We're starting to put more plays in to get him the ball," Pope said.

Bridgeport, 0-2 after going 9-0 last season, tied the game in the third quarter but couldn't put the Marauders away.

"They didn't have one starter back from last year," said Pope, who was pleasantly surprised. "I thought after going 9-0 he'd have a good team again, but they only had 10 seniors and 17 juniors."

Quarterback Mark Schneider played the entire game and completed four of nine passes for 103 yards. But he lost 16 yards on running plays, mainly because Bridgeport was blitzing its linebackers.

"My guard would take one step to pull out and they'd get us in the backfield," Pope said.

Defensively, O-E racked up 10 sacks, with Chris Bashore getting three and VanAtta collecting two. The Marauders doubled Bridgeport's total yardage, 274-136.

Pope expects to turn Schneider loose this Friday in the Mid-Michigan 'B' Conference opener against Chesaning, which comes to O-E at 1-1.

"I'm going to throw more this week," said Pope of his coaching strategy. "Nine passes isn't enough for this team. I got a little conservative there."

Line-drive field goal edges St. Johns

History has repeated itself for the St. Johns football team.

Last year's results featured close opening losses to Owosso and Lansing Waverly. Ditto for 1983.

The 1982 Redwings recovered to win their last seven games and capture the Mid-Michigan 'B' Conference championship. As the current Redwings journey to Alma for their conference opener Friday, coach Joe Gonzales wouldn't mind if history kept repeating itself.

But he knows better than to predict it.

"They've got to make the big play at the big time, and that hasn't happened," said Gonzales. "These guys could pop out of it and do something. We've just got to keep their attitude up."

Last Friday's loss to the defending Capital Area Conference champions was agonizing to St. Johns. Guarding a 7-0 lead, the Redwings lost it when Waverly scored 10 fourth-quarter points.

The death blow came when Waverly's Ron Budd lined a 34-yard field goal through the uprights with 1:13 left.

"I told our linemen if they would have jumped up they would have hit it," said Gonzales of the low-trajectory kick.

"We outplayed them three quarters of the game, maybe three quarters and a half. But they probably had a better fourth quarter than we did, and that was the difference."

St. Johns scored its first points of the season when quarterback Brian Bates passed 4 yards to tight end John Werbish with two seconds left in the first half. Bates kicked the extra point.

But Waverly tailback David Carter scored on an 18-yard run and set up the winning field goal by dashing 31 yards. A face

mask penalty tacked on 15 more yards to the drive.

St. Johns, with a stronger line anchored by new center Alan Ebert,

gained 168 yards to Waverly's 162. But Gonzales said the Warriors profited from 93 yards in Redwing penalties and poor punt

return execution.

"Our lack of catching and fielding the punts in the air in the third and fourth quarter probably gave them an extra 30-40 yards on the roll," he said. "It changed the field position."

Tackling leaders for the St. Johns defense were Jeff Ely, John Keenoy and Eric Thum, with 10 apiece. The return of senior captain John Archambault from an injury also helped steady the secondary. "They didn't run his corner



the team has lived up to its billing. Alma, behind 6-foot-3, 190-pound quarterback Eric Smith, is 2-0.

"The defense let down on two or three key plays," said Gonzales in analysis of the Waverly game. "If we want to win this week, we can't let down at all."

Senior quarterback Mike Green will remain on the sidelines with a back injury. Gonzales said the soonest Green could return would be the Oct. 7 game against Ovid-Elsie.

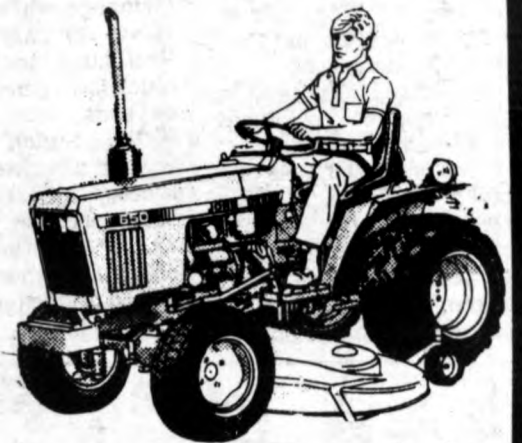

Fowler blitzes Vestaburg

Rank Fowler fifth in the state. Rank the Eagles fourth.

Rank the team third, second or even No. 1. It doesn't matter to coach Steve Spicer.

As far as Spicer is concerned, there is no sure way to tell how his Class D football team compares with similar units throughout Michigan. So he does not worry about it.

Neither does Spicer allow his players to fret over state rankings.

"I don't put anything in ratings," said Spicer, whose team has had to deal with eager pollsters ever since its 1980 appearance in the Pontiac Silverdome. "They don't see the teams play, anyway. They look at scores sometimes, but that doesn't do much good."

He offered his team's dismantling of Vestaburg last Friday as evidence.

"We won, 40-0, but we played a young, inexperienced ballclub that hasn't had a j.v. team in two years. It's nice to be ranked, but we tell the kids not to believe any of that."

Fowler, rated as high as sixth in one Class D poll, takes on Portland St. Patrick, 2-0, Friday at Fowler. The Shamrock-Eagle game will open the Central Michigan Athletic Conference season for both schools.

But the visiting Shamrocks are of more concern to Spicer than state rankings. Their ground-oriented attack is similar to Fowler's, in that one tailback, Bruce Cook, is the primary ballcarrier. Carl Noren, a 205-pound tackle, blasts most of Cook's holes.

Fowler's tailback, Tom Simon, recorded his second 100-yard rushing performance when he totaled 145 in 20 carries against Vestaburg. Included were touchdown runs of 18, 1 and 40 yards.

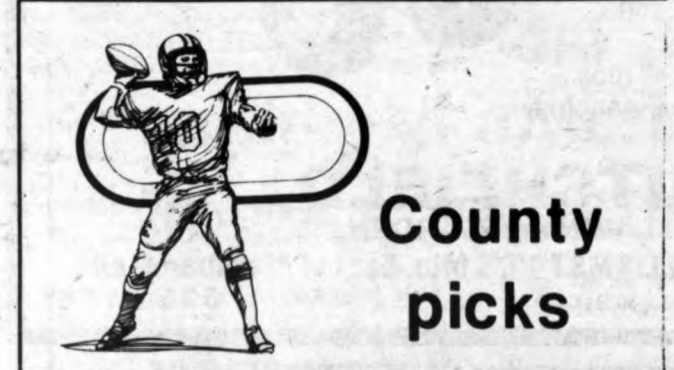
Dan Simon and Bill Snyder also ran for Eagle scores, and Dennis Fox scampered 38 yards with an interception for the other touchdown. Bob Simon kicked four of six extra points.

Fowler rolled up 382 yards rushing. Quarterback Steve Goerge completed one of four passes, but did not gain any yardage.

Vestaburg managed two completions in eight attempts for 20 yards, but its rushing game wound up losing 13 yards.

"They're young," Spicer said. "We played a normal 5-2 defense. I think with their inexperience, their offense just wasn't clicking."

Fowler coach Steve Spicer isn't paying much attention to the state ratings.

Fowler tops St. Pat's; P-W keeps winning

"We played to our maximum," said Fowler girls basketball coach Denny Smith after his team beat Portland St. Patrick, 59-57, in Central Michigan Athletic Conference action last Tuesday.

The victory over the defending conference champion gave Smith confidence. But he wasn't turning cartwheels over his team's championship chances.

Instead, he was boosting undefeated and state-ranked Pewamo-Westphalia.

"Nobody in our league's going to get them," Smith said. "St. Pat's has got an outside chance, but they're not nearly as deep as P-W."

Fowler's top two players — Peg Thelen and Darce Schmitt — had outstanding games to spark the Eagles past the Shamrocks. Thelen scored a career-high 25 points and Schmitt added 12 points and 11 rebounds.

More importantly, Schmitt played the entire fourth quarter with four fouls while checking Portland St. Patrick's top scorer, Laurie Leik. The 5-foot-11 Shamrock scored 12 of her game-high 26 points in the third quarter, but only two points in the fourth quarter.

Fowler bumped its record to 3-1 last Thursday by stopping Portland, 51-43. Thelen scored 16 points — three under her season average — and Schmitt had 15 to lead Eagle scorers.

Fowler, which hosts unbeaten Ashley tonight, has been struggling to fill its fifth starting position since Judy George suffered a knee injury in the season's second game. She underwent a three-hour operation last week and will be lost for the season, Smith said.

"The spot's wide open," he said. "I'm trying to find somebody to fill it. My bench has been really weak so far. In the St. Pat's game, they scored one point."

Pewamo-Westphalia has no such problem. New double-figure scorers seem to emerge every game for coach Carol Bogard.

Last week, in victories over Laingsburg and Carson City-Crystal, center Lynda Rademacher stole the spotlight.

The 6-0 junior scored 18 and grabbed eight rebounds in the 62-44 win over Laingsburg. Then, she scored 28 points, snared seven rebounds, blocked four shots and had three steals in less than three quarters of action

against Carson City-Crystal.

Bogard said Rademacher's dominance in the 56-35 win resulted when Carson City double-teamed senior Patty Theis. Frequently left alone, Rademacher sank 11 of 13 shots, mainly off of inside feeds.

"They concentrated on Patty the whole game," Bogard said. "They left her (Rademacher) open a lot. They really collapsed on Patty."

Theis and Jackie Bauer scored 10 points apiece against Carson City as P-W hiked its record to 4-0. Cheryl Blatt grabbed eight rebounds and Bauer contributed six steals and five assists.

How much stock does Bogard place in her team being ranked second by the Detroit Free Press and third by the Detroit News?

"About as much as Notre Dame does," she said with a chuckle. "I think we have a good ballclub, but I don't think we're the No. 2 club in the state."

In other county action, Ovid-Elsie also moved to 3-1 by stopping Montrose, 67-48, last Thursday. Coach Mary Hudecek played her entire bench but was most impressed by the play of starting point guard Mary Perrien, who scored 12

points, had 11 steals, forced seven turnovers and had seven assists. "She played the best

floor game I've ever seen any player play, even in college," Hudecek said. "She ran the team well. She kept everybody moving."

Shelby Terpstra scored 13 points and Teri Woodbury had 11 for the Marauders, who also snapped Okemos' 46-game winning streak at home earlier in the week.

At St. Johns, the Redwings posted narrow wins over DeWitt and Lansing Sexton despite losing two starters to injuries.

The Redwings edged DeWitt, 47-45, behind Pam Sehlke's 14 points. However, point guard Lisa

Thelen suffered elbow and knee bruises and wing Amy Hartsuff banged up a knee.

Neither suited up for last Thursday's 30-23 win over Sexton, but Brenda Eiseler picked up the slack with 13 points and 12 rebounds. Janine Scott added six points and four steals and Sehlke collected seven rebounds as St. Johns moved its record to 3-1.

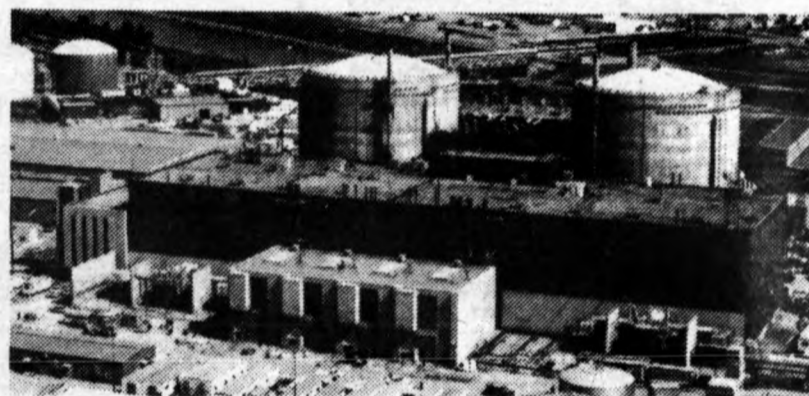

Business, labor say n-plant vital to Michigan

Business and labor leaders, in unusual harmony, say the electricity that will be produced by the Midland Nuclear Plant is essential to Michigan's economy.

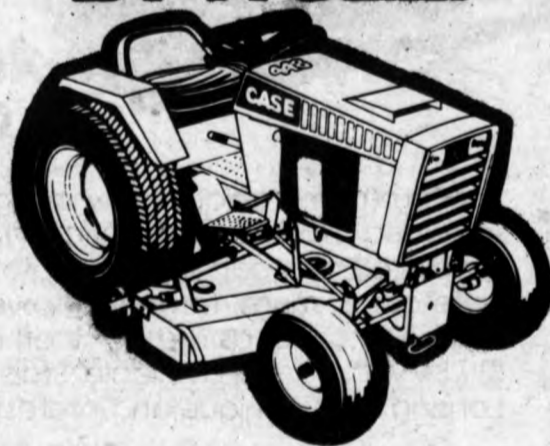

A report from the Village Treasurer indicated 1983 real estate and personal taxes totaled \$82,828.05, an increase of \$163,09 over 1982.

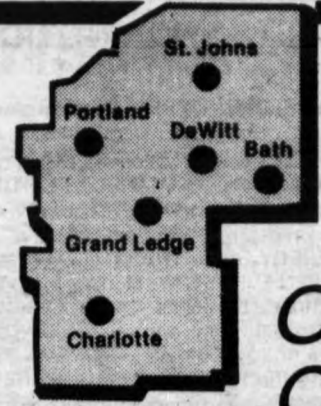

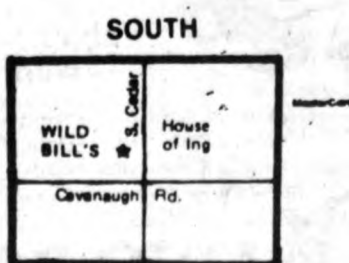

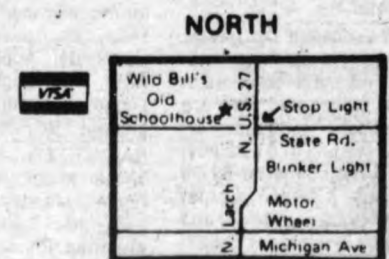
