County probation position is filled

The 65th Judicial District's temporary situation of being without an active probation officer has been relieved.

The situation arose when former probation officer Judy Kelly resigned her position with the district court in June to take a position in Eaton County. That, coupled with the recent sick leave necessary for Officer Kenneth Baker left the court with no one to handle probation duties.

District Judge Frederick M. Lewis remedied the situation with the hiring of Lynne Edin, who began her new duties last Monday. Edin fills the vacancy created by Kelly's resignation.

Edin comes to her new job after serving three years as police dispatcher and secretary for DeWitt Township. Prior to

working there, she had held a position as a schoolteacher in Minnesota.

Some of Edin's duties include the presentencing responsibilities of acting as a liaison between social agencies and those persons awaiting sentencing, background investigations and post-sentencing counseling and enforcement.

Lewis said he felt that Edin's was "a peach of a job in the sense that are some visible rewards in it." The major reward, he noted, is that unlike as in many other jobs, a probation officer can see the results of his or her work. "There's a great sense of accomplishment when they can see that what they've done has turned someone around," he explained.

Sesquicentennial starts with tribute to DeWitt

Nearly 400 historic-minded DeWitt citizens, braved the cool, rainy climate Tuesday evening to witness the Founding Day Ceremonies at Riverside Park for the city's Sesquicentennial Celebration.

DeWitt Mayor Lynn Thayer welcomed back two former mayors to the celebration, Lawrence Keck who served from June 10, 1969 to Nov. 13, 1972 and Ray DeWitt who served from Nov. 24, 1972 to June 26, 1973.

DeWitt's two state legislators, Senator Alan Cropsey and Representative Gary Randall presented Mayor Thayer with a joint resolution passed that very day in both Houses of the Legislature commending DeWitt on its long heritage and contribution to the State of Michigan.

Thayer praised the Sesquicentennial Committee for its fine work in preparing for this week's activities. He credited the committee for the large turnout Tuesday night.

"It says alot for the committee," Thayer commented. "They are all just citizens who have put alot of work into this celebration. If I were on the committee, I'd be real happy."

The large crowd was then treated to a reenactment of a Civil War skirmish, provided by a group of Civil War enthusiasts from Lansing. The two sides were dressed in full Confederate and Union regalia and battled in the waning dusk of that rainy mid-Michigan evening.

Area residents have plenty to look forward to however, as Sesquicentennial activities continue through the weekend.

Tonight at 7:30 the Sesquicentennial Choir program will take place in the DeWitt High School Auditorium with the presentation of awards to the various contest winners to follow.

On Friday, there will be a Blue Grass Band Concert at 7:30 p.m. at Riverside Park followed by the Candlelight River Ceremony.

Festivities will conclude on Saturday with the Scott Family Reunion at Riverside Park starting at 11 a.m.; dedication of the monument on Mrs. David Scott's grave at 2 p.m. at the DeWitt Cemetery; a chicken barbeque from 4-8 p.m. at the DeWitt Memorial Building; a historic display at Faye Hanson Public Library; DeWitt Heritage Home Tour from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.; and the DeWitt City Fire Department fireworks beginning at 9 p.m. at Riverside Park.

Teachers get rolling

Wheelchair Blues

Traci Allen, a sophomore, has difficulty getting into classrooms at St. Johns High School.

It's not the school's fault, or the fault of anyone else, for that matter. It's simply difficult for her to fit a bulky wheelchair through the narrow openings.

She also has trouble rolling down inclines in the hallways. Unless a student helps her, she cannot roll down a ramp without speeding out of control.

Miss Allen, stricken with cerebral palsy, is the only wheelchair student at the high school.

"She's getting around," said special education teacher Lynn Baisley. "She's getting to her classes, but she just isn't as independent as she would like to be."

In order to help her get around school easier, Mrs. Baisley is spearheading a fund-raising effort. Special education teachers hope to raise \$1,000 so they can purchase an Amigo (a special golf-cart type of transporter) for Miss Allen.

The Amigo is narrower and much more mobile than a wheelchair, Mrs. Baisley said. It also would enable Miss Allen to go down inclines without the aid of students, since the rider can control his speed better than a wheelchair occupant.

After two weeks of fund-raising, \$125 has been collected for the Amigo. Mrs. Baisley said efforts would be made to contact local service organizations and St. Johns student groups to help raise the rest of the money.

The Amigo would be purchased



specifically for Miss Allen to use at the high school, but it also would be available to St. Johns students after she graduates, Mrs. Baisley said. Students with a broken leg would find the Amigo very handy, she said.

Until the money is raised, students will continue to help Miss Allen negotiate the halls of St. Johns.

"She never stops trying," said Mrs. Baisley. "The smile never goes off her face. She's just an amazing girl."

Free concert

Every day at about 3 p.m., Laura Furry gives the workers of St. Johns a free concert.

That's when she gets off school at Rodney B. Wilson Junior High and strolls over to the First United Methodist Church. Awaiting her fingers are the 17 keys of the church's bell chimer.

Laura, an eighth grader, has been playing the chimes since August, 1981. Monday though Friday, she plays hymns that can be heard throughout downtown St. Johns. For playing the historic chimes, which were dedicated in 1916, she earns \$30 a month.

"She's a good little chimer," said church secretary Jean Lublow. "She very seldom makes a mistake."

Special 4-H project for Schneeberger

A Clinton County youth, Brenda Schneeberger of DeWitt, has been selected to raise a Standardbred foal for one year as part of the Michigan 4-H Standardbred Horse Production Project.

Schneeberger is one of 18 Michigan 4-H members selected to participate in the 1983-84 production project. Qualified 4-Hers were chosen by the 4-H Standardbred Advisory Committee.

Next month Schneeberger will receive a foal born last spring. She will raise the horse until August of 1984 and then will sell the horse at a Standardbred auction. Schneeberger will receive one-third of the sale price after expenses, with the remainder going to the breeder who donated the foal.

"The project gives the kids an opportunity to learn the responsibility

that comes with caring for a horse," says Theresa Silm, Clinton County Extension 4-H youth agent. "A unique aspect of the Standardbred project is that it also gives young people a rare opportunity to learn about the economics and career possibilities in the harness racing industry."

Schneeberger will participate in a number of programs throughout the year through the cooperation of

the Michigan Harness Horsemen's Association and Michigan Standardbred Breeders' Association. She will attend meetings on horse care, visit breeding and training facilities, and participate in a workshop on preparing her yearling for sale.

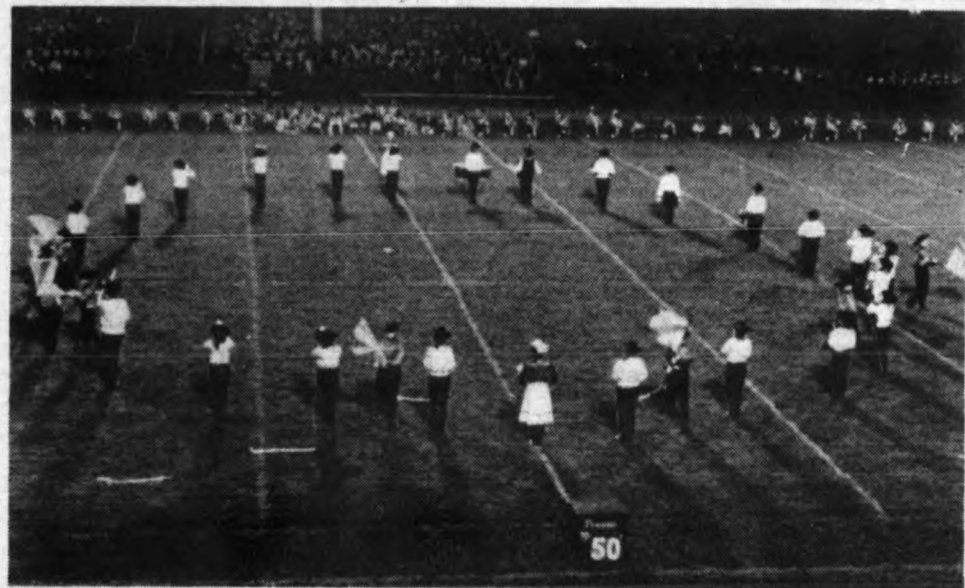
"It's a very colorful night, a beautiful night," said Cole. "People look forward to it every year."

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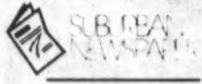

These are some of the largest yields of wheat ever reported in Clinton County. Many farmers are wisely keeping the "cap bundles" separate from those which are undamaged and in that way getting the top price for the wheat which is not sprouted, according to the report of St. Johns elevators.

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New mortgage program announced

Saving the best for the last typifies a new Union Federal Savings mortgage program announced this week by Vice President John R. Burmeister.

"We're the last," said Burmeister of the new adjustable mortgage loan (AML)

program, "but we're hoping to be the best since we've had a chance to look at the rest."

Burmeister, mortgage lending and service manager, said the new loan program starts with an interest rate of 11 percent, the lowest rate the association has charged for home loans since May 1979.

The rate is 3 percent lower than Union

Federal's 30-year fixed-rate mortgages.

In the St. Johns area, prospective borrowers can contact Priscilla Gove at Union Federal's office, 709 S. US-27. She can be reached at 224-8991.

The new program could mean homebuyers would pay about \$100 less in monthly payments. Monthly payments on a 30-year, \$40,000 mortgage at 14 percent

would be about \$473.95 compared with \$380.93 for the same home loan at 11 percent, which is \$93.02 less per month.

The interest rate on the new AMLs is indexed to the monthly National Median Cost of funds for FSLIC insured savings and loan associations. Annually, ad-

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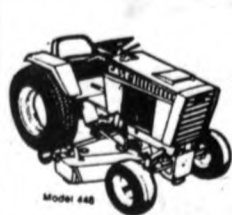

justments on interest rates will not go up or down by more than 1½ percent. Over the period of the loan, the interest rate will also not vary up or down by more than 5 percent.

"We feel the caps (1.5 percent per year and 5 percent over the life of the loan) will provide the consumer with more security in planning for their housing future," Burmeister said.

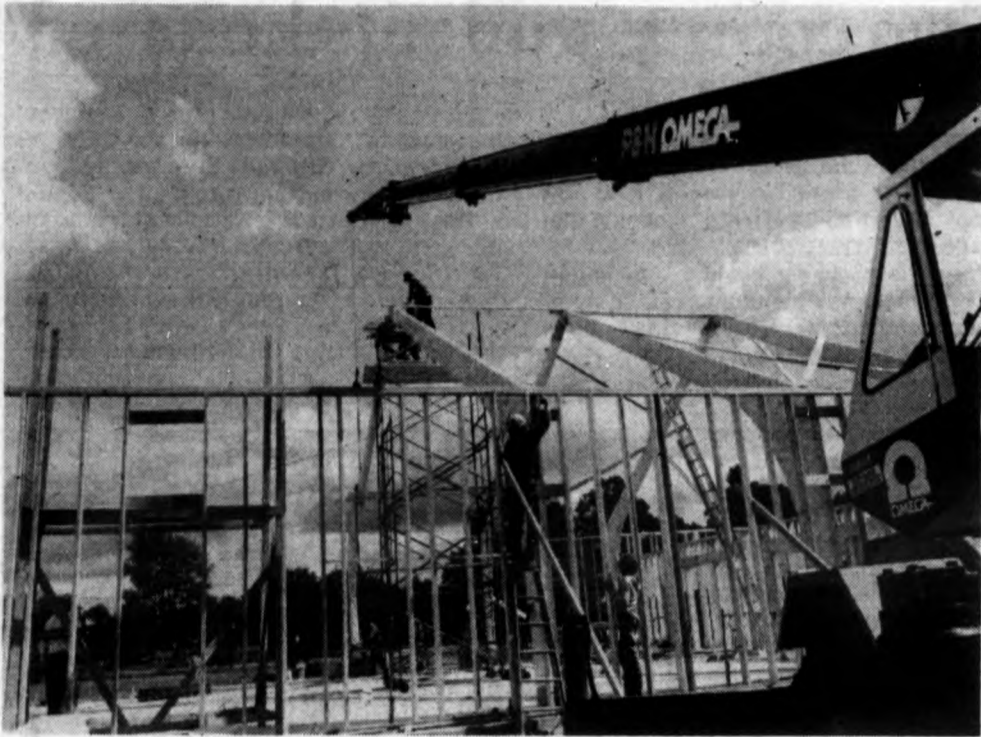
If interest rates follow a pattern similar to those of the past two years, Burmeister said, Union Federal Savings home loans would cost a borrower between 1 and 2 percent less than the national average mortgage interest rate.

"We find the highest rate during this time period to have been 11.68 percent and the lowest rate to have been 8.09 per-

cent," Burmeister said when charting the history of monthly median cost of funds since January 1980 through June 1983. "This is typically lower than the national average of mortgage contracts financing the sale of existing homes," he added.

"What this new program amounts to is a return to the way we did business years back," Burmeister said, "when we were paying 4½ percent interest on savings and charging 6½ percent interest on mortgages. The figures are higher, but the spread is the same," he added.

Burmeister advised prospective borrowers, when comparing various AML programs, to look at the initial interest rate charged, amount of caps and which index is being used to determine the interest charge.

Volunteers build church

Building a church isn't cheap these days.

But volunteers from the church's congregation can cut costs quickly, as pastor Floyd Hughes of First Baptist Church of DeWitt is discovering.

About 20-25 men are pitching in to build the church's 7,000 square foot sanctuary, Hughes said, without charging the church a cent. Their efforts have sliced what normally would have been a \$250,000-\$300,000 project into a \$100,000-\$125,000 project, Hughes said.

Most of the men work 10-hour days at Oldsmobile before taking their customary three-, four- and five-hour shifts at the church.

"I believe it's because they love the Lord," said Hughes, explaining why the men put in long hours for no pay. "They want to use this as a means to serve Him."

In addition to the men, about a dozen women are helping cook meals and about 15 of the church's young members help with odd jobs, Hughes said.

Everyone is working hard in the hope that the sanctuary will be operational in time for a candlelight ceremony on Christmas at the church, located on the corner of DeWitt and Cutler roads.

When completed, the church will seat 370 on the main floor and 50 on the balcony. It was also have additional classroom space and a new vestibule.

Expansion was created by the church's growth. Hughes said his congregation numbers about 200 now.

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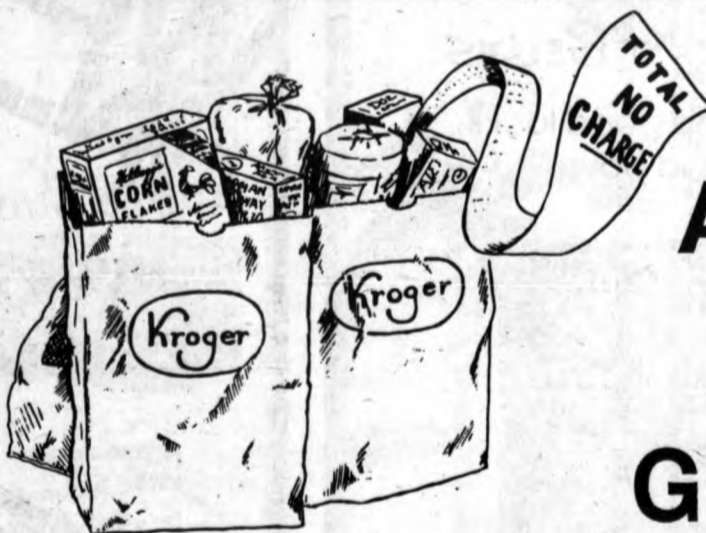

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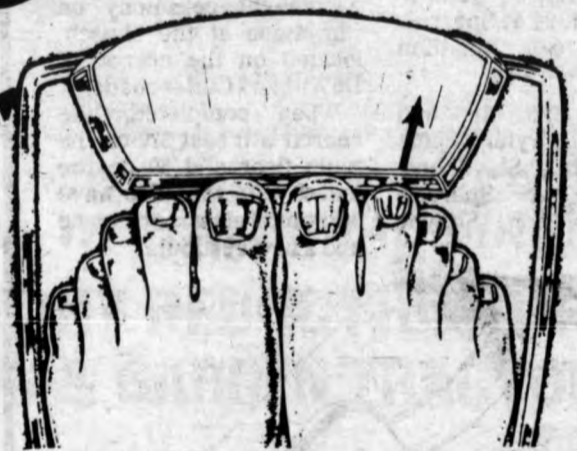
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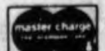
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DeWitt Township approves police pact

Effective October 17, 1983, the DeWitt Township Police Department will begin a new work schedule as a result of action recently taken by the DeWitt Township Board.

By a 4-3 vote at its last regular meeting on Monday, Sept. 26, the board approved a letter of agreement between DeWitt Charter Township and the Fraternal Order of Police, State of Michigan Lodge which represented the local law officers. Members dissenting were Clerk Gregory Whitlock, Treasurer Alta Reed and Trustee Charles Rademacher.

In dissenting, Whitlock told the board "I think we've gone to a very great expense to come up with this agreement * not that I think its (the cost) unnecessary. But I think this particular schedule goes beyond the present contract the police are working under, and I don't think it should be approved."

The agreement puts township police officers on a four-day, 10 hour schedule as opposed to their previous five-day, eight hour system.

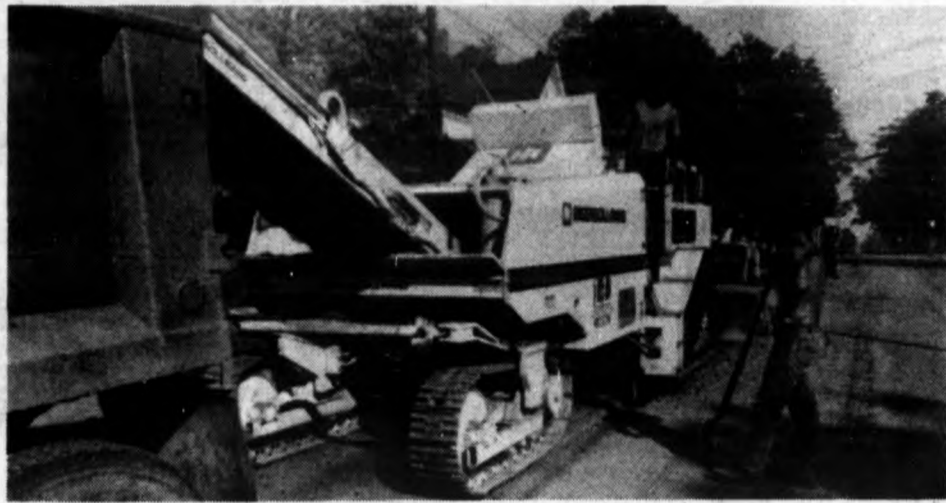
Township Services Coordinator Tom Woodruff noted that the agreement automatically changes the

time allowed officers for vacation, sick leave, personal days and bereavement.

Sick leave, personal days and bereavement time increased by a similar ratio.

The board's intent in initially agreeing to consider a change in scheduling, explained Whitlock, was to eliminate scheduled overtime. That, he said, has been accomplished. He noted, however, that overtime may still be necessary in certain situations.

Under the previous agreement, officers earned five days of vacation time for each six months on the job, 10 days for one year's duty and 15 days for up to five years of service. The recently approved agreement gives officers 45 hours of vacation time for six months, 90 hours per year and 135 hours for up to five years, based on the 10-hour schedule. The new schedule results in an increase of one day's vacation time per year.

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Hospice

A concept of care

What does the word hospice mean to you?

Unless you are personally involved with one, chances are you might have some misconceptions about it — that according to coordinators of the Hospice for Clinton County, based out of the Clinton Memorial Hospital Home Health Services.

"These misunderstandings really dishearten us," says Home Health Services Nurse Coordinator Michelle Wiseman, who together with Hospice Head Nurse Jan Gramlich, outlined the functions and some of the most common misconceptions they've encountered since the program started in November of last year.

They described hospice as a concept of care and not necessarily a place or person.

Hospice for Clinton County is primarily a home-based hospice which allows the terminally ill person to spend his remaining life in familiar home surroundings. A team concept is involved with physicians, nurses, and other personnel from Clinton Memorial Hospital providing their professional skills and volunteers and clergy providing support for all involved.

"When hospice comes, they're (the patient-family) looking for someone to stay 24 hours to care for the patient," Gramlich said. "That is not what we do. We provide support for family members to care for their loved ones. The care of the patient rests on the family.

"We will never take over the care," she added. "We want the family and the patient to remain in control of their lives and we will give support and guidance."

It's more of a philosophy of care and individual-type of sharing to help families meet their destiny, Wiseman said.

One of the major components of this support team is the volunteers. Volunteers are people, the majority of them having fulltime jobs, who will spend from a half hour to four or six hours a week with the patient-family. The time spent depends on each family's needs.

Both Gramlich and Wiseman hope these misconceptions about the hospice program are not holding people back from volunteering.

As of January of this year, the Hospice for Clinton County has served 23 family units with 18 lay volunteers trained to do the work. Eventually, Gramlich says, they would like to be able to place two volunteers to a family unit.

The program is currently training another 20 volunteers, but is always looking for more. Hospice for Clinton County plans to have another training session next Spring and continue them twice a year thereafter.

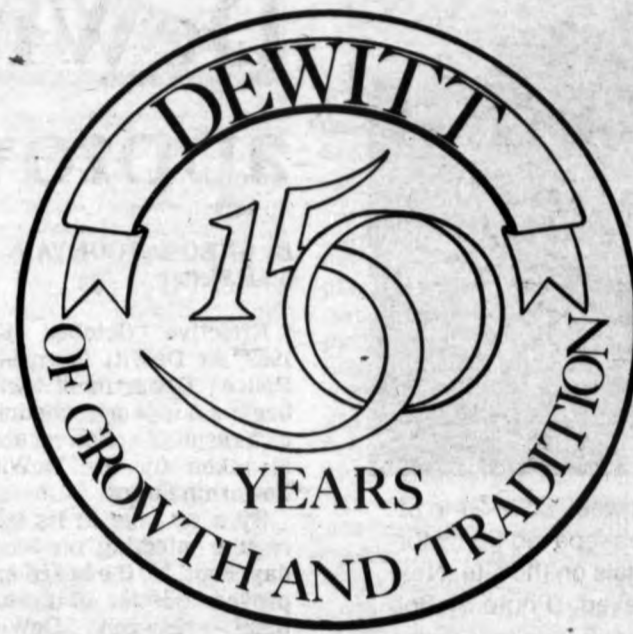
They ask for volunteers to commit for one year. The volunteer may continue after that, but Gramlich has found that the emotional draining the experience has on the volunteer often dictates some time off.

Since the hospice volunteers work with the terminally ill, there will come a time when their work will be very emotional. Working with the patient and family for any period of time will form special bonds between them. However, despite all the emotional risks and personal investment, Gramlich and Wiseman say working with the hospice is very rewarding.

"We are given a unique opportunity to share one of the most important times of a person's life," Wiseman explained. "Everyone thinks that birth is so special and so important, but when you come to think of it, death is really. And being able to share in the final moments of their life is not an opportunity given to everyone."

People interested in becoming involved with Hospice for Clinton County can contact either Gramlich or Wiseman through the Home Health Services of Clinton Memorial Hospital in St. Johns.

"Clinton County has been fantastic in their response to hospice," Gramlich said. "But it's an ongoing educational process — because nobody really looks at hospice until they have a need for one."



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MMB considers division setup

The move to add Lakewood and Greenville to the Mid-Michigan 'B' (MMB) Conference — seemingly at a dead end a month ago — is gaining momentum among conference officials.

Only one school — St. Johns — has expressed reluctance over the proposed eight-team, two-division alignment. Other athletic directors and principals contacted by The County News have not objected to the two schools entering the MMB.

The plan, as discussed at a conference meeting in St. Johns Wednesday, Sept. 21, would call for two four-team divisions for the 1984-1985 school year. A final vote on the issue, which would require five yes votes for passage, will probably come at next Wednesday's 9 a.m. conference meeting at Chef's Cafe, St. Johns.

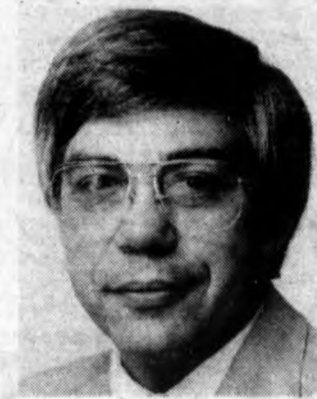
While conference athletic directors and principals took no formal action at the Sept. 21 meeting, executive secretary Gary Swinehart of Ionia was authorized to include Lakewood and Greenville in a mock schedule. The schedule will be presented to conference officials Oct. 12 to help them decide on the issue.

Lakewood and Greenville, members of the disbanding Tri-River League, originally hoped to make the MMB into an eight-team conference. But opposition from Chesaning and Corunna because of long travel distances caused the switch to a divisional emphasis.

Under the plan being discussed, MMB teams would be split into West and East divisions. The West division would include Chesaning, Corunna and Ovid-Elsie, while the East division would have Ionia, Lakewood and Greenville. Either St. Johns or Alma could fit into either division, league officials said.

St. Johns athletic director Steve Bakita said he is not enthused about being put into the West division. St. Johns would have twice as many miles to travel if it was in the West division rather than the East, Bakita said.

St. Johns athletic director Steve Bakita is wary of a divisional format in the Mid-Michigan 'B' Conference if his school is placed into a West Division.



"We're not completely sold on it," said Bakita of the divisional format if St. Johns is placed in the West Division. "Our preference is to keep it one division, eight teams."

Alma principal Don Miller cautiously worded his position on adopting a divisional format.

"We are not opposed to an expansion of the league," Miller said. "We are not opposed to Lakewood and Greenville being in the league, because we've played them before."

But Miller is opposed to Bakita's stance on mileage. He said the conference should look at other factors, such as enrollment, if schools are placed in divisions.

"I don't think transportation should be the biggest concern, though it is a concern," Miller said.

Enrollment figures presented at the Sept. 21 meeting showed St. Johns at 1,240, Ionia at 1,001, Chesaning at 980, Greenville at 964, Corunna at 910, Alma at 857, Lakewood at 832 and Ovid-Elsie at 666.

Chesaning athletic director Don Flory, whose school is 80 miles from Lakewood and 61 from Greenville, said he came to the Sept. 21 meeting with skepticism. He was not excited about Lakewood and Greenville joining the

conference, but his attitude changed when he heard about the divisional concept.

"I'm a little more optimistic now that it will come about," Flory said. "I'm not committed yet, but I'm open to the possibility of it."

Flory expressed the sentiments of other athletic directors who said the move could serve as a stepping stone for future league growth. He said the eight-team, two-division format could lead to a 12-team, two-division alignment down the road.

"If we're ever going to grow, I think we're going to have to grow in divisions," Flory said.

Corunna athletic director Jim Duffield, who earlier said that travel distances would prevent his school from voting Lakewood and Greenville into the conference, is also impressed by the divisional concept proposal.

"We would like it as a stepping stone (to 12 schools)," Duffield said.

Bakita offered the counterpoint to that opinion. "I'm not sure that improves us much more than we are," he said. "You'd still be in a six-team league, for all practical purposes."

"I'm not totally sold on divisional play at this point. I'm not sure what it would do to rivalries (if St. Johns is in the West Division)."

But Ionia athletic director Charles Kohloff called it a good idea. "The key to the whole thing," Kohloff said, "is if equitable scheduling can be worked out in a divisional structure."

Kohloff also squelched rumors that Ionia would attempt to pull out of the MMB if conference schools did not vote to admit Lakewood and Greenville. "We've been real happy with our association with the Mid-Michigan 'B'," Kohloff said.

Ovid-Elsie athletic director Bob Foreback said the issue would probably be decided by a vote at the Oct. 12 meeting. Voicing a role of neutrality, Foreback said he would probably vote in accordance with the mood of the other conference schools.

Fowler passes, runs to victory

Fowler has one word on its mind this week as winless Potterville comes to town.

"We'll definitely gear for the pass because that's what they like to do," Fowler coach Steve Spicer said. Fowler passed and ran past Laingsburg in a tough

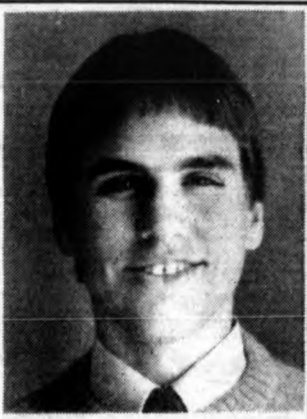

"Nothing in the CMAC surprises me this year," Spicer said. "As a rule, you're going to see close ballgames. You can't let down against Potterville."

Eagles in line for state playoffs?

Portland, 3-1, Maple Valley, 3-1, Portland St. Patrick, 3-1, and Laingsburg, 3-1.

When it comes to making the playoffs, those wins are crucial. Fowler will pick up eight bonus points for every victory by one of the opponents it defeats.

Another aspect that favors Fowler is the playoff system's extra points for defeating teams higher than your class. For every Class C school Fowler beats, it gets 48 points, compared with 32 for beating a Class D team. Five Class C teams dot Fowler's schedule.

One final plus is Portland, Fowler's last opponent. The Red Raiders are a Class B team, and Fowler could earn 64 points with a victory to close out the season.

If Fowler goes 9-0, and those six opponents finish with winning records, it will be very difficult to keep the Eagles out of the playoffs. But it wouldn't be impossible.

Blame it on Mendon and Gobles. They aren't a law firm from West Bloomfield. They are the No. 1 and No. 2 ranked Class D teams in the state.

Both are undefeated, and both are in Fowler's playoff region. That would be no problem, except that only two teams qualify from each region into the state playoffs. Reality can be harsh, so let's consider this — because of Mendon and Gobles, Fowler might not qualify for the playoffs even if it has a perfect season.

Spicer tells everyone who asks him that he does not talk about the playoffs when establishing team goals. He's well aware of the system's potential to break an unbeaten team's heart.

I commend his approach to shoot for team improvement and the conference championship as priorities. He doesn't coach for the playoffs — he simply takes a berth if the system gives him one.

But don't be surprised if folks in Fowler start cheering for victories by Portland, Genesee and Maple Valley in the weeks to come. I suspect even Spicer himself will be peeking at the scores.

Ask Fowler coach Steve Spicer about his team's No. 6 ranking in the Class D Associated Press poll and he will brush it off.

It's almost impossible to rank teams with fairness, he will say, so it's easy for pollsters to base their choices on reputation. After two girls' state track titles and a 1980 trip to the Pontiac Silverdome to play for the state Class D football crown, Fowler's reputation has definitely been established.

Spicer's opinion of polls makes sense. They are, indeed, ridiculous. But facts are facts. Fowler is ranked sixth in the state, and I wouldn't doubt that the team is among the state's ten finest in Class D. But the bottom line to all of this fuss is that the Eagles are 4-0. Five games separate them from a perfect season.

The thought of qualifying for the Class D state playoffs has undoubtedly crossed the minds of Eagle fans. Though Fowler has five tough games remaining, the opportunity is definitely real — perhaps more than Fowler fans realize.

Consider this. Six of Fowler's past and future opponents on this year's schedule are sitting with winning records. They are Fulton, 4-0, Genesee, 3-1,

DeWitt vs. Mason: Mason's Pete Hanover is one of the area's finest quarterbacks and his team must win to keep pace with Lansing Catholic Central in the Capital Circuit. Logic says to pick Mason, but coach Gail Thornton's switch to the two-platoon system could help DeWitt's offense break loose. DeWitt 18, Mason 14.

Redwings face Marauders in big MMB test

One thing seems certain about this year's St. Johns-Ovid-Elsie game.

If the coaches are correct, Friday's matchup on the St. Johns field won't be a blowout.

"They've got the best team I've seen over there in 10 years," St. Johns coach Joe Gonzales said.

Ovid-Elsie coach Russ Pope, whose team carries a somewhat surprising 3-1 record, is concerned about St.

Johns' size. However, he is confident in his team's abilities after last Friday's 14-0 blanking of Corunna.

"We've got to have some quickness by our linebackers to back us up," Pope said, referring to St. Johns' strategy of running the ball straight ahead. "They're just going to keep pounding and pounding and pounding into you."

"I think I've got a better chance this year than I have in a long time of beating them."

The last time Ovid-Elsie beat St. Johns was 1977, when the Marauders won, 12-0, in coach Mark O'Donnell's last game, Pope said.

St. Johns warmed up for the battle by scoring on its first four possessions to pound Ionia, 27-7. Swingback Chris Loucks ran for two touchdowns on reverses and Chad Munger and Brub Zamarron scored the other touchdowns on short runs.

Ovid-Elsie, meanwhile, scored two touchdowns in the first four minutes to trip Corunna for the first time since 1978. Quarterback Mark Schneider passed for touchdowns to Dan Fox and Marcel Hirschegger.

St. Johns is coming into the game relatively healthy, but Ovid-Elsie has some bumps and bruises. Halfback Scott Gardner (hip pointer), Fox (bruised shoulder) and back Scott Winans (neck) could miss parts of the game. But quarterback Mark Schneider, who was kicked in the shin in the third quarter of the Corunna game, is back at full strength, Pope said.

The game should help determine who has an inside

track on the league championship. St. Johns is tied with Chesaning at 2-0, while O-E looms at 1-1.

"I really think Corunna is a better team than Chesaning," said Pope. "They were a super hitting team. I don't think Chesaning will stay undefeated in our league."

Meanwhile, at Pewamo-Westphalia, the Pirates lost their third game when Fulton scored a touchdown in the final two minutes of the game. Fulton won, 6-3, on a quarterback sneak with 1:34 left.

The loss dropped P-W to 1-3, and 0-2 in the Central Michigan Athletic Conference, which practically eliminates the team from the title chase.

After winning two straight championships, P-W is not accustomed to the spoiler's role it now finds itself in. But coach Mike Folk isn't hoisting the white flag.

"I don't think we're going to pull up and quit just because we're no longer in the title chase," Folk said. "We've got some things to look forward to."

One of those things is this week's game at Portland St. Patrick. Folk hopes to see his offense get untracked against St. Patrick after scoring only one touchdown in four games.

Quarterback Kris Werner strung three good pass plays together in a drive against Fulton. He completed a 25-yard pass to Joe Trierweiler, a 12-yarder to Tom Schafer and a 15-yarder to Jon Thelen. That moved the ball into position for a 25-yard Ron Schafer field goal.

Homecoming arrives this week as we prepare to face a potent Ovid-Elsie offense in what could turn out to be a key conference game.

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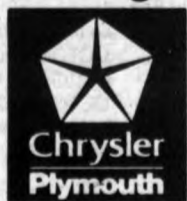
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Bath tops Dansville, 39-33, for season's first win

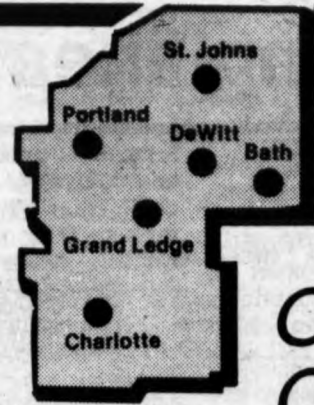
