Commission likes study's new plans

The move to realign municipal office space took a step forward Tuesday night, however so slightly.

The far-ranging decision to move the St. Johns Fire Department to the Public Safety Department site and reapportion the vacated space to the rest of the remaining city offices was discussed by the St. Johns City Commission.

The commission went over a preliminary feasibility study drawn up by the architectural firm of Granger Associates Inc. of Flint, discussing how the space would be divided and shared between the city offices, library, and Chamber of Commerce.

The entire study, however, was conducted on the presumption that the fire department was relocated and combined with the city's Public Safety Department two blocks away. And that idea is still a few years down the road and still the city's first priority.

The study calls for the city offices staying where they are, yet expanding into the main floor of the current library. The library would have all of the basement, except for the expanded Chamber of Commerce office, and the area vacated by the fire department.

Despite some questions about the scattered areas of the proposed new library, Mayor John Arehart described the study as providing a "Very functional and attractive layout."

"It gives us a direction to point in," Arehart went on. "We can build and expand the library, almost tripling the size of the library, and make the offices more functional and efficient, than if we had to go out and purchase a building for a library."

The city commission was also updated on the status of the city's sanitary sewer maintenance program.

A smoke testing of the city sewers last fall found 106 individual areas where some form of water was finding its way into the sewer system. Seventy-four were within the city's right of way and the other 32 were on private property.

City Engineer Doug Weir told the commission all but four of the 74 to be corrected will be done by this fall.

Of the 32, Weir said letters have been sent to the individual property owners advising them to correct their situation. So

far, the city has received responses by 15 which had indicated some sort of timetable of correction.

But overall, according to Weir, they have made progress in problem areas they've identified. Yet he qualified that by saying there may be some problems that didn't show up in the initial smoke detection and he may have to do additional testing this winter.

The city commission followed by opting to retain the two-hour Trick or Treat schedule for Halloween this year, contrary to the wishes of the Police Chief Lyle French.

French requested the city commission, in the interest of pedestrian safety, to reduce the time from 6-8 p.m. to 6-7:30 p.m.

Past observation, the chief relayed, indicates that during the last half hour of the event, vehicle traffic increases substantially. He felt that an hour and a half affords the children of St. Johns sufficient time to visit neighborhood residents and return home prior to the influx of traffic.

Commissioner Tom Wiseman responded by saying, "In taking the kids back and forth across town to visit relatives or what have you, an hour and half is over before you know it. I think we should keep the two hours as it is."

Taxpayers tell County: "Don't increase rates"

Several Clinton County residents would rather not see their tax rate increased and attended the special Truth in Taxation Meeting by the Clinton County Board of Commissioners Tuesday morning to say so.

The Board of Commissioners is proposing to increase the county's millage rate by .6605 mills for 1983, which would bring the county to the highest allowable millage rate it can levy — 5.800 mills.

That increase would increase county revenues by nearly \$375,000, a majority of

that, according to the board is targeted for an increase in salaries for county employees.

Thomas Woodruff, an administrator from DeWitt Township, told the commissioners that since they are trying to hold down taxes at the township level, the board should try to hold them down at the county level as well.

"We can control our taxes," Woodruff said, "but not the county's. I know the county is able to make budget cuts like we've had to. You can try to get by with less than the .6605 increase."

Bob Serrine of St. Johns wondered to the board if this truth in taxation meeting wasn't going to be like all the others where things are said by the citizens then forgotten or not taken into consideration when decision time comes.

Serrine said, "It's awfully easy to spend somebody else's money. Rather than raising taxes, try cutting back."

"The last five years your limits, percentage-wise, have not been changed. But my assessment has been raised. I guess if you don't raise the (tax) rate here, you'll just raise my assessment anyway."

In response to the outcry from the citizens present, Board Chairman Roger Overway said he didn't think the board would levy the rate to the 5.8 mill level, but the county will still need more than the 5.1 mill levy it currently has.

"We're at the point now where the amount of money coming in is not enough to meet the proposed county budget," Overway explained. "We could either raise taxes or cut the budget or both. We'll probably do both. I don't think we'll levy the full amount, but we need additional money over last year."

The proposed budget has not increased that much, Overway said, only eight per cent — and the county is not getting anywhere near that from its property taxes.

Commissioner Richard Hawks added during the meeting that not only does the county need the additional revenue for the increase in employee salaries, but for other projects the county has going.

"We're putting over \$600,000 into the renovation of our jail to meet state requirements, but we're also spending \$60,000 to \$70,000 to board prisoners in other jails (because of the overcrowding)," Hawks remarked.

"If we went to nothing but a lock-up, then we would not be able to have a road patrol. They'd spend all their time transporting prisoners back and forth to the other jails."

The decision on the millage increase will be decided at the next Board of Commissioners meeting Oct. 27.

In similar action, the commissioners accepted the millage rates of the other taxing districts — the townships, cities, drain assessments, special assessment districts, and lighting districts — and will also authorize them at the Oct. 27 meeting.

One township has yet to submit its millage rate. That is Watertown Township. It has been embattled in a budget as well as a millage controversy.

Barbara Boughton, a leading campaigner against a millage increase in Watertown Township, came before the Board of Commissioners Tuesday morning and requested that it not allow the township government to levy the added

DeWitt men injured near Elk Rapids

Two DeWitt men, St. Johns natives, were injured in a one-car accident Sunday morning in Antrim County. Sheriff's deputies there say a car driven by Brian O'Shaughnessey, 20, of 3330 Lehman, DeWitt apparently fell asleep at the wheel of his car while driving along North Bay Shore Drive near Elk Rapids around 2:30 a.m.

Officials say the car travelled 372 feet off the road before striking a tree. O'Shaughnessey and a passenger, Jeff Pioszak, 20, of 505 Highah St., DeWitt, were taken to St. Joseph Hospital in Traverse City. Pioszak was then transferred to Traverse City Osteopathic Hospital. Both men were listed in fair condition. The accident remains under investigation.

A DeWitt native was killed in an unusual accident early Saturday morning in Gratiot County. Sheriff's department authorities there say Gary Becker, 29, 6333 Wilson Rd., Perrinton, was killed when he was run over by a car while he was jogging.

The driver of the car, Dennis Anderson, 38, of Perrinton told officers that it was dark and rainy at the time, approximately 6:30 a.m., when he saw the victim walking on the south side of Wilson Road.

Anderson stated he drove to the north side of the road to avoid the person and was some 20 feet from him when he dove in front of the car. Anderson said he could not stop in time to avoid hitting the man and ran over him. Becker was pronounced dead at the scene.

The accident remains under investigation.

DeWitt Township police are investigating the armed robbery of Domino's Pizza, 3606 Northeast St., on Oct. 4 around 11 p.m. A lone white male, 25-30 years old, 5'8", medium build with reddish blond hair and a full red beard entered the store showing a semi-automatic pistol and demanded all the cash from the lone clerk on duty. He fled the scene on foot, running across U.S. 27 into a residential area with an undetermined amount of money, but well over \$100.

Police Capt. Larry Jones believes this robbery ties in with the rash of robberies not only in the DeWitt area but the tri-county area as well. It was the third such armed robbery in DeWitt Township in the past two weeks.

DeWitt Township also reported the arrest of a Lansing woman on Oct. 5 which led to the destruction of one of their police cars.

Marie Orozco, 38, of Lansing was stopped for suspicion of drunk driving at Northeast and Wielend Rds. When she got out of her car she reportedly became very abusive to Officer Andy Lindeman. Upon being arrested and put into the squad car, Orozco began kicking at the screen and windows of the back seat.

She was successful in kicking out the dividing plexiglass window between the front and back seat. She is being charged with malicious destruction to police property and drunk driving.

A DeWitt man was robbed of his wallet and about \$50 in cash after he was at-

tacked by three men early Saturday morning. Lansing Police say Gary Ridder, 31, was leaving the Green Door Lounge, 2005 E. Michigan, at 12:30 Saturday morning, when he was attacked from behind by three men who clubbed him over the head and took his wallet.

Ridder was treated for head lacerations at a local hospital and released. Police have no suspects at this time.

An altercation at DeWitt High School caused over \$200 in damage but no injuries last week. DeWitt Police report Garrick Puffer, 18, of Sage Lane, DeWitt came to the school to see a student there. A fight ensued and both Puffer and the other student went through a large plate glass window valued over \$200. The men suffered minor cuts and bruises, but no medical attention was necessary. Puffer was charged with assault and battery and malicious destruction to property over \$100. His case is pending review and authorization by the Clinton County Prosecutor's Office.

The Clinton County Sheriff's Department is working on a possible robbery that occurred by Sleepy Hollow State Park on Oct. 9.

Brian Ellsworth of Grant, and a friend, Brenda Jacobs of Edmore, were hitch hiking to Lansing. Ellsworth told authorities that they were picked up near Alma by two white males in a full size vehicle. They were driven to the Sleep Hollow State Park area where one subject pulled a gun on the two and demanded money. Several threats were made to the victims and some money was given over to the suspect. The victims were also forced to perform

some sexual acts. The case remains under investigation.

The Highland Hills Golf Course was reportedly broken into on Oct. 2. A rear window was broken out of a building and several bottles of liquor were taken. Missing were some bottles of whiskey, rum and schnapps. A total of 16 bottles were taken. It remains under investigation.

The Clinton County Sheriff's Department made a total of 25 arrests for the week, nine of the arrests were for drunk driving.

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Garrett deserves needed support

A 4-3 vote from any governing body barely constitutes a vote of confidence. However, Monday's action by the DeWitt School Board to extend superintendent Steve Garrett's contract through 1985 is a step in the right direction for a school district which hasn't been famous for cooperation.

Residents spoke out against extending the contract, but they brought out nothing to convict Garrett of any wrongdoing. One woman objected to his lack of strong leadership, but no one produced evidence to back up that claim or any other against the superintendent.

Board vice president Dick Smeage, one of the dissenters, made the strongest attack on Garrett. Smeage said his personal standards, beliefs and ethics forced him to vote against extending Garrett's contract.

When we asked him to elaborate on that statement, he refused, leaving much to imagination of our readers as to the scope of his comments.

We believe that Smeage's statement is worthy of consideration. If, indeed, the superintendent has done something contrary to sound ethics, than the district should consider firing him. But if he hasn't, then Garrett deserves a vote of confidence from the community.

Getting rid of Garrett would hardly improve DeWitt's image as a problem area for superintendents. Before he was hired in 1980, the district ran through four school heads in the short span of two years. As one citizen astutely mentioned Monday night, DeWitt can scarcely afford another switch in superintendents — especially if no one has a solid reason for wanting Garrett out.

Before anyone convicts the superintendent of any crimes, we'd like to see more than a verbal tirade. How about a fair trial?

City officials transplant tree to court house lawn

City officials decided to transplant a Christmas tree to the Court House lawn between the curb and walk at the head of Clinton Avenue in the hopes of replacing the new tree put up each year for holiday decorations marking the opening of the Christmas shopping season.

The tree, a typical Christmas type, was procured by Police Chief Everett Glazier from the evergreen forest near Corunna, last week, at a cost of \$20. It is 25 feet tall, a white spruce with long lower branches tapering symmetrically to the top.

City employees dug a huge hole to receive the tree's long roots. "Slim" Weaver helped as the tree was placed in the excavation.

Coffee roaster gives residents chance to buy fresh coffee

St. Johns residents are being given the opportunity of buying coffee that is roasted fresh every day, such as cities have the advantage of obtaining from a coffee ranch, as Fred C. Burk has this week installed a new Watkins coffee roaster.

The roaster is an electrical appliance which is heated by gas. It will hold 50 pounds of coffee at one time and requires only one hour to roast it. Burk will handle several grades of green coffee which they will roast and sell. They will also handle green peanuts which will be roasted fresh every day.

The new equipment is located in the front left hand side of the grocery department and plans are being made to make that side into a separate department handling the coffee, teas, etc.

Watertown Township: Troubles still

The state of confusion continues in Watertown Township as a Truth in Taxation meeting last Thursday brought up more questions than answers.

Initially designed to inform the public the township may be raising its property taxes to the allowable five mills, a group of concerned citizens, spearheaded by Barbara Boughton, exposed the fact that there were many discrepancies in the recently designed proposed budget.

The group contends there is more money in the township's surplus fund than what appears in black and white, and because of the accounting error, there is no need for a tax increase.

The township board, however, wants to be able to cover itself by carrying between \$60,000-\$70,000 in the surplus fund — which it would more than have if Boughton's figures are correct.

The board wants to levy five mills so it will have three mills to work with. Two of the five mills will automatically go to the payment of a general obligation debt to Clinton County for the township's sewer project.

And it's been that sewer project that is hanging like an albatross around the neck of the township board.

Analysis

When the two-mill levy was assessed in 1982, it was believed to be a bond debt. When in reality, it was a general obligation debt to the county.

By that fact, the two-mill levy qualified to be rolled back by virtue of the Headlee Amendment — yet never was — resulting in the township residents paying more taxes than they should have.

According to tax figures, township residents paid \$76,946.17 too much because of the mistake.

The township board, on the advise of township attorney Richard Robinson, wants to credit property owners for their overage on last year's tax bills to this year's bills. That credit would be equivalent to 1.4916 mills.

However, many of the township residents, for various reasons, would rather have the overage returned to

them and not given as a credit.

That would force the township to dole out the \$76,946.17 in cash, out of the surplus fund. That kind of money, according to current budget reports, would not leave much, if anything, in that fund. And that is another reason why the board would like to see the levy raised to five mills.

That is where Boughton stepped in and revealed the errors in the proposed budget, saying the surplus fund is healthier than the board realizes, and therefore, need not fear any shortfall.

To make matters worse than they already were at that time, the township treasurer, Ted Carlson, was not present at the meeting to try and answer the discrepancies in the proposed budget.

No one was thus qualified to find an answer to the questions brought forth by Boughton and the other dozen or so concerned citizens present.

Those answers, hopefully, were to be answered at the township's regularly scheduled meeting Tuesday night or at a special meeting on Oct. 17.

But until then, it seems the head-shaking over Watertown Township government continues with a lot of questions to be answered and, according to Barbara Boughton, a lot of rectifying to be done.

millage it seeks because the township has violated five separate areas of the Watertown Township Charter Act and other mandated laws.

She said these violations regarding financial accounting directly effects the township's credibility in making an informed assessment of its own millage needs.

The violations include:

- No quarterly report has ever been produced since the township was chartered.
- An annual budget has never been itemized with a written explanation of increases and decreases.
- The actual proposed 1984 budget discussed at the public hearing was not available to the public before the meeting.
- No Public hearing was held to discuss the use of Federal Revenue Sharing funds before a transfer to the General Fund for the township's roads.
- And, the commingling of sewer funds and general funds until 1983.

For these reasons, and the fact that the

township will be storing a balance of \$248,193 in its General Fund at the end of the year, Boughton requested that the Board of Commissioners not allow Watertown Township to increase its millage rate to five mills.

The Watertown Township attorney, Richard Robinson, then addressed the board and said that the Board of Commissioners faces only one issue and that is, "This year the fact is that Watertown Township is allowed to levy five mills."

"Your consideration," Robinson told the commissioners, "is to decide whether the township has conducted a legal, authorized increase to levy five mills."

He told the board that the problems facing Watertown Township, they're trying to solve on a township-wide basis; and should not concern the county.

Boughton later replied that, "It is the responsibility of the board to help the taxpayers and act as a check and balance for the townships."

Watertown Township must still get its millage request into the county in order for it to be authorized at the Oct. 27 meeting.

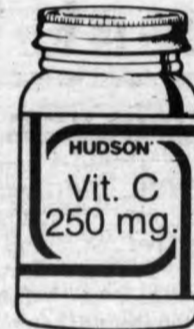

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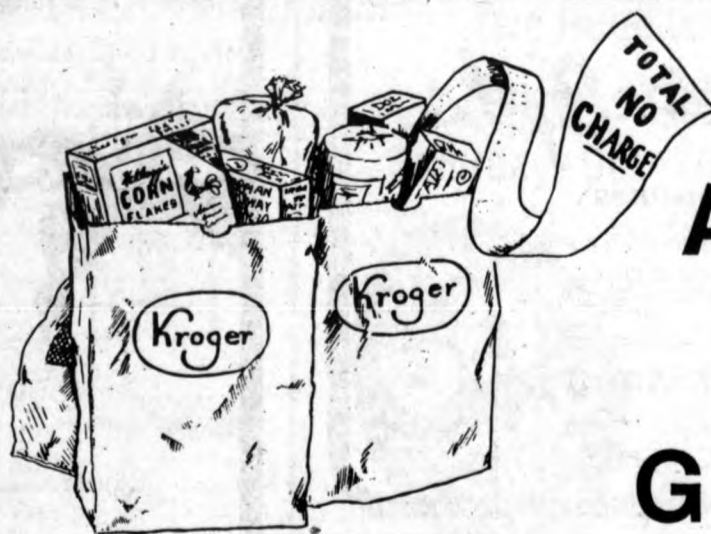

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St. Johns pro-lifers rally

An estimated 375 local residents took an active part in the second largest rally in the history of Michigan which was held at the state capitol recently.

Approximately 200 pro-life advocates from St. Johns attended as well as 100 from Fowler and 75 from the Pewamo-Westphalia area.

The aim of the "Say Yes For Life Rally" was to show elected state officials Medicaid funding of abortions is deeply opposed by many. The total count of those attending the rally was estimated at over 4,000.

Right to Life of St. Johns President Angie Iocco says she feels the turnout was excellent.

"I think the latest medical breakthroughs allowing unborn babies to be operated on has helped us a lot," she said. "It forces us to look at the issues of fetal distress and

pain, and how ferociously an unborn baby will fight for his or her right to live."

Many of the area churches sent representatives. Among them were First Baptist, St. Joseph Catholic, Holy Trinity, Grove Bible, and First Church of God.

At the rally, large barrels were on hand from Operation Stork, an organization dedicated to helping mothers in need of baby goods.

Leona Karber, secretary of St. Johns Right to Life, explained, "This gives us a chance to show our concern for the well-being of the mother and child. And Operation Stork has been a big help to mothers from our St. Johns area in the past. We support them all we can."

Two sixth graders representing the St. Joseph Catholic School showed their concern for life when they presented Operation Stork a check resulting

from a voluntary school project aimed at helping those in need.

Presenting the check at the rally were Claudia Perez, daughter of Dr. Ceneca and Chita Perez; and Nicole Lodico, daughter of Peter and Sandy Lodico.

Iocco said last year \$5.7 million in taxpayer money was handed out to abortionists to account for some 19,400 abortions in 1982. Michigan remains one of only 14 states where tax dollars continue to fund non-therapeutic abortions.

"In the past, bills opposing Medicaid funding have past both the state house and senate only to be vetoed later by the governor," she said. "This year, if Governor Blanchard vetoes the bill, as he has promised he will do, we hope we can muster the two-thirds majority of the house and senate we need to override his veto power."

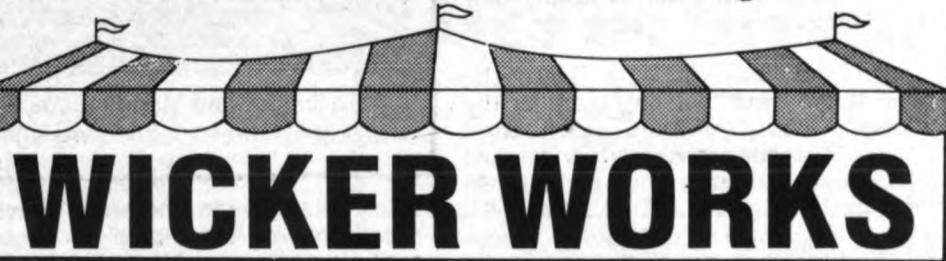

Titles tantalize county schools

St. Johns tests 4-1 Chesaning

St. Johns coach Joe Gonzales doesn't look like Bo Schembechler, but he talks like the Michigan football coach when it comes to winning championships.

Like Schembechler, Gonzales realizes that championship teams are usually the ones who play the best defense. And that is precisely why he is concerned heading into Friday's Mid-Michigan 'B' Conference showdown with Chesaning.

While St. Johns has been piling up points en route to three consecutive conference victories, the Redwings have also been yielding yardage in huge chunks.

In previous years, Gonzales said his teams have usually allowed around 100 yards total offense per game. This year, opponents have averaged over 200 yards against the Redwing defenders.

Ovid-Elsie gained 294 against St. Johns last week, despite losing by the lopsided score of 35-12. Jon Martin reeled off 165 of those yards on only 13 carries.

"We'll have to play better defense to win," said Gonzales of tomorrow's game.

Chesaning, 4-1, is also 3-0 in the conference and will be trying to avenge a 22-0 loss to St. Johns last year. St. Johns will be trying to secure back-to-back conference football championships for the first time as a member of the MMB.

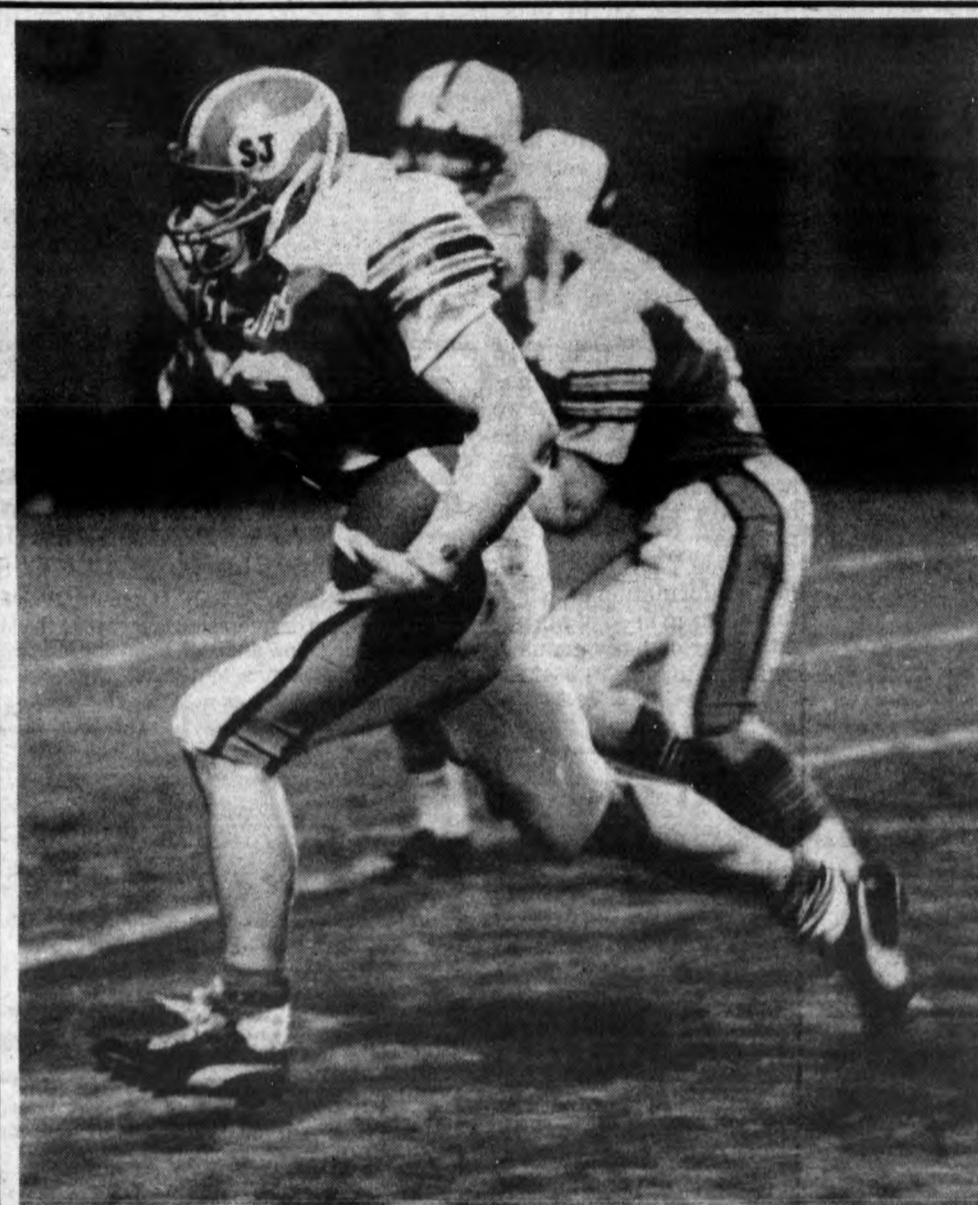
The Redwings are also trying to duplicate last year's feat of losing their first two games and winning the final seven.

"St. Johns has probably shown the most improvement of any team in the league," said Ovid-Elsie coach Russ Pope, a St. Johns native who has watched every Redwing game when replayed on local cable television. "That's what you want to see in high school football. I think by the time they get to the end of the season, they'll be as good as they were last year."

Pope's team lost to Chesaning earlier this season, 21-12. Based on what he's observed, the O-E coach rates St. Johns as a slight favorite.

"St. Johns has much better backs," Pope said. "I feel St. Johns can win it with ball control. Chesaning can win it with big plays."

Chesaning's offense is well balanced, with 6-foot-3 junior Rob Stewart calling the signals. Mike Greenfelder, a 205-pound running back, and fullback Jeff Budd carry the ball often in Chesaning's trap-oriented offense. Two of Greenfelder's favorite targets are ends Dan Bitterman and Stuart Forsyth.

One intangible in Chesaning's favor is special teams. The Indians blocked two punts in a win over Alma, and St. Johns had two punts blocked against Ovid-Elsie.

But Gonzales is confident in his offense's ability to move the ball. In recent weeks, St. Johns has shown great versatility in the backfield with tailback Chad Munger running off tackle, upback Pat Makara running up the middle and swingback Chris Loucks running reverses.

Against Ovid-Elsie, quarterback Brian Bates showed good poise in finding Loucks on short routes. Often utilizing a rollout after a play-action fake, Bates found Loucks five times for 64 yards, including one touchdown.

Munger scored three touchdowns on runs and Loucks broke away for a 55-yard

score on a reverse to add sparkle to Homecoming. St. Johns officials estimated that the crowd was the biggest since 1975. Not counting Ovid-Elsie tickets and St. Johns season tickets, 2,182 tickets were sold, officials said.

Ovid-Elsie never could get its passing game untracked to mount a quick comeback after St. Johns scored on its first four offensive possessions. O-E completed one pass in four attempts for 32 yards.

"I wasn't going to throw into that wind," said Pope, referring to a strong southerly flow. "My kid's a floating type of passer. He doesn't fire it in."

O-E's quarterback, Mark Schneider, left the game in the third quarter after St. Johns' John Keenoy fell on his left foot. Pope said he expected Schneider back in time for Friday's game at Ionia.

Fowler travels to 5-0 Fulton

Fowler has played some tough opponents on the way to its 5-0 record and No. 6 ranking in the Associated Press Class D football poll this season.

But the toughest are yet to come, according to coach Steve Spicer.

"We'll play the four best teams on our schedule now," said Spicer, in reference to Fulton, Pewamo-Westphalia, Genesee and Portland.

First comes a Friday date at Fulton, which is also 5-0. At stake is a share of the Central Michigan Athletic Conference title.

Giles Feldpausch scored another time on a 20-yard run.

Bill Payne led the defense with 11 tackles, and Feldpausch and Simon had one interception apiece.

Fowler enters the game in good health, with the exception of tackle Bill Kohagen. He is bothered by a bruised rib and hadn't practice in 10 days as of this Tuesday.

Fowler enters the game ranked second in its Class D playoff region with 58 points. Waterford Our Lady of the Lakes leads the region with 66 points, and Gobles is third with 54. The top two teams in each region qualify for the state playoffs.

Correction: Last week, we reported that Mendon, the state's top-ranked team, is in Fowler's playoff region. Actually, Mendon is in a different region.

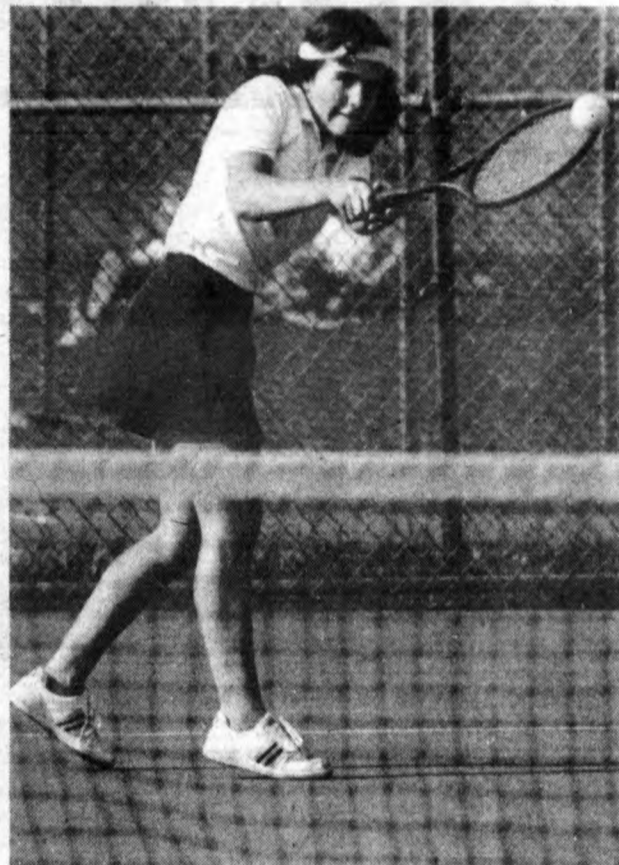
and Maria San Juan, who forfeited their championship match to Corunna.

St. Johns boys perfect in league

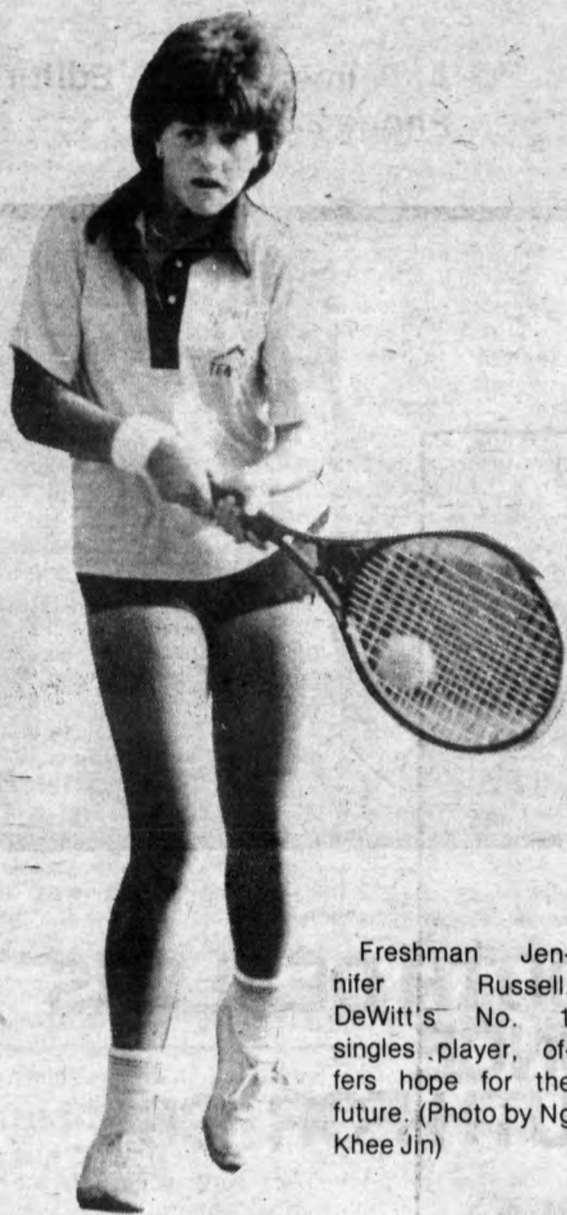
St. Johns stayed perfect in Mid-Michigan 'B' Conference cross country meets by whipping Chesaning last Tuesday, 19-39.

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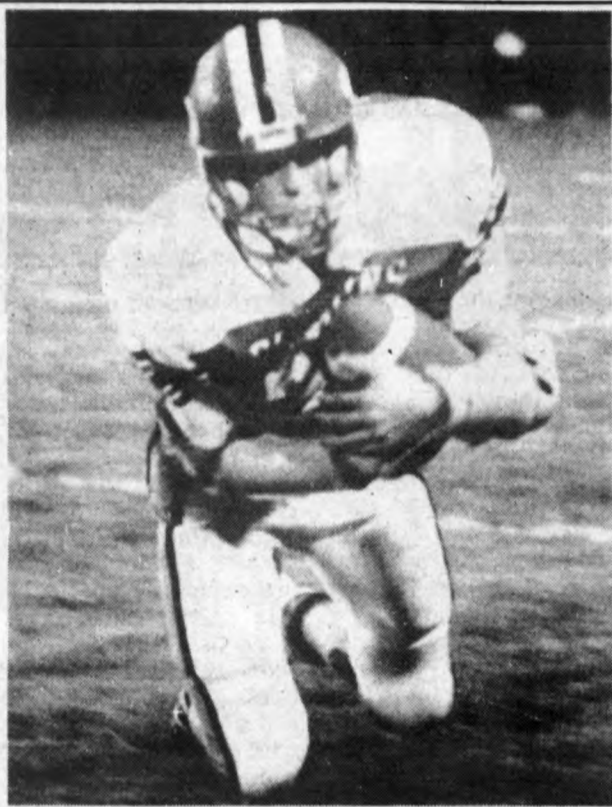

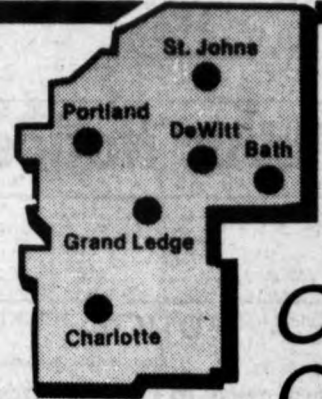

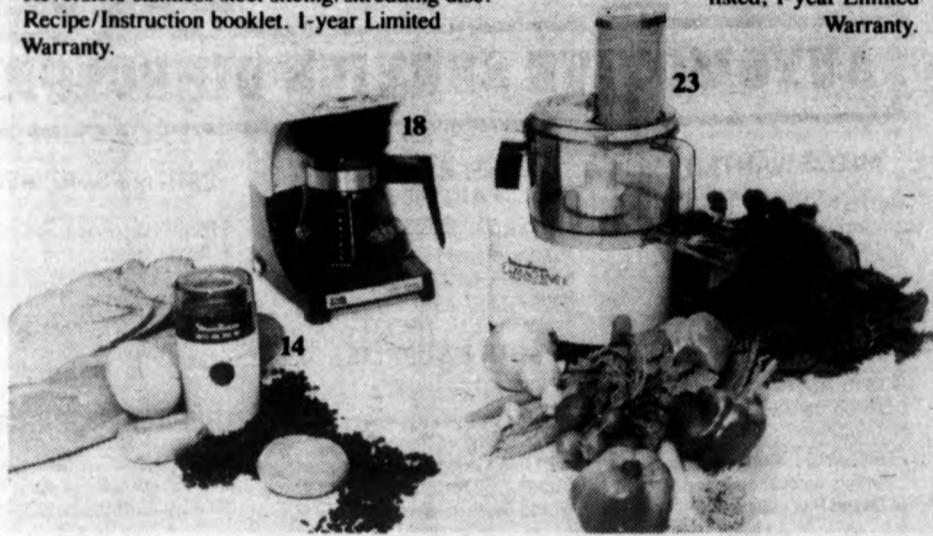
