## Audit shows city in good standing

St. Johns residents can rest assured that financially, their city is doing well.

City coffers have \$430,000 in the fund balance according to the annual audit presented to the city commission Monday night.

The city commission also learned the water fund is in good enough shape so as not to warrant an increase in the sewer and water rates.

The audit divulged there was only a one per cent increase in taxes over the past year, but the city suffered a three and a half per cent decline in revenue due to the shortfall in state revenues of some \$43,000.

But overall, the commission was told by accountant Dale Abraham, that the city of St. Johns is in just as good of condition as it was last year, if not better.

The commission also moved, on the recommen-

ation of city manager Randy Humphrey, not to petition the county drain commission to remove or repair a badly deteriorated storm drain along U.S. 27.

The commission felt it was not solely responsible for the condition of the drain which was used, at one time, as a farm crossing. The crossing has apparently not been used for a couple of years.

They did not leave out the possibility of looking at the situation again around budget time in the spring if others in that area would like to join the city in improving the condition of the drain.

The St. Johns Chamber of Commerce was given permission to conduct its annual holiday opening ceremonies on Friday, Nov. 25 and designated the downtown lighting to brighten the streets from 5

p.m. to 10 p.m. from Nov. 25 to Jan. 2.

The City Commission also passed resolutions commending Commissioners John Hannah and Donald Roesner for their long dedicated service to the city of St. Johns during their terms in office.

Both men are retiring from service on the commission and will not seek re-election on Nov. 8.

Hannah served on the city commission for 15 years from 1968-1983. Roesner has been on the commission for nine years from 1974-1983. They received decorative plaques in thanks for their hard work.

Both Roesner and Hannah expressed their appreciation to the citizens, employees and management of St. Johns for their support to the city commission over the years.

## Young athlete fights cancer foe

Rumors have flown around DeWitt High School ever since Julie Pung came back to school.

Everyone knew what had happened to her in late July. That's when doctors diagnosed that the 16-year-old athlete had leukemia.

As soon as the word got out, rumors flew faster than geese in October. Julie, people said, was not going to make it.

Indeed, the disease has caused changes in her life. No longer is she spending hours in the DeWitt pool, where she used to train. She also has had to miss some days of school.

But as she walks to and from classes and carries on the normal life of a DeWitt student, the rumors dog her footsteps. She sees it in the mournful eyes of fellow classmates.

"I don't think about it that much," she said, referring to the cancer that is robbing her bone marrow of its healthy elements. "I'm just normal like everybody else."

"A lot of people stare at me. It gets to be expected. They just kind of look at me and I can tell they're staring at me. But my close friends haven't done that."

Some students have been saying that Julie, a junior, won't live to see her senior year. They have assumed that leukemia is terminal.

Those closest to the case know better. "She has a very good chance of licking this," said Mrs. Ron Pung, Julie's mother. "A lot of people have the idea that once you get leukemia, you're a goner. Someone told us that a rumor was going around school that she would be dead in six weeks. That's simply not true."

"She's going to be alive in six months," said Sarah Leroy, Julie's nurse at the Michigan State University Pediatric Hematology-Oncology Clinic where she has been undergoing treatment.

Leroy said that Julie has acute lym-

phoblastic leukemia (a.l.l.). In a.l.l., as in any form of leukemia, the white cells start growing very quickly and crowd out the healthy elements of bone marrow, the nurse said.

Though she did not give specifics on Julie's case, the nurse said that a.l.l. patients with "good risk" features have a good chance to live for five years or longer. About 80-90 percent of those patients survive for five years, she said.

Some good risk features include early diagnosis of the leukemia, immediate treatment and sex of the patient. Girls respond better to treatment than boys, because leukemia often settles in the male testes and spreads throughout the body, the nurse said.

Though no cure is known for leukemia, patients have been known to live normal lives with the disease. Treatment involves chemotherapy and radiation, in certain cases.

"We're extremely optimistic that she is going to lick this," said Mrs. Pung. "She has a lot of things in her favor."

DeWitt swim coach Mike Keevan, who called Julie one of his team leaders, is also confident in her ability to battle adversity. "She's been a pretty tough cookie," Keevan said.

The swim coach noticed how pale she looked last year in school and called her parents to alert them. "I thought she had anorexia," he said.

On top of her already weakened condition, she contracted bronchitis. That's when she decided not to swim for DeWitt's summer team.

When she got weaker, she entered Lansing Sparrow Hospital for blood tests. She was diagnosed with leukemia on July 29 and started chemotherapy the next day.

Treatments became intense. For one month, she went to MSU every day. Even now, she must build her schedule around trips to MSU after her day at DeWitt.

"It interferes with school all the time," she said. "It's totally switched my life around. I can't do as much as I used to."

She also can't swim this year, which is quite a change for one of the Panthers' top swimmers. Her best event is the 100-yard backstroke, and she also has competed on state-qualified relay teams for DeWitt.

"I miss it, but I'm kind of glad I got a break this year," she said.

She has lost 10 pounds and all of her hair. She wears a wig in school, but the loss of body fat has been more difficult for her at times.

"I get really cold in the house," said the 120-pound Pung.

She's learned the importance of white blood cell counts, as well. If she has over 1,000, she can go to school. Less than that, she must stay home, because at that level her body is not as strong as it needs to be to fight off diseases.

But students should not assume that because she isn't in school she is probably dying. Julie certainly isn't thinking negatively.

"I have every chance," she said. "Everything's in my favor."

## Sealed Power shows profit

Sealed Power Corporation has announced a 39 per cent increase in its third quarter earnings over last year.

This year's earnings were \$6,770,000 compared to \$4,884,000 for the same period last year. Share earnings reflect the two-for-one stock split effective in June, 1983.

Sales for the three month period were up 15 per cent over last year's level totaling \$104,708,000.

Sealed Power said the earnings improvement over the similar quarter in 1982 resulted principally from increased sales in the replacement and original equipment automotive markets. The market demand for vehicle repair and maintenance products was also strong during the past quarter.

However, sales of industrial products declined 10 per cent from last year's third quarter, totaling \$4.4 million, or four per cent of total corporate sales. This product class continues to reflect the restrained levels of business activity characteristic of the general industrial sector, the company noted.

Powered product sales improved, totaling \$42.2 million, up 25 per cent over the same quarter a year ago, and contributed 40 per cent to corporate sales. The continued upswing in North America auto and light truck production supported this increase.

Sealed Power is a leading supplier of precision engine and non-engine components and service tools to the worldwide transportation industry. It has an automotive products plant here in St. Johns.

# Four are injured in county accidents

Four people were injured in three separate accidents in Clinton County over the past week.

• Angelique Jeannero, 16, of 119 W. Clinton, Ovid, was injured when the car she was driving left the roadway on M-21 east of St. Johns, hit a culvert and flipped. She was transported by Clinton Area Ambulance to Clinton Memorial Hospital then transferred to Sparrow Hospital in Lansing where she was reported in fair condition. A passenger in the car, Rebecca Flynn, 16, also of Ovid, was treated and released at Clinton Memorial Hospital.

• David Lee Conway, 28, of 9354 Jason Rd. was injured when he was rear-ended while he was stopped. Conway, who was eastbound on Round Lake Road, stated he had stopped for traffic in front of him and had just started up again when he was struck from behind by a vehicle driven by Ricky Rose, 22, of 9600 Jason Rd.

Conway was treated by Laingsburg Ambulance and transported to Sparrow Hospital. Rose was cited for violation of the basic speed law.

• Richard Smith, 34, of 235 Garfield in Maple Rapids, was northbound on Wright Road when his vehicle left the roadway, travelled through a ditch and struck several trees. Smith was treated by Portland Ambulance and transported to St. Lawrence Hospital. He was cited for careless driving.

In other news around Clinton County:

• The Clinton County Sheriff's Department investigated a break-in at the Pewamo-Westphalia High School on Oct. 20. A window on the west side of the building had been forced open, giving the suspects access to several classrooms where desks and cabinets were gone through. Some \$70 was found to be missing.

There was also damage done to several doors which were kicked in, some the glass broken out of. A building next to the school was also entered by breaking out the door.

There has been no estimate of damage and the case remains under investigation.

• The sheriff's department arrested a man for larceny and car theft last week in Maple Rapids.

David Diehl reported to the authorities that he had caught two subjects loading two sheets of press board into a van that was parked in front of a building he owned. Upon talking with the subjects, it was learned they did not have permission to be in the building.

It was later learned that the subjects had hot-wired the van and had taken it without permission.

Arrested for larceny from a building and unlawful driving away of an automobile was Kirk D. Snyder, 21. A warrant charging the same is being sought for a 17-year-old female that was with Snyder.

## Badge Beat

• William Warnke of Essex Township reported that someone had shot out the back window of his 1972 Ford pickup. A .22 caliber rifle had been used. The vehicle had been parked at his residence. The damage was estimated at \$120.

• Authorities are investigating a break-in at the Chapel Hill Cemetery early last week where entry was gained through a north window and the alarm disengaged.

The suspects unsuccessfully attempted to open a safe in the building. Numerous items were taken from the office area, as well as tools that were in a shed. Listed as missing are a .357 six-shot ruger, a tape recorder, coffee pot, a Wayne State University class ring, wrenches, pliers, and other items. Total losses were estimated at approximately \$300.

• An investigation is con-

tinuing into the melicious destruction of some street signs in the village of Westphalia. It is believed that the vehicle which ran over the signs is red and white and should show damage to the right front side.

• Suzanne Powers of Eagle reported to the Clinton County Sheriff's Department that she had been contacted by the American Bank and Trust in Lansing that four checks of hers had been written on a closed account.

She then checked her residence and found that she was also missing some cash and bottles of liquor

from the residence. A 15-year-old is believed to be the subject involved and the case remains under investigation by the sheriff's department, along with the Grand Ledge Police Department and the Lansing Police Department since the checks were cashed in those two cities.

The Clinton County Sheriff's Department investigated a total of 26 accidents the past week, 12 of which were car-deer accidents, and three minor injury accidents where the drivers sought their own treatment.

**Record set for number jailed here**

Fourth finds 19 men and two women held in custody.

Twenty-two prisoners, the largest number ever confined at one time in the Clinton County Jail, spent the Fourth of July holiday weekend in custody. There were 19 men and two women held, Sheriff Percy Patterson reported.

Most of the offenders were held on traffic charges, disorderly conduct following drinking bouts and offenses of lesser degree. Because Monday was a holiday, none could be taken to court until Tuesday morning.

The previous record of prisoners held, Sheriff Patterson said, was 20. The jail, which replaced the old structure only five years ago, has a capacity of 32 prisoners. Regarded as one of the best security lockups in the state, it is used for custody of Federal and State prisoners in addition to housing offenders charged in county prosecutions.

Among notorious prisoners the jail has housed were "Crazy Jack" Hyatt, the Jackson Prison riot leader and Edwin Albert Townsend, Elsie State

Savings Bank bandit, convicted in Grand Rapids last winter and given a 40-year Federal Prison term.

Both women were brought in on drinking, charged with driving while under the influence of drink. One woman was held for the sheriff of Ionia County, there being no usable quarters for women prisoners at the Ionia County Jail.

This was found in the same issue:

For a whipped topping lower in calories than either whipped cream or whipped evaporated milk, M.S.U. home economists say, use nonfat dry milk solids. To make two and a half cups of topping, add one-half cup dry milk powder to one-half cup water and one tablespoon lemon juice. **Gratiot County Klan to have Kountry Klub**

The county organization of the Ku Klux Klan of Gratiot County has purchased the Susdorf Farm of 120 acres, two and one-half miles southwest of Alma for the Klan Kountry Klub, which county organizer Turney says is the first of its kind in the state.

A large barn on the place will be fitted up for temporary quarters this fall and a new building will be erected in the spring. It is expected tennis courts, croquet grounds, a baseball diamond and a golf course will be laid out in the spring. The farm has a half-mile frontage on Pine River making possible good bathing and boating facilities.

**Gabriel gets mixed reviews**

Varying remarks and impressions were expressed about St. Johns School Superintendent Earl Gabriel during his public evaluation last week by the Board of Education.

For the most part, it could be said that two of the boardmembers, Neil Barnhart and Leonard Puetz, are not thoroughly satisfied with the job being done by Gabriel. The other four seemed to be pleased with what they have witnessed since the superintendent was hired eight months ago.

It was the fact that Gabriel has only been on the job for eight short months that made the boardmembers qualify their responses to many of the 55 points on the evaluation that they had little basis to evaluate him thoroughly.

The issues the board were best suited to evaluate Gabriel on were his relationships and deal-

ings with the board, the school personnel, and the public, and his handling of the teacher contracts, the budget, and the controversial school closings last Spring.

Responding on how Gabriel has acted as liaison between the Board of Education and the personnel, board president Robert Craig said Gabriel was instrumental in getting fair contracts with the union and non-union employees.

While Barnhart felt his performance in that area was unsatisfactory because the administration was pink-slipped in a secret meeting and because the administration fears Gabriel.

"The administration believes they'll be fired or demoted if they make waves. There is an all-time low morale on the staff," Barnhart said during the course of the evaluation.

Barnhart went on to comment that he feels Gabriel thinks he is the president of the board; is never in his office; ignores people when they have the floor at the board meetings; and supplies information only when he wants to.

Similar comments came from Puetz who said the contracts were not the board's contracts, but Gabriel's contracts; has a poor understanding of the school's needs; and has simply lost his trust in the superintendent.

However, totally differing remarks came from the other boardmembers.

Craig feels Gabriel has been responsive to all boardmembers' questions; has achieved a positive status in the community; that the morale around the schools has improved tremendously; and handled pressure situations quite well.

Boardmember Thomas Irner said Gabriel has followed the challenges of the board; has many times gone the extra mile for the board; made accomplishments in the educational programs by installing small, no-cost programs; and has practiced sound personnel policy.

Boardmember Peter Apostol may have summed it up when he commented on the point of Gabriel having a harmonious working relationship with the board, "We cannot expect him to have a harmonious relationship with each individual."

The scores of the evaluation will be tallied into a composite and will be part of the public minutes. It will also be placed in his personnel file.

"We will be taking action next March when his contract comes up," Craig said.

# Divorce the topic of elementary set

More often than not, unfortunately, children are the most severe victims of divorce.

They are not mature enough yet to really understand what is happening between their mother and father, why, who's to blame, and what is going to happen to them.

The parents are too wrapped up in their own problems. The children get either one side of the story or the other with few explanations or truth.

Their confusion many times goes unresolved because they have nowhere to turn.

A counselor at Bath Elementary School will be hoping to bridge some of those gaps and help these young victims of divorce through an elementary divorce group for fourth and fifth graders.

Miss Sandra Swan says, "So many children I see are from families where there has been a divorce. It's a difficult thing for many of them, particularly at first, to handle."

She first noticed the extent of the need for a group like this two years ago after showing a film entitled "Break Up" about a girl whose parents are separating. After the movie Miss Swan noticed a lot of response from the students on the subject.

"I realized how much of a problem it was for them," she said.

The idea for such a group has been in the works for about a year now and has gotten positive reactions from the teachers and principal who are often the first to notice the troubled youngster. One parent even called when she heard about the program and emphatically asked to have her child enrolled.

Fourth and fifth graders were chosen because Miss

Swan felt they would be more vocal than the younger children. Plus, she figured, there are more students at that age where families have been split up because the parents would have been married longer.

She expects the first couple of sessions of the group will be more get acquainted type meetings. Then film strips and movies will be used later to stimulate the discussion on various topics concerning divorce.

The discussion will be open for whoever wants to respond, she said. The student is not going to be forced to respond if they don't want to. That is so they won't feel threatened about a topic that may be sensitive to them.

"I want them to feel very comfortable," she said.

Miss Swan has several goals she hopes to accomplish with this unique divorce group.

The first is to help the children clarify their feelings about divorce and understand them.

"I want them to understand that other children have had similar feelings and experiences. Like the guilt feelings they have about the divorce being their fault and knowing other kids went through this," Miss Swan said.

Another is to help the children get a more realistic view of the divorce situation.

"It's hard for children not seeing a parent, it's hard for them to understand why. And why people act the way they do," she noted. "And most of these children have the fantasy that their parents will get back together and everything will be back like it was before. They're really hoping."

Miss Swan is also looking forward to getting the children to communicate and cope with the situa-

tions that arise. She wants them to learn how to verbalize what they're feeling and hopefully have this group as a place to talk out these feelings.

She said she has not had a very large response for the group as yet, but hoping a mailing sent home with many of the students this week will encourage more participation. She stresses that confidentiality for the group, which will meet one hour during school, will be respected.

# Fowler students find profit through work

By MARTY ACKLEY

For young people in a rural community like Fowler, the education they receive, both at home and at school, revolves around either the farm or their small town.

Rarely do they learn how to live and work in the fast pace of a larger city.

This is changing for some students at Fowler High School, through a shop class that is teaching the philosophies and techniques of our industrial society.

For the past few years, Mr. Dennis Whitlock's Industrial Arts class, has been starting, owning and operating its own business.

This semester, the class of sophomores has formed Calf Coupes Inc., a small business that builds and sells calf hutches.

So far, says company president Steve Esch, they have had 20 orders on line, but would like five or 10 more before the semester is over and the company must fold.

And for the class, it's not only educational but fun as well.

There are three things Whitlock, who serves only as an advisor to the company, hopes these young entrepreneurs learn from the class.

"One," he says, "is to be able to work as a group.

"Normally, shop projects are individual. But we work with people out in the world, not as individuals. One guy could

build this (calf hutch) quite easily, but as a group, it's more difficult."

Whitlock said that some find being part of a whole operation is usually quite hard.

The second is for the students to learn the applications of business — from production to management and advertising.

And the third thing Whitlock hoped to teach the students is to have a better understanding as a whole of what industry is like.

"They are finding it's more complex than what it looks like," he said.

After a few introductory lectures, Whitlock took the class on a tour of an Oldsmobile plant in Lansing. That gave the new company a foundation of what automation and mass production was really like.

"It gave us some idea of how a business runs," said Dale Epkew, the company's treasurer and along with Esch and advertising manager Dave Thelen are the officers of Calf Coupes Inc.

"But some people didn't like Olds," he added, "because they saw the work was too long."

Another shot of realism these Fowler students may never have learned.

But president Esch has found that most people in the company are willing to work and few who don't pull their own share.

Share — now there's a word this class has come to know and appreciate. For every student is not only an employee of the corporation, each is a shareholder. Which means the better and harder they work, the

more profit they get in return.

Each student bought at 25 cents a piece up to \$4. The share money is used to buy the operating materials to get started because before they could advertise and sell, they had to build and show what they could do.

When the class is over at the end of the semester and the corporation folds, the profits are divided and paid to each student according to their holdings in the company. So for the highest return on their investment, the students have learned to work hard and well.

Esch said he had an idea at first of what it would be like to start and help run the operation, that it might be hard to get people started at first.

"But now," he says with the experience of a veteran corporate executive, "it's easier than we thought."

That may be, according to Whitlock, because this company is a bit unique to the others he has advised.

"The kids take pride in more of what they've done," he said. "They've taken the idea right from the start to the finish. They did a community survey to see what kind of product was needed, then designed, engineered, built and sold them."

So this class, or this type of class, is rather unique to the students in Fowler. It is teaching them many things — business, automation, production, communication, selling, and cooperation. All the ingredients needed to make today's students the successful young producers of tomorrow.

# Teacher travels to Japan

By MARTY ACKLEY

Comparing differing educational systems and philosophies between to totally diverse cultures may be like comparing apples to oranges.

But DeWitt elementary school teacher Mrs. Charlene Schaar made some interesting discoveries about the differences between American and Japanese education when she visited the Orient this past summer.

"I had heard that they were far superior to our schools," she said. "The students are in school longer during the year, they have homework in addition to their schoolwork, and they are far ahead of us in the art and physical education areas. It surpassed my experience with schools."

One thing she did see over there that she didn't really care for was the way they didn't differentiate among the children.

"Everyone learned everything the same, whereas we encourage more creativity. There seems to be very little individualism as far as learning is concerned," she pointed out.

And the Japanese hide any special education students. They don't admit they have them, she stated.

"Where we provide for that child, it's like they don't even exist over in Japan. They hide them in closets or something. They get no education whatsoever," Schaar said.

The first grade teacher from DeWitt went on the goodwill mission in a sister exchange program between Michigan and Japan, a tour to aid in a better understanding between the two nations.

Her husband, Dr. William Schaar, the Dean of Students at Lansing Community College, was on the selection committee for the students to work over in Japan. The students felt that the doc-

tor and his wife should go along.

At first she was not too excited about going over to visit Japan. She said she knew very little of the country and its people and its language.

She is quite fluent in German and speaks it and teaches it to her young first graders. She would have gone to Europe instead of Japan.

She also carried a distant dislike for the Japanese people, she related, because of the memories and prejudices dating back to her recollections of World War II, when Americans were taught to hate the Japanese.

Now after living, sleeping and eating with them in their homes, she has gained a real love for the Japanese people.

The differences she found were basically cultural.

Teaching is basically the same, yet the classes are a lot larger over in Japan because of the over population.

"The teachers over there are highly respected though," Schaar added. "Anything the teachers say goes. The parents

abide by what directions are given by the teachers."

How about the kids. Are the Japanese children better students than Americans?

"I didn't see much difference," she smiled. "Kids are the same the whole world over."

Kids, she said though, are strictly the center of attention over in Japan. Everything revolves around the kids. Here in America, where both parents are probably working, the adults are sometimes too preoccupied to center all of their attention around the children.

The visit East has also helped Schaar's teaching somewhat, being able to learn and relate a new culture.

"The trip to Japan has

opened new vistas to me that I've not experienced before," she said. "And when you broaden yourself, it opens yourself to improve your teaching."

Schaar has even developed an exchange program between her class here in America with one over in Japan.

So if you drop by Mrs. Schaar's first grade class at Scott Elementary School in DeWitt, don't be surprised to hear the young students counting in Japanese while doing their morning exercises.

And if you should ever make it to an elementary school in Japan, don't be surprised to see a colorful wall poster drawn by a little 6-year-old from DeWitt, Michigan.

DeWitt has broken its losing streak but Bath has not as the southern Clinton County teams wind down their seasons.

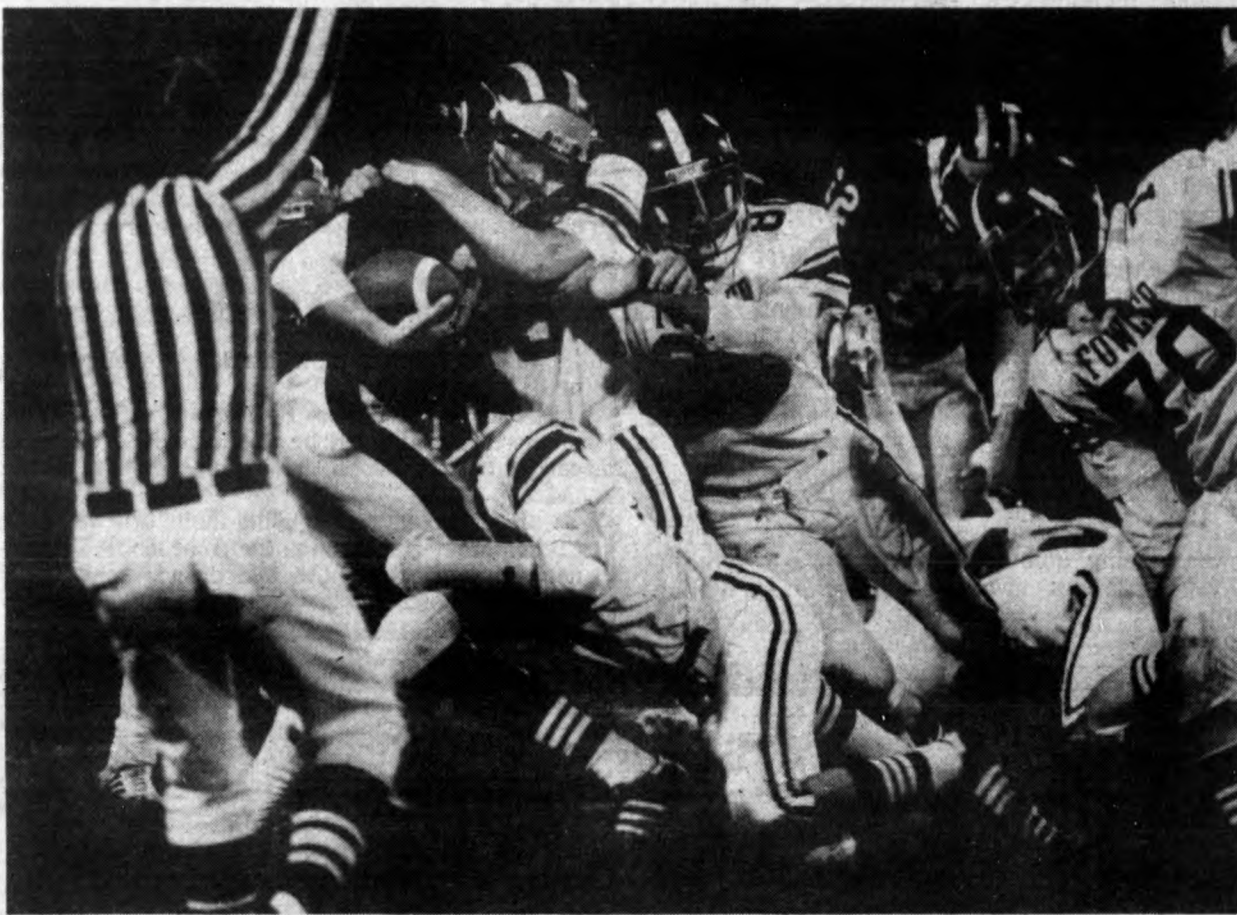
DeWitt blasted Charlotte, 28-0, last Friday while Bath fell to Haslett, 6-0.

The Panthers put together their best offensive game of the season in beating the winless Orioles. Tom Deak led the

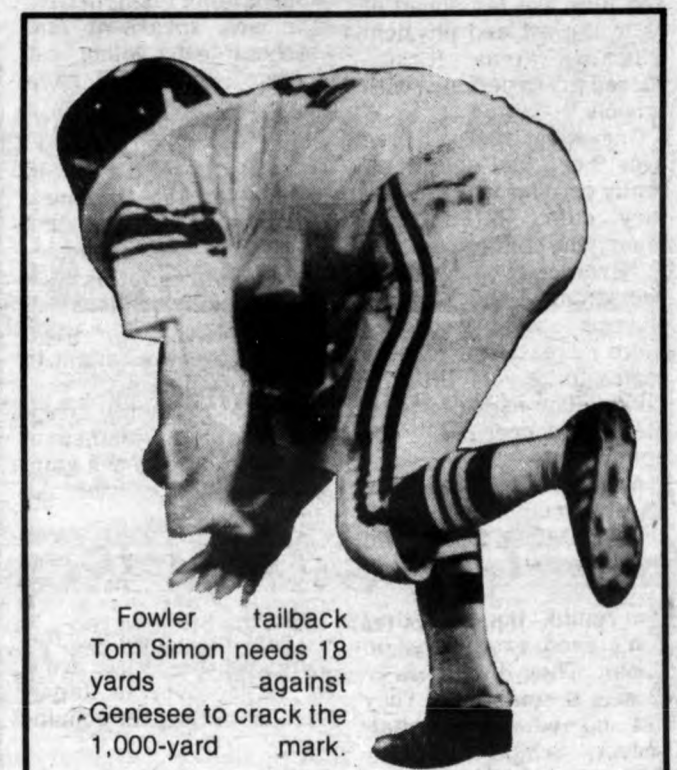
attack by scoring two touchdowns.

## Eagles clinch crown

Fowler didn't have to do a lot of scouting to figure out who Genesee's chief offensive weapon will be in Friday's football game.

The visitors, tri-champions in the Mid-State Athletic Conference with Webberville and Byron, feature a 1,000-yard rusher in tailback Don Robinson.

Robinson has had two 200-yard games this season and has never gained fewer than 70 yards. Against Ashley, he tore up the turf for 317 yards in 34 carries.

"We were shocked," said Genesee coach Jim Masserang. "I added it up

about five times just to make sure."

Masserang said he likes to let Robinson carry anywhere from 20 to 35 times a game. "He's a real strong kid," said Masserang of the 5-foot-10, 180-pounder. "That's his biggest asset."

Fowler tailback Tom Simon hasn't been quite so spectacular, but he, too, has proven himself as a big gainer. He enters the game with 982 yards and 14 touchdowns. With two games remaining, he needs 56 yards to break Fowler's school record for rushing in a season.

"I'd take a win for any record," said Fowler coach Steve Spicer, whose team is 7-0 after clinching

the Central Michigan Athletic Conference title. "I'm sure Tommy would, too."

By beating Pewamo-Westphalia, 14-7, Fowler maintained its grip on a Class D state playoff berth. The Eagles are currently second in their regional behind Waterford Our Lady of the Lakes. The third-place team is Saginaw Michigan Lutheran Seminary, 5.2 points behind.

As the playoff rankings stand, Fowler would be playing the Waterford team in a first-round game at Corunna. If the Eagles would win that game, they would play the winner of Mendon-Morenci in a

semifinal game at Mason. The finals are held the following week at the Pontiac Silverdome.

But Spicer is trying to downplay all of that. He's worried enough about Genesee and next week's foe, Portland. Genesee is 5-2 and the Red Raiders are a Class B school with a 4-3 record.

"I know they'll call me on Nov. 5 if we make it," he said. "They haven't called me yet so we're not there. We've got two good football teams left."

Fowler was ranked sixth by The Associated Press, sixth by The Detroit Press and 10th by The Detroit News in polls this week.

## Pirates ponder losing season

Losing 14-7 to Fowler stung Pewamo-Westphalia a little more than usual this year.

Losing to one's arch-rival is never fun, but it really hurts when it means you will have a losing season. For P-W, 2-5 with two games remaining, this will be the first losing season since the mid-1960s.

"These kids aren't losers," said P-W coach Mike Folk of his junior-dominated squad. "They've played well all year. These kids have played better than some of the teams here that have had winning seasons."

"If we would have scored every touchdown each time we got inside the 10-yard line, it would have been a different season."

If the Pirates had scored one particular touchdown on Fowler from inside the 10-yard line, it might have been a different game.

The Eagles were clinging to a 7-0 lead when P-W partially blocked a punt in the third quarter. They took over on the Fowler 36 and marched to the 9 before turning the ball over on a botched snap from center.

Fowler, undefeated champions of the Central Michigan Athletic Conference, drove the ball 91 yards for the clinching touchdown. Tom Simon finished the drive with an 8-yard run for his second touchdown, and Bob Simon kicked his second extra point.

"If we could have went in and scored at that point, it would have been a much better game," Folk said.

As it was, P-W did manage to swing the momentum in

the fourth quarter and to nearly pull even. Tom Schafer's 2-yard burst up the middle and Ron Schafer's kick with 6:41 left cut the margin in half, but Fowler got out of trouble when Joe Bertram boomed a 61-yard punt.

P-W tried to move from its own 20, but two sacks finished the Pirates' evening.

Injuries contributed to P-W's low total of 127 yards on offense. Two regular backs — Jon Thelen and Joe Trierweiler — missed the game with injuries, and Thelen's replacement, Bruce Cook, left early in the first quarter with a knee injury.

P-W's lone offensive threat was Schafer, who carried 26 times for 108 yards.

With Cook, a nose guard, and Thelen, a linebacker, out of the lineup, Fowler was able to run up the middle with good success. Upback Dan Simon rambled for 103 yards.

"Certainly the injuries played a factor, but I don't want to take anything away from Fowler," said Folk.

In an interesting development, Folk climbed up in the press box and radioed plays down to varsity assistant Kurt Mabie during the game. Folk said it was the first time he had ever tried that in a game.

Portland carries a 4-3 record and some crippling injuries into its game against P-W Friday. The Red Raiders lost quarterback Dan West last week to a broken hand. Another back, Nick Lefke, is troubled by a back injury.

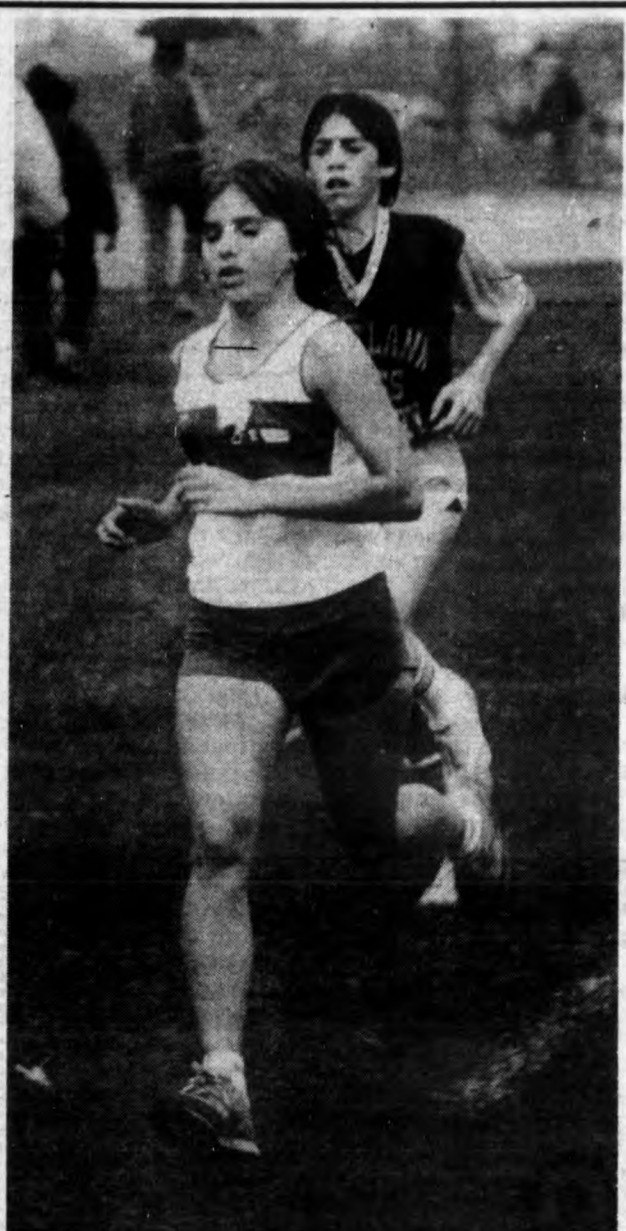

The Redwings blew a chance to share the Mid-Michigan 'B' Conference championship last Friday when they fell to Corunna, 14-7. Chesaning had opened the door by losing to Ionia, 14-0, but St. Johns had to settle for a second-place tie with Alma when Corunna scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns.

Protecting a 7-0 lead, St. Johns was heading downfield toward another score when Corunna linebacker Dean Welte intercepted a Brian Bates pass. The Cavaliers scored with 3:09 left, and took an 8-7 lead when Jeff Apey ran in the two-point conversion.

Bates led St. Johns into position to win the game, but Welte intercepted a pass and returned it 81 yards for the clinching touchdown with 50 seconds left.

"He's the best one I've seen all year," said Gonzales of Welte's linebacker talents. "In fact, they didn't beat us. Welte beat us."

"He showed excellent speed. We had angles on him on that last interception and we still didn't catch him."

St. Johns defense, the Redwings' weakness all

season, again failed to measure up to Gonzales' standards. Though it held Corunna to 224 yards — the lowest total by an opposing offense in five weeks — it didn't shut down the Cavaliers when it had to in the fourth quarter.

St. Johns has held opponents below 200 yards only twice this season. Owosso gained 173 in the first game of the year, and Lansing Waverly gained 162 the following week.

"We're just not used to it," said Gonzales of the porous defense. "That's not characteristic here."

St. Johns' offense produced 283 yards. Running back Chad Munger led ballcarriers with 61 yards in 20 carries. Bates com-

pleted five of 18 passes for 71 yards.

On defense, Jeff Ely had 13 tackles and Jeff Hayes had nine tackles, one interception and one knocked down pass.

Chesaning won the conference championship with a 4-1 record. St. Johns and Alma finished at 3-2.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 5 WHICH IS "AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE ACQUISITION OF A SANITARY SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM BY THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF WATERTOWN, CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN, TO PROVIDE FOR THE OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF THE WATERTOWN CHARTER TOWNSHIP WASTEWATER COLLECTION SYSTEM; TO PROVIDE FOR THE OWNERSHIP, OPERATION OF, AND MANDATORY CONNECTION TO, SAID SYSTEM; TO REGULATE THE DISCHARGE OF WATER AND WASTE INTO SAID SYSTEM; TO PROHIBIT PRIVATE SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEMS AND EXCEPTIONS THERETO; TO PROVIDE RATES AND CHARGES TO BE LEVIED UPON USERS OF THE SYSTEM AND FOR CONNECTION THERETO; FOR CAPACITY UTILIZATION, INSPECTION AND FOR INDUSTRIAL COST RECOVERY, TO ESTABLISH ADMINISTRATIVE AND FINANCIAL PROCEDURES FOR THE OPERATION OF THE SYSTEM AND THE DISCHARGE OF OBLIGATIONS INCURRED IN CONNECTION THERewith; TO DEFINE TERMS, ESTABLISH FUNDS, AND PROVIDE REMEDIES AND PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE, BY ADDING THERETO A SECTION 6.1 TO PROVIDE FOR AND REGULATE THE ABANDONMENT OF PUBLIC SEWER AND DISCONNECTION OF BUILDING SEWER FROM THE PUBLIC SYSTEM, TO PROVIDE FOR CONSTRUCTION REQUIREMENTS AND STANDARDS, INSPECTION, PERMITS AND FEES FOR SAME; AND TO ADD A SECTION 8H PROVIDING FOR CONNECTION OF PREMISES NOT PREVIOUSLY INCLUDED WITHIN A SPECIAL ASSESSMENT DISTRICT AND TO PROVIDE AN EFFECTIVE DATE HEREOF."

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF WATERTOWN, CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN, ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. That a Section 6.1 be added to said Sanitary Sewer Ordinance providing as follows:

SECTION 6.1. Public Sanitary Sewer Disconnection and abandonment.

1. Abandonment of Public Sewer. In the event a public sanitary sewer must be abandoned, for example, due to condemnation, catastrophe, or otherwise, and in the event said abandonment is otherwise permitted by law, the owner of the premises previously served thereby shall cause the construction of a four foot inside diameter manhole at a location to be selected by the engineers selected by the authority. The con-

struction specifications relating to said manhole shall be equal to those required of such structures on the existing system and shall be inspected and approved by said engineers. All costs of said construction shall be borne by the owner of the premises previously served by said sewer.

2. Abandonment of Building Sewer. In the event abandonment of a building sewer is permitted by law, and in the event the owner of premises previously connected to the public sanitary sewer shall abandon said building sewer, said owner shall, at owner's expense, cause said building sewer to be excavated at the property line (i.e., at the public sewer or road right-of-way line) and plugged with a permanent airtight stopper or plugging device which shall be suitably secured and braced. Approval of all such plugging devices shall be obtained in advance of installation.
3. Abandonment and Disconnection Permit Fees. Permits for abandonment of public sanitary sewer shall be obtained not less than two (2) weeks before commencement of manhole construction and permits for disconnection of building sewers shall be obtained at least twelve (12) hours before excavation. No excavation or construction required herein shall be filled or covered unless and until satisfactory inspection thereof by the municipality or Authority personnel. All work shall be done by contractors qualified under the terms of this Ordinance and a permit fee of twenty five (\$25.00) Dollars shall be due and payable at the time said permit is obtained.

SECTION 2. That a Section 8H entitled, "Connection of Premises Not Previously within Special Assessment District" shall be added to said Ordinance which Section shall provide as follows:

SECTION 8H. Connection of Premises not Previously within Special Assessment District. In the event a premises shall directly connect to a sanitary sewer, the construction of which was originally funded in whole or in part by special assessment, and in the event said premises was, for whatever reason excluded from said special assessment district, the Township shall require payment in full of an amount equal to the special assessment which would have been levied as to said premises if it had been originally included in said special assessment district. Payment of said special assessment amount shall be in addition to any other fees or charges applicable to said use at the time of connection."

SECTION 3: EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its adoption and publication as required by law.

Bath lost to Perry and Fowlerville last week as the Bees tumbled to 2-10 overall, 2-7 in the Ingham County League.

Perry pulled away in the final minutes for a 44-33 victory last Tuesday.

Against Fowlerville, Campbell was encouraged by the progress of sophomore center Lori Luoma. She scored 17 points and grabbed 15 rebounds in the 63-48 defeat.

The following Ordinance was adopted:

### CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF WATERTOWN CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN ORDINANCE NO. 7

#### PREAMBLE

AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE AND ESTABLISH PROCEDURES AND STANDARDS FOR THE REVIEW OF NEW APPLICATIONS FOR LIQUOR LICENSES, FOR PERIODIC RENEWALS THEREOF, FOR REVOCATION OF SUCH LICENSES, AND FOR THE HEARING OF OBJECTIONS TO SUCH RENEWAL AND/OR REQUEST FOR RELOCATION, TO ESTABLISH STANDARDS FOR APPLICANTS AND TO DELINEATE CRITERIA FOR THE UTILIZATION OF ANY LICENSE PERMITTING THE SALE OF BEER, WINE OR SPIRIT WITH SAID TOWNSHIP AND, TO PROVIDE FOR HEARINGS AND TO PROVIDE AN EFFECTIVE DATE HEREOF.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF WATERTOWN, CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN ORDAINS:

#### SECTION 1

##### 1. TITLE.

This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Watertown Charter Township Liquor License Ordinance."

#### SECTION II

##### 2. APPLICATION FOR NEW LICENSE.

A. Application: applications for license to sell beer and wine or spirits shall be made to the township board in writing, signed by the applicant, if an individual, or by a duly authorized agent thereof, if a partnership or corporation, verified by oath or affidavit, and shall contain the following statements and information:

1. The name, age and address of the applicant in the case of an individual; or, in the case of a co-partnership, the persons entitled to share in the profits thereof; in the case of a corporation, the objects for which organized, the names and addresses of the officers and directors, and, if a majority interest in the stock of such corporation is owned by one person or his nominee, the name and address of such person.

2. The citizenship of the applicant, his place of birth, and, if a naturalized citizen, the time and place of his naturalization.

3. The character of business of the applicant, and in the case of a corporation, the object for which it was formed.

4. The length of time said applicant has been in business of that character, or, in the case of a corporation, the date which its charter was issued.

5. The location and description of the premises or place of business which is to be operated under such license.

6. A statement whether applicant has made application for a similar or other license on premises other than described in this application, and the disposition of such application.

7. A statement that applicant has never been convicted of a felony and is not disqualified to receive a license by reason of any matter or thing contained in this ordinance or the laws of the State of Michigan.

8. A statement that the applicant will not violate any of the laws of the State of Michigan or of the United States or any ordinances of the township in the conduct of its business.

9. The application shall be accompanied by building and lot plans showing the entire structure and premises and in particular the specific areas where the license is to be utilized. The plans shall demonstrate adequate off street parking, lighting, refuse disposal facilities and where appropriate, adequate plans for screening, and noise control.

B. Restrictions on license: No such license shall be issued to:

1. A person whose license, under this ordinance has been revoked for cause.

2. A person who, at the time of application or renewal of any license issued hereunder, would not be eligible for such license upon a first application.

3. A co-partnership, unless all of the members of such co-partnership shall qualify to obtain a license.

4. A corporation, if any officer, manager or director thereof, or a stock owner or stockholders owning in the aggregate more than five percent (5%) of the stock of such corporation would not be eligible to receive a license hereunder for any reason.

5. A person whose place of business is conducted by a manager or agent unless such manager or agent possesses the same qualifications required of the licensee.

6. A person who has been convicted of a violation of any federal or state law concerning the manufacture, possession or sale of alcoholic liquor or a controlled substance.

7. A person who does not own the premises for which a license is sought or does not have a lease therefor for the full period for which the license is issued, or to a person, corporation or co-partnership that does not have sufficient financial assets to carry on or maintain the business.

8. Any law enforcing public official or any member of the township board, and no such official shall be interested in any way either directly or indirectly in the manufacture, sale or distribution of alcoholic liquor.

9. For premises where there exists a violation of the ap-

plicable Building, Electrical, Mechanical, Plumbing or Fire Codes, applicable Zoning Regulations, applicable Public Health Regulations, or any other applicable Township Ordinance.

10. For premises where it is determined by a majority of the board that the premises do not or will not reasonably soon after commencement of operations have adequate off-street parking, lighting, refuse disposal facilities, screening, noise, or nuisance control or where a nuisance does or will exist.

11. Where the board determines, by majority vote, that the proposed location is inappropriate considering the desirability of establishing a location in developed, commercial areas, in preference to isolated, undeveloped areas; the attitude of adjacent residents and property owners; traffic safety; accessibility to the site from abutting roads; capability of abutting roads to accommodate the commercial activity; distance from public or private schools for minors; proximity of the inconsistent zoning classification; and accessibility from primary roads or state highways.

C. Term of license: Approval of a license shall be for a period of one year subject to annual renewal by the township board upon continued compliance with the regulations of this ordinance. Approval of a license shall be with the understanding that any necessary remodeling or new construction for the use of the license shall be commenced within six months of the action of the township board or the Michigan Liquor Control Commission approving such license whichever last occurs. Any unusual delay in the completion of such remodeling or construction or in commencement of business may subject the license to revocation. Failure to commence business within nine (9) months of a grant of a new license by the Michigan Liquor Control Commission shall be deemed grounds for a recommendation of license non-renewal or revocation.

D. Reservation of Authority: No such applicant for a liquor license has the right to the issuance of such license to him, her or it, and the township board reserves the right to exercise reasonable discretion to determine who, if anyone, shall be entitled to the issuance of such license. Additionally, no applicant for a liquor license has the right to have such application processed and the township board further reserves the right to take no action with respect to any application filed with the township board. The township board further reserves the right to maintain a list of all applicants and to review the same when, in its discretion, it determines that the issuance of an additional liquor license is in the best interests of the township at large and for the needs and convenience of its citizens.

E. License Hearing: The Township Board shall grant a public hearing upon the license application when, in its discretion, the Board determines that the issuance of an additional liquor license is in the best interests of the township at large and for the needs and convenience of its citizens. Following such hearing the Board shall submit to the applicant a written statement of its findings and determination. The Board's determination shall be based upon satisfactory compliance with the restrictions set forth in Paragraph B.1 through 11 and Paragraph C above.

#### SECTION III

3. OBJECTIONS TO RELOCATION, RENEWAL AND REQUEST FOR REVOCATION.

A. Procedure: Before filing an objection to relocation, renewal or request for revocation of a license with the Michigan Liquor Control Commission, the township board shall serve the licensee, by first class mail, mailed not less than ten days prior to hearing with "Notice of Hearing", which notice shall contain the following:

- (1) Notice of proposed action
- (2) Reasons for the proposed action.
- (3) Date, time and place of hearing.
- (4) A statement that the licensee may present evidence and testimony and confront adverse witnesses.

Following hearing, the township board shall submit to the licensee and the Commission a written statement of its findings and determination.

B. Criteria for nonrenewal or revocation: The township board shall recommend nonrenewal or revocation of a license upon a determination by it that based upon a preponderance of the evidence presented at hearing either of the following exist:

- (1) Violation of any of the restrictions on licenses set forth in paragraph 1.B(1) through (11) and paragraph C above; or
- (2) Maintenance of a nuisance upon the premises.

C. The foregoing shall be deemed to be in addition to any other remedies provided by law and the township reserves the right to proceed directly to obtain injunctive relief to immediately abate such nuisance or to address any situation deemed detrimental to the health, safety and welfare of its citizens.

#### SECTION IV

4. SEVERABILITY. Should any section or part thereof of this Ordinance be declared unconstitutional, null or void by a court of competent jurisdiction, such declaration shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections or parts thereof of the Ordinance.

#### SECTION V

5. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall take effect on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 1983. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

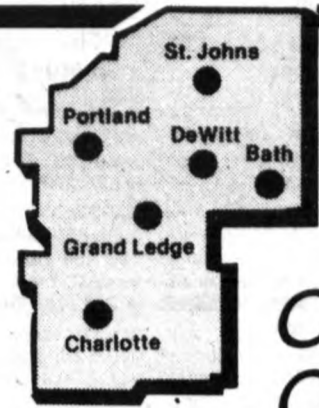

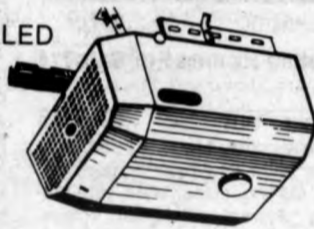

# Dancers swing to sound of the Law

Wendell Law has been calling since 1962.

No, he hasn't been getting a busy signal all of that time. The 63-year-old St. Johns resident has been calling square dances since that year.

As one of only two active square dance callers in Clinton County (DeWitt's Fred Nurenberg is the other), Law is a member of an elite group. He's the guy that says "swing your partner" and so much more on Friday and Saturday nights.

"We've got just bushels of calls that had never been invented since I started calling," Law said.

In fact, Law has learned 100-125 commands which he teaches to dancers. A member of the International Callers Association since 1975, Law teaches a mainstream program of 68 calls and a bonus program of 27 calls to his students. Experimental calls push the count over 100.

Though the calls can sometimes get confused by new dancers, square dancing is not as complicated as it seems, Law said. Basically, it consists of four couples standing on four sides of an imaginary square and moving smoothly and rhythmically.

"It's a wonderful recreation," Law said. "Kids pick it up just like that."

Law started to pick it up with his wife, Dot. They danced for four years

before a caller asked him to try a call. He's been calling ever since.

"I thought it would be something great when I retired," said Law, who retired in 1975 after 35 years with the U.S. Social Security Administration in Lansing. "It's really been interesting. You get to meet a lot of nice people."

He learned how to call by watching the callers of that day and picking up tips wherever he could. "They have caller schools, but I learned on my own," he said. "I've gone to a lot of workshops and caller conferences since."

Law started teaching square dancing in 1963, when the Shootin' Stars, Clinton County's first club, was forming in Bath. He also helped teach the Maple Twirlers when that club formed in Maple Rapids in 1965.

Both clubs still dance — the Maple Twirlers on the second and fourth Fridays in St. Johns, and the Shootin' Stars on the second and fourth Saturdays in Bath. About 100 couples are involved, Law said.

The demands on a caller are quite heavy, said Law, who also calls meetings to order as Riley Township Supervisor.

"It's quite a responsibility," he said. "I can't call my summers my own."

"You've got to like it. You've got to like people and love what you're doing. Of course, I've dealt with people all my life."
