Bethel Church plans 2 musical programs

6 Watertown drag racers are ticketed

At least six tickets were issued last week against youths charged with drag racing on private business property in southeastern Watertown Township.

Clinton County Sheriff's police, DeWitt Township police and state police were called in Saturday night on the request of farmers who had been kept awake at night by the racers.

ACCORDING TO Sheriff Percy Patterson, the drag racing has been taking place for some time on property owned by Decker Implement Co. between State Road and I-96 on a line with Grove Road. A private blacktopped road leads back to a blacktopped parking area at the side of the implement firm.

The racers have reportedly ignored token barriers and attempts to keep them off the property. They are said to have moved farm implements off the blacktopped lot so they'd have room to tinker with their cars and to race from the lot out to State Road.

ABOUT 20 CARS were there

last Saturday when law enforcement agencies moved in.

Gary L. Osteen, 20, of Lansing, was fined \$15 plus \$19.90 costs and sentenced to 15 days in jail for allowing an unlicensed person to drive his auto at the site. He was also given the same fine and an extra 15 days for being a disorderly person.

JERRY CROSSER of Lansing was fined \$50 plus \$19.90 costs and sentenced to 30 days in jail for drag racing. He appealed the jail sentence and is now free on bond.

Gerald Green of Holt pled not guilty to drag racing and is free on \$100 bond. Michael H. Stallup, 19, of Lansing, is free on \$100 bond for having defective equipment.

JUSTICE OF THE Peace Gordon Willyoung of DeWitt Township heard the cases.

Terry Casteel and LaVern Sutfin, both of Lansing, were also ticketed for drag racing at the same place last week, but they have not yet appeared in court.

St. Johns woman reigns as Senior Citizens Fair Queen

Mrs. Mable A. Lowe, 98-year-old great-grandmother from rural St. Johns, was crowned queen of the Senior Citizens Fair last Friday at the Lansing YWCA.

Mrs. Lowe, poet, piano player and "a wonderful person to know," reigned at the three-day fair with the "king," H. D. Matthiesen, 86, of Webberville, an expert at woodworking. The royal couple

were selected as the oldest of more than 80 exhibitors at the event, which was limited to persons over 60.

MRS. LOWE WON a ribbon for her booklet of poetry entitled "Reflections," and the king had a similar award placed on his coffee table inlaid with numerous pieces of wood in different sizes and colors.

Mrs. Lowe, who lives on West Taft Road south of St. Johns, also received a corsage as queen. Many of her friends and relatives from Bath, Grand Ledge and Lansing were there to see her receive her crown.

MRS. LOWE has two children, Mrs. Florence Dennis of Lansing and Vernon Lowe of Bath, 11 grandchildren and 51 great-grandchildren. Most of her life has been spent in Bath and the Bath area, with the exception of the past six years which she has spent with her granddaughter and family, the Alfred Loudons of rural St. Johns.

Many and varied were the exhibits on display at the Senior Citizens Fair, and officials said all the work showed a high degree of skill and talent. Judges commented that many of the creations represented "arts that are slowly disappearing in this country."

Medicare blanks being mailed

Mailing of the 15 1/2 million "Medicare" applications to social security and railroad retirement beneficiaries, which started Sept. 1 is moving smoother and all beneficiaries should receive theirs by December, W. Scott Hamlin, social security district manager in Lansing, reports.

A booklet explaining protection under the new hospital insurance plan and what additional supple-

mentary protection is available under the voluntary medical insurance program is being sent along with the application.

HAMLIN cautioned beneficiaries not to become upset if they don't get their applications in the first few mailings. All will be mailed in plenty of time to be returned before March 31, the last day of the first general enrollment period.

The mailings are being made on a regular schedule, based on the last digit of a beneficiary's

claim number. This means, Hamlin continued, that a husband and wife may receive their applications at different times if the wife's benefits are based on her own work.

ALSO, BECAUSE of the scheduling, next-door neighbors probably will get their applications at different times.

Another problem that has arisen is that some husbands and wives are both signing the same enrollment card. Each beneficiary will get his own card in the mail and should not use someone else's card.

Rural school operation makes Nickel happy

After two weeks of watching the operation of rural schools in the system, Walt Nickel, assistant superintendent in charge of rural schools for the St. Johns Public School District said he was pleased.

"School is going reasonably well, about the way we expected at this point," he said Monday. Current enrollment figures are in and the problems that have arisen since the annexation of 32 districts last spring are now definable and workable.

A TOTAL of 1,114 pupils in grades kindergarten through eighth grades are enrolled in 30 school buildings outside St. Johns. The book supply for them seems to be the biggest problem to date; all schools don't have the same texts, and all have not gotten all they need. This hasn't been serious, Nickel said, and more books were to be ordered this week.

Transportation of pupils from district to district in the rural area is going extremely well, Nickel said. "The bus routes ought to settle down soon now to a set schedule so that parents will know just when they (buses) are going to come."

NICKEL SAID he was very happy with all the contacts he's made in the rural area. "The parents with whom I've had to work since annexation have been very cooperative and helpful in solving many of our problems."

"The cooperation of our teachers has been 100 per cent right down the line," he said, "and this is very gratifying." There are 38 full-time teachers and six part-timers in the 30 buildings being operated in the country by the St. Johns School District. Eight of the teachers have completed work on their bachelor's degrees and the rest are working toward them, Nickel said.

ENROLLMENT figures in the rural districts break down this way:

Kindergarten 171 pupils; first grade 156; second grade 130; third grade 122; fourth grade 109;

fifth grade 127; sixth grade 108; seventh grade 93; and eighth grade, 98.

The seventh and eighth grades are smaller than the others because there are five schools where those students are bused.

Sealed Power in addition soon

Sealed Power Corp. expects to be moving into the new portion of their St. Johns plant by about the first of October, according to Lawrence Sexton, plant manager.

Sexton said last week the building was about 75 per cent complete and contractors planned to finish closing up the building last week. All that remains then will be finishing work on the plumbing and electrical services and on the roof.

It will probably be the first of the year, however, before all production will be located and functioning in the new addition. The Sealed Power expansion program here will cost in the neighborhood of \$2.75 million, and the 61,000-square foot addition nearly triples the size of the plant. An additional 100 people will eventually be employed there.

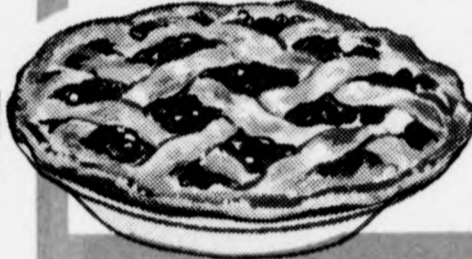

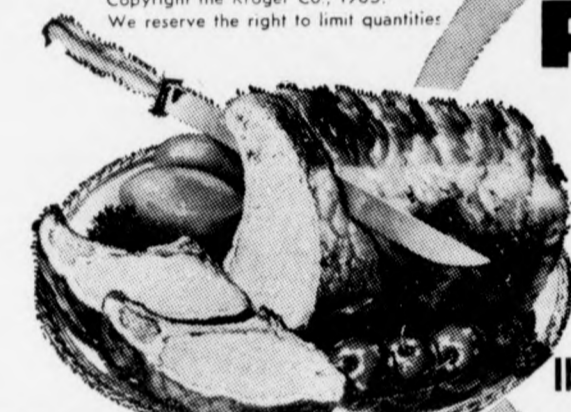
