## Offer fluoride program

Topical applications of fluoride will again be offered to Clinton County area children this summer according to Mrs. Mary Beth Upton, RN, chairman of the Clinton County Health Dept. topical fluoride program.

The fluoride program which is supervised by the Michigan Department of Public Health, will be made available to preschoolers, 2d, 5th, and 8th graders and to special cases referred by dentists.

According to Mrs. Upton, the procedure consists of 4 visits to the fluoride clinic. The child's teeth are cleaned on the first visit and a fluoride solution is applied directly to the surface of the teeth.

THE FLUORIDE application only is then then repeated during the 3 succeeding visits. This technique has been shown to reduce tooth decay by about 40 percent compared with the 60 to 65 percent reduction obtained with fluoridated water, she said.

From the 1973 clinic, there will be about 905 tooth surfaces prevented from decay in the 659 children who had the four applications.

The minimum cost of dental care for the surfaces would have been approximately \$7,240. Not only is there a monetary saving, but also a saving in pain and discomfort for the children.

In addition to providing protection against cavities, the program offers a valuable dental experience for children with no discomfort. Dental health education by the clinic personnel, including instruction in the proper method of brushing teeth, also is an important part of the program, said Mrs. Upton.

Parents of eligible children will be notified at a later date and be given an opportunity to enroll their children in the program. A small fee is charged to cover the cost of operating the clinic.

The local Derby, sponsored by the Jaycees, is financed entirely by local businesses, service organizations and individuals.

Last year's Derby drew entries from St. Johns, Westphalia, DeWitt and other Clinton County areas, with participants competing for prizes and trophies.

THE DERBY is open to Clinton County boys and girls between the ages of 11 and 15.

## Three go to prison on larceny charges

ST JOHNS - Circuit Court Judge Leo Corkin sentenced 3 men to the Michigan Dept. of Corrections Monday following their Jan. 14 pleas of guilty to larceny in a building.

The 3, Joseph L. Jacobs, 17, Clare; Richard L. Sysak, 19, Coleman and James L. Slee, 17, Coleman were arrested Dec. 17 after neighbors of Gower's Hardware in

Eureka reported seeing individuals breaking into the store.

The Clinton County Sheriff's Dept. responded to the calls and, subsequently, arrested the 3 after pursuing their vehicle and stopping it at Scott Rd and Maple Rapids Rd.

Jacobs was sentenced to a minimum of 30 months with credit given for 43 days already served in the county jail.

Slee received a minimum sentence of 17 months with the recommendation, that if he qualifies, he will be sent to the Michigan Training Unit in Ionia to continue his education or learn a trade. He also received credit for 43 days.

Sysak also received a 17-month sentence with the recommendation that he be sent to the training unit to complete his education or learn a trade.

## Elect Cressman chairman

## Lansing's move for more members on Planning group fails

City spokesmen and Tri-County Regional Planning Commission should be structured.

The city's request for more representation was thwarted when Tri-County commissioners approved by an 8 to 1 vote an 18 member proposal giving Lansing 2 members; East Lansing 1; cities, villages and townships 6; and Clinton, Eaton, and Ingham counties 3 apiece.

Before restructuring can occur, the plan has to be approved by the Clinton, Eaton, and Ingham County Boards of Commissioners. Presently Tri-County is composed of nine members.

Prior to the action taken Wednesday, spokesmen from several governmental units voiced their opinions. Numerous meetings open to comment have been conducted over the past year-and-a-half while hashing and rehashing formulas for representation.

Lansing councilman Joe Ferguson felt Lansing has expertise to offer and it should have more than just a token say in what happens in the region.

Ferguson and councilman George Griffiths of East Lansing, among others, opted for the one-man, one-vote concept.

Almond B. Cressman, Tri-County chairman pointed out that Lansing accepts two members out of a 13-member council on the Capitol Area Council of Governments (CAPACOG). "We're not an elected body, so we're not bound by the one-man, one-vote principle."

Dave Hollister chairman of the Ingham County Board of Commissioners, stated "I can not urge strongly enough that Ingham County is in sympathy with Lansing". He hoped that at least a 25 percent representation would be achieved for Lansing.

Ingham county commissioner Gordon Swix (former Tri-County chairman) said Hollister only spoke for himself because as far as he knew only three commissioners had gone on record for 25 percent representation for Lansing.

Another Tri-County commissioner Donald Hines stressed that Tri-County com-

missioners are appointed by the three county boards, not elected to the position. "Our job is not representing people but to come up with good plans to be used by the governmental units". "It's important for people to remember we are not a legislative group, we are a planning commission," he added.

New officers for 1974 were also elected at the meeting - Almond B. Cressman of Clinton County, Chairman; Milford J. Moore of Eaton County, Vice-Chairman; and Donald A. Hines of Ingham County, Treasurer.

A new Tri-County commissioner is James Fuller of Eaton Rapids, who was recently appointed by the Eaton County Board to replace Keith Killoran.

## Manslaughter charge brings fine, 30 days and probation

ST JOHNS - Rex Tefertiller, 53, 654 Ovid St., Elsie, was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail, \$1,000 fine and 2 years probation after pleading guilty to the Oct. 14 manslaughter death of his former wife, Betty Lee Tefertiller of Elsie.

He was sentenced Monday in Circuit Court and had entered a plea of guilty Dec. 10.

In passing sentence Circuit Court Judge Leo Corkin said, "This is a rather strange case. I know this is nothing you intended to

do. I also know you are very remorseful, but it also cannot be condoned."

When he entered his plea Dec. 10, Tefertiller told the court that he and his former wife were having a "scuffle" when he had pushed against her neck to break what he termed a "headlock."

He said later she dropped to the floor and he did not know that she had died.

Original charges of 2d degree murder were dropped in lieu of the manslaughter plea.

## DeWitt Twp plans park project

DEWITT TWP - Ice skaters at Valley Farms Park may have the benefit of a \$7000 shelter project by the time freezing comes to DeWitt Twp next winter.

The township board voted Monday night to put a contract out for bids on the project for the park, which is on Wieland Rd.

Speaking for the Parks and Recreation Commission, township supervisor Dale Emerson said improvements will include a paved concrete floor, heat for bathrooms and storage areas and sliding overhead doors.

### Concern About Sewer

The sparse crowd at the meeting expressed concern about recent reports that a planned sewer system in Bath Twp will hook up with the DeWitt sewage treatment plant and be financed in part by DeWitt residents.

"Rest assured," answered Emerson, "that they will be paying at least as much as we will. We're not going to pay for Bath's sewer system."

Emerson said a letter had been sent to the Clinton County Dept. of Public Works requesting a meeting with department and Bath officials to discuss whether Bath

should be allowed into the DeWitt plant and, if so, what the terms and conditions of their entry would be.

### Urge Airport Authority Vote

In keeping with their view that Clinton County should become part of the Airport Authority board members voted to send a letter to the County Board of Commissioners urging that the question be placed on the November ballot. Emerson said the county voted against membership in 1970.

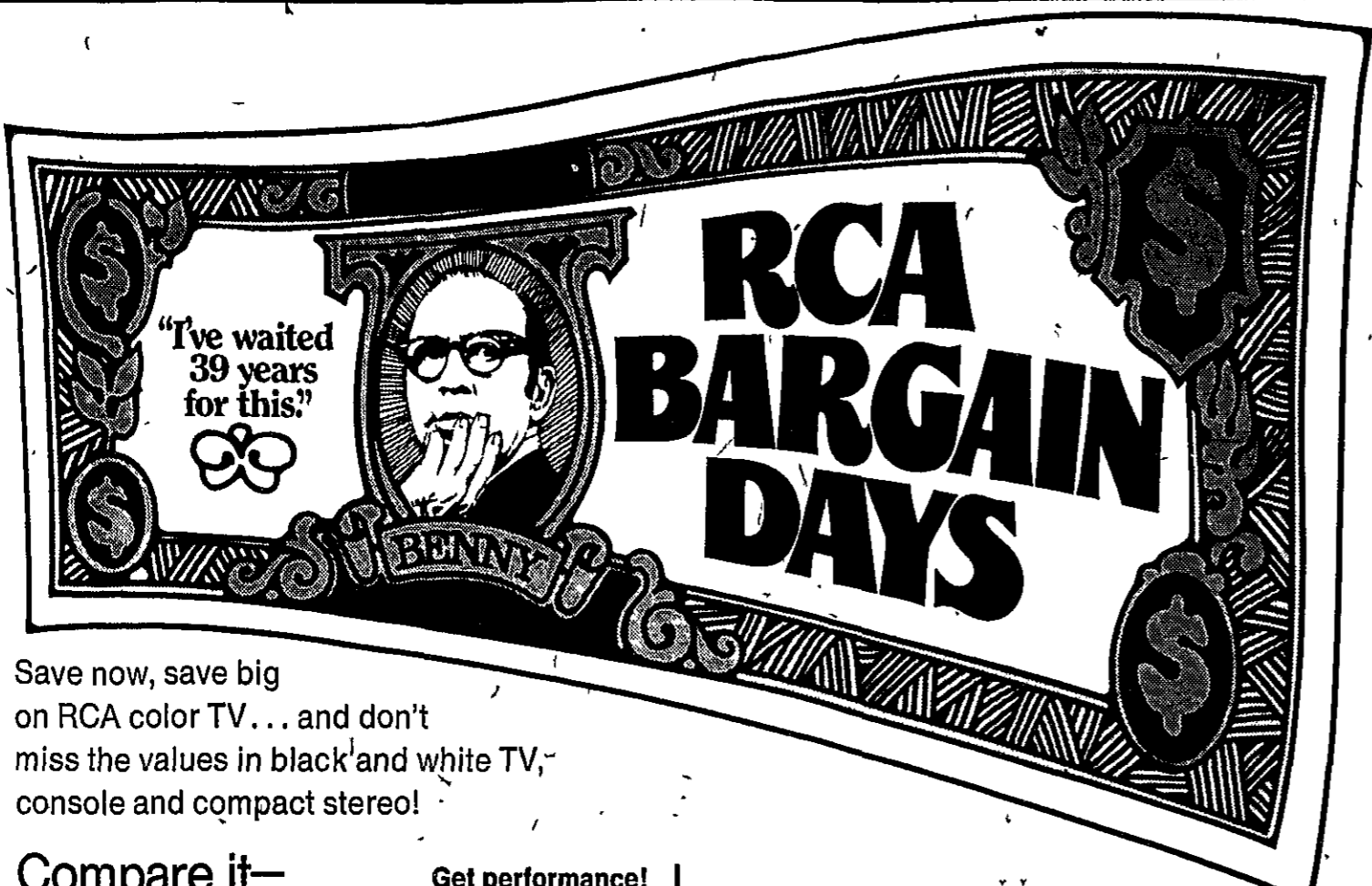
of this drawing will be announced later.

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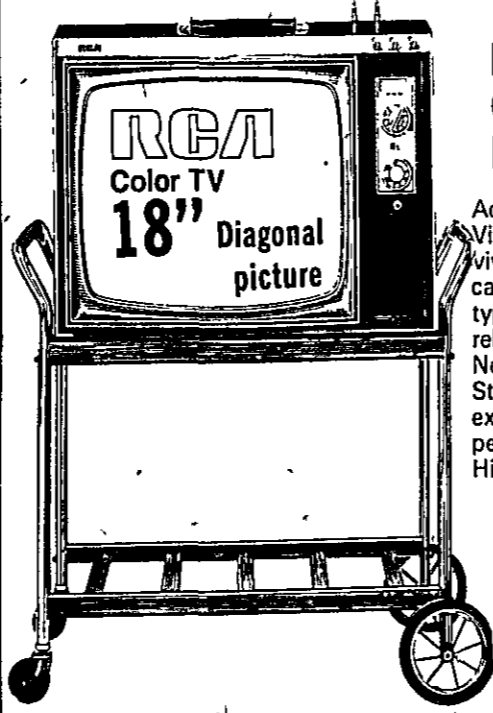

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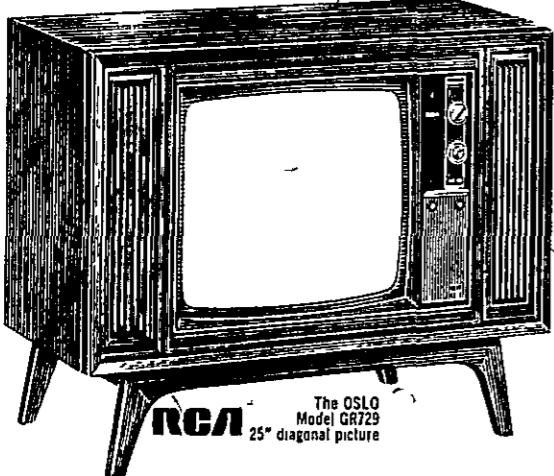

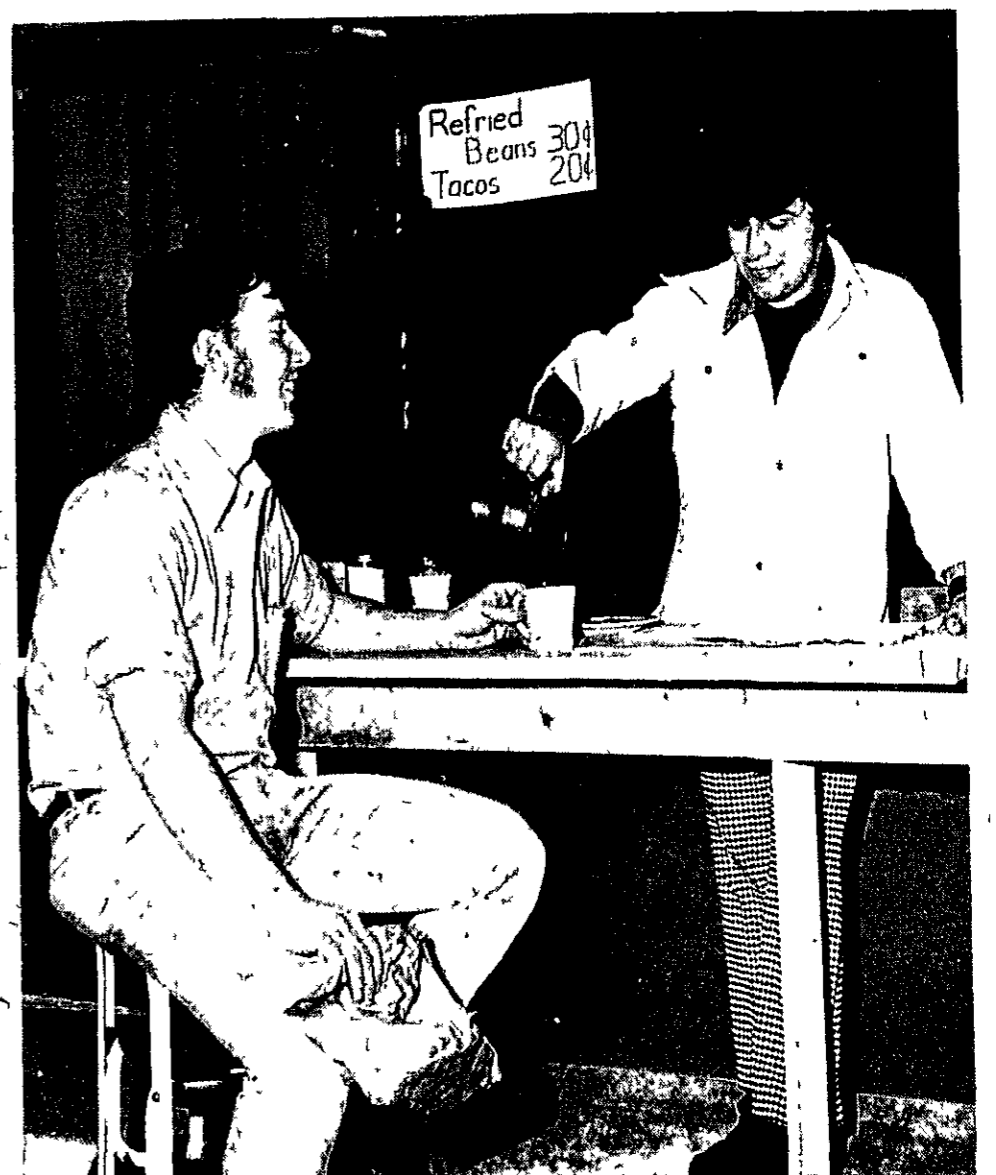
in the field of home appliances and television.

## Treize urges safety measures by owners of mobile homes

Mobile home dwellers have been urged by State Rep. R. Douglas Treize of Owosso to make their homes safer and reduce the possibility of fire.

Rep. Treize noted that all the recent furor about construction standards will apply only to units still being built and does not extend to existing units. "This is little comfort to people who already live in these structures", he said.

"There is no state law authorizing governmental inspections and specifications of existing mobile homes and there is little likelihood of one", Treize said, "so the primary responsibility for fire safety rests with the homeowner."

Treize recommends among Rep. Treize's recommendations, which were prepared by the State Fire Marshal were:

-Keep outside doors openable and exit paths and hallways clear.

-Keep heating units in good working order and never bypass their automatic controls. The air opening should be free of obstructions.

-Consider the installation of an approved automatic smoke detector and alarm in the mobile home to alert the family in case of danger.

-Keep a good fire extinguisher available.

Following these and other safety precautions can assist a family in its mobile home safety efforts Rep. Treize said.

Statistics have shown that mobile homes are twice as susceptible to fire as conventional homes and the likelihood of fatal fires is greater in them; but, cooperation between government seeing that they are built properly and residents seeing that they are used properly can keep these hazards to a minimum, Treize said.

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

## Strange game animals star in Feb 11 show

ST JOHNS -- Anyone for javelina? How about sandhill crane or chukar? Don't even know what they are?

The latest Wally Taber Safari Show headed for St. Johns High Auditorium Monday, Feb 11 at 8 pm features hunting, fishing, wildlife and scenic plus answers to those strange-sounding names from far-away places.

Sponsored by the St. Johns Exchange Club, the twin-bill of color-adventure films features Jack Niles, noted New Mexican big-game guide and champion archer, in person, narrating a pair of adventure films.

From the little-known bush country of the Texas-Mexican border to the little-fished fly-in lakes of Quebec, Niles narrates whole-family entertainment.

"Our competition is mostly thorny cactus and deadly rattlesnakes when we stalk those bristle-maned border pigs known as javelina," Niles said.

"And the job is even more difficult when one uses only a bow to bag his quarry."

Niles also dispatches a cattle-

killing lion with his bow after a long-cold trail is worked out by smart-nosed hounds. Using a predator call, he brings coyotes and fox within spitting distance of the camera and documents some entirely different hunting when he guides a rifle-hunter after a near-record prong-horn antelope. In short, Niles adds old-fashioned stalking to modern-day hunting.

"For the shotgun addict," said John Fedewa, show chairman for the sponsoring club, "Niles introduces the audience to an unknown gamebird staging a masterful comeback from near oblivion -- sandhill crane.

He utilizes some well-trained dogs on America's favorite exotics, the ring-neck pheasant and the wary speedster known as chukar partridge. And, for the waterfowler, Niles goes on a snow-goose hunt," Fedewa said.

As for fishing, Niles includes the annual Michigan carp shoot in which archers arrow tons of

carp which are rendered into fertilizer. The colorful whole-family entertainment flies into remote Quebec lakes for walleye pike and great northern pike.

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## View from the Senate

While some people may actually like it, the recent change to year-round double fast time in Michigan appears to be creating a lot of resentment throughout the state if newspaper editorials, letters to the editor, and legislative mail are an accurate indication of the way many people feel.

The most frequently recurring complaints seem to come from parents of children who must go to school in total darkness in the morning. At least seven pupils already have been injured in accidents attributed to the early hour darkness.

While there have been no reported attacks on children as yet, at least five accidents involving children already have been attributed in the Detroit area to motorists unable to see youngsters in the early morning gloom.

As far as we know, however, no child has yet been killed since the beginning of the new time change.

Acceding to public demand, many schools all over the state have had to shift their starting hours to lessen the danger to pupils. Detroit's Common Council was so concerned that it recommended that Detroit elementary and junior high schools start classes later in hopes of avoiding serious injury or possible death.

Meanwhile, there is a growing drive to return Michigan to its normal Central Time Zone. The huge Michigan Townships' Association unanimously adopted a resolution at its convention in Grand Rapids asking that such action be taken. The Clinton County Board of Commissioners in my 30th Senatorial District also has passed a similar resolution.

Meanwhile, two bills to accomplish this already have been introduced in the Senate. A letter I received recently from a prominent mid-Michigan school administrator had this, in part, to say:

"I have been in school administration more years than I care to remember, but I cannot recall any decision which has caused more universal unhappiness and consternation among our people than the return to Daylight Savings Time as of January 6, 1974."

"Up to this point we have done everything possible to cooperate with the many suggestions to save fuel... (but) as far as we can determine at this point, the return to Daylight Savings Time will increase the usage of energy in our schools because of the additional hour of lighting in the morning, so at least from the standpoint of school operation, the change will increase the use of energy."

A recent Associated Press wire service story dated Jan 20 had this comment on the time change:

"The manager of the Lansing Board of Water and Light said Saturday the switchover to Daylight Saving Time has not saved any energy in Lansing... The only effect of the new time has been to change hours of peak electricity demand from early evening to early morning..."

To obtain a better grasp on how the people of mid-Michigan feel about this issue, whether they are from urban areas which by and large supported six-month DST in the November, 1972, referendum, or from rural areas which generally opposed it, I will be sending out a poll in early February to a broad cross-section of the population which

will contain the following questions:

- 1) Should Michigan remain on year-round Eastern Daylight Savings Time (the time we're observing now)?  
Yes No Undecided
- 2) Should Michigan remain on year-round Daylight Savings Time, but shift from Eastern to the Central Time Zone?  
Yes No Undecided
- 3) Should Michigan remain in the Eastern Time Zone, but ask the federal government to be allowed to observe

Daylight Savings Time only during the 6 summer months?  
Yes No Undecided

4) Should Michigan remain in the Eastern Time Zone and not observe Daylight Savings at any time during the year?  
Yes No Undecided

I'm hoping that I'll get a heavy enough response to be meaningful as the state is forced once again to consider this most controversial topic.

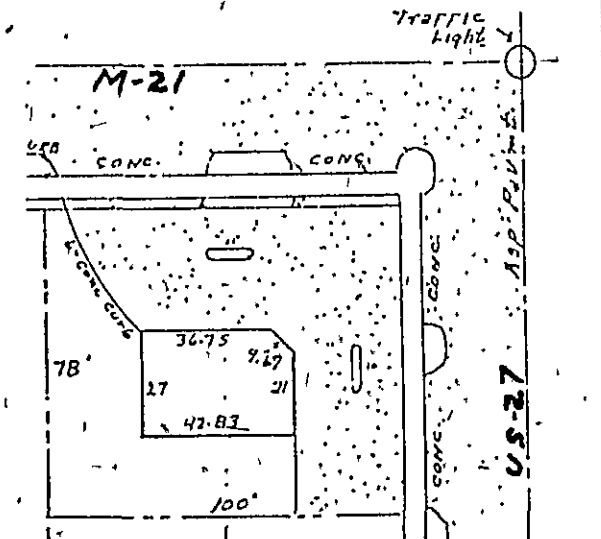

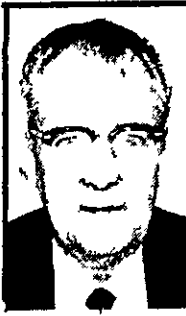

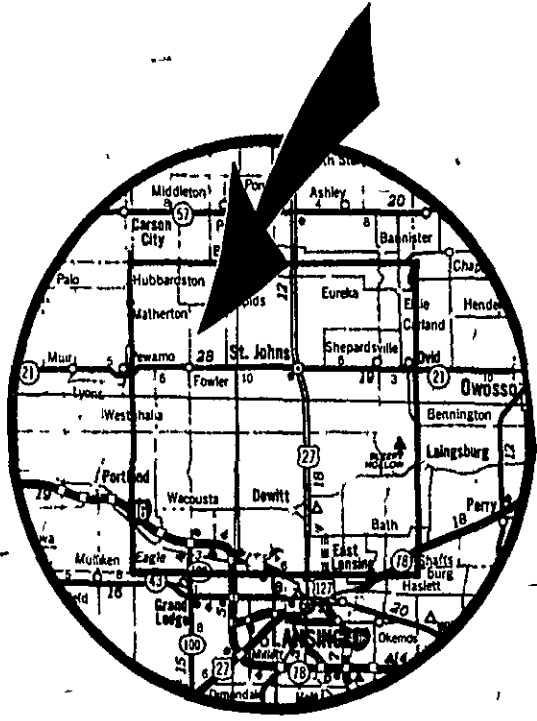

"How to Milk Profits" from "Today's Feed Prices" is the theme of a dairy feeding workshop to be conducted Thursday, Jan 31 from 10 am to 3 pm at the basement meeting room at the McCurdy Park, Casno.

Any dairymen in the Carland area are urged to attend the workshop that will deal specifically with the most profitable feeding programs for dairy cattle in view of high feed costs and changes in the price of milk.

Dr Don Hillman, dairy specialist, and Dr Stephen Harsh and Dr Roy Black, agricultural economist of Michigan State University will conduct the workshop.

Each dairymen will learn how to calculate a balanced ration that is nutritionally sound for producing milk.

ORDER AND NOTICE OF HEARING By order dated August 10, 1970 in Case No. U-3001, the Commission approved its Rules and Regulations Governing the Extension of Underground Electric Distribution Lines.

The Commission's order dated August 17, 1970, confirmed and adopted said rules and regulations. These rules and regulations contain provisions for contribution in aid of construction applicable to extensions of underground electric distribution and service lines in residential subdivisions and to commercial and industrial extensions.

The rules established charges of \$1.00 per lot front foot for distribution lines and \$1.25 per foot for service lines in residential subdivisions, and a charge of \$2.00 per trench foot for commercial and industrial extensions.

In response to requests by residential home builders and developers, members of the Legislature and utility companies, the Commission believes that it would be in the public interest to review these charges.

The Commission finds that the current costs of construction of overhead and underground extensions are to any extent different from those upon which the above charges were based, it proposes to fix different charges to reflect the change in the difference in costs.

The Commission FINDS that: A. Jurisdiction in this matter is pursuant to Act 106, P.A. 1909, as amended, M.C.L.A. 460.551 et seq; Act 419, P.A. 1919, as amended, M.C.L.A. 460.51 et seq; Act 3, P.A. 1939, as amended, M.C.L.A. 460.1 et seq; Act 306, P.A. 1969, as amended, M.C.L.A. 24.201 et seq; and the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, 1954 Administrative Code, Supplement No. 54, R 460.11.

A hearing should be held to determine the proper and reasonable charge per lot front foot for distribution lines and the proper and reasonable charge for service lines in residential subdivisions, and the proper and reasonable charge for commercial and industrial extensions under the Commission's Uniform Underground Electric Extension Policy.

All public utilities, including rural electric cooperatives, providing electric service in the Lower Peninsula mainland should be required to provide specific data for the Commission's consideration in this matter.

THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED that: A. The Commission, on its own motion, will conduct an investigation to determine whether there should be revision in the charges of \$1.00 per lot front foot for distribution lines and \$1.25 per foot for service lines in residential subdivisions, and the charge of \$2.00 per trench foot for commercial and industrial extensions under the Commission's Uniform Underground Electric Extension Policy.

B. Each public utility, including rural electric cooperatives, providing electric service in the Lower Peninsula mainland shall, on or before February 4, 1974, prepare and submit to the Commission, together with its proposed testimony, an original and 7 copies of studies for the years 1971, 1972 and 1973, showing its average differential in cost between overhead and underground extensions in residential subdivisions and also the average difference in cost between overhead and underground commercial and industrial extensions.

In addition, each such public utility shall submit to the Commission 50 copies of its testimony and studies for distribution to interested parties requesting copies of same.

C. A public hearing will be held at 9:30 A.M., on February 25, 1974 in the Auditorium, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan, and continue, if necessary, on February 26, 27 and 28, 1974, in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913 for the purpose of receiving testimony and evidence concerning this matter. Any interested parties may attend the hearing and participate, subject to the provisions of the Commission's Rules and Practice and Procedure.

S. Any party wishing to intervene in this investigation shall, in accordance with Rule 11 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, file with the Commission an original and 7 copies of a petition to intervene at least five (5) days prior to February 25, 1974.

E. Each public utility, including rural electric cooperatives, providing electric service shall, on or before February 15, 1974, notify the public of the hearing by publishing a copy of this Order and Notice of Hearing in newspapers of general circulation published within its service area and by mailing a copy of this Order and Notice of Hearing to all cities, incorporated villages, counties and townships within its service area. Proofs of publication and service are to be submitted to or before the scheduled hearing.

The Commission specifically reserves jurisdiction of the matters herein contained and the authority to issue such further order or orders as the facts and circumstances may require.

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
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# 4-H Chatter National Citizenship short course

## State Police TIP to pay for tips

The Michigan State Police in January are beginning a new crime-fighting program, that may pay up to \$30,000 for valid information relative to large seizures of illegal drugs, major illegal drug traffickers, and illegal drug laboratories, Col. John R. Plants, department director, has announced.

For reference purposes, the program will be known as "TIP" an acronym for "Turn in Pushers". This is reported to be one of the first such police programs on a state-wide level and was initiated by the Michigan to this State Police. Payment of awards, up to \$30,000, will be contingent upon validation of information which results in seizure of large volumes of illegal drugs and narcotics and/or closing of clandestine-type illegal drug-making operations, and/or prosecution of major illegal drug dealers.

Officials emphasized the program is keyed to the apprehension and conviction of large scale narcotics dealers and suppliers. The TIP program will supplement regular narcotics investigative efforts. The TIP information can be anonymously given by telephoning toll-free in Michigan to this State Police-manned number: 800-292-2277. Identity of the caller and his or her information will be given the fullest possible protection.

The State Police number, available from any post, will be manned around the clock by officers familiar with the program. They will receive the information, answer pertinent questions the caller may have, and assure callers that their identity and information will remain confidential.

The amount of the awards to individuals will be determined by the degree of material assistance rendered. This qualifying factor will rest upon a decision by a board of several persons selected from a panel of prominent citizens.

The identity of members of any given board will not be disclosed in the interest of their security.

Funds for the administration of the program as well as for the cash awards were granted by legislative appropriations.

It is emphasized that the toll-free phone number for "TIP" is not to be called for general information about the program. This number is intended for use by informants or those persons who may have potentially useful information concerning illegal drug and narcotic trafficking. Additional information regarding the operation of the program may be obtained by calling Captain Christopher Swartzendruber, Commanding Officer, Intelligence Section, State Police Headquarters, East Lansing.

## Chloe's Column

### Meals on Wheels?

What does a person who needs a special low sodium diet, and a senior citizen who finds it difficult to get to the grocery in the winter months have in common? They both might benefit from the St Johns, Meals on Wheels program.

Meals on Wheels of St Johns was formed to provide nutritionally balanced hot and cold meals to area residents. The need for such a service was pointed out by many people working in the area of health care.

Clinton Memorial Hospital Auxiliary assumed the responsibility of initially financing the service. Started in June of last year, the program is patterned after the meals on wheels in Charlotte, Michigan, according to Hospital Auxiliary Board member, Mrs Mel Warren.

#### Non-profit

A non-profit corporation, Meals on Wheels is administered by a board of directors, composed of some members of the sponsoring organization as well as many outside the auxiliary. Many

citizens interested in the project have contributed to this effort.

Mrs Warren reports that almost 60 volunteers are involved in the program, which would enable them to serve many more citizens than are presently receiving meals.

Meals on Wheels will deliver 2 nutritious meals a day to your home, 7 days a week. Meals are brought by volunteers in the community and delivered at noon hours.

Who may obtain Meals on Wheels? Any person who is able to benefit from such a service, particularly upon referral by a doctor, may participate in Meals on Wheels. For example, a person who could be discharged from the hospital if meals were prepared during the convalescent period might order Meals on Wheels. An individual who feels he cannot prepare his own nutritious meals or needs a special diet such as diabetic, low fat or low sodium may also use Meals on Wheels, according to Mrs Warren.

Special diets available  
All meals are prepared by the

kitchen, of Clinton Memorial Hospital under the supervision of the registered dietitian, Mrs Floyd Parmelee. Special diets can be prepared by order of your doctor.

The regular meals provide a hot meal, at noon. It usually includes cooked meat or fish, potato or substitute, vegetable, salad, bread and butter, milk and dessert. The charge is \$1.55 a meal. A cold supper consisting of a sandwich, salad, milk and dessert may also be delivered. The hot meal and cold supper cost \$2.55. Special diets are charged 15 cents extra per day. Collections are made by the members of the volunteer organization for the meals delivered. The time of collection is arranged when meals are ordered.

## Free Methodists announce "Isn't It Good to Know" film

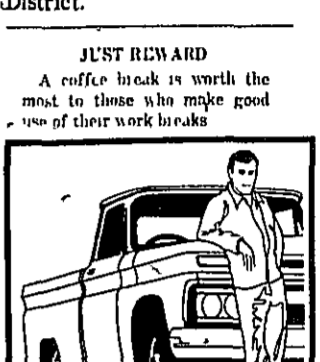

Randy Bowles made sure Bashore's shot was the clincher by stealing the ball as Chesaning took the ball out of

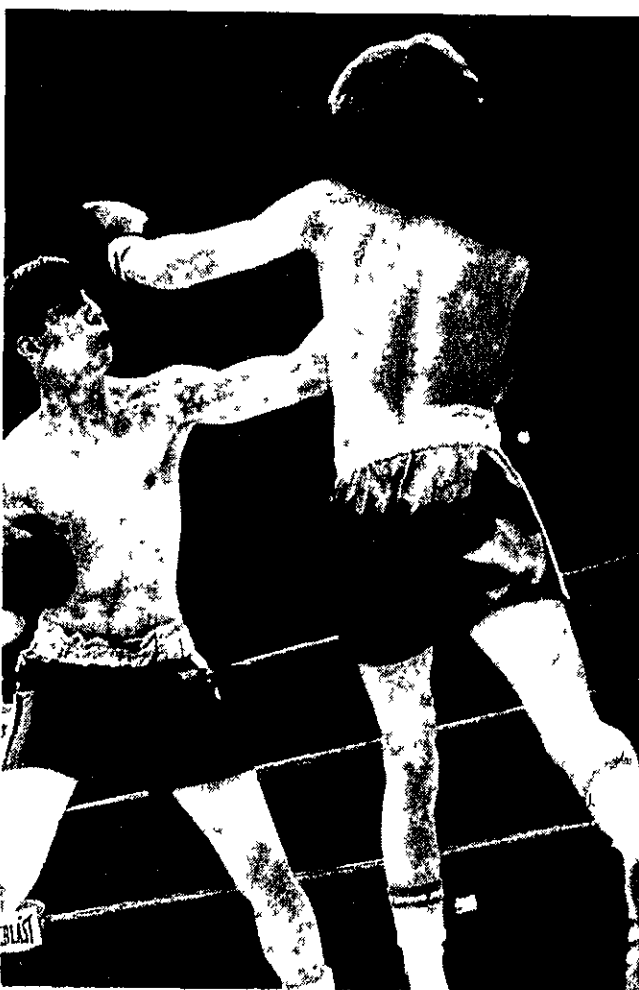
bounds. Randy Bowles led the scoring

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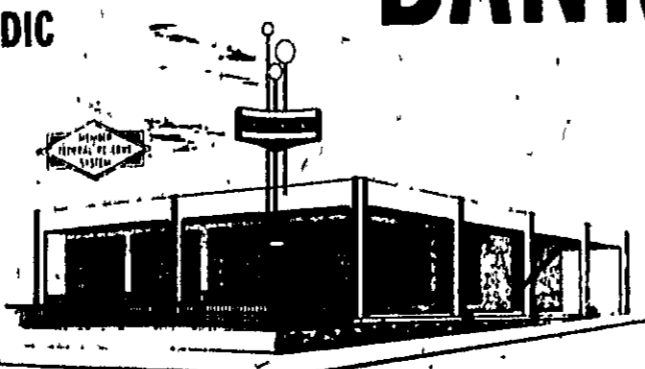
