FACT FINDER

Are you concerned about getting the straight facts on a question which arises but don't know where to find the answer? We'll find the facts for questions submitted by our readers. Just drop us a line at FACT FINDER, Clinton County News, St. Johns 48879.

Q: There should be a yellow mark on those little hills from St. Johns to Fowler. I go to St. Johns every day to work and many times cars are passing on the hills. The other afternoon 2 ladies passed me on a small hill. The car coming from the west took off the pavement. This was a small yellow car coming from the west. Who wants to give a comment on that? EK, Fowler.

A: Ralph Heber, superintendent, manager of the Clinton County Road Commission was glad to comment. He told FACT FINDER he has approached the State Highway Department about marking the sections of road with hills between St. Johns and Fowler on M-21. He said they indicated it wasn't necessary, but he hasn't given up. Heber said he is again to request the state mark the lines and erect no passing signs. He said, your FACT FINDER question might help convince them county residents are concerned.

Q: I've always wanted to go for an old fashioned sleigh ride, but know of no places. Having lived here only 4 months, I don't know much about recreation around here. But surely there is a place where one could go for a sleigh ride? I would appreciate any information you could give me. MK, St. Johns

A: There is a place, but the closest one we came up with is in Mason. The Crazy 'C' Riding Stable charges a minimum of \$25 per hour and the sleigh holds up to 20 people. You can call for information at 676-5548.

St Johns to study sewer improvements

ST. JOHNS - St. Johns City Manager Harvey Weatherwax was given the go-ahead to lay groundwork for a sewer bond issue at the City Commission's Monday night meeting.

Weatherwax reported finding 12 catch basins Monday, the result of smoking the sewers. These catch basins are in the downtown area, he said.

Weatherwax said he had hoped a bond issue wouldn't be necessary, but this new find, in addition to forthcoming engineer's reports, will require action.

storm sewers," he declared, "Or perhaps a sanitary sewer."

Catch basins are supposed to take storm water, and prevent it from going into the sanitary sewer system. In this case, water may get into the sanitary system, requiring either the construction of new storm sewers or blockage of the catch basins.

City clerk Tom Hundley said the commission's actions were taken in anticipation of what engineers will report to them, to pave the way for future action on the problem.

Dr. Grost moved that Weatherwax set

up a meeting with a bonding attorney for preliminary discussions. The motion was seconded by Jean Rand, and passed unanimously.

Also discussed at the Feb. 12 meeting was expansion of the Kroger store in the Southgate Shopping Center. After a lengthy discussion of whether the greenbelt should actually be green, how high the mound should be, and how far apart to plant trees, Tom Coleman, an engineer residing in St. Johns, had some suggestions to make.

be solved, he said, by a shallow valley ditch with an outlet. Coleman advised against the use of stones along the greenbelt because of potential problems mowing grass and upkeep. Wood chips, he said, would permit adequate drainage, and the ground could be terraced to help retain water and prevent the chips from floating away.

Another suggestion was to use ground cover rather than grass, and make sure the trees are planted 10-15 feet apart. Otherwise, he said, they would have to be pruned too often.

Roy Ebert recommended the commission adopt Coleman's ideas, with the other members concurring. Randy Humphrey, Zoning Administrator, was absent from the meeting, so the ideas presented will be communicated to him for consideration. He will make recommendations based on the commission's wishes.

DICK WEDGE, a representative from the Michigan Employment Security Commission reported internal problems as the reason their trailer is still located on city property. He said they had planned to move into the new Social Services office, but the main office in Detroit vetoed the move.

Wedge reported they have not found office space yet, but are looking. In his plea for an extension of the time limit requiring the MESC to move their trailer, he cited their contributions to the community.

The MESC, Wedge said, has referred 318 people for jobs, developed 252 jobs, and actually placed 128 people in new jobs in the St. Johns area.

THE COMMISSION voted to allow the MESC an additional 60 days in which to move their trailer.

City Attorney Paul Maples reported on the codification of existing city ordinances. He recommended that Lewis C. Andrews from Ann Arbor be contracted to perform the codification. Andrews, who did Charlotte's codification, gave Maples an estimate of \$3200 for the job, compared with other estimates in excess of \$15,000. Maples said there would be additional printing costs, but that this estimate was still the lowest.

Dr. Grost moved the commission contract Andrews' services, seconded by Ebert. The motion carried.

Ordinance 253 was accepted after a public hearing. This ordinance amends no 245.

SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS 2-73 and 1-73 were confirmed after public hearings were held.

1-73 provides for the assessment of 80 per cent of the cost for a property owner's curb and gutter. The average price for this area on Oak St will amount to approximately \$450, according to Tom Hundley, City Clerk.

Property owners will have up to 3 years to pay, with a 6 per cent interest charge made. Hundley noted that no one stopped into his office to discuss the assessment, and he had only 2 phone calls inquiring about it.

2-73 IS SIMILAR to assessment 1-73 in that property owners will have 3 years to pay at 6 per cent interest.

First payments from property owners are due in a short period of

time, after the assessments were confirmed at the meeting. If a property owner cannot pay the total sum at once, he can avoid interest on one-third of the total by paying before the deadline. However, no deadline was set by the commission.

A storm sewer on Scott Rd can either be put in by the city, or the county drain commissioner can declare a district and put it in. Dr. Grost said he has an "uneasy feeling" about the city taking charge of the matter.

The drainage thing always seems somewhat like guesswork, he said. Weatherwax agreed, and suggested that the county draw up a district. He was granted permission for preliminary information on the cost figure.

ALSO DECIDED at the meeting was the acceptance of a \$461 bid for the purchase of a city automobile by Traver's Auto.

Leasing of an IBM copy machine to replace the city's present Xerox model was authorized.

An application for sewer and water tap in route 6, St. Johns, was denied.

The Cass St special assessment issue will be reported on at the next meeting, beginning the special assessment procedure.

THE COMMISSION authorized the purchase of the Matthews Bldg at a cost of \$20,916.11, which includes the winter taxes due on the building. Commission members agreed that it would be unfair to require the developer to pay these taxes amounting to approximately \$500, which are due because of the Commission's delay in resolving the matter. Opposed to the motion was Ebert.

The resignation of William W. Barber from the Park Board was accepted by the commission. Ebert moved that Jack Bertoldi be appointed to fill the vacancy. Motion passed.

A letter from the Lt. Gov. of Mich., requesting St. Johns set up a committee to study the feasibility of a bi-centennial celebration was considered. It was decided to maintain communication with his office, but the cost may be prohibitive to having a celebration, Grost said.

Planning Commission recommendation #1 was returned to the commission for further study.

THE PLANNING COMMISSION'S recommendation to deny the Rademacher request for rezoning was accepted by the city commission. The proposed rezoning would have changed an area between Walker and State Sts to general commercial, for purposes of building a beauty shop. The commission said the proposed building was too large.

The Fink rezoning request from R-3 to general commercial was sent to the Planning Commission.

A new municipal pumping contract with Consumer's Power was approved for 1 year. Consumers had previously cancelled a contract with the city pending an expected rate increase. The increase was later denied, so the contract was reinstated until March 1, 1973 at the old rate. The new contract is also at this old rate, and was accepted without any discussion by the commission.

Sixteen-year-old victim of murder

DEWITT TWP - DeWitt Twp Police were interviewing witnesses and expected to apprehend a suspect Tuesday following the 10:30 am shooting slaying of Alberto Rodriguez, 16, at 526 Valley Rd.

Rodriguez of 3880 Wilson Ave was visiting the Valley Rd home when he was fatally shot in the chest by a handgun.

Witnesses reported the suspect fled the house through the back door and ran down a snowmobile trail.

He then drove away in a green and black car and was believed to have been traveling south of US-27.

Details on the slaying of the Sexton High School student were incomplete at presstime Tuesday.

Judge Green sells private practice

ST. JOHNS - It's full-time Probate Judge Timothy Green.

Judge Green, Clinton County Probate Judge, told the County News he has sold his private practice to Paul Maples and is no longer engaged in private law practice.

His decision to sell followed a decision by the Michigan Court of Appeals which said he was to do "one or the other," but he couldn't continue as probate judge while still engaged in private practice.

In Michigan, a line roughly from Muskegon to Bay City divides the state into 2 sections.

Those probate judges north of the line may engage in private practice while those south of the line are considered full-time judges and are not allowed to practice privately.

The reason for such a set-up is that the state says lack of population in the northern portion of Michigan does not call for a full-time position.

Judge Green felt the stipulation was unfair and appealed on that basis to the Michigan Court of Appeals, but was unsuccessful.

Some local controversy arose also from Judge Green's reported position with the County Road Commission.

He told the County News Tuesday he never held a position with the Road Commission and that his involvement with the commission was "a figment of the imagination blown out of proportion."

Asked if he served as legal counsel for the Road Commission Judge Green said he represented them on occasion,

but as business that came into his law firm as attorney and client.

A story in the Dec 27 edition of the County News stated Judge Green earned \$17,500 as legal counsel for the Department of Public Works, but County Clerk Carter said he was not aware of such a figure in the county budget.

Judge Green earns \$33,000 as probate judge, with \$17,750 coming from the state and the remainder from the county

Finance Commission ok's Bath sewer

LANSING - Attorney General Frank J. Kelley, chairman of the Municipal Finance Commission, has announced the Commission approved \$3,550,000 of "Clinton County Sanitary Sewage Disposal System No. 4 Bonds, (Charter Township of Bath)."

Attorney General Kelley said, "The proceeds will be used to pay part of the cost of constructing a sanitary sewage disposal system and appurtenances in the County of Clinton to service the Charter Township of Bath."

These bonds are payable from fixed

contractual payments to be made by the Township of Bath to the County of Gratiot, pursuant to a certain contract dated Sept 28, 1972, which payments are sufficient to pay the principal and interest on these bonds when due.

The following fees are to be paid from the bond proceeds: Bond Attorney, \$15,125 and Financial Consultant, \$10,925.

Bond bids will be opened Feb 26 at 8 pm.

Fisher Construction Company of Midland is the sewer construction contractor.

Clinton County Sheriff Dept reports indicate the Craig vehicle was traveling east on Maple Rapids Rd, when it went off the road into a snow bank. It was

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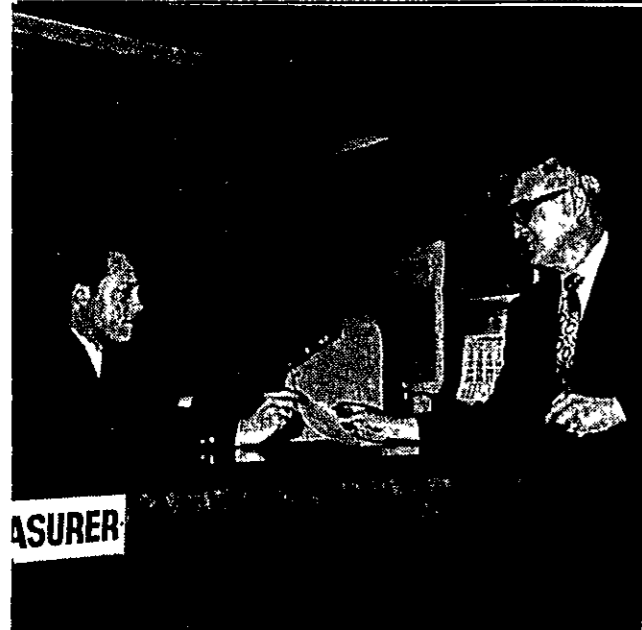

Sealed Power's Sulka assigned to Belgium

MUSKEGON -- Charles E. Johnson, group vice president of International Operations, announced today the assignment of 3 Sealed Power executives to Liege, Belgium. Edward Sulka of St Johns was named manufacturing manager; Bernard K. Harrison, plant engineering manager; and Donald J. Thompson, sales manager; of the corporation's European facility to be located in Liege, Belgium. Construction of the new facility for the manufacture of piston rings will begin in April of this year.

Sulka began his employment at Sealed Power's Muskegon plant, in 1940 working in various capacities in Muskegon until 1946 when he was transferred to the corporation's St Johns, division where he held the positions of general foreman and machine shop superintendent.

In 1965, he was promoted to the position of plant manager of Sealed Power's

machining and foundry operations in Mexico City, Mexico. In 1970 he was again promoted, returning to St Johns, where he is now located as the St Johns' division manager.

Sulka will continue to reside in St Johns working with the International Division in Muskegon planning the organization and facilities of the new Belgium plant until late in the year when it is expected that Sulka, his wife, Evelyn, and daughter, Jan, will move to Liege.

Thompson will be responsible for administering European sales programs and obtaining new business for the Belgium manufacturing operations. Thompson and his family presently reside in Liege.

Fluoride again available for Clinton County families

ST. JOHNS -- Topical Fluoride applications will again be offered to Clinton County children this summer according to Mrs Luella Canfield, RN, chairman of the Clinton County Topical Fluoride Committee.

The fluoride program which is supervised by the Michigan Department of Health, will be made available to pre-schoolers, second, fifth, and eighth graders and to special cases referred by dentists.

According to Luella Canfield, the procedure

consists of 4 visits to the fluoride clinic at approximately two day intervals. The child's teeth are cleaned on the first visit and a fluoride application is applied directly to the surface of the teeth. The fluoride application only is then repeated during the three succeeding visits. This technique has been shown to reduce tooth decay by a about forty percent compared with the sixty to sixty-five percent reduction obtained with fluoridated water, she said.

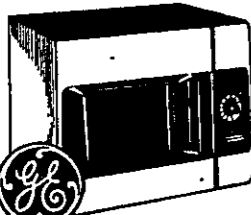

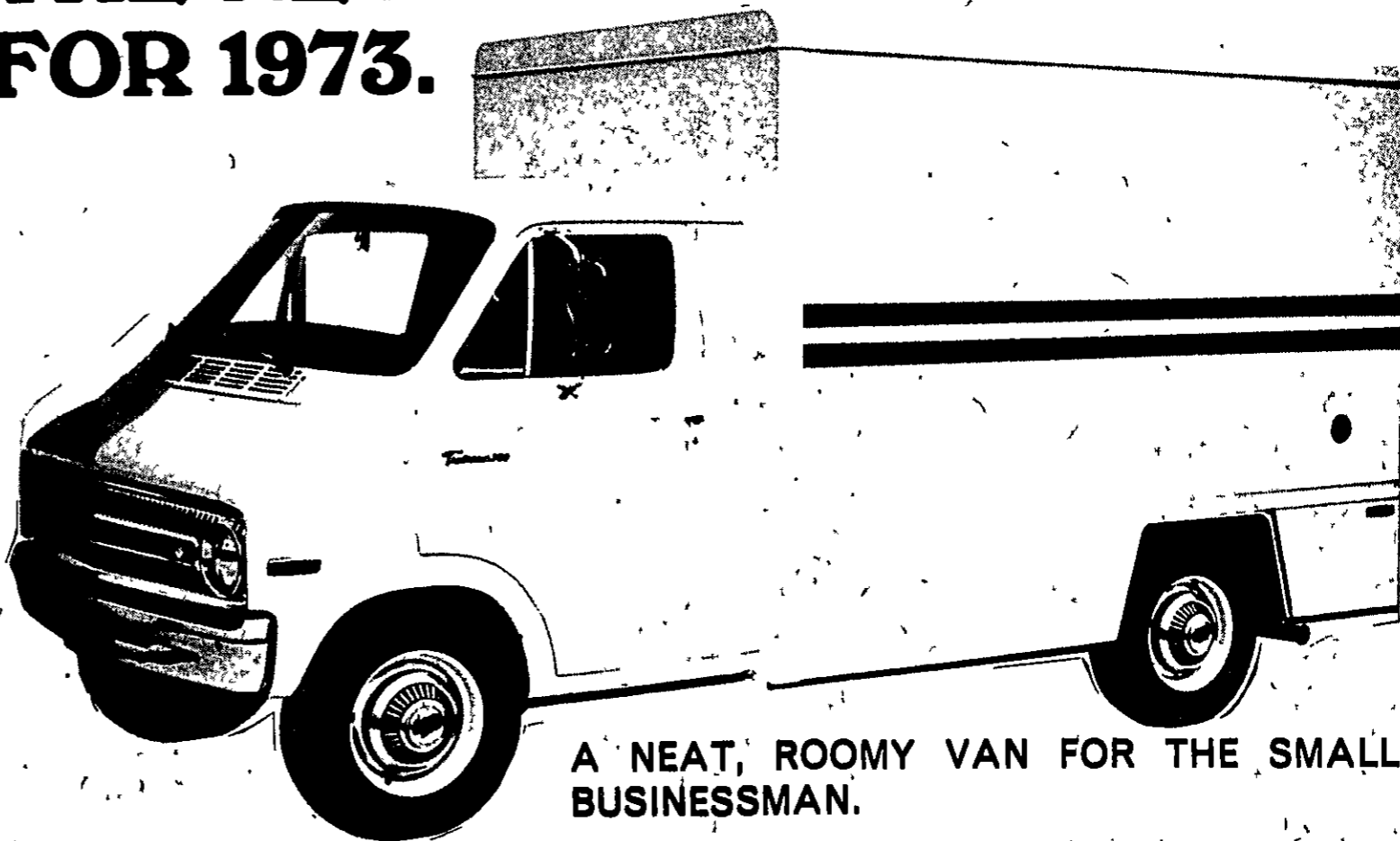

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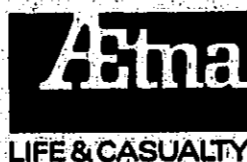

Rejucha is in the US as guest conductor with the first International Festival presently being held by the orchestras of Michigan State University.

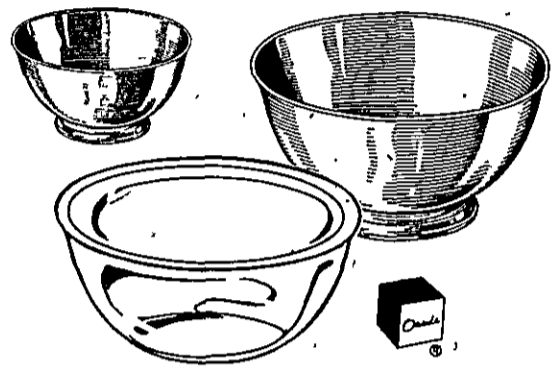
Rejucha is the conductor in Czechoslovakia of the

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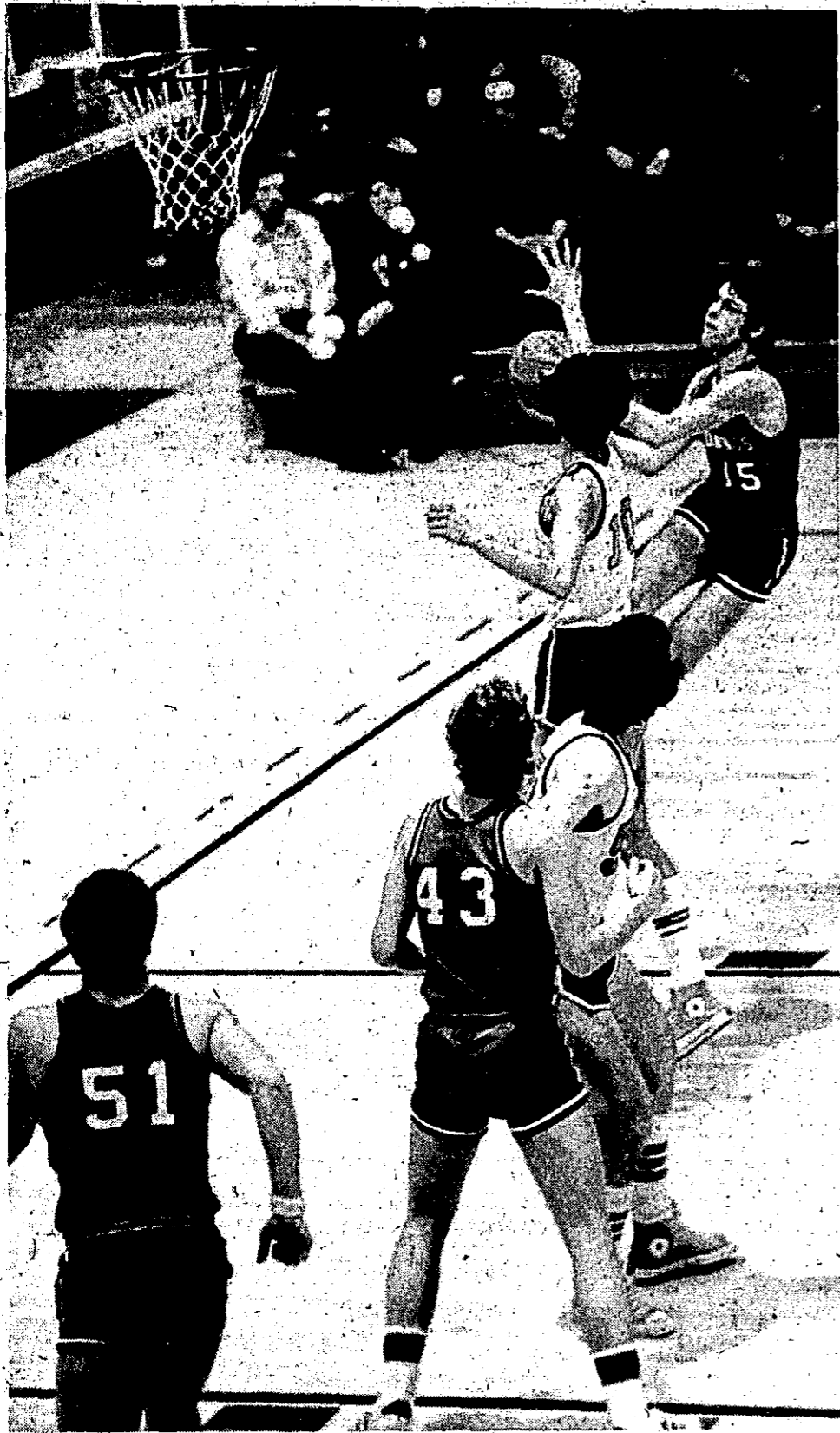
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Redwings rip Alma 91-76

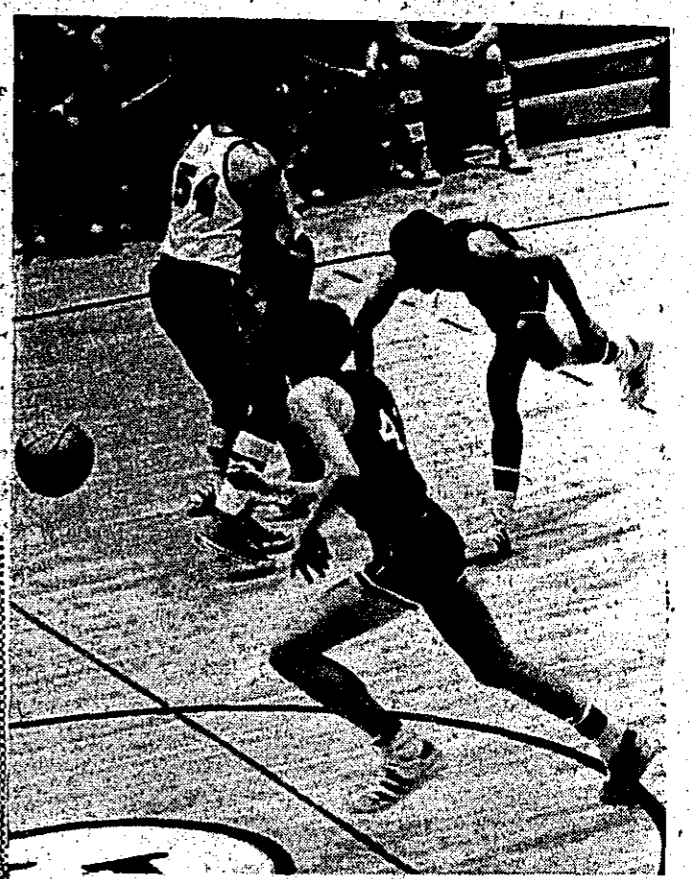
Alma had a 46% shooting average, over St Johns' 43%, but the Redwings poured in

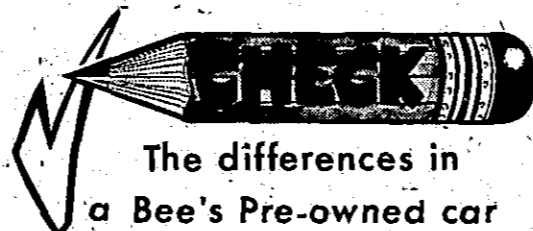

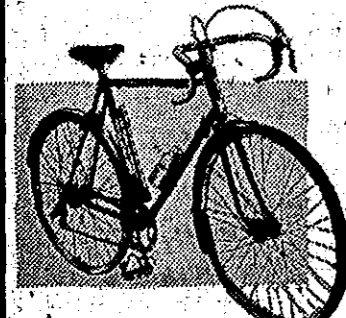

Ovid-Elsie has a tough task on their hands Friday, after a Tuesday home clash with Haslett.

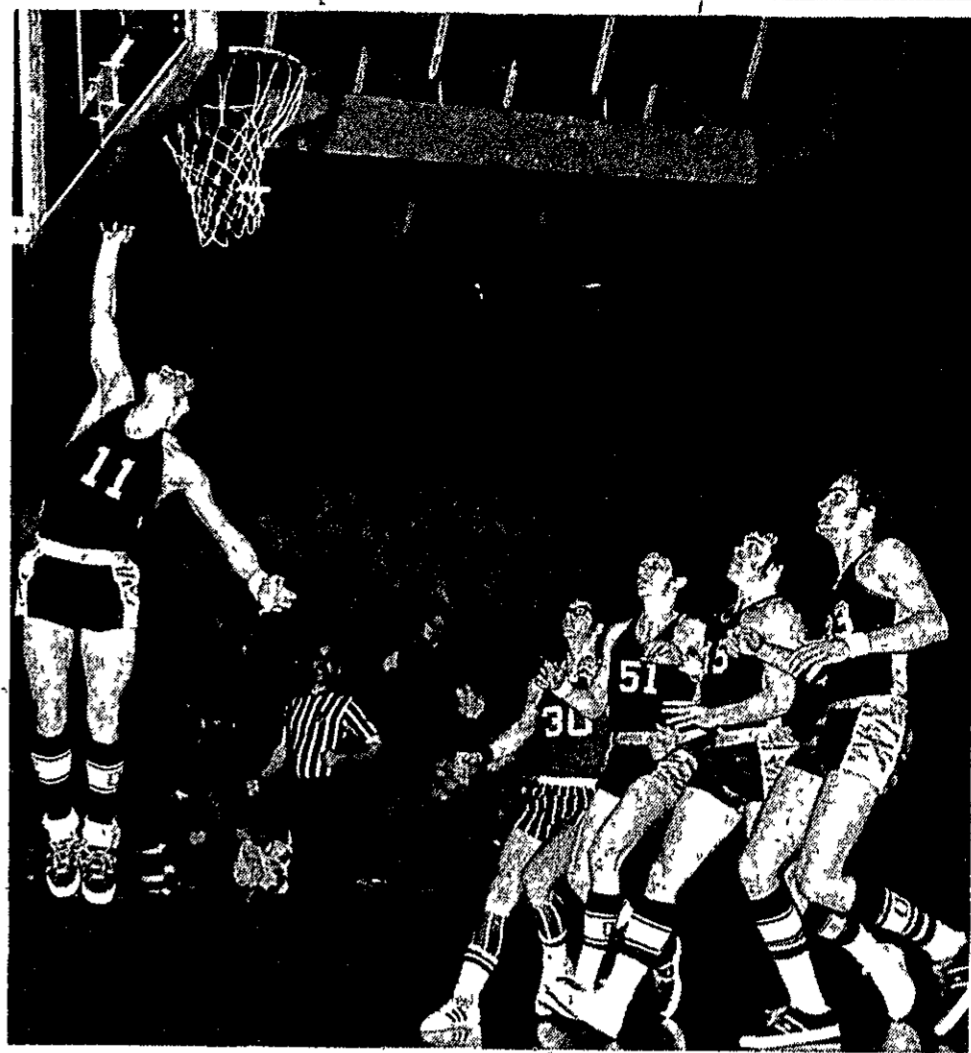
The Marauders host Ithaca Friday, with Ithaca posting an unbeaten league record. The Yellowjackets have lost 2 non-league games, 1 against

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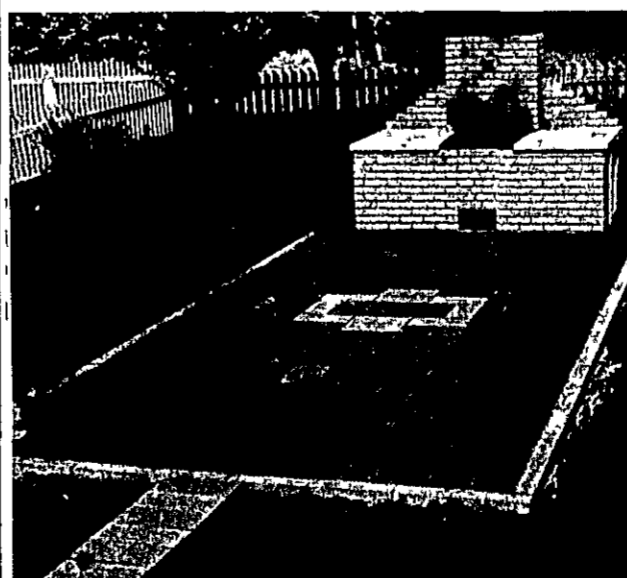
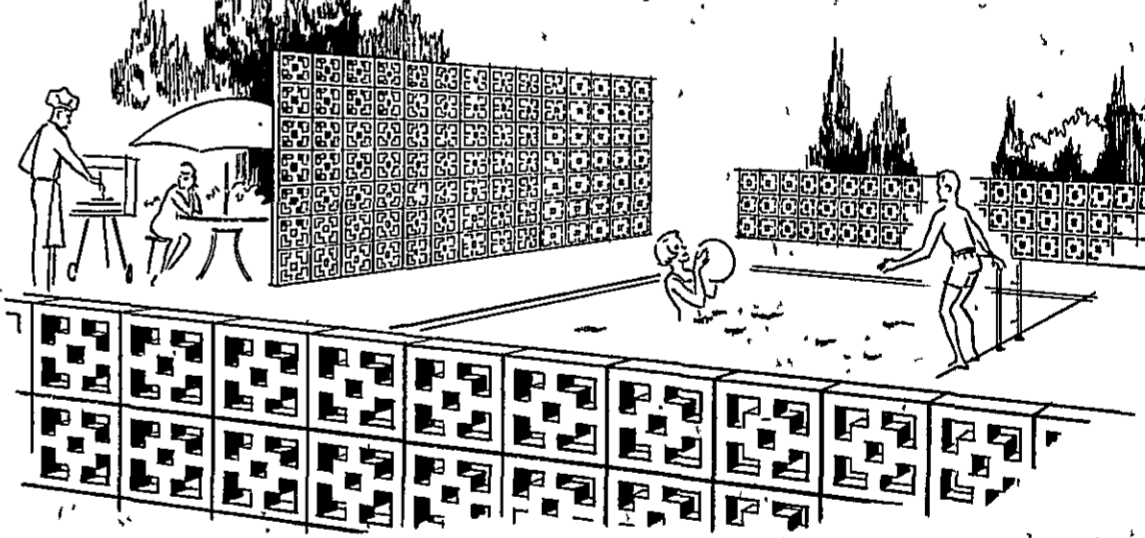
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Pewamo-Westphalia downs DeWitt Panthers

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Want to stop smoking?

ST JOHNS - Smokers who want to kick the habit will have their chance next week under a special Five-day Plan to be conducted by a dental-medical-clergy team at the St. Johns High School evening program.

The plan consists of regular evening group therapy sessions, films and a daily personal control program for home or work. It has been successful over a period of 8 years in major cities around the world.

This Plan is now being held in many of the major cities in the United States and Canada as well as in other countries of the world.

The Plan consists of 5 consecutive group therapy sessions, that include lectures or discussions by a minister-doctor team. Films on smoking and its effects, demonstrations of procedures helpful to overcoming the smoking habit without drugs, exchanges of experiences by participants as they fight the habit are a part of the effective Five Day Plan.

A personal control program that reaches into every minute of the individual's waking life tells him: how to relax, how to avoid familiar spots or activities that might lead to a smoke, when to exercise and how to breathe, what to eat and drink, and even what to think at crucial times.

Thirdly, there is a buddy system that is a vital part of the program and follow-up after the course closes.

The first session of the Five Day Plan begins Feb 19 at 7:30 pm in room 138 at the St. Johns High School. It will feature a film at its beginning, 7:30 pm followed by Pastor Herzog and Dr. Wohlers at the opening therapy session, and a physician has been invited to also participate in the sessions.

The Five Day Plan to Stop Smoking was developed by the Seventh-day Adventist denomination. It began in New England with one of the first courses held in Claremont, NH by a Seventh-day Adventist minister, Elman J. Folkenberg, and an Adventist physician, Dr. J. Wayne McFarland.

Forty persons attended the course in a hotel ballroom, and 30 of the 40 attending stopped smoking.

Subsequently it was tested in several other New England towns, in factories, high schools, sanitariums and, for the general public. The plan has been

observed and commended by the well-known chest surgeon, Dr. Alton Oshner, and by heart specialist Dr. Paul Dudley White.

According to surveys, approximately 50 per cent of the participants lose their craving for tobacco by the 3d day, and by the 5th evening, 70 per cent or more have lost their craving or it is so diminished that they have the problem under control.

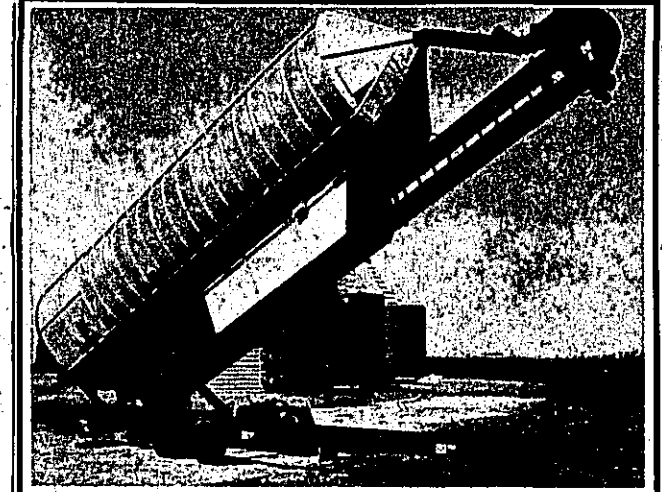

Plenty of questions

DEWITT TWP — There were plenty of questions but not too many answers at the DeWitt Township Board meeting Monday night.

Citizens concerned about poor road conditions were told by Clinton County Officials that gravel fills were considered construction and

Police chief Bruce Angel recognized the problem and indicated due to the time and

expense involved in drawing up and testing such an ordinance, the township must wait to implement one currently now being worked out by Lansing Township.

IN THE SAME vein, several residents expressed concern over the lack of an ordinance prohibiting the discharge of firearms in residential areas.

Angel explained that such an ordinance cannot be enforced in the township because many areas do not meet established residential criteria.

In other business:

*The board voted to hire 1 new full-time policeman with Revenue Sharing funds.

*Denied a liquor license to Joseph DeRose for a proposed restaurant at Coleman Rd and US-27.

*Established a standard procedure for reducing sewer factors. Requests for reduction must be submitted to the board in writing for documentation purposes.

*VOTED THE treasurer be given the option of receiving his salary on a 65 to 35% basis with the greater amount paid during the business tax season. (Nov 1-March 1).

zoning, early recommended to be approved by the Clinton Planning Commission, contending there would be a noise problem and threat to land values.

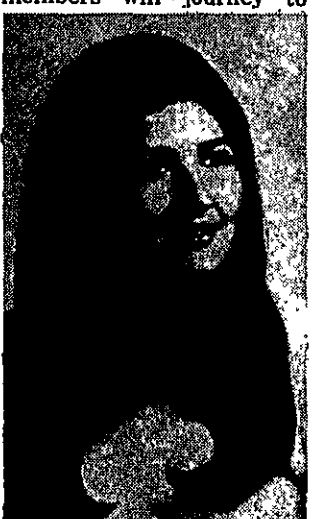

ONE YEAR AGO

Feb 16, 1972
About 35 St Johns citizens jammed into the tiny city commission room Monday night to demand a public hearing concerning a proposed housing complex to be built across from St Johns High School on Sickles Street.

Police officers from the St Johns Police Department and the Clinton County Sheriff's Department announced Monday that they had cracked a theft ring which was responsible for more than 35 robberies totaling \$1700.

Sealed Power Corporation has announced plans for two new manufacturing facilities in Franklin, Ky, and Belgium, according to G E Reynolds, president.

Attacking one of the worst highway bottlenecks in Michigan State Senator William S Ballenger (R-Ovid) has requested the State Highway Department to abandon plans to widen US-27 in St Johns to five lanes and to "seriously consider" rerouting that highway around the Clinton County community immediately.

TEN YEARS AGO

Feb 14, 1963
Enthusiasm for the Soap Box Derby to be staged on N Clinton Avenue next June is snowballing according to officials of the St Johns Jaycees, Chamber of Commerce and Pohl Brothers Chevrolet-Olds, sponsors of the event.

Sale of 1963 license tabs is lagging behind last year's mid-February total, by about 25 per cent, according to Jack Andrews, manager of the local PX Store license branch.

About \$875 was pledged this week toward construction of an All Faiths Chapel at Traverse City State Hospital in a campaign currently being conducted in the county by clergymen and lay leaders.

Fowler school district electors will go to the polls Monday to vote on a

proposition to increase school taxes by four mills for the next three years for additional operating millage.

The annual report of the Clinton County Dairy Herd Improvement Association and Owner Sampler program, released this week by the county extension office, showed a general improvement in production of participating herds and a favorable comparison between state and county average.

The St Johns Lions Club will present its 12th annual Ministerial Show at the high school auditorium at 8 pm Friday and Saturday.

25 YEARS AGO

Feb 12, 1948
Wheat was down to \$2.16 in St Johns this morning as the grain market continued in the worst tailspin in the nation's history. The price collapse in grains surpassed even the 1929 crash and the 1920 slump. In two weeks wheat has dropped in St Johns from a high of \$3.00 to the present \$2.16 quotation.

Announcement was made this week by Postmaster George Judd that Gayle Vanconsant had been appointed assistant postmaster to fill the position left vacant by Geo Osgood's resignation Jan 1.

The estimated minimum requirements of the Clinton County road commission for 1948 has been set at \$300,500 it was revealed this week by Lyle Belknap, county road engineer. This figure will exceed estimated receipts of \$202,000 by \$98,500.

Norman R Sleight, St Johns man who will direct the Red Cross drive in Clinton County this year announced today that the 1948 quota for this county has been set at \$6000. The drive for that figure will get underway officially on March 1.

Questions about Social Security

Q. I'm only 16, but I want to start looking for a part-time job. Do I need to get a work permit before I come in to get a social security number?

A. No, you don't need a work permit, but you should apply for a social security number as soon as possible. The Social Security Administration must screen every application against the national files in Baltimore, Maryland, to make sure that duplicate numbers aren't issued or that an applicant hasn't been issued a social security number before. This process will take several weeks.

Q. I'm enrolled in the medical insurance part of Medicare and I heard that the annual deductible is going to increase. Is this true?

A. Yes. Beginning January 1, the annual deductible under the medical insurance part of Medicare will increase \$10 — from \$50 to \$60. An increase was necessary because of rising medical costs.

Q. I'll be 65 next August and I'm trying to keep up with all the latest information on Medicare. I read that a recent law changed the way I'll enroll in the medical insurance part of Medicare. Is this true?

A. Yes. People who become 65 in July or later and are eligible for Medicare hospital insurance will automatically be enrolled in the medical insurance part of Medicare. However, you'll still have the opportunity to decline enrollment if you decide you don't want medical insurance coverage.

View from the Senate

Michigan's Department of Natural Resources (DNR) — one of the hardest working but least popular agencies in the state these days — may be experiencing growing pains soon.

Governor William G. Milliken recently sent a Special Message to the Legislature on plans for reorganization of several state departments, and one of the most significant recommendations involves the 2,400-employee DNR.

The Governor issued an executive order making that department responsible for environmental matters and proposing to transfer to it what he called "certain essential functions and resources presently devoted to environmental matters in other departments."

The functions being transferred include watershed development and planning and land drainage assistance from the Department of Agriculture; air quality monitoring and regulation, solid waste management and control, sewage collection and treatment regulation, and licensing of septic tank cleaners from the Department of Public Health; and the boundary commission from the Treasury Department.

THE GOVERNOR also is charging the Department, which he proposes to rename the "Department of Environment and Natural Resources", with continuing to develop a land use program. In addition, the Air

Pollution and the Water Resources Commission will be completely integrated into the Department.

The Governor's idea in making these changes is to bring closely-related functions into closer proximity for more effective operation.

But any time a function is transferred from one department to another there is likely to be resentment and hard feelings. Some complaints already have emanated from backers of the Agriculture and Public Health Department, who do not wish to see their functions diminished.

There is little question but that the Department of Natural Resources can probably handle these new assignments and may, in the long run at least, do a better overall job with various facets of these responsibilities brought closer together.

UNFORTUNATELY for the Department of Natural Resources, however, one of its weakest points is its poor public relations, especially with some powerful legislators in both houses and with many hunters and fishermen who are dissatisfied with almost anything the department tries to do.

The additional animosity likely to be created by the ordered absorption of several functions of other departments isn't likely to be good for the Department's already shaky public image. The late P.J. Hoffmaster was one of the most astute department heads the state

has ever had and a master of public relations. The Department's image deteriorated after "Pete" Hoffmaster died and it has never been the same since. It is generally agreed that the Department has been handed some hot potatoes. It has the staff to do a good job but a good image-builder would come in handy.

In the meantime, the Senate Committee on State Affairs is making plans to hold public hearings on several legislative resolutions to disallow all or parts of the Governor's sweeping edict. This will give rank-and-file citizens who will be vitally affected by the gubernatorial pronouncement a chance to be heard.

Down on smoking

At a recent meeting of physicians at the MSU medical college, a secretary taking minutes raised a few eyebrows by placing a "No Smoking" sign on the table. The sign was obeyed, with some grumblings, by the older physicians. A young resident in training, perhaps representing the new breed of doctors, said that "all he could do was to limit himself to two cigarettes".

"Well," explained the secretary, "I have a bad allergy, and a roomful of smoke doesn't do my bronchial tubes any good. My boss doesn't smoke, and I don't see why I should put up with other people smoking in our office."

RIGHTS OF NON-SMOKERS

One of the other doctors, a chest surgeon, agreed strongly with her. He added that the American College of Chest Physicians, the prestigious medical society, has issued a strong statement in favor of what it calls "the rights of non-smokers".

This was no meaningless wordage, as the organization backed it up with action at its recent annual scientific meeting in Denver.

Smoking was allowed only in special sections in the rear of large meeting rooms, providing the air conditioning was judged sufficient.

In smaller rooms, smoking was banned entirely.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The College's board of trustees at its meeting went even further.

"We recommend," they stated, "that all meetings of medical associations and institutions follow a similar pattern, of segregation of smokers, or complete prohibition of smoking, to protect the rights of the non-smoker".

Other equally forceful recommendations were that smoking be banned in public places in the headquarters of medical societies and "at all sites of health care delivery", such as hospitals, clinics and offices of practicing physicians; and that smoke-free areas be developed in all public indoor facilities.

DISCOURAGING CIGARETTE USE

There are probably many more things that can be done to subtly, but firmly, discourage smoking and encourage abstinence.

Ingham Medical Hospital, for instance, where a great deal of chest surgery is done, and the entire staff is aware of late results of chronic

cigarette usage, such as Cancer of the lung or Emphysema, eliminated any cigarette vending machines on premises several years ago.

Many is the time I have seen a seemingly distraught person in the corridors of the hospital, looking avidly for the vending machine, not to be found anywhere in sight.

THE OUNCE OF PREVENTION

The person who smokes probably has both a medical and a social obligation to the non-smoker.

If a person, through a good deal of effort and to protect his health, abstains from smoking, why should he be subjected to polluted air in a small room or office indoors?



School financing

The Supreme Court week gave a belated Christmas present to the people of Michigan in the form of an opinion concerning the financing of our schools. Whether you like the present is a matter of individual opinion. But, one thing is certain — this one will not go the way of many of the season's children's toys — this and its effects will last a long time.

Putting aside the partisan political aspects of the latest decisions, a majority of the justices of Michigan's Supreme Court has decided that the basic method of "support for primary and secondary education in the state which has been used for 135 years violates both the present state Constitution and the US Constitution.

The logic leading up to this conclusion is much the same as was presented in this column a number of times prior to the vote on Proposal "C" in last November's election. Simply stated, the court ruled that there is a sharp disparity among the school districts of the state regarding how much local money is available through a formula which gives more to the low tax base district and

less to the one with more local resources, people in the poorer districts are being denied the "equal protection under the law" guaranteed them by both the state and federal constitutions.

YOU MAY recall some of the examples which have been used. One of the cases cited in the court's decision compares the Dearborn District with the adjacent school system in Inkster. Because of its larger tax base, the Dearborn District can raise \$1,219 per child by levying a local school tax of "25.9 mills." Inkster, using the same tax rate, gets only \$219.21 per pupil. The state aid formula, however, provides Dearborn with only \$106.43 per pupil while Inkster receives \$526.36 from the state. In spite of this, the Dearborn District winds up with \$1,325 to educate each of its children while Inkster has only \$745.

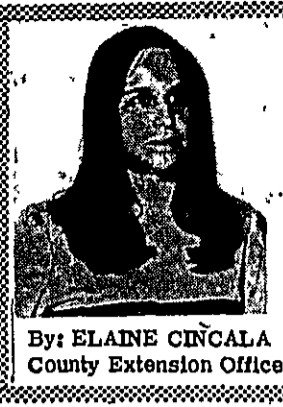
The court now says this kind of inequity cannot continue. I suppose we can be thankful for one thing in the court's decision. It did not impose a method of correcting the problem. Too many times lately we have seen our courts reach decision on the constitutionality of a question and then proceed to order "corrective measure", which, in effect, mean the court writes the new laws.

In this case, the court stuck to its role of judging, and left the correction where it belongs, in the hand of the legislative branch of government. Specifically, the court only ruled on the law which distributed the state school-aid funds for the 1970-71 school year. The same general formula has been used in the two succeeding years and presumably, the same flaws exist. It is obvious, though, we cannot go back and change the way the money was spent, that long ago.

THE COURT did say, however, it will be willing to review whatever formula is developed this year covering school support for the 1973-74 school year.

Environment is the key

Have you heard the one about the couple who adopted a three-month old French baby? They began taking French lessons so they could understand the child when he began to talk.

We laugh, because we know the baby will learn the language he hears spoken around him. It will be English he learns and not French as a result of his being surrounded by English-speaking people.

His environment, then, is the key. And if he is to develop his language skills to the fullest, that environment must provide him with many opportunities to hear and practice speech. He needs both adults and children to interact with. The child that gets little or no such intellectual stimulation starts life with a handicap he may never overcome.

Concerned parents can provide much of the necessary stimulation in the home. When a child is very small you can encourage cooing and gurgling by repeating the sounds and showing that you are pleased. Respond to his cries of discomfort or hunger or fear and he will learn to use his cries to communicate how he feels.

WHEN THE CHILD is first putting words together, you can help by praising successes rather than criticizing and correcting mistakes. You can also encourage self-

expression by asking questions and being willing to listen.

See, too, that he plays with other children. Getting along with others is very important part of life, and a good part of getting along is skill in communicating feelings and desires.

On those rainy days when everyone needs something new and interesting to do, try one of these activities borrowed by MSU Spartan Nursery School.

Play Dough

1 cup salt
2 tsp oil (if you have it)
3 cups flour

Enough plain or colored water to make soft dough (about 1-1/2 cups).

Mix together (let the kids do it). Will keep if covered in refrigerator for several weeks. Add more flour or water if too sticky or dry.

Blowing Bubbles

Add some dishwashing detergent to a bowl or glass of water. Give the kids a straw and let 'em blow

Make-Believe

Large cardboard cartons or packing crates (free from grocery and other stores). Assorted sizes can be used as cars, hiding places, boats — just let the kids climb in and out till the boxes collapse — then throw out the boxes.

Soap Suds Finger Painting

Soap flakes (Lux or Ivory — not a detergent) Water.

Add equal amounts of soap and water together in a bowl. Beat with an egg beater (or shake in a jar) until stiff like egg whites. Use for finger painting — put a glob on a tray and let the kids swish it around, when they are finished, wash the tray; or use brown wrapping paper or grocery bags to paint on. Even the kitchen table works if you don't mind the soap washes right off.

Home-made Paste

3 cups water
1 tsp alum
1 cup flour
1 cup water

Mix the flour and water (1 cup each) into a smooth paste. Bring the 3 cups water to a boil and slowly add the paste, stirring constantly. Add alum. Put into jar with cover.

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Agriculture in Action

January to June

If you are anything like the average of approximately 80 million US taxpayers, you'll pay 43 percent of everything you earn this year in some form of taxes.

This percentage includes all taxes, hidden as well as direct. It includes local school taxes, township and county taxes, sales, gasoline, state and federal income taxes -- all of them.

It will take you from New Year's Day until the first part of June to earn enough just to pay your taxes this year, if you are one of the average taxpayers.

Foreasy figuring, let's say you expect to earn \$10,000 this year. Out of that \$10,000, you will pay \$4,300 in some form of taxes. That figures out to over \$2 per week.

All of the facts and figures, it must be remembered, are based upon averages and calculated estimates, but by

some of the nation's best statisticians and tax experts. We are reaching the point in this country where almost half of our total working time must be devoted to our township, county, state and federal governments and school districts.

We are also reaching the point where almost half of our work force is employed in operations run by our tax dollars.

While averages and estimates can always be proved faulty when applied to specific and individual circumstances, there can be little argument about the total picture they portray.

If all this disturbs you, perhaps you'll find consolation in the fact that it is really relatively good news, for there are strong indications that things may be worse in years to come unless we find a way to halt excessive government spending.



Farm Tips

Plants add beauty

Healthy plants can add beauty and color to your home, especially during these drab winter months. To keep your plants healthy I would suggest these: Make sure your plants get enough light. If necessary, rotate plants from dark to bright areas. Avoid placing plants in awned or northern windows or against inside walls. Don't drown your plants. Use the "finger test" before watering, add water only if the soil is dry to the touch. Generally this is about twice weekly for plants in small pots, and once a week for those in larger pots. Use pots with holes for drainage or put a little coarse gravel in the bottom to avoid waterlogging. Ideally the water should be close to room temperature.

Make sure plants have enough humidity. If extra moisture is needed fill a shallow pan with gravel, add water, and place the potted plant in it.

Avoid temperature extremes or sudden changes in temperature. Don't keep plants near outside doors or radiators or on appliances. Dust your plants about once a month with a damp sponge or a commercial leaf polish. This lets the plants breathe freely. Use fertilizers

carefully. Their use and effectiveness depends upon many factors, so follow instructions carefully. Fertilize only between March and September.

Silos can pollute

That silo is a potentially potent polluter. Drainage from a silo can have 60 to 160 times higher levels of biodegradable organic material and total volatile solids than municipal sewage waste, according to Robert J. Courchaine, Michigan Water Resources Commission.

"We have seen at least one silo that was leaking eight gallons of drainage material per minute," said Courchaine. "It was producing waste equal to that of a city of 25,000 people."

"Generally, most silos do not drain this much, but farmers should be aware of potential pollution."

Speaking at a recent silo conference at Michigan State University, Courchaine recommended these measures:

- Minimize silo seepage by properly controlling silage moisture content.
- Divert natural drainage and storm water away from the silo. This is especially important with bunker silos.
- Locate silos down grade from existing or potential groundwater supply wells and isolate them from natural drainways and flowing streams.

Provide collection and storage holding areas for silo drainage and properly spread collected waste on the land.

Farm may need less storage space

EAST LANSING -- Dorn Diehl, State Executive Director of the Michigan Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, announced major changes in the Farm Storage and Drying Equipment Loan Program which reflect a lessening of need for on-farm grain storage space.

The changes, which were made effective December 13, 1972, are:

- Storage needs will be based on one year's production of eligible commodities instead of the present two years.
- Loans will no longer be available for oxygen-limiting and other silo-type structures or for equipment for use with such structures.
- Costs of materials and labor for concrete work or electrical wiring cannot be included in loans.
- The maximum loan or aggregate outstanding balance is reduced from \$35,000 to \$25,000.
- The interest rate is increased on loans from 46 cents (approximately 5-1/2 percent annually) per \$100 or fraction thereof to 50 cents (6 percent annually) per \$100 or fraction thereof. This new rate reflects increased borrowing costs of money to Commodity Credit Corporation.

The farm facility loan program has assisted many farmers in obtaining on-farm storage and drying facilities in the United States," he said. "Since the beginning of the program in 1949 through the end of fiscal year 1972, approximately \$640.9 million have been loaned to farmers through 356,650 loans; these loans included farm storage structures with storage capacity of almost 1.8 billion bushels."

"Fifty-seven percent of the total funds loaned and more than 49 percent of the total storage capacity built under the program has been since 1967. During fiscal year 1972, producers borrowed a record \$120.3 million through 38,950 loans for storage structures and drying facilities with a storage capacity of approximately 251.2 million bushels."

These contests start in early spring and consist of, agricultural forum, parliamentary procedure, Sr public speaking, Frsh public speaking, and demonstration. The Ovid-Elsie Chapter placed (4th) fourth in the state in parliamentary procedure, 3rd in the state in Sr Public Speaking, and 4th in the state in demonstration.

The chapters next activities are the skills con-

tests, horticulture, soil judging, meat judging, dairy products, poultry judging, agricultural, mechanics, livestock judging, environmental skills, and crops are some of skills contests that the Ovid-Elsie Chapter participates in. The Ovid-Elsie FFA also had exhibits at fairs around the state during the summer such as their sugarbeet exhibit. The Ovid-Elsie FFA received a 2nd place ribbon on their exhibit.

Not only is the Ovid-Elsie chapter one of the most active chapters in the state, it is also the safest. The Ovid-Elsie chapter received a gold award in the state and a bronze award in the national in chapter safety.

With all of the activities that the Ovid-Elsie chapter is in, they do need money. So far fund raising they sold citrus fruit, garden seeds and had a slave sale.

With all this work one would have to say that the Ovid-Elsie FFA is doing a very good job of building today's youth. This is Ovid-Elsie's first year.

VFW National Home changes children's rules

EATON RAPIDS -- For the first time in the 47-year history of the VFW National Home at Eaton Rapids, Michigan, residence has been opened to children of members of the Ladies Auxiliary who are not themselves veterans of overseas wartime service, according to an announcement by the organization's National President, Mrs Lola Reid of South St Paul, Minn.

The proposal to accept children of auxiliary members into the National Home, subject to eligibility requirements of prospective applicants, was put to the vote of life members of the Home. An overwhelming majority favored its acceptance, according to Sam Story, executive director of the National Home.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars National Home is a unique village of children situated amid 640 acres of rich, rolling Michigan land about 20 miles south of Lansing. Some 200 children, their mothers, and houseparents live in 34 residences. Six to eight children and their houseparents are assigned to each residence.

The main source of revenue for the National Home are the sale of Buddy Poppies, proceeds of the National Home Christmas Seals, gifts and bequests, and \$25.00 life memberships in the Home purchased by VFW and Auxiliary members.

The village is self-sufficient even to operating its own fire department with 10 high school boys as volunteer firemen. The boys assist neighboring towns in emergencies, as well as providing fire protection to their own village.

The Junior Girls Unit of the National Home has undertaken the project of replacing the 20 year old fire truck now in use with a new fire engine through the collection of between 6 to 8 million Betty Crocker coupons. In an agreement with General Mills each coupon would be worth one half cent toward the ultimate cost of between \$31,000 to \$40,000.

Village of Maple Rapids Ordinance No. 142

VILLAGE OF MAPLE RAPIDS CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN

Minutes of a regular meeting of the Village Council of the Village of Maple Rapids, County of Clinton and State of Michigan held in said Village on the 7th day of February A.D. 1973 at 7:30 P.M. Eastern Standard Time:

Present: Councilman Schmidt, Brunner, Dean, Tyler, Thomas, Wright, President Abbott.

Absent: Councilman None. The following preamble and ordinance was offered by Councilman Brunner and supported by Councilman Dean.

WHEREAS, it is deemed necessary to the public health and public welfare that an ordinance be passed defining public nuisances and prohibiting their creation and maintenance, the following ordinance which shall be numbered Ordinance No. 42 is hereby offered:

ORDINANCE NO. 42 THE VILLAGE OF MAPLE RAPIDS ORDAINS:

Section 1. Definition of terms: Nuisance defined and Prohibited:

Whatever annoys, injures or endangers the safety, health, comfort, or repose of the public; offends public decency, interferes with, obstructs or renders dangerous any street, highway, navigable lake or stream; or in any way renders the public insecure in life or property is hereby declared to be limited to, whatever is forbidden by any provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 2. Unsafe Structures Defined:

a. Those whose interior walls or other vertical structural members list, lean or buckle to such an extent that a plumb line passing through the center of gravity falls outside of the middle third of its base.

b. Those which, exclusive of the foundation, show thirty-three (33) per cent or more, of damage or deterioration of the supporting member or members, or fifty (50) per cent of damage or deterioration of the non-supporting enclosing or outside walls or covering.

c. Those which have improperly distributed loads upon the floors or roofs or in which the same are overloaded, or have insufficient strength to be reasonably safe for the purpose used.

d. Those which have been damaged by fire, wind or other causes so as to have become dangerous to life, safety, morals, or the general health and welfare of the occupants or the people of the Village of Maple Rapids.

e. Those which have become so dilapidated, decayed, unsafe, insanitary or which so utterly fail to provide the amenities essential to decent living that they are unfit or human habitation, or are likely to cause sickness or disease, so as to work injury to the health, morals, safety or general welfare who live or may live therein.

Section 3: It shall be the duty of the Village Fire Chief, or Village Health Officer, or Village President, or such officers acting in unison to investigate any nuisances or potential nuisances within the Village of Maple Rapids. If the above officers determine that a nuisance exists the matter shall be brought to the attention of the Village Council.

Section 4: If the Village Council determines that a nuisance exists the Village Council shall by resolution give notice to the owner of the property to abate the nuisance within 30 days after receipt of the notice. The notice shall describe in complete detail the condition or conditions which are deemed to be public nuisances. The notice shall further state that failure to comply with its terms within the specified period constitute a violation of this ordinance and make the said lot or premises liable for the necessary expense incurred by the Village in adopting such measures as may be necessary to abate the said nuisance as defined in the notice.

Section 5: The said notice shall either be served on the owner of the said premises or shall be served on the owner by certified mail if the owner

does not reside in the Village of Maple Rapids. If the whereabouts of the owner is not known a copy of the said notice shall be posted in a conspicuous place on the said premises.

Section 6: In the event that the owner, possessor, occupier, or any person, firm, or corporation having charge of such lot or premises fails or refuses to comply with the abatement notice as provided for in Section 4 of this Ordinance, it shall be the duty of the Village Fire Chief, or Village Health Officer, or Village President, or any of these, to direct the Village Department of Public Works to take the necessary steps to abate and remove such nuisance or nuisances as described in the said notice in the event the nuisance remains unabated after the date described for removal in said notice of abatement.

Section 7: The Village Department of Public Works shall keep a record of all necessary expense incurred in the removal or abatement of said nuisances as caused by the failure or refusal of the responsible persons or persons to abate same within the specified period of time and shall submit such statement of expenses to the Village Assessor who shall be responsible for levying against the said lot or premises a special assessment, said tax to become a lien against the said lot or premises and collectible the same as all other taxes so assessed.

Section 8: Nuisance Per Se: The following acts, services, apparatus and structures are hereby declared to be public nuisances:

a. The maintenance of any pond, pool of water, or vessel holding stagnant water.

b. The throwing, placing, depositing or leaving in any street, highway, lane, alley, public place, square or sidewalk, or in any private place or premises where such throwing, placing, depositing, or leaving is in the opinion of the Village Fire Chief, Village Health Officer, or Village President, or any of them, dangerous to or detrimental to public health, or likely to cause sickness or attract flies, insects, rodents and/or vermin, by any person of any animal or vegetable substance, dead animal, fish, tin cans, bottles, glass, or other rubbish, dirt, excrement, filth, unclean or noxious water, or fluids, hay, straw, soil, garbage, swill, animal bones, hides, horns, rotten soap, grease, tallow, offal or any other offensive article or substance whatever.

c. The pollution of any stream, lake or body of water by or the depositing into or upon any highway, street, lane, alley, public street or square, or into any adjacent lot or grounds of, or depositing or permitting to be deposited any refuse, foul or noxious liquid or water, creamery or industrial waste, or forcing or discharging into any public or private sewer any steam, vapor or gas.

d. The emission of noxious fumes or gas in such quantities as to render occupancy of property uncomfortable to a person of Ordinary sensibilities.

Section 9: Penalty: Any person who shall fail to comply with a notice to abate a nuisance within the time limits set by such notice issued under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined not more than \$100.00 or imprisoned not more than thirty (30) days, or both.

Section 10: All ordinances, resolutions, or orders or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of such conflicts, hereby repealed.

Section 11: Severability: In any section, paragraph, clause, or provisions of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause, or provisions shall not affect any of the other provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 12: This Ordinance shall become effective Twenty (20) days after passage. our nightly meetings. Many things done and discussed in home economics are related to and done in FHA. There is much hope that many girls, and even boys, will join FHA. It will give them a good understanding of life as a homemaker.

For FHA and home economics, many things are done for society. Cancer, UNICEF, Care, United Fund, adopting an orphan, programs to improve minority relations, visiting the sick, old folks, blind, the retarded, deaf, etc, are all part of the duties of FHA's.

There are also many fun activities in FHA and home economics, too. There are parties, dances, style shows, international banquets, talent shows, fish fry's, and trips.

Girls also work on degrees for FHA. There are 3 different degrees, and each is a little harder, but well rewarding: (1) Junior (2) Chapter (3) State. There are goals for each, with a write-

up on what has been done, and finally, a test. For the state degree, there are many goals and much hard work is involved.

There is a points system in FHA. Points are kept according to how much work is done during the year for FHA. The girl, or girls, with highest points may go to State Convention.

State Convention is held in the spring each year, for 3 days. Girls with state degrees may also go. Those going get excused from school. They get to meet new girls and compare ideas and have lots of fun, as well as learn.

Workshop is held in the early summer each year. It is for newly-chosen officers, usually the top four. It is located in different places in Michigan each year. This year it was held at Northern Michigan University, in Marquette. Girls from all over Michigan go to compare and take back ideas to their chapters.
